1           5/24/18 - STATED - INVOCATION

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning. Good morning, everyone. We're  
4 going to get started. There's a lot of  
5 excitement today. It will be our first  
6 of many championships.

7                   I ask for a little quiet,  
8 please, on the side over there so we can  
9 get started. Thank you very much for  
10 your cooperation.

11                   To give our invocation this  
12 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor  
13 Michael Rzonca of St. Jerome's Parish in  
14 Winchester Park. He is here today as the  
15 guest of Councilman Henon.

16                   I would ask all members,  
17 guests, and visitors to please rise.

18                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
19 visitors rise.)

20                   PASTOR RZONCA: My friends, let  
21 us invoke the name of our God and ask  
22 that God, our creator, be present to us  
23 at this time.

24                   Oh, God, we gather here to ask  
25 your guidance and support as we carry out

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2           our deliberations and decisions for our  
3           constituents, the people of Philadelphia.

4                    Enlighten us as we consider the  
5           various needs and concerns of our people.  
6           Let us be true to our wonderful city, the  
7           Cradle of Liberty, the City of Brotherly  
8           Love, where both the Declaration of  
9           Independence and the Constitution of the  
10          United States of America were born.

11                   We share a great history of  
12          over 200 years of forming and fostering a  
13          city which truly cares about its people,  
14          extending the care in myriad ways such as  
15          in helping veterans and opening doors for  
16          those whose conditions of living have  
17          seen too many doors close in front of  
18          them, in seeking to inform people about  
19          the programs available to facilitate  
20          improvement in their lives.

21                   As we have called upon you to  
22          be present to us, give us the foresight  
23          and the courage to respond to all that  
24          will continue to make this city great.

25                   We pray this in your most holy

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those  
7 inspiring words.

8 Council will be at ease.

9 (Council at ease.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Our next order of business is  
12 approval of the Journal of the meeting of  
13 Thursday, May 17, 2018, and the Chair  
14 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
16 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
17 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May  
18 17, 2018 be approved.

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
21 been moved and properly seconded.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

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2                   (No response.)

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 ayes have it, and the meeting of  
5 Thursday, May 17 is approved.

6                   The next order of business is  
7 requests for leave of absence.

8                   I'd ask if anyone with a cell  
9 phone or any other device that makes any  
10 kind of noise, please turn it off at this  
11 moment. Thank you very much.

12                   The next order of business is  
13 requests for leave of absence, and the  
14 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

15                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
16 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
17 majority, there are no requests for leave  
18 of absence today.

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20 Chair thanks the gentlemen.

21                   The Chair now recognizes  
22 Councilman O'Neill.

23                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
24 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
25 republicans, there are no requests for

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2           leave of absence.

3                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
4           Chair thanks the gentleman.

5                    At this time I would like to  
6           take a moment to thank everyone who has  
7           taken time out of their busy day to come  
8           down to witness their government in  
9           action.  We genuinely appreciate you  
10          being here.  We hope your stay here today  
11          is a pleasurable one and a knowledgeable  
12          one, so much so that you come back again.  
13          So, again, thank you so much for being  
14          here today.

15                   Drum roll.  At this time, the  
16          Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson, who  
17          will present a resolution  
18          congratulating -- I said drum roll, not  
19          feedback -- congratulating the  
20          Philadelphia Eagles.  Would Don Smolenski  
21          and those accompanying him please join  
22          the Councilman at the podium.

23                    (Applause.)

24                    (Councilmembers and guests  
25          approached podium.)

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2                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So today  
3 we have the great privilege to stand as  
4 members of Council to honor and show  
5 support for our Super Bowl LII Eagles  
6 champions. Let's give them a real big  
7 round of applause.

8                   (Applause.)

9                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: It's been  
10 a long time coming. For all my Dallas  
11 fans, I just want to publicly say y'all  
12 haven't had a championship in the last  
13 ten years. So this is a new generation.

14                   And beyond that, we want to  
15 acknowledge the work that the Eagles have  
16 been doing throughout the City of  
17 Philadelphia. Most recently we partnered  
18 with Connor Barwin in dedicating a  
19 multi-athletic field in South  
20 Philadelphia, our first turf football  
21 field. And most recently they also had  
22 an opportunity to unveil their foundation  
23 for autism, and I know my colleague  
24 Councilman Derek Green was very involved  
25 in that process. And so beyond being

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2           Super Bowl champions, they're also  
3           champions when it comes to contributing  
4           to the quality of life here in the City  
5           of Philadelphia.

6                         And so I want to ask for my  
7           good friend from South Philadelphia,  
8           Councilman Mark Squilla, who will take a  
9           moment to lead us in that great Super  
10          Bowl Championship Eagles theme song,  
11          cheer. And so on the count of three --  
12          now, y'all won't get me like Senator  
13          Williams, but it goes something like  
14          this.

15                        (Councilmembers sing "Fly,  
16          Eagles, Fly.")

17                        (Applause.)

18                        COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So this  
19          citation reads:

20                        Congratulating the Philadelphia  
21          Eagles for their historic victory over  
22          the New England Patriots in Super Bowl  
23          LII.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,



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2 the Philadelphia Eagles are a cornerstone  
3 Philadelphia institution. During the  
4 tenure of its owner, Jeffrey Lurie, and  
5 its President, Don Smolenski, the Eagles  
6 organization has been a model franchise.  
7 The organization's values are reflected  
8 in its deep engagement with fans and  
9 community members in its charitable work  
10 with children and notably in the players  
11 themselves.

12 And I would like to  
13 acknowledge, we know behind every strong  
14 executive, there's even a stronger  
15 executive assistant. So Liz is the power  
16 behind the throne. I want to take a  
17 moment to acknowledge her, give her a  
18 round of applause as well.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas

21 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
22 the team members, brought together under  
23 the leadership of executive vice  
24 president, Howie Roseman, embody a  
25 hardworking and resilient spirit that

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2           resonate deeply with the people of this  
3           great City. The strength of the team's  
4           character was exemplified this season by  
5           players' advocacy for social justice,  
6           which received national attention. These  
7           efforts included advocacy for criminal  
8           justice reform by Malcolm Jenkins and  
9           donation of an entire season's salary by  
10          Chris Long for his educational equality,  
11          and you know that hungry dogs run faster;  
12          and

13                    COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And  
14          whereas, the Philadelphia Eagles entered  
15          Fall 2017 as a contender for a division  
16          title in the NFC East. Their perennial  
17          rivals, the Dallas Cowboys and the New  
18          York Giants, were also predicted to have  
19          strong teams, however, and the Eagles  
20          came into the season prepared for a  
21          dogfight; and

22                    COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,  
23          second-year head coach Doug Pederson and  
24          veterans such as Jason Peters, Zach Ertz,  
25          Malcolm Jenkins, Jason Kelce, Fletcher

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2           Cox, and returning quarterback Carson  
3           Wentz were joined in the off-season by  
4           new additions Torrey Smith, Alshon  
5           Jeffery, LeGarrette Blount, and Chris  
6           Long. Meanwhile, backup quarterback Nick  
7           Foles made a return to the Eagles, which  
8           would prove a critical addition later on;  
9           and

10                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
11           with the City of passionate fans behind  
12           them, to say the least -- we do have the  
13           best fans in the country -- the Eagles  
14           began their season by winning ten of  
15           their first eleven games. During this  
16           stretch, the team defeated each of their  
17           NFC rivals, with two victories coming  
18           against Washington; and

19                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: The  
20           Seventh has three playgrounds from the  
21           Eagles, I must say, just for the record,  
22           Moffet, Potter-Thomas, and last year we  
23           built Elkins. Thank you very much. And  
24           we are working with Connor Barwin for  
25           Waterloo. So thank you very much,

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2           Eagles.

3                       After a tough loss on the road  
4           against the Seattle Seahawks, the Eagles  
5           beat the Los Angeles Rams, but only after  
6           losing Carson Wentz to a season-ending  
7           knee injury. Prior to his injury, Wentz  
8           was considered a leading candidate for  
9           the NFL's Most Valuable Player Award.  
10          With All-Pro tackle Jason Peters already  
11          sidelined with a season-ending injury,  
12          the Eagles' Super Bowl dreams were  
13          suddenly in doubt;

14                      COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And  
15          whereas, in his first game as starting  
16          quarterback, Nick Foles made the City  
17          proud as he threw for 237 yards and 4  
18          touchdowns in a 34 to 29 victory over the  
19          rival New York Giants. Foles took on  
20          starting quarterback duties for the rest  
21          of the season, and in spite of critics'  
22          doubts, lost only one game; and

23                      COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
24          despite finishing their season with 13  
25          wins against only 3 losses, a record that

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2           earned the team the top seed in the NFC  
3           playoffs, the Eagles were still dismissed  
4           by most commentators as they entered the  
5           playoffs. These doubts only fueled the  
6           team and its fans, who embraced their  
7           underdog status; and

8                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,  
9           against the odds, the Eagles beat both  
10          the Atlanta Falcons in the NFC Divisional  
11          Round and the Minnesota Vikings in the  
12          NFC Championship. These wins earned the  
13          Eagles their third trip to the Super  
14          Bowl, and their first Super Bowl  
15          appearance since the tragic defeat at the  
16          hands of the New England Patriots in  
17          Super Bowl XXXIX in 2005; and

18                   COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,  
19          heading into the Super Bowl after a  
20          convincing win against the Vikings in  
21          their previous game, the Eagles still  
22          maintained their underdog status against  
23          the favored New England Patriots.  
24          Donning their notorious German Shepherd  
25          masks, the team and its fans maintained

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2           their faith in this season's Super Bowl  
3           destiny, despite the critics, and shocked  
4           the Patriots and the rest of the world  
5           with a 41 to 33 victory; and

6                    COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the  
7           game featured a number of instantly  
8           classic moments in professional football  
9           history. Among them were acrobatic  
10          touchdown catches by Alshon Jeffery,  
11          Corey Clement, whose cousin Donna Clement  
12          Jackson works in my staff, and Zach Ertz;  
13          a gutsy fourth down conversion in the  
14          fourth quarter; a dazzling strip sack by  
15          Brandon Graham of Patriots quarterback  
16          Tom Brady; and the legendary "Philly  
17          Special" play, which resulted in a  
18          touchdown pass from tight end Trey Burton  
19          to quarterback Nick Foles; and

20                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
21          Foles was brilliant throughout the game,  
22          passing for 373 yards and three  
23          touchdowns, resulting in a stellar 106.1  
24          passer rating. For these contributions,  
25          along with his leadership and poise

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2           during the game, he was named Super Bowl  
3           MVP; and

4                        COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the  
5           victory in Super Bowl LII is the Eagles'  
6           first-ever Super Bowl title and the first  
7           NFL Championship for the team since  
8           1960 - a full 7 years before the first  
9           Super Bowl was played. After the Eagles'  
10          win, Philadelphians marked the joyous  
11          occasion by pouring into the streets to  
12          celebrate the victory with family,  
13          neighbors, and friends, celebrating well  
14          into the night of February 4th; and

15                      COUNCILMAN OH: Let me just  
16          thank the Eagles, Don Smolenski. Every  
17          time there is an event to benefit our  
18          nation's veterans, the Eagles come  
19          through time and time again. So thank  
20          you so much for supporting those who  
21          serve in our military and our veterans.

22                      Whereas, the championship  
23          celebration continued on February 8th,  
24          when the City and region descended upon  
25          South Broad Street and the Benjamin

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2           Franklin Parkway for the Eagles' victory  
3           parade. The scenes of cheering players  
4           and fans, all showered in confetti, and  
5           the stirring speeches from the victorious  
6           players are sure to live on in  
7           Philadelphians' memories for decades; and

8                        COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

9           Whereas, this is really awesome. This is  
10          a heck of a thing here.

11                       Whereas, these joyous  
12          celebrations speak to Philadelphia's  
13          identity as the City of Brotherly Love  
14          and Sisterly Affection, and moreover,  
15          they highlight the bravery and dedication  
16          of the Philadelphia Police Department,  
17          the Philadelphia Office of Emergency  
18          Management, SEPTA, and other key parade  
19          partners, who worked tirelessly to allow  
20          Philadelphians to enjoy the festivities  
21          safely; and

22                       COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
23          this legislative body celebrates the  
24          Philadelphia Eagles with the historic  
25          season, on and off the field, and wishes



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2           its ascension to even greater heights in  
3           2018 and seasons to come; now, therefore,  
4           be it

5                         Resolved, that the Council of  
6           the City of Philadelphia, congratulates  
7           the leadership of the Philadelphia Eagles  
8           and all associated for their historic  
9           victory over who? The New England  
10          Patriots. In Super Bowl what? LII.

11                         Congratulations.

12                         (Applause.)

13                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
14          the Chair recognizes Don Smolenski for  
15          remarks.

16                         MR. SMOLENSKI: Thank you. I  
17          have to say it's wonderful to relive the  
18          entire season. So thank you very much.

19                         As I walked into the Chamber  
20          here, I realized that my last visit in  
21          here was almost 20 years ago and was not  
22          lost on me that during that time, the  
23          City Councilmembers and the City of  
24          Philadelphia did a lot of work on various  
25          legislative matters, all in support of

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2           two projects in South Philadelphia, which  
3           was Lincoln Financial Field and Citizens  
4           Bank Park. And it's always been a  
5           private-public partnership, one where the  
6           City and the team and really the  
7           residents of Philadelphia have all been  
8           partners, and the vision and the dream  
9           was to bring championships to the City of  
10          Philadelphia, and both the Philadelphia  
11          Phillies and the Philadelphia Eagles both  
12          through Citizens Bank Park and Lincoln  
13          Financial Field and support of the entire  
14          City of Philadelphia and the region have  
15          now brought a World Series title and a  
16          Super Bowl championship to the City of  
17          Philadelphia. We could not have done it  
18          without the support of everyone in this  
19          room, everyone in all of municipal  
20          government, and obviously without all the  
21          support of the amazing fans who have  
22          cheered us on over the vast number of  
23          years.

24                        So it is with extreme pleasure  
25          and a privilege to share the championship

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2           with everyone and to say thank you for  
3           the proclamation today and thank you for  
4           all your support.

5                         (Applause.)

6                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Council will be at ease.

8                         (Council at ease.)

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Where did all the cameras go? I thought  
11          they were here for us. It was about the  
12          Eagles, huh? All right.

13                         At this time, the Chair  
14          recognizes Councilwoman Bass, who will  
15          present a resolution recognizing Eighth  
16          District community leaders for their  
17          outstanding service. Would Brother Ron  
18          Armour, Trapeta Mayson, Keith Schenk,  
19          Michelle Kerr Spry, and Pastor Alex  
20          Velazquez, Jr., and LeQuyen Vu and those  
21          accompanying them please join the  
22          Councilwoman at the podium.

23                         (Councilmembers and guests  
24          approached podium.)

25                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

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2           joining the Councilwoman, we have  
3           Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman  
4           Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman Blackwell,  
5           Councilman Green, Councilman Oh, and  
6           Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

7                        COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good  
8           morning.

9                        (Good morning.)

10                      COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I thought  
11           the cameras were here for our community  
12           activists. They should have been. Thank  
13           you, Councilman Taubenberger.

14                      But I just really wanted to  
15           take a moment out when you think about  
16           the people in our communities that really  
17           make it happen, these are the folks in  
18           the Northwest, just some of the folks,  
19           that when you call them, no matter what  
20           time of day or night, when there is  
21           something that is happening, when you  
22           need help, they are at the ready always.  
23           There's never a no, I can't, I'm not  
24           able, I won't. They make it happen, and  
25           so we wanted to really recognize some of

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2           our community activists who go above and  
3           beyond, who put community first always,  
4           who look out for not just their neighbor,  
5           their neighbor's neighbors and their  
6           neighbor's neighbor's neighbors. They  
7           look out for entire communities, and we  
8           wanted to spend some time this morning  
9           just really saying thank you so much for  
10          all that you do. And so we have a  
11          resolution that reads:

12                        Honoring and recognizing  
13          Brother Ron Armour, Trapeta Mayson, Keith  
14          Schenk, Michelle Kerr Spry, Pastor Alex  
15          Velazquez, Jr., and LeQuyen Vu for their  
16          significant contributions to advocacy and  
17          community service in Northwest  
18          Philadelphia.

19                        Whereas, Brother Ron Armour has  
20          spent over 40 years as a preacher and  
21          community activist. He has provided for  
22          the religious needs of congregations  
23          throughout Philadelphia, serving as a  
24          counselor, career coach, spiritual  
25          advisor, fundraiser, and volunteer for

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2           numerous organizations and charities.  
3           His community stewardship continues to  
4           positively impact the lives of children  
5           and families, particularly those at risk  
6           or in need; and

7                        COUNCILMAN OH:   Whereas,  
8           Trapeta Mayson is a Germantown resident,  
9           artist and civic leader committed to  
10          artistically and thoughtfully developing  
11          and contributing to efforts that  
12          positively and sustainably impact  
13          communities. She is a member of the  
14          Greene Street Artist Cooperative and  
15          reads her poetry widely and works  
16          extensively conducting creative writing  
17          and community engagement workshops.  
18          Formerly serving as the Executive  
19          Director of Historic Germantown, Trapeta  
20          is currently the Division Director of  
21          Intensive Behavioral Health Services at  
22          COMHAR and serves as the Vice President  
23          of the Germantown Services District,  
24          member of the Friends of Joseph E.  
25          Coleman Northwest Regional Library and

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2           Co-Chair of the Education Outreach  
3           Committee on the Mayor's Task Force for  
4           Historic Preservation; and

5                        COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

6           Whereas, Keith Schenk is a youth, public  
7           health and safety advocate focusing on  
8           violence prevention, civic engagement,  
9           and combatting urban blight. He is the  
10          founder of One Love Guns Down which seeks  
11          to counter the negative impact of  
12          community violence and police brutality.  
13          Keith also served as a Drug and Alcohol  
14          Professional for 20 years and is credited  
15          with developing programs to address  
16          maladaptive behaviors that lead to  
17          recidivism. He also serves as a More  
18          Beautiful Philadelphia Block Captain and  
19          is currently pioneering  
20          #gogreenGermantown as part of an effort  
21          to build urban resilience in communities  
22          impacted by blight;

23                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And  
24          whereas, Michelle Kerr Spry is the  
25          Founder and President of The Echo

2           Collective, which trains and educates  
3           young women to echo a positive model of  
4           personal, social and professional  
5           competencies. She has utilized her  
6           extensive experience in financial  
7           capability education and program  
8           development to design and implement  
9           housing counseling programs for community  
10          organizations throughout Philadelphia,  
11          assists families at risk of mortgage  
12          foreclosure with financial management  
13          skill building, and teach problem-solving  
14          skills to incarcerated individuals and  
15          returning citizens in housing, financial  
16          literacy, and job training;

17                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And  
18          whereas, Pastor Alex Velazquez, Jr., has  
19          pastored the Oasis City Church in Olney,  
20          providing services to that community for  
21          over 21 years. His mission is to feed  
22          the hungry and clothe the naked. Each  
23          year his church sponsors numerous  
24          community outreach activities, including  
25          the September 5th Street Block Event, the

2           Hallelujah Fest, and food and toy  
3           giveaways on Easter, Thanksgiving and  
4           Christmas which serve over 700 needy  
5           families. Seeing a need for the services  
6           to the youth in Olney, he has also  
7           founded the Oasis Youth Foundation which  
8           endeavors to service at-risk youth in the  
9           community through both educational and  
10          recreation services;

11                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
12          LeQuyen Vu is Executive Director of the  
13          Indo-Chinese American Council which  
14          started in 1984 in Philadelphia's Logan  
15          neighborhood to support minority,  
16          refugee, and immigrant communities  
17          through education and community  
18          resources. Under the leadership of Ms.  
19          Vu, the IAC aims to build a community  
20          where education creates opportunities and  
21          growth for all immigrant, refugee, and  
22          minority children and families by  
23          after-school programs, summer programs,  
24          and adult classes. Serving as a member  
25          of Mayor Kenney's transition team on

2           immigrant and multicultural affairs, she  
3           works with elementary schools in the  
4           Northwest to develop supportive  
5           partnerships that prioritize family and  
6           community engagement.

7                         She also used to be my wife's  
8           boss.

9                         Therefore, be it

10                        COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: That's  
11           important.

12                        Resolved, that the Council of  
13           the City of Philadelphia honors and  
14           recognizes Brother Ron Armour, Trapeta  
15           Mayson, Keith Schenk, Michelle Kerr Spry,  
16           Alex Velazquez, Jr., and LeQuyen Vu for  
17           their dedication to community service and  
18           their significant contributions in  
19           Northwest Philadelphia.

20                        Further resolved, that an  
21           engrossed copy of this resolution be  
22           presented to each honoree as evidence of  
23           our sincere respect and admiration of  
24           this legislative body.

25                        Congratulations.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4           Thank you, and the Chair recognizes  
5           Michelle Kerr Spry for remarks.

6                   MS. SPRY:   Wow, what a humbling  
7           experience, and I hope that I can speak  
8           the words that my pastors back here find  
9           fitting.

10                   I'll be brief with my words,  
11           because it's not the words that we speak  
12           that have the power.  It's the work that  
13           we do that we hope that has the impact.

14                   The great Muhammad Ali and the  
15           Honorable Shirley Chisholm have spoken  
16           these words, but I'd like to quote the  
17           tireless advocate, Marian Wright Edelman,  
18           who has been my personal shero, to  
19           capture this moment.

20                   It is not the service.  Service  
21           is the rent we pay for being.  It is the  
22           very purpose of life and not something  
23           you do in your spare time.

24                   My fellow members up here make  
25           their life's work service.  We appreciate

25          in 1998 to, quote, "provide visibility

11           located across the airport, in all seven  
12           terminals, and are curretted throughout  
13           the year and presented in a variety of  
14           Philadelphia-centric artwork and promote  
15           citywide events;

16                      Under the leadership of the  
17           founding director of exhibits, Leah  
18           Douglas, the Exhibits Programs has  
19           organized more than 400 exhibits  
20           featuring the works of artists and  
21           cultural institutions from across the  
22           City and region.

23                      So I practiced my part and just  
24           read her part. Whereas

25                      COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the

22                    COUNCILMAN GREEN: From Odunde  
23          to the Mummers, the Exhibitions Program  
24          has made great efforts to showcase the

10          including the Charter High School for  
11          Architecture and Design, Philadelphia

16                       COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
17          past exhibits at PHL have also  
18          highlighted Philadelphia's central role  
19          in American History, from the Colonial  
20          Era to the present day, presenting  
21          artifacts from pivotal moments such as

25          Whereas, perhaps most importantly, the

24                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

25 Mr. President. I have one bill and a

4           and I have duties outside of City Hall  
5           and would like permission to leave and be  
6           recorded aye on all bills and

9           Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be  
10          granted.

11                      CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
12          amending Title 10 of The Philadelphia  
13          Code, entitled "Regulation of Individual  
14          Conduct and Activity," by repealing  
15          certain provisions relating to temporary  
16          removal of firearms and adding a new  
17          Chapter 10-2300, entitled "Philadelphia  
18          Gun Violence Protection," establishing  
19          procedures relating to the relinquishment  
20          or seizure of firearms from individuals  
21          who present an imminent threat of harm to  
22          the individual's own self or others.

23                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
24          Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

25                      COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2           Mr. President. Today I introduce this  
3           bill as a continuation of the work that  
4           you, Mr. President, and my colleague  
5           Councilman Johnson are doing on the  
6           Special Committee on Gun Violence, which  
7           is an arduous task, but this might just  
8           be one arrow in the quiver to fight that  
9           violence.

10                         This bill represents a  
11           collaborated effort between our offices,  
12           the Philadelphia Police Department, the  
13           Administration, the Law Department, Mayor  
14           Kenney, and the District Attorney Larry  
15           Krasner. This bill helps school teachers  
16           who knows her student is displaying  
17           certain warning signs of predicted  
18           violence and fears that he will actually  
19           or she actually come back and carry out  
20           that violence at a public school.

21                         This bill will help women and  
22           men in the workplace who have domestic  
23           violence issues and are being threatened  
24           by an ex that says, I'm going to come and  
25           create havoc in your workplace and

2 threaten your very life.

3 This bill will help  
4 ex-boyfriends, ex-girlfriends who are in  
5 possession of firearms that need a  
6 cooling off period from the emotion of  
7 being in that kind of situation.

8 This bill will protect us from  
9 senseless acts of gun violence that  
10 continue to rise in our nation. And the  
11 one thing about it, Mr. President, is  
12 there is usually predictive behavior.  
13 Someone says, I'm going to hurt people,  
14 and we don't believe them. We don't take  
15 them for their word.

16 So this establishes a new  
17 section in Philadelphia Code to create a  
18 gun violence protection procedure or  
19 protection order. So someone comes to a  
20 public school and we've had plenty of  
21 fist fights in schoolyards. I know as a  
22 teacher, former Councilman Wilson Goode  
23 has broken up a couple, but when a young  
24 man or woman says I'm going to take it  
25 out on the whole school, we should

2           believe them and we should make sure that  
3           a responsible individual such as a  
4           teacher or a principal has an opportunity  
5           to go and petition a court to say maybe  
6           we should check that household for  
7           firearms and weapons of mass destruction.  
8           It just makes sense.

9                         This procedure will protect  
10           people in this building when people may  
11           have constituent service issues and,  
12           because of mental illness and other  
13           pressures, actually come and take it out  
14           on your and my staff.

15                        So the Philadelphia gun  
16           violence protection procedure will allow  
17           the following: It will allow petitions  
18           of gun violence in order to be filed by  
19           school officials, family members,  
20           household members, police officers,  
21           assistant district attorneys with the  
22           knowledge that individuals present  
23           themselves as an imminent threat to  
24           themselves and/or others. So this  
25           petition will allow within five days a

2           court hearing so that someone can say,  
3           You were shooting off steam, we don't  
4           believe that you present a threat to  
5           others, here's your guns back. Or if  
6           there is a need for further action,  
7           whether it is mental health intervention  
8           or other services that can be provided,  
9           that we take a step to prevent senseless  
10          violence that seems to be growing in our  
11          country.

12                           Thank you, Mr. President.

13                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14           Thank you, Councilman.

15          of the fact that as policymakers we must  
16          continue to fine-tune public policy to  
17          ensure that it is equitable.

18                    The ten-year real estate tax  
19                    abatement originally called upon City  
20                    Council to designate and target, quote,  
21                    "deteriorating areas of the City that  
22                    were physically blighted," as defined by  
23                    substandard housing, vacant land, and  
24                    delinquent properties. Its goal at the  
25                    time was to help revitalize our

2 communities, retain residents, and  
3 attract home and business owners. And  
4 there is no question that parts of our  
5 City would not have been rebuilt without  
6 the ten-year tax abatement. There is no  
7 question that parts of our City may still  
8 benefit from incentivized development and  
9 rehabilitation. These proposals do not  
10 diminish that reality, but it is time to  
11 look to the future.

12 Last year alone, the City and  
13 our schools forfeited over \$40 million in  
14 tax revenue from the abatement. And  
15 while some areas of the City have been  
16 marked by rapid growth and development,  
17 studies also show or suggest that the  
18 abatement might also be contributing to  
19 disproportionately higher displacement  
20 risks for longtime residents.

21 The Economy League of Greater  
22 Philadelphia has recommended that smart  
23 and strategic tax abatement reform could  
24 yield significant revenue, and this week  
25 the City of Philadelphia will release

2           even more data on the tax abatement. And  
3           as we look to the weeks ahead, time and  
4           again Council has been asked to step up  
5           to the plate to support our  
6           schoolchildren, and this body has  
7           delivered each and every time. Now we're

9           it's by six-year-old Dean Pagan at Comly  
10          Elementary who ate paint chips off of his  
11          desk because -- who was lead poisoned  
12          because of paint chips that flaked off of  
13          his desk, because he wanted his desk to  
14          be clean. It's now coming from  
15          fourth-grader Ashley Garner at Hamilton  
16          Elementary who has missed school days and  
17          has had terrifying asthma attacks because  
18          of the conditions at her school building.  
19          And it's being asked now by second-grader  
20          Lucas Sims, who suffered from carbon  
21          monoxide poisoning at Loesche Elementary  
22          School.

23                        There is no question that the  
24                        tax abatement -- that modifying the tax  
25                        abatement can help us show our commitment

19                    MR. DANIHEL: Okay. Good  
20           afternoon. This is an official decree of  
21           the people in writ of mandamus quo  
22           warranto and, as such, requires immediate  
23           action and remedy.

24                    Every week Council, Mayor, and  
25           others transfer private property to the

2           government, probably illegally.

3                       Trust in public servants and  
4           government is required. As we celebrate  
5           Memorial Day, people remember who served  
6           to defend the people. Would people serve  
7           far from home knowing that their

10          How can the people trust Council, Mayor,  
11          and others when they steal my home, steal  
12          my law-required just compensation, steal  
13          my reimbursed expenses, steal the pride  
14          and the dignity of owning my home?

15                      As public servants, you are  
16          bound by oath, law, and Constitution so  
17          that you don't become the legalized  
18          version of the criminals, as Jefferson  
19          warned. Does the RICO-style conspiracy  
20          to deny rights save you from prosecution?

21                      If committing one crime one  
22          time would land people in jail, why  
23          hasn't the Attorney General investigated  
24          and prosecuted?

25                      The constitutions require

2           immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
3           breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
4           duty. Your oath of office requires you  
5           to act or face prison.

6                     42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,

8           Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
9           through 11, 26 PA CSA 701, 703, 705, 708,  
10          709, 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed  
11          in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056  
12          appear violated.

13                    I call for the federal and  
14          Commonwealth governments to perform their  
15          constitutional obligations to investigate  
16          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
17          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
18          1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

19                    The denial of God-given 42 USC  
20          1982 property rights for 24 years is  
21          egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,  
22          and requires immediate remedy.

23                    A just government must obey the  
24          rule of law. This color of law  
25          government must have its Charter to

4                   Public servants cannot refuse  
5           their sworn duty to act any more than a

9           is required for all who violate oath,  
10          Constitution or law.

11                   I remind Council, it takes a  
12          lot of cooperation to create and allow  
13          monumental corruption.

23          Christine Riddick and I'm here today in

25          by Councilman Oh, and I'd like to thank

11          and took it to each of the  
12          Councilperson's office on April the 2nd  
13          when I did a rally outside of City Hall.

14                    My son's case right now is in  
15          Supreme Court. So, again, I'm saying I'm  
16          here to get support from City Council,  
17          not blindly but informed support. This  
18          booklet contains all the proof, not that  
19          I've written, it's written and it's  
20          backed up by the City of Philadelphia's  
21          ballistics, the Medical Examiner's  
22          Office, and an expert, forensic expert.  
23          Also, the Superior Court -- it's the  
24          first document inside this booklet --  
25          states that an innocent man sits in

2           prison for no better reason than a failed  
3           statute. That means that is a technical  
4           error of why my son is sitting in prison  
5           for 26 years and eight months, and I'm  
6           here to ask for your support.

7                        When a statute is more

9           should take responsibility in changing  
10          that particular law and lifting your  
11          voices up with me that an innocent man,  
12          not because his mother says so or he says  
13          so, but the proof is right here. The  
14          proof has been available since 1991.

15                       The climate in Philadelphia was  
16          not right for reform, justice reform.  
17          This is the best climate that we have  
18          had. I have never seen a light at the  
19          end of the tunnel until now in  
20          Philadelphia with the changes in the  
21          District Attorney's Office. And with the  
22          help of Councilman Oh and others, I'm  
23          hoping that the Council, every  
24          Councilmember, regardless of what party  
25          you're at, to support an innocent man's

2           plight and his family's plight. And if  
3           you have any questions, my name and  
4           number is in the book. If you can't find  
5           it in the book, I'm in the Daily News.

9           name if you have any questions,  
10          additional questions, other than what  
11          this book has.

2                   No one should stand by and  
3 allow or tolerate a highly qualified,  
4 credentialed woman, a well-respected  
5 professional with two decades of  
6 experience in the financial sector to be  
7 used as a scapegoat by multiple  
8 departments over multiple years through  
9 multiple Administrations in the City of  
10 Philadelphia government.

11                  Today I rise to raise my voice,  
12 as I will not allow any woman to be  
13 thrown the blame of years of mistakes,  
14 inefficiencies, mishandlings, mistakes or  
15 lack of oversight when she, an African  
16 American woman, has finally been given a  
17 seat at the table.

18                  Thank you to Mayor Jim Kenney  
19 for recruiting, identifying, and hiring  
20 competent women with impeccable  
21 credentials and exceptional experience.  
22 Our City Treasurer, Rasheia Johnson, is  
23 no exception.

24                  Our City Treasurer has served  
25 as an investment banker, financial

2           advisor, and bond issuer in her stellar  
3           20-year career. She has also worked in  
4           the Municipal Finance Department at Loop  
5           Capital Markets in Philadelphia and,  
6           moreover, also served as our City  
7           Assistant to the Director of Finance in  
8           Debt Management.

9                   Throughout her career, our City  
10           Treasurer has managed over 7 billion --  
11           that's billion with a B -- in  
12           transactions with complex technical and  
13           analytical experience. Therefore, she  
14           has a proven record of leadership and  
15           excellence working in both the government  
16           and private sector. My mother would say  
17           she has earned her stripes.

18                   I commend our City Treasurer on  
19           her commitment to being completely  
20           transparent in our government. I thank  
21           her for not only bringing the issue of  
22           the unreconciled bank accounts to our  
23           attention, but also releasing an RFP to  
24           find a third party to resolve the  
25           problems that were present long before

2                   she was appointed to her post.

3                   Let me be clear. So to ensure  
4                   that there is no interpretation or  
5                   misinterpretation of my intent, I have  
6                   chosen to speak up and speak out as an  
7                   advocate for a highly qualified woman  
8                   with an unblemished record of performance  
9                   prior to deciding and choosing the  
10                  opportunity to serve the citizens of our  
11                  City.

12                  Let's review the facts.  
13                  Rasheia Johnson assumed her position in  
14                  January 2016. The City has known about  
15                  these issues as far back as 2014 during  
16                  the Nutter Administration when several  
17                  employees in the Treasury Office  
18                  responsible for daily bookkeeping  
19                  suddenly left their jobs.

20                  Fact: Findings reveal that  
21                  Johnson is the only Treasurer to  
22                  reconcile payroll records since 2010.  
23                  Has anyone probed why her predecessors  
24                  did not address the missing 27 million?  
25                  My homework tells me that Rasheia

2                   Johnson's predecessors did not reconcile  
3                   payroll for seven years.

4                   Based on homework, the good  
5                   news I have to report is that one of her  
6                   predecessors has fully acknowledged that  
7                   the discovery itself is the result of her  
8                   diligent work. Thank you, Rob Dubow.

9                   Comptroller Rhynhart stated  
10                  that, and I quote, "not reconciling  
11                  accounts is an inducement for  
12                  wrongdoing," end quote. Really?  
13                  However, if there was any wrongdoing, it  
14                  was not on Rasheia Johnson's watch.  
15                  Ms. Johnson inherited this unresolved  
16                  financial issue. The operative word is  
17                  "inherited." In fact, as best as I can  
18                  tell, Rasheia is the only professional  
19                  who took steps to clean up this mess that  
20                  other professionals failed to address.  
21                  Ms. Johnson identified the problem. Ms.  
22                  Johnson did not run away from the  
23                  discovery. Ms. Johnson identified the  
24                  best course of action to resolve the  
25                  problem. And as I tell my daughter all

2                   the time, look the lion in the mouth and  
3                   say, I will not be eaten.

4                   Ms. Johnson has now proceeded  
5                   to fix the problem. It is now fair that  
6                   we allow the City Treasurer to solve this  
7                   seven-year problem on the City's behalf.  
8                   It is now appropriate that we allow the  
9                   City Treasurer and the designated third  
10                  party to complete their assignment  
11                  accurately, not rapidly but accurately.

12                  Yes, it is absolutely  
13                  appropriate that we as members of City  
14                  Council probe, inquire about the  
15                  processes within City departments, drill  
16                  down and ask the tough questions that we  
17                  all do every day about how we spend our  
18                  taxpayers' dollars. This is our duty as  
19                  elected members of this legislative body.  
20                  However, in fulfilling this duty, we  
21                  should also be fair and judicious as we  
22                  seek the answers to our legitimate  
23                  questions.

24                  Fact: Since the news has been  
25                  made public, there have been departures

2                   from the Finance and Treasurer's Office.  
3                   Did anyone look behind the facts? Did  
4                   anyone care to look at any of the past  
5                   history? Our colleague Councilman Domb  
6                   and others have compared the urgency of  
7                   chief financial officers and accountants  
8                   in the private sector and business to  
9                   that of Ms. Johnson's team. Legitimate.  
10                  Many of us are aware that many businesses  
11                  in the private and non-profit sectors  
12                  manage CFO transitions very delicately  
13                  and often a lot -- several months for  
14                  on-boarding, shadowing, and intel-sharing  
15                  between the departing and incoming  
16                  financial officers. I witnessed this up  
17                  close and personal at the Urban League of  
18                  Philadelphia with the transition of your  
19                  leadership and the Philadelphia Visitors  
20                  and Convention Bureau with the transition  
21                  of their comptroller.

22                  What I now know is that the  
23                  City of Philadelphia currently does not  
24                  follow that model, leaving our Treasurer  
25                  or any Treasurer to navigate departmental

2           finances of varying sizes and  
3           complexities with little to no  
4           assistance.

5                   Fact: Having conferred with a  
6           number of experts over the last week,  
7           including my sister who is a CPA charged  
8           with finding off-short accounts for the  
9           federal government, it takes a treasurer  
10          up to six months to begin to grasp and  
11          fully analyze all accounts and functions,  
12          especially when there has been a complete  
13          lack of disclosure from those that had  
14          departed the position and left behind  
15          limited information with limited help for  
16          the transition, be that intentional or  
17          unintentional.

18                   Fact: Ms. Johnson discovered  
19          the lack of reconciliations in May of  
20          2016, five months after she started, and  
21          was working without the help and guidance  
22          of her predecessor.

23                   There have been many criticisms  
24          of Ms. Johnson and most of them have come  
25          from white men. Everyone has the luxury

2           to seize the opportunity to criticize, to  
3           cast judgment, to have an opinion.

4           That's easy. No one gets to dispute the  
5           facts. So if we're going to throw the  
6           net, let us cast the net wide and include  
7           everyone who had a role and share in the  
8           responsibility of this longstanding  
9           unresolved financial matter before  
10          January 2016 when Rasheia Johnson  
11          arrived.

12                   Fact: What so many people  
13          failed to disclose is that shortly after  
14          Johnson took her post as Treasurer in  
15          2016 and after she discovered the lack of  
16          reconciliations, she left for leave,  
17          maternity leave, to take care of her  
18          newborn child. She did not return until  
19          December of 2016, several months later.  
20          Due to the fact that the City of  
21          Philadelphia did not implement the  
22          opportunity to work from home until  
23          January of 2018, just four months ago,  
24          Rasheia Johnson was not able to  
25          adequately address these issues, and

2                   neither did anyone above her pay grade  
3                   despite knowing of the discoveries.

4                   I repeat, we can all have an  
5                   opinion. No one can argue the facts.  
6                   Therefore, in my personal opinion, this  
7                   is yet another example of a disguised  
8                   discrimination, mistreatment, and lack of  
9                   policies in place to ensure the success  
10                  of pregnant professional women and other  
11                  mothers across professions in our city.

12                  Now, I'm not surprised, because  
13                  as I tell my daughter all the time, women  
14                  must walk on water to be considered  
15                  equal. Black and brown women have to  
16                  walk on water excellently and fly  
17                  flawlessly to be equal.

18                  Rasheia Johnson is not unlike  
19                  the women in this City Council. She has  
20                  what my mother calls gumption, I call  
21                  moxie, and what my daughter calls keeping  
22                  it 100, telling it like it is. Ms.  
23                  Johnson's credentials, experience, work  
24                  ethic, dedication, honesty, and integrity  
25                  should not be challenged.

2                   I cannot be silent, because  
3                   silence is betrayal.

4                   In closing, Comptroller  
5                   Rynhart, who is also a working mother,  
6                   said there is a culture change that needs  
7                   to happen on the financial management of  
8                   the City. I agree. However, certainly  
9                   not to the detriment of working mothers,  
10                  pregnant mothers, black and brown women,  
11                  women, period, and the children that  
12                  these women come from. Perhaps the  
13                  culture change needs to start with us,  
14                  those in leadership, to accommodate,  
15                  encourage, and treat working mothers with  
16                  impressive credentials of all  
17                  socioeconomic backgrounds with the same  
18                  yardstick we measure others.

19                  Fact: A large number of  
20                  gender-blinded studies conducted within  
21                  various workforces show that women are  
22                  often held to impossible standards and  
23                  put in positions to take the blame for  
24                  others' mistakes. No. Given all I have  
25                  read and learned on this matter, I will

2                   not allow that circumstance here in this  
3                   City Council so blatantly and, in my  
4                   personal point of view, with unwarranted  
5                   judgment.

6                   One of my heroes, Shonda  
7                   Rhimes, stated, and I quote, "There is  
8                   such an interest in things being equal  
9                   and such a weary acceptance that it is  
10                  not," end quote.

11                  So I stand today to say I am  
12                  not weary of standing up and advocating  
13                  for yet another woman, most especially  
14                  competent and qualified women with  
15                  unblemished careers when they have been  
16                  unrightfully belittled and accused of  
17                  oversights, non-disclosures, and mistakes  
18                  created on someone else's watch.

19                  Mr. President, we can all have  
20                  an opinion. No one can dispute the  
21                  facts.

22                  Thank you, Mr. President.

25                  (Applause.)

6                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
7           you, Mr. President. Let me say how proud  
8           we are of all that was just said. And in  
9           fact, he's a male, but he's good, her  
10          Deputy or her Vice Chair of Finance.

11          He's good too, but she has from the very  
12          beginning been here, been with us, has  
13          been willing to give all that she has,  
14          and I'm in total agreement and very proud  
15          of all those facts that Councilwoman  
16          Blondell Reynolds Brown has said.

17                   And I wanted to also add on  
18          this issue about Eric Riddick. I  
19          remember when he was born. I've known  
20          his mother all these years in her fight,  
21          and we want her to know we stand with her  
22          as well.

23                   Thank you.

24                   Thank you, Mr. President.

5                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
6           Council President. I just want to  
7           acknowledge and also second the comments  
8           of my colleague Councilwoman Blondell  
9           Reynolds Brown. I've had multiple  
10          interactions with the Treasurer's  
11          Department since this young lady has  
12          taken on that position, but it's also  
13          common knowledge that this issue that  
14          she's addressing didn't start on her  
15          watch. And so I just want to thank the  
16          Councilwoman for stepping up to the plate  
17          and addressing this particular issue.

18                   Thank you very much.

20          Thank you, Councilman.

21                   The Chair recognizes  
22          Councilwoman Parker.

23                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
24          you, Mr. President. Mr. President, in  
25          the booklet entitled "In Pursuit of

3           support letter section, you will see a  
4           letter from a young woman by the name of  
5           Suzanne Christina. Here she is writing  
6           as an advocate, but we know her because  
7           she's performed as a singer and

9           also a resident of the Ninth Councilmanic  
10          District, and she has been advocating on  
11          behalf of Mr. Riddick long before even  
12          this resolution was introduced in  
13          Council. I just needed to say to my  
14          constituent, your Councilperson is paying  
15          attention to you. I see that your  
16          advocacy was presented before us today,  
17          and thank you.

18                   I also want to say special  
19          thank you to Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.  
20          Councilwoman, you know as an English  
21          teacher, there is nothing more  
22          frustrating for me when someone attempts  
23          to exude passion, but they have  
24          demonstrated no ability to do homework.  
25          I appreciate the homework that you have

2           done on this issue and the light that you  
3           shed on an issue and a subject that I  
4           have not and had not investigated in the  
5           great detail and done the research that  
6           you had uncovered here today.

7                   I think one of the things that  
8           was most shocking is that it would be

10          and feedback we did hear from her  
11          predecessors who are still actively  
12          engaged in our City as she bears the  
13          brunt of conversation regarding the  
14          future.

15                   So I'm just saying thank you,  
16          Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, for doing  
17          your homework and sharing the results of  
18          your research and data-driven efforts  
19          with all of your colleagues.

20                   Thank you.

22          Thank you, Councilwoman.

23                   The Chair recognizes Councilman

25                   COUNCILMAN OH: I'd just like

3                   aware of all these facts. I wasn't -- I  
4                   never was aware of what was going on,  
5                   but, Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds

7                   enlightened all of us about what is  
8                   happening. Someone is being blamed for  
9                   something that is not their fault.  
10                  Certainly they shouldn't be blamed, and  
11                  we can follow through now and understand  
12                  in a much better light what is happening.  
13                  So thank you for your diligence and your  
14                  willingness to stand up for someone who  
15                  we haven't even heard about facing these  
16                  accusations.

17                                 Thank you.

19                   Thank you, Councilman.

20                                 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
21                   Green.

22                                 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
23                   Council President. I want to salute my  
24                   colleague Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds  
25                   Brown for her commentary. I've known

2           Ms. Johnson since when I worked for  
3           Councilwoman Tasco and Councilwoman Tasco  
4           was the Chair of the Finance Committee,  
5           and in the role that Ms. Johnson had both  
6           at Loop Capital and Siebert, both  
7           minority investment banks, she provided  
8           great information and evidence to the  
9           City of Philadelphia and gave different  
10          ideas and suggestions that have benefited  
11          the City quite a bit.

12                    When the Administration, the  
13          previous Administration, was trying to  
14          sell PGW, it was Rasheia Johnson and  
15          Derek McNeil at that time at Loop Capital  
16          who gave us some ideas regarding a  
17          commercial paper program when we could  
18          not go to market in reference to getting  
19          additional money for the Philadelphia Gas  
20          Works, that she provided that was an  
21          outstanding opportunity and idea that  
22          saved and provided an opportunity for the  
23          City of Philadelphia to bring in capital  
24          for PGW. That idea was also shared by  
25          the airport, who also did a commercial

2           paper program when the airport also could  
3           not go to market because they were in the  
4           process of going through their capacity  
5           expansion program.

6                   I do find it interesting that  
7           based on her role as City Treasurer and  
8           one of the things I've done since I've  
9           been in this body is asked questions  
10          about what are the number of firms that  
11          we are using from an investment banking  
12          perspective in reference to being  
13          bookrunners for bond issuance, and I know  
14          Ms. Johnson and her staff have been very  
15          diligent about making sure we have  
16          inclusion for minority firms, especially  
17          investment banking firms and on the  
18          professional services in reference to how  
19          we issue debt in this City, something  
20          that we have not always historically  
21          done, because often it's been said that  
22          certain firms don't have the capacity to  
23          do certain types of offerings when the  
24          people that have run some of these  
25          minority firms have worked in majority

2                   firms and have gone to the same colleges  
3                   and universities that some of their  
4                   non-minority counterparts have gone to.

5                   So I do find it interesting  
6                   that in her goal to try to address  
7                   diversity, this issue is being brought up  
8                   on her watch. So I commend Councilwoman  
9                   Brown for her commentary, and I support  
10                  Ms. Johnson as we move forward.

11                  Thank you.

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13                  Thank you, Councilman.

14                  That concludes the speeches on  
15                  behalf of the minority and the majority,  
16                  and with that, the Chair recognizes  
17                  Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion  
18                  to adjourn.

20                  you. Inviting everyone, in particular  
21                  the Energy Authority will be holding its  
22                  annual briefing for members and staff  
23                  immediately following Council's session,
