2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning.

4                   Good morning, everyone.  
5                   (Good morning.)

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I  
7 thought I was talking to myself for a  
8 minute. How is everybody doing today?

9                   Awesome. Awesome.

10                  We're going to start. If the  
11 members will take their seat and the  
12 visitors and guests retire behind the  
13 rail, we will start our meeting today.  
14 Thank you very much.

15                  To give our invocation this  
16 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor  
17 Marshall Mitchell of Salem Baptist  
18 Church. He is here today as the guest of  
19 Councilman Green.

20                  I would ask all guests,  
21 members, and visitors to please rise.

22                  (Councilmembers, guests and  
23 visitors rise.)

24                  PASTOR MITCHELL: Let us pray.  
25                  Merciful and eternal God who

3           day, we thank thee for waking us up this

5                         We pray now, oh God, that your  
6           presence would hover over this Council,

10          this way.

11                        We pray a special prayer over  
12          the City of Philadelphia for all of its  
13          children and its seniors and all of its  
14          residents. We pray even now, oh God, as  
15          we pursue Amazonian size wins that we  
16          still look and see the needs of little  
17          children and of aging seniors.

18                        Grant us wisdom, grant us  
19          peace, grant us your mercy. It is in thy  
20          holy and sovereign name that we pray.

23                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you so much, Pastor, for those  
25          inspiring words.

5 Thank you very much.

6 And our next order of business  
7 is the approval of the Journal of the

10 Greenlee.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
12 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
13 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,  
14 February 15th, 2018 be approved.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17 Thank you. It has been moved and  
18 properly seconded that the Journal of the  
19 meeting of Thursday, February 15, 2018  
20 stand approved.

21 All those in favor say aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
3 ayes have it, and the Journal is  
4 approved.

5                   The next order of business is  
6 requests for leaves of absence, and the  
7 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

8                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
9 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
10 majority, there are no requests of leave  
11 of absence today.

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
13 Chair thanks the gentleman.

14                  The Chair now recognizes  
15 Councilman Oh.

16                  COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
17 much, Council President. On behalf of  
18 the minority, there are no requests for  
19 leaves of absences.

20                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
21 Chair thanks the gentleman.

22                  At this time, I would like to  
23 dispense with the regular order of  
24 business and I would like to thank  
25 everyone who has taken time out of their

2           busy day to come down to witness their  
3           government in action. We genuinely  
4           appreciate you coming down. We hope your  
5           stay here today is a knowledge one but,  
6           more importantly, a pleasurable one, so  
7           much so that you come back again. So,  
8           again, thank you for being here. We  
9           really appreciate it.

10                    At this time, the Chair  
11           recognizes Councilman Jones, who will  
12           present a resolution honoring  
13           Philadelphia's living legends. Would  
14           George Beach and those accompanying him  
15           please join the Councilman at the podium.

16                    (Councilmembers and guests  
17           approached podium.)

18                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
19           joining Councilman Jones, we have  
20           Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Green,  
21           Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman  
22           Blackwell, and Councilwoman Reynolds  
23           Brown.

24                    COUNCILMAN JONES: February is  
25           African American History Month. You can

2           take a global perspective and look at how  
3           we've had contributions throughout the  
4           world that have emanated from the African  
5           American population here in this country.  
6           You can do a statewide look at what  
7           impacts community leaders, civic leaders  
8           from our community have had statewide or  
9           you can just look out the window and look  
10          at Philadelphia and see the  
11          contributions, both big and small, the  
12          leadership that came before us that I  
13          still hear and some that have gone on and  
14          passed away have made.

15                    Today we come to honor those  
16           both living and those who have  
17           transitioned on, people that I, as I get  
18           older, actually knew and made a  
19           contribution in my life. Whether we talk  
20           about George Beach, Joey Temple, Rita R.  
21           Smith-Wade-El, Valeria Bullock or some  
22           that have passed on like Vernon Marks,  
23           affectionately known as Pop-Pop, Charlie  
24           "Boo" Burrus, Abdul Malik Muhammad, Carl  
25           "Moore Baby" Moore, and Joe Faulk as part

2           of our fabric of the Philadelphia  
3           community.

4                       The first protest I ever had --  
5           and I actually did go to some protests --  
6           Charlie "Boo" Burrus and others, people  
7           like actually Milton Street told two  
8           young guys from high school -- and matter  
9           of fact, I was a freshman in high school,  
10          not to give my age away. So there was a  
11          police officer for Civil Affairs named  
12          Finsel (ph). Many of you won't -- I  
13          heard some people heard of Finsel. He  
14          was a gentleman police officer, but he  
15          played no games. And when it was time to  
16          move, it was time to move, and he  
17          would -- I remember being up close and  
18          personal with these members of the  
19          community, Georgie Woods and David P.  
20          Richardson and others, and they were  
21          making their statement. They were  
22          fighting for right causes, and could have  
23          been the Gallery. And we were out there.  
24          I remember Finsel coming over saying,  
25          Now, you went around seven times around

2           this building now. I have to do my job  
3           just like you're doing yours. So some  
4           people going to go to jail today.

5                         And that was the time when  
6           those leaders looked back at young people  
7           that had their life ahead of them, that  
8           did not want to have marks on their  
9           record, that says time for you to go  
10          home, time for you to get up out of here,  
11          it's time for us to take on the mantle of  
12          that part of this demonstration. And I  
13          never forgot that.

14                        Charlie "Boo" Burrus, if you  
15          knew him, charismatic and interesting  
16          character, came into the Office of  
17          Housing and Community Development. They  
18          squatted in more houses. People who own  
19          houses today owe those actions to him,  
20          because they said, Well, why are these  
21          houses vacant when people need them, and  
22          stepped up to the plate and took over  
23          buildings. I remember taking over the  
24          Office of Housing and Community  
25          Development, and he came in with such

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2           furor, such intensity, I got scared. I  
3           said, You ain't really mad, are you?

4                     He's like, Yeah, I'm mad, but  
5           not mad at you.

6                     So those are the kinds of  
7           things I remember. Malik Muhammad on  
8           Lancaster Avenue taught me a great many  
9           things, not only about religion but about  
10          being in business and having to make a  
11          payroll and having to pay yourself last  
12          and having to look out for others before  
13          you looked out for yourselves.

14                    So all of these things, when  
15          you hear me and others in here talk,  
16          you're hearing their voices. You're  
17          hearing Georgie Woods and others. Joey  
18          Temple probably has the best collection  
19          of some of the -- I wish he would share  
20          it some time of what Georgie's old shows  
21          were.

22                    So without further adieu, we  
23          are honoring the living legends today.  
24          Honoring and celebrating the Philadelphia  
25          Living Legends such as George Albert

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2           Beach, Joey Temple, Rita Smith-Wade-El,  
3           and Valeria Bullock, who are leaders in  
4           the areas of civil rights, community  
5           activism, education, business, youth  
6           mentorship in the Philadelphia area; and  
7           further honoring those legends who are no  
8           longer with us: Vernon "Pop-Pop" Marks,  
9           Charlie "Boo" Burrus, Abdul Malik  
10          Muhammad, Carl Moore "Baby Moore," and  
11          Joe Faulk as part of the commemoration of  
12          Black History Month.

13                       Whereas, George Albert Beach is  
14          the founder of Beach Advertising which  
15          was one of the oldest minority-owned  
16          advertising agencies in the state of  
17          Pennsylvania. For more than four  
18          decades, Beach's company has been an  
19          advertising agency of choice for many  
20          local and national corporations,  
21          non-profit organizations, such as and  
22          including Hershey's Foods, Campbell Soup  
23          Company, and the Philadelphia Convention  
24          and Visitors Bureau. Mr. Beach is the  
25          recipient of numerous awards including

2           the Addy, Neographics -- you'll explain

3           what that is -- and Art Directors Club

4           awards and the best of the category

5           awards from Printing Industry of America.

6           Beach is revered by paving the way for

7           many African Americans to learn the

8           fundamental skills and strategies of

9           navigating the communications field; and

10                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

11           Whereas, Joey Temple is a radio producer

12           and lifelong resident of Philadelphia.

13           Temple's career in radio began when he

14           received an opportunity to volunteer with

15           Mattie Humphrey at WDAS. During his

16           internship, he participated in the

17           Breakfast Show, and provided knowledge to

18           the community about mass incarceration.

19           After the completion of his internship,

20           Joey Temple stayed at WDAS to work with

21           the legendary Georgie Woods. Currently,

22           Joey T. produces "A Message in Music,"

23           which airs 96.1 AM on Fridays, and the

24           "Electric Magazine Show," for 900 AM on

25           Saturdays. Joey Temple spends his time

2           outside of the radio station being active  
3           in his community and working to prevent  
4           youth from engaging in a life of crime;  
5           and

6                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
7           Rita R. Smith-Wade-El is a Professor of  
8           Psychology and African American studies  
9           at Millersville University of  
10          Pennsylvania. Dr. Smith received her  
11          Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from  
12          Columbia University, and her Master of  
13          Arts and Doctorate of Philosophy in  
14          Psychology from the University of  
15          Pennsylvania. In addition to being a  
16          dedicated professor who supports the  
17          future success of younger generations,  
18          Dr. Smith is also an activist, organizer,  
19          breast cancer survivor, and the Vice  
20          President of the Lancaster Chapter of the  
21          NAACP; and

22                       COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
23          Valeria Bullock is a former Senior  
24          Business Analyst for PECO, who was  
25          responsible for managing the company's

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2           Low-Income Usage Reduction Program.

3           Early in her career at PECO, Bullock

4           implemented a solar water heating pilot

5           program that targeted low-income

6           residential customers with solar

7           technology. Bullock's work at PECO

8           brought national attention to the

9           importance of usage reduction programs

10          and their benefits to low-income

11          residential utility customers. Bullock

12          is the recipient of the Philadelphia

13          Visionary Award and the Award for

14          Excellence given by Pennsylvania Legal

15          Services. Her work has also been

16          recognized by the American Council for

17          Energy Efficiency and Economy and the

18          former National Fuel Fund Network; and

19                    COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,

20          the Vernon Marks was the longtime

21          chairman of Philadelphia's Vacant

22          Property Review Committee. Notably,

23          Marks was the first African American bail

24          bondsman in the City of Philadelphia and

25          one of the founders of the Strawberry

2           Mansion Citizens' Participation Council.  
3           Marks was the champion of this community  
4           in a big way and was an active leader and  
5           organizer in Philadelphia's Civil Rights  
6           struggle. Marks was known by many as the  
7           "Mayor of North Philadelphia"; and

8                        COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And before  
9           I give remarks on Charlie "Boo" Burrus, I  
10          just wanted to say Councilman Jones had  
11          no idea of this when he assigned me this  
12          reading assignment, but Charlie "Boo"  
13          Burrus was my neighbor for a brief moment  
14          in North Philadelphia. He lived on the  
15          3200 block of North Newkirk Street. So  
16          it's really special to me to be able to  
17          read this today.

18                       Whereas, Charlie "Boo" Burrus  
19          was a lifelong resident of the Mantua  
20          section of Philadelphia. Burrus can be  
21          described by those who knew him as a  
22          unique individual that was fully  
23          committed to the success of his  
24          community. Burrus' particular focus was  
25          supporting and helping Philadelphia's

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2           youth. Burrus worked around the clock to  
3           ensure that youth stayed away from  
4           negative encounters, pushing them to move  
5           forward in a positive direction. Burrus  
6           was on the forefront of trying to reduce  
7           gang activity throughout the City through  
8           his work with the Crisis Intervention  
9           Network, where he was a member of the  
10          field operations team. Burrus also  
11          founded the Inner City Organizing Network  
12          (ICON), a non-profit that aided young men  
13          by using their skills to renovate homes;  
14          and

15                    COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
16          Abdul Malik Muhammad was a longtime  
17          resident, community leader and  
18          entrepreneur from West Philadelphia. In  
19          1986, Muhammad founded the Lancaster  
20          Avenue Business Association, which  
21          bridged the gap between the businesses  
22          from 34th Street all the way out to 63rd  
23          Street. Muhammad provided firm  
24          leadership to the corridor and showed  
25          direct support for unification and



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2           teamwork strategies to a diverse business  
3           community. Several of the services  
4           Muhammad worked continually to maintain  
5           were sanitation and cleanup services,  
6           creating an area town watch for security  
7           on the corridor, and a zero-tolerance  
8           graffiti policy. With support from  
9           membership participation, Muhammad  
10          created programs that prompted change  
11          implemented towards the revitalization of  
12          Lancaster Avenue through community,  
13          social and economic development; and

14                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
15          Carl Moore was a community activist from  
16          South Philadelphia, whose primary mission  
17          was advocating for affordable and  
18          accessible community healthcare. In  
19          1970, Carl Moore founded the Greater  
20          Philadelphia Health Action Incorporation.  
21          Greater Philadelphia Health Action  
22          Incorporation was one of the first  
23          medical managed care programs in the City  
24          of Philadelphia. Over 45 years after  
25          Moore started on his mission, residents

2           of South Philadelphia and community  
3           stakeholders, including myself,  
4           celebrated the opening of the Carl Moore  
5           Health Center at 1401 South 31st Street,  
6           which is a state-of-the-art facility.  
7           The facility specializes in providing  
8           primary care, OB/GYN, podiatry, dental,  
9           behavioral health and pharmacy services  
10          to the community and at an affordable  
11          cost;

12                    COUNCILWOMAN GYM: And whereas,  
13           Joe Faulk was a well-respected community  
14           leader. Always looking out for the  
15           underdog, Faulk helped with various  
16           projects aimed at enhancing the quality  
17           of life of young people in his community.  
18           Faulk's greatest accomplishments and  
19           achievements were in the Nicetown and  
20           Tioga neighborhoods. Faulk served as a  
21           dedicated Committee Person for the 51st  
22           Ward; now, therefore, be it

23                    Resolved, by the Council of the  
24           City of Philadelphia, that it hereby  
25           honors and celebrates Philadelphia's

2           Living Legends: George Albert Beach,  
3           Joey Temple, Rita R. Smith-Wade-El, and  
4           Valeria Bullock, who are leaders in the  
5           areas of civil rights, community  
6           activism, education, business and youth  
7           mentorship in the Philadelphia area; and  
8           further honors those legends who are no  
9           longer with us: Vernon Marks, Charlie  
10          "Boo" Burrus, Abdul Malik Muhammad, Carl  
11          Moore, and Joe Faulk as part of the  
12          commemoration of Black History Month.

13                   And further resolved, that an  
14           engrossed copy of this resolution be  
15           presented to Philadelphia's Living  
16           Legends and the families of our lost  
17           legends as further evidence of the  
18           sincere appreciation and gratitude of  
19           this legislative body.

20                   (Applause.)

21                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
22           the Chair recognizes Mr. Beach for  
23           remarks.

24                   MR. BEACH: Thank you very  
25           much, giving honor to God. Council

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2           President, Councilpersons, honored guests  
3           who are in this room today, being a  
4           living legend is a responsibility that I  
5           found that I've had to bear the brunt of.  
6           I enjoy my life thus far, and I've been  
7           encouraged by the opportunities that were  
8           presented to me in the great City of  
9           Philadelphia.

10                         Philadelphia was a proving  
11           ground for opportunities in business,  
12           particularly opportunities for minority  
13           individuals, who were not factored in in  
14           the early planning of businesses for this  
15           great city. But lo and behold, I had an  
16           opportunity on Monday, Tuesday,  
17           Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday,  
18           and Sunday to do business in the great  
19           City of Philadelphia. And why was I able  
20           to do business in the City of  
21           Philadelphia? Because I had great people  
22           surrounding me and great people who were  
23           interns, particularly minority  
24           individuals, who had an opportunity to  
25           see firsthand how it was done, because

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2           that was my primary goal, to get it done,  
3           get it done right, and have something  
4           that was very special to me that I  
5           learned early in life, the oohs and the  
6           ahhs. The oohs were over here and the  
7           ahhs were over there, and it was from the  
8           work that I did as a youngster in art  
9           that I got the oohs and the ahhs. And I  
10          still get them today.

11                        Can I hear an oohs over here  
12          and some ahhs over there.

13                        (Oohs and ahhs.)

14                        MR. BEACH: Thank you very  
15          much. That has what has propelled me and  
16          I know has propelled those that are  
17          surrounding me today.

18                        When I look at some of the  
19          individuals that came to Beach and some  
20          of them have stepped away proudly and  
21          have said, I cut my teeth at Beach, and  
22          I'm so proud of them, because my job is  
23          to make an opportunity available for  
24          those that are coming behind me and those  
25          that are along with me. And it's so

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2           great when you see other people doing  
3           great things. I'm inspired by others. I  
4           look out, I see out, and I try to step in  
5           the shoes of others, and that was what  
6           has made my firm very successful, because  
7           I stepped out of me and became them, and  
8           I learned how to market in their behalf.

9                        So I want to say to the group  
10          that's here, congratulations on all that  
11          you have done and all that you and your  
12          family members have done in order to move  
13          business in the great City of  
14          Philadelphia to where it is now and to  
15          where it will be in the future, which is  
16          in the next five minutes.

17                        Thank you very much.

18                        (Applause.)

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20          Thank you. Council will be at ease. And  
21          as we do that, I would like to take a  
22          moment to recognize one of my awesome  
23          friends, former State Senator Shirley  
24          Kitchen. I didn't see you back there.

25                        (Applause.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: She  
3 is the living legend of all legends.  
4 Thank you.

5                   Council will be at ease.

6                   Councilman Jones.

7                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. Will  
8 all members come up on the high-rise.  
9 Family members stay where you are, and  
10 we'll take the picture.

11                   (Council at ease.)

12                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13 Thank you, and congratulations.

14                   Can I have a little quiet,  
15 please. As you leave, I'd ask you to  
16 please keep your voices down. Thank you.

17                   At this time, the Chair  
18 recognizes Councilman Squilla, who will  
19 present a resolution congratulating Carla  
20 Moss. Would Carla Moss and those  
21 accompanying her please join the  
22 Councilman at the podium.

23                   (Councilmembers and guests  
24 approached podium.)

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

2           joining Councilman Squilla, we have  
3           Councilman Green and Councilman Johnson.

4                     Thank you. Can we have quiet,  
5           please.

6                     COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Good  
7           morning, everyone. I just want to say  
8           that to me, today it's an honor to be  
9           able to have a resolution here in Council  
10          to someone who was able to help  
11          everybody. And Carla was the person that  
12          no matter who called her, what time of  
13          day, she would always be able to respond  
14          and never said no. And so this is just a  
15          small thing that we can do here on  
16          Council to be able to honor her for all  
17          her dedication and work she has given to  
18          us here in the City of Philadelphia.

19                    So today we are congratulating  
20          and honoring Carla Moss for her years of  
21          dedicated service to the residents of  
22          Philadelphia on the occasion of her  
23          retirement from the City of Philadelphia  
24          Commissioner's Office.

25                    Whereas, Carla is retiring

2           after serving the residents of  
3           Philadelphia since 2004. She was  
4           promoted to Deputy City Commissioner in  
5           2008, and her responsibilities included  
6           registering voters, assisting potential  
7           candidates with the election process; and

8                       Whereas, Carla was born in  
9           South Philadelphia to Delores and Joe  
10          Capozolli and has two siblings, Richard  
11          and Gina. Carla's father, John  
12          Capozolli, was a POW during World War II;  
13          and

14                      Whereas, Carla always called  
15          South Philadelphia home and has vowed to  
16          never leave, except for vacations to her  
17          trips upstate to the mountains and down  
18          the shore to everyone in Philadelphia's  
19          favorite vacation spot, Wildwood, New  
20          Jersey; and

21                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And I just  
22          want to take a personal moment and thank  
23          Carla for just being one of my mentors  
24          who watched me through this process as I  
25          started off as a young buck getting

2           involved in electoral politics. I just  
3           want to personally thank you and Butch  
4           for being there for me.

5                       Whereas, Carla met and married  
6           Billy (Butch) Moss, a fellow lifetime  
7           South Philadelphia resident, who was born  
8           at the Naval Hospital. They have been  
9           married for 47 blissful years. Together  
10          they have two sons, Jason and Michael,  
11          and two beautiful grandchildren,  
12          8-year-old Paige and 1-year-old Michael,  
13          with whom Carla and Butch look forward to  
14          spending more time; and

15                      Whereas, Carla and Butch plan  
16          on enjoying some of their favorite past  
17          times such as spending time down the  
18          shore and up the mountains, delighting in  
19          the great outdoors, fishing and traveling  
20          to their other favorite spot, Key West,  
21          Florida; and

22                      COUNCILMAN GREEN: And I also  
23          want to thank Carla for all the work

11                      Council President and  
12          colleagues, an equitable and inclusive  
13          housing policy has been a priority for me  
14          since I arrived in this body in 2012. As  
15          a young man, I decided to become a public  
16          servant because I wanted to take on the  
17          injustices that I saw in the world and  
18          particularly my own community.

19                      This week I have seen a  
20          sickening, unacceptable but, most  
21          importantly, un-American injustice. When  
22          we talk about segregation, we are usually  
23          talking about the Jim Crow era, separate  
24          schools, separate churches, separate  
25          water fountains, and we sometimes give in

2           to the myth that the civil rights  
3           movement has relegated racial segregation  
4           to the darker days of American history.  
5           But here we are on the 50th anniversary  
6           of the Fair Housing Act and deep  
7           segregation is alive and kicking.

8                         It is a legacy of federally  
9           sanctioned redlining policies that  
10          designated black neighborhoods as credit  
11          risks for home loans. Homeownership,  
12          which is commonly considered the  
13          cornerstone of the American dream, is to  
14          some an American nightmare, but earlier  
15          this week we got a powerful proof of  
16          modern-day redlining.

17                        The Center for Investigative  
18          Reporting released an in-depth report  
19          that took a year of intensive research,  
20          including review of 31 million documents.  
21          They found that banks were denying home  
22          purchase loans, home improvements loans,  
23          and home refinancing to applicants of  
24          color at far higher rates than to their  
25          Caucasian applicants.

2                   In Philadelphia, black home  
3 applicants were 2.7 times more likely to  
4 be denied than their Caucasian  
5 applicants.

6                   Why disparity persisted? When  
7 the researchers controlled for nine  
8 factors, including income, loan amount,  
9 and geographic location. One powerful  
10 example is my own childhood neighborhood  
11 of Point Breeze where I grew up and I'm  
12 currently raising my family. Between  
13 2012 and 2016, white home loan applicants  
14 were granted 806 loans out of 958  
15 applications, an 84 percent success rate.  
16 However, for African Americans, home loan  
17 applicants were granted 275 loans from  
18 746 applications, a 37 percent success  
19 rate. This is not right, and I'm going  
20 to work with my colleagues to get to the  
21 bottom of it.

22                   Next month I'll be holding  
23 hearings to get a grip on the root causes  
24 of this problem and, most importantly,  
25 hold those accountable and the banking

14          on his or her real estate taxes.

15                        Now, this was an important and  
16          an exceedingly necessary change to the  
17          regulations, and I want to commend our  
18          Department of Revenue for making it.  
19          However, it is the intent of this  
20          legislation to see a commensurate change  
21          made to The Philadelphia Code.

22                        As a member of this body  
23          representing the Ninth District, which we  
24          know from past hearings is comprised of  
25          94 percent of what is referenced as

2 middle neighborhoods, those are  
3 communities that can go boom or go bust,  
4 I know all too well the scourge that  
5 reverse mortgages have had on certain  
6 neighborhoods in the City of  
7 Philadelphia, and in light of Councilman  
8 Johnson's recent comments regarding his  
9 hearing, Councilman, I will tell you we  
10 have had no problems with the approval of  
11 reverse mortgages in the City of  
12 Philadelphia, especially in neighborhoods  
13 where there's a high rate of  
14 homeownership.

15 In addition to that, I want to  
16 note that it is quite common for reverse  
17 mortgage lenders to swoop in and pay off  
18 any remaining real estate tax balance for  
19 homeowners even if they are already in a  
20 payment plan, and then they use this as  
21 an impetus to foreclose on those  
22 homeowners.

23 Now, while the Department of  
24 Revenue's regulations will now protect  
25 against this, we wanted to have something

2           even stronger. I am proud to note for  
3           the record that our friends in the  
4           housing and advocacy world, specifically  
5           the folks at Community Legal Services who  
6           represent these individuals in court  
7           whose homes have been unfairly foreclosed

9           that while the new regulations are  
10          important, putting commensurate language  
11          in the Code would give homeowners a  
12          statutory basis to legally state that so  
13          long as they are in a payment agreement  
14          and compliant with it, their real estate  
15          taxes are, in effect, not delinquent.

16                        So it is my hope that these new  
17          regulations, along with this bill that  
18          was introduced, will finally put an end  
19          to some of the more unscrupulous  
20          practices that we have seen relative to  
21          reverse mortgages.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
20 Mr. President. I offer one  
21 non-privileged resolution.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged  
25 resolution authorizing the Commissioner

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That

12                   And the Chair recognizes  
13           Councilman Oh.

14                   COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
15           much, Council President. I have one  
16           bill. May I be heard after the title is  
17           read?

18                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19           Absolutely. Thank you, Councilman.

20                   CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
21           amending Title 20 of The Philadelphia  
22           Code, entitled "Officers and Employees,"  
23           Chapter 20-700, "Defense and  
24           Indemnification," by adding new language  
25           to provide protection for disclosures of

3           cooperation against sexual harassers, all  
4           under certain terms and conditions.

5                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

7                    COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
8           much, Council President. First, I'd like  
9           to say my thanks to Councilwoman Blondell  
10          Reynolds Brown and the women of Council,  
11          all of you, for your tireless work in  
12          bringing more and more attention to the  
13          issue of discrimination, unfairness, and  
14          harassment in the workplace of women in  
15          our society, and particularly it is  
16          shameful when it is our government, and  
17          you've done a lot of work to really raise  
18          this attention and you certainly have  
19          caught my attention.

20                   As an attorney, I've practiced  
21          in the area of employment discrimination  
22          and have represented women who face  
23          gender discrimination and sexual  
24          harassment. One of the things that I  
25          would like to add through this bill is an

2           ability to reach the highest levels of  
3           our government and our agencies where  
4           those who condone, participate or get  
5           their subordinates to cover for them who  
6           are aware of harassment can now be  
7           reached.

8                         This bill I think in the spirit  
9           of certainly our new City Controller,  
10          Rebecca Rynhart, with her new hotline  
11          for City employees to report sexual  
12          harassment I think is a way to  
13          effectively deal with this issue.

14                        The big problem is that when  
15          someone has experienced sexual harassment  
16          or when they think about supporting a  
17          victim of sexual harassment, there are  
18          protections and there are remedies, but  
19          that happens after the person has been  
20          retaliated against. And what they have  
21          to weigh is reporting, being fired, and  
22          then dealing with this problem as they  
23          have no income, health insurance or  
24          pension.

25                        This bill makes clear that

2           anyone who retaliates against a victim  
3           who reports or a witness, that that  
4           person will be terminated. Elected  
5           officials, who are not subject to  
6           termination, will be reported without  
7           discretion to the District Attorney's  
8           Office. This empowers the equal  
9           opportunity agencies, the City  
10          Controller, the District Attorney, and  
11          the Inspector General to take action. It  
12          protects victims of sexual harassment  
13          from retaliation for reporting offenders.  
14          It protects witnesses who report or  
15          confirm misconduct from being retaliated  
16          against, and it discourages high-level  
17          directors or officers from instructing  
18          subordinates or supervisors to retaliate  
19          against victims or witnesses of sexual  
20          harassment by providing the District  
21          Attorney, City Controller, Inspector  
22          General and others to make those victims  
23          and witnesses impugned from termination or  
24          retaliation during the course of their  
25          investigation.

2                   And, finally, it provides an  
3 avenue to reach the highest level of  
4 directors, commissioners, executives, and  
5 elected officials by providing the  
6 investigating authority the ability to  
7 provide a level of immunity to  
8 cooperating witnesses.

9                   Let me give an example. If  
10 there is a high-level executive who is  
11 engaged in sexual harassment and is being  
12 protected by his board members, if that  
13 person then tells a subordinate to fire a  
14 victim of sexual harassment, that  
15 subordinate may be fired as well under  
16 this Code section, but if that  
17 subordinate then goes to the Controller's  
18 Office and cooperates in being a witness  
19 against the executive, that person will  
20 be able to be protected from termination.  
21 And I think it is important that we  
22 address this issue by ensuring that we  
23 reach the highest levels so that those  
24 who hide in the shadows and condone this  
25 type of activity will be exposed.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4                   Thank you, Councilman. That bill will be  
5                   referred to the appropriate committee.

6                   That concludes our introduction

9                   And the Chair recognizes  
10                  Councilman Johnson for a report from the  
11                  Committee of Legislative Oversight.

12                  COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4                   Thank you, Mr. Decker.

5                   The Chair again recognizes

6                   Councilman Johnson.

7                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

8                   Council President. I move that the rules

9                   of Council be suspended so as to permit

13                  (Duly seconded.)

14                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15                  Thank you.

16                  Will somebody please answer the

17                  phone and then turn it off. Thank you.

18                  It has been moved and properly

19                  seconded that the rules of Council be

20                  suspended so as to permit first reading

21                  this day of the nine bills that were just

22                  read into the record by the Clerk.

23                  All those in favor say aye.

24                  (Aye.)

25                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Those opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
5 ayes have it, and these bills will be  
6 placed on our First Reading Calendar  
7 today.

8 The next order of business is  
9 the consideration of the Calendar. I  
10 note that the bills just reported from  
11 committee with a suspension of the rules  
12 have been deemed to have had a first  
13 reading. These bills will be placed on  
14 the Second Reading and Final Passage  
15 Calendar at our next session of Council.

16 As there are no additional  
17 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the  
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the  
19 purpose of calling up bills and  
20 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar  
21 today.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
23 Mr. President. The following resolutions  
24 and bills are being called up for the  
25 Second Reading and Final Passage

8 Thank you very much, Councilman.

9 Before we consider the

12 comment session. It will go as follows:

13 If you are interested in  
14 testifying on a bill or resolution that  
15 is on the Final Passage today, if you  
16 have not already done so, you may sign up  
17 at the table to my left.

18 When your name is called, you  
19 will go to the middle of the Council  
20 Chambers. There's a podium. On that  
21 podium, there's a device. When the light  
22 turns green on that device, it will be  
23 your time to speak. When the light turns  
24 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to  
25 conclude your remarks. And when that

6                     Mr. Decker, can you read the  
7           first name of the individual on the  
8           witness list.

9                     CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
10          commenting on 180111, 171145, and 170675.

11                    (Witness approached podium.)

12                    MR. DANIEL: Good morning.  
13          This is an official decree of the people  
14          in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as  
15          such, requires immediate action and  
16          remedy.

17                    I'm sorry. This is an official  
18          decree of the people in writ of mandamus  
19          quo warranto and, as such, requires  
20          immediate action and remedy. Every week  
21          Council, Mayor, and others transfer  
22          private property to the government,  
23          probably illegally.

24                    I quote Paul Robeson, "The  
25          answer to injustice is not to silence the

2           critic, but end the injustice."

3                    You were not elected to rule  
4           the sovereign people, as some officials  
5           have repeatedly stated. You were hired  
6           as public servants to conduct the  
7           people's business, enforce the existing  
8           laws, and inquire why existing law is not  
9           enforced.

10                   I again quote Dr. King, "He who  
11           passively accepts evil is as much  
12           involved in it as he who perpetrates it."

13                   Unenforced laws are causing  
14           chaos. As public servants, you cannot  
15           violate oath, Constitution or law without  
16           penalty. How can officials deny and defy  
17           inalienable, inviolable, God-given  
18           rights? How can agents and agencies  
19           steal my home without compensation, due  
20           process, Seventh Amendment trial by jury?  
21           How can government pay a contractor  
22           upwards of 100 million, mostly federal  
23           taxpayer dollars, to build a mall on my  
24           stolen home? Why has no official  
25           demanded the Attorney General prosecute

2           as required by law?

3                     The constitutions require  
4           immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
5           breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
6           duty. Your oath of office requires you  
7           to act or face prison.

8                     42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
9           18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
10          Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
11          through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
12          712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
13          SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
14          violated.

15                    I call for the federal and  
16          Commonwealth governments to perform their  
17          constitutional obligations to investigate  
18          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
19          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
20          1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of  
21          God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
22          24 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
23          oath-violating, and requires immediate  
24          remedy.

25                    A just government must obey the

2           rule of law. This color of law  
3           government must have its Charter to  
4           govern revoked until a constitutionally  
5           compliant government is installed.

6                     Public servants cannot refuse  
7           their sworn duty to act any more than a  
8           fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
9           sovereign people require oath,  
10          Constitution, and laws be enforced. Jail  
11          is required for all who violate oath,  
12          Constitution, and laws.

13                    I remind Council, it takes a  
14          lot of cooperation to create and allow  
15          monumental corruption.

16                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

17                    Clerk, would you please read  
18          our next speaker, please.

19                    CHIEF CLERK: Orlando Acosta,  
20          commenting on 170678.

21                    (Witness approached podium.)

22                    MR. ACOSTA: Good morning.

23          Right now I feel glad that a lot of  
24          changes are going on within this body of  
25          government in terms of everything

3           residents in the City of Philadelphia,  
4           but let's not forget we have a lot of  
5           work to do. But without community being  
6           involved in the conversation of it all

10          in residence, nothing will stand for the  
11          people if God doesn't lead the forefront  
12          of it.

13                        So let's not forget that before  
14          we do anything in government, pass any  
15          laws, any statutes or anything like that,  
16          we have to have it in terms of really  
17          understanding the principal aspect of  
18          everything when it comes down to rental  
19          properties or people owning properties,  
20          and we have to know and give people the  
21          opportunity to follow the Constitution  
22          within itself, the laws and everything  
23          like that, because without that, we're  
24          not really standing on much of anything.

25                        So that's the first and

4                     Thank you.

5                     COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

6                     Clerk, could you please read  
7           our next speaker, please.

9           commenting on 171109 and 170743.

10                    (Witness approached podium.)

11                    MS. BILAL: Good morning,  
12           Councilpeople. I'm just here today, one,  
13           to stand with the women of Council.  
14           Could y'all please stand up. A sexual  
15           harassment education training is so much  
16           needed in this city, that when you decide  
17           as City Council government to make sure  
18           that it is ingrained in this city, it is  
19           a plus, and I just want to give y'all  
20           women applause for making sure that this  
21           happens, all of you.

22                    (Applause.)

23                    MS. BILAL: Second, since I got  
24           three minutes for two things -- and I got  
25           that, you know, one and a half and one

4                        Let me stand here in support of  
5           170743. 170743 is to ensure that the  
6           Police Advisory Commission is funded and

9                        I put forth testimony, but due  
10          to my schedule, I couldn't be here in  
11          person, so let me say this: Until the  
12          City, until the communities of this city  
13          is comfortable with how police situations  
14          are investigated, until they are secure  
15          with those who investigated to come out  
16          with a fair and just outcome, until they  
17          are ensured that when they go to the  
18          police to make a complaint, that it's not  
19          covered up, that it's not thrown under  
20          the rug, that the buddy system in this  
21          institution doesn't play a role in  
22          reporting incidents with police people,  
23          until they are ensured that those police  
24          officers -- now, this goes both ways --  
25          that are not doing nothing and that

2           people come out and make frivolous  
3           complaints against them for just doing  
4           their job, which is hard enough, a Police  
5           Advisory Commission needs to be in place.

9           money at a good idea, but if you don't  
10          make sure that it is funded with credible  
11          and good training of those who are going  
12          to be investigated, then you're throwing  
13          good money at a good idea that just won't  
14          work.

15                   And my last before my last 20  
16          seconds is, don't forget to come out to  
17          the no Temple stadium, March the 1st at  
18          George Washington Carver High School at  
19          6:00 p.m. If you are in North Philly or  
20          anywhere in this city, you need to make  
21          sure -- Temple is not the ones that run  
22          this city. We who live in the City runs  
23          this city. And in my four seconds, thank  
24          you very much.

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16                   EPI's Celine McNicholas and  
17           Janelle Jones, they worked on the data.  
18           They also note in this report that if the  
19           Supreme Court decides in favor of  
20           weakening unions, it will impact the  
21           future of democratic decision-making in  
22           the workplace and the preservation of  
23           good middle-class jobs in public  
24           employment.

25                   So I know we will all pay very
