2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 We're going to get started. If the  
7 visitors will retire behind the rail, we  
8 can move on to our invocation.

9 And to give our invocation this  
10 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor Myra  
11 Maxwell of the Trinity United Church.  
12 She is here today as the guest of  
13 Councilman Johnson.

14 I would ask all members,  
15 guests, and visitors to please rise.

16 (Councilmembers, guests, and  
17 visitors rise.)

18 PASTOR MAXWELL: Good morning.

19 (Good morning.)

20 PASTOR MAXWELL: Truly it is an  
21 honor today for me to bring this  
22 invocation, and I want to especially  
23 thank God first and Councilman Johnson,  
24 who has been an inspiration and  
25 encouragement throughout the City. So we

17                   Almighty God, we pray that you  
18      will touch those who will present on  
19      today, for, Lord God, there are many that  
20      work in our communities and serve, Lord  
21      God. We pray that you will touch, Lord  
22      God, the grassroots organizations, Lord  
23      God, and the larger organizations as  
24      well, that we'll work together to do  
25      what's necessary to keep this city great.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
5 thank you, thank you, Mr. President. In  
6 keeping with our protocol to welcome  
7 special guests, it is a thrill for me  
8 this morning to present to some and  
9 introduce to others several women who  
10 have led the way by being sisters in  
11 solar, and I want to ask Councilwoman  
12 Parker to pay particular attention  
13 because she is a sorer of ours.

14 It's a thrill for me to welcome  
15 Rose McKinney-James, Esquire, Chair of  
16 the Board of Directors for the American  
17 Association of Blacks in Energy. She and  
18 the entire Board are here, and we want to  
19 welcome them to the City of Brotherly  
20 Love and Sisterly Effectiveness.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: She is  
23 joined today to be our keynote speaker  
24 for our Sisters in Solar first annual  
25 luncheon, which talks about STEM and

4 We will also be welcoming  
5 George Washington Carver High School

10 Thank you, Nancy Mifflin, Rose  
11 McKinney-James. Please stand up so we  
12 can welcome you.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
15 Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 And thank you for being here  
19 today. We really appreciate it.

20 Our next order of business is

5 And the Chair now recognizes

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
8 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
9 republicans, there are no requests for  
10 leave of absence.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
12 Chair thanks the gentleman.

13 At this time, I would like to  
14 dispense with the regular order of  
15 business and I would like to thank  
16 everyone who has taken time out of their  
17 busy day to come down to witness their

23 At this time, the Chair

11 Councilwoman -- everybody?

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
13 Everybody.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We  
15 have all members of Council.

16 (Councilmembers and guests  
17 approached podium.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Mr.  
19 President, this is really a pleasure for  
20 us. So many people have known Lynette  
21 over the years in so many ways, through  
22 so many activities, that everybody is up  
23 here to share in certainly our best  
24 wishes for her, our thank you's, and our  
25 congratulations to her for all that she's

4 So we are happy to present this  
5 resolution, again, signed by everybody.

6 Resolution recognizing and  
7 honoring Lynette Brown-Sow on the

10 Philadelphia and for her many  
11 accomplishments that have benefited the  
12 City of Philadelphia.

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
14 Lynette Brown-Sow graduated from West  
15 Philadelphia High School in 1968. She  
16 received a degree of Bachelor of Science  
17 in Administration from Antioch University  
18 in 1979 and a Master's of -- M.S.S. in  
19 Policy, which is Master's in Social  
20 Sciences in Policy, Planning and  
21 Development from Bryn Mawr College in  
22 1981; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: We are  
24 excited about her next act.

25 Whereas, in 1980, she founded

3 minority/female-owned consulting firm  
4 that provides professional services to  
5 corporations, non-profits, and  
6 governmental entities; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
8 Lynette Brown-Sow is also a member of  
9 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Philadelphia  
10 Alumnae Chapter, Incorporated.

11 And whereas, her expertise in  
12 organizational development, board  
13 governance, marketing and crisis  
14 communications has made her a  
15 highly-sought after board member. She  
16 currently serves on the board of numerous  
17 organizations including, but not limited  
18 to, the Philadelphia Tribune Company,  
19 Incorporated; Hahnemann University  
20 Hospital; NHS Enterprises, Inc.; and The  
21 Board of City Trusts of where she serves  
22 Girard College via her committee  
23 assignment. She's a member also of the  
24 Forum of Executive Women and a convener  
25 of the Forum for a Better Pennsylvania;

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
4 she served as the Chair of the Board of  
5 Directors of The Consortium, a behavioral  
6 healthcare organization that pioneered  
7 the strategy of balancing the input of  
8 community leaders and medical experts.  
9 In 2007, The Consortium named its newest  
10 service center the Lynette M. Brown  
11 Center of Hope; and

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
13 Brown-Sow has served Community College of  
14 Philadelphia as a consultant, program  
15 director and as Vice President of  
16 Marketing and Government Relations for  
17 more than 25 years.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: As a  
19 member of the President's Cabinet at the  
20 College, she oversaw advertising, public  
21 relations, creative services,  
22 publications, special events, and  
23 government and community relations for  
24 the College; and

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, she

2   developed and strengthened partnerships  
3   nationally and locally, working with the  
4   American Association of Community  
5   Colleges and the White House to support  
6   free-tuition programs at community  
7   colleges and to sustain funding for Pell

9           COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,  
10   Lynette Brown-Sow has also lent her  
11   knowledge to those in government. She  
12   helped with the transition teams for both  
13   Mayor Edward Rendell and Michael Nutter.  
14   She was later appointed as Deputy Mayor  
15   of Administration for the Rendell  
16   Administration; and

17           COUNCILMAN DOMB: She also  
18   chaired the Philadelphia Zoning Board of  
19   Adjustment during a citywide change. In  
20   2012, she was nominated by Mayor Nutter  
21   and was approved by City Council to  
22   become the Commissioner and Board Chair  
23   of the Philadelphia Housing Authority;  
24   and

25           COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

2 Whereas, Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf  
3 appointed Brown-Sow to the Pennsylvania  
4 Workforce Investment Board, which works  
5 with state educational policies to build  
6 a strong workforce development system.

8 and

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
10 Brown-Sow has received numerous honors,  
11 awards and recognitions, including the  
12 Sammy Award for Outstanding Community  
13 Service by the Laborers International  
14 Union of North America; the  
15 Communications of the Year by the  
16 National Council for Marketing and Public  
17 Relations; and the Energy for the  
18 Community Award from PECO. She was  
19 recognized by her peers as one of the 100  
20 Distinguished Alumni at Bryn Mawr College  
21 and named, for five consecutive years, as  
22 one of the City's most influential  
23 Philadelphians by the Philadelphia  
24 Tribune; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

2 Lynette Brown-Sow is a life-long  
3 Philadelphian, and has worked in both the  
4 public and private sectors throughout her  
5 long and fruitful career. She has  
6 dedicated her talents to the service of

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I also  
10 want to take a moment to acknowledge my  
11 big sister, Lynette Brown-Sow, who when I  
12 first got involved in this process of  
13 politics, she taught me the art of ward  
14 political organizing across the City of  
15 Philadelphia.

16 And so now, therefore, be it  
17 resolved, that the Council of the City of  
18 Philadelphia, hereby recognizes and  
19 honors Lynette Brown-Sow on the occasion  
20 of her retirement for her commitment to  
21 service to Community College of  
22 Philadelphia and for her many  
23 accomplishments that have benefited the  
24 City of Philadelphia.

20      Councilman Oh for celebrating Philly's  
21      own rich, rich cultural and arts talent.

22                   Whereas, Philly LIVE Center  
23      Stage is a music initiative established  
24      by Councilman David Oh as Chairman of the  
25      Committee on Global Opportunities and the

3 Whereas, Philly LIVE Center

4 Stage provides local musicians with

5 exciting opportunities to be discovered

9 Stage's performances and Award Show are

10 structured across 10 different genres of

11 music, bringing diverse musicians

12 together. The 10 different genres are

13 Rock, Hip-Hop, Jazz, Classical, Gospel,

14 Country/Folk, World, Pop, R&B, and DJ.

15 In addition, a "People's Choice" Award is

16 selected as an 11th category; and

17 Whereas, this year's finalists

18 performed live in prominent local venues,

19 including World Cafe Live, Milkboy, Hard

22          yellow, you will have 30 seconds to  
23          conclude your remarks. When the light  
24          turns red, we'd ask that you please  
25          adhere to our guidelines and conclude

4 Mr. Decker, please call the  
5 first name on the list.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Rob Graff,  
7 commenting on 180218.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
10 morning.

11 MR. GRAFF: Good afternoon,  
12 Council President Clarke and members of  
13 Philadelphia City Council. My name is  
14 Robert Graff. I manage the Office of  
15 Energy and Climate Change Initiatives at  
16 the Delaware Valley Regional Planning  
17 Commission. DVRPC serves the City of  
18 Philadelphia and its eight surrounding  
19 Pennsylvania and New Jersey counties.  
20 Councilman Squilla represents the City of  
21 Philadelphia on DVRPC's Board.

22 I'm honored to provide  
23 testimony in favor of Bill 180218, which  
24 discontinues the approval of new reserved  
25 electric vehicle parking spaces on the

2 street in front of electric vehicle  
3 owners' homes and eliminates the existing  
4 spaces by 2033.

5 DVRPC has been involved in  
6 electric vehicle work for the past  
7 decade. In 2012, DVRPC released Ready to  
8 Roll, Southeastern Pennsylvania's  
9 regional electric vehicle action plan.  
10 We are currently working with the  
11 researchers at the Plug-In Hybrid and  
12 Electric Vehicle Research Center at  
13 University of California - Davis to  
14 develop tools to help us understand how  
15 electric vehicle ownership and charging  
16 in our region is likely to evolve. I  
17 also serve as DVRPC's representative on  
18 the Drive Electric Pennsylvania  
19 Coalition.

20 For the past year, I served on  
21 the City's Electric Vehicle Policy Task  
22 Force established to develop a long-term  
23 sustainable approach to promote electric  
24 vehicle use in Philadelphia. The Task  
25 Force's policy recommendations released

2 in March include freezing the electric  
3 vehicle parking space program.

4 As part of its EV work, DVRPC  
5 receives detailed registration data from  
6 PennDOT for every vehicle in the five  
7 counties of Southeastern Pennsylvania.  
8 The most recent data we have from  
9 November 2017 shows 733 electric vehicles  
10 in Philadelphia. This bill affects only  
11 the 68 electric vehicles that are parked  
12 and charged on public streets in reserved  
13 overnight curbside parking spaces in  
14 front of their owners' homes. That is,  
15 it affects just 7 percent of the 733  
16 electric vehicles registered in the City.

17 Furthermore, the owners of  
18 those 68 electric vehicles will continue  
19 to be provided reserved overnight parking  
20 on the street in front of their homes  
21 until 2033 as long as they own or lease  
22 an electric vehicle. This seemed fair to  
23 the Task Force members.

24 Note that the City still allows  
25 residents to install curbside EV chargers

2           in front of their homes. However, they  
3           will not be provided with a reserved  
4           spot. EV owners have several charging  
5           choices if they do not have dedicated  
6           off-street parking. Rent a space to park  
7           and charge their electric vehicle, charge  
8           at their place of work or other location  
9           to which they drive regularly or charge  
10          at a public charging station.

11                   The Task Force report  
12           recommends nine strategies to foster  
13           these and other options for EV owners.  
14           OTIS has stated it will actively pursue  
15           these strategies and report regularly on  
16           their implementation status.

17                   Thank you for your attention.  
18           I would be happy to respond to any  
19           questions you might have.

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21           Thank you, sir.

22                   CHIEF CLERK: Bill West,  
23           commenting on 180218.

24                   (Witness approached podium.)

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

2 morning.

3 MR. WEST: Good morning. My  
4 name is Bill West. My colleague Ilene  
5 Wilder and I are Co-Chairs of the Parking  
6 Committee for the Philadelphia Crosstown  
7 Coalition, a group of 32 registered  
8 community organizations from across the  
9 City. Ilene couldn't be here today, but  
10 I am here to urge you to vote in favor of  
11 Bill No. 180218, which addresses the  
12 closing down of the current curbside  
13 charging program for electric vehicles.

14 Ilene and I served as community  
15 members of the City's Electric Vehicle  
16 Policy Task Force, which conducted a  
17 broad inquiry into the potential for  
18 bringing large numbers of electric  
19 vehicles to the City. The report of the  
20 Task Force contains a large number of  
21 recommendations and, frankly, is a very  
22 encouraging document.

23 Although replacing gasoline and  
24 diesel-powered vehicles with electric  
25 vehicles on a one-to-one basis would do

2 nothing to alleviate the problems of  
3 traffic and parking congestion in the  
4 City, it would substantially improve the  
5 quality of the air we breathe and also  
6 give us a quieter city.

7 One of the jobs of the Task  
8 Force was to figure out what to do with  
9 the current electric vehicle parking  
10 space program, which provides residents  
11 with dedicated curbside parking spaces in  
12 front of their homes where they may  
13 install chargers and recharge their  
14 electric vehicles. Although this program  
15 is certainly well-intentioned, there is  
16 simply not enough space on our streets to  
17 accommodate the large number of electric  
18 vehicles that the Task Force envisions.  
19 To use a piece of jargon, the program is  
20 not scalable.

21 In our opinion, Bill 180218  
22 faithfully renders into legislative  
23 language the recommendations of the Task  
24 Force that relate to the current  
25 on-street charging program. I should

2       emphasize that the Task Force reached its  
3       conclusions by consensus. The group  
4       included three private citizens who are  
5       electric vehicle owners.

6                   We think the bill represents  
7       good policy arrived at through a good  
8       procedure. We heartily encourage you to  
9       vote for Bill 180218.

10                   Thank you.

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12       Thank you for your testimony.

13                   CHIEF CLERK: Larry Spector,  
14       commenting on 180218.

15                   (Witness approached podium.)

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
17       morning.

18                   MR. SPECTOR: Thank you,  
19       Council President Clarke, members of City  
20       Council and especially our district -- my  
21       district Councilman Mark Squilla and  
22       Councilman David Oh. My name is Larry  
23       Spector. I appear on behalf of the  
24       Society Hill Civic Association. This is  
25       an association which has 5,000 residents

2 represented who live within boundaries of  
3 Delaware River to 8th Street, from Walnut  
4 to Lombard Street.

5 We strongly support the phasing  
6 out of the current electric vehicle  
7 parking program and the recommendations  
8 that were made by the Task Force. We  
9 think that those recommendations provide  
10 an excellent roadmap for parking for  
11 public electrical vehicle charging  
12 infrastructure.

13 Currently, the curbside  
14 charging stations are not scalable and  
15 they're not even accessible to many  
16 people. So the bill will end the  
17 practice of giving an exclusive parking  
18 space to homeowners who have these  
19 parking permits.

20 Our neighborhood in particular  
21 has a disproportionate number of the  
22 permits that have been issued under these  
23 programs, but the elimination of the  
24 program will end the exclusivity that  
25 homeowners have for the spaces by

2           codifying two-hour parking for all  
3           vehicles between 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.  
4           and allowing electric charging to  
5           continue from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.  
6           still for the homeowners. And the  
7           homeowners will have 15 years during the  
8           sunset phase of this bill to be able to  
9           continue to charge their cars.

10                       The program will stop what we  
11           see as sometimes the ad hoc installation  
12           of these charging stations that take up  
13           valuable places on the public sidewalks  
14           and have even been a tripping hazard for  
15           some residents of Society Hill.

16                       In conclusion, the Society Hill  
17           Civic Association strongly supports the  
18           work, the excellent work, of the Task  
19           Force and its recommendations and the  
20           general direction in which this whole  
21           venture of electric charging of vehicles  
22           is going.

23                       Thank you.

24                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25           Thank you for your testimony.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
6 morning.

7 MS. EVELEV: Thank you for  
8 giving us this opportunity to speak to  
9 you about a critical issue, one that  
10 looms over all of us, the universal peril  
11 of nuclear weapons and what that means  
12 for our children and grandchildren.

13 In our wars, there are -- our  
14 wars are fought differently today. Now  
15 wars since World War II, the casualties  
16 have been 90 percent civilian and 10  
17 percent combatants. Nuclear weapons are  
18 designed for one thing, to wipe out whole  
19 populations, and they would also  
20 dramatically alter the climate in ways so  
21 catastrophic that they are, frankly,  
22 beyond imagining.

23 This issue is not new to  
24 Philadelphia, and I wish to speak to the  
25 local precedence. Few of you may recall

2 Philadelphia was an active center with  
3 its Quaker history of getting a nuclear  
4 freeze referendum on the ballot  
5 nationally. The referendum called for  
6 the United States and Russia, the only  
7 nuclear powers at that time, to retain  
8 existing nuclear parity, halt the arms  
9 race, and open the way for eventual  
10 elimination of all nuclear weapons. The  
11 nuclear freeze referendum of 1982 was the  
12 largest referendum on a single issue in  
13 United States history and won by a  
14 landslide. It was on the ballot in 38  
15 cities, and I'm proud to say that  
16 Philadelphia was one of them and that we  
17 voted three to one for the referendum.

18 That was yesterday. Today nine  
19 nations have nuclear weapons, with the  
20 U.S. and Russia having 90 percent of  
21 them. The threat has grown with  
22 proliferation and with irresponsible and  
23 unpredictable leadership.

24 The Bulletin of the Atomic  
25 Scientists has a clock that measures how

2 close we are to nuclear war. The hands  
3 are now two minutes to midnight. They  
4 have only been this close once before,  
5 during the confrontation with the Soviet  
6 Union drawing the Cuban missile crisis.

7 Today we are here to plead for  
8 our grandchildren and children and to our  
9 City Council to follow these precedences  
10 and make Philadelphia again a leader by  
11 exerting pressure on our Congressmen and  
12 Senators to co-sponsor companion  
13 legislation now languishing in committee  
14 that prohibits the President from  
15 launching a first strike use of nuclear  
16 weapons without a declaration of war by  
17 Congress.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Jean Haskell,  
22 commenting on 180322.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MS. HASKELL: We thank you.

25 The Granny Peace Brigade thanks

2 Councilmember Helen Gym and Derek Green  
3 for introducing Resolution 180322. We  
4 also wish to thank the co-sponsors,  
5 Councilmember Parker, Councilmember  
6 Reynolds Brown, and Councilmember  
7 Greenlee, and we want to give a big  
8 shout-out to Jordan Kanell, who seems to  
9 be a magician at making things happen.

10 It means a lot to us that City  
11 Councilmembers are willing to stand with  
12 us as we call on our city to continue its  
13 precedent-setting stand to call on  
14 Congress and pass the bills that will  
15 prevent an unpredictable President from  
16 taking unilateral action with a nuclear  
17 weapon.

18 We all know the horror to  
19 humans and the environment that is caused  
20 by the impact of a nuclear strike. We  
21 know less about the dollars and cents  
22 cost of such a strike. Nuclear weapons  
23 have two basic parts, the warhead, or  
24 bomb, and the delivery system. One  
25 typical nuclear warhead may cost as much

2 as \$53 million. Delivery system is more  
3 expensive. Depending on whether it goes  
4 by land or by submarine, it can cost as  
5 much as \$200 million. Do the math. If  
6 one nuclear weapon were to be launched,  
7 the approximate cost could be as much as  
8 \$253 million.

9 Everyone in this room could  
10 come up with a long list of things our  
11 city could do with even one-third of \$253  
12 million. Thus, while some of you may  
13 think that the possible launch of a  
14 nuclear first strike is not relevant to  
15 our city, the financial implications are  
16 clear. The money could be better spent  
17 on schools, housing, infrastructure,  
18 healthcare, efforts to fight poverty, as  
19 well as those other items you all have on  
20 your wish list.

21 According to the Union of  
22 Concerned Scientists, from where my  
23 figures come, the United States will  
24 spend some \$250 billion on new nuclear  
25 warheads and delivery systems in the next

2 few decades. That is roughly equal to 30  
3 years of federal funding for Head Start  
4 children.

5 We hope you agree. It is time  
6 for our city to call on Congress to act.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
11 on one second, Mr. Decker.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
13 O'Neill.

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
15 Mr. President. I ask permission to leave  
16 the Chamber. I won't be back for the  
17 meeting. I have Council business in my  
18 district, and I'd like to be voting aye  
19 on all bills and resolutions except for  
20 Resolution 180322.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman. The record shall  
24 reflect that.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Margarita Padin,

2 commenting on 180352 and 170678.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MS. PADIN: Good morning. I'm  
5 here to support Councilmember Reynolds  
6 Brown's 180352 urging Pennsylvania House  
7 of Representatives to reject House Bills  
8 1659 and 2138, which would create  
9 stringent employment requirements for  
10 Pennsylvanians using SNAP and Medicaid  
11 benefits. Thank you.

12 As a recipient of SNAP and  
13 Medicaid benefits and right now it's  
14 almost humanely impossible to comply with  
15 the present requirements, I don't see how  
16 it could be any more stringent. You  
17 know, when you receive these benefits,  
18 you've got two weeks to go to a  
19 CareerLink and apply and receive  
20 employment with certain vendors that are  
21 contracted with the CareerLink, and if  
22 you don't, you've got to do compulsory  
23 volunteer work, and when you're doing  
24 that, how can you pursue your employment  
25 if your eight hours a day are spent doing

2       volunteer work? And also if you're a  
3       union member, you can't work for the  
4       people that the CareerLink has their  
5       contracts with to send you to majority  
6       poverty wages because you have to work  
7       with contractors that are signatory to  
8       your union, and the only way for you to  
9       get these jobs is to be out there looking  
10      for work.

11                    So I don't see how it humanly  
12      would be possible to make these  
13      requirements any more stringent. So  
14      thank you very much.

15                    I'm also here in support of  
16      Councilmember Maria Quinones-Sanchez's  
17      170678. As a resident of Philadelphia, I  
18      appreciate any efforts for affordable  
19      housing. The majority of people that  
20      work really hard making poverty wages  
21      need a place to live. And I live in a  
22      neighborhood where we have affordable  
23      housing and we also have the highest  
24      rising market-rate housing in the area,  
25      so it seems to be able to co-exist, but

2 working people need a place to live.

3 Thank you, Maria.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, could  
7 you read the name of our next speaker,  
8 please.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
10 commenting on 180303, 180353, and 180004.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. DANIHEL: This is an  
13 official decree of the people in writ of  
14 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,  
15 requires immediate action and remedy.  
16 Every week Council, Mayor, and others  
17 transfer private property to the  
18 government, probably illegally.

19 Last week Councilman Domb spoke  
20 on the responsibility to pay property  
21 taxes. He stated that the government  
22 cannot pay its bills without people  
23 performing their obligation to pay their  
24 taxes.

25 What about the government

2 obligation to pay just compensation and  
3 expenses for my stolen home? Since all  
4 were not paid with the federal HUD  
5 monies, how can Mayor, Council preach to  
6 Starbucks that officials are committed to  
7 equity and fairness? Constitution and  
8 laws require compensation that a  
9 well-informed owner would accept as well  
10 as reimbursed losses and expenses to be  
11 paid.

12 Why has no official demanded  
13 investigation and prosecution of how my  
14 home was stolen without compensation, due  
15 process or Seventh Amendment trial by  
16 jury in a clear RICO-style conspiracy to  
17 deny rights?

18 The constitutions require  
19 immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
20 breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
21 duty. Your oath of office requires you  
22 to act or face prison.

23 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
24 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
25 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1

1           4/19/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
3           712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
4           SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
5           violated.

6                        I call for the federal and  
7           Commonwealth governments to perform their  
8           constitutional obligations to investigate  
9           and prosecute all involved in the theft  
10          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
11          1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of  
12          God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
13          24 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
14          oath-violating, and requires immediate  
15          remedy.

16                       A just government must obey the  
17          rule of law. This color of law  
18          government must have its Charter to  
19          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
20          compliant government is installed.

21                       Public servants cannot refuse  
22          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
23          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
24          sovereign people require oath,  
25          Constitution, and laws be enforced. Jail

1           4/19/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           is required for all who violate oath,  
3           Constitution or law.

4                     I remind Council, it takes a  
5           lot of cooperation to create and allow  
6           monumental corruption.

7                     COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.  
8                     Clerk, would you please read  
9           the name for the next testimony, please.

10                    CHIEF CLERK: Liam Dougherty.  
11                    (Witness approached podium.)

12                    MR. DOUGHERTY: Hello,  
13           Councilmembers. Thank you for letting me  
14           speak. I'm here to show my support for  
15           the unfair rental practices bill  
16           introduced by Councilmembers Jones,  
17           Parker, and Gym.

18                    I have a disability and I work  
19           at Liberty Resources. We are a center  
20           for independent living, and I want to say  
21           on behalf of the disability community,  
22           just cause eviction legislation is  
23           essential for us. Not only is it sort of  
24           unbelievable that this city doesn't have  
25           such legislation right now, it takes

2 people with disabilities months,  
3 sometimes years, to find housing, and we  
4 cannot afford to be on our own and live  
5 without.

6 Right now I'm -- in my building  
7 I rent, and my wife is eight months  
8 pregnant, and our building is being sold  
9 to another landlord. And the way things  
10 are right now, they could very easily not  
11 accept my new lease and I would be trying  
12 to look for a new place to live with a  
13 four-month-old baby, and that's not  
14 something I can do. It took me about a  
15 year -- six months to a year to find this  
16 current apartment that I'm in.

17 So, again, thank you for  
18 hearing me and for introducing this bill,  
19 and I appreciate the time.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Samantha Petty,  
24 commenting on 170854.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2 MS. PETTY: Hello. Thank you  
3 for letting me speak today. I'm here  
4 about the same bill as the last speaker,  
5 requiring good cause for certain  
6 residential evictions and to provide a  
7 first option for existing tenants to  
8 renew a lease.

9 I'd first like to thank City  
10 Council for its current focus on  
11 affordable housing and eviction  
12 prevention. There's been a lot of action  
13 around that in a lot of different ways,  
14 and that's very meaningful to the City of  
15 Philadelphia.

16 On this bill specifically, I'm  
17 here as a mom of a medically complex  
18 child. It takes us a very long time to  
19 find housing that's on one floor and has  
20 an elevator for my child's wheelchair and  
21 medical equipment.

22 I do not personally fear  
23 eviction. I am quite economically  
24 stable. I have a lot of educational  
25 access and white privilege that allows me

2 to not let my landlord intimidate me when  
3 I ask for reasonable accommodations for  
4 my child, but I'd like to represent my  
5 child's classmates today and their  
6 families who do not have the same access  
7 that I do and are often intimidated by  
8 their landlords and evicted without any  
9 cause given.

10 Eviction in our city affects  
11 one out of 14 Philadelphia renters. I  
12 believe it's a poverty issue because it  
13 causes poverty. It's not just a symptom  
14 of not being able to pay your rent. It's  
15 a fair housing issue, because it  
16 disproportionately affects women of color  
17 and children, and those are classes  
18 protected under fair housing law.

19 It's also a big public health  
20 issue for children like mine and also  
21 other children who are moved into  
22 substandard housing when their parents  
23 have evictions on their record, and  
24 reasonable landlords do not want to rent  
25 to people with recent evictions on their

2 record.

3 I'm really proud of our efforts  
4 in early education. I work in that  
5 sector as a peer specialist for other  
6 parents of kids with disabilities, and I  
7 can't tell you how many kids we lose  
8 track of every week because their parents  
9 are evicted and we can't give them  
10 services because we can't find them again  
11 because evictions happen so quickly, the  
12 parents don't have time to contact us and  
13 set up a new place for us to meet their  
14 kids and provide services in their homes.

15 We are facing cuts federally  
16 for protections to fair housing. The  
17 most recent HUD budget no longer allows  
18 us to use federal dollars to  
19 affirmatively further fair housing. This  
20 is a very important part of our job as a  
21 city, and I think we can step up locally,  
22 and passing good cause evictions means  
23 that we will protect fair housing for our  
24 citizens.

25 And, finally, I think good

2           policy supports other existing policy and  
3           that this change will support the  
4           \$500,000 budget recently won by Council  
5           for eviction court and our beverage tax  
6           that helps with early education in  
7           keeping our kids stable and educated.

8                         Thank you very much.

9                         (Applause.)

10                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you for your testimony.

12                        CHIEF CLERK:   Ikey Raw,  
13           commenting on 170854.

14                        (Witness approached podium.)

15                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   Good  
16           morning.

17                        MR. RAW:   Good morning.   How  
18           you doing, Councilman Clarke?   Ladies and  
19           gentlemen, I'm here to speak on behalf of  
20           not only the family of David Jones, also  
21           the family of all children murdered in  
22           the streets of Philadelphia.

23                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24           Ikey?

25                        MR. RAW:   Starbucks is not more

2 dangerous than a racist police officer.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Mr. Raw?

5 (Witness speaking without  
6 microphone.)

11 treatment possible" allowed by law and  
12 establishing a fund to be used for their  
13 religious, educational, vocational and  
14 social guidance, introduced by Councilman  
15 Oh.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17 Chair again recognizes Councilman Oh.

18 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you.  
19 With appreciation to Councilwoman Jannie  
20 Blackwell, I move for the adoption of the  
21 resolution.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
24 been moved and properly seconded.

25 All those in favor say aye.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7 ayes have it. That resolution is  
8 adopted.

9 CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
10 other resolutions on the Final Passage  
11 Calendar, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13 Thank you very much.

14 Are there any speeches on the  
15 behalf of the minority?

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
17 Oh.

18 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
19 much, Council President. There have been  
20 a lot of issues that have faced the City,  
21 and fortunately the media has reported on  
22 it, and I appreciate all the  
23 Councilmembers who have been very  
24 actively engaged.

25 I would like to talk about

2           something, however, that I came across  
3           last week. While I was away, a woman  
4           came and left me a booklet, and it was  
5           about her son. His name is Eric Mann.  
6           And I agreed to meet her, but she wanted  
7           me to read the booklet, and I did read  
8           the booklet, and it reminded me of  
9           something that I had experienced many  
10          years ago as an attorney and, that is,  
11          when I came across Pennsylvania's Post  
12          Conviction Relief Act. I'd like to talk  
13          a little bit about it because I will  
14          introduce a resolution next week calling  
15          upon the State Legislature to amend and  
16          reform this Act. I have asked my staff  
17          to contact Harrisburg. I will go visit  
18          them.

19                 The first page of the book that  
20          she left me, which is evidence of proof  
21          of incidence, is an opinion written by  
22          Justice James Fitzgerald, who was  
23          specially assigned to Superior Court, and  
24          he wrote in concurrence or agreement with  
25          the decision that the law was being

2 followed, but this is what he said. He  
3 said, I write separately only to express  
4 my utmost displeasure with the Post  
5 Conviction Relief Act's failure to  
6 facilitate justice in this case, where it  
7 is clear to all that it is likely that an  
8 innocent man sits behind bars for no  
9 better reason than a poorly conceived  
10 statute. No system of criminal justice  
11 is perfect. However, a system of  
12 criminal justice that prevents the  
13 correction of obvious errors is easily  
14 improved, if only the Legislature could  
15 see fit to do it.

16 This case, in summary, is about  
17 a man who was accused of shooting from a  
18 terrace another man. A witness, a single  
19 witness, said he saw him from a terrace  
20 shoot downward and kill the man. At the  
21 hearing, there were three alibi witnesses  
22 sitting in court, but the attorney never  
23 called them to testify. And later, many  
24 years later after the conviction, it was  
25 found that likely the defense attorney

2           never filed notice to the prosecution  
3           that they had an alibi witness and,  
4           therefore, could not present the alibi  
5           witness. Since that time, the single  
6           eyewitness recanted, saying that he did  
7           not tell the truth.

8                         But the most critical thing for  
9           me is scientific evidence that two  
10          different weapons were used, a .22  
11          caliber weapon and a .32 caliber weapon,  
12          firing horizontally and from down to up.  
13          It would be scientifically impossible for  
14          the person on the terrace to have shot  
15          the bullets that killed this person.

16                         He has spent 26 years in jail.

17                         Here is the problem with  
18          Pennsylvania's Post Conviction Relief  
19          Act, and I did run into this decades ago,  
20          and fortunately for the person I  
21          represented in a very long process  
22          through a writ of habeas corpus in the  
23          Federal Court, the evidence against him  
24          was found to be unreliable and he was set  
25          free.

2           The problem is that once a  
3 person is found guilty in Pennsylvania  
4 and the appeals are exhausted, a  
5 defendant may file post-conviction  
6 relief, and there are limited grounds.  
7 Ineffective assistance of counsel is one.  
8 Newly discovered evidence is the other.  
9 However, you have to file within a year,  
10 and if you have newly discovered  
11 evidence, you have to file within 60 days  
12 of the knowledge of that evidence. That  
13 may sound simple enough, but in  
14 Pennsylvania, the standards are too  
15 strict. They're too hard. It's hard to  
16 overcome these standards, because for  
17 ineffective assistance of counsel, it is  
18 different than medical malpractice. The  
19 standard is that no competent attorney  
20 would have done what the attorney did in  
21 either -- particularly excluding or not  
22 including evidence of innocence, and that  
23 evidence has to be of a certain category  
24 and, therefore, if an attorney committed  
25 malpractice, what I would say is

2 malpractice, that will not provide the  
3 defendant an opportunity to have his case  
4 heard or the evidence heard.

5           The other issue is that in  
6 Pennsylvania, newly discovered evidence  
7 is not evidence that you just find. It's  
8 evidence that you should have found,  
9 could have found, but didn't find. And  
10 in Pennsylvania, no matter how poorly  
11 represented you are, how illogically you  
12 are represented, how terribly you're  
13 represented, as long as your lawyer told  
14 you what he was going to do -- and most  
15 people rely on their lawyers -- you don't  
16 have an appealable basis.

17           I think that the Pennsylvania  
18 Post Conviction Relief Act needs to be  
19 amended so that people who have evidence,  
20 newly discovered evidence, scientific  
21 evidence, recanting of evidence, evidence  
22 of attorney malpractice, can appeal and  
23 present their evidence, because the way  
24 it is right now, it is just nearly  
25 impossible in our state.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 Speeches on behalf of the  
6 majority?

7 The Chair recognizes  
8 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
10 Mr. President. I have one announcement  
11 and remarks I wish to make.

12 First, my favorite writer, Maya  
13 Angelou, once remarked, quote, Success is  
14 loving life and daring to live it.

15 I rise this morning to inform  
16 my colleagues and staff that Haniyyah  
17 Sharpe-Brown for the last two years has  
18 loved her work in our office, but has  
19 dared to live life and move on. She's  
20 been offered -- made an offer she cannot  
21 refuse, a career opportunity she cannot  
22 refuse, and has chosen to move on and  
23 make another corner of the world  
24 distinctively hers.

25 So I want all to join me in

2           saying thank you to Haniyyah  
3           Sharpe-Brown.

4                        (Appause.)

5                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Secondly,  
6           Mr. President, on a personal but also a  
7           very professional note, Councilman Goode  
8           has always been my leader, my teacher, my  
9           hero when it comes to any and all issues  
10          that remotely touch the song known as  
11          diversity and inclusion.

12                      This morning I, along with  
13          Councilman Kenyatta Johnson and Chair of  
14          the Committee on Labor and Civil Service,  
15          Councilwoman Cherelle Parker, coupled  
16          with co-sponsorship by members Gym and  
17          Green, have offered a resolution, because  
18          given the song we've been singing for the  
19          last 20-plus years, diversity and  
20          inclusion is still not well in the City  
21          of Philadelphia.

22                      The expulsion, arrest, and  
23          detainment of two African American men at  
24          Starbucks in Philadelphia last week never  
25          should have happened. We know that

2       discrimination amongst black and brown  
3       people, women happens all the time. It  
4       happens because this country suffers from  
5       a history of inequality and racism, from  
6       slavery to Jim Crow. It happens because  
7       the biases and stereotypes created in our  
8       history, like the movie Birth of a  
9       Nation, still live with us today  
10      profoundly. It is because of this  
11      history that we end up with a  
12      neighborhood where African Americans are  
13      3 percent of the residents. Let me  
14      repeat that. African Americans are 3  
15      percent of the residents, yet 67 percent  
16      of the police stop and frisk, according  
17      to the ACLU.

18                 So I join many across the City  
19      and, quite frankly, around the country,  
20      but locally a number of institutions,  
21      including our own City of Philadelphia  
22      and Starbucks and other companies, who  
23      take full responsibility to not only  
24      acknowledge the power of these biases and  
25      stereotypes but, more importantly, to

2           work actively through equitable hiring  
3           and advancement practices to modernize  
4           policies and procedures. We need to look  
5           at how well we're not doing in this area.

6                        So clearly it is now time for  
7           City Council and the City of Philadelphia  
8           to again lead by example by doing two  
9           things. Let's first evaluate best  
10          practices that work, look to see how  
11          effective they are with regards to  
12          training in the area of implicit bias and  
13          racial equity, and then look to see what  
14          we can adopt as a city so that we can  
15          lead by example from this day going  
16          forward.

17                        Thank you, Mr. President.

18                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19           Thank you, Councilwoman.

20                        The Chair recognizes Councilman  
21           Johnson.

22                        COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
23           Council President. And I want to also  
24           thank my colleague Councilwoman Blondell  
25           Reynolds Brown for staying on the case

2           and stepping up to the plate with my  
3           other fellow Councilmembers with me last  
4           week in the Second Councilmanic District  
5           as we address the issue of racial  
6           profiling in the Starbucks cafe at 18th  
7           and Spruce Streets.

8                       By this point, I think we're  
9           all aware of the racial profiling  
10          incident that took place last week where  
11          two African American young men at the  
12          Starbucks located at 18th and Spruce  
13          Streets were arrested. If you had told  
14          me a week ago I'd meet the founder of  
15          Starbucks this week as a result of racial  
16          profiling in the Second Councilmanic  
17          District, I probably wouldn't have  
18          believed you. Nevertheless, here we are.

19                      Privately I met with members of  
20          the local Starbucks team, including the  
21          founder of the company, Howard Schultz,  
22          to address the issues and concerns  
23          regarding to my constituents. I have to  
24          personally commend their executives for  
25          showing up in person and listening to

2           what people have to say and taking steps  
3           pretty immediately to address racial  
4           profiling in their stores.

5                     My fellow Councilmembers and  
6           myself and advocates stood outside on the  
7           corner of 18th and Spruce Streets and  
8           demanded an apology and also expected --  
9           and also addressed the issue of, beyond  
10          just an apology, for Starbucks to take  
11          seriously by addressing the issue of  
12          sensitivity training in their stores,  
13          because we have come to learn that this  
14          is not an isolated incident only in the  
15          City of Philadelphia. In the last few  
16          days, the company has announced it will  
17          close 8,000 stores on the afternoon of  
18          May the 29th for what they call  
19          unconscious bias training.

20                     This is a step in the right  
21          direction in Philadelphia and across the  
22          country, but to me I must personally say  
23          it's not enough. The company has work to  
24          do here in the City of Philadelphia to  
25          regain the trust of customers and restore

2 their brand image it portrays as a  
3 welcoming environment for people to meet  
4 up and hang inside their establishment.

5 The two young men affected,  
6 Rashon Nelson and Donte Robinson, have  
7 spoken out publicly for the first time  
8 this morning offering their perspective  
9 on the event and also asking to be a part  
10 of clear policy changes. Those two young  
11 men have experienced a deep level of  
12 trauma as a result of being arrested for  
13 doing nothing.

14 We will continue to have  
15 conversations with local residents and  
16 the company leadership to see what more  
17 can be done moving forward to ensure all  
18 of our citizens feel welcome in the  
19 Starbucks cafe. We need to be sure that  
20 there are clear policies uniformly  
21 applied across the board for everyone to  
22 adhere to and that employees are not set  
23 up to use their discretion for failure.

24 However, even more, we need to  
25 engage with the Philadelphia Police

2           Department to work to improve community  
3           and police relations. Most of you know  
4           that police have a tremendous amount of  
5           discretion and have the opportunity to  
6           make decisions on the drop of a dime  
7           whether they would like to arrest someone  
8           or not. You can look on social media on  
9           any given day at any given time and see  
10          officers engaged in their level of  
11          discretion when it comes to if they would  
12          like to arrest someone or not regarding  
13          to the circumstances of the issue at  
14          hand.

15                    I will be meeting with  
16          Commissioner Ross to address the  
17          Philadelphia Police Department's policies  
18          regarding rules of engagement as well as  
19          when is discretion used and how is that  
20          discretion used, and also looking at the  
21          issue of racial profiling, particularly  
22          in the Second Councilmanic District, as  
23          the figures that were released by ACLU  
24          were just mentioned by my colleague  
25          Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown.

2           I want to thank the customers  
3 and advocates who documented this  
4 incident and brought national media  
5 attention to this issue. As a city,  
6 we're in a unique position now that we  
7 weren't in last week to have a real  
8 conversation and open up a dialogue about  
9 racial profiling in our city and what it  
10 looks like in 2018. There's an  
11 international spotlight on Philadelphia  
12 right now documenting how we handle this,  
13 whether we like it or not, and on our  
14 Police Department and the Starbucks  
15 corporation telling the story of race  
16 relations in America. Hopefully we can  
17 use it as a platform where we want to  
18 continue to advocate for a better way of  
19 handling situations in public and private  
20 spaces and show the world how  
21 Philadelphia will go about implementing  
22 real change and making progress as it  
23 relates to race relations.

24           I am encouraged by the positive  
25 steps we're taking right now, and they

2           are significant, but as I mentioned  
3           before, it's not enough.

4                     Again, I want to thank my  
5           colleagues for over the last few weeks  
6           and over this last week just being  
7           supportive and having the dialogue and  
8           conversing with me about the various ways  
9           in approaching this issue, and Council  
10          President, thank you for your time.

11                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12          Thank you, Councilman.

13                    The Chair recognizes  
14          Councilwoman Blackwell.

15                    COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
16          you, Mr. President. Let me say that I am  
17          proud of and I certainly agree with  
18          Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown and  
19          Councilman Kenyatta Johnson.

20                    Let me also say that I want to  
21          thank and agree with Councilman Oh about  
22          what he's saying, and we're proud to  
23          support anything we can do to support him  
24          in what he says about making the law  
25          fairer for people who have been

2           incarcerated.

3                         Finally, I wanted to say to all  
4           those who listen, please make sure that  
5           April -- the end of April is coming soon  
6           on our parking amnesty program. Please  
7           make sure you take advantage of it. We  
8           have already brought in \$1,430,295 with  
9           cash payments and payment plans. We  
10          brought that into the City with this  
11          amnesty plan. So please, John and Jane  
12          Q. Public, please come forward, take  
13          advantage of this, because the end of  
14          April is coming soon. We said they  
15          should extend it another 30 days, but of  
16          course we can't get that. We did try.  
17          So do what you can to let your people  
18          know time is running short. And we're so  
19          happy. People didn't agree with this,  
20          but bringing in \$1 and a half million  
21          already certainly makes a big difference.

22                         Thank you, Mr. President.

23                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24           Thank you, Councilwoman.

25                         The Chair recognizes

3                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
4           you. I want to remind folks that we have  
5           an L&I hearing scheduled for 1:00. We  
6           will delay that to 1:15 given where we  
7           are right now.

8                   It's important to note the  
9           intersectionality of some of the issues  
10          that we talk about, and I definitely want  
11          to join Councilwoman Reynolds Brown in  
12          speaking of the work that Wilson Goode  
13          did here in Council around inclusion and  
14          how all these things come together.

15                  I personally want to thank you,  
16          Council President, for the RFP on the OPA  
17          assessments. As we're in the middle of  
18          this budget discussion, it's very  
19          important definitely as Chair of  
20          Appropriations that we really demonstrate  
21          to folks that we're being good stewards  
22          of their money.

23                  Last year I introduced a bill  
24          to review the state code and the matrix  
25          by which assessments are conducted in the

2           City of Philadelphia, and the law clearly  
3           stipulates that we cannot use unrealized  
4           value of abatements so that we don't  
5           overvalue, overassess, and overburden  
6           longtime residents. Last week Councilman  
7           Johnson introduced a resolution, and  
8           we'll work jointly on that public  
9           discussion that's so very important, and  
10          clearly your RFP is complementary to that  
11          work.

12                        Today, along with Councilman  
13          Johnson and Councilman Green,  
14          Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman Jones,  
15          Councilwoman Bass, and Reynolds Brown, we  
16          are calling for another public discussion  
17          that we believe is extremely timely about  
18          our capital and professional contracting  
19          for the City of Philadelphia, not only in  
20          the General Fund but also in our  
21          enterprise funds.

22                        In our public discussions over  
23          the last couple of weeks, it's alarming  
24          that we don't have articulated standards  
25          and that departments have a lot of

2       discretion and individually develop RFPs,  
3       how they award contracts, whether it's  
4       the lowest responsible bidder, best value  
5       as it gets incorporated, but the level of  
6       discretion is concerning.

7           It's further alarming that our  
8       numbers are decreasing given the Mayor's  
9       public commitment to inclusion and  
10      Council's work around this issue. That's  
11      why I think it's necessary for us to have  
12      a very public discussion and develop  
13      standards that hold contractors and  
14      vendors responsible to meet their  
15      participation goals. Ultimately if we  
16      don't debar and fire people, they're not  
17      going to take us serious. But, more  
18      importantly, that we hold the departments  
19      responsible to reach the goals, because  
20      we are talking about a five-year \$10.8  
21      billion capital fund, and when you look  
22      at our enterprise funds such as the Water  
23      Department at \$4.8 billion, we got to  
24      show people, not just tell people, that  
25      we're being responsible, and I look

2 forward to that public discussion as  
3 we've always had in Council to bring  
4 added value and added discussion within  
5 the Administration and Council on these  
6 important issues.

7           Thank you, Council President.

8           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you, Councilwoman.

10           The Chair recognizes  
11 Councilwoman Bass.

12           COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
13 Mr. President. I just want to take a  
14 moment to invite everyone over to the  
15 Caucus Room. I know we have a lot  
16 happening today after session, but I  
17 wanted to invite everyone over to the  
18 Caucus Room immediately after session for  
19 a lunch briefing on Community  
20 HealthChoices. This is Pennsylvania's  
21 new mandatory managed care program for  
22 individuals who are eligible for both  
23 medical assistance and Medicare, older  
24 adults and individuals with physical  
25 disabilities.

2           This program has been rolling  
3 out across the state since the beginning  
4 of this year and will go into effect in  
5 Philadelphia next January, and it's going  
6 to have a significant impact. It's going  
7 to impact thousands of our residents,  
8 many of whom may either be unaware of the  
9 change or have concerns about these  
10 changes and what it can mean for their  
11 healthcare.

12           So we certainly hope folks can  
13 come over after the session and get some  
14 valuable information that can be shared  
15 with all of our constituents.

16           Thank you, Mr. President.

17           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18           Thank you, Councilwoman.

19           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
20 Domb.

21           COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
22 Council President. This week we  
23 remembered the six million Jews killed in  
24 concentration camps during World War II.  
25 My grandfather came here in 1915. He was

2           one of nine. My eight aunts and uncles  
3           were all killed in concentration camps,  
4           so were my great-grandparents, so were  
5           their children, including a two-year-old.  
6           Everyone perished except my grandfather.

7                        No one spoke for them. The  
8           world was silent. No one spoke. I see  
9           what happened this past week in  
10          Philadelphia, and I'm glad that we do  
11          speak for people who need our voice.  
12          That's a good thing.

13                       Thank you.

14                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Thank you, Councilman.

16                       There are no additional  
17          speeches on behalf of the minority and  
18          majority.

19                       And with that, the Chair  
20          recognizes Councilman Greenlee for a  
21          motion to adjourn.

22                       COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
23          you, Mr. President. I move that Council  
24          stand adjourned until Thursday, April  
25          26th, 2018 at 10:00 a.m.
