2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Man,

6 that was weak.

7 Good morning, everyone.

8 (Good morning.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 There you go. Get ready for some good

11 times this weekend.

12 If everybody will take their
13 seats and the visitors will retire behind
14 the rail, we're going to get this baby
15 started.

16 To give our invocation this
17 morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend
18 Ethelyn R. Taylor of Oxford Presbyterian
19 Church. She is here today as the guest
20 of Councilwoman Parker.

21 I would ask all guests,
22 visitors, and members to please rise.

23 (Councilmembers, guests, and
24 visitors rise.)

25 REVEREND TAYLOR: Good morning,

2 everyone.

3 (Good morning.)

4 REVEREND TAYLOR: Let us pray.

5 Holy God, Eloheinu, Blessed

6 One, Allah, Lord Jesus, the many peoples

7 of the earth have many names for you, and

8 the peoples of this city are as diverse

9 as the peoples of the earth. Yet we are

10 one people in your eyes, the creatures of

11 your making.

12 We worship you, our creator,

13 for you have made all of us in your

14 image. We pray that your spirit might be

15 upon this body today and each day and

16 that your creativity and wisdom might

17 flow freely among your people in this

18 Council Chamber, for these good women and

19 men were called and chosen to order the

20 life and work of this city with more than

21 a million residents.

22 It is indeed no small task, oh

23 God, for we are all human. And so we ask

24 that you inspire these, your servants,

25 with your own just rule, that they may

5 Thank you. And, again, thank you,

6 Reverend.

7 The next order of business is

10 and the Chair recognizes Councilman

11 Greenlee.

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

13 you, Mr. President. I move that the

14 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

15 January 25th, 2018 be approved.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you. It has been moved and

19 properly seconded that the Journal of the

20 meeting of Thursday, January 25th, 2018

21 stand approved.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 ayes have it, and the Journal is
5 approved.

6 The next order of business is
7 requests for leaves of absence, and the
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. On behalf of the
11 majority, there are no requests of leave
12 of absence today.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 Chair thanks the gentleman.

15 And the Chair now recognizes
16 Councilman Oh on behalf of the minority.

17 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
18 much. On behalf of the minority, there
19 are no requests for leaves of absence.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair thanks the gentleman.

22 At this time, I would like to
23 take a moment to thank everyone who has
24 come down to witness their government in
25 action today. We really appreciate you

2 taking time out of your busy day to
3 witness your government in action. We
4 hope your stay here today is a
5 knowledgeable one but, more importantly,
6 we hope that your stay here today is a
7 pleasurable one, so much so that you come
8 back again. So, again, thank you very
9 much for your participation this day.

10 At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
12 who will present a resolution honoring
13 the African American Children's Book
14 Project. Would Vanesse Lloyd-Sgambati
15 and those accompanying her please join
16 the Councilwoman at the podium.

17 (Councilmembers and guests
18 approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
20 joining Councilwoman Brown is
21 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman
22 Parker, Councilwoman Gym, Councilman
23 Taubenberger, Councilman Greenlee,
24 Councilman Jones, Councilman Green,
25 Councilwoman Bass, Councilman Johnson,

2 and Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
4 Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 You're welcome.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: There is a
8 short list of presentations that we do
9 every year that I completely enjoy, and
10 this one is particularly special because
11 it's about children and the arts and
12 books and literacy. And so it's always a
13 pleasure to lift up and celebrate this
14 year the 26th Annual African American
15 Children's Book Project presentation.

16 This morning we are honoring
17 the African American Children's Book
18 Project on the occasion of the 26th
19 Annual African American Children's Book
20 Fair, and I would amend that and say
21 festival, Ms. Founder, Vanesse
22 Lloyd-Sgambati, and the February 3rd Kick
23 Off of the National Literacy Initiative's
24 Preserve a Legacy, Buy a Book Program.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Whereas, in 1926, noted historian Carter
3 G. Woodson and the Association for the
4 study of negro life and history announced
5 the second week of February to be,
6 quote/unquote, "Negro History Week"; and

7 Whereas, the second week in
8 February was chosen because of the
9 birthdays of President Abraham Lincoln
10 and Frederick Douglass; and

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And I just
12 want to encourage everyone to bring a
13 young person to this particular event.
14 All the books are free, and it's an
15 invaluable experience. So I'd also want
16 to thank Vanesse for her hard work in
17 making sure that we bring high-quality
18 literature events for our young people.

19 Whereas, during early American
20 history, African Americans were not
21 allowed to learn to read and have books;
22 in some states the penalty for this
23 infraction was death; and

24 Whereas, the importance of book
25 fairs cannot be understated and for

2 twenty-six years the African American
3 Children's Book Fair has enhanced
4 multi-culturalism in our City utilizing
5 the joy of reading as a tool; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
7 Vanesse Lloyd-Sgambati, the founder/CEO
8 of the African American Children's Book
9 Project, created the book fair because
10 she saw a void in the community and
11 understood that all children should have
12 access to books that reflect their
13 images. She believes that books open up
14 the world of opportunities for all
15 children and after twenty-six years, the
16 African American Children's Book Fair is
17 the oldest and largest single day event
18 for African American children's books in
19 the country. As a literary consultant
20 she is a much sought after expert on
21 trends in diverse books and how to
22 incorporate these books into homes,
23 schools and libraries; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, one
25 of the most important reasons to

2 encourage reading in our children is that
3 studies show that the more our youth
4 read, the more likely they are to make
5 positive lifestyle decisions as they grow
6 older. Literacy also makes our youth
7 more productive global citizens; and

8 Whereas, strictly judging by
9 attendance, the Fair is a tremendous
10 success as well as over 3,500 people
11 attended the Fair in past years from
12 across the nation; and

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
14 rich or poor, no one leaves empty-handed
15 as the books themselves are priced at a
16 level where they are more affordable and
17 posters, bookmarkers, and raffle books
18 are distributed free of charge to
19 attendees; and

20 Whereas, the success of the
21 event is reflected in five elements: the
22 attendees (parents, children, and
23 caregivers and educators), the authors
24 and illustrators, the sponsors and
25 volunteers. Three esteemed participants

2 are Aldustus Jordan and authors Ray
3 Anthony Shepard and Brittney Shipp; and
4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
5 Aldustus "A.J." Jordan has dedicated his
6 career and personal life to advocating
7 for high quality literacy and educational
8 opportunities for children and families
9 in underserved communities. After
10 beginning his career working for Head
11 Start, A.J. worked as a school social
12 worker, developed education-focused after
13 school programs and served as the
14 Education Coordinator for Public Citizens
15 for Children and Youth, where he
16 organized coalitions to develop advocacy
17 platforms to strengthen public schools
18 across the region; and

19 Whereas, Jordan currently
20 serves as Senior Vice President for
21 Community Relations at Wells Fargo, where
22 he leads the company's philanthropic
23 contributions and employee engagement
24 initiatives for one of the largest
25 regional corporate funders in the areas

2 of early literacy and education. Jordan
3 also serves on numerous non-profit boards
4 and committees, including the Leadership
5 Council for the Read by 4th Campaign, the
6 Free Library of Philadelphia's Corporate
7 Advisory Council, KIPP Philadelphia, the
8 Salvation Army Kroc Center Advisory Board
9 and the Philanthropy Network of Greater
10 Philadelphia; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
12 Ray Anthony Shepard is a grandson of a
13 slave, a former teacher, and the retired
14 editor-in-chief of a major education
15 publishing company. He is a graduate of
16 the Harvard Graduate School of Education,
17 where he received the Martin Luther King
18 Jr. Fellowship from the Woodrow Wilson
19 Foundation; and

20 Whereas, Shepard's book Now or
21 Never: Fifty-Fourth Massachusetts
22 Infantry's War to End Slavery is his
23 first work of creative non-fiction for
24 younger readers. The book is a dual
25 biography of George E. Stephens and James

2 Henry Gooding, both of whom not only
3 served in the Massachusetts 54th
4 Infantry, but also published eyewitness
5 reports of the Civil War from the
6 perspective of the African American
7 soldier. Their correspondence exposed
8 the reality of life at camp, and the
9 shocking misery of the battlefield.
10 These soldiers and the 54th Infantry
11 fought against many injustices, and their
12 leadership resulted in one of America's
13 first notable civil rights victories:
14 the right to equal pay for African
15 American soldiers; and

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
17 Shepard has dedicated his career as an
18 educator to fostering a better
19 understanding of American slavery among
20 history teachers and their students.
21 From his personal experience growing up
22 in Nebraska, he knows that it is
23 difficult, quote, "to teach American
24 slavery without making some students feel
25 embarrassed, angry, or guilty," unquote.

2 With his book, he aims to expose both the
3 pain and hope of American slaves and
4 their liberators; and

5 Whereas, Brittney Shipp
6 recently returned to Philadelphia's NBC10
7 First Alert Weather Team after spending
8 two years as Chief Meteorologist at
9 KRON-TV in San Francisco. Shipp is an
10 Emmy-nominated journalist, and earned her
11 Bachelor's Degree in International
12 Development Studies from the University
13 of California, Los Angeles, and a
14 Certificate of Broadcast Meteorology from
15 Mississippi State University; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Let us
17 thank all of the sponsors who support
18 this annual event.

19 Whereas, Shipp's children's
20 book The Meteorologist in Me was
21 published in 2016. The book tells the
22 story of a girl named Summer who dreams
23 of becoming a TV meteorologist. Summer
24 loves sharing weather facts with her
25 family and friends and wonders why

2 everyone laughs at the thought of her on
3 TV. Despite roadblocks, Summer is
4 determined to pursue her dream of
5 becoming a broadcaster; and

6 Whereas, The Meteorologist in
7 Me was inspired by Shipp's combined
8 passions for meteorology and children's
9 education, and she hopes that her book
10 will help to bridge the gender gap in
11 STEM careers. Shipp is dedicated to
12 energizing young girls to pursue
13 understand weather and science; and

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
15 Whereas, the 26th Annual African American
16 Book Fair will be held free of charge on
17 Saturday, February the 3rd, 2018, from
18 one to four p.m. at the Community College
19 of Philadelphia located at 17th and
20 Spring Garden Streets; now, therefore, be
21 it

22 Resolved, by the Council of the
23 City of Philadelphia, that we hereby
24 honor the African American Children's
25 Book Project on the occasion of its 26th

2 Annual African American Children's Book
3 Fair and the February 3rd kick-off of the
4 National Literacy Initiative's Preserve a
5 Legacy, Buy a Book Program.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Further
7 resolved, that an engrossed copy of the
8 resolution will be presented to
9 representatives of the African American
10 Children's Book Project, the Founder and
11 President, Vanesse Lloyd-Sgambati, Ray
12 Anthony Shepard, Brittney Shipp, and
13 Aldustus Jordan for their hard work and
14 unwavering efforts in the promotion of
15 children's literacy, as evidence of the
16 sincere sentiments of this legislative
17 body.

18 Let's lift up and celebrate
19 those who care about literacy with the
20 African American Children's Book Project.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair recognizes Ms. Sgambati for
24 remarks.

25 MS. LLOYD-SGAMBATI: Darrell,

2 those X's rolled off your tongue.

3 Thank you so much. I'm honored
4 and humbled to be here, and I just wanted
5 to acknowledge a few -- all of the
6 Councilpeople who are in back of me for
7 celebrating and reading the resolution,
8 but I want to give a special
9 acknowledgment to Councilwoman Jannie
10 Blackwell, Cherelle Parker, and Kenyatta
11 Johnson, who are three people who have
12 continually had a presence at the book
13 fair. And one of the reasons why they
14 have a presence there, if you want to
15 meet the future of Philadelphia, come to
16 my book fair. If you want to meet the
17 people who are going to be the next
18 employees of Philadelphia, come to my
19 book fair.

20 So I encourage everyone who is
21 in this room, take some time on Saturday
22 and come out to the Community College of
23 Philadelphia.

24 But I also want to say that
25 reading is important, and as we try to

2 get that Amazon contract, those people
3 who are there are buying books. It warms
4 your heart to see people going up and
5 down the aisles buying books. And we
6 have the Super Bowl of reading, over 30
7 authors and illustrators. Best-selling
8 authors and illustrators from around the
9 country will be present, because we
10 believe a book opens up a world of
11 opportunities.

12 But I just -- I know Darrell is
13 going to give me the hook shortly, so I'm
14 going to say A.J., who is from Wells
15 Fargo, if Wells Fargo stopped giving in
16 this town, it would shut down a lot of
17 community service efforts, and he is in
18 the forefront. He's always willing and
19 able to support all of those causes.

20 And then Ray Anthony Shepard,
21 he worked in the publishing industry for
22 a number of years, and you have a copy of
23 his book. I encourage you to read that
24 book, not only because it has some
25 insightful information, but there's a

2 strong connection, because during the
3 Civil War, Philadelphia had a lot of
4 freed men of African descent who fought
5 bravely in the Civil War for the North.

6 And, finally, Brittney Shipp,
7 you have a copy of her book, and Brittney
8 was so upset she couldn't be here this
9 morning, but the Eagles called and she's
10 on assignment. But we just wanted to
11 acknowledge her by the presence of her
12 book there on your tabletop. And we're
13 going to pass the mic to A.J., but don't
14 forget, a book does open up a world of
15 opportunity. Encourage, enlighten, and
16 enrich our children through literacy.

17 Thank you very much.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. JORDAN: Thank you very
20 much. Good morning.

21 (Good morning.)

22 MR. JORDAN: Great to be here.
23 I want to thank, first and foremost,
24 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for the
25 recognition and for all of your

2 leadership for children and youth issues
3 for so many years and of course, Vanesse,
4 congrats on -- it's hard to believe it's
5 been 26 years -- the annual festival.
6 Certainly my girls and I are looking
7 forward to Saturday. And of course I
8 want to thank Council for your leadership
9 on the issue of education and
10 specifically literacy, but I also want to
11 acknowledge a few of my Wells Fargo
12 colleagues that are here and Jenny Bogoni
13 who is in the audience. For those who
14 don't know Jenny, you have to get to know
15 Jenny. Jenny is with the Free Library,
16 and Jenny runs and leads a coalition
17 initiative called the Read by 4th
18 Campaign, an historic effort bringing
19 together diverse stakeholders, parents,
20 teachers, community organizers, the
21 entire City to comprehensively address
22 the issue of children's literacy in
23 Philadelphia.
24 The alarming reality is that in
25 a city with one of the highest

2 concentrations of higher education
3 institutions, two out of every three
4 Philadelphia kids, two-thirds of all
5 children, are not reading on grade level
6 by the time they enter the 4th grade.
7 Our company certainly is proud to serve
8 as a lead supporter and funder and
9 partner for Read by 4th that's reversing
10 this trend and increasing literacy rates
11 for literally thousands of children as we
12 speak.

13 So let me just say in closing,
14 I know we're all excited about the Eagles
15 on Sunday. We're going to, without a
16 doubt, have a great victory, and then
17 come Tuesday or Wednesday of next week
18 we'll be outside, a million-plus people,
19 cheering on the Eagles as they have their
20 victory parade, but I wonder after all
21 the fanfare is over, can we take that
22 same level of energy, that same level of
23 excitement, and that same level of pride
24 and join the more than 91 partners of the
25 Read by 4th Campaign to cheer on our

2 families to ensure that all of our
3 children read on grade level and go on to
4 make our city proud? I think we all
5 would agree that while a Super Bowl win
6 would be great for the City, ensuring
7 that every single child, every child can
8 read is the biggest victory the City
9 could ever hope for.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Council will be at ease.

14 MS. LLOYD-SGAMBATI: I would be
15 remiss if I did not acknowledge the
16 literary Councilperson, Blondell Reynolds
17 Brown. She brought me here to the table,
18 and thank you so much.

19 Ray.

20 MR. SHEPARD: Good morning.

21 I'm Ray Anthony Shepard, author of Now or
22 Never. It is a book about a
23 Philadelphian, George Stephens, who was
24 obviously born here, became the first
25 African American Civil War correspondent

2 and one of the early African American
3 officers of the Union Army. And I'm also
4 pleased to be part of the 26th Annual
5 African American Book Festival held here
6 in Philadelphia. It is the most
7 prestigious book festival in the nation.

8 Thank you again.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Council will now be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. The next order of business is
15 communications, and the Chair requests
16 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the
17 messages from the Mayor to the Chief
18 Clerk.

19 Mr. Decker, please read those
20 messages.

21 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
22 and members of the Council of the City of
23 Philadelphia, I am transmitting for the
24 consideration of your honorable body a
25 resolution approving the redevelopment

3 Redevelopment Authority for the

6 Area, identified by house numbers and

9 Fifteenth Street and 824 through 826
10 Burns Street, 1522 through 1524 Parrish
11 Street, 1536 Parrish Street and 1538
12 Parrish Street; and

13 An ordinance authorizing the
14 relocation of the lines and the striking
15 and abandonment of certain portions of a
16 right-of-way reserved for drainage
17 purposes and water main purposes
18 extending from Meade Street to Gravers
19 Lane, southwest of Shawnee Street on City
20 Plan No. 165, thereby reducing the width
21 of said right-of-way, all under certain
22 terms and conditions.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you, Mr. Decker. Do you have any
25 additional communications?

2 CHIEF CLERK: I have none,
3 Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you very much.

6 And our next order of business
7 is the introduction of bills and

9 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Forgive me
11 for not being a good student and paying
12 attention, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 That's okay.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I have two
16 resolutions that are not at my desk, so
17 if you could please circle back. Thank
18 you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair now recognizes Councilwoman
21 Blackwell.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. I have no bills or
24 resolutions today. Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 2/1/18 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS

2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Greenlee.

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. On your behalf, I
7 offer one resolution.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you, Councilman.

10 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
11 resolution approving the redevelopment
12 contract of the Philadelphia
13 Redevelopment Authority for the
14 redevelopment and urban renewal of a
15 portion of the Model Cities Urban Renewal
16 Area, identified by house numbers and
17 street addresses as 815 through 819 North
18 Fifteenth Street, 825 through 831 North

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 an American Idol contestant, in a car
19 accident in California.

20 He was born on May the 23rd,
21 1979. He was 38 years old and, as I
22 mentioned, from South Philadelphia,
23 specifically Point Breeze. He was an NBA
24 player for 14 years and played for eight
25 teams in total throughout his career. He

3 University. He played for such NBA teams
4 as Miami Heat, the New Orleans Hornets,

9 He will long be remembered not
10 only for his accomplishments on the court
11 but for his vibrant personality, positive
12 outlook, and the compassion he had for

15 people in Point Breeze, South
16 Philadelphia.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Mr.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I offer
22 two resolutions this morning,
23 Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you so much, Councilwoman.

3 resolution recognizing the Efforts of

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

9 CHIEF CLERK: And a
10 non-privileged resolution Urging the

13 as a Non-Ticketing Day.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

16 And we have no reports from
17 committee today, so the next order of
18 business is the consideration of the
19 Calendar.

20 There are no bills on the First
21 Reading Calendar today, so the Chair at
22 this point recognizes Councilman Henon
23 for the purpose of calling up bills and
24 resolutions that are on our Final Passage
25 Calendar today.

2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. The following resolutions
4 and bills are being called up for Second
5 Reading and Final Passage Calendars

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you so much, Councilman.

14 Before considering the bills
15 and resolutions that are on our Final
16 Passage Calendar for today, we will have
17 our public comment session. It will go
18 as follows:

19 If you are interested in
20 testifying on a bill or resolution that
21 is on the Final Passage Calendar today,
22 if you have not already done so, I'd ask
23 that you sign up at the table to my left.

24 When your name is called, you
25 will go to the middle of the Council

10 your remarks. You will be given three
11 minutes. Thank you very much for your
12 anticipated cooperation.

13 Mr. Decker, please call the
14 first name on the list.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Jojuan Powell,
16 commenting on 180032.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MS. POWELL: Hi, everyone.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 morning.

21 MS. POWELL: Hi, everyone. I'm
22 here today to speak --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
24 state your name for the record, please.

25 MS. POWELL: My name is Jojuan

2 Powell. I'm from the Mantua area in
3 Philadelphia. I'm here to speak about
4 bail reform and how I think we should end
5 cash bail.

6 Can I grab my book really fast?
7 Sorry.

8 I feel like we should end cash
9 bail to -- I really want to know where's
10 the money going to. I forgot the
11 percentage. I'm pretty nervous. I'm
12 sorry. I forgot the percentage of what
13 is taken out and it goes back to the
14 City. I really wanted to know like where
15 does that money go, and if it don't go
16 anywhere, is it possible that it can go
17 to some of our communities, such as my
18 community? I live in the Mantua section
19 community where no teenagers from the age
20 of 11 to 18 has anything to do
21 activity-wise for them to get -- it's
22 easy for them to get in trouble or get
23 arrested, because there's nothing for
24 them to do.

25 So I was just here to ask and

2 beg for the bill to be passed; that is,
3 no cash bail in Philadelphia, so that
4 money can be brought back to our
5 communities.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Nasir Matthews,
11 commenting on 180032.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MR. MATTHEWS: Good morning. I
16 want to apologize in advance for my
17 nervousness.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Speak into the mic.

20 MR. MATTHEWS: My name is
21 Jerome Matthews. I prefer to be called
22 Nasir. I'm here on behalf of the
23 Philadelphia Community Bail Fund. In
24 light of some recent events that took
25 place in like the last 30 days, they

2 really came and helped me out when I was
3 in the position where I really didn't
4 have anyone else to help me.

5 I was arrested and incarcerated
6 and held on bail, which I really couldn't
7 afford or anyone in my family couldn't
8 afford. And I was able to get in touch
9 with them, and they helped me out, and in
10 the process, I lost my job. If I had
11 stayed in any longer, there's a
12 possibility I could have lost my home. I
13 could have lost my car. And for all of
14 those things, I really worked real hard
15 and a lot of years, you know, to actually
16 acquire those things, and as a result,
17 the cash bail system, you know, I almost
18 pretty much lost all of that and would
19 have had to return to pretty much
20 somewhat of a state of hopelessness and
21 feeling helpless after everything that I
22 have acquired.

23 And just as some suggestions, I
24 really believe that there's a lot at the
25 government's disposal that they could use

2 as opposed to cash bail as -- I'm well
3 aware that in a person's absence of not
4 attending their hearing, they can be held
5 accountable. That trial can be held in
6 their absence. They can be found guilty
7 and they can be sentenced, you know, all
8 in the same time. I believe that there
9 are other things that can possibly be
10 done, like when people are accused of
11 committing crimes, they can be held to
12 being GPS monitored while they're on
13 release, because at the end of the day,
14 being citizens of the country, the way
15 that other system works, it's supposed
16 to -- people are supposed to be innocent
17 until proven guilty, but for people to be
18 held in prison without any ways to get
19 out, it's really a feeling like you're
20 guilty until proven innocent. And I
21 really believe that we should work hard
22 to try to do something about this,
23 especially for people that would be in my
24 position that have a lot to lose and
25 would have to work so hard to get it

2 back.

3 That's it. Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

6 (Applause.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Nyssa Taylor,

8 commenting on 180032.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. TAYLOR: Good morning.

11 Thank you. Nyssa Taylor from the ACLU of

12 Pennsylvania. I am urging this Council

13 to pass Resolution 180032.

14 Taking away someone's liberty

15 solely because they cannot pay violates

16 multiple constitutional protections.

17 Across the country a recent wave of civil

18 rights lawsuits have successfully

19 challenged this practice of cash bail.

20 Courts and states such as Georgia,

21 Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi,

22 Missouri, Texas, and California have

23 issued rulings that stop this inequitable

24 practice.

25 In recognition of the terrible

2 toll that we just heard described by
3 Mr. Matthews, legislatures in cities and
4 states across the country have drafted
5 legislation to eliminate this practice.
6 We would urge Philadelphia to join this
7 vanguard.

8 Philadelphia's current system
9 of cash bail violates constitutional
10 protections in three ways. First of all,
11 setting monetary bail higher than someone
12 can afford constitutes excessive bail
13 under the Eighth Amendment and it upends
14 our fundamental rights of liberty and the
15 presumption of innocence.

16 Recognizing this, our United
17 States Supreme Court has written, The
18 traditional right to freedom before
19 conviction permits the unhampered
20 preparation of a defense and serves to
21 prevent the infliction of punishment
22 prior to conviction. Unless this right
23 to bail before trial is preserved, the
24 presumption of innocence, secured only
25 after centuries of struggle, would lose

2 its meaning. Setting bail that someone
3 cannot pay injects into our own system of
4 government the very principles of
5 totalitarianism, which our government has
6 sought to guard against.

7 We know that hundreds of people
8 are incarcerated on State Road because
9 they cannot pay.

10 Second, detaining people solely
11 because they do not have money violates
12 the Equal Protection Clause of the United
13 States. Because an order imposing
14 secured money bail is effectively a
15 pre-trial preventative detention order
16 only against those who cannot afford to
17 pay. Those wealthy defendants with
18 similar criminal histories who pose risk
19 can buy their liberty while our indigent
20 Philadelphians sit incarcerated because
21 they do not have cash.

22 And, finally, the Fifth
23 Amendment of the United States
24 Constitution prohibits the government
25 from depriving people of liberty without

2 due process.

3 Our system flagrantly ignores
4 these protections and strips our people
5 of their liberty as a result of their
6 financial poverty. Philadelphia's
7 current system of monetary bail violates
8 these constitutional protections and
9 takes a toll on our population. This
10 practice must end, and this resolution is
11 a great step in the right direction and I
12 would urge you to pass it.

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
16 you.

17 CHIEF CLERK: William Moore,
18 commenting on 180032.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. MOORE: Mr. President, my
21 name is Reverend William B. Moore. I
22 pastor the Tenth Memorial Baptist Church
23 in Philadelphia for the last 44 years. A
24 number of my parishioners have been
25 victimized by the criminal justice

2 system.

3 For a number of years I went
4 with other pastors to visit the prison
5 and I went for several years, and a
6 number of my parishioners were there, not
7 only the first year that I went, the
8 second year that I went, the third year
9 that I went. They were there so long
10 that they were joined by other
11 parishioners from the church that I
12 pastor as well as other pastors, and many
13 of them could not pay a cash bail.

14 There's nothing that would
15 assist in the speed-up of returning
16 citizens from the criminal justice system
17 than that requiring a cash bail.

18 In addition, while I stand
19 here, I also want to address another
20 issue that impacts our community and,
21 that is, shock waves ran through my body
22 when I read that Temple University was
23 moving forward with the stadium. We have
24 been victimized by senior citizens whose
25 taxes are rising, whose homes have been

2 destroyed. Our neighborhoods have been
3 destroyed by noise and trash. People
4 cannot sleep at night because of
5 students. And as a pastor, I have built
6 a senior citizen home. I participated in
7 homeownership, and yet our communities
8 are being filled by visitors who stay for
9 four years and move forward. And I would
10 certainly urge that when this matter
11 comes before Council, in that Temple has
12 not heard our cry, that the members of
13 this body will hear our cry.

14 I do want the Eagles to fly,
15 but we do not want the Temple to fly.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Mike Lee,
18 commenting on 180032.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. LEE: Good morning, members
21 of City Council. My name is Mike Lee and
22 I am the Legislative Director in
23 Government Affairs for the District
24 Attorney's Office of Philadelphia. Thank
25 you very much for proposing this

2 resolution, and the District Attorney's
3 Office is in favor of Resolution 180032
4 to express our interest in instituting
5 internal policies to reduce the reliance
6 on the cash bail system.

7 We understand that there are
8 currently five types of release on bail
9 that are afforded to the criminal justice
10 system. We are excited to work forward
11 with the other stakeholders in this
12 process to bring forth a better balance
13 of public safety, the rights of the
14 accused, and the moral and financial cost
15 of the current cash bail system. And if
16 you have any questions of how we're
17 trying to reform or inform our reform,
18 please feel free to reach out to me, and
19 we look forward to producing a better
20 Philadelphia and a more fair criminal
21 justice system.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you.

25 (Applause.)

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 CHIEF CLERK: Orlando Acosta,
3 commenting on 180032.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. ACOSTA: How you doing?

6 I'm speaking on 180032.

7 Basically we can't be a city of
8 the forefathers of where we have the
9 Liberty Bell and so-called freedom if you
10 violate the aspect of our Eighth
11 Amendment and the Fifth Amendment in the
12 due process and different things like
13 that. We can't be the founding city of
14 freedom if we're violating civil rights
15 in that way. So we have to eliminate
16 this cash bail.

17 People are being bankrupt
18 because they can't afford to get people
19 released. And how are we going to create
20 a city of unity and liberty and this is
21 where the forefathers wrote the most
22 sacred document in the country, but we're
23 the city that's violating civil rights?
24 That's not looking good on our city.
25 That's not looking good for our citizens.

2 So we have to stop this and let civil
3 rights and people rights speak, because
4 that's what the forefathers of the
5 Constitution want for our citizens.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Weatta

11 Frazier-Collins, commenting on 180027.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. FRAZIER-COLLINS: Good
14 morning, everyone. Giving honor to
15 everyone that is in attendance, City
16 Councilmen, distinguished guests. I am
17 Weatta Frazier-Collins, the daughter of
18 the legendary boxer, Smokin' Joe Frazier.

19 Before I continue --

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. COLLINS: -- if I can just
22 say, go Eagles. I didn't get the memo
23 about wearing green, but my blood is
24 green. As far as the underdogs is
25 concerned, the Eagles is an underdog, but

2 let me tell you that Joe Frazier was
3 probably the first underdog in the City
4 of Philadelphia back in the '60s.

5 I stand before you today asking
6 for permission and approval to allow
7 Glenwood Avenue to be changed to Joe
8 Frazier Boulevard, Street, Avenue,
9 whichever you all prefer.

10 My father was a dynamic man.
11 He was a man that gave back from his
12 heart and the spirit of love. He
13 mentored a great deal of individuals in
14 the City of Philadelphia, men and women.
15 I ask that you approve this in honor of
16 him.

17 The Fraziers are not finished.
18 When we closed down his estate, we
19 realized that there weren't any schools
20 named after Joe Frazier. There are no
21 buildings named after Joe Frazier. This
22 man did a lot for the City of
23 Philadelphia and it is overdue, but the
24 bad thing is, my father was modest. He
25 believed that he was just doing his job.

2 So when he woke up in the morning to run
3 down Fairmount Park and do his road work
4 and to get things done to make things
5 perfect for his family, he just figured
6 he was doing his job. He didn't need a
7 statue. And thank God that is now down
8 at the Xfinity Live. He figured he
9 didn't need all these accolades, because
10 the bottom line is, his parents taught
11 him to be respectful, to be humble, and
12 to get the job done.

13 So I ask as the Founder and the
14 CEO of The Legacy Exists Joe Frazier
15 Scholarship Fund to pass this bill to
16 honor this great golden Olympian medal
17 winner. I stand also with my husband,
18 Gary Collins, and we're just grateful for
19 the opportunity and hope that you all
20 will actually pass this bill.

21 Thank you for the chance.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Norman Wooten,
25 commenting on 180027.

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 MR. WOOTEN: Good morning,
4 Council President Darrell Clarke.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MR. WOOTEN: Good morning, City
8 Council elected officials. Good morning,
9 Frazier family. And good morning to all
10 the family and guests here. My name is
11 Norman S. Wooten. I reside in North
12 Philadelphia as a committee person for
13 the 37th Ward, 10th Division. I, along
14 with my counterpart, Michael Abdullah,
15 represent this North Philadelphia
16 community.

17 We, the aforementioned, have
18 proudly signed petitions to have Glenwood
19 Avenue east of Broad Street renamed
20 officially to Joe Frazier Boulevard. Joe
21 Frazier, former heavyweight champion,
22 went down in history as one of the
23 greatest boxers to ever step into the
24 ring. He stepped in at 20 years old and
25 won the gold medal at the 1964 Tokyo

2 Olympics. He completed his career with a
3 record of 32, 4 and 1 with 27 knockouts.

4 He made Philly his home. He
5 built a gym in a house here because he
6 loved the people. But his roots ran deep
7 in the sandy soil of South Carolina where
8 he was born in 1944. Joe was a man who
9 at an early age helped his father with
10 heavy work around the house. Long before
11 he became Smokin' Joe, he was known in
12 Beaufort, South Carolina as Billie Boy, a
13 stocky farmer's son who honed his skills.
14 By the age of 16, he came to Philadelphia
15 to stay with residents, got a job in a
16 slaughterhouse, describing himself as a
17 small piece of leather, well put
18 together.

19 Joe found respect in the
20 pitless survival wars of the North Philly
21 boxing gyms. He never backed up and he
22 never backed down.

23 In closing, I'm proud to be
24 here today in honor of Joe Frazier, as
25 his legacy will continue to be remembered

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 in the streets of Joe Frazier Boulevard.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

6 Clerk, would you read the name
7 of our next speaker, please.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Ethelind Baylor.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. BAYLOR: I see Council
11 President Clarke coming back, members of
12 City Council, brothers and sisters, and
13 fellow Philadelphians. My name is
14 Ethelind Baylor, Vice President of AFSCME
15 District Council 47.

16 I am here to speak in support
17 of Councilman Green's resolution
18 recognizing a moment of silence today,
19 February 1st, 2018, in honor of the
20 sacrifices made by the Memphis sanitation
21 workers who proclaimed "I Am a Man" in
22 their successful campaign to secure their
23 economic rights and social dignity.

24 To honor those sanitation
25 workers and their supporters that stood

2 up for their right to remind the public
3 they were indeed human, that they deserve
4 proper equipment to do their jobs, and
5 that they deserve the right to be
6 recognized as a union in 1968 and those
7 who died on the job in Memphis,
8 Tennessee, Brothers Cole, Robert Walker,
9 as well as your recognition of our
10 national Moment of Silence event
11 scheduled today, February the 1st at
12 12:30 p.m. here outside of City Council.

13 Fifty years later, brothers and
14 sisters in AFSCME District Council 47
15 continue the struggle for fair wages,
16 safe working conditions, and the right to
17 retire with dignity for union workers in
18 Philadelphia. We appreciate your
19 resolution. It is also a reminder that
20 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. stood with
21 those AFSCME sanitation workers and was
22 assassinated while still in Memphis on
23 April 3rd, 1968.

24 The moment for civil and human
25 rights today is still a labor and clergy

2 working together to improve the
3 conditions for working people in this
4 nation. The sign "I Am a Man" reminding
5 us of the struggle in Memphis is a poster
6 I see every time I enter into our
7 District Council President's office,
8 Frederick Wright. It is a constant
9 reminder of the people who struggled and
10 died for our right to have organized
11 labor.

12 We must never forget those who
13 made the supreme sacrifice, and we have a
14 responsibility to continue the struggle
15 for jobs, peace, and freedom. Echol
16 Cole, Robert Walker, Dr. King, Brother
17 Norman Rayford, member of the Hospital
18 Workers 1199C who also died while
19 organizing for members in his union.

20 Again, thank you, Councilman
21 Green, and for those members in City
22 Council who will support this resolution
23 in recognizing AFSCME's national Moment
24 of Silence today, Thursday, February the
25 1st, 2018 at 12:30 p.m. through 1:30 p.m.

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 outside of City Hall. We invite all of
3 you to join us today, and if you can't
4 make it outside, we ask that you just
5 join us in a moment of silence. Please
6 take a video or picture of yourself, and
7 we ask that you use the hashtag
8 #iamcoleandwalker.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Blanche Brown.

14 (No response.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Blanche Brown.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Brad Wilson.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MR. WILSON: Hello, everyone.

20 I'm Brad Wilson. I lied about what issue
21 I want to speak about, but why? I want
22 to get up here and speak.

23 Everybody, I'm a resident of
24 Center of Hope, the shelter for men up at
25 Broad and Girard, and I've lived there --

2 this is the second time I've lived there.

3 The reason why I wanted to come up and

4 speak, everybody, I'm putting out a cry

5 for help. I'm not a baby, but a serious

6 cry. Center for Hope does not provide us

7 with a hot shower. The roof leaks. They

8 refuse to get the roof fixed. Two guys

9 had their bed wet by this roof leaking.

10 The rooms do not have proper heat, and

11 when we complain to the staff or go to

12 director, the director says, I'll take

13 care of it, and nothing happens.

14 This is a real cry for help.

15 Can you please get us some help? Hot

16 water heaters and a new roof put in.

17 Those are serious L&I --

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 You're speaking about the BID, the

20 Northern Liberties BID?

21 MR. WILSON: Excuse me?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You

23 signed up to speak about the Northern

24 Liberties BID.

25 MR. WILSON: Right. Darrell,

2 this is the only way I can probably get
3 some help out there. I know you City
4 Council people are able to do something
5 about the shelter system.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
7 sir --

8 MR. WILSON: But we've gone to
9 the director --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
11 excuse me. You signed up to speak about
12 the Northern Liberties BID.

13 MR. WILSON: That's all I came
14 to speak about, because we need help.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Something else? Okay.

17 MR. WILSON: We seriously need
18 help.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do
20 me a favor? Sir, will do me a favor?
21 Can you hang around until after the
22 Council. I'll have somebody sit down and
23 talk to you about the specific issue.
24 Thank you.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Jared Doblein,

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 commenting on 171145.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. DOBLEIN: Good morning. My
5 name is Jared Doblein.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MR. DOBLEIN: I'm here to speak
9 on Bill 171145 about the proposed
10 non-profit creation for the development
11 of Northern Liberties. I think for too
12 long Council has allowed these
13 non-profits to develop and allowed to
14 play a shell game with developers' money
15 and allowing tax breaks and allowing tax
16 abatements and allowing development
17 without community consciousness in mind.

18 That being said, I think that
19 this Council has a decision to make in
20 granting a variance for the stadium in
21 North Philadelphia. Our Council
22 President has said time and time again
23 that if the North Philadelphia residents
24 stand against this stadium, like they
25 have against these for-profit

2 developments without them in
3 consideration, without these for-profit
4 developments, without time for public
5 housing, without money for public
6 housing, if he stands with us, he'll
7 stand -- he said he will stand with us if
8 we speak out against the stadium. We're
9 standing right now --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Excuse me. You started out talking about
12 the non-profit corporation. Are you
13 talking about the Northern Liberties BID?

14 MR. DOBLEIN: Right.
15 Absolutely.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Okay. I just want to make sure. I
18 understand it's a strategy to segue, but
19 as long as you start out by talking about
20 it.

21 MR. DOBLEIN: Right. Well,
22 they're all connected in terms of the
23 property development in this community.
24 So the North Philadelphia stadium is just
25 another move to be able to develop

2 properties in that community without the
3 consent of the district residents. The
4 district residents are right now in
5 Council, and they're opposing that
6 stadium. They're opposing the variance
7 to block off 15th Street. They're
8 opposing putting a 35,000-seat football
9 stadium, a single lane across from a day
10 care, across from long-term community
11 residents' homes. And we think we're
12 sick of Council playing this shell game
13 where they put this money in the
14 non-profits, and the non-profits go there
15 and they do the developments, but no one
16 lives in them or they bring in people
17 from outside the neighborhood with little
18 money put toward mixed housing or
19 low-income housing.

20 So we think that the stadium is
21 another example of this. It will lead to
22 gentrification in North Philadelphia. It
23 will lead to the displacement of
24 long-term residents, and we think it's a
25 shame for Temple to be wanting to do

2 this, for a community school to be
3 wanting to do this, and we think that
4 Council should stand against the proposed
5 stadium in North Philadelphia, just like
6 it should stand against the shell games
7 that are played with non-profits and
8 community development corporations.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Anthony Monteiro.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MR. MONTEIRO: Thank you very
15 much.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MR. MONTEIRO: Good morning,
19 Council President, and thank you, Council
20 President Clarke. Thank you,
21 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell. In some
22 ways what we do here today with this
23 resolution recalls your late husband,
24 Councilman Lucien Blackwell, who loved
25 and was inspired by Du Bois. For him, I

2 am certain this is a dream come true.

3 Thank you, Councilwoman Helen
4 Gym, for introducing this resolution into
5 Council. It's an historic resolution.
6 Honoring William Edward Burghardt Du Bois
7 on the occasion of the 150th anniversary
8 of his birth and to declare 2018 the Year
9 of Du Bois and encouraging Philadelphians
10 to read Du Bois this year is a special
11 moment for our city and nation. It
12 carries transcendent and spiritual
13 significance.

14 In honoring Du Bois, who
15 honored our city with his landmark
16 sociological study, the Philadelphia
17 Negro, the Council honors our citizenry
18 and makes a statement about the values we
19 strive to realize. The citizens will
20 take pride in this act. The nation will
21 acknowledge it, but more than this, the
22 world will take notice and say here is a
23 city whose leaders are imbued with moral
24 courage, that here is a city with the
25 courage to stand up for a man who at the

2 height of McCarthyism was attacked by his
3 own government, whose name was smeared
4 and books removed from libraries and his
5 name could only be mentioned in whispers.
6 The world and nation will say here's a
7 city that is great because it honors not
8 just a great scholar, scientist, poet,
9 internationalist, and activist for the
10 rights of African Americans, the darker
11 races of the world and working people,
12 but who was one of the great fighters for
13 world peace and for the progressive unity
14 of all peoples.

15 As the world hears about this,
16 it will pause and say here is that city
17 on the hill. Here is that city that
18 dares to imagine what James Baldwin
19 called the new Jerusalem. They will say
20 Philadelphia is that city that
21 audaciously imagines what the African
22 Pope, Saint Augustine, called the New
23 City of Man.

24 In embracing the life and
25 legacy of Du Bois, Council will say

2 Philadelphia is a city that strives to
3 realize man and womankind's most ancient
4 strivings for peace, justice, and human
5 rights.

6 Our people suffocate under the
7 weight of one crisis after another of
8 wars and threats of more horrific wars.

9 I think I have to stop.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
11 know, you're on a roll.

12 MR. MONTEIRO: Thank you very
13 much. This will be a great occasion.
14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Meghna Chandra.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MS. CHANDRA: Good morning,
21 everybody. My name is Meghna Chandra. I
22 am a Ph.D. student at the University of
23 Pennsylvania, a member of the Saturday
24 Free School, and a member of the
25 Organizing Committee for the 2018 Year of

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Du Bois.

3 Making 2018 the Year of Du Bois
4 would be an act of courage on the part of
5 City Council, upholding science,
6 integrity, and peace.

7 As a student in the University,
8 we learn two approaches to scholarship.
9 On the one hand, we learn that statistics
10 can reveal the truth. On the other, we
11 learn that there is no one truth, that
12 the world is too complicated to
13 understand.

14 Du Bois teaches us that science
15 free from the delusions of white
16 supremacy can help humanity evolve. In
17 the Philadelphia Negro, he demonstrated
18 meticulously through sociological methods
19 that blacks are an oppressed people who
20 faced problems, not because they're an
21 inferior race as the whites believed but
22 because of the cruelty of white society.

23 Du Bois realized that the truth
24 alone was not enough to change the world.
25 He understood the need to stand for truth

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 in a system that tried to bury it.

3 In 1908, he delivered a speech,
4 Galileo Galilei, at his alma mater. In
5 his speech he said that Galileo for all
6 his scientific accomplishments was a
7 failure because he lied about the
8 scientific truth in order to save his
9 life.

10 Science is a great and worthy
11 mistress, but there is one greater and,
12 that is, humanity, which science serves.
13 One thing there is greater than knowledge
14 and, that is, man who knows. In the
15 midst of the society whose lifeblood is
16 faith and in the name of science which
17 will know the truth, that the truth may
18 make it free, the verdict of civilization
19 must be not even splendor of the service
20 of truth done by Galileo Galilei can wipe
21 away the blot of its cowardly lion.

22 Unlike Galileo, Du Bois was a
23 true scientist and warrior who lived his
24 life unbowed and unbroken. He stood for
25 the full recognition of the humanity of

2 black people at a time when the whites'
3 power structure believed that black
4 people were subhuman. He stood for peace
5 at a time when being American meant
6 standing for war. He paid the price for
7 it many times throughout his life, but he
8 gained the respect of the darker nations
9 around the world and the gratitude and
10 respect of future generations.

11 Finally, to proclaim 2018 the
12 Year of Du Bois is a profound act of
13 imagination and the belief that humanity
14 can evolve. To honor W.E.B. Du Bois is
15 to believe in a future in which people
16 have the courage to stand up for what's
17 true even when it's unpopular and
18 dangerous, and in celebrating the legacy
19 of this great man, young people know what
20 it is to dedicate our lives to the
21 pursuit of truth, justice, and freedom.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Autumn Zellers.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

1 2/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. ZELLERS-LEON: Good
3 morning. So my name is Autumn
4 Zellers-Leon. I am a member of the
5 Saturday Free School and I am also an
6 anthropology Ph.D. student at Temple's
7 College of Liberal Arts, and I'm speaking
8 today in favor of the resolution of the
9 Year of Du Bois in 2018.

10 So as a graduate student, I
11 teach classes and assist professors who
12 teach classes. In this way, I and my
13 colleagues prepare Philly's community for
14 public service and the world.

15 I was born in Philadelphia, but
16 the majority of my colleagues come from
17 all over the country and the world, and
18 here in Philadelphia we find a city rich
19 in cultural and radical political
20 traditions rooted in its thriving black
21 community. We find this alongside deeply
22 unsettling social facts of poverty,
23 segregation and, as the Councilman
24 mentioned earlier, struggles with
25 literacy.

2 As graduate students and
3 university employees, we find ourselves
4 sharing with others in the City, country,
5 and world the fears of an uncertain
6 future. In this milieu, I started what
7 is now nearly an extinct species of event
8 at Temple University -- that's a reading
9 group -- of none other than W.E.B. Du
10 Bois's magnum opus, Black Reconstruction.
11 Every week since September of last year
12 grad students and undergraduates and
13 community members have sat around a table
14 reading to each other aloud Du Bois's
15 work. Reading him has helped to
16 illuminate our social condition here in
17 Philadelphia.

18 Du Bois's life of a scholar
19 drastically unrecognized in his lifetime
20 offers us clarity and hope in these
21 confusing times. And among so much of
22 this confusion inside the university and
23 out, we have found a common thirst
24 between ourselves as students and
25 community members for clarity and

2 knowledge, and we have also learned about
3 our responsibility to tell the truth for
4 a better world. We have learned about
5 the color line and its powerful role in
6 shaping the social inequality we
7 experience and see around us. We have
8 also learned how it is crucial to
9 understand this color line if we want to
10 move forward as scholar activists in the
11 United States.

12 Finally, by reading Du Bois
13 together, sharing aloud his pros and
14 poetry, we honor the magnificent
15 contribution he has made to our city,
16 which was only formally recognized
17 decades after his death in 2012 at the
18 University of Pennsylvania.

19 The Council's vote in favor of
20 this 2018 Year of Du Bois resolution
21 would also be an honor to his service and
22 an expression of solidarity with the
23 people of this city thirsty for knowledge
24 and clarity.

25 Thank you.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. DANIHEL: Okay. This is an
8 official decree of the people in writ of
9 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
10 requires immediate action and remedy.
11 Every week this Council, Mayor, and
12 others transfer private property to the
13 government, probably illegally.

14 People testify at Council every
15 week. People pay their tax dollars,
16 expecting government will spend them
17 wisely and lawfully. Then how can agents
18 and agencies steal my home without
19 compensation, due process or Seventh
20 Amendment trial by jury? How can
21 government pay a contractor upwards of
22 100 million, mostly federal taxpayer
23 dollars, to build a mall on my stolen
24 home? How can agents and agencies deny
25 and defy inalienable, inviolable,

2 God-given rights without required
3 prosecution?

4 Rule of law requires every
5 official to report these actions to the
6 DA, the PA Attorney General, and the U.S.
7 Attorney General immediately given that
8 hundreds of millions of federal taxpayer
9 monies appear to be involved. Have
10 officials respected their fiduciary duty
11 to guard against spending these precious
12 taxpayer dollars and reported this, as
13 required by oath and law?

14 If committing one crime one
15 time would land people in jail, then RICO
16 laws are clearly required to round up
17 groups of oath-violating officials.

18 The Constitution and laws
19 require immediate remedy of this breach
20 of law, breach of close, breach of
21 fiduciary duty. Your oath of office
22 requires you to act or face prison.

22 elderly food cupboard that I run in our
23 community that serves the 19121, 19132,
24 and 19130 zip code area. So I thank you
25 for having the foresight to see this, and

23 March, local high school students,
24 college students, nearly a quarter of
25 them white, were participating alongside

12 people, led by his wife Coretta Scott

15 days later, demanding that the city
16 accede to the union's requests, and
17 negotiators finally reached a deal on
18 April 16th allowing the City Council to
19 recognize the union and guarantee a
20 better wage.

21 Today we join with cities from
22 around this country to pass this
23 resolution in support of this 50th
24 anniversary as we join the "I Am 2018"
25 campaign. Today at 12:30, our local

20 Eagles history fact. So for the next
21 couple of minutes, I will speak to the
22 Eagles' history around their
23 philanthropy.

24 You were here in 2000, along
25 with Councilman O'Neill and Councilwoman

2 Jannie Blackwell, when we were discussing
3 quite vigorously the negotiation of the
4 building of the new stadiums. The
5 leadership of the Eagles was approached
6 to give back to our city's children,
7 which many of us felt essential and I
8 felt a requirement. With the help and
9 the lift of former Mayor John Street and
10 Deputy Mayor George Burrell, who I am
11 eternally grateful for because I was a
12 freshman, very green, they guided me with
13 shuttled diplomacy where I was ultimately
14 sitting at the same table with the Eagles
15 leadership.

16 Out of multiple meetings, we
17 reached an agreement with the Eagles
18 whereby they would give \$1 million per
19 team per year for 30 years to
20 Philadelphia's children. And today any
21 non-profit can go to the Philadelphia
22 Foundation website, look up the Fund for
23 Children, and those non-profits can apply
24 for funding that covers children's
25 programming in arts and culture, which I

2 had to negotiate for, because no one saw
3 the value of why that's important to
4 kids; athletic programming; early
5 childhood education; and parenting
6 workshop.

7 I applaud the leadership of the
8 Eagles for their willingness to give back
9 to our city's children, and today 30
10 years -- 25 years going forward, that \$1
11 million will go into a fund to support
12 Philly's kids.

13 So while those of us who are
14 very, very astute in the logistical
15 information around the Eagles, I salute
16 the Eagles because their philanthropy.
17 And because of that, I say fly, Eagles,
18 fly.

19 Thank you, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Jones.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. I want to thank all those

2 who brought to our attention during Black
3 History Month the origin of the struggle
4 for sanitation workers. That was
5 appropriate on today's first day. But I
6 always in this month try to recognize
7 living legends and heroes that do their
8 part for people, and just like standing
9 up for the sanitation workers, I want to
10 recognize you, Mr. President, and
11 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell for what
12 they did yesterday at the opening of the
13 Hub of Hope center downstairs in the
14 SEPTA station. Not perfect, but it is a
15 continuation of taking care of the least
16 of us to make sure that they are okay.

17 Many people do not know that in
18 those same subways, Jannie Blackwell and
19 the late Lucien Blackwell got arrested
20 for helping the homeless and taking care
21 of them and fought for them and refusing
22 to stop. It is very easy to treat them
23 like invisible people if we choose not to
24 see them. And I'll never forget going
25 outside -- everybody walks Councilwoman

2 Blackwell to her car. It's like an
3 entourage. So we were walking out of the
4 building one day and a seemingly homeless
5 man came up to me and started asking me
6 what I was doing for the homeless cause
7 and where I stood on the panhandling bill
8 that you were fighting at the time, and I
9 was explaining my position to him,
10 Mr. President, and then I said, Well,
11 this is the champion of homeless issues,
12 Councilwoman Blackwell.

13 He stopped me, said, I know who
14 she is. I'm checking your credentials on
15 where you are on this. And I never
16 forgot that.

17 I also attended and with great
18 glee and I want to recognize the Mayor of
19 the City of Philadelphia who created a
20 situation for evictions, and this is the
21 Eviction Task Force that he brought up
22 and is now moving to deal with the
23 overwhelming growth of evictions in the
24 City of Philadelphia, led by Helen Gym,
25 who is another hero that we should

2 recognize. Maria Sanchez also.

3 So it's important during Black
4 History Month to recognize the past, but
5 I think it's also important to
6 memorialize what's going on every day,
7 quietly, doesn't get a headline all the
8 time, but what you've done to make it
9 better for people today. And I'm very
10 impressed with my colleagues in that
11 regard, which brings me to the fact that
12 we are going to move forward with our
13 "just cause" legislation. And what that
14 really talks about is not rent control,
15 it's not New York, we're not trying to
16 stop people from enjoying property
17 rights, but I must remind you, just like
18 this is in Black History Month, that at
19 the Penn Wynn Apartments there were 200
20 families, Mr. President, Councilwoman
21 Blackwell, Councilwoman Sanchez, and
22 Councilwoman Gym, that were summarily
23 evicted from that property just because
24 some investors saw an economic
25 opportunity. They said, Ooh, we can get

2 30 percent more rent. We put a couple of
3 thousand of dollars into a bathroom and a
4 kitchen, I can get quality tenants.

5 Some of those people that they
6 evicted, Mr. President, had lived there
7 30 years. Some of them have been in this
8 Chambers testifying for different things.
9 I won't put them on blast who was one of
10 those people, but you know them, and
11 these people, some of them had never
12 missed a month of rent. In fact, most of
13 them weren't late ever.

14 And so these group of investors
15 decided that we're going to take this
16 profit over people, and when you leave,
17 30 days later we will give you your
18 security deposit and down payment.

19 Now, I don't know about you,
20 average rent, about a thousand dollars,
21 first month, last month, I don't have
22 that in my back pocket if you just told
23 me go and you have to leave.

24 So what this legislation calls
25 for is good cause. Like if people have

2 paid their rent and are in good standing,
3 offer them a first opportunity, even if
4 it's at an increased rent, to rent from
5 the new developers. Give them an
6 opportunity to take those deposits to be
7 able to find a better place or a
8 different place to live.

9 What hit me the hardest was a
10 lady and her child leaving. They had to
11 go. And she looked at me and said with
12 sincerity, You know, Councilman, you're
13 doing good work. I voted for you. You
14 know that always -- you know how that is.
15 And she said, Where I'm leaving and
16 moving to now, I won't be able to vote
17 for you the next time.

18 Well, when I heard about it, I
19 used to think it was just your problem,
20 Councilman Johnson, Council President
21 Clarke's problem and, to a lesser extent,
22 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell's problem
23 about these investors coming in, fixing
24 up, and displacing people, but it has hit
25 home.

4 with another hundred-plus units in it.

15 his contributions and that he's on the
16 right side of the issues we should hold
17 dear as human beings in this city.

21 The Chair recognizes

22 Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I just wanted to mention

3 for really highlighting the great work
4 that he is doing and really all of
5 Council has worked to embrace.

6 Forty percent of Philadelphians
7 are renters in this city, and as
8 Councilman Jones pointed out, the
9 widening gap in inequality between what
10 is market-rate rental in our city and
11 what is actually affordable to our
12 residents is dramatic and growing
13 significantly and, as a result,
14 Philadelphia's eviction rates are
15 skyrocketing, one out of 14 renters, many
16 of them struggling to make payment but
17 also many of them struggling to deal with
18 substandard housing.

19 We heard testimony in our
20 eviction hearings that -- we heard from a
21 veteran who had a hole in his ceiling and
22 snow blowing in, and he was withholding
23 rent to get that fixed. A mother who
24 would put dinner on the stove and have
25 rodents devour it before her family can

2 eat it.

3 And so we have a lot to do in
4 this area. I am incredibly grateful to
5 my partners who stood with us this week
6 when the City announced the Council
7 allotment that was given to provide legal
8 aid for the very first time to
9 non-criminal defendants. So these are
10 individuals who are facing eviction who
11 would be qualifying for a lawyer. There
12 will be a lawyer a day housed at the
13 Landlord-Tenant Court, there's on-call
14 assistance, and that there is a full-time
15 Landlord-Tenant Help Center for all
16 parties to get assistance and advice as
17 they go through this process.

18 Additionally, something that I
19 wanted to share with my colleagues are
20 that Judges Neifield and Moss over at
21 Municipal Court have instituted a new
22 policy that requires landlords to be in
23 compliance with all laws before they can
24 file for an eviction. That is also a
25 tremendous move by them. We're

2 incredibly grateful to the courts, but
3 most of all, I am deeply indebted to my
4 colleagues on City Council. Yesterday I
5 was able to stand with Councilmembers
6 Greenlee, Johnson, and Jones, but
7 Councilmembers Quinones-Sanchez, Green,
8 Taubenberger, Domb, Blackwell, all of us
9 have all been incredibly supportive of
10 this issue. We're trying to work on this
11 Anti-Eviction Task Force. We're going to
12 figure out smart and sensible solutions
13 that make sense for a healthy
14 development, growth-oriented city, but on
15 which our people are not sacrificed at
16 the mercy of a ruthless market that will
17 undermine communities and families.

18 So I'm looking forward to the
19 policies, potentially legislative
20 proposals, and resources that will come
21 out of that and look forward to the
22 partnership, but thank you to my
23 Councilmembers for all of that.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilwoman.

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I know today is an
6 exciting day for a lot of people, our
7 last Council session before a big game,
8 but I do want to say that I want to
9 recognize somebody who has been on my
10 staff who will be leaving to look for
11 better possibilities and opportunities to
12 still continue his constituent services
13 throughout my district. But Sean
14 McMonagle's last day will be Friday.
15 Sean has been with me. He's been here
16 since 1999 with the previous Councilman.
17 He's been my right hand, my legislative
18 aide, and he's been guiding me through
19 the process and taught me a lot of things
20 along the way of how to get things done.

21 So I just wanted to have Sean
22 stand up today, big round of applause for
23 all the service he's given to the City.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And if

5 And one other thing, and I know
6 we're going to be rooting real big for
7 the game and the Eagles on Sunday, but

9 want you to enjoy but don't destroy, and
10 celebrate but don't desecrate. Remember
11 that.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 And I'll miss you in caucus,
16 Sean.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Domb.

19 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
20 Council President. As some of you may
21 know, my office is collecting socks to
22 donate to the homeless. Socks are the
23 most needed items in homeless shelters.
24 We have them around City Hall, collection
25 locations, and it's the entire month of

2 February. So we can donate new socks for
3 all ages, and the box is located around
4 City Hall. And all I can say is, sock it
5 to me.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Green.

10 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
11 Council President. I just want to
12 quickly remind my colleagues about the
13 AFSCME rally outside in support of the "I
14 Am 2018" campaign on the apron of City
15 Hall. In fact, today's rally is a
16 continuation of the long history of civil
17 rights work by organized labor in our
18 city. And, in fact, just a few steps
19 away from where the rally will take
20 place, there is a state historical marker
21 that recognizes that in 1938, 3,000 City
22 workers launched a strike protesting wage
23 cuts and layoffs, and after eight days, a
24 collective bargaining agreement was
25 reached, and this action led to the

2 formation of AFSCME District Council 33.

3 So I'd like to thank AFSCME for
4 their past, current, and future work in
5 reference to advancing civil rights in
6 our city.

7 And then, finally, I'd like to
8 echo the words of Councilwoman Blondell
9 Reynolds Brown in reference to our
10 Eagles. They do a lot of philanthropic
11 work here in our city, and for those of
12 us who have not already heard, the Eagles
13 will be having an Autism Challenge on
14 Saturday, May 19th that will allow us to
15 either bike, run or walk to support
16 research at Drexel, Children's Hospital
17 of Philadelphia, as well as Thomas
18 Jefferson. It really shows the
19 leadership of Jeff Lurie and the entire
20 Eagles organization to address autism.
21 And just like the polar plunge in
22 December, I'll be challenging my
23 colleagues to either run, bike or walk
24 for the Eagles Autism Challenge. Stay
25 tuned.

5 to recognize Councilman Johnson, but I

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

13 announcements. So the first announcement
14 is that during this week, we have moved a

22 5:00 to 8:00 p.m.
