3 morning. We're going to get started, if
4 the members have taken their seat. If
5 any guests and visitors please retire
6 behind the rail, we will have our
7 invocation.

5 one?

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: In the last
10 Administration, Mr. President, we raised
11 the question of what we could do about
12 gun violence. In the last
13 Administration, Mr. President, you boldly
14 with other Councilmembers tried to stop
15 certain types of firearms in the City of
16 Philadelphia, for which you were sued,
17 not just professionally but personally.

18 In this Administration,
19 Mr. President, you, I, and my colleague
20 Councilman Johnson struck upon a sojourn
21 to try to stem the tide of firearms in
22 the City of Philadelphia, going on a
23 holiday to a gun show where we saw we
24 needed a bigger boom, that the flow of
25 guns coming into Philadelphia was

2 immense.

3 So there are two things today
4 that I am proposing. One is for us to
5 look at those principles that we adopted
6 last year to disinvest in companies that
7 do business with firearm manufacturers,
8 because the only way to approach this is
9 through their pocketbooks, one.

10 And then number two is to look
11 at what happened in Florida and make it a
12 cautionary tale, that we should look at
13 temporary restraining orders. I'll put
14 it to you this way: If on Monday we have
15 a conflict in City Hall and on Tuesday
16 the person says I'm going to come back
17 and do something really, really tragic to
18 the people and citizens in City Hall, by
19 Wednesday we should believe them and we
20 should go to their homes and temporarily
21 get those firearms, Mr. Sheriff, get them
22 under control until there is a due
23 process, Mr. District Attorney, to
24 determine whether or not they are
25 competent enough to hold those firearms.

2 It is better to be safe than
3 sorry, and we hope that common sense
4 rules and regulations, common sense
5 regulations both at the City and the
6 State, can protect us from ourselves,
7 protect us sometimes from elements that
8 need help. And if we can do that, then
9 we can take control of a little bit of
10 our own safety.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 That concludes our committee

20 is consideration of the Calendar.

21 I note that bills just reported

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you.

22 We will now move to our public
23 comment session. Our public comment
24 session will go as follows:

25 If you are interested in

6 When your name is called, you

10 turns green on that device, it will be
11 your time to speak. When the light turns
12 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
13 conclude your remarks. When the light
14 turns red, we'd ask that you please
15 adhere to our guidelines and conclude
16 your remarks. We thank you for your
17 anticipated cooperation. You will have
18 three minutes to speak.

19 Mr. Decker, please call the
20 first name on the list.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
22 commenting on 180154, 180153, 180145,
23 180149, 180155, and 171145.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. DANIHEL: This is an

2 official decree of the people in writ of
3 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
4 requires immediate action and remedy.

5 The recent shootings and my
6 stolen home are the result of
7 oath-violating officials allowing and
8 enabling law violators to go
9 unprosecuted. You were hired to maintain
10 the rule of law, investigate law
11 violations, and demand Attorney General
12 investigate and prosecute missing and
13 misused hundreds of millions of mostly
14 federal taxpayer Housing and Urban
15 Development money given to resolve Logan
16 as indicated by the Obama Administration.

17 I again quote Dr. King: "He
18 who passively accepts evil is as much
19 involved in it as he who perpetrates it."

20 Unenforced laws are causing
21 chaos. Laws are like Bibles. Unless
22 they are followed, nothing changes.

23 As public servants, you cannot
24 violate oath, Constitution, and laws
25 without penalty. How can officials deny

2 and defy inalienable, inviolable
3 God-given rights? How can agents and
4 agencies steal my home without
5 compensation, due process, Seventh
6 Amendment trial by jury? How can
7 government pay a contractor upwards of
8 100 million, mostly federal taxpayer
9 money, to build a mall on my stolen home?

10 Ben Franklin was quoted, "You
11 have a republic if you can keep it."
12 Clearly prosecution is required
13 immediately of all involved to preserve
14 the rule of law. The constitutions
15 require immediate remedy of this breach
16 of law, breach of close, breach of
17 fiduciary duty. Your oath of office
18 requires you to act or face prison.

19 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
20 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
21 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
22 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 706, 709,
23 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in
24 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
25 violated.

1 3/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I call for the federal and
3 Commonwealth governments to perform their
4 constitutional obligations to investigate
5 and prosecute all involved in the theft
6 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
7 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
8 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
9 24 years is egregious, extraordinary,
10 oath-violating, and requires immediate
11 remedy.

12 A just government must obey the
13 rule of law. This color of law
14 government must have its Charter to
15 govern revoked until a constitutionally
16 compliant government is installed.

17 Public servants cannot refuse
18 their sworn duty to act any more than a
19 fireman can refuse to fire a fire. The
20 sovereign people require oath,
21 Constitution, and laws be enforced. Jail
22 is required for all who violate oath,
23 Constitution or law.

24 I remind Council, it takes a
25 lot of cooperation to create and allow

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Emmanuel Bussie,
6 commenting on 180155.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
9 morning.

10 MR. BUSSIE: Good morning,
11 everyone. So all of you should have
12 received an interim report card for City
13 Council. In 2015, we had a Black
14 Political Summit.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Mr. Bussie.

17 MR. BUSSIE: Yes. Did you say
18 my name?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
20 put down you want to talk about vacant
21 property in the Eighth District. Can you
22 at least give the impression that you're
23 going to talk about that and start out by
24 talking about that?

25 MR. BUSSIE: I normally would,

2 but I ain't in the mood to --

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
4 accommodate us for a moment.

5 MR. BUSSIE: I know. I
6 normally would, but I ain't in the mood
7 to play games, right?

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Well, we're not playing games here today.
10 We just ask you to abide by the rules.
11 If you can just talk about -- start off
12 talking about Eighth District and segue
13 into what you want to segue.

14 MR. BUSSIE: I am going to get
15 into that.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Because there are rules.

18 MR. BUSSIE: So you want me to
19 introduce the bill first or say the bill
20 first? How you want me to proceed? I'm
21 going to get into -- you don't know what
22 I'm going to talk about because I just
23 started. So how you want me to proceed?

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
25 mean, the rules are that you're supposed

3 the list.

4 MR. BUSSIE: How do you know
5 I'm not going to do that? Because the
6 way I introduced myself or introduced the

10 My time can't be running out
11 because he told me to stop.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Mr. Bussie.

14 MR. BUSSIE: This is what I'm
15 talking about.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Mr. Bussie.

18 MR. BUSSIE: Yes.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Public comment is for the purpose of
21 talking about something on the Calendar.

22 MR. BUSSIE: How do you know I
23 was not going to talk about something on
24 the Calendar?

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Well, can you please talk about that and
3 then we can proceed.

4 MR. BUSSIE: Again, back in
5 2015, the Black Political Summit had a
6 conference with 31 recommendations that
7 almost every Councilperson signed off on,
8 except three or four.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: In
10 the Eighth District?

11 MR. BUSSIE: And the Eighth
12 District as well.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No;
14 Eighth District property.

15 MR. BUSSIE: The Eighth
16 District property. The Councilperson for
17 that district signed off on it as well.

18 Now, if you're going to
19 interrupt me, do I get more time?

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Well, Mr. Bussie, you're not going to
22 come in and dictate the terms of the
23 process.

24 MR. BUSSIE: I'm not dictating
25 the terms. I'm talking about that bill.

1 3/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I'm talking about that piece of
3 legislation. I'm going to get to that.
4 That piece of legislation -- you can't
5 dictate to me how I talk about my topic.
6 So, see, this is what it is, right? You
7 really don't care about that, because
8 what you do care about is trying to
9 control people. Because you sit up there
10 as President of City Council, you want to
11 dictate to us how we discuss a topic.
12 This is all about your pride and your
13 ego. This isn't about this topic.

14 (Microphone turned off.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
16 want to talk about the Eighth District
17 property disposition, you can do that.

18 MR. BUSSIE: Do the Eighth
19 District have a Councilperson?

20 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes.

21 MR. BUSSIE: All right, then.
22 So you can't tell me how to talk about
23 the Eighth District property when I'm
24 talking about the Eighth District
25 Councilperson. That property is in a

2 district that has a Councilperson, which
3 I'm talking about. So you want me to
4 talk about it in a certain way? How do
5 you want me to proceed here?

6 Disrespecting the President?

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
8 got a minute left on your time.

9 MR. BUSSIE: Don't put your
10 hands on me. Don't put your hands on me.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Don't touch him.

13 MR. BUSSIE: I didn't get a
14 chance to speak. He told me not to
15 speak. I didn't get a chance to speak.
16 I got 30 seconds into my speech and he
17 going to tell me I can't speak?

18 Why not, Darrell? Why not?
19 Why not? This is the problem. It's the
20 level of disrespect and disregarding and
21 arrogance by this body by that
22 leadership. It's a problem. We got
23 great Councilpeople, but they laying on
24 somebody that's arrogant, that's an
25 egotist. This is the problem.

5 (No response.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Tracy Purdy.

7 MS. PURDY: I give the floor to
8 the next comment.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Pamela Williams.

10 Pamela Williams.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Marie Patterson.

13 PASTOR WILLIAMS: Pastor Pam is
14 here.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 PASTOR WILLIAMS: Good morning.

18 Good morning to everyone. I am
19 totally and unequivocally appalled at the
20 process, Mr. President. I think that --
21 and I know I'm supposed to speak on the
22 bill --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
24 start it out. I know how it works. If
25 you just start and say, I'm talking about

2 property in the Eighth District, and then
3 you can just -- I'm just asking you to --

4 PASTOR WILLIAMS: I'm talking
5 about a project in the Eighth District,
6 but just like the rules are suspended for
7 the Councilpeople who I pay to represent
8 me, I ask that the rules be suspended so
9 I can make the comment that is necessary,
10 because I am a citizen in the City of
11 Philadelphia and I pay taxes.

12 What has happened today to the
13 public and the citizens in this Chamber
14 is utterly and unnecessarily
15 disrespectful. We were told that we
16 could not sit in this Chamber, of which
17 we pay for and which these persons
18 represent us, and we were sent upstairs.
19 I was told that someone would come
20 upstairs to get me. When it was my time
21 to speak, no one ever came. The sound
22 system up there is not working. We could
23 not hear the bills that you read.

24 (Applause.)

25 PASTOR WILLIAMS: If I ask the

2 City Councilpersons who are sitting on
3 the floor what the third bill was read, I
4 believe that they can't even tell us,
5 because the monitoring system is so
6 horrible in here.

7 We are at a crossroads in
8 Philadelphia, and something must change.
9 It must change, because the people are
10 being disrespected. The people in black
11 and brown communities in this city are
12 being disenfranchised. And everybody in
13 this body has been elected to represent
14 us and to cause us to be able to have
15 power to rise up and to have a great life
16 in this great city.

17 Justification is at a high rate
18 in this city. Nowhere in this city
19 should a developer be able to come in and
20 redesign a home and the home costs
21 \$217,000 for sale. And I live in a house
22 that's worth \$56,000 and I can't even
23 afford to pay the taxes.

24 I'm here today to serve notice.
25 I've come out of my cocoon, and I'm here

2 to fight like hell that something change
3 in this city, because it is not right,
4 Mr. President. Councilpersons, it's not
5 right. Because these people are being
6 disenfranchised and we're being
7 disenfranchised by the political system
8 that exists and was elected by the
9 people.

10 If you going stand up for the
11 people, be for the people. Rise up for
12 the people and make sure the people are
13 being counted and taken care of, and
14 that's what the City of Philadelphia
15 should be and that's what we should stand
16 for, a city of brotherly love and
17 sisterly affection.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Marie Patterson,
22 commenting on 180155.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MS. PATTERSON: Good morning.

3 Can you repeat the bill, please?

4 CHIEF CLERK: 180155.

5 MS. PATTERSON: 180155. My
6 name is Marie Patterson and I represent
7 the Fifth Councilmanic District. I've
8 lived in North Philly all my life. 18055
9 [sic] is no different than any other bill
10 that is on this table.

11 The Councilpeople in this city
12 are not doing what they're supposed to
13 do. I see a lot of people sitting around
14 hugging. Our children are being
15 destroyed. Philadelphia is being
16 destroyed, and it's because we don't have
17 good leadership.

18 That's all I have to say. It's
19 not going to take me three minutes.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 MS. PATTERSON: It's not going
23 to take me three minutes to tell you
24 Councilpeople what you should be doing.
25 You get an F on the housing. In my part

2 of town, housing for black people, it's
3 been gentrified. I don't see housing for
4 black people, affordable, that came from
5 Darrell Clarke that's the head of the
6 Fifth Councilmanic District.

7 I have violence prevention. I
8 see violence every day. There are plenty
9 of plans out there that could talk about
10 violence prevention, but I don't see it
11 in my Council. And I see you all sitting
12 here making rules, but they are not for
13 the African Americans and the people
14 who -- the constituents who you're
15 supposed to be working for.

16 Temple, union, the EOP project,
17 the campaign finance, and the Black
18 Political Summit, these are all things
19 that we say that Council have an F for, F
20 because you didn't make an effort, F
21 because you're not representing the
22 people. And this right here is a dog and
23 pony show that me as a business of
24 Philadelphia will no longer be a part of
25 the dog and pony show.

1 3/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 We're here, Different Kind of
3 Democrat, Professionals for Progress, to
4 change the narrative of how Philadelphia
5 should be living. We should not be
6 second-class citizens.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

9 (Applause.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Zahirah Ahmad.

11 (Mr. Bussie approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Manny, no. You already spoke.

14 MR. BUSSIE: She yielded the
15 floor to Emmanuel Bussie.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 That's not how it works, man. Come on.

18 That's not how it works.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
21 on a second.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Cindy Bass.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. Point of information.

1 3/1/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 180155 is a lot transfer, a vacant lot
3 transfer that, as we all know, the City
4 of Philadelphia has a very difficult time
5 with vacant lots. And so we do encourage
6 property owners to take responsibility
7 for those side lots next to them, and
8 that's what the transfer of 180155 is.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: You're
12 welcome.

13 MS. AHMAD: Good morning.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MS. AHMAD: I'm speaking on
17 180155 and, most importantly, how we, the
18 black people, the brown people, the
19 minority people of Philadelphia, have no
20 say. No one pays attention to us. No
21 one listens to us.

22 Time and time again we have
23 fought, we have fight, we have spoken,
24 and nothing is being done. We look at
25 things that's going on around the City,

2 and we clearly, each and every one of us
3 sitting here, can honestly say we
4 disagree with so much.

5 There are bills being passed
6 that should not even be passed. There
7 are bills that should be passed that are
8 being overlooked, one being the schools.
9 Our children should not be suffering in
10 this school system. The teachers should
11 not have to come out of their pockets and
12 pay for supplies to teach their students.
13 The teachers should not have to be
14 refereed to disarm children. The
15 teachers are there to teach. And this is
16 why our children are losing now, because
17 we don't have leadership to stand up and
18 help these teachers do what they are here
19 to do.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, ma'am, for your testimony.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: John Evans.

24 (No response.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: John Evans.

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Move
4 on.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Greg Brinkley,
6 commenting on 170954-A.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MR. BRINKLEY: Good morning.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MR. BRINKLEY: I really didn't
12 prepare a speech. I don't think I need
13 one. Very clearly on this bill, I got
14 some clarification from Council
15 Blackwell's office that this bill also
16 has a connotation that Council is the
17 final -- can approve this bill.

18 I'm not liking the makeup of
19 the nominating panel. I don't think it
20 has enough African American male
21 presence. I unapologetically make that
22 comment. I think it's disproportionate
23 to the amount of school kids in terms of
24 makeup of the schools. I think that
25 Council should require before they

2 approve it.

3 I'm going to put it on record
4 that the Mayor who opposes the extension
5 of the amnesty program to get money for
6 the schools, but yet he will not file a
7 lawsuit against the Parking Authority for
8 the money that they haven't given. I'm
9 not understanding that dichotomy. I
10 think that it's disrespectful, and with
11 all due respect to you, Council
12 President, I support the Different Kind
13 of Democrat, and I think that leadership
14 has a lot to do with anybody. You set
15 the tone for that, and with all due
16 respect to you, you have failed.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Elizabeth McGraw,
19 commenting on 180153, 180154, and 180150.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MS. MCGRAW: Good morning.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MS. MCGRAW: You already know
25 I'm Elizabeth McGraw. You already know

3 I support Professionals for Progress and

10 I am appalled at City Council's audacity

11 to open your session in prayer. I nearly

12 fainted. I nearly fell out of my seat.

13 How dare you open your session in prayer,

14 asking for God's blessings, everybody say

15 amen, while you failed our children and

16 jeopardize our futures. I am disgusted

17 and appalled.

18 I'm a 65-year-old grandmother

19 who is raising children in this

20 community, and you fail us this way all

21 under praying?

22 I'm done.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

25 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Rochelle Bilal,
3 commenting on 160248.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MS. BILAL: Good morning,
8 Council President, and good morning,
9 Councilpeople. I'm Rochelle Bilal,
10 Different Kind of Democrat.

11 I am voting no for Bill 160248
12 in reference to excluding new businesses
13 from occupancy tax. We have an
14 organization in this city that is on
15 Girard Avenue. Not only did you increase
16 our taxes from \$1,500 to almost \$8,000,
17 we pay about \$168 occupancy tax every
18 single month, and we've been here since
19 1972. You want to relieve new businesses
20 of occupancy tax, then you should relieve
21 those that have businesses and have been
22 serving the City since 1972 of their
23 occupancy tax first. We have abatement
24 and now we got a relief of occupancy tax?
25 You got to stop this giving people a

2 break when you don't give us who work in
3 this city and its community, have a
4 business, a non-profit organization that
5 serves the community a break first before
6 you give anybody else that comes into
7 this city another abatement, another
8 occupancy tax exclusion in this city.

9 I say vote no on 160248.

10 On the other hand, in reference
11 to this report card from Professionals
12 for Progress and Different Kind of
13 Democrat, we are saying you haven't done
14 enough. When you get a grade of a 50,
15 that gives you an F. So right now City
16 Council stands at a grade 50, which is an
17 F. An F in the Parking Authority. Take
18 back the street parking and fund our
19 schools.

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. BILAL: An F on affordable
22 housing. You got people that can't even
23 come in -- that live in this city and
24 can't get a house. Our children want to
25 stay here, but they can't because they

3 Violence prevention, you say
4 you want to wait until summertime? We
5 had nine shootings in this city in a
6 matter of a week and you want to wait for

10 stadium.

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. BILAL: You get an F.

13 We are saying we need
14 representation in this city, and we
15 saying right now City Council is getting
16 a 50 grade mark, means you get an F.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Sister Taleah

22 Taylor, commenting on 170408.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

25 morning.

2 MS. TAYLOR: Good afternoon,
3 everyone. My name is Sister Taleah and,
4 first off, I want to say thank you to
5 Councilwoman Brown and Councilwoman Gym
6 on stepping up for our children in
7 Philadelphia School District, because I
8 also don't believe that any kids between
9 kindergarten and 5th grade actually know
10 what they're doing, and suspension is way
11 too far when they belong in school. So I
12 do thank you for that. I do thank you
13 for that.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. TAYLOR: But that's not
16 enough when this city ignores the needs
17 of the black and brown people, then
18 display a good smoke screen acting like
19 they're helping, but we see no results in
20 our communities.

21 I am the Vice Chair of the
22 Philadelphia Anti-Violence Coalition, and
23 I have hundreds, hundreds of soldiers out
24 there in the street doing outreach work.
25 We get no help whatsoever. None

2 whatsoever. You keep saying that we're
3 going to get help, we're going to get
4 help. We're doing it off our dimes. I'm
5 working two and a half jobs so I can
6 support one of my programs out of my own
7 pocket. We're not getting no help, but
8 we're getting the numbers and keeping the
9 kids off the street. But there's 60
10 million-plus going to programs that we
11 don't see coming in our neighborhood?
12 Where is the money? It's not funding
13 anything for us. We're still closing
14 down recreation centers, still closing
15 down schools. It's not enough for our
16 children. That's why I believe -- and
17 you know I love you, Councilman Curtis
18 Jones, and others. David Oh, you're my
19 man, and Jannie Blackwell, but leadership
20 has to go.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you.

23 MS. TAYLOR: And I am a
24 Different Kind of Democrat.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
5 other speakers on the public comment
6 list, Mr. President.

9 looking forward to more. No; I'm good.
10 I'm good. I'm good. Thank you. But
11 your words are obviously taken seriously,
12 and as usual, we're prepared to sit down
13 and talk about real solutions for real
14 issues. Thank you so much for being
15 here.

16 MS. TAYLOR: We're always told
17 that.

8 2020 Census and its impact on
9 municipalities.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
13 Council President. I'll be very brief.
14 As everyone in this body knows that under
15 Article I, Section 2 of the United States
16 Constitution, it requires us to have a
17 census every ten years. Based on that
18 census, that's how we allocate the
19 members of Congress as well as how
20 funding is provided through cities
21 throughout this nation.

22 December of last year the
23 Justice Department actually requested
24 that the Census Bureau provide a question
25 regarding citizenship be placed on the

2 2020 Census. Many people in this body
3 know that there's historically being an
4 undercount of people of color in our
5 census and, as a result, that's caused us
6 to have reduced resources not only in the
7 City of Philadelphia but cities around
8 this nation.

10 Kenney, along with other members of the
11 United States Conference of Mayors,
12 requested to Commerce Secretary Wilbur
13 Ross to not have this type of language in
14 the 2020 Census, as well as make sure we
15 provide adequate resources so that all
16 people in not only the City of
17 Philadelphia but throughout the
18 Commonwealth and throughout the nation
19 are properly counted in the census. And
20 so I'm glad to support this resolution,
21 and with that, I move for the adoption.

22 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

23 It's been moved and properly
24 seconded.

25 All those in favor say aye.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

15 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
16 you, Council President. I move for the
17 adoption of the resolution.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
20 been moved and properly seconded.

21 All those in favor say aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

1 3/1/18 - STATED - MAYOR'S BUDGET ADDRESS

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and that resolution is
4 adopted.

5 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
6 other resolutions on the Final Passage
7 Calendar, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you very much.

10 That concludes our Calendar.
11 We will have a five-minute pause and we
12 will proceed.

13 (Brief pause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
15 have Phase 2 of our Council session.
16 Thank you for your patience.

17 The time has come for us to
18 consider the Mayor's presentation of his
19 annual budget. The Philadelphia Home
20 Rule Charter states that the Mayor shall
21 submit to Council, no later than 90 days
22 before the end of the fiscal year, his
23 operating budget message and proposed
24 operating budget ordinance for the
25 ensuing fiscal year. At the same time,

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2 the Mayor shall submit to Council the
3 recommended capital program and capital
4 budget as received from the City Planning
5 Commission, to the extent approved by the
6 Mayor.

7 I now appoint the following
8 committee to escort the Mayor to the
9 Council Chambers: Councilman Henon,
10 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilman
11 Greenlee, Councilman O'Neill, and
12 Councilman Oh.

13 (Pause.)

14 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS:
15 Mr. President, the Mayor has arrived.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 You're supposed to applaud.

19 (Standing ovation.)

20 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you,
21 everyone. Please be seated.

22 Good morning -- or actually
23 good afternoon, and to Council President
24 Darrell Clarke and all of my colleagues
25 on City Council, it's great to be back in

2 this Chamber and to be here with you all.

3 I'm grateful that we're joined
4 by Philadelphia's newest elected
5 officials, District Attorney Larry
6 Krasner and City Controller Rebecca
7 Rhyhart.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: As I said at
10 your inauguration, I look forward to
11 working with you both in the coming
12 months and years on a wide range of
13 important issues.

14 We're just two months in and
15 2018 is already proving to be a banner
16 year for Philadelphia.

17 I don't know about you, but I'm
18 still pinching myself that the Eagles are
19 Super Bowl champions.

20 (Applause.)

21 MAYOR KENNEY: And that great
22 parade up Broad Street to the steps of
23 the Art Museum showed the world yet again
24 that Philly knows how to throw a huge
25 celebration.

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2 To the thousands of City
3 workers who made that parade happen, we
4 thank you. It was an example of the
5 quality of work you deliver day in and
6 day out.

7 2018 has also brought the
8 tremendous news that Philadelphia is
9 among the 20 finalists to host Amazon's
10 second headquarters.

11 (Audience member boos.)

12 (Applause.)

13 MAYOR KENNEY: I don't know. I
14 think 50,000 jobs is pretty good, but
15 anyway.

16 Partners from every part of
17 this region rose to the occasion in
18 support of the Amazon HQ2 bid. Their
19 contributions and the consistent support
20 shown by all of you here in City Council
21 undoubtedly boosted the City's prospects.
22 We all understand what a game changer
23 this would be for Philadelphia.

24 When all branches of local
25 government are focused on working

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2 together for progress, the residents of
3 the City and region benefit.

4 Two years ago we worked
5 together and enacted the Philadelphia
6 Beverage Tax. In its first full year,
7 that tax brought in nearly \$79 million.
8 To date, more than 2,700 three- and
9 four-year-olds have benefited from the
10 free --

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR KENNEY: -- have
13 benefited from the free, quality early
14 education through our PHLpreK program.
15 That 79 million also funded 11 community
16 schools, supporting more than 6,500
17 students, most of whom live below the
18 poverty line.

19 Last year --

20 (Applause.)

21 MAYOR KENNEY: Last year you
22 approved legislation authorizing our
23 Rebuild program, and just a few weeks ago
24 you introduced legislation to kick off
25 this investment in neighborhood parks,

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2 recreation centers, and libraries.

3 Now, the beverage industry
4 would like folks to think that somehow
5 \$79 million in new revenue is a failure.
6 I suppose when you can spend over \$15
7 million over two years just for lobbying
8 and when you can pay a single CEO nearly
9 \$30 million a year in salary, then maybe
10 \$79 million seems like chump change. But
11 not to us.

12 But for the residents of
13 Philadelphia who are benefiting from
14 these programs, it certainly isn't chump
15 change. I am hopeful that the coming
16 year will bring a final resolution to the
17 lawsuit, allowing us to move forward with
18 a full expansion of PHLpreK and community
19 schools and with the capital borrowing
20 for the Rebuild program.

21 Of course, it is our city's
22 most vulnerable residents who have long
23 been a top priority here in City Council.
24 In the past year, Councilmembers Gym and
25 Johnson and Quinones-Sanchez spearheaded

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2 the Philadelphia Eviction Prevention and
3 Response Task Force. This work will help
4 ensure that the rights of renters are
5 protected and assistance is provided to
6 keep them in their homes.

7 That effort, in turn, will help
8 mitigate homelessness, an issue in which
9 our good friend Jannie Blackwell has
10 worked tirelessly throughout her entire
11 life to stop.

12 At the same time, Councilwoman
13 Cherelle Parker has been laser focused on
14 a matter that hasn't received enough
15 attention, the threat to Philadelphia's
16 middle neighborhoods. She has made clear
17 that even as we focus on poverty, we
18 cannot lose sight of the communities
19 where vulnerabilities are less obvious.

20 That is why we're allocating
21 \$500,000 in additional funding for
22 investments in our commercial corridors.

23 Those are just some of the many
24 examples of how every day of the year
25 City Council fights for those who have no

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2 voice. You've done tremendous work to
3 boost opportunities and level the playing
4 field.

5 As I come before you today, I
6 only wish I had sufficient resources to
7 fully address every challenge our city
8 faces. But unfortunately we don't. This
9 spending plan is lean. We have combed
10 through every part of government looking
11 for new efficiencies.

12 We have stepped up our efforts
13 to reduce tax delinquency, thanks in part
14 to ideas put forth by Councilmembers
15 Allan Domb and Mark Squilla. Nearly
16 9,000 properties were removed from the
17 delinquency rolls in the past year, and
18 now more than 95 percent of property
19 owners pay on time. We will continue to
20 work with them on these essential
21 efforts.

22 But make no mistake, we must
23 continue to find ways to do more with the
24 resources that we have.

25 Last fall, some of you joined

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2 me as we released the result of the first
3 survey of Philadelphia residents in more
4 than a decade.

5 The issues our residents care
6 about were clear. Better streets, more
7 efficient sanitation services, and
8 improved public safety ranked as the top
9 three services that the City should focus
10 on.

11 I am pleased to say that we
12 listened. This budget and capital
13 program offer new investments for all
14 three.

15 For public safety, this budget
16 reflects our commitment to protecting all
17 neighborhoods from crime, particularly
18 violent crime. We are investing \$100
19 million over the Plan to make sure our
20 police force is at its full complement of
21 over 6,500 officers, a level not reached
22 since the recession of 2009.

23 I know Council President Clarke
24 and Councilman Johnson, who spend much of
25 their time working with victims of gun

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2 violence, will share my belief that this
3 staffing level can have a meaningful
4 impact on reducing crime.

5 There's already progress.

6 Violent crime is at its lowest level
7 since 1979, and property crime is at its
8 lowest level since 1971. Use-of-force
9 incidents, including officer-involved
10 shootings, have consistently declined
11 over the past few years. Thanks to an
12 increased emphasis on training for
13 officers, along with proactive oversight
14 and review by Police Internal Affairs, we
15 expect continued progress in the reforms
16 instituted by our great police
17 commissioner, Richard Ross.

18 Regarding pedestrian stops, the
19 number of stops lacking reasonable
20 suspicion dropped 72 percent in 2016 over
21 the previous year, and that dramatic drop
22 has continued.

23 I applaud the men and women of
24 the Police Department for taking these
25 reforms seriously and for working with

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2 police leadership to ensure public safety
3 while protecting constitutional rights.

4 Thanks to the advocacy of
5 Council President Clarke, this budget
6 also sets aside increased funding for the
7 Police Advisory Commission. This allows
8 for additional staffing to support its
9 work with the Department to review police
10 policy and practice.

11 We have safely reduced our jail
12 population by 24 percent. We're very
13 proud of that.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR KENNEY: Along with our
16 criminal justice partners, we pushed for
17 systemic change. New investments in
18 existing initiatives strongly championed
19 by Councilman Curtis Jones will allow us
20 to build on this.

21 The coming year will bring
22 initial construction of the new Police
23 Administration Building at 400 North
24 Broad Street, along with new capital
25 investments for the 2nd and 15th Police

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2 Districts in Councilman Henon's district
3 and the 22nd Police District in
4 Councilman Clarke's district.

5 These are vital steps to give
6 the Police Department what they have long
7 lacked, modern facilities that enhance
8 rather than hinder their ability to do
9 their jobs and keep our residents safe.

10 As you know, the brave men and
11 women of the Philadelphia Fire Department
12 are still grieving. In January,
13 Lieutenant Matt LeTourneau lost his life
14 in the line of duty. Matt was as devoted
15 to firefighting as he was to his own
16 family. And I would ask you now to
17 please stand to honor Matt's memory with
18 a moment of silence.

19 (Moment of silence.)

20 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you.

21 There is no greater way to
22 honor Matt's sacrifice than commit to
23 investments that can reduce danger to
24 both the public and to our firefighters.
25 These are investments that have long been

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2 championed by Councilmembers O'Neill,
3 Greenlee, Henon, and Taubenberger.

4 I am pleased to announce that
5 our Five Year Plan commits to the
6 construction of a much-needed logistics
7 hub for the Fire Department.

8 The hub will provide
9 state-of-the-art training facilities, a
10 centralized gathering location for the
11 entire Department in a time of crisis,
12 and safe storage of Fire Department
13 vehicles that will extend their useful
14 life and reduce maintenance costs.

15 We are boosting staffing levels
16 in the Fire Department, including new
17 paramedics, to over 2,600 members. That
18 represents a 24 percent increase in
19 funding for staff since we took office.

20 Our capital program calls for
21 the expansion of the Fire Department's
22 fleet of vehicles. We plan to add six
23 engines, three ladders, and 11 medic
24 units the coming year. And we'll
25 continue this \$10 million funding level

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2 throughout the six-year capital program.

3 In doing so, we better protect
4 our residents. We save lives. And we
5 honor not only Matt LeTourneau, but every
6 firefighter who puts his or her life in
7 harm's way to serve our city.

8 This budget also proposes
9 funding to address one of the most
10 pressing public health crises this city
11 has faced, the scourge of opioids.

12 Like many other cities over the
13 last few years, we've seen this epidemic
14 worsen. There were about 1,200 overdose
15 deaths in Philadelphia last year, the
16 highest death toll of any major city in
17 the country.

18 We've seen increased
19 homelessness and public safety issues
20 that affect innocent families and
21 businesses in neighborhoods that have
22 been overwhelmed by the crisis.

23 We failed many people during
24 the crack epidemic by treating it solely
25 as a matter for law enforcement rather

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2 than a public health problem. It was the
3 wrong approach, and --

4 (Applause.)

5 MAYOR KENNEY: And it was
6 costly in ways that still impact many
7 Philadelphians today. That's why we need
8 innovative, multi-pronged solutions to
9 treat the opioid epidemic like the health
10 crisis that it is.

11 The Mayor's Task Force to
12 Combat the Opioid Epidemic delivered
13 recommendations focused around education,
14 treatment, overdose prevention, and our
15 criminal justice response.

16 This budget will provide nearly
17 \$20 million over five years for a range
18 of services to implement those
19 recommendations and also address the
20 needs of residents in the most affected
21 neighborhoods.

22 We are creating a medic unit
23 that pairs emergency medical workers with
24 outreach workers, and we're developing
25 more "handoffs" from emergency

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2 departments so that someone who has
3 recently overdosed is connected as
4 quickly as possible for treatment.

5 We are distributing the
6 overdose antidote, naloxone, to first
7 responders and community members, and
8 we're providing low-barrier housing
9 options that do not require sobriety.

10 We're investing in Police
11 Assisted Diversion, which provides those
12 with minor drug offenses the opportunity
13 to find help rather than being arrested.
14 With a \$3.75 million investment over the
15 next five years, this program, a pilot in
16 the 22nd Police District, will expand to
17 East Division, the center of the opioid
18 epidemic.

19 As I stand here today, I know
20 we all wish we didn't have to make these
21 investments. We can all think of other
22 necessary programs we'd like to see
23 expand with this money.

24 That is why the City filed suit
25 against the manufacturers of opioids. It

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2 is our hope that one day these firms will
3 be forced to compensate the City for the
4 costs that their unscrupulous marketing
5 practices have created to this government
6 and to our residents.

7 I look forward to continued
8 collaboration with Councilmembers like
9 Cindy Bass and Maria Quinones-Sanchez,
10 David Oh and Mark Squilla, who have
11 confronted this issue head-on.

12 Together we will continue to
13 work with residents to ease the
14 quality-of-life issues that have arisen
15 in neighborhoods close to the epicenter
16 of the epidemic. We continue to
17 implement our coordinated effort to
18 address impacts to the West Kensington
19 and Fairhill neighborhoods.

20 So I ask all of you, let's work
21 together in these efforts. At this time
22 of crisis, we need to pursue all options
23 to save lives and improve our
24 neighborhoods.

25 (Applause.)

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2 MAYOR KENNEY: As I mentioned,
3 thousands of Philadelphians who responded
4 to our resident survey made abundantly
5 clear that streets and sanitation are top
6 concerns. So in this budget we are not
7 wavering from our goal of repaving more
8 than 130 miles of streets each year by
9 the year 2023.

10 The Streets Department is
11 currently hiring a second crew of more
12 than 30 people for repaving, and a third
13 crew will be added in future years.

14 We also intend to advance
15 Vision Zero, the bold public safety plan
16 to eliminate traffic-related deaths by
17 the year 2030. We plan to spend \$60
18 million over the five years for
19 reengineering of dangerous locations, for
20 expanded traffic-calming devices, and for
21 more bike lanes.

22 We'll be purchasing new
23 sanitation compactors to replace aging
24 ones, increasing the reliability of this
25 vital service to our residents.

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2 The reconstruction and repaving
3 of streets, improved sanitation
4 collections, and safer streets for
5 pedestrians and bicyclists, all of these
6 are good for economic development.
7 Because well-paved roads and streets,
8 along with a clean city, encourage strong
9 private sector commitment to
10 Philadelphia.

11 Another encouraging sign for
12 the City's business community is City
13 Council's regulatory reform initiative
14 spearheaded by Councilman Green.

15 The rules and regs that govern
16 businesses in this city are important,
17 and your efforts will ensure that they
18 are appropriate, up to date, and
19 encourage companies to invest in
20 Philadelphia. We look forward to seeing
21 the results of that effort in 2018.

22 Our commitment to
23 Philadelphia's businesses was made
24 abundantly clear a few weeks ago when I
25 spoke to the Chamber of Commerce and

2 announced our workforce development plan,
3 Fueling Philadelphia's Talent Engine.

4 This plan serves as a launching
5 point for the bold steps needed to align
6 education and workforce systems to the
7 talent our businesses need. And a brand
8 new Office of Workforce Development will
9 begin operations this month to coordinate
10 this important work with our outside
11 partners. This will ensure that Fueling
12 Philadelphia's Talent Engine is
13 transformed from a bold plan to a
14 groundbreaking reality.

15 At the same time, we are
16 requesting half a million dollars to
17 build off the success of last summer's
18 Fair Chance Hiring Initiative. Fair
19 Chance provides reimbursements to
20 employers who hire returning citizens and
21 pay them a living wage.

22 Of course, we fully intend to
23 do what Councilwoman Reynolds Brown has
24 long championed, to lead by example, by
25 continuing the City as Model Employer

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2 program which we launched as a pilot last
3 year. City as Model Employer prepares
4 residents who face barriers to employment
5 for positions that are currently
6 difficult for City departments to fill.

7 We're also boosting our
8 commitment to one of the most successful
9 talent engines, the Community College of
10 Philadelphia. This budget will increase
11 funding to the Community College by \$1.5
12 million annually. This will help ensure
13 that thousands of Philly's high school
14 graduates have a chance for a next step,
15 a certificate or social degree that will
16 open doors as they move into the
17 workforce.

18 These students are waiting for
19 their shot at greatness, just like that
20 team of underdogs we cheered on Broad
21 Street and the Parkway a few weeks ago.

22 Truth is, I believe the real
23 Philadelphia underdogs are our students,
24 hundreds of thousands of preschoolers,
25 children, teens, young women and young

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2 men who have been poorly served by an
3 underfunded School District.

4 A generation of students and
5 families have suffered as a result. Yet
6 no one was ever fully accountable for the
7 outcomes, and the City's power to improve
8 Philadelphia schools were limited.

9 Now we are in a moment of
10 truth. It's time to write a new chapter
11 in the history of Philadelphia schools.

12 Over the last two years, thanks
13 to the leadership of Superintendent
14 William Hite and his team, the District
15 has achieved stability and improved
16 literacy and graduation rates. But we
17 still have work to do, but we are headed
18 in the right direction. Establishing
19 clear accountability is the best way to
20 make sure we not only stay on course, but
21 also accelerate our progress.

22 In November, I stood before you
23 and made the case for a locally
24 controlled School Board, and with your
25 support, we are moving diligently in that

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2 direction.

3 (Applause.)

4 MAYOR KENNEY: The School

5 Reform Commission will cede control this

6 summer, and governance of the schools

7 will revert to a nine-member locally

8 appointed board.

9 To ensure that the new board

10 has time to prepare for a smooth

11 transition into the enormous

12 responsibilities that await, I plan to

13 appoint members later this month.

14 I will make our appointments

15 from a pool of recommendations

16 thoughtfully considered by the

17 Educational Nominating Panel, a diverse

18 group of Philadelphians made up of

19 dedicated parent advocates, former

20 students, educators, and leaders of

21 various citywide organizations.

22 The Panel considered more than

23 500 nominations and applications from all

24 across the City, and within their 40-day

25 deadline presented a list of 27

2 recommendations just this week.

3 I welcome the proposed Charter
4 amendment to give City Council the
5 authority to approve the Mayor's Board of
6 Education appointments. In the meantime,
7 we'll continue to look to each of you for
8 advice and guidance in this process.

9 We will appoint a board that
10 possesses the diverse skills, knowledge,
11 and perspectives needed to sustain and
12 build on the District's recent success, a
13 board that shares our vision that all
14 students deserve access to a quality
15 school in their own neighborhood.

16 As we return to local control
17 of schools, we must provide the financial
18 stability the District needs so our
19 students and schools can continue
20 building on the real progress they've
21 made in recent years.

22 But the District's forecast is
23 grim, a \$900 million deficit projected by
24 the year 2023. Addressing this
25 tremendous need won't be easy, but the

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2 alternative is far worse.

3 That would cost us the
4 District's hard-won stability. It would
5 return our students to overcrowded
6 classrooms, lacking in resources, in
7 schools without nurses and counselors.
8 It would set us back just when we were
9 poised to finally move forward.

10 There is nothing left to cut.
11 There is no one else to turn to. While
12 we continue to press the Commonwealth to
13 meet its constitutional requirement to
14 fund schools adequately, we can no longer
15 afford to wait for other people to help
16 us. Right now it's up to us. We need to
17 step up and provide the financial
18 stability and the accountability that our
19 District needs.

20 So in this budget and Five Year
21 Plan, we propose that we start by using
22 existing revenues to boost the City's
23 contribution to the School District by
24 \$20 million for each of the next five
25 years.

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2 In addition, we propose a
3 package of tax measures that delivers
4 stability by closing the District's
5 projected deficit.

6 This includes a 6 percent
7 property tax increase to bring the
8 District \$475 million over five years.

9 For the average residential
10 property owner, that means an additional
11 \$95 a year. And if they are enrolled in
12 the Homestead Exemption program at its
13 current level, it works out to an extra
14 \$70 a year, or less than \$6 a month.

15 I propose readjusting scheduled
16 reductions in the wage tax to bring in
17 nearly \$340 million over five years. And
18 an increase in the local portion of the
19 real estate transfer tax will bring the
20 School District about \$66 million
21 additional.

22 All told, this package will
23 mean an additional \$980 million to the
24 children of Philadelphia over five years.

25 I know for many residents this

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2 will be a sacrifice. I vow to work with
3 City Council to protect low-income
4 homeowners. We will expand housing
5 counseling and outreach with \$2.5 million
6 in foreclosure prevention programs. We
7 will boost funding to the Philadelphia
8 Land Bank by nearly \$4 million. And
9 we'll expand the Homestead Exemption in
10 light of growing home values.

11 Our residents deserve to know
12 precisely what their sacrifice will
13 accomplish, so let me tell you.

14 Eliminating the deficit and
15 ensuring the financial stability of our
16 schools will enable us to push forward
17 with the School District's Action Plan
18 3.0, a plan that has generated early
19 success in literacy, college and career
20 readiness, and staffing.

21 It will also bring vital new
22 investments such as capital improvements,
23 including upgraded elementary classrooms;
24 additional 9th grade academies that
25 provide academic supports and counseling

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2 to reduce the risk of dropping out;
3 expanded and improved CTE programs,
4 apprenticeship programs, IT internships,
5 and other high school pathways and
6 opportunities; school climate investments
7 to enhance positive and safe school
8 cultures; and expanded college access
9 through advanced placement courses, free
10 SAT testing, and a middle college program
11 where high school students can earn an
12 Associate's Degree.

13 This investment will also bring
14 specialized reading coaches for every
15 elementary school and expand the focus on
16 early literacy into grades 4 and 5; more
17 counseling assistance to provide
18 bilingual services and support the
19 families, and more ELL teachers to ensure
20 students are acquiring needed English
21 language skills; more opportunities for
22 students to have career exposure and work
23 experience in the summer and year-round;
24 and continued efforts to increase the
25 diversity and quality of our teaching

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2 workforce.

3 All of these efforts will take
4 years to fully realize, but we expect to
5 see steady and incremental progress each
6 year, with more students reading on grade
7 level, graduating, and successfully
8 transitioning into college and careers.

9 And neighborhoods will flourish
10 around a growing number of successful
11 schools.

12 Families will know they have
13 quality educational options for their
14 kids, and businesses will know their
15 future workers are getting the training
16 and skills they need to succeed.

17 A wise man recently said, "An
18 underdog is a hungry dog. And hungry
19 dogs run faster."

20 Let me tell you, the children
21 of Philadelphia School District, the real
22 underdogs, are very hungry. They're
23 hungry for knowledge that only a properly
24 funded school, with updated books, modern
25 technology, and adequate staffing can

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2 bring.

3 They are hungry for the
4 opportunities that only a high school
5 diploma or equivalency can achieve. They
6 are hungry for the one thing that
7 students and families in other parts of
8 the state take for granted: Hope.

9 (Applause.)

10 MAYOR KENNEY: Hope for a
11 better future.

12 I stand here today ready to be
13 held personally accountable for this. I
14 do so because I envision a day when we
15 are cheering not only athletes on the
16 Parkway but also students at a podium,
17 holding diplomas, holding scholarships,
18 holding job offers, and holding the hands
19 of their proud family members.

20 Students, for the first time,
21 are holding on to the realization they
22 are no longer underdogs. They are
23 champions.

24 (Applause.)

25 MAYOR KENNEY: We have to make

2 this a reality.

3 These are our kids. They are
4 no one else's kids. And no one else is
5 coming to their rescue, not from
6 Harrisburg and not from Washington, DC,
7 God knows. And every time I enter a
8 pre-K or a kindergarten or an elementary
9 school, what I see are hopeful children,
10 who are unspoiled, who don't see race,
11 who want to be loved and want to be
12 educated and want to be successful
13 adults.

14 I see it in preschool. I see
15 it in kindergarten. I see it in
16 elementary schools. I see it in high
17 schools, our CTE schools, Dobbins,
18 Swenson, all those schools.

19 These young people are hopeful
20 for a future, and we can't keep on
21 talking about it unless we pay for it.
22 And we need to pay for our kids' future,
23 because in the end, the 26 percent
24 poverty rate that we have as a city will
25 only be reduced through education. And

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2 when I'm long --

3 (Applause.)

4 MAYOR KENNEY: And when I'm

5 long gone from this earth, what I hope is

6 that our tax base is expanded, we have

7 more people paying taxes and raising

8 families and buying homes in our

9 neighborhoods and making our

10 neighborhoods stable so we don't have to

11 spend money on prisons, on drug

12 addiction, on all the things we spend

13 money on that we should never spend money

14 on.

15 We should have people who are

16 successful and can make their way in this

17 world, and we'll all have been better off

18 for that, and that will be our legacy.

19 Let's fund our schools and

20 let's get to work.

21 Thank you.

22 (Standing ovation.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: As

24 you leave, because we still have to

25 adjourn Council, those that are leaving,

2 we ask you to leave quietly and quickly.
3 Those that are going to stay, we ask you
4 to allow us to conclude our Council
5 session.

6 And before we all leave, I
7 omitted something this year. I'd like to
8 recognize -- I guess I can call him my
9 mayor, Mayor John Street.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
12 a little personal. It's a little
13 personal. Mayor Kenney is a close
14 second, but you understand the Street
15 connection.

16 Thank you, Mayor, for being
17 here.

18 Temple students? Yeah, I see
19 them. Hey guys.

20 Why don't we ask everybody to
21 keep quiet so we can go ahead and
22 adjourn. If the members will take their
23 seats, we can adjourn and everybody can
24 leave.

25 First of all, any speeches on
