2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning. We're going to get started.  
4 Thank you. We'll get started if the  
5 members will take their seat and visitors  
6 retire behind the rail. Thank you.

7                   To give our invocation this  
8 morning, the Chair recognizes the  
9 Reverend Clarence Hester, a very good  
10 friend of mine. Pastor Hester used to  
11 drive me around on my first election, had  
12 some very, very spiritual conversations,  
13 and I want to thank you so much, Pastor,  
14 for making sure that you kept me in check  
15 during that particular time.

16                   The Pastor is here today from  
17 Erie Avenue Baptist Church.

18                   Would all members and guests  
19 and visitors please rise.

20                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
21 visitors rise.)

22                   PASTOR HESTER: Giving honor to  
23 God, to you, Mr. President, and to the  
24 members of this Council. We thank God  
25 and President Clarke for this august

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2 honor and privilege to stand before this  
3 prestigious body of servants and lift you  
4 up to an almighty God.

5           Let us pray.

6           Almighty and everlasting God,

6                         Grant to all of us an  
7           unwavering faith and the absolute

10          and the power of an active, even  
11          sanctified goodwill.

12                        Even now, Lord, help them to  
13          seek guidance in all their worthy  
14          pursuits and ever-widened opportunities  
15          for continuing services to you and the  
16          people of Philadelphia. Grant unto this  
17          Council the victory of faith on the  
18          ideals to which we are committed to as a  
19          city.

20                        Grant our city peace,  
21          resources, and provisions as you provide  
22          this body with strength and spiritual  
23          substance, performing with great might  
24          the tasks with which our common lives yet  
25          confront us with. Meet the deeper

20                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21           Thank you very much. Thank you.

22                    Our next order of business is  
23           the approval of the Journal of the  
24           meeting of Thursday, May 3rd, 2018, and  
25           the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
8 Thank you. It has been moved and  
9 properly seconded that the Journal of the  
10 meeting of Thursday, May 3rd, 2018 stand  
11 approved.

12 All those in favor say aye.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
18 ayes have it, and the Journal is

20 The next order of business is

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
24 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
25 majority, there are no requests of leave

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4                   Chair thanks the gentleman.

5                   The Chair now recognizes  
6                   Councilman Oh.

7                   COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
8                   much. On behalf of the minority, there's  
9                   no request for leaves of absence.

10                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
11                  Chair thanks the gentleman.

12                  At this time, I would dispense  
13                  with the regular order of business and I  
14                  would like to welcome and I want to thank  
15                  everyone who has taken time out of their  
16                  busy day to come down to witness their  
17                  government in action. We genuinely  
18                  appreciate you being here. We hope your  
19                  stay here is a knowledgeable one but,  
20                  more importantly, a pleasurable one, so  
21                  much so that you come back again. And,  
22                  again, thank you so much.

23                  At this time, the Chair  
24                  recognizes Councilman Domb, who will  
25                  present a resolution acknowledging and

6                         (Councilmembers and guests  
7           approached podium.)

8                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
9           joining Councilman Domb, we have  
10          Councilman Jones, Councilman Green,  
11          Councilman Oh, Councilman Taubenberger,  
12          Councilman Henon, and Councilwoman  
13          Blondell Reynolds Brown and Councilwoman  
14          Gym.

15                        COUNCILMAN DOMB: Today we're  
16          recognizing Amplify Philly but, more  
17          importantly, we're recognizing the tech  
18          community in Philadelphia, which is our  
19          future. Everyone knows that the economic  
20          job multiplier of tech is five to one,  
21          meaning for every job in tech, we create  
22          five more jobs.

23                        Behind me today are the future  
24          of our city, the people who create jobs  
25          in our city. We need to support them.



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2           They're doing a great job, and they're  
3           making us proud of Philadelphia.

4                        And so in that light, we  
5           recently had an unbelievable event in  
6           Austin, Texas at South by Southwest, and  
7           they had their own house there, and  
8           that's a lot of what this resolution is  
9           about, but also to recognize the great  
10          work of the people in technology, many of  
11          whom are way younger than me, but that's  
12          a good thing.

13                      And, by the way, just for those  
14          of you who haven't heard me say this, one  
15          out of three jobs in tech do not require  
16          a college degree. The average income of  
17          tech is \$39,000 higher. And we need to  
18          start teaching coding and technology  
19          pre-K to 12th grade in our public schools  
20          and charter schools.

21                      So having said, acknowledging  
22          and recognizing Amplify Philly, a  
23          partnership of public and private  
24          organizations, that joined together to  
25          highlight Philadelphia's startup and tech

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2           community and promote Philadelphia as a  
3           hub for startups at the 2018 South by  
4           Southwest Conference & Festival in  
5           Austin, Texas.

6                    COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,  
7           South by Southwest is a conference and  
8           festival that offers the unique  
9           convergence of independent films,  
10          original music and emerging technologies  
11          while fostering creative and personal  
12          growth; and

13                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,  
14          South by Southwest is the launchpad for  
15          new creative content, media  
16          presentations, music showcases and films  
17          and screenings and also provides  
18          conference panel discussions, which  
19          present a forum for learning, business  
20          activities and global networking  
21          opportunities; and

22                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
23          South by Southwest also provides  
24          intellectual and creative intermingling  
25          among industry leaders which helps spark

2           new ideas and carves the path for the  
3           future of each ever-evolving field, even  
4           after the festival is over; and

5                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
6           Amplify Philly's initiative is the result  
7           of a grassroots community-driven effort  
8           which organizes exhibitors and attendees  
9           for a larger Philadelphia impact at what  
10          is considered one of the most influential  
11          technology conferences in the world; and

12                       COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:  
13          Whereas, Amplify Philly, organized by REC  
14          Philly, Witty Gritty and Philly Startup  
15          Leaders, transformed a two-story bar in  
16          Austin, Texas into the "Amplify Philly  
17          House," with two days of Philly-centric  
18          programming; and

19                       COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
20          attending South by Southwest in a  
21          coordinated effort reflects the growing  
22          tech scene in Philadelphia and showcases  
23          our City's dynamic environment for  
24          entrepreneurialism, innovation and  
25          collaboration; and

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2                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, we  
3           in this Council are very proud of this  
4           collaboration of innovators who formed to  
5           bring Greater Philadelphia's story to  
6           South by Southwest which speaks to what a  
7           unique, vibrant, living and breathing  
8           technology community we have; now,  
9           therefore, be it

10                   COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, that  
11           the Council of the City of Philadelphia,  
12           hereby acknowledges and recognizes  
13           Amplify Philly, a partnership of public  
14           and private organizations, that joined  
15           together to highlight Philadelphia's  
16           startup and tech community and promote  
17           Philadelphia as a hub for startups at the  
18           2018 South by Southwest Conference &  
19           Festival in Austin, Texas.

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21           That's it? Oh, I'm sorry. Let's give a  
22           hand.

23                   (Applause.)

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
25           Chair recognizes Mr. Silver for remarks.

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2                   MR. SILVER: Thank you.

3           Appreciate it. I just want to thank the  
4           Council for having us today and Allan  
5           Domb for putting this together. I really  
6           appreciate that.

7                   I just want to reiterate just  
8           something very special that happens when  
9           you bring in the City, Startup PHL, and  
10          corporations, Comcast and Lift Labs, but  
11          then you bring together entrepreneurs and  
12          a diverse startup community and then our  
13          music community and our artists and watch  
14          what happens when we bring all those  
15          people together to say -- to really have  
16          one mission, which is to talk about  
17          Philadelphia and the beautiful growing  
18          communities that are here, and this is  
19          what it's all about right here.

20                   So I just want to thank  
21          everyone that's on the stage and the  
22          City's support, and we're going to  
23          continue doing this and continue growing  
24          this Amplify Philly initiative to  
25          continue talking about Philadelphia's

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2           growing art and tech communities across  
3           the country and across the globe. So  
4           thank you for everyone here and thank you  
5           for having us today.

6                        (Applause.)

7                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Council will be at ease.

9                        (Council at ease.)

10                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you.

12                      At this time, the Chair  
13           recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will  
14           present a resolution celebrating the 70th  
15           Anniversary of the State of Israel.  
16           Would Ms. Robin Schatz and those  
17           accompanying her please join Councilman  
18           Johnson at the podium.

19                      (Councilmembers and guests  
20           approached podium.)

21                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
22           joining Councilman Johnson, we have  
23           Councilwoman Bass, Councilman Oh,  
24           Councilman Jones, Councilman  
25           Taubenberger, and Councilman Domb,

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2           Councilman Squilla, and Councilman Henon.

3                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good  
4 morning, everyone.

5                   Good morning, everyone.

6                   (Good morning.)

7                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Today we  
8 have the privilege of honoring the 70th  
9 Anniversary of the foundation of the  
10 State of Israel, who I've had the  
11 opportunity to visit several summers ago  
12 and it was an eye-opening and  
13 life-changing experience.

14                   Being a christian, I had an  
15 opportunity to visit a variety of sites  
16 and several sites that I learned about as  
17 a young man going to Sunday school, and  
18 as a man of faith, it just encouraged me  
19 to, as my grandmother would say, keep on  
20 keeping on.

21                   And so it's an honor to have  
22 with us today Naomi Adler, who is the CEO  
23 of the Jewish Federation of Greater  
24 Philadelphia, and Mr. Amir Sagie, who is  
25 the Deputy Consul General of Israel in

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2           New York, and hopefully in the near  
3           future we'll advocate and bring back a  
4           consulate here to the City of  
5           Philadelphia.

6                     And so I want to thank all my  
7           colleagues for being up on the stage with  
8           me today. And I also want to make  
9           mention of Councilman Allan Domb, who is  
10          working with my staff as it relates to  
11          the 70th Anniversary and the variety of  
12          different activities that are going to be  
13          taking place throughout the City of  
14          Philadelphia throughout the rest of this  
15          year.

16                     And so the resolution reads:  
17          Celebrating the 70th Anniversary of the  
18          foundation of the State of Israel.

19                     COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, on  
20          the 14th of May, 1948, in Tel Aviv, David  
21          Ben-Gurion declared "the establishment of  
22          the Jewish state and Palestine, to be  
23          called Israel." Ben-Gurion would serve  
24          as the nation's first and longest-serving  
25          prime minister; and



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2                   COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,  
3           Israel's scientific, economic, and  
4           cultural achievements are testament to  
5           the dynamism of the young nation. In  
6           only 70 years, the Israeli economy has  
7           become a leader in technology, medicine,  
8           and agriculture and the nation has  
9           developed a lasting friendship with the  
10          United States based upon shared values  
11          and mutual admiration; and

12                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
13          Philadelphia has been home to a thriving  
14          Jewish community since the late 17th  
15          Century. The community is represented,  
16          in all its diversity, by an array of  
17          organizations including the Jewish  
18          Federation of Greater Philadelphia, the  
19          American Jewish Committee of  
20          Philadelphia/Southern New Jersey, the  
21          Anti-Defamation League of Philadelphia,  
22          and the Israeli-American Council of  
23          Philadelphia; and

24                   Whereas, Philadelphia also has  
25          the distinction of being home to the

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2           National Museum of Jewish American  
3           History, which sits on Philadelphia's  
4           historic Independence Mall. The museum  
5           was founded in 1976 by members of  
6           Congregation Mikveh Israel, which was  
7           founded in 1740 and is the oldest  
8           continuous formal Jewish congregation in  
9           the United States; and

10                    COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
11           since 1966, Tel Aviv and Philadelphia  
12           have been sister cities. They have since  
13           built long-lasting ties to cultural,  
14           political, and educational exchanges.  
15           The cities have come to share  
16           international status as hubs for tourism,  
17           culture, and innovation; and

18                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
19           Mayor Michael Nutter traveled with a  
20           Philadelphia delegation to Tel Aviv in  
21           2013, in partnership with the Jewish  
22           Federation of Greater Philadelphia, to  
23           foster positive relationships with  
24           leadership in Israel and encourage  
25           Israeli investment in Philadelphia. On

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2           that trip, Philadelphia's representatives  
3           met with Israeli President Shimon Peres;  
4           and

5                           COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

6           Whereas, Israel's anniversary celebration  
7           began with a torch-lighting ceremony on  
8           the evening of Wednesday, April the 18th,  
9           and culminated with a public Shabbat  
10          service, altogether comprising 70 total  
11          hours of celebration and festivities.  
12          These included an all-night beach party  
13          along a 70-kilometer stretch of  
14          coastline, as well as festivals in homage  
15          to spontaneous hora dances that filled  
16          the streets after Ben-Gurion declared the  
17          establishment of the state; and

18                           COUNCILMAN JONES: If New York  
19          and Miami had a baby, it would be Tel  
20          Aviv.

21                           Whereas, those celebrations  
22          will also include the world-renowned  
23          Philadelphia Orchestra, which will travel  
24          to Israel in June and play concerts in  
25          Haifa, Tel Aviv, and Jerusalem. The only

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2           major American orchestra to participate  
3           in the anniversary celebrations, the  
4           Orchestra will be accompanied by  
5           acclaimed Israel-born and  
6           Philadelphia-based chef Michael  
7           Solomonov; and

8                        COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
9           over 200,000 people who identify as  
10          Jewish live in the Greater Philadelphia  
11          region and that community will celebrate  
12          the Jewish state's 70th Anniversary with  
13          cultural and philanthropic events  
14          throughout 2018; and

15                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
16          the City of Philadelphia will formally  
17          celebrate Israel's anniversary with a  
18          series of events, including a ceremonial  
19          flag raising on May the 14th, 2018,  
20          outside of City Hall. Consul General  
21          Dani Dayan, Mayor Jim Kenney, members of  
22          Council, and other City officials will  
23          join Naomi Adler, President and CEO of  
24          the Jewish Federation of Greater  
25          Philadelphia, and Philadelphia's Jewish

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2           community in celebration of Israel's  
3           foundation in 1948; now, therefore, be it  
4                       Resolved, by the Council of the  
5           City of Philadelphia, that this body  
6           hereby acknowledges and celebrates the  
7           70th Anniversary of the foundation of the  
8           State of Israel.

9                       We say congratulations.

10                      (Applause.)

11                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
12           the Chair recognizes Ms. Adler for  
13           remarks.

14                      MS. ADLER: Thank you. It is  
15           such an honor to be with you today to  
16           celebrate this special relationship  
17           between Philadelphia and Israel. I'd  
18           personally like to thank resolution  
19           sponsors Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,  
20           Councilman Allan Domb, Councilwoman  
21           Cherelle Parker, Councilman Brian  
22           O'Neill, Councilman David Oh, and of  
23           course all members of City Council for  
24           adding their signatures.

25                      I am so proud to have the

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2 opportunity to formally recognize the  
3 strong bonds Philadelphia shares with  
4 Israel. Business-to-business  
5 partnerships are flourishing, and we  
6 continue to work together to share best  
7 practices on security, technology, and of  
8 course infrastructure. How wonderful it  
9 is to have a high tech day and have the  
10 discussion about Israel today.

11 Philadelphia's sister city  
12 relationship with Tel Aviv unites two  
13 cities that are both emerging as global  
14 hubs of leadership and innovation and  
15 education, and both cities share an  
16 allegiance to the principles of brotherly  
17 and sisterly love, a heartfelt commitment  
18 to celebrating diversity, to upholding  
19 LGBTQ and gender equality, and protecting  
20 and empowering our communities' most  
21 vulnerable neighbors.

22 This resolution means so much  
23 to us at the Jewish Federation of Greater  
24 Philadelphia. At the Jewish Federation  
25 we serve vulnerable populations here in

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2           Philadelphia and across the world. We  
3           inspire community engagement and to  
4           support Jewish life and learning. We are  
5           so grateful that the City of Philadelphia  
6           has always shown tremendous support for  
7           our priorities as well as our local  
8           Jewish communities. That's why it's so  
9           wonderful to be here today to join  
10          together in celebration of Philadelphia's  
11          Jewish population and those who are with  
12          them and share in our mutual love and  
13          dedication to the Jewish homeland of  
14          Israel.

15                    If you are looking for more  
16          ways to celebrate Israel, we have plenty  
17          of local opportunities coming up. Next  
18          Monday please all join us on May 14 as we  
19          once again come together at City Hall  
20          with Mayor Kenney for the City of  
21          Philadelphia's first-ever raising of the  
22          Israeli flag over Philadelphia. This is  
23          a historic moment. I hope all of you  
24          will join us for this special ceremony,  
25          which will start at 1:00 p.m.

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2                   Also we are joining with the  
3 Citizens Diplomacy International to  
4 celebrate our sister city relationship  
5 with Tel Aviv at, where else, Sister  
6 Cities Park. From June 5th to June 28th  
7 the park will feature Humans of Tel Aviv,  
8 a public art exhibition that celebrates  
9 Tel Aviv's diversity and vitality.

10                   Thank you again for joining  
11 Philadelphia's Jewish community to  
12 celebrate this momentous moment of  
13 Israel's 70th anniversary. We hope you  
14 will help us keep the celebration going  
15 at many of the events to come.

16                   Thank you.

17                   (Applause.)

18                   MR. SAGIE: Good morning all,  
19 your Honorable President Clarke, members  
20 of Council Johnson and all members of  
21 Council that co-sponsored this amazing  
22 resolution. I'm extremely honored and  
23 privileged to be here and bring greetings  
24 from the eternal capital of the Jewish  
25 people, Jerusalem, our capital, and also

2           from Tel Aviv, a very nice city as well.  
3           And it really gives me a great honor to  
4           be here and represent the State of Israel  
5           on this very, very festivity day and to  
6           thank all of you for bringing this today  
7           and hosting us today here at this  
8           Chambers.

9                        I just want to share a small  
10          story with you. In the heart of  
11          Jerusalem, in the heart of our capital,  
12          there's a very interesting park called  
13          the Liberty Bell Park, and I grew up in  
14          that city knowing that there is a Liberty  
15          Park in the center of Jerusalem, and I  
16          never dreamt that those days when I was  
17          playing at that park that I would be  
18          standing here in the actual place where  
19          the Liberty Bell is and bring greetings  
20          from the people of Israel. So thank you  
21          all.

22                       Israel is extremely proud to be  
23          70 years old. We've done a lot. We've  
24          achieved a lot, but this has not been  
25          possible without the amazing help of the

2           Jewish community of the United States,  
3           the people of the United States, and the  
4           people of Philadelphia as well.

5                        So thank you all for everything  
6           you've done and you will do for us. And  
7           we are there to -- as we heard in the  
8           resolution, we are protecting the same  
9           values. We are sharing the same  
10          ideologies and ideas, and we'll continue  
11          this amazing relationship for another 70  
12          years. So thank you all, and have a  
13          great day.

14                        (Applause.)

4                         (Councilmembers and guests  
5           approached podium.)

6                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
7           joining the Councilwoman, we have  
8           Councilman Green, Councilman Oh,  
9           Councilman Jones, Councilwoman Gym,  
10          Councilman Taubenberger, and Councilwoman  
11          Parker and Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

12                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:   Thank  
13          you, Mr. President.   In addition to all  
14          of those who co-sponsored it who are  
15          here with me --

16                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17          Councilwoman, hold on a second.

18                        Folks, could we have a little  
19          quiet, please.   Thank you.

20                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:   Thank  
21          you, Mr. President.

22                        We thank all those who  
23          co-sponsored it, and of course all  
24          members signed it.   A special thanks to  
25          Councilman Oh, who agreed to yield to me

4                     Thank you, Councilman.

5                     Resolution recognizing and  
6           honoring Dr. Stephen S. Tang for his work

9           innovation in the City of Philadelphia.

10                    Let me say we're extremely  
11           grateful for all that he has done. We  
12           were only sorry to hear that he had moved  
13           on.

14                    COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
15           Dr. Stephen S. Tang became President and  
16           CEO of the University City Science  
17           Center, the nation's oldest and largest  
18           urban research park, in 2008. After ten  
19           years as University City Science Center  
20           President and CEO, Dr. Stephen Tang will  
21           move to become the leader of the  
22           Bethlehem, Pennsylvania-based medical  
23           device company OraSure Technologies as  
24           President and CEO; and

25                    COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, a

2           major component of Dr. Tang's legacy at  
3           the Science Center is the physical  
4           expansion of the Science Center Campus.

5           Under his leadership, the Science Center  
6           partnered with Wexford Science and  
7           Technology and grew from 17 acres to 27  
8           acres, rebranding the campus area in  
9           uCity Square; and

10                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
11           Tang's leadership positioned the Science  
12           Center as a leading tech-based economic  
13           development organization in the Greater  
14           Philadelphia region. Tang transformed  
15           the Science Center from a traditional  
16           real estate focused research park to an  
17           innovation hub, connecting innovators  
18           from across the Greater Philadelphia  
19           region. He oversaw the creation of  
20           Quorum, which in almost seven years has  
21           welcomed over 70,000 entrepreneurs,  
22           scientists, investors, and others to over  
23           1,000 programs and events, and the  
24           Science Center has consistently opened up  
25           its doors to the community. I have

3           college workshop fairs with Councilwoman

9           Dr. Tang's work at the Science Center has  
10          advanced Philadelphia as an incubator of  
11          innovative ideas and companies. The QED  
12          Proof-of-Concept funding program for  
13          university technologies with market  
14          potential began in 2009. It has helped  
15          10 technologies obtain licenses, 8  
16          startups form, and 13 projects leverage  
17          \$22 million in additional funding; and

18                       COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
19          in addition to his good work at the  
20          Science Center, Dr. Tang also serves on  
21          several statewide, regional and local  
22          Boards of Directors. Along with  
23          Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf, he  
24          co-chairs the Team Pennsylvania  
25          Foundation, which bridges the gap between

3                       COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

4           Whereas, in September of 2016, Dr. Tang

5           was appointed to the National Advisory

8           as its co-chair through 2018. NACIE

9           members offer recommendations to the

10          United States Secretary of Commerce for

11          policies and programs designed to make

12          U.S. communities, businesses, and the

13          workforce more globally competitive.

14          Previously, Dr. Tang served on the United

15          States Department of Commerce's

16          Innovation Advisory Board; and

17                       COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,

18          Dr. Tang has been a strong voice in

19          support of immigrant entrepreneurs. When

20          programs like the country's H1-B visa

21          came under threat, Tang stood by his

22          conviction that the region should do more

23          to protect immigrants; and

24                       Whereas, Dr. Tang has used his

25          time at the Science Center to make a

2           significant contribution to our  
3           community. He has perhaps been the most  
4           transformational leader in the Science  
5           Center's history and leaves it extremely  
6           well-positioned for decades of successful

9                    COUNCILMAN OH: And I'd like to  
10          say with the permission of Councilwoman  
11          Blackwell that it's been my pleasure to  
12          have the opportunity to work with  
13          Dr. Tang, definitely one of the most  
14          innovative and capable leaders here in  
15          Philadelphia. He has been so impactful  
16          in so many ways. Sorry to see him leave  
17          our city, but I'm sure he will continue  
18          to interact with us. He is very strongly  
19          tied in.

20                   Now, therefore, be it resolved,

12                    DR. TANG: Thank you,  
13           Councilwoman Blackwell. Thank you,  
14           Councilman Oh. Thank you, Councilwoman  
15           Parker, and thank you for all here  
16           present, City Council President Clarke  
17           and all the members of City Council.  
18           It's really truly an honor to be here to  
19           receive this proclamation, and I'm  
20           deeply, deeply humbled.

21                    I have only one regret about  
22           being here today, and that is because the  
23           first time I was scheduled to be here, it  
24           was postponed because of the Eagles

10          Russian immigrants, native of  
11          Philadelphia, pioneer of Philadelphia  
12          television, who once covered the events  
13          here at City Council, and now an  
14          excellent executive coach to many senior  
15          executives in Philadelphia, including the  
16          great pro bono work she does every night  
17          for me to make me a better person.

18                        I also want to thank my  
19          colleagues in the Science Center, Matt  
20          Goldfine and Nadja Bush, for being here  
21          today as well.

22                        The poet John Donne famously  
23          said, No man is an island, and it's true.  
24          It would be impossible for one person  
25          alone to achieve all that you outline in

3 to the talented team of the Science  
4 Center. Thank you for shining a bright

8           This is an official decree of the people  
9           in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as  
10          such, requires immediate action and  
11          remedy.

12                   Every week Council, Mayor, and  
13          others transfer private property to the  
14          government, probably illegally.

15                   Last week in talking to my  
16          public servants, I heard what seems to be  
17          the Philadelphia government motto:  
18          That's above my pay grade. In a city  
19          with do-it-or-die-trying patriots and  
20          heroes like Franklin, Jefferson,  
21          Washington, and others, they never  
22          uttered "that's above my pay grade."

23                   In February, the Art Museum  
24          speech, Jason Kelce never said "Super  
25          Bowl, that's above my pay grade."

2                         Since Philadelphia government  
3           is number one at being full of number two  
4           and steals homes from the most vulnerable  
5           sovereign people, prosecution of oath  
6           violators is clearly required, not the  
7           numerous resolutions against HUD and  
8           federal government officials that  
9           Council, Mayor, and others regularly  
10          produce.

11                        Patriots sacrifice so much for  
12          the rule of law. To allow officials to  
13          violate oath, Constitution, and laws is  
14          unconscionable. As well-paid  
15          representatives, nothing is above your  
16          pay grade. Clearly de-funding agencies  
17          and prosecuting oath, Constitution, and  
18          law-violating officials is required.

19                        The constitutions require  
20          immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
21          breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
22          duty. Your oath of office requires you  
23          to act or face prison.

24                        42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
25          1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA

8           Commonwealth governments to perform their  
9           constitutional obligations to investigate

13                       The denial of God-given 42 USC  
14          1982 property rights for 24 years is  
15          egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,  
16          and requires immediate remedy.

17                       A just government must obey the  
18          rule of law. This color of law  
19          government must have its Charter to  
20          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
21          compliant government is installed.

22                       Public servants cannot refuse  
23          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
24          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
25          sovereign people require oath,

23                  The Chair recognizes Councilman

25                  COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

2           much, Council President. Last week I  
3           believe I did speak about the gentleman  
4           Eric Riddick, who the Superior Court in  
5           its decision just at the end of last year  
6           said likely sits an innocent man in  
7           prison but for the Post Conviction Relief  
8           Act. And I went to see Senator Stewart  
9           Greenleaf, who chairs the Senate  
10          Judiciary Committee, and before I went, I  
11          discovered -- and I did not know this --  
12          that he has introduced some 20 bills on  
13          criminal justice reform, including the  
14          Post Conviction Relief Act. He has done  
15          bills which includes why we can have DNA  
16          evidence in our court system to appeal  
17          convictions. He has done a lot of work,  
18          and I really want to recognize the work  
19          he's done, that he is still doing.  
20          Unfortunately he is not running for  
21          reelection, and that means that we have  
22          to support him in his efforts for a more  
23          just criminal justice system here in  
24          Pennsylvania.

25                   I did also go to visit Eric

2           Riddick at State Correctional Institution  
3           Chester, had an opportunity to sit down  
4           with him for about an hour. I have  
5           familiarized myself with the evidence and  
6           his appeal and other things, and it is  
7           very unfortunate that the evidence that  
8           proves that he is not guilty is not able  
9           to be considered.

10                   I'm really bringing this up  
11           because I will distribute some  
12           information to my colleagues and I will  
13           introduce a resolution urging the  
14           Governor to pardon him. I think the  
15           evidence is very clear that if he were  
16           able to have his evidence considered, he  
17           would not be incarcerated.

18                   Thank you very much.

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20           Thank you, Councilman.

21                   On behalf of the majority, the  
22           Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds  
23           Brown.

24                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
25           Mr. President. A friendly reminder to my

2                   colleagues about a briefing immediately  
3                   following Council in the Caucus Room with

6                   is a management common for the arts

9                   around the City, and of course lunch will  
10                  be served.

11                  Secondly, on Thursday, March  
12                  8th, we'll recall this was the  
13                  International Day of the Women whereby  
14                  City Council approved our ballot  
15                  referendum. This measure, we should be  
16                  reminded, was introduced by the women of  
17                  City Council where we collectively worked  
18                  to make this happen. That includes  
19                  Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell, members  
20                  Councilwoman Maria Quinones-Sanchez,  
21                  Councilwoman Cherelle Parker,  
22                  Councilwoman Cindy Bass, and Councilwoman  
23                  Helen Gym.

24                  Voters will have the  
25                  opportunity to approve a City Charter

2                   change to mandate sexual harassment  
3                   prevention training on this coming May  
4                   Primary ballot. The yes or no question  
5                   will read as follows: Shall the  
6                   Philadelphia Home Rule Charter be amended  
7                   to provide for mandatory annual training  
8                   for all City officers and employees  
9                   regarding sexual harassment in the  
10                  workplace?

11                  We're asking all listeners and  
12                  viewers to remember this ballot question  
13                  and to lend your voice.

14                  In conclusion, we all know that  
15                  everyone deserves to work in an  
16                  environment that works against gender  
17                  stereotypes, empowers bystanders,  
18                  encourages civility, and takes training  
19                  seriously, all done to promote women,  
20                  period. So members of Council, all of us  
21                  firmly believe that no one should live in  
22                  fear of being sexually harassed when they  
23                  walk into our workplace. And so with  
24                  this authorization by voters, mandatory  
25                  sexual harassment training will become

3                   Thank you, Mr. President.

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5                   Thank you, Councilwoman.

6                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
7                   Jones.

8                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
9                   Mr. President. Two quick items and then  
10                  a fun item.

11                  The Metro put on the front page  
12                  about the tenacious tenants article, and  
13                  it chronicles some of the things that  
14                  Philadelphia is going through by way of  
15                  the eviction crisis. My good friend and  
16                  colleague Ms. Gym is on that panel to  
17                  look at these issues in depth. I offered  
18                  because of the Penn Wynn situation where  
19                  200 units of housing were purchased by  
20                  investors, some from in town, some from  
21                  out of town, and they were summarily  
22                  dismissed, evicted, many of whom did not  
23                  receive their down payment and security  
24                  deposits and they were told, we'll get  
25                  back to you after you leave here 30 days

2                   later. I don't know about you, but  
3                   average rent in Philadelphia is about  
4                   \$1,100. First month, last month,  
5                   security brings you to about \$3,300.

6                   We looked into this and we  
7                   worked with the Tenants Union, and  
8                   through the wisdom of some of my  
9                   colleagues, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown  
10                  said meet with all parties, that's how  
11                  this process should go, talked to my  
12                  other colleagues, and we have come up  
13                  with what we believe is a good compromise  
14                  for the good cause legislation. It  
15                  protects tenants, but it doesn't trample  
16                  property owners' rights, and we believe  
17                  that we have the support in Council to  
18                  pass it.

19                  The imperfect should never be  
20                  the enemy of the good. Nothing we do on  
21                  this earth is ever going to be perfect  
22                  for everybody, but the democratic process  
23                  is to try and find common ground for the  
24                  good of the people, and we believe that  
25                  we've done that.

2                   The second thing I want to talk  
3                   about today is flavored tobacco. Sunday  
4                   is Mother's Day. I remember about my  
5                   mother, she loved her Virginia Slims.  
6                   She would send me and my brother to the  
7                   corner store with just enough money,  
8                   maybe couple of pennies above, to get a  
9                   Pepsi and her Virginia Slims. My  
10                  father's preference was Pall Mall, those  
11                  red -- those rough ones, and his favorite  
12                  beverage was Dr. Pepper. We would do  
13                  that, and we've done that until I was old  
14                  enough to duck the duty.

15                  My father died of lung cancer.  
16                  My mother two snowstorms two seasons ago,  
17                  my brother and I were getting her  
18                  medicine and we were driving it, because  
19                  I have a four-wheel drive, to her block,  
20                  which had a steep incline. I was doing a  
21                  radio interview at the time. I was  
22                  multi-tasking, mom, radio.

23                  My brother came back to the  
24                  door, waved me in and told me come up.  
25                  My mother had an aneurysm, but there was



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2           a lit cigarette on the table next to her.

3                   So as I fast forward when my  
4           grandchild, taking her to school, we  
5           stopped at a corner store to get her  
6           lunch. In the window right next to the  
7           candy are flavored tobacco that I  
8           challenge anybody to tell me the  
9           difference between some of these packages  
10          from Skittles and others. They are  
11          directly designed to market at little  
12          kids to encourage them to begin that  
13          path.

14                   Now, some of us adults have  
15          purchased these products, but they should  
16          never be marketed towards kids. And so  
17          I'm going to say this to you, sometimes  
18          we are never going to get it 100 percent  
19          right, but we will 100 percent of the  
20          time try to do the right thing. I  
21          believe these two pieces of legislation  
22          are the right thing for the people of the  
23          City of Philadelphia.

24                   Finally, on a better note, the  
25          City Council Row Team will be on the

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2           river 11 o'clock Saturday representing  
3           Philadelphia City Council. To my  
4           colleague Gym, to my colleague Green, to  
5           Cindy Bass, and Councilman Henon,  
6           particularly Councilwoman Bass, who had a  
7           fear of water, all Imma say is the first  
8           day she had on more gear that if she fell  
9           in, she wasn't sinking. She was ready.  
10          But as our coach took us out day after  
11          day, her confidence improved. She threw  
12          the life raft, the oxygen tank, all of  
13          that to the side and prayed, and she is  
14          ready. And Councilman Henon, who is  
15          strong, but at times was rhythmatically  
16          challenged. We could tell his  
17          improvement by how many times he would  
18          hit us in the back with the oar. But he  
19          has improved.

20                   And, finally, our coach,  
21          Brannon Johnson, who has had patience  
22          with us, and I encourage all of us to  
23          come out. And the reason we're doing  
24          this is because young people don't view  
25          the Schuylkill as their river, and rowing

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2           is their sport, and we have found a way  
3           to provide 100 spots for a free rowing  
4           camp this summer for urban kids. There  
5           are so many scholarships and  
6           opportunities that we just don't know  
7           about because we're afraid to come out of  
8           our comfort zone, like my colleague so  
9           bravely did. But by us offering  
10          ourselves in this race, we hope to  
11          encourage urban kids to come out of their  
12          comfort zone, take off their life jackets  
13          and oxygen tanks and go boldly into the  
14          Schuylkill and come out dry.

15                   Somebody asked me -- I ain't  
16          doing this. Well, what do you do when  
17          the water gets on you in the river? If  
18          the water gets on you, you're doing  
19          something wrong. You should be dry in  
20          that boat.

21                   So we encourage you all to come  
22          out. Thank you for your support, and we  
23          may surprise some people on Saturday.

24                   Thank you, Mr. President.

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3                   to your surprise.

4                   The Chair recognizes  
5                   Councilwoman Blackwell.

6                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
7                   you, Mr. President. While we still have  
8                   numbers coming in, we would like to give  
9                   you a report on our parking amnesty  
10                  program. Monies collected through  
11                  yesterday, Wednesday, May 9th, are  
12                  \$1,478,649, but that doesn't include the  
13                  payment plan information. Value of  
14                  payment plans is \$1,180,883, which means  
15                  the grand total of money that will be  
16                  collected is \$2,659,532. So we in  
17                  Council are doing our part.

18                  Thank you.

19                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20                  Thank you, Councilwoman.

21                  COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
22                  Thanks.

23                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
24                  Thank you.

25                  The Chair recognizes Councilman

3                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
4           Council President. I just want to  
5           acknowledge my colleague Councilman  
6           Curtis Jones for those very enthusiastic  
7           remarks, and I wish the City Council  
8           Rowing Team the best this Saturday.  
9           Y'all have a lot of heart, and so I will  
10          be rooting for you guys.

11                   On a serious note, I want to  
12          just make a few announcements. One, this  
13          evening in my district at 23rd and Snyder  
14          Avenue at Yesha Banquet Hall, we'll be  
15          having our annual Mother's Day  
16          celebration from 5:00 to 8:30. It's the  
17          oldies but goodies Mother Day's  
18          celebration. So if you want to take time  
19          out to just honor mothers for who they  
20          are and the great role that they play in  
21          our society, and I take a moment also to  
22          acknowledge all the mothers here in City  
23          Council for holding it down.

24                   (Applause.)

25                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: We all

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2                   know that I'm a new dad, and so y'all  
3                   walked me through that process, I will  
4                   say that, in terms of my City Council  
5                   family. Y'all have watched me grow in  
6                   this process of becoming a dad and the  
7                   transitioning of my mom and all of that.  
8                   Y'all have been with me on that path. So  
9                   I have a greater appreciation for y'all  
10                  role, and so I wanted to acknowledge the  
11                  hard work that you are doing.

12                  But also I want to take a  
13                  moment and touch on two particular issues  
14                  that I've been experiencing throughout my  
15                  district. One, as I know we go through  
16                  the process and making sure we get things  
17                  right by crossing our T's and dotting our  
18                  I's when it comes to the issue of  
19                  Rebuild, I'm just looking forward to us  
20                  to finding a way to wrap up this process,  
21                  primarily because when I'm out and about  
22                  and I had very, very contentious  
23                  community meeting the other day, they put  
24                  me on the spot about, one, my support for  
25                  the recent sugar beverage tax and how

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2           that was going to really have an impact  
3           in our community when it comes to  
4           revitalizing our parks, our recreational  
5           facilities, community schools, as well as  
6           universal pre-K. And I mentioned to them  
7           that we do have a court case that's  
8           taking place in Harrisburg and hopefully  
9           that case will be fought in -- we will  
10          win next week when the debate happens on  
11          the Supreme Court, but I want to continue  
12          us as a body advocating to move that  
13          process forward, because my constituents  
14          are asking me, Councilman, what are we  
15          going to do about our parks and our  
16          recreational facilities.

17                 But it also ties into a bill  
18          that I'm a co-sponsor of that was  
19          introduced by my colleague Councilman  
20          David Oh a couple weeks ago. And I just  
21          want to read briefly from the press  
22          release that was put out, because this is  
23          a very, very serious issue that we're  
24          addressing here in the City of  
25          Philadelphia.

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2                   On April the 26th of 2018,  
3                   Councilman David Oh introduced a bill to  
4                   specifically respond to the drastic real  
5                   estate property tax assessment for 2019.  
6                   This bill was sponsored by Councilman  
7                   Mark Squilla, myself, and Councilman  
8                   Domb, and it will create -- it will  
9                   change the Charter and will require City  
10                  Council approval for the implementation  
11                  of any real property assessments whose  
12                  over year percentage increase extends  
13                  that of the national urban Consumer Price  
14                  Index. The legislation would add the  
15                  following language to the Philadelphia  
16                  Home Rule Charter: Real property  
17                  assessments are to be made on the basis  
18                  of the actual value of individual real  
19                  properties, which shall be determined  
20                  using costs, comparable sales, and income  
21                  approaches considered in conjunction with  
22                  one another and independent of the need  
23                  to balance the annual operating budget.  
24                  And any annual percentage increase in  
25                  overall real property assessments that



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2                   exceeds the United States Bureau of Labor  
3                   Statistics' Consumer Price Index or urban  
4                   consumers percentage change for the same  
5                   period shall require City Council  
6                   approval before it becomes effective.

7                   And I just want to say at least  
8                   in Point Breeze, we have seen property  
9                   taxes increase by the tune of 43 percent.  
10                  I am consistently being bombarded in my  
11                  office with letters, requests for  
12                  meetings to address this issue, and quite  
13                  frankly, because the assessments are  
14                  already done, we as a Council body don't  
15                  have any say so over that process. But  
16                  my constituents are asking me to figure  
17                  out a way to do something.

18                  And so I'm taking this bill  
19                  serious. We want to continue advocating  
20                  for this bill, because I do believe we  
21                  have to have some level of protection or  
22                  some type of real answers to our  
23                  constituents. We have people -- I'm not  
24                  talking about just long-term residents.  
25                  I'm talking about the new folk that move

2           in the neighborhood. They're about to  
3           move and lose their homes because they  
4           can't pay their taxes in gentrifying  
5           neighborhoods. So it's affecting old  
6           residents, new residents, black  
7           residents, white residents, Asian  
8           residents, all in gentrifying  
9           neighborhoods.

10                   We welcome development, but we  
11           do not want to have displaced -- we do  
12           not want to have development in a  
13           place as it relates to displacing  
14           long-term and new-term residents.

15                   And so I'm going to continue  
16           working with my colleagues on this  
17           particular bill, but we have to have some  
18           type of check and balance, because we  
19           don't want to have a back-door tax  
20           increase on our residents as it relates  
21           to property value going up in their  
22           neighborhoods. And to give you an  
23           example, somebody tagged me on Facebook  
24           and gave me a picture of two houses on  
25           the same block right next to each other

2                   with two totally different property  
3                   assessments. Like how do you justify  
4                   those numbers?

5                   And so I'm going to stay on  
6                   this case, because we got to figure it  
7                   out. And I'm telling you, if we don't  
8                   take this seriously -- I can't speak for  
9                   all of you, but some of you might not  
10                  even be coming back next year, I'm going  
11                  to be quite frank, because people are  
12                  upset. So I'm going to do my job to make  
13                  sure I'm on the ground letting my  
14                  constituents know that I'm fighting back  
15                  on this particular issue.

16                  Thank you, Council President.

17                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18                  Thank you, Councilman.

19                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
20                  Squilla.

21                  COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
22                  Mr. President. I know the big rowing  
23                  race is on Saturday, but I do want to  
24                  announce too that they'll be officially  
25                  renaming Park South Broad Street by Reed

2           for Jimmy Tayoun Way, Councilman in the  
3           First District, at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday  
4           morning. So all are invited if they want  
5           to stop by before they go row or watch  
6           the team. Everybody is welcome.

7                   So thank you.

8                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you, Councilman.

10                   The Chair recognizes  
11           Councilwoman Gym.

12                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
13           very much, Council President. I want to  
14           thank my colleague Councilman Jones for  
15           that rowing team opportunity and our  
16           great coach, Brannon from BLJ Rowing, who  
17           is really doing a lot to diversify the  
18           Schuylkill and make sure that many people  
19           have a chance to enjoy the river. So I'm  
20           looking forward to that, and hopefully we  
21           will make it across the finish line and  
22           not end up in a bank somewhere or, worse,  
23           in the water.

24                   I also just want to really  
25           thank my colleagues as well for the

2           lively conversation we've been having in  
3           City Council the last couple of days  
4           around school funding. Today the  
5           Inquirer ran its second of three, I  
6           believe, pieces on the state of our  
7           public schools, in particular the  
8           physical conditions that they're in.  
9           Many of you -- many of my colleagues  
10          already, including and especially  
11          Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, have been  
12          incredibly active on paying attention to  
13          lead poisoning and not take it for  
14          granted. We were able together to pass a  
15          requirement that water fountains and  
16          stations in schools had to abide by a  
17          lead content of no higher than 15 parts  
18          per billion. We've been paying attention  
19          to lead paint and lead poisoning. But  
20          the story on Sunday made it very clear  
21          that we have a long way to go.

22                   The cafeteria, for example, at  
23           Philadelphia High School for Girls has a  
24           water content. If we regulate it at 15,  
25           the water content in the cafeteria

2           contains lead parts of 600 parts per  
3           billion. If you're swimming in Sayre  
4           High School's pool, you're exposed to  
5           almost 5,200 parts per billion lead  
6           concentration in the water.

7                    If you think that the EPA  
8           recommends that there's only 40  
9           micrograms of lead per paint per square  
10          foot, at an Olney High School classroom  
11          it's almost 10,000 on the second floor.  
12          There are stairwells and autistic support  
13          rooms that are in the thousands.

14                   So the issue that we've got is  
15          how not to create a sense of helplessness  
16          or a lack of ability to take on issues  
17          like asbestos in our schools or lead  
18          poisoning amongst our children, but to  
19          recognize that we still have a lot of  
20          work to do. We have a history that we  
21          have inherited, but we've already shown  
22          that as a body together, we put brand new  
23          water hydration stations in every single  
24          public school in the City to guarantee  
25          that those children wouldn't drink or be

2                   forced to only drink from those water  
3                   fountains. We're figuring out options  
4                   for ourselves about what school funding  
5                   is going to mean in the future.

6                   We heard testimony from the  
7                   School District this week that we've got  
8                   hundreds of vacancies in our school  
9                   facilities, which is partly why the  
10                  buildings are as dirty and as uncared for  
11                  as they are. We're paying \$9 an hour for  
12                  cleaners, which is simply not workable,  
13                  and it's one of the main reasons why they  
14                  have vacancies.

15                  We've got a lot of  
16                  conversations to have about how we're  
17                  going to fund our schools. There's not  
18                  only one option. There are multiple  
19                  options that we have on the table, but I  
20                  think the urgency is there, the need is  
21                  there, and the responsibility is ours to  
22                  figure it out.

23                  Thank you.

4                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
5 you, Mr. President. The School District  
6 agreed yesterday to give within two days  
7 everybody a list of -- that was my  
8 school, Sayre. In fact, my sister taught  
9 there -- to give us a list of what their  
10 plans are for making corrections  
11 specifically on these schools in our  
12 district that so many of us have. So  
13 thank you, Councilwoman Gym, for bringing  
14 that forward.

15                   And I'd like to thank my  
16 colleagues rowing, and John Fenton in my  
17 office is doing it. I'm certainly sorry  
18 I can't be there and I can't be with this  
19 naming of part of Broad Street for Tayoun  
20 because Jannie from Cheyney has to be at  
21 Cheyney. This is our anniversary, and  
22 we've got to be there to march these new  
23 folks in. So unfortunately it's one of  
24 those real busy days. I'm sorry I can't  
25 be with you, but Jannie from Cheyney will

3                   us.

4                   Thank you.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6                   Awesome. Thank you, Councilwoman.

7                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
8                   Domb.

9                   COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
10                  Council President. I'll be brief, but I  
11                  want to address Councilman Johnson's  
12                  comments for a moment about taxes. We've  
13                  been through this budget hearing this  
14                  season, and I have heard several things  
15                  from the budget process that I wanted to  
16                  make sure my colleagues -- I wanted to  
17                  share with them and, that is, that there  
18                  are alternatives to raising taxes. There  
19                  are alternatives.

20                  We heard yesterday the school  
21                  system will need the money in three years  
22                  basically from now, not in the next two  
23                  years, and I'm in favor of supporting the  
24                  School District and what they need. I'm  
25                  not in favor of raising taxes in order to

2           do that. I'm in favor of cutting the  
3           Prisons. We saw the population now is  
4           down 35 percent. Don't tell me we can't  
5           cut 15 percent of a \$391 million budget  
6           that includes fringe benefits. That's a  
7           lot of money.

8                   Number two, there's still  
9           delinquent taxes on the table of 215  
10          million of non-owner occupied. And we  
11          will protect low-income homeowners who  
12          are renters through sequestration.  
13          That's 215 million. There are other  
14          alternatives.

15                   And, number three, we heard  
16          yesterday that the Administration will  
17          have our accounts reconciled by the end  
18          of June, and hopefully we will be able to  
19          balance the remainder of the 27 million  
20          that's missing. And I've said this  
21          publicly. I'll say it again. I am not  
22          voting for any tax increase, none, until  
23          we see all of our accounts reconciled and  
24          the money is found. That will be my  
25          position.

2                   Thank you. Happy Mother's Day.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

5                   Okay. With that, that  
6 concludes our speeches, and the Chair  
7 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown  
8 for a motion to adjourn.

9                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes, yes,  
10 yes. Not quite, Mr. President, only  
11 because as a former cheerleader from Penn  
12 State, I need to salute those that are  
13 rowing this weekend, like win. I can't  
14 join them. I couldn't participate in  
15 that physical fitness experience because  
16 I too will be away this weekend  
17 celebrating my daughter's graduation  
18 after 48 months from Syracuse University
