2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 hour has come. We've established a
7 quorum. If the visitors and guests will
8 retire behind the rail, we can get
9 started.

10 To give our invocation this
11 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor Joe
12 White of Grace Baptist Church. He is
13 here today as the guest of Councilman
14 Squilla.

15 I would ask all members,
16 guests, and visitors to please.

17 (Councilmembers, guests, and
18 visitors rise.)

19 PASTOR WHITE: Council
20 President, it's a privilege and honor to
21 be here. I wish to thank you all for
22 your service, and it is with humble heart
23 we ask for wisdom as we open this
24 session.

25 Shall we pray.

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2 Father God, we thank you so
3 much for your presence in our lives, in
4 our city. We thank you for your evident
5 blessings on our city through its rich
6 history. Lord, your provident help,
7 Lord, as we face the challenges of today,
8 and the promise of hope for the tomorrow
9 of our children and our grandchildren.

10 We pray for those who sacrifice
11 and serve here, Lord, as Councilmen and
12 Councilwomen. We pray that you would
13 give them a shield to protect them.
14 Lord, also we pray for a light to guide
15 them as they go forward in their role
16 here in this hall, Lord, as they serve
17 their community, Lord, as they are
18 husbands, wives, mothers, fathers. We
19 thank you for those roles, and I pray
20 that you would continue to bless them in
21 that area.

22 We pray, Lord, that you would
23 also bless each and every City employee
24 as they serve to make our city -- Lord,
25 to maintain it and to improve it. We ask

7 We pray for wisdom for this
8 City Council meeting, not just in this
9 hall, not just in this hour, but also as
10 they continue their work.

11 I pray that you would get the
12 glory and honor. We pray it in Jesus's
13 name.

14 Amen.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you so much for those inspiring
18 words.

19 Council will be at ease.

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. The next order of business is
23 the approval of the Journal of the
24 meeting of Thursday, April 5th, 2018, and
25 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
3 you, Mr. President. I move that the
4 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April
5 5th, 2018 be approved.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
8 has been moved and properly seconded that
9 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
10 April 5th, 2018 stand approved.

11 All those in favor will
12 indicate by saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it, and the Journal is
19 approved.

20 The next order of business is
21 requests for leaves of absence, and the
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. On behalf of the
25 majority, a leave of absence is requested

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 record shall reflect Councilwoman Gym has
5 been granted a leave of absence.

6 And the Chair now recognizes
7 Councilman O'Neill.

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. On behalf of the
10 republicans, there are no requests for
11 leave of absence.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
13 sorry. I'm having a little technical
14 difficulties up here.

15 The Chair thanks the gentleman.

16 At this time, I would like to
17 dispense with the regular order of
18 business and I would like to thank
19 everyone for taking time out of their
20 busy day to come down to witness their
21 government in action. We genuinely hope
22 that you enjoy your day, so much so that
23 you come back again. So, again, we
24 really appreciate you being here today.

25 At this time, the Chair

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2 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
3 who will present a resolution honoring
4 Iyanla Vanzant. Would Ms. Vanzant and
5 those accompanying her please join the
6 Councilwoman at the podium.

7 (Appause.)

8 (Councilmembers and guests
9 approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 joining Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, we
12 have Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman
13 Parker, Councilman Green, Councilman
14 Jones, and Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez
15 and Councilman Greenlee and Councilwoman
16 Bass.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you
18 very, very, very, very, very, very much,
19 Mr. President. This is a big thrill for
20 me, as it is rare in the work that we do
21 that we get a chance to meet those
22 persons we admire from afar up close and
23 personal. And so this morning is a real
24 thrill for me, and I'm very, very
25 grateful.

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2 I join the many who are
3 thrilled to invite our very special guest
4 to City Council today, the extraordinary,
5 exceptionally extraordinary, how about
6 that, Iyanla Vanzant to receive an
7 official City of Philadelphia resolution
8 honoring her life's work.

9 This is a woman with many
10 titles. Mother, grandmother, good
11 girlfriend, wise woman, life coach,
12 spiritual teacher, soul technician,
13 attorney, minister, prayer warrior,
14 servant, cultural custodian, and student
15 of life are all words that have been used
16 to describe this phenomenal woman we have
17 the pleasure of honoring today.

18 My personal opinion is that she
19 exemplifies the answer to the question
20 how to reinvent yourself. And beyond
21 that, she's what I call a possibility
22 thinker.

23 Consider this: Possibility
24 thinkers resemble the hummingbird that
25 looks for and finds honey often in the

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2 most unlikely and unthinkable places.
3 Possibility thinkers perceptively probe
4 every problem proposed and opportunity to
5 discover only the positive aspects
6 present in that situation.

7 In reverse, impossibility
8 thinkers make sweeping passes over a
9 proposed idea, scanning it with a
10 negative eye, only looking for the
11 distasteful aspects. Impossibility
12 thinkers look for reasons why something
13 won't work instead of visualizing ways in
14 which it could work. They are inclined
15 to say no to any proposal and never give
16 the idea a fair hearing.

17 Further, Ms. Vanzant has
18 learned that impossibility thinkers
19 immediately, impulsively, instinctively
20 react to any positive suggestion with a
21 sweeping unstudied irresponsible
22 assortment of reasons why it won't be.

23 Ms. Vanzant, on the other hand,
24 is not that. She's what we call a
25 possibility thinker, who when faced with

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2 a mountain did not quit. She kept on
3 striving until she either climbed over,
4 found a passthrough tunnel underneath or
5 simply stayed and turned the mountain
6 into a gold mine.

7 Ms. Vanzant recognizes that
8 possibility thinkers are a resource for
9 people, and her philosophy is that where
10 there's a will, there's a way.

11 Why has she succeeded in so
12 many genres? Because she has trained
13 herself to look only for the
14 possibilities in all areas of life. And
15 for that, we're honoring Iyanla Vanzant's
16 life, her accomplishments, contributions
17 to the fields of spirituality and
18 personal development.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
20 Iyanla Vanzant has had a 30-year-long
21 distinguished career in which she
22 continues to be honored for her writing,
23 public speaking, life coaching, and
24 spiritual teachings. Throughout her
25 career, she has published 18 books, six

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2 of which are New York Times best sellers,
3 and has played a leading role in two
4 television shows, multiple speaking
5 tours, and countless radio and television
6 features. Her formal titles as life
7 coach, ordained priestess, spiritual
8 healer, and attorney are not what defines
9 her. She is also a devoted mother, a
10 grandmother, a prayer warrior, and a
11 student of life; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
13 Iyanla Vanzant's life is a living
14 testament to the values in life's
15 valleys. Vanzant has had to overcome
16 much adversity on her journey to success.
17 She was born in the Brooklyn projects,
18 and her mother died when she was two
19 years old. Throughout her childhood and
20 young adulthood, she suffered from
21 physical and sexual abuse.

22 She would be proud to know that
23 April is Child Abuse Month every year in
24 this Council.

25 Iyanla was once a single mother

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2 relying on public assistance to help with
3 the cost of raising her family. From
4 this troubled history, she gives God the
5 credit for being able to overcome. Her
6 journey through the valley has only
7 strengthened her relationship with God
8 and has given her the motivation to
9 dedicate her career to the spiritual
10 uplifting of women of color; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
12 against all odds, Vanzant has received
13 three degrees of higher education, in
14 which she has graduated with
15 distinguished honors. She graduated
16 summa cum laude with a Bachelor of Arts
17 in public administration from Medgar
18 Evers College. She went on to receive
19 her law degree from the inaugural law
20 school class at the City University of
21 New York. After deciding to pursue a
22 different career path, she received her
23 Master's degree in spiritual psychology
24 from the University of Santa Monica. Her
25 educational career is evidence of her

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2 tireless work ethic; and

3 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,

4 after receiving her law degree, Ms.

5 Vanzant moved to the City of Brotherly

6 Love -- and, more importantly, Sisterly

7 Effectiveness -- to serve as a public

8 defender with the Defender's Association

9 of Philadelphia. Iyanla shares that it

10 was through practicing "man's law" that

11 she developed a new love and respect for

12 God's law; and

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,

14 Vanzant legitimized her passion for

15 spiritual uplifting by becoming an

16 ordained Yoruba priestess in 1983, and an

17 Ordained Minister of New Thought

18 Christianity in 1994. That same year

19 Vanzant and her daughter Gemmia founded

20 the Inner Visions Spiritual Life

21 Maintenance Center and Bookstore in

22 Silver Springs, Maryland. She uses the

23 center to carry out her divine purpose by

24 offering classes, workshops, and products

25 targeted towards personal and spiritual

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2 development; and

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
4 Vanzant is known for her renowned writing
5 and speaking abilities. She uses these
6 gifts to educate women of color about how
7 to navigate hard times, and her words
8 have helped millions achieve spiritual
9 awakenings. In 1988, Vanzant published
10 her first book, a workbook for her
11 students titled Tapping the Power Within.
12 Since then she has published 17 more
13 books, all of which demonstrate her
14 unique ability to speak into her
15 audience's lives; and

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: And you have
17 to grow, outgrow, and then grow some
18 more, her quote.

19 Whereas, in addition to being a
20 successful, highly revered writer,
21 Vanzant has hosted a number of television
22 shows. She was a life coach on NBC's
23 "Starting Over" program that centered
24 around her helping women guests overcome
25 dysfunction within their lives.

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2 Currently, Vanzant is executive producer
3 and star of "Iyanla Fix My Life." The
4 show is featured on Oprah Winfrey's
5 network (OWN), and is the number one
6 rated show on the network, and the number
7 two -- give it up.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: And the
10 number two rated reality show across all
11 networks on Saturday night; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
13 whereas, Iyanla Vanzant has been
14 recognized across the globe for her
15 accomplishments. Vanzant is a four-time
16 NAACP Image Award recipient; a three-time
17 Gracie Award winner; and a three-time
18 honorary degree recipient. Vanzant was
19 named one of the 100 most influential
20 Black Americans by Ebony Magazine, which
21 stated that, quote, "her books, lectures
22 and television appearances have made her
23 a multimedia high priestess of healthy
24 relationships"; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,

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2 despite Ms. Vanzant's outstanding number
3 of achievements, awards, and
4 recognitions, she remains humble, and
5 gives God all the credit for her success.
6 She has stated, quote, "it is not the
7 television show, or the red carpets or
8 knowing how many followers I have that
9 keeps me going. It's remembering the
10 truth of who I am: a girl from Brooklyn,
11 who has made many, many mistakes and is
12 still God's Beloved," end quote. To
13 Vanzant, God is the reason why she has
14 been able to touch a gazillion lives
15 around America and the globe, and
16 embodies the traits of a spiritual
17 technician; now, therefore, be it

18 Resolved, by this Council of
19 the City of Philadelphia, we hereby
20 honor, recognize, and congratulate
21 Ms. Vanzant's life, accomplishments, and
22 contributions to the fields of
23 spirituality and personal development.

24 Further resolved, that an
25 engrossed copy of this resolution will be

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2 presented to our honored guest as
3 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
4 this Philadelphia legislative body.

5 Thank you for all you've done.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
8 the Chair recognizes Ms. Vanzant for
9 remarks.

10 MS. VANZANT: Thank you. I am
11 humbled and honored to be here, and I'm
12 here because my grandmother scrubbed
13 floors and cleaned toilets to feed me and
14 my brother. I'm here because I am the
15 demonstration of the dream that my
16 ancestors never thought would come true.
17 And I hope that each and every day of my
18 life, I live to bring honor to those
19 people who sacrificed so that I could
20 have the privilege and the benefit of
21 standing in a place like this, of serving
22 publicly, working on a television network
23 owned by a black woman whose grandmother
24 did somebody's laundry.

25 It's not about me at all. It

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2 is to bring honor to the lives and souls
3 and names of my greatest-greatest
4 grandmothers who endured indignities that
5 I would never have to endure. I do it to
6 bring honor to them. I do it to bring
7 honor to all of my brothers and sisters.
8 And I ask that God keep me humble and
9 clear and occasionally give me a good
10 meal and I'll be happy.

11 Thank you so much. Thank you
12 so much.

13 (Appause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Council will be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you very much. Awesome lady.

19 At this time, the Chair
20 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
21 present a resolution recognizing a whole
22 lot of awesome ladies, Delta Sigma Theta
23 Sorority. Would Patricia Alford and
24 those accompanying her please join the
25 Councilwoman at the podium.

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2 (Councilwoman and guests
3 approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 joining Councilwoman Parker, we have
6 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman
7 Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman Jannie
8 Blackwell, Councilman Domb, Councilman
9 Green, and Councilman Johnson and
10 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
12 morning, everyone. And we want to thank
13 you all so very much for your patience.

14 I want to say a special thank
15 you to our sorer, Councilwoman Blondell
16 Reynolds Brown. I mean, we could not
17 have sort of had a preface that was more
18 appropriate to this presentation than
19 hearing from Sister Iyanla Vanzant. So
20 thank you.

21 On today, Councilwoman Reynolds
22 Brown and I have the great privilege and
23 honor of continuing a tradition, and this
24 is the 15th year of that tradition
25 established by our former sorer,

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2 Councilwoman Marian Tasco, in which our
3 Quaker City Alumnae Chapter, our Quaker
4 City Alumnae Chapter, Dr. Stone and Pat
5 Alford -- where are you? I just want you
6 to raise your hand so they'll see the
7 women from the chapter, the leaders from
8 the chapter that are responsible, Sorer
9 Reynolds Brown, for us being here today
10 and establishing all of this.

11 However, for those who are
12 watching, we have also had the honor of
13 honoring Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
14 Incorporated, in Pennsylvania, and when
15 we did so, it would be inappropriate to
16 single out one out of the 26 chapters
17 that provide service to communities
18 across Pennsylvania. And we also thought
19 the same in that if we wanted to truly
20 salute Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
21 Incorporated, that we needed to make sure
22 we were lifting up all of the chapters
23 who provide public service in the
24 Philadelphia region.

25 And with that being said, I

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2 want to thank you all so very much for
3 being here, and a special thank you to
4 Quaker City, Dr. Claudette Stone, and
5 Patricia Alford.

6 And I've got to say this for
7 the record, because people who don't
8 understand the protocol of these
9 primarily African American sororal and
10 fraternal organizations think they hear
11 Delta Sigma Theta the chapter and they're
12 sort of all the same. I see some members
13 in the audience who are members of other
14 fraternities and sororities, and you know
15 that although we are a part of one
16 organization, each of the respective
17 chapters who are here take great pride
18 and authorship in the work that they do
19 in their own right. And, Quaker city, we
20 know that this is one of your signature
21 programs in this Youth Day and that
22 you've been recognized regionally and we
23 believe, if it hasn't come, nationally.

24 So we want to give Quaker City
25 a round of applause, please, for their

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2 leadership in helping to establish this.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: With that

5 being said, Soror Councilwoman Reynolds

6 Brown, you don't have to be humble. I

7 can say it. Just so you know, we do

8 continue strong legacies of leadership.

9 For those of you who remember Brielle,

10 Blondell's daughter, holding her pants

11 leg when she was on the trail, you should

12 know that Soror Brielle is the President

13 of the Syracuse Chapter of Delta Sigma

14 Theta Sorority, Incorporated, in New

15 York.

16 I'm sorry for embarrassing you,

17 Sister. I had to tell the truth.

18 With that being said, with that

19 being said, let me get to work.

20 Our national President, Beverly

21 E. Smith, our national President and CEO,

22 notes that her vision for Delta Sigma

23 Theta Sorority is of a sisterhood that

24 actualizes the mantra "joy in our

25 sisterhood, power in our voice, and

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2 service in our heart," and it's with that
3 in mind that on today, we are proud to be
4 recognizing and honoring the members of
5 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated,
6 Quaker City, Philadelphia, and Valley
7 Forge Alumnae Chapters on the occasion of
8 the 15th Delta Youth Day at the City
9 Council of Philadelphia, which is one of
10 the renowned signature programs
11 established by the Social Action
12 Committee of the Quaker City Chapter, and
13 for the overall outstanding public
14 service provided by each of these three
15 chapters for the benefit of countless
16 residents of our great city.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
18 whereas, the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
19 Incorporated, was founded on January
20 13th, 1913 -- I repeat, January 13th,
21 1913 -- by twenty-two diligent collegiate
22 women on the campus of Howard University
23 to promote academic excellence and
24 provide assistance to those in need, and
25 as a result of its ability to continue

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2 the rich unparalleled legacy of its
3 founders by providing substantively
4 efficient advocacy in public service,
5 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated,
6 has blossomed into one of the world's
7 largest predominantly African American
8 women's organization; and

9 Whereas, the Quaker City,
10 Philadelphia, and Valley Forge Alumnae
11 Chapters share much more than a local
12 bond. In fact, they are each members of
13 a robust Pennsylvania statewide network
14 that includes 26 collegiate and alumnae
15 chapters in the mighty eastern region.
16 From Philadelphia to York, from Allegheny
17 to Erie, and many counties in between,
18 these dynamic women of diverse
19 educational and professional backgrounds
20 join together today to proudly institute
21 the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Five-Year
22 Point Programmatic Thrust, which includes
23 a laser beam focus on the following:
24 Economic Development, Educational
25 Development, International Awareness and

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2 Involvement, Physical and Mental Health,
3 and Political Awareness and Involvement
4 through service with their local and
5 national communities while also
6 celebrating their respective chapters
7 with great pride; and

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
9 with fortitude, in 1927, eleven members
10 of the Gamma Chapter, led by Sadie T.M.
11 Alexander, the first national President
12 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, formed the
13 nucleus of Xi Sigma, and together
14 stressed the importance of academic
15 excellence while advocating for
16 progressive and equitable social,
17 political, and educational policies in
18 the 20th Century. The charter members
19 became leaders in the community in which
20 they lived, and in 1956, the nomenclature
21 of all graduate chapters of Delta Sigma
22 Theta was changed to Xi Sigma, was
23 proudly renamed the Philadelphia Alumnae
24 Chapter, including members my mother,
25 wife, and sister; and

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2 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I would
3 say he's an enlightened man.

4 Whereas, the Quaker City
5 Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta
6 Sorority, Incorporated, was chartered on
7 October 17, 1976 and the ceremony was
8 held on the campus of LaSalle University.
9 There twenty-eight enthusiastic young
10 women who were dedicated to combining
11 their vision, skills, and energies to
12 establish a new alumnae chapter in the
13 Philadelphia metropolitan area realized
14 their dream of sisterhood together. The
15 goal of the chapter was to enhance the
16 Philadelphia community through its public
17 service endeavors. Our being here today
18 is the product of those fruits of their
19 labor; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
21 whereas, I have been down with the flu
22 and didn't get the dress code memo today,
23 clearly. But I'm just so honored to be
24 here with Delta Sigma Theta, because
25 without them, I can't even imagine all of

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2 the service projects that will go undone
3 in the City of Philadelphia. So thank
4 you so much for all that you do.

5 Whereas, on February 10th,
6 1991, the Valley Forge Alumnae Chapter
7 was chartered by twenty-seven committed
8 women from all walks of life. This
9 chapter continues to thrive as its
10 membership of creative, energetic, and
11 hard-working women purposely live in
12 their mission. They consistently provide
13 leadership opportunities and scholarships
14 to youth in the community, support
15 projects that transform the lives of
16 families, participate in various
17 charitable events, and serve as social
18 activists; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
20 Whereas, it makes Philadelphia proud to
21 see the women of Delta Sigma Theta
22 Sorority, Incorporated, continue to blaze
23 trails created by their founders'
24 footsteps. They are forerunners in
25 promoting social and political activism

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2 by addressing voting rights, supporting
3 voter education, and hosting numerous
4 voter registration drives and voter phone
5 banks. They are also strong advocates
6 for the equitable funding of public
7 education, quality after-school programs,
8 and access to early childhood education
9 for all children; and

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
11 these didactic women have assumed the
12 charge of ensuring that communities
13 receive well-rounded support through
14 various events and programs including
15 their much-anticipated annual health
16 fairs, renowned Delta Academy and Delta
17 Gems programs, annual College Expo, the
18 VFAC Scholarship Program, and the Juanita
19 Kidd Stout Community Expo; and

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
21 the members of each of these respective
22 chapters' Social Action Committees have
23 furthered their commitment to social and
24 political engagement by empowering and
25 encouraging student activism through

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2 their Election Ambassador Corps, the
3 Behind the Ballot Girl Scouts badge, and
4 continued participation in Youth
5 Leadership Day, where students observe
6 Councilmembers in action and are provided
7 a platform to engage with Councilmembers
8 who represent the districts where the
9 students reside; and

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
11 women of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
12 Inc., continue to be magnificent examples
13 of leaders with an uncompromising
14 commitment to their community which has
15 been thoroughly examined and is
16 exemplified by today's presentation.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Now,
18 therefore, be it resolved, by the Council
19 of the City of Philadelphia, that it
20 hereby recognizes and honors the members
21 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
22 Incorporated, Quaker City, Philadelphia,
23 and Valley Forge Alumnae Chapters on the
24 occasion of the 15th Delta Youth Day at
25 the City Council of Philadelphia, which

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2 is one of the renowned signature programs
3 established by the Social Action
4 Committee of the Quaker City Chapter, and
5 for the overall outstanding public
6 service provided by each of these
7 chapters for the benefit of countless
8 residents in our city.

9 In addition to that, we need to
10 thank Council President Clarke, sorors,
11 for allowing us to have a moment of
12 flexibility here during this
13 presentation. So give Council President
14 Darrell Clarke a round of applause.

15 Thank you for your patience,
16 Mr. President.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
19 didn't have a choice, Councilwoman.

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, sir.
21 Yes, sir.

22 In addition to that, and we
23 saved the best for last, in that we want
24 to make sure that in the audience, aside
25 from the dynamic young men and women who

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2 you see standing before you, I want to
3 ask all of those who are a part of the
4 leadership program to please stand up who
5 are present. Anyone else who is out
6 there, I see you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: I also
9 see Paul Robeson, Lincoln University,
10 Upward Bound, Parkway West Schools,
11 Carver Engineering and Science, and
12 Harris Middle School.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:
15 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell, I think
16 your principal, Richard Gordon, is trying
17 to be a regular here.

18 It's good to see you, Principal
19 Gordon.

20 Thank you so very much. With
21 that being said, again, this is usually
22 the annual event of the Quaker City
23 Chapter, but we are going to hear from
24 Linda Miller, who will be speaking on
25 behalf of the President of the

12 MS. MILLER: Good morning. My
13 name is Linda Miller and I am
14 representing Philadelphia Alumnae Chapter
15 and our illustrious President, Dr. Monica
16 Johnson Taylor.

17 I just want to say thank you to
18 Cherelle Parker for hosting this event
19 today. Our youth are so important to us,
20 and if we don't take care of them and
21 lead them forward, who else will?

22 I also want to say to President
23 Darrell Clarke, thank you for inviting us
24 here. And, President Clarke, you know as
25 well as our sorors know, we don't wait

2 for an invitation. We just show up and
3 chill out for programs that affect our
4 community.

5 Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. HOWARD: Greetings. My
8 name is Tracy Howard. I'm the President
9 of Valley Forge Alumnae Chapter of Delta
10 Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated.
11 Thank you for inviting us here this
12 morning.

13 Greetings to President Clarke
14 and City Council. A special greeting to
15 my sorors, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown
16 and Councilwoman Cherelle Parker. And we
17 also want to recognize our special
18 guests, our honored students and all of
19 those involved with the Youth Day
20 project. Kudos and hats off to the women
21 of Quaker City Alumnae Chapter who are
22 sponsoring this day.

23 We know that Delta Sigma Theta
24 Sorority was found by socially conscious
25 youth students at Howard University, and

2 so we are happy to use this day to
3 connect our local youth with our
4 government. We hope that this is not
5 just the first time, but more and many
6 more times that they will stay engaged,

10 Incorporated, for continuing our national
11 initiatives.

12 Good day, everyone.

13 (Applause.)

14 DR. STONE: Good morning to
15 President Clarke, Councilwoman and Soror
16 Blondell Reynolds Brown and Soror
17 Cherelle Parker.

18 For the past 14 years, Quaker
19 City Alumnae Chapter has participated in
20 and attended the Council proceedings.
21 Our focus was to bring our students from
22 all over the City to see and participate
23 in the government actions to make
24 informed decisions in their communities,
25 in their schools, at home, and abroad.

2 This experience is another educational
3 opportunity for our young people to
4 become scholars and to be experts as they
5 move forward.

6 So we thank you once again for
7 everything. We thank you for inviting us
8 here, having us here every year. We look

10 our sorors from Valley Forge Alumnae,
11 Philadelphia Alumnae, and all the sorors
12 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
13 Incorporated.

14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. ALFORD: Hello.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Listen,
18 she's being humble. All of this, from
19 our recent statewide Founders' Day this
20 year to this event, the lady who crosses
21 the T's and dots the I's and does the
22 work is Patricia Alford. So give her a
23 round of applause.

24 (Applause.)

25 MS. ALFORD: I just wanted to

2 bring you greetings. I am the
3 Pennsylvania Council of Delta's
4 Coordinator for Social Action. So that
5 means that not only are we locally being
6 active, we are statewide active, and then
7 we answer to the eastern region.

8 I just want to give thank you
9 to the Councilmembers and Darrell Clarke,
10 because Philadelphia is a city made up of
11 communities. From its inception, it was
12 made up of communities, and the
13 communities and the people who live
14 within that community are the most
15 important and dearest thing to the City.

16 I want to thank you for the
17 decisions you have made, because the
18 decisions you have made tells us that you
19 truly represent the people who have voted
20 you into office.

21 Recently there was a decision
22 made by the Council and Darrell Clarke
23 that we would -- they would put a hold on
24 building expansion with Temple
25 University. You know something? You

3 City. That's what we -- that's all we
4 ask you to do, is to hear what the people
5 have to say, and that's the most
6 important -- that's what makes Philly the
7 best city in the world.

8 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you.

12 Council will be at ease.

13 (Council at ease.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
15 have one more presentation. At this
16 time, the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
17 Quinones-Sanchez, who will present a
18 resolution recognizing the Philadelphia
19 Children's Alliance and the Department of
20 Human Services. Would Ms. Chris
21 Kirchner, Commissioner Cynthia Figueroa,
22 and those accompanying them please join
23 the Councilwoman at the podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining the Councilwoman, we have
4 Councilman Green, Councilman Henon,
5 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman
6 Reynolds Brown.

7 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
8 you, all. It is so important, the
9 connectivity between the presentations
10 we've had this morning. We had a
11 wonderful author who talked about her
12 childhood trauma and how she has
13 succeeded. We had the women who uplift
14 our community and keep our families
15 together. And now we recognize one of
16 the premier service providers as we deal
17 with family and childhood trauma in the
18 City of Philadelphia, the Philadelphia
19 Children's Alliance.

20 If you haven't had an
21 opportunity to read an American writer, a
22 very revered writer, Junot Diaz, last
23 week in the New Yorker dropped an article
24 about his childhood abuse and trauma, and
25 it was a very moving story, and I

2 encourage everyone who has an opportunity
3 to read it.

4 I want to thank Commissioner
5 Figueroa for joining us and their support
6 and partnership of this wonderful
7 program. We do this every year as we
8 declare April Child Abuse Awareness and
9 Prevention Month.

10 So with that, recognizing and
11 honoring the Philadelphia Children's
12 Alliance and the Department of Human
13 Services for their partnership and
14 commitment to bring healing and justice
15 to victims of child abuse in Philadelphia
16 and declaring April 2018 to be Child
17 Abuse Awareness and Prevention Month in
18 the City of Philadelphia.

19 Whereas, for over 28 years, the
20 Philadelphia Children's Alliance and the
21 Department of Human Services has
22 advocated for a team-based approach,
23 built a cooperative relationship,
24 introduced efficiencies into the system
25 to provide rapid response, and

2 effectively change how abused children
3 are served and cared for in Philadelphia;
4 and

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
6 the Philadelphia Children's Alliance
7 became a full member of the National
8 Children's Alliance (NCA) in 1992 and was
9 accredited by the NCA in 2001. Today,
10 Philadelphia Children's Alliance not only
11 meets all National Children's Alliance
12 standards, but is a national best
13 standards model for peer agencies
14 nationwide; and

15 Whereas, in 2013, the
16 Philadelphia Children's Alliance, the
17 Department of Human Services, Police
18 Special Victims Unit, the District
19 Attorney's Office, and the medical
20 providers co-located in one facility
21 within the Seventh Councilmanic District
22 to create a more effective and caring
23 response to children who have been
24 sexually abused. All are dedicated to
25 providing justice and healing for

2 sexually abused children, working to
3 protect victims, ending the cycle of
4 abuse, protecting children who have
5 experienced minor sex trafficking, and
6 improving the quality of abuse
7 investigations. With the addition of
8 SEPTA's newest Route 53, this facility
9 not only is more accessible, but it also
10 allows for more streamlined
11 investigations and a less traumatic
12 experience for children; and

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: And whereas,
14 in 2017, Philadelphia Children's Alliance
15 and co-located partners conducted 1,916
16 forensic interviews, with 2,177 children
17 and caregivers receiving victim advocacy.
18 182 children received mental health
19 therapy on site, and an additional 800
20 children were linked with trauma-focused
21 therapy at mental health partner agencies
22 throughout the City of Philadelphia; and

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, St.
24 Christopher's Hospital and the Children's
25 Hospital of Philadelphia has established

2 a medical clinic on site at the
3 co-located facility so that any child is
4 able to receive the immediate attention
5 and care they need five days a week. In
6 2017, 560 children received on-site
7 medical evaluations; and

8 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
9 Whereas, April is Child Abuse Awareness
10 and Prevention Month and Philadelphia
11 Children's Alliance, with the Department
12 of Human Services, recognizes this month
13 by promoting increased knowledge of the
14 resources available to parents and
15 caregivers to prevent child maltreatment
16 and promote well-being; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
18 whereas, the Philadelphia Children's
19 Alliance and the Department of Human
20 Services are well respected organizations
21 in Philadelphia focused on services to
22 child victims of sexual abuse and minor
23 sex trafficking. We recognize the
24 critical need for these vital services to
25 protect children and families they serve

2 so that children can quickly get the help
3 they need to be safe and have fulfilling
4 lives; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
6 you to all my colleagues who have visited
7 and supported this work.

8 Therefore, be it resolved, that
9 the Council of the City of Philadelphia
10 hereby recognizes, congratulates, honors,
11 and celebrates the work of the
12 Philadelphia Children's Alliance and the
13 Department of Human Services for their
14 commitment to promoting healing and
15 justice for victims of child abuse in
16 Philadelphia and declaring April 2018 to
17 be Child Abuse Awareness and Prevention
18 Month in the City. We extend our sincere
19 respect and admiration of this
20 legislative body, and thank the
21 organization for leading the national
22 movement in how we care for children.

23 Further be it resolved, that an
24 engrossed copy of this resolution will be
25 presented.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 the Chair recognizes Ms. Kirchner and
6 Commissioner Figueroa for remarks.

7 COMMISSIONER FIGUEROA: Thank
8 you, Councilman Clarke and Councilwoman
9 Maria Quinones for sponsoring this
10 resolution and being a staunch advocate
11 for children.

12 On behalf of the Philadelphia
13 Department of Human Services and in
14 partnership with the Philadelphia
15 Children's Alliance, I am honored to
16 accept this resolution proclaiming April
17 2018 to be Child Abuse Awareness and
18 Prevention Month in the City of
19 Philadelphia.

20 The truth is, child sex abuse
21 is among one of the most difficult pieces
22 of work that we are aware of, and we have
23 to open our hearts and also educate.
24 It's all of our responsibility to have a
25 voice and protect our children. It's

2 never okay to be silent on child sexual
3 abuse.

4 We're very fortunate. You
5 heard about the collaboration. It's
6 unique. It's a national model, the fact
7 that we bring everybody together and can
8 minimize the trauma of a child who has
9 experienced tremendous trauma in their
10 lives.

11 I want to thank the
12 Philadelphia Children's Alliance. I want
13 to thank the Council body for their
14 tremendous support of our work in this
15 very difficult work.

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. KIRCHNER: I also want to
19 thank Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez for
20 sponsoring this resolution and City
21 Council for declaring April 2018 as Child
22 Abuse Awareness and Prevention Month.
23 I'm Executive Director of the
24 Philadelphia Children's Alliance, a role
25 that I've had for many years, and

2 recently, though, child sexual abuse is
3 in the news every day. You can't open
4 the paper without hearing of a national
5 story or a local story.

6 We have read and wept as the
7 multitude of actors and athletes came
8 forward to speak about sexual abuse that
9 occurred when they were minors.

10 Commissioner Figueroa and I
11 have been speaking out to remind everyone
12 that as we read these heartbreaking
13 stories in Hollywood and DC and New York,
14 there are Philadelphia stories too. For
15 every Aly Raisman, who was one of 150
16 victims of abuse by her USA gymnastics
17 coach, there might be a little girl in
18 Frankford. And for every Anthony Rapp,
19 who was abused when he was 14 by Kevin
20 Spacey, there might be a small boy from
21 the Northeast.

22 Every neighborhood in
23 Philadelphia is affected. Last year
24 there were 3,000 reports of alleged
25 sexual abuse to DHS and the Police.

2 Forty to 50 children come to our
3 co-located center every week. So that's
4 eight to 12 kids every day. So you can
5 picture some of them sitting in our
6 waiting room right now for a coordinated
7 investigation and to receive services.
8 And these are only the cases that we know
9 about. Research tells us that only 38
10 percent of children ever disclose their
11 abuse. Sixty-two percent of the kids
12 keep quiet, and maybe they'll talk about
13 it later when they're adults.

14 Children come to our facility
15 on Hunting Park Avenue to talk about what
16 has happened to them, to be interviewed
17 by experts, to get a medical exam, to get
18 victim support services, and to get
19 therapy and to begin their process of
20 healing. If we all do our jobs, their
21 abuse will stop and they will be
22 protected. The abuse will not be a
23 life-defining event, but will be
24 something that they work through with the
25 help of qualified professionals.

2 I'd like to thank our partners
3 and advocates who have spoken out on this
4 issue. We coordinate our efforts. We
5 have a fully integrated response to these
6 cases that involves the Philadelphia
7 Police Department's Special Victims Unit,
8 who are housed with us, the Department of
9 Human Services, who has all of their sex
10 abuse specialists housed with us, the
11 District Attorney's Office, who has staff
12 on site, as well as Children's Hospital
13 and St. Christopher's Hospital, who share
14 coverage of the medical suite, and our 15
15 mental health provider partners
16 throughout the community. We thank them
17 all for their partnership and support.

18 We were also very fortunate
19 this year -- I don't know if any of you
20 saw our Give 5 to PCA campaign. So Nick
21 Foles, Trey Burton, and Jordan Hicks from
22 the Philadelphia Eagles adopted us.
23 These Super Bowl champions opened their
24 wallets and their hearts to help our
25 child victims, an off-the-field "Philly

2 special," if you ask me.

3 By taking steps to promote
4 child abuse awareness and prevention,
5 City Council is taking a great step in
6 helping us in our mission to bring
7 healing and justice to every victim of
8 child sexual abuse in the City of
9 Philadelphia. As a community, we must
10 stay informed, speak out, and protect our
11 children.

12 Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Council will be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman

24 COUNCILMAN JONES:

25 Mr. President, I have one privileged

6 resolution honoring and remembering the
7 life of William Bethel, and offering our
8 deepest and sincerest condolences to his
9 family, friends, and all those grieving
10 his untimely death.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. We read all too often
17 about homicides in the City of
18 Philadelphia and too often to young
19 people.

20 A young man from Roxborough,
21 African American, two, three-sport kid,
22 boxed, played football, was just down
23 South Street, just like tens of thousands
24 of other kids, and was murdered. What
25 made this different was, he was anything

2 but a stereotypical kid. He lived in a
3 different part of town. He was an honor
4 roll student. He was a kid that most
5 people would say was a pleasure to be
6 around. And what happens too often, too
7 many guns, too many instances, too many
8 conflict resolutions by gun happened to
9 him.

10 He had a candlelight vigil up
11 in the northern part of my district where
12 close to 100 people came out and
13 celebrated not his death but his life.

14 I say this to say that the work
15 of my colleague and you, Mr. President,
16 is yet undone. There are no
17 stereotypical zip codes where it happens.
18 There are no prototypical kid. No kid is
19 safe until all kids are safe.

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you, Councilman. That will be on
23 this week's Calendar.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman

11 introduced today places the exemption
12 language directly in the ordinance as
13 opposed to in the contract, which the
14 legislation would authorize.

15 As I have said from the
16 beginning, it's neither the goal nor the
17 intent of this legislation to remove
18 anyone from their homes. Rather, the
19 goal is to collect money from those who
20 choose not to pay and who have gotten
21 away with it for far too long. We must
22 send a strong signal that we will not
23 tolerate this any longer.

24 To the delinquent commercial
25 and industrial property owners and

2 investors, let me say this: On behalf of
3 the tax-paying citizens and businesses as
4 well as our school children, we are
5 coming for our money. This revenue is

10 taxes, we are talking again about raising
11 the transfer tax, and we're freezing the
12 planned decrease to the City wage tax,
13 all while we continue to grow our
14 government budget.

17 back and allow the 51,000 delinquent
18 commercial, industrial, and investment
19 property owners to continue to shed their

7 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

19 CHIEF CLERK: Deborah Young.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Deborah Young.

22 (No response.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,

24 commenting on 180322.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

3 afternoon.

4 MR. KING: Good afternoon,
5 Council President and Councilmembers.
6 Thank you for your time. The Resolution
7 180322, I want to state, first of all,
8 that the chemical attack story in Syria
9 is unraveling under the facts. This
10 resolution cannot be considered outside
11 of the military deployments in the
12 Balkans that took place during the
13 Clinton Administration, the regime change
14 that started under the first Bush
15 Administration. It cannot be considered
16 outside the military deployments in
17 Libya, Syria, the Ukraine, and other
18 places under the Obama Administration.

19 I would also like to add that
20 no one could have not recognized the fire
21 at Trump Tower as communication or the
22 constitutionally questionable
23 evidence-gathering by the FBI under court
24 order referred by Special Counsel
25 Mueller. Deep state machinations

2 conducting a de-stabilization offensive
3 exists.

4 President Trump has been trying
5 to take the United States out of the
6 globalization era and its endless war
7 against humanity. This -- anyway, under
8 the cover of the 2008 financial meltdown,
9 \$40 trillion and the nation were given to
10 Wall Street. The banks were saved, yet
11 30 million Americans were forced out of
12 their home by a fraudulent foreclosure
13 process. This has never been
14 investigated. It is the actual national
15 security crisis.

16 The Main Street economy is in
17 need of cash like you need oxygen. Wall
18 Street should not be acting like the
19 creditor to the United States. President
20 Trump is trying to lead the nation out of
21 globalization and its endless war policy
22 against humanity.

23 I ask you for your
24 understanding and support for the
25 President and broaden our perspective so

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you for your testimony.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Carol Green,
8 commenting on 180322.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. GREEN: Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 afternoon.

13 MS. GREEN: Please pray for me.
14 My name is Carol Green and -- 180322, I
15 don't want nuclear war. I don't
16 understand Mr. Trump. I don't know how
17 God might be leading him, but I know that
18 in our city, someone from the field
19 office of the FBI, you might call it the
20 CIA, before the Oklahoma City bombing was
21 sent to Oklahoma City's field office,
22 this was before the bombing happened,
23 someone from this field office was sent
24 there, and also a letter came to my house
25 for Timothy McVeigh. It was a long

2 envelope. It was white. And I need you
3 to pray about this, because I don't
4 understand what happened. I don't
5 understand why it happened, but before it
6 happened, there was a President that came
7 to our city, President Bush's father, and
8 someone was going to try to hurt him. So
9 information was given to me concerning
10 this matter, and I gave this information.
11 I called the FBI, I believe. I might
12 have called them first, and I let him
13 know God let me know that they were going
14 to hurt him. And before they could hurt
15 him, God fixed it so that they wouldn't
16 hurt the elder, the first President Bush.
17 And like I said before, someone from the
18 field office in Philadelphia was sent to
19 Oklahoma City's field office before the
20 Oklahoma City bombing, and before the
21 bombing, a letter was sent to my house
22 for Timothy McVeigh.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
25 you, ma'am.

2 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
3 please.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
5 commenting on 180313, 180314, 180326,
6 180303, 180304, 180310, and 180327.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MR. DANIHEL: Yes. This is an
9 official decree of the people in writ of
10 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
11 requires immediate action and remedy.

12 Every week Council, Mayor, and
13 others transfer private property to
14 government, probably illegally.

15 Dr. King passed 50 years ago
16 and was quoted, "He who passively accepts
17 evil is as much involved in it as he who
18 perpetrates it." This is reinforced in
19 laws later mentioned as violated.

20 The people did not authorize
21 Council, Mayor, and others to become the
22 legalized version of the criminals, as
23 Jefferson stated. The Fourteenth
24 Amendment, no state shall make or enforce
25 any law which shall abridge the

2 privileges and immunities of the citizens
3 of the United States, nor shall the state
4 deprive any people of life, liberty or
5 property.

6 How can agents and agencies
7 deny God-given rights and the
8 Constitution to steal my home without
9 compensation, due process or Seventh
10 Amendment trial by jury? Spending
11 upwards of 100 million federal taxpayer
12 HUD money to create homelessness to build
13 a mall is clearly punishable by law.

14 Why has no official demanded
15 the Attorney General investigate and
16 prosecute, as required by law? The
17 constitutions require immediate remedy of
18 this breach of law, breach of close,
19 breach of fiduciary duty. Your oath of
20 office requires you to act or face
21 prison.

22 14 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
23 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
24 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
25 through 11, 26 PA CSA 701, 703, 705, 708,

2 709, 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed
3 in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056
4 appear violated.

5 I call for the federal and
6 Commonwealth governments to perform their
7 constitutional obligations to investigate
8 and prosecute all involved in the theft
9 and illegal transfer of my home, 1083
10 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
11 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
12 24 years is egregious, extraordinary,
13 oath-violating, and requires immediate
14 remedy.

15 A just government must obey the
16 rule of law. This color of law
17 government must have its Charter to
18 govern revoked until a constitutionally
19 compliant government is installed.

20 Public servants cannot refuse
21 their sworn duty to act any more than a
22 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
23 sovereign people require oath,
24 Constitution, and law be enforced. Jail
25 is required for all who violate oath,

2 Constitution or law.

3 I remind Council, it takes a
4 lot of cooperation to create and allow
5 monumental corruption.

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
7 you.

8 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
9 please.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Andrew Joung,
11 commenting on 170854.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MR. JOUNG: Good morning. I
14 guess it's still the morning, or is it
15 afternoon? Good afternoon, City
16 Councilmen and women. My name is Andrew
17 Joung and I am a tenant in Powelton of
18 Philadelphia, and on behalf of the
19 Philadelphia Tenants Union, I greatly
20 appreciate the opportunity to speak. I
21 would like to discuss the importance of
22 passing the good cause legislation, Bill
23 No. 170854.

24 I was not born in Philadelphia
25 nor was I raised here. I was born in

2 Queens to an immigrant Korean family
3 fleeing economic calamity. I spent the
4 first ten years of my life in a small
5 apartment in Flushing and the rest
6 bouncing around New York state. I'm
7 pretty young, and I left New York when I
8 was 22 to move to Philadelphia. But I
9 have seen in that period dramatic changes
10 in the state that I was raised and
11 increasing in possibility of better life.

12 Now, this is Philadelphia, not
13 New York. So I'm not going to dwell on
14 New York too long. After all, I'm sure a
15 lot of you already know what's happening
16 in New York.

17 But here's one thing I want to
18 say about New York City. Gentrification
19 is not just about rising housing prices.
20 It's also about an increasing
21 concentration of jobs in places where
22 people cannot live. Just because homes
23 are cheaper in the outer boroughs or
24 further upstate does not mean that's
25 where the jobs are. People commute for

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2 hours, spending huge portions of their
3 income traveling just to make a living in
4 cities that no longer care to house them.

5 Some of my friends -- and these
6 are people I grew up with in like high
7 school -- literally commute from like a
8 three-hour job upstate to work for \$15,
9 \$20 an hour. With public transit costs,
10 we are talking -- I mean, with public
11 transit, we are talking about like a
12 five-hour round trip every day. This is
13 like our youth -- this is the youth of
14 our country, but we spend a fifth of our
15 waking hours stuck on trains.

16 It is a tale of two cities in
17 New York, but it's not just one about one
18 city being rich and another being poor.
19 It's about another one having the jobs
20 and the others do not.

21 But, again, I'm not here to
22 talk about New York, because with regards
23 to evictions, Philadelphia is far, far
24 worse. In the 2010 census, Philadelphia
25 was ranked as like the fifth largest

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2 metropolitan area, and I know like there
3 are like extrapolations since then, so I
4 think Philadelphia has dropped to about
5 eighth, but like stay with me. Out of
6 those five, according to Matthew Desmond,
7 who is a renowned Harvard sociologist,
8 writer of the New York Times best seller
9 Evicted -- maybe some of you have heard
10 of him -- he just recently came out with
11 this really new great dataset that's on
12 this website called evictionlabs.org,
13 which I really highly recommend that
14 anybody in this rooms that's concerned
15 about housing justice should really check
16 out.

17 So according to Matthew
18 Desmond, out of the top five largest
19 metropolitan areas according to the 2010
20 census, according to him, New York City
21 has the second highest eviction rate at
22 1.61 percent. But who has the largest
23 eviction rate of the five? Philadelphia,
24 with an eviction rate of 3.48 percent.
25 That is more than double New York's

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2 eviction rate.

3 As someone who works at the --
4 does that mean I'm out of time or can I
5 keep on going?

6 As someone who works at the
7 Wharton School of the University of
8 Pennsylvania --

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.
10 I was saying you got to wrap it up, not
11 keep going.

12 MR. JOUNG: So I think City
13 Council members should all support good
14 cause legislation because it's common
15 sense. City Council should be ashamed if
16 it cannot even say that good tenants
17 should stay in their homes. We need to
18 protect all Philadelphians. Housing is a
19 human right.

20 Thank you for your time.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Stephanie
24 Altimari, commenting on 170854.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

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2 MS. ALTIMARI: Hey, everyone.

3 Hi to City Council.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: How
5 are you?

6 MS. ALTIMARI: Good afternoon.
7 My name is Stephanie Altimari. I'm here
8 on behalf of the Philadelphia Tenants
9 Union. I grew up in Mayfair and
10 Lawncrest, and right now I'm living in
11 Callowhill, and I'm here to discuss the
12 urgency of passing the good cause
13 legislation, Bill No. 170854.

14 So I've been doing tenants'
15 rights work in Philadelphia for about
16 three years, and I've seen a few really
17 horrifying things: a mother living with
18 a toddler in a house with exposed outlets
19 and no heat; space heater plugged in in
20 the winter because the gas didn't work;
21 people living with trash inside their
22 house because the landlord doesn't give
23 them anywhere to put outside and the
24 neighbors complain if it's outside. I've
25 seen people living with cellophane

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2 windows because landlords don't want to
3 fix the glass. I've heard of landlords
4 walking in on like women tenants while
5 they were naked and then trying to like
6 barter sexual favors, saying like, if you
7 can't pay your rent, you can do this
8 instead. I've seen like families torn
9 apart from eviction. I've seen people
10 kicked out of their houses with children,
11 having to move into homeless shelters.
12 I've seen people evicted from houses
13 landlords didn't even actually own, but
14 the landlord successfully managed to
15 evict them; entire blocks sold to
16 developers, communities uprooted. And
17 time and time again the thing that I've
18 heard is that tenants don't want to
19 complain about living in these
20 conditions, because if they complain,
21 their landlord can kick them out of their
22 house without any real reason. They can
23 just make up anything and get them
24 removed from their home. These are the
25 laws in Philly.

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2 So what I'm trying to
3 illustrate here is that the landlords in
4 Philly have an incredible amount of power
5 over tenants. All of the examples I've
6 listed -- and I could go on and on --
7 like might have been made a little less
8 possible if landlords did not have an
9 unchecked power of eviction, and good
10 cause legislation provides that power
11 check.

12 Evictions enforce homelessness.
13 Eviction is enforced segregation. It
14 displaces entire communities. It robs
15 working-class people of affordable
16 housing.

17 The eviction crisis is the most
18 prevalent in gentrifying neighborhoods.
19 There's an incentive for landlords to
20 evict long-term tenants and to cash in on
21 rising real estate prices. According to
22 Philadelphia Legal Assistance, the areas
23 in North Philly and University City have
24 the most -- have the highest eviction
25 rates in the City, 15 percent. They've

2 seen 3,000 evictions since the beginning
3 of 2018. Seventy percent of all
4 evictions are women of color, and that's
5 three times more likely if you have
6 children.

7 So it's not really even just
8 the financial strain of moving, but it's
9 the psychological burden that people face
10 knowing that there's a threat of losing
11 their housing just if they want to
12 complain to live -- for repairs to their
13 property.

14 So what I'm saying is, City
15 Council members should all support good
16 cause legislation because it's common
17 sense. New Jersey already has it, has
18 had it for years. And Philly is my
19 hometown. I love it. I've never left
20 for a reason, but like I might have to
21 and all the people that I grew up with
22 might have to if the rents keep rising
23 because of gentrification. Housing is a
24 human right.

25 And thank you for your time.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 issue of safe injection sites as a way to
12 deal with the significant crisis of
13 opioid addiction in the City.

14 Last week our Public Health and
15 Human Services Committee had hearings in
16 Councilwoman Sanchez's district to really
17 have an engaged conversation regarding
18 this issue.

19 Recently, our Police
20 Commissioner stated that we have over
21 1,200 opioid deaths in 2017. 2018 also
22 seems to be a number of deaths that may
23 occur from opioid addiction. And as we
24 debate this issue, there are various
25 resources that we have in the City to

2 address this issue, but I also believe
3 there are resources that we have that
4 we're not using effectively to address
5 the opioid problem.

6 According to recent data,
7 marijuana makes up 24 percent of the
8 primary referral to drug treatment
9 admissions, whereas heroin represents 27
10 percent. Further, 30 percent of our
11 referrals are coming from our criminal
12 justice system, and that's the largest
13 referral source for drug treatment. And
14 marijuana referrals double that of opioid
15 referrals.

16 Marijuana users make up a large
17 number of people that are in treatment,
18 and I think those are treatment
19 facilities that can be better used for
20 those who are on opioid addiction.

21 Considering this information,
22 I'm introducing this resolution today to
23 hold hearings regarding the use of THC, a
24 chemical found in marijuana, for
25 screenings for people on probation and

2 parole in our city. In various cities
3 like New York City years ago have gotten
4 rid of using THC screenings.

5 This body under then-Councilman
6 Kenney, now our Mayor, took leadership in
7 de-criminalizing small amounts of
8 marijuana in 2014. In addition, through
9 our Special Committee on Criminal Justice
10 Reform and also the dollars we received
11 through the MacArthur grant, we've also
12 been reducing the number of people in our
13 jails in our city and to the cost to our
14 taxpayers of about \$42,000 per year per
15 person to be incarcerated.

16 As many people in this body
17 know and throughout the City, poverty is
18 a major issue in our city. Close to 26
19 percent of the citizens of the City are
20 in poverty. And I think that when we use
21 THC as a screening mechanism for
22 probation and parole, it continues to
23 perpetuate those issues of poverty, where
24 people who are returning citizens trying
25 to make better for their lives and to

2 maintain a job and provide resources back
3 to their family, but if they violate
4 their probation or parole based on a THC
5 screen, they may go back to prison, and
6 this is an issue that's, I think,
7 something that we need to discuss and
8 debate, that we're not using all the
9 resources that we have to address the
10 opioid addiction. And I think by looking
11 at how we're using THC screenings is an
12 important conversation that this body
13 should have.

14 I move for the adoption of the
15 resolution.
