So I'd also want 15 16 to thank Vanesse for her hard work in 17 making sure that we bring high-quality 18 literature events for our young people. 19 Whereas, during early American 20 history, African Americans were not allowed to learn to read and have books; 2.1 22 in some states the penalty for this infraction was death; and 23 Whereas, the importance of book 2.4 fairs cannot be understated and for 25

She believes that books open up 14 the world of opportunities for all 15 children and after twenty-six years, the African American Children's Book Fair is 16 the oldest and largest single day event 17 for African American children's books in 18 19 the country. As a literary consultant 20 she is a much sought after expert on trends in diverse books and how to 2.1 22 incorporate these books into homes, 23 schools and libraries; and COUNCILWOMAN GYM: 2.4 Whereas, one 25 of the most important reasons to

After beginning his career working for Head 10 Start, A.J. worked as a school social 11 12 worker, developed education-focused after school programs and served as the 13 Education Coordinator for Public Citizens 14 15 for Children and Youth, where he 16 organized coalitions to develop advocacy platforms to strengthen public schools 17 18 across the region; and 19 Whereas, Jordan currently serves as Senior Vice President for 20 2.1 Community Relations at Wells Fargo, where 22 he leads the company's philanthropic 23 contributions and employee engagement initiatives for one of the largest 2.4 25 regional corporate funders in the areas

Jordan 2. 3 also serves on numerous non-profit boards and committees, including the Leadership 4 5 Council for the Read by 4th Campaign, the 6 Free Library of Philadelphia's Corporate Advisory Council, KIPP Philadelphia, the 7 Salvation Army Kroc Center Advisory Board 8 9 and the Philanthropy Network of Greater Philadelphia; and 10 11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, 12 Ray Anthony Shepard is a grandson of a slave, a former teacher, and the retired 13 14 editor-in-chief of a major education 15 publishing company. He is a graduate of 16 the Harvard Graduate School of Education, 17 where he received the Martin Luther King 18 Jr. Fellowship from the Woodrow Wilson Foundation; and 19 20 Whereas, Shepard's book Now or 2.1 Never: Fifty-Fourth Massachusetts 22 Infantry's War to End Slavery is his 23 first work of creative non-fiction for younger readers. The book is a dual 2.4 25 biography of George E. Stephens and James

Henry Gooding, both of whom not only 3 served in the Massachusetts 54th Infantry, but also published eyewitness 4 5 reports of the Civil War from the perspective of the African American soldier. Their correspondence exposed the reality of life at camp, and the 8 9 shocking misery of the battlefield. These soldiers and the 54th Infantry 10 11 fought against many injustices, and their 12 leadership resulted in one of America's first notable civil rights victories: 13 14 the right to equal pay for African American soldiers; and 15 16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas, 17 Shepard has dedicated his career as an 18 educator to fostering a better 19 understanding of American slavery among 20 history teachers and their students. 21 From his personal experience growing up in Nebraska, he knows that it is 22 23 difficult, quote, "to teach American slavery without making some students feel 2.4 25 embarrassed, angry, or guilty, "unquote.

Shipp is an Emmy-nominated journalist, and earned her 10 11 Bachelor's Degree in International 12 Development Studies from the University of California, Los Angeles, and a 13 14 Certificate of Broadcast Meteorology from 15 Mississippi State University; and 16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Let us 17 thank all of the sponsors who support 18 this annual event. 19 Whereas, Shipp's children's 20 book The Meteorologist in Me was 2.1 published in 2016. The book tells the 22 story of a girl named Summer who dreams 23 of becoming a TV meteorologist. loves sharing weather facts with her 2.4 25 family and friends and wonders why
