2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. We're going to get
4 started. We have a pretty long agenda
5 today.

6 If members have taken their
7 seat, we have established a quorum.
8 Visitors will retire behind the rail.
9 Thank you very much.

10 To give our invocation this
11 morning, we have a very special guest,
12 and I'd like to recognize Stefen
13 Wisniewski of the Philadelphia -- wait a
14 minute. Hold it. The Super Bowl
15 Champion, Philadelphia Eagles.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: He
18 is here today as the guest of Councilman
19 Oh.

20 Thank you, Champ.

21 MR. WISNIEWSKI: Thank you,
22 Councilman.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
24 everybody would please stand.

25 (Councilmembers, guests, and

3 MR. WISNIEWSKI: I'm honored to
4 be here with you guys. It's been awesome
5 to see since the Super Bowl just how much
6 that win has meant to the City, and I'm
7 proud to have been a part of that. I
8 think what we did was special for a lot
9 of reasons, but hopefully we can be an
10 inspiration that a group of people from
11 different backgrounds, different races,
12 different socioeconomic backgrounds can
13 come together for a common purpose and
14 achieve something pretty awesome.

15 And something a lot of people
16 know about our team is that one thing
17 that really bonded a lot of us together
18 was our faith in Christ and that a lot of
19 our players are followers of Jesus and
20 spend a lot of time studying the word of
21 God together, praying together, and I
22 think that gave us a special bond.
23 That's why I'm here today, is to pray.
24 So let's bow our heads.

25 Father in heaven, you are holy,

2 you are all-powerful, all-mighty. You
3 sit above the circled earth we got down
4 here. We look like little grasshoppers,
5 and yet you love us so much, God. You
6 love us so much that you sent your son
7 Jesus to die on the cross to pay a

9 that.

10 God, our prayer this morning is
11 that your will will be done here on
12 earth, here in Philadelphia, here in the
13 City Council as it is in heaven.

14 God, this city, this earth, it
15 doesn't look like it's supposed to, God.
16 It doesn't look like heaven. We have way
17 too much chaos, way too much violence,
18 way too much selfishness. God, forgive
19 us for our part in the failings of this
20 world, forgive us for our sins, and fill
21 us with your spirit that we may walk more
22 closely with you and that we may make
23 this world down here like it is up in
24 heaven.

25 God, I want to pray for this

3 Councilmembers, all the leaders of this
4 City, God. We want to pray that you
5 would give them the spirit of

10 this City would do nothing out of selfish
11 ambition or vain conceit, but in humility

13 themselves and that we would not -- all
14 the leaders would not think of their own

20 Thank you very much.

21 Our next order of business is
22 the approval of the Journal of the
23 meeting of Thursday, March 8th, 2018, and
24 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Thank you. It has been moved and
8 properly seconded that the Journal of the
9 meeting of Thursday, March 8, 2018 stand
10 approved.

11 All those in favor say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and the Journal is
18 approved.

19 The next order of business is
20 requests for leave of absence, and the
21 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. On behalf of the
24 majority, there are no requests of leave
25 of absence today.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair thanks the gentleman.

4 And on behalf of the minority,
5 the Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
7 much. On behalf of the minority, there
8 are no requests for leaves of absence.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair thanks the gentleman.

11 Before we proceed, I would ask
12 if anyone has a device, cell phone or any
13 other type of device that makes any
14 noise, could you please turn it off.
15 Thank you very much.

16 At this time, I would like to
17 dispense with the regular order of
18 business and I would like to welcome and
19 thank everyone who has taken time out of
20 their busy day to come down to witness
21 their government in action. We wish that
22 your stay here today is a knowledgeable
23 one but, more importantly, a pleasurable
24 one, so much so that you come back again.
25 So, again, we really appreciate you being

3 At this time, for our first
4 presentation, the Chair recognizes
5 Councilman Henon, who will present a
6 resolution recognizing my good friend and
7 spiritual advisor, Sister Mary Scullion,
8 as the Grand Marshal of the annual St.
9 Patrick's Day Parade. Would Sister Mary
10 Scullion and those accompanying her
11 please join the Councilman at the podium.

12 (Applause.)

13 (Councilmembers and guests
14 approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
16 joining Councilman Henon, we have
17 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman
18 Greenlee, and Councilman Johnson. And I
19 believe we also have Councilman Squilla.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Well, good
21 morning, everybody.

22 (Good morning.)

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Good
24 morning. That's right. Before we begin,
25 I would like to -- want to say a few

2 remarks. It is a special occasion as we
3 honor the Grand Marshal, but it's very
4 special this year, because a miracle is a
5 surprising and welcome event that is not
6 explicable by nature, natural or
7 scientific laws and is, therefore,
8 considered to be work of a divine agency.

9 If you listen to the interviews
10 conducted by Sister and with Sister,
11 along with Sister, you will periodically
12 hear her talk about miracles. She once
13 said that it was a miracle that she was
14 able to get people to believe in her at
15 the onset when no one knew anything about
16 her, her mission or Project HOME.

17 I've never argued or I've never
18 said no to a nun. Catholic school has
19 taught me well. But in this case, I
20 would say, Sister Mary, the miracle
21 wasn't that people believed in you. The
22 miracle is you. You are evidence of
23 God's power and presence in our lives and
24 his ability to work in us and through us,
25 from running organizations that have

2 served new immigrants, to preserving the
3 arts and culture of the Irish, the
4 incredible people standing along with me
5 here today and the parade's Ring of
6 Honor, the Board members of the St.
7 Patrick's Day Observance Committee, our
8 incredible dancers, the Celtic Flames.
9 They all represent the best of the
10 Philadelphia Irish community.

11 Everyone standing here is so
12 proud to honor and recognize Sister Mary
13 Scullion as Grand Marshal of the 2018 St.
14 Patrick's Day Parade. Sister is the
15 daughter of Irish immigrants. So proud
16 that we can call her one of our own, but
17 we are especially proud of her tireless
18 work to answer God's call to serving
19 Philadelphia's homeless by giving them
20 homes, housing opportunity for
21 unemployment, medical care, and
22 education.

23 We are here to thank and honor
24 Sister for her fearless and wicked
25 dedication, her compassion, and her

2 faith, and in doing so, we are thanking
3 God for giving us the miracle that Sister
4 Mary Scullion is and represents.

5 Sister, on behalf of my
6 colleagues on City Council, especially
7 Council President Clarke, on behalf of
8 the entire Irish community, the Ring of
9 Honor of the 2018 St. Patrick's Day
10 Parade Board, we thank you for being
11 here. Go raibh mile maith agat. May God
12 continue to bless you.

13 And with that, we are going to
14 start and recognize and honoring Sister
15 Mary Scullion, R.S.M. as the Grand
16 Marshal of the 248th annual St. Patrick's
17 Day Parade.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: This
19 resolution covers about as much as Sister
20 Mary's history that you can fit on a
21 resolution.

22 One thing that definitely won't
23 be in here is something I experienced
24 several years with her and are very fond
25 memories, bartending on St. Patrick's Day

2 at the Muldoon's Saloon. And we were
3 actually -- we would actually try to be
4 bartenders, and it didn't work real well,
5 but we had a great time.

6 And so whereas, Sister Mary
7 Scullion, R.S.M. is a Philadelphia-based
8 American Roman Catholic religious sister
9 and activist, named by "Time" as one of
10 the "100 Most Influential People in the
11 World" in 2009, alongside Michelle Obama
12 and Oprah Winfrey;

13 Whereas, Sister Mary Scullion's
14 commitment to the service of others began
15 with her education at Little Flower High
16 School -- Catholic High School for Girls,
17 a Jesuit education from St. Joseph's
18 University -- it's almost a Catholic
19 education, right? I went there -- and a
20 Master's in Social Work from Temple
21 University; and

22 Whereas, Scullion joined the
23 Sister of Mercy and began working on
24 behalf of the homeless in 1976. She has
25 been involved in service work and

2 advocacy for homeless and mentally ill
3 persons since 1978. Sister Mary was a
4 co-founder in 1985 of Women of Hope,
5 which provides permanent residences and
6 support services for homeless mentally
7 ill women; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

9 Whereas, in 1988 -- and I was here
10 working for Lucien Blackwell in those
11 days -- Sister Mary founded the Outreach
12 Coordination Center, the nation's first
13 program that coordinated city, private,
14 and public agencies to assist people
15 living on the streets with special needs
16 in finding housing and shelter in a more
17 systematic way. The following year, she
18 and her associate, Joan Dawson McConnon,
19 co-founded Project H.O.M.E., a nationally
20 recognized organization that provides
21 supportive housing, employment, education
22 and healthcare to enable chronically
23 homeless and low-income persons to break
24 the cycle of homelessness and poverty
25 under the motto "none of us are home

2 until all of us are home"; and

3 Whereas, Project H.O.M.E. has
4 grown from an emergency winter shelter to
5 802 units of affordable and supportive
6 housing for persons who have experienced
7 homelessness and low-income persons at
8 risk of homelessness in the City of
9 Philadelphia. There are an additional 30
10 units under construction, 42 units in
11 pre-development, and 170 units in the
12 pipeline. Project H.O.M.E.'s goal is to
13 complete 1,000 total units of affordable
14 housing in the near future; and

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
16 under Sister Mary's leadership, Project
17 H.O.M.E. established the Hub of Hope,
18 which for six winters has served as a
19 walk-in engagement center located in the
20 concourses of Suburban Station. Since
21 2012, the Hub has had over 36,000 visits
22 and facilitated 1,429 placements into
23 shelter, treatment programs, and housing
24 around the City. Now, through a
25 partnership between SEPTA, the City of

2 Philadelphia, and Project H.O.M.E., the
3 Hub of Hope has expanded into a permanent
4 location in Suburban Station to offer
5 year-round services; and

6 Whereas, Sister Mary Scullion
7 has been recognized locally and
8 nationally for her dedication to the
9 service of the less fortunate and has
10 received numerous awards and honorary
11 doctorates for her leadership including
12 the 1992 Philadelphia Award, a 2002
13 Eisenhower Fellowship, the 2002 Ford
14 Foundation's prestigious "Leadership for
15 a Changing World Award," and the 2011
16 Medal from The University of Notre Dame,
17 which is the highest award given to an
18 American Catholic; and

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
20 Sister Mary's dedication to Philadelphia
21 includes serving as a Trustee at St.
22 Joseph's University and a tenure on the
23 City of Philadelphia's Board of Ethics;
24 and

25 Whereas, Sister Mary Scullion's

2 unwavering devotion to service is rooted
3 in the guiding principles of the
4 Religious Sisters of Mercy, which was
5 founded in 1831 in Dublin, Ireland by
6 Catherine McAuley; and

7 Whereas, the theme of the 2018
8 St. Patrick's Day Parade is "St. Patrick,
9 Bless Those Who Respond to the Call of
10 the Needy"; and

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
12 joining Sister Mary Scullion as Grand
13 Marshal, the Ring of Honor members for
14 the 2018 St. Patrick's Day Parade include
15 Honorable Bobby Henon, Honorable Brian
16 O'Neill, Sister Kathleen Klarich, R.S.M.,
17 Eileen Conboy Barrilli, Siobhan Lyons,
18 Reverend James Callahan, Sean Trainor,
19 William Heeney Senior, Joseph Ashdale,
20 Wayne Miller, Monsignor Paul Kennedy,
21 Sister Maureen McGarrity, Tom Regan,
22 Clair McManus Fulginitti, Mike Roman,
23 Jack Gill, and Joseph Driscoll; and

24 Whereas, the 2018 Philadelphia
25 St. Patrick's Day Parade would not be

2 possible without the continued support
3 and dedication of the Mayo Association,
4 the Donegal Society, the Derry Society,
5 the Tyrone Society, the Cavan Society,
6 the Galway Society, the Irish Society,
7 the Second Street Irish Society, the
8 Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, the Irish
9 Memorial, the Behon Law Society, the
10 Irish Network of Philadelphia, the
11 Emerald Society, the Cairdeas Irish
12 Brigade, the St. Patrick's Day Observance
13 Association, and all the individual
14 chapters of the Ancient Order of
15 Hibernians and the Ladies Ancient Order
16 of Hibernians throughout Philadelphia and
17 Delaware Valley; now, therefore, be it
18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Resolved,
19 that the Council of the City of
20 Philadelphia, does hereby recognize and
21 honor Sister Mary Scullion, R.S.M. as
22 Grand Marshal of the 248th Annual St.
23 Patrick's Day Parade.
24 And it further be resolved,
25 that an engrossed copy of this resolution

2 be presented to Sister Mary, R.S.M. as
3 evidence of our sincere respect and
4 admiration of this legislative body.

5 Congratulations.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
8 at this time, the Chair recognizes Sister
9 Mary Scullion for remarks.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: First, I
11 want to recognize a little bit out of
12 order, before our Grand Marshal, is the
13 President of our St. Patrick's Day
14 Observance Committee and Parade
15 Committee, our own Bill Ivers.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. IVERS: After 46 years in
18 politics, I don't often get to this level
19 here, but I'm proud to be up here today.

20 I'd like to thank our
21 President, Darrell Clarke, and also Bobby
22 Henon, Councilman Henon, and Councilman
23 O'Neill for introducing this resolution
24 and all of Council for signing on.

25 Nearly 33 million Americans

2 with Irish ancestry had made tremendous
3 contributions to the betterment of our
4 country. For centuries, the tenuous
5 Irish spirit paired with American
6 self-reliance has helped Irish immigrants
7 and their descendents realize incredible
8 dreams.

9 With religious devotion,
10 strength through love of family and
11 confidence in promise of America, Irish
12 Americans have engaged the American
13 experience in robust and meaningful ways.
14 Their neighborhoods, schools, churches,
15 and workplaces had affirmed the
16 importance of faith, industry, and
17 learning.

18 It's therefore no wonder that
19 Americans' art, business, and public life
20 are marked by the Irish names and
21 symbols.

22 So in the spirit of St.
23 Patrick, I wish you all a blessed and
24 happy St. Patrick's Day. And also I'd
25 like to say to Sister Mary Scullion,

2 thank you for your mission here in
3 Philadelphia and around the country.

4 It's unbelievable what you have succeeded
5 in doing for the unfortunate people
6 around.

7 And I'd like to thank my Board
8 of Directors for a great parade last
9 Sunday. We had tremendous weather and
10 great crowds at our new location down at
11 Independence Hall.

12 Thank you, and happy St.
13 Patrick's Day.

14 (Applause.)

15 SISTER MARY: Thanks a lot,
16 Bill, and congratulations to the Ring of
17 Honor.

18 I really want to thank all of
19 City Council, especially my friend, who
20 is awesome, Council President Darrell
21 Clarke. Thank you. And also to Jannie
22 Blackwell and her late husband Lucien,
23 who were such great leaders when the
24 plight of the homeless -- we didn't have
25 as many friends as we do today. So thank

2 you so much, Councilwoman.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
4 you.

5 (Applause.)

6 SISTER MARY: I just want to
7 say that my mom and dad, especially my
8 mom, experienced really deep poverty when
9 she lived in Ireland, and my mom and dad
10 came here in pursuit of the American
11 dream. When they came, they didn't even
12 have a high school -- I mean a grade
13 school education. They didn't even
14 graduate from eighth grade. My mom
15 cleaned houses and my dad was a
16 bartender. I really never lived up to
17 his ability, but that's beside the point.
18 Okay?

19 But the thing I really think is
20 really important is, they came in search
21 of the American dream and they worked for
22 that American dream of equal opportunity
23 for all, and as long as we have people
24 living on our streets and as long as we
25 have immigrants who are unwelcome in our

2 country, that dream is still just that, a
3 dream, and we have a lot of work to do in
4 our society to make that dream a reality.

5 Vincent Harding said, is
6 America possible? And that question
7 still haunts us today in the society that
8 we live in today where there's greater
9 economic disparities and they're growing.

10 And so I'm deeply honored and
11 touched by this award, but it's only an
12 indication of so much more work that
13 needs to be done, and when we as Irish
14 coming from an Irish culture made gains
15 in this country, it's even more incumbent
16 upon us never to forget where we came
17 from and never to forget the struggles of
18 others, because we're one human family.

19 Thank you.

10 recognizes Councilman Green, Councilwoman
11 Bass, Councilwoman Gym, Councilwoman
12 Blondell Reynolds Brown, Councilman
13 Taubenberger, Councilwoman Parker, of
14 course Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman
15 Jones, Councilman Johnson.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Good
17 morning.

18 (Good morning.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: This
20 is a special pleasure for me. As you
21 know, I'm very proud to be Jannie from
22 Cheyney.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: I want
25 to thank Michael Coard for all of his

3 Bob Bogle, thank you for everything you
4 do and always have done. And I won't
5 mention anyone else at this point, but
6 thank you all for being here, and I want
7 to thank all my colleagues.

8 Resolution honoring and
9 recognizing Cheyney University on the
10 40th Anniversary of its 1978 NCAA
11 Division II Basketball Championship.

12 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
13 on March 18th, 1978, the Cheyney Wolves
14 made history by defeating the University
15 of Wisconsin-Green Bay in bringing home
16 the NCAA Division II Championship trophy;
17 and

18 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
19 Cheyney State College opened as the
20 Number Two team in the nation in the
21 first Division II poll that year, just
22 behind Green Bay, which held the Number
23 One spot the entire season, with its only
24 loss of the season being against Division
25 I DePaul University; and

2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
3 there were 32 teams in the Division II
4 Men's Basketball Tournament 40 years ago.
5 Cheyney defeated Adelphi University in
6 the regional semifinals, then went on to
7 vanquish Philadelphia College in the
8 regional final, which led them to beating
9 Sacred Heart University in the national
10 quarterfinals, and finally Florida
11 Institute of Technology in the national
12 semifinals; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
14 Cheyney championship team, led by
15 Naismith Hall of Fame Coach, John Chaney,
16 was comprised of John Butts, Duane
17 Coleman, All-American Milt Colston,
18 Tournament MVP Andrew Fields, Kenney
19 Hinson, Jeffrey Hutcherson, Roger
20 Leysath, Gerald Mills, Charles Murphy,
21 Gilbert Saunders, Arthur Stone, and John
22 Walter; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
24 winning the championship would not have
25 been possible without the dedication of

2 Coach John Chaney; and

3 Whereas, Cheyney University
4 honored its 1977-78 Division II National
5 Championship Men's Basketball Team on
6 February 17th, 2018 inside Cope Hall on

8 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

9 Whereas, March 18th, 2018 will be the
10 40th Anniversary of this momentous
11 occasion in the Cheyney University
12 history. We congratulate you and
13 celebrate wholeheartedly with you;

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Now,
15 therefore, be it resolved, that the
16 Council of the City of Philadelphia
17 hereby recognizes and honors Cheyney
18 University on the 40th Anniversary of
19 their 1978 NCAA Division II Basketball
20 Championship.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Further
22 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
23 resolution be presented to Coach John
24 Chaney and the 1978 Cheyney Men's
25 Basketball Team as a sincere expression

17 Black History Month, but we all know
18 black history is American history, and
19 this unique family, I think, crystallizes
20 the unique history of our country, the
21 fact that their lineage goes back to the
22 first mayor of this city. And just
23 having an opportunity to learn about that
24 history, about their role in Philadelphia
25 and Cheltenham is phenomenal. I thought

3 this unique family and their history and

5 So it gives me great honor to
6 present this resolution honoring the
7 Montier Family of Philadelphia and

11 Whereas, during the early
12 colonial period, prior to the
13 establishment of our nation, William Penn
14 received a large land grant from King
15 Charles II of England as a repayment of
16 his a debt owed his father; and

17 Whereas, in the course of
18 developing what would be known as
19 Pennsylvania, Penn required prospective
20 landowners to purchase parcels of land in
21 the wilderness as a precondition to
22 buying land in the City; and

23 Whereas, in 1682, a group of 15
24 Quakers pooled their resources to acquire
25 land from William Penn, and the

2 wilderness portion of their new land
3 became Cheltenham Township, one of the
4 nation's earliest suburbs; and

5 Whereas, one of these
6 landowners was Humphrey Morrey, who
7 controlled 250 acres in the western

9 appointed by Penn as Philadelphia's first
10 mayor in 1691;

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Wow.

12 Whereas, in spite of their
13 vital role in the formation of the white
14 abolitionist movement, some Quakers,
15 including Morrey, were slaveholders; and

16 Whereas, upon the death of
17 Humphrey Morrey bequeathed his human
18 property to his children and one enslaved
19 woman known as Cremona, or "Moonie," went
20 to the home of the youngest son Richard;
21 and

22 Whereas, Richard Morrey and
23 Cremona fell in love and married and had
24 five children - a rare example from that
25 time and place in history of consensual

2 relationships between a man of European
3 descent and a woman of African descent;

4 Whereas, after Richard died,
5 Cremona, who was left 198 acres of land
6 in his will, met and in 1766 married Jean
7 Montier, a black man of French Caribbean

9 Whereas, the Montiers,
10 including the children of Richard and
11 Cremona, built a homestead in Cheltenham
12 where they lived and made boots and
13 shoes, and established a shop in
14 Philadelphia which went on to prosper and
15 bring them considerable wealth; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
17 Whereas, the descendants of Richard and
18 Cremona have played crucial roles in the
19 history of our nation, like serving in
20 the Union Army during the Civil War, and
21 in the sustaining of the local black
22 community, including establishing and
23 supporting churches, burial grounds and
24 mutual aid societies; and

25 Whereas, in 1841, Hiram and

2 Elizabeth Montier commissioned a pair of
3 sitting self portraits in oil, an option
4 which at the time was only available to
5 families with wealth, very few of whom
6 were African American descent; and

7 Whereas, those rare and unique

10 and were privately held until one
11 descendant, Williams Pickens III,
12 inspired by the historic election of the
13 first black President of the United
14 States, lent them to the Philadelphia
15 Museum of Art for public display; and

16 Whereas, the history of the
17 Montiers, dating back more than three
18 centuries, including the portraits of
19 Hiram and Elizabeth, the home in
20 Cheltenham, and a trove of documents, has
21 been the subject of several articles and
22 documentaries, including a new half-hour
23 documentary produced by WHY?; and

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
25 story of the Montiers reminds us that

3 not for the efforts of a broad and
4 diverse group of individuals, all of whom

10 Philadelphia and Cheltenham and recognize
11 their historical significance and
12 contributions to our region.

13 Further resolved, that an
14 engrossed copy of this resolution be
15 presented to William Pickens III and
16 other descendents of the Montiers, as
17 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
18 this legislative body.

19 Congratulations.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. PICKENS: Well, thank you
22 very much. On behalf of my family -- and
23 they're all behind me. We have some in
24 front of me as well -- we thank the City
25 Council and this wonderful city, the

17 orchestrate and organize this family
18 reunion. We have been around I say for
19 348 years. We'll be around another 348
20 years, guaranteed.

21 We love this country and helped
22 make it what it is today, and I think
23 that Philadelphia is the right place for
24 us to celebrate and commemorate. And so
25 I bless you all. God bless our family

3 All Act of 2017, and affirming universal
4 access to health care as a human right.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
6 that will be on next week's Calendar.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Taubenberger.

9 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Good
10 morning, Council President. I have no
11 bills or resolutions today.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 O'Neill.

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

16 of bills and resolutions, and the next
17 order of business is reports from
18 committee.

19 And the Chair recognizes
20 Councilwoman Parker for a report from the
21 Committee of Labor and Civil Service.

22 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. The Committee on
24 Labor and Civil Service reports one bill
25 with a favorable recommendation.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you.

4 Mr. Decker, please read the

6 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
7 and members of the Council of the City of

21 The Chair now recognizes
22 Councilman Johnson for a report from the
23 Committee of Transportation and Public
24 Utilities.

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

18 northeastwardly therefrom, striking from
19 the City Plan and vacating Ditman Street
20 from a point southwest of Tolbut Street
21 to its terminus further southwestwardly
22 therefrom, and striking from the City
23 Plan and abandoning a certain drainage
24 right-of-way which extends between the

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 ayes have it, and that bill will be on

10 of the rules have been deemed to have had
11 a first reading and they will be placed

14 As there are no additional

16 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
17 purpose of calling up bills and
18 resolutions that are on the Final Passage
19 Calendar today.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
21 Council President. There are bills and
22 resolutions that are being called up, if
23 I could just get to the right page. My
24 apology.

25 And I do want to thank you for

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 Before considering the
12 resolutions and bills on the Final
13 Passage Calendar today, if you haven't
14 already done so, I'd ask that you sign up
15 at the table to my left.

16 When your name is called, you
17 will go to the podium in the middle of
18 the Council Chambers. There's a device.
19 When the light turns green on that
20 device, it will be your time to speak.
21 When the light turns yellow, you will
22 have 30 seconds to conclude your remarks.
23 When the light turns red, we would ask
24 that you respectfully adhere to our
25 guidelines and conclude your remarks.

2 Mr. Decker, would you please
3 call the first witness.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
5 commenting on 180228, 180225, and 180220.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 morning.

9 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.

10 This is an official decree of the people
11 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
12 such, requires immediate action and
13 remedy.

14 Every week Council, Mayor, and
15 others transfer private property to the
16 government, probably illegally.

17 A few days ago, Congressman
18 Brady and Council President announced a
19 private bill to be held -- to help an
20 undocumented person. Meanwhile, real
21 constituents are being made homeless and
22 being removed from their neighborhoods
23 while their elected representatives
24 refuse their sworn duty to meet with
25 them.

2 A constituent is defined as a
3 voting member of a community. Elected
4 representatives are required to help
5 constituents. In 2016, an outsider was
6 elected. The sovereign people sent a
7 clear message to the elected monarchy
8 that violating the people is not allowed,
9 that violating oath, law, and
10 constitutions will be prosecuted.

11 Laws are like Bibles. Unless
12 they are followed, nothing changes. As
13 public servants, you cannot violate oath,
14 Constitution, and law without penalty.

15 How can agents and agencies
16 steal my home without compensation, due
17 process, Seventh Amendment trial by jury?
18 How could government pay a contractor
19 upwards of 100 million, mostly federal
20 taxpayer HUD money, to build a mall on my
21 stolen home? Why has no official
22 demanded the Attorney General investigate
23 and prosecute, as required by law?

24 The constitutions require
25 immediate remedy of this breach of law,

2 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
3 duty. Your oath of office requires you
4 to act or face prison.

5 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
6 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
7 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
8 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
9 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in
10 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
11 violated.

12 I call for the federal and
13 Commonwealth governments to perform their
14 constitutional obligations to investigate
15 and prosecute all involved in the theft
16 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
17 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

18 The denial of God-given 42 USC
19 1982 property rights for 24 years is
20 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
21 and requires immediate remedy.

22 A just government must obey the
23 rule of law. This color of law
24 government must have its Charter to
25 govern revoked until a constitutionally

2 compliant government is installed.

3 Public servants cannot refuse
4 their sworn duty to act any more than a
5 fireman can refuse to fight a fire.

6 The sovereign people require
7 the oath, Constitution, and laws be
8 enforced, and jail is required for all
9 who violate oath, Constitution or law.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 MR. DANIHEL: I remind Council,
13 it takes a lot of cooperation to create
14 and allow monumental corruption.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Debbie Rhoe,
18 commenting on 170408 and 180220.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MR. RHOE: Hello, everyone.
23 I'm going to speak on 180220, resolution
24 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
25 Property to execute and deliver to the

2 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
3 without consideration, deeds conveying
4 conditional fee simple title to certain
5 City-owned lots and pieces of ground with
6 buildings and improvements thereon,

8 City of Philadelphia, pursuant to Chapter
9 16-400 of The Philadelphia Code and
10 authorizing the Philadelphia
11 Redevelopment Authority to dispose of
12 such properties for rehabilitation and/or
13 improvements in accordance with the terms
14 of Chapter 16-400 of The Philadelphia
15 Code.

16 I'm very familiar with this.
17 This was a beautification type contract
18 or agreement that Mayor -- can't think of
19 his name right now, but anyway, my
20 property, I had property like that. I
21 was very involved in beautifying my
22 community and I had did everything I was
23 supposed to in accordance with Chapter
24 16-400 and my properties were not
25 conveyed to me through the Redevelopment

2 Authority. President Council Clarke put
3 a stop to that, and I was fighting for my
4 property for ten years, and until I got
5 lawyers involved, they were not conveyed.
6 Eventually they were conveyed, and still
7 my contractual agreement was not honored.
8 It was supposed to be given to me for
9 nominal fee. I wind up paying outrageous
10 settlement costs, thousands of dollars,
11 to get my properties, and I'm just not in
12 agreement with this at all because, you
13 know, after paying thousands of dollars
14 when it was supposed to be nominal fee, I
15 wind up having another burden placed on
16 me ten more years before I could actually
17 sell or do anything I wanted with it
18 without the City of Philadelphia,
19 President Clarke getting a piece of that
20 money, which I think is outrageous,
21 especially as a constituent who wanted to
22 beautify my community.

23 Not only that, it's like high
24 taxes now. I'm paying 1,000 percent more
25 than what I was paying, which was \$125 a

2 year for a property. Now I'm paying
3 \$1,125 a year, which wants to really put
4 me out of my community.

5 And I'm not in agreement with
6 whatever he's in cahoots with with Temple
7 University as far as special interest
8 groups, you know, gentrification. It's
9 just horrible.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
11 Rhoe.

12 MR. RHOE: And I am not in
13 agreement with this.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. Thank you, Ms. Rhoe.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Rochelle Bilal,
17 commenting on 160248.

18 (Ms. Rhoe talking without
19 microphone.)

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MS. BILAL: Good morning,
22 Councilman Clarke. Good morning,
23 Councilpeople, here this morning. I'm
24 finding out that this bill is being held,
25 Bill No. 160248. As I constantly read

2 over everything in reference to this
3 exclusion of use and occupancy tax, I
4 caution you in reference to the
5 organizations in this city that have
6 property in the City that don't get a
7 break from any taxes in this city, that
8 taxes have increased over the years in

10 top of abatement, you want to give an
11 occupancy exclusion. Until you look at
12 those that are struggling to maintain
13 they properties in the City, you
14 shouldn't give anybody an exclusion from
15 occupancy tax. Those that's here that
16 been paying taxes, to say somebody coming
17 here saying you don't have to pay the
18 occupancy tax that most of us are
19 struggling to pay, along with the
20 assessment that keeps constantly going up
21 and your taxes going up, and now
22 everybody else gets an exclusion. I'm
23 asking you to relook at that bill,
24 160248.

25 On the other hand, we are

2 constantly saying -- I'm a part of the No
3 Stadium, No Deal Coalition. No Stadium,
4 No Deal Coalition. We hear what you
5 saying, but until Temple say it, we going

8 your Councilpeople has a letter. This is
9 your letter, Councilman Clarke. It's
10 officially from the No Stadium, No Deal
11 Coalition.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 MS. BILAL: That is not just
15 the Stompers. It's a coalition of us are
16 saying this. So until they say no, we
17 going to keep saying no stadium, no deal.
18 No stadium, no deal.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Ms. Bilal.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Patrick Duff,
24 commenting on 170967.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2 MR. DUFF: Good afternoon,
3 Council.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 afternoon.

6 MR. DUFF: I come to you --
7 it's actually National Sunshine Week this
8 week. Sunshine Week is the Sunshine Laws
9 that create open public --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Mr. Duff, are you going to talk about the
12 public Educational Supplement?

13 MR. DUFF: Actually --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 That's what you signed up for.

16 MR. DUFF: That's the
17 interesting part. That's why I'm here.
18 Both of the other speakers were cut off
19 basically at the end, which is fine.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.
21 We will --

22 MR. DUFF: You guys don't
23 provide --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
25 need you to talk about what you signed up

3 MR. DUFF: Well, I'm glad
4 you're doing this, because it's going to
5 give me the right to sue you for cutting
6 me off.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 MR. DUFF: Because you don't
10 have an open --

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
12 asking for you to please testify --

13 MR. DUFF: You don't have an
14 open public comment section in your city
15 like every other city in this state.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Mr. Duff.

18 MR. DUFF: And it's --

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Mr.
20 Duff, can you please -- you're supposed
21 to talk about what you signed up for.

22 MR. DUFF: Okay. Well, let me
23 say I support your bill. Can I speak
24 now? I support your bill.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: What

2 bill? You signed up for the public
3 education --

4 MR. DUFF: Do I have the right
5 to speak now as a citizen, a taxpayer?

9 (Mr. Duff talking without
10 microphone.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do
12 you want to call the next witness.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Barry Thompson.

14 MR. DUFF: Thank you. Thank
15 you very much.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Barry Thompson --

17 MR. DUFF: Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 You're welcome.

20 CHIEF CLERK: -- commenting on
21 170854.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. THOMPSON: Good afternoon,
24 City Council.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

2 afternoon.

3 MR. THOMPSON: Good afternoon,
4 City Council President. My name is Barry
5 Thompson. I am the Vice President of the
6 Philadelphia Tenants Union. I support
7 Bill No. 170854. We go throughout the
8 City getting the support of the
9 community. We also have the support of
10 the Philadelphia Mayor's Task Force,
11 Eviction Task Force, supporting this
12 bill.

13 The problem that we are having
14 now today is, we're being refused to meet
15 with certain City Councilmen in certain
16 districts about supporting this bill. We
17 asked a long time ago to sit down with
18 you concerning a good cause -- at the
19 time, we was called the Philadelphia
20 Tenants Union and it was called Just
21 Cause Eviction Bill at the time. You
22 told us that you wanted no part of the
23 Philadelphia --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Is
25 this the Councilman Jones --

1 3/15/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. THOMPSON: Yes. This is
3 the same bill Councilman Jones presented.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Okay.

6 MR. THOMPSON: We, the
7 Philadelphia Tenants Union, asked to sit
8 down with you over a year and a half ago
9 concerning the Philadelphia Tenants Union
10 and the bill that we was fighting for.
11 At that time, it was called Just Cause
12 Eviction. The City determined to make it
13 the Good Cause Eviction. The whole
14 purpose is making it the cause that we
15 all want to stand together on one ground.

16 We want to ask City
17 Councilmember and other Councilmembers to
18 come together and support this bill.
19 This bill, Good Cause Eviction, will also
20 help with the eviction crisis in the City
21 of Philadelphia, and we ask the City
22 Council to stand behind us and help us
23 get this bill passed.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you, sir. Thank you for your

2 testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Jarrett Smith,
4 commenting on 170854.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MR. SMITH: Hi there. My name
7 is Jarrett Smith. I'm the Campaign
8 Director for the Philadelphia Tenants
9 Union.

10 I urge City Councilmembers to
11 consider this bill very strongly.
12 Philadelphia has an eviction crisis. I'm
13 an organizer by trade and I'm an
14 organizer in the community, and it's very
15 easy to say Philadelphia has an eviction
16 crisis and look at the data and look at
17 one-fifth of housing being gone by the
18 numbers, but to go down and having
19 organized in buildings like the Penn
20 Wynn, speaking with teachers, with
21 elderly people, with generations of
22 families and telling them that there is
23 nothing the City can do for them, they're
24 going to be homeless in several months.

25 It's a lot easier to deny a

2 meeting with your constituents. It's a
3 lot easier to pass the resolutions to
4 support more development in the City, but
5 let me tell you, it's very, very hard to
6 look people in the face and tell them
7 that there is nothing that we can do.

8 What the Philadelphia Tenants
9 Union has done is organized tenants
10 throughout the City and constituent
11 organizations to fight for a bill that
12 will put a preventative measure for
13 homelessness in this city. So far we've
14 collected the support of Community Legal
15 Services, the Tenant Union Representative
16 Network, Stadium Stompers, Philadelphia
17 SA, Witnesses to Hunger, Fair Housing
18 Rights Center, Philly DSA, Liberty
19 Resources, Help, MLP, Unite Here, Fifth
20 Square, Temple University Graduate
21 Student Union, and Mount Olive Tabernacle
22 Baptist Church.

23 We've covered all types of
24 people in this City, and everyone working
25 in housing in the City agrees that good

2 cause is a measure that we should be
3 taking. No, it is not rent control, and
4 as a former real estate agent in New York
5 City, having sold some very expensive
6 real estate, I can tell you this will not
7 adversely affect development in the City.

9 of the balance and power for your
10 constituents, for tenants in this city
11 when they go before a court of law.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
19 Council President. I would like to be
20 excused, but I would also like to be
21 voting aye on all bills and resolutions.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman. The record shall
24 reflect your vote. Thank you.

25 Mr. Decker.

7 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes. I'd like
8 to give honor to God, and I want to say
9 good morning to everyone or good
10 afternoon. My name is Jacqueline
11 Williams. I live at 1609 North 18th
12 Street. I was born and raised on that
13 block. My mother had a beauty shop
14 there. My mother invested in other
15 businesses in the area. I'm a block
16 captain. I'm running for committee
17 person.

18 DDL, some type of funding,
19 supposed to have purchased my house.
20 They threatened me. They've taken my
21 bedroom set, living room set, freezer out
22 of my house, my furs, other things.
23 They're trying to force me to leave.
24 They came back again and asked me to
25 leave.

25 community. I try to keep clean. I sweep

18 Speeches on the part of the
19 majority?

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Jones.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. Growing up in West
24 Philadelphia, we had a tradition of
25 busting someone's chops, and it was

2 abbreviated down to busting. It's
3 probably the same throughout other parts
4 of the City. You had to be able to take
5 it and you had to be able to give it.
6 You couldn't take it too personal because
7 you would protest too much and people
8 would think it must be true.

9 But I feel compelled today to
10 recognize the fact that the other day the
11 Health and Human Services Committee held
12 a hearing on opioids. There was a
13 subsequent article written where some
14 unflattering things were said by one of
15 the reporters. In one case he said that
16 some of our questions were not well
17 thought out and somewhat juvenile and
18 things like that. And in my case, said
19 that I was more concerned about the
20 Hamburglar at McDonald's than people who
21 had addiction. And I thought it was kind
22 of funny, but in the tradition of
23 busting, I wanted to say that I attended
24 a funeral of a young man, Nasser Fattah,
25 son of Sister Falaka Fattah, who died of

2 opioids, and that wasn't in that article.
3 That experience of seeing or hearing that
4 someone had been in their room for two
5 days until someone found them wasn't
6 quite really funny.

7 I'll go on to say that we as
8 Councilpeople aren't experts on
9 everything, so we ask some questions, but
10 really if you think about, it's for four
11 audiences. It's, one, for the people who
12 are on TV who don't know all of the
13 acronyms and shortcut answers to things.
14 So you almost have to ask the question so
15 that people who don't have advanced
16 degrees in recovery can follow and get
17 along, because they are the taxpayers and
18 pay the bills.

19 And then you have to go to the
20 audience of the particular departments
21 that you have to deal with and try to
22 coax them to the place that actually
23 gives you a real answer, because unlike
24 elected officials who on some occasions
25 are politicians, they can be crafty

2 pretty much to it. If you don't box them
3 in to ask the exact question that you
4 want answered, they will skirt around the
5 issue.

6 I want to further say that the
7 press is an important part of that too,
8 because they highlight those things that
9 might be important to all stakeholders,
10 including elected officials, including
11 the public, and we appreciate their
12 observation. But what we need to
13 understand is that we're doing this thing
14 in a methodical way to build a record on
15 the record so that when we come back in
16 the budget process, we can refer to
17 former questions and answers.

18 I made reference in particular
19 to the fact that there were two
20 McDonald's, and I personally know these
21 individuals for the last 20 years. Ken
22 Youngblood, who has a store on Ogontz
23 Avenue and one on Frankford, after 20
24 years is closing his Frankford Avenue
25 store because he cannot manage some of

2 the clients that come from some of the
3 recovery places, because his staff, who
4 he has to really coax at a \$15 or less an
5 hour to come and deal with that, get
6 sodas thrown in their face, they get spit
7 on, they get cursed out and threatened
8 "don't come out the store after your
9 shift" kind of thing. And I don't know
10 where everybody else lives, but I go to
11 the McDonald's at 52nd and Jefferson
12 where on Sunday when ladies with the big
13 hats are coming from church are afraid to
14 go in there because the climate is such
15 that they're uncomfortable.

16 Now, don't get it twisted.
17 When they tried to close Parkside
18 recovery, that community tried to close
19 it, I stood up for them and I will
20 continue to stand up for them, because
21 recovery is an important part of our
22 city. There are people who need that
23 help. But I also have to balance -- and
24 I'm going to use the word "balance" -- as
25 an elected official that small businesses

2 that create jobs and pay taxes are
3 important too.

4 So now they need to Google the
5 fact that the Hamburglar hasn't been the
6 representative for McDonald's for quite
7 some many years, but that being said, I
8 want you to know that all sides matter,
9 the perspective of the popular soup of
10 the day with whatever that cause is, but
11 people who are impacted with unintended
12 consequences need to be heard too. And
13 as an elected official, not a politician,
14 because I'm only a politician when I'm
15 running, I'm going to serve each of those
16 constituents, whether they ever vote for
17 me or not, because that's what I swore to
18 do. And I applaud my colleagues who ran
19 that hearing and who asked the tough
20 questions. Even if some of the advanced
21 students in the grad student section
22 already knew what was going on, the
23 public didn't, and they deserve to hear
24 answers too.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 The Chair recognizes

5 Councilwoman Parker.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

7 you, Mr. President. Speaking of

8 unintended consequences, I want to take

9 this opportunity to thank my colleagues

10 who are members of City Council's

11 Committee on Labor and Service for

12 attending yesterday's hearing regarding

13 the impact of medical marijuana on

14 employment in Philadelphia. That would

15 be Vice Chairman Councilman O'Neill,

16 members Henon, Quinones-Sanchez,

17 Taubenberger, Domb, and Gym.

18 Mr. President, while we heard

19 some insightful testimony from the

20 business community, the legal community,

21 the medical community, the labor

22 community, and our District Attorney's

23 Office, along with other City officials,

24 it is clear that there is a host of

25 potential unintended consequences that

2 this legislation could have on not only
3 employers in the City of Philadelphia but
4 employees.

5 Just for the record,
6 Mr. Speaker -- I'm getting rid of it, and
7 that's only because you told me we're
8 going, Mr. President. Just the
9 thought -- and this is just from
10 information and data that we gathered
11 yesterday -- that someone might not be
12 eligible to be a caregiver -- we had no
13 idea this was an issue -- for their loved
14 one because of a previous conviction is
15 troubling.

16 The notion that a medical
17 marijuana patient could be fired from
18 their job for failing a drug test is
19 equally disturbing.

20 In addition to that -- and this
21 comes to mind because of a recent visit
22 to CHOP's Policy Center, its Policy
23 Lab -- that the notion that someone is
24 suffering from PTSD -- now, I know when
25 we think of post-traumatic stress

2 disorder, many of us just think military,
3 but now because gun violence and violence
4 overall is also beginning to be treated
5 as a public health crisis, we are
6 learning that our children and families
7 and people who have been victims of
8 sexual assault also suffer from what is
9 diagnosed as PTSD. So that someone
10 suffering from PTSD or cancer or one of
11 the other conditions, the chronic
12 conditions that were listed, could lose
13 their job because they are a medical
14 marijuana patient, that was devastating.

15 In addition to that, we learned
16 that -- let's just think about a
17 50-year-old who is a successful business
18 person, who has led an exemplary life for
19 decades, that they automatically become
20 disqualified from working in the medical
21 marijuana industry because he or she
22 attended a concert 30 years earlier and
23 smoked a joint is shortsighted.

24 In addition to that,
25 Mr. President, I want to note for the

2 record that I'm glad that our hearing
3 highlighted some of those concerns and
4 brought them to public light.

5 I also want to note for the
6 record that one of the things we talked
7 about doing, and we've already begun to
8 put things in motion, was to get the
9 private sector to work with us so that we
10 can begin to develop a public education
11 campaign for both employees and employers
12 so they not only know their rights, but
13 they know the risk, Mr. President,
14 because the information is -- knowing the
15 information and having it is half the
16 battle, and we're going to work to make
17 this happen.

18 But it is also our hope and we
19 were very encouraged by the olive
20 branches we received from the private
21 sector in noting that they understood our
22 interest in seeing them, not government
23 but the private sector, help to drive the
24 process and lead and hopefully come up
25 with a set of guidelines for employees

2 who are in the private sector.

3 Now, relative to our own 27,000
4 municipal employees, we will be working,
5 Mr. President, with our executive office,
6 along with our Council team, our Council
7 staffs, and our unions representing
8 municipal workers and we will be working
9 on coming up with a rubric and a
10 legislative prescription, if necessary
11 and applicable, to ensure that the City
12 of Philadelphia is a model employer and
13 that we do everything we can to protect
14 municipal employees who would also happen
15 to be medical marijuana patients.

16 Finally, I want to just note
17 for the record that, Councilman O'Neill,
18 I agree wholeheartedly with your
19 sentiments and just want to note for the
20 record that we will submit via a formal
21 letter and documentation to the Governor,
22 along with the legislative leadership in
23 Harrisburg, as the state is crafting its
24 regulations on this still evolving
25 subject, and we will count on all of

2 members of Council to help us as we move
3 forward in that effort, as I am often
4 reminded of our action taken when we were
5 working on, from a land use perspective,
6 on the implementation of medical
7 marijuana here in the City of
8 Philadelphia, and we want to make sure
9 that we just get these details right, so
10 even whatever action we move forward
11 with, districts and people across the
12 City don't get negatively impacted by any
13 unintended consequences.

14 Thank you for your patience,
15 Mr. President. And I also want to say --
16 and many of you may know this lady on
17 another issue. I want to send a special
18 prayer to my good friend and former
19 member of the Pennsylvania General
20 Assembly and, that is, Mike Gerber, who
21 is an attorney and business person here
22 in the City, but while we were here, I
23 received a text message saying that Penny
24 Gerber passed away.

25 Now, while the Gerber family

2 was very active in Montgomery County,
3 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, when you
4 think about trailblazers like our Augusta
5 Clark and Marian Tasco, women like
6 Colleen Alexander and Penny Gerber were
7 laying the foundation in the suburbs so
8 that women could have a seat at the
9 table, Councilwoman Blackwell, relative
10 to politics.

11 And so a friend of mine just
12 sent me this message saying that Penny
13 Gerber was a special lady. She was tough
14 and graceful, forceful and warm, and she
15 never backed down. She was one of the
16 first women to go through Chase's banking
17 program in the 1960s when there were no
18 women on Wall Street. She was the CEO of
19 a Teamsters unionized transportation
20 company and, in her final years, was
21 totally engaged in politics.

22 And, Mr. President, if you know
23 Montgomery County politics, sometimes she
24 as the vice chair appeared to wield more
25 influence than even the male chairman.

2 So special prayers sent to Mike
3 Gerber and all of his family, and we will
4 continue to remember the legacy of
5 Ms. Penny Gerber.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilwoman.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. Today I introduced
13 legislation designed to yield additional
14 revenue for the School District of
15 Philadelphia given its anticipated
16 projected \$900 million deficit. I might
17 add a footnote that this is actually an
18 amended version of a bill I introduced in
19 2012 with the partnership of
20 Representative Vanessa Lowery Brown, and
21 for a host of reasons, the timing was not
22 right.

23 As legislators responsible for
24 ensuring taxpayer dollars and City
25 resources are spent wisely, I am of the

2 belief that we need to exhaust all
3 available alternatives before asking
4 taxpayers to give up more of their
5 hard-earned dollars. This time I believe
6 the time is ripe, R-I-P-E, to reconsider
7 extended hours for restaurants and bars
8 as a vehicle for additional revenue for
9 our city.

10 And I would be remiss not to
11 say thank you to State Representative
12 Jordan Harris, as we've been working in a
13 collaborative way over the past many
14 weeks, because Harrisburg would have to
15 allow the City of Philadelphia to explore
16 this opportunity.

17 Let the record reflect that
18 Representative Harris has been a real
19 leader on this issue in Harrisburg, as he
20 actually introduced a similar version in
21 2016.

22 Let this legislation be the
23 conversation starter on creative,
24 non-traditional, some might argue
25 unorthodox ways that we should pursue to

2 raise additional needed revenues for our
3 school.

4 I know that this program will
5 require close coordination and open
6 communication with neighborhood groups,
7 District Councilmembers who will have a
8 lot of say as we go forward, the business
9 community, the hospitality community, and
10 the Philadelphia Police Department. I
11 look forward to what I will know will be
12 a robust conversation, but also
13 ultimately a friendly debate.

14 Thank you, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman.

17 The Chair recognizes

18 Councilwoman Bass.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
20 Mr. President. So just a couple of
21 things I wanted to mention. And the
22 first, I wanted to echo and really lift
23 up my colleagues who were at the hearing
24 on Monday around substance abuse and
25 opioid addiction, and in attendance were

2 Councilmen Greenlee, Henon, Taubenberger,
3 Jones, Gym, Squilla, and Sanchez, and of
4 course it was Councilwoman Sanchez's
5 resolution which brought us here to have
6 this very important conversation. But
7 this was something that to suggest that
8 the members of Council were less than
9 interested or somehow had not done their
10 homework or were unfamiliar with this
11 very important issue is just flat-out
12 wrong.

13 The idea behind Council and
14 hearings in particular is to bring items
15 to the forefront and to have transparency
16 around issues when we ask questions. And
17 so we were never able to get off of the
18 first panel because there were so many
19 questions for the Administration in terms
20 of how tax dollars are spent, what are we
21 doing as a city to combat this issue.
22 And so we can't move beyond having that
23 conversation with the Administration
24 until it's properly flushed out.

25 And so I just really wanted to,

2 number one, thank all of my colleagues
3 and really all members of Council for
4 being supportive of us as we try to deal
5 with a very, very, very difficult issue.

6 The second thing I wanted to
7 mention is that today I introduced a
8 resolution around continuing a
9 conversation around the Department of
10 Human Services' relationship with
11 Community Umbrella Agencies, also known
12 as CUAs, which are contractually
13 obligated to provide services to
14 Philadelphia's most vulnerable children
15 and families in their care.

16 On February 7th, the Committee
17 of Public Health and Human Services held
18 an extensive hearing around the CUA Score
19 Card. And while that conversation is
20 ongoing, this is a part of that issue
21 that also needs to be flushed out when
22 you think about the possibility of
23 discrimination against the LGBTQ
24 community.

25 The possibility that we as

2 taxpayers could be funding agencies with
3 an anti-LGBTQ policy is absolutely
4 unacceptable. We as a city have
5 extensively talked about ways to be more
6 inclusive, affirm and support all people
7 of every background. We've investigated
8 and we've legislated. The City has in
9 place laws that prohibit discrimination,
10 so how could this be happening? The
11 City's Fair Practices Ordinance is clear,
12 but is possibly being violated.

13 And so we really look forward
14 to getting that information out and on
15 the record as the first in several steps
16 that we need to do to fix that particular
17 issue, and looking forward to having that
18 conversation.

19 And last, but not least, I just
20 wanted to invite everyone over to the
21 Wawa Welcome America Council briefing
22 immediately after session. I'm very
23 excited to welcome the leadership of Wawa
24 Welcome America to City Council, and as
25 the Chair of the Committee on Parks,

2 Recreation and Cultural Affairs, I can
3 say that they brought an unprecedented
4 level of energy, vibrancy, and vision to
5 one of the nation's biggest free events.
6 In addition to showcasing civic pride,
7 the staff will continue to embrace
8 diversity and inclusiveness as a key
9 focus of the festival's programming and
10 outreach.

11 So we certainly hope folks
12 could come over after session and hear
13 the briefing and also enjoy the free
14 lunch.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. I wanted to say
22 thank you to Councilwoman Bass and to the
23 Committee on Monday. Having eight
24 panels, they broke at Panel 1 so that we
25 could have our Education hearing. We'd

2 still be waiting had they not been kind
3 enough to do so. So that was such an
4 important issue, and it was so kind of
5 them to do that. They didn't have to.
6 When you're running a hearing, certainly
7 you are in charge.

8 So I wanted to say thank you.
9 Thank you to her and thank you to the
10 Committee.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilwoman.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
14 you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

17 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
18 Council President. Just two quick items.
19 Sunday morning I actually flew to Austin,
20 Texas to go to South by Southwest and
21 support our Philadelphia tech community,
22 came back Monday night. And Philadelphia
23 for the first time had its own Amplify
24 Philly House there with over 50 to 100
25 tech people from Philadelphia, and we had

2 people coming to this house from almost
3 every mayor city across the United
4 States, whether it was Seattle,
5 Washington. It was unbelievable how
6 interesting and important it is for
7 Philadelphia. And they were like really
8 into the sessions. We had 11 different
9 sessions, including a tech session on
10 diversity, and Todd Carmichael from La
11 Colombe was there speaking about his
12 company. But it was phenomenal for the
13 City to see that happen. We have this
14 great spot in Austin. Fortunately none
15 of us got hurt from those terrible things
16 that happened there, but it was a great
17 event for Philadelphia, and people were
18 coming in there from Washington saying,
19 hey, this is better than the DC House.
20 So it was really good for our city.

21 And the second thing, which I
22 have to talk about today because we're
23 four weeks away from the deadline of
24 April 17th, is the Earned Income Tax
25 Credit. And we're still not getting the

1 3/15/18 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 right money into our city. It's still
3 \$100 million. There's still 40,000
4 people not getting the money. And the
5 more we talk about it, hopefully the more
6 people will get it.

7 Just to go over specifics, a
8 single parent with two children who makes
9 45,000 or less, a couple who makes 50,000
10 with two children can get a check from
11 the federal government up to \$5,616 and
12 file back three additional years. So you
13 can get almost close to four years, which
14 is almost \$22,000 or \$23,000. It's a lot
15 money. And if you have more children
16 under the age of 18, the checks are even
17 bigger.

18 Last year I donated space at
19 the North American Building at Broad and
20 Sansom, and it was open for four months.
21 We actually -- the finals, we gave out
22 over \$4 and a half million of refunds to
23 4,100 people. This year for those people
24 listening, we have a location at 15th and
25 Walnut. I've donated the old LA

2 Fitness/Bally's space, the Drexel
3 Building. It's 24,000 feet. Campaign
4 for Working Families, United Way, and the
5 Department of Revenue all involved. And
6 so if people are looking for these
7 refunds, they'll fill out the tax returns
8 for free. It's at 15th and Walnut.
9 There's about 18 or 19 other sites that
10 Campaign for Working Families maintains,
11 and we need to get the money back to the
12 people to the City.

13 This money comes out of our
14 federal withholding tax. When that
15 hundred million doesn't come back into
16 our city, it's not fair to those 40,000
17 people. It's almost like a transfer of
18 wealth out of Philadelphia by it not
19 coming back.

20 So thank you, and want to make
21 sure as many people apply as possible.
22 Thanks.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
25 your persistence on that very important

2 issue.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Jones.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. Very
6 quick, Mr. President. I know everybody
7 noticed, but Bill Foster is not here
8 today. I asked permission if I could say
9 this. He is undergoing heart surgery as
10 we speak. And if you've never seen any
11 of his photos, he has a Facebook, Bill
12 Foster on Facebook, and he captures those
13 moments both in Council and throughout
14 the City that memorialize what we as a
15 city, as a family are going through. And
16 I just thought if people who are
17 listening or people in this Chamber could
18 go on his Facebook and wish him well so
19 that when he wakes up to that, it's
20 encouragement for him to get his butt
21 back to work and stop loafing. All
22 right?

23 Thank you, Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilman.

1 3/15/18 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT

2 That concludes the speeches
3 today. And with that, the Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown
5 for a motion to adjourn.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
