2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. We're going to get
4 started. We are running extremely late.
5 If members will take their seats and the
6 visitors can retire from the floor and go
7 behind the rail. Thank you.

8 To give our invocation this
9 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor
10 Antonio Anderson of Mount Tabor Baptist
11 Church. He is here today as the guest of
12 Councilwoman Bass.

13 I would ask all members,
14 guests, and visitors to please rise.

15 (Councilmembers, guests, and
16 visitors rise.)

17 PASTOR ANDERSON: Councilman
18 Clarke, Councilwoman Bass, distinguished
19 City Council, and men and women and to
20 the great citizens of Philadelphia, today
21 we pray and celebrate the work and
22 stewardship of all of our elected
23 officials, who oftentimes have to be in
24 early and, after trying to meet and
25 satisfy the needs of all their

3 a few moments to spend quality time with
4 their family and get up the next day to

6 Today we stop to say thank you
7 for your entire work, your commitment to
8 our city and its citizens, your

10 better Philadelphia and assuring the
11 future of Philadelphia as one of the most
12 competitive cities for jobs, education,
13 and housing.

14 Like Nehemiah, the prophet, we
15 need you all to stay on the wall, to
16 complete the work, and don't come down
17 for your detractors. The work is too
18 great, people's lives are too important,
19 and our children are depending upon you.

20 But as you stay on the wall,
21 don't forget one in four citizens in
22 Philadelphia are considered in poverty.
23 As you stay on the wall, don't forget our
24 citizens are over-criminalized, and
25 justice is often unjustified. As you

3 been terrorizing our Hispanic community
4 with the threat of illegal deportations.
5 As you stay on the wall, don't forget our
6 children and senior citizens are the most

9 mandate in which you have been called and
10 elected to serve. Stay on the wall and
11 let's continue to work together, pray
12 together, to build a City of
13 Philadelphia, empower the citizens of
14 Philadelphia, and create a future where
15 all Philadelphians and our communities
16 prosper.

17 Let us pray.

18 Our Father and our God, we
19 thank you for this opening session of
20 City Council. We pray, God, that your
21 work will be done today. We pray that
22 lives will be changed. We pray, God,
23 that the work and the words that are
24 shared and commence today would be for
25 the betterment of all our people. God,

5 God, we need you to make sure

12 commitment to continue to work and to
13 stay on the wall.

14 We ask you, God, to ensure that
15 our citizens are looked out for and not
16 looked over.

17 God, we pray for this opening
18 session that you would be satisfied with
19 the words and the work that goes forth.

20 Amen.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you so much, Pastor. We appreciate
24 those inspiring words.

25 Council will be at ease.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. And, again, Pastor, thank you
5 so much for those inspiring words.

6 The next order of business is
7 the approval of the Journal of the
8 meeting of Thursday, May 24, 2018, and
9 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
11 you, Mr. President. I move that the
12 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May
13 24th, 2018 be approved.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you. It has been moved and
17 properly seconded that the Journal of the
18 meeting of Thursday, May 24th, 2018 stand
19 approved.

20 All those in favor say aye.

21 (Aye.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Those opposed?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 ayes have it. The Journal is approved.

3 The next order of business is
4 requests for leaves of absence, and the
5 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
7 you, Mr. President. On behalf of the
8 majority, there are no requests for
9 leaves of absence today.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair thanks the gentleman.

12 The Chair now recognizes
13 Councilman O'Neill.

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. On behalf of the
16 republicans, there are no requests for
17 leave of absence.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair thanks the gentleman.

20 At this time, I would like to
21 welcome and thank everyone who has taken
22 time out of their busy day to come down
23 to witness their government in action.
24 We genuinely appreciate you being here.
25 We hope your stay here today is a

2 knowledgeable one but, more importantly,
3 a pleasurable one, so much so that you
4 come again. So, again, thank you so
5 much.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilwoman Blackwell.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. Today we are honored
10 to have an African diplomatic delegation
11 join us. They are here to visit the
12 Regional Port Authority. They're on
13 their way to Harrisburg to meet with
14 Senator Sharif Street and visitor many
15 businesses, and we are just so happy that
16 they put it on their schedule to join us.
17 They are led certainly by Stan
18 Straughter, Chairman of ACBC, African
19 Caribbean Business Council, and Chairman
20 of UNESCO. They are joined by also Chris
21 Dunbar. Many of you know he's our Deputy
22 Treasurer, but he's also from Liberia.
23 His grandfather was President Tubman and
24 his grandmother was Harriet Tubman. So
25 we all know that we have some special

2 people here.

3 Dr. Darlene Thompson, Thelma
4 Pete, Gloria Williams, they're all part
5 of our Commission. We want to thank them
6 for being here. And we want you to know
7 that they are here to discuss trade and
8 mutual economic development and job
9 creation in Philadelphia and in their
10 respective countries.

11 It's important to note that
12 Cameroon, Ghana, and Cote d'Ivoire as
13 well as Liberia produce 80 percent of the
14 world's cocoa, a produce which is
15 extremely critical to the chocolate
16 manufacturing industry in Philadelphia
17 and Harrisburg. It is estimated that
18 trade with cocoa alone is over 3 billion
19 per year at the port.

20 Also, Philadelphia has a long
21 history with these countries. We want to
22 expand our relationship at every level.
23 Cameroon has Douala, Philadelphia's only
24 African sister city. Ghana -- and we
25 have Dr. Corte here -- in addition to

2 cocoa is noted because its first elected
3 President graduated from Lincoln
4 University and the University of
5 Pennsylvania. The current President of
6 Cote d'Ivoire graduated from Drexel
7 University and the University of
8 Pennsylvania.

9 Liberia has the largest
10 population of African immigrants living
11 in our city, and 54 of the founders of
12 the country of Liberia lived in
13 Philadelphia and attended Cheyney
14 University, the first historically black
15 university in the United States.

16 So we are very happy to have
17 them. We have mentioned just a few
18 names. Her Excellency Erieka Bennett --
19 and I'm going to ask them to stand first
20 as well as the people I just introduced.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Her
23 Excellency Erieka Bennett, founder and
24 mission head, AU Diaspora Africa Forum of
25 Republic of Ghana. His Excellency

2 Dr. Barfor Ajay Barwa, Ambassador of the
3 Republican of Ghana.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We
6 have Dr. Sandy Williams, Diaspora Africa
7 Forum.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And we
10 want to have Bumi Fernandez, President of
11 Odunde. You know that's this weekend,
12 and you know that Odunde in addition to
13 bringing some 400,000 people here, they
14 raised for us \$28 million and 30 if you
15 include the state. That's Bumi Fernandez
16 and Odunde. And we're naming that block
17 after her mother, Lois Fernandez, on
18 Saturday.

19 Bumi, stand up, President of
20 Odunde.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We
23 have Honorable Samuel Warzi, Deputy
24 Minister of Information and Culture and
25 Tourism from Republic of Liberia.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

4 Dr. Tony Luck, African Development
5 Specialist, Republic of South Africa.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
8 Paul Manhan, Economic Counselor for Cote
9 d'Ivoire.

10 And let me let you know that
11 they just presented to the President the
12 first map of their country and its
13 products created by a Ghanaian, and they
14 made that presentation to the President.
15 And we are so happy to enjoy the
16 relationship we had. You all know we
17 created Echoes of Africa in 2000 and the
18 Mayor's Commission on African and
19 Caribbean Immigrant Affairs in 2005.

20 So we don't want to hold them.
21 They've got to get to Harrisburg, but
22 please join me in welcoming them.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, and welcome.

3 you. Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you.

6 At this time, the Chair
7 recognizes Councilman Al Taubenberger to
8 present a resolution recognizing Angelo
9 Cataldi. Would Mr. Cataldi and those
10 accompanying him please join the
11 Councilman at the podium.

12 (Councilmembers and guests
13 approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 joining Councilman Taubenberger, we have
16 Councilman Oh, Councilman Greenlee,
17 Councilman Domb, Councilwoman Parker,
18 Councilman Johnson, Councilman Jones,
19 Councilman O'Neill, and Councilman
20 Squilla.

21 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
22 Mr. Cataldi, thank you for being here.
23 You do a great service to the City of
24 Philadelphia, and I just wanted to say
25 one word or a couple sentences and, that

2 is, my son William and I listen to you
3 every morning, and we greatly appreciate
4 what you say, even though when sometimes
5 it angers us, but the fact is you're
6 making us happy.

7 Whenever you talk about sports,
8 it generally makes people happy. We
9 might be upset with the results. Last
10 night's Phillies game was certainly an
11 example of not being happy, but in the
12 end, it does make you happy because
13 you're talking about something else other
14 than your own troubles, and that's a
15 very, very, very good service.

16 Honoring and recognizing Angelo
17 Cataldi on the Anniversary of his 30th
18 year on the air with SportsRadio 94WIP,
19 and his over 35 years of covering
20 Philadelphia Sports.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
22 although a native of Rhode Island, Angelo
23 Cataldi is and will always be a
24 Philadelphian at heart, due to his total
25 immersion into Philadelphia Sports and

2 his coverage for the past 35 years,
3 starting with writing for the
4 Philadelphia Inquirer in the early 1980s,
5 and then moving on to become the host of
6 WIP's Morning Show in 1989; and

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: And he's
8 taller than he looks on radio.

9 Whereas, during Mr. Cataldi's
10 time writing for the Philadelphia
11 Inquirer, he was a nominated finalist for
12 a Pulitzer Prize, due to his coverage of
13 the 1986 Philadelphia Eagles season under
14 the new head coach, the controversial
15 Buddy Ryan; and

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
17 Mr. Cataldi first appeared on the radio
18 in 1988 with co-host and Eagles legend
19 Tom Brookshier, Angelo combined his
20 entertainment skills along with his
21 robust support and coverage of our
22 Philadelphia Sports teams, which helped
23 build the passions of Philadelphia sports
24 fans; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,

2 upon his hosting of the 94WIP Morning
3 Show in 1989, it has contributed to the
4 rich history of vocal praise and
5 criticism of our Philadelphia sports
6 teams, coaches, players, fans and even
7 some of the sports reporters; and

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,
9 Angelo's robust coverage has helped lead
10 Philadelphians to be one of the most
11 informed -- I would say the most
12 informed -- vocal and supportive fan
13 bases in the United States and the world.

14 And it's the first time I've
15 ever heard you referred to as
16 Mr. Cataldi.

17 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
18 his 94WIP show, "Angelo Cataldi and the
19 Morning Team," has dominated the
20 Philadelphia sports radio airwaves for
21 the majority of his 30-year career in
22 radio broadcasting; and

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, over
24 the past 30 years of his radio coverage
25 of Philadelphia sports, Mr. Cataldi has

2 provided insightful, meaningful,
3 entertaining and brash commentary,
4 leading to impassioned discussions on
5 various Philadelphia sports topics; and

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
7 Mr. Cataldi's passion to get Philadelphia
8 fans involved led to the creation of the
9 infamous Wing Bowl, along with the
10 formation of the infamous "Dirty Thirty"
11 that will live on in NFL Draft lore
12 forever;

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
14 as the Seattle Seahawks claim the 12th
15 Man, we Philadelphians claim Angelo
16 Cataldi as our 12th Teammate. His
17 passion electrifies Philadelphia fans,
18 and pushes the fans to the most
19 vociferous fans in the nation of
20 Philadelphia -- fans in the nation in the
21 City of Philadelphia;

22 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
23 Resolved, by the Council of the City of
24 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor,
25 recognize, and celebrate Angelo Cataldi

2 for his coverage of Philadelphia sports
3 for more than 35 years, and for the
4 passion he has brought to our City of
5 Philadelphia.

6 Congratulations.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 the Chair recognizes Mr. Cataldi for
10 remarks.

11 MR. CATALDI: Thank you,
12 Council President. I hereby authorize
13 the funding for the signing of LeBron
14 James as soon as possible.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. CATALDI: Nice to have all
17 this power up here.

18 Look, I know you guys got
19 serious business to do, and I cannot
20 begin to tell you, Councilman
21 Taubenberger, I cannot begin to tell you
22 the honor this is for me, for one reason
23 above all others. I did move here 35
24 years ago from Rhode Island, which I
25 never really liked that much, and my main

3 close as you can be to actually being a
4 Philadelphian without being born here,
5 and I feel like this kind of certifies
6 that, and I'd love to believe for the
7 rest of my life that I am now actually

9 a Philadelphian.

10 Thank you very much.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: We
13 have a very couple special things. This
14 is actually memorialized, so the actual
15 resolution is right here, and let your
16 wife actually have some of it as well.
17 And something very, very special indeed.
18 I've worked with my colleagues. Everyone
19 does not get these. So you are special.

20 Honoring and recognizing Angelo
21 Cataldi for creating 30 years of
22 entertaining, enlightening, and
23 progressive sports talk radio in
24 Philadelphia as host of WIP's Morning
25 Show, a ratings juggernaut, a national

4 Congratulatory.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Council will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Before our next presentation,
11 I'd like to recognize Councilman Oh,
12 Councilman Johnson, and Councilwoman
13 Reynolds Brown.

14 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
15 much, Council President. Without any
16 planning, I've been alerted that we have
17 a very special guest in Chambers today.
18 He is visiting Philadelphia. His name is
19 Paul Ritter. He's here with his family.
20 And in light of our city's drug epidemic;
21 in fact, our nation's drug epidemic, Paul
22 Ritter is a teacher who with his students
23 began the first ever drug giveback
24 program, prescription drug giveback
25 program. Our city has emulated with his

3 He is right here with his
4 family. I'd ask him to stand up. Thank
5 you for joining us today.

7 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
8 much, Council President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 Councilman Johnson.

12 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
13 Council President. I just want to
14 acknowledge some interns from a program
15 that I established when I first arrived
16 in City Council in 2011. It's the
17 Airport Summer Internship Program. We
18 have some interns who are here just
19 observing our process today with their
20 supervisor, Ms. Maryanne Mahoney.

21 And so I just want to take a
22 moment -- they're to the left of me --
23 just to acknowledge these young folks who
24 have come down to see our work in
25 progress.

6 Thank you, and welcome. Thank you for
7 being here today.

9 Councilwoman.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you
11 very much, Mr. President, and thank you
12 for the accommodation. As an alum of
13 Philadelphia High School for Girls,
14 affectionately known as Girls' High, I
15 want to join with Katherine Gilmore, my
16 Chief of Staff, also a Girls' High alum,
17 and our Honorable Marlene F. Lachman,
18 Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas Judge,
19 also a Girls' High alum, to welcome
20 several Girls' High students who indeed
21 will be leaders of tomorrow. And so we
22 want to say welcome to Chelsea Davis, if
23 you would move in so we can stand up so
24 that we can see you, Jocelyn Miller,
25 Jermoya Parkinson, Cindy Chow, Jessica

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you
8 very much for the accommodation.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 Welcome.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilman Squilla, who will
14 present a resolution congratulating the
15 Constitution High School Boys Basketball
16 Team. Would Coach Robert Moore and those
17 accompanying him please join the
18 Councilman at the podium.

19 (Councilmembers and guests
20 approached podium.)

21 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
22 Council President. And I do want to say
23 it's an honor to be here today to
24 celebrate this great occasion and the
25 same day as Angelo Cataldi. So maybe

2 they can talk about Constitution on the
3 radio show and what a great job they do.

4 Being in the First District is
5 an honor because we represent so many
6 champions. Nothing on the other people
7 here in Council, but the First District
8 does have most of the champions here in
9 the City of Philadelphia.

10 But today we would like to
11 honor and congratulate the Constitution
12 High School Boys Basketball Team, The
13 Generals, on winning the 2018 PIAA State
14 Championship for the AA Classification.

15 Whereas, The Generals, led by
16 Head Coach Robert Moore, finished with a
17 record of 21 and 11; and

18 Whereas, the Varsity Basketball
19 Program at Constitution High School was
20 started only a mere 9 years ago and the
21 team has advanced to the State Playoffs
22 every year of their existence winning 199
23 games in that period, including a record
24 of 33 and 5 in State Playoff Games and 4
25 State Championships, 1 runner-up in that

2 time. They won 5 City Titles in 9 years
3 and 1 Public League Championship in 2012;
4 and

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
6 The Generals defeated Our Lady of the
7 Sacred Heart to win the State
8 Championship by a score of 81 to 71 on
9 March the 27th, 2018;

10 Whereas, The Generals were led
11 by Damon Wall - 1st Team All Public
12 League, 1st Team Associated Press
13 All-State, and Associated Press State
14 Player of the Year. Jahmir
15 Marable-Williams - 2nd Team All Public
16 League and 3rd Team Associated Press
17 All-State. Keshawn "Champ" Hammonds -
18 3rd Team All Public League, 2nd Team
19 Associated Press All-State; and

20 Whereas, based on their past
21 performance, it is safe to assume that
22 The Generals from Constitution High
23 School Boys Basketball Team will only get
24 better with time; now, therefore, be it

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Resolved,

2 by the Council of the City of
3 Philadelphia, that we hereby congratulate
4 the Constitution High School Boys
5 Basketball Team on winning the 2018 PIAA
6 State AA Championship;

7 Further resolved, that this
8 engrossed copy of this resolution be
9 presented to the Constitution High School
10 Boys Basketball Team, further evidence of
11 the sincere sentiment of this legislative
12 body.

13 Congratulations.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
16 the Chair recognizes Coach Moore for
17 remarks.

18 COACH MOORE: Thank you,
19 Council President Clarke.

20 I'd like to thank Council
21 President Clarke, Councilman Johnson,
22 Councilman Squilla for having us today.
23 I'll keep this brief. I just wanted to
24 express our gratitude to everybody here
25 for continuing to fund School District of

2 Philadelphia public schools so that
3 schools like Constitution, a Philadelphia
4 public high school, can compete at this
5 level and win four state championships in
6 seven years and see all of our basketball
7 players go to college every single year.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

2 Council.

3 I don't come here -- well, we
4 don't come here as a different kind of
5 democrat to be disruptive in Council,
6 right? But the tactics and the
7 strategies that was used today to be
8 disruptive were used to get attention to
9 a matter that they felt important to us.
10 I think we can learn something from that,
11 but I would much rather be disruptive out
12 on the street. And on Saturday,
13 beginning on Saturday, we're going to go
14 into Councilman Kenyatta Johnson's
15 district and take our fight to Kenyatta's
16 district in support of City Council.

17 We come here today to support
18 you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Rebuild?

21 MR. BUSSIE: When the Mayor --
22 oh, I'm sorry. I'm talking about --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are
24 you talking about Rebuild?

25 MR. BUSSIE: Yes, Rebuild,

2 180108.

3 So we came here to support you
4 guys, because we didn't like the lies and
5 the deception that the Mayor put out
6 there that Council was a do-nothing
7 Council, that Council was holding up
8 Rebuild, which couldn't be further from
9 the truth. But the Mayor is allowed to
10 make those statements about Council and
11 divide you guys and split you guys like
12 that, because you guys are divided.

13 I never said anything or we as
14 a different kind of democratic said
15 nothing about Cherelle Parker and her
16 ribbon-cutting ceremony with the Mayor.
17 We said nothing about any member of
18 Council, except Kenyatta Johnson, and
19 asked the question did Kenyatta Johnson
20 cut a deal with the Mayor and flip on us,
21 because we're going to start -- I'm not
22 saying he did or didn't, but we're going
23 to start calling Councilmembers out
24 asking for a different level of
25 accountability.

2 We're here today to support
3 City Council, the brave City
4 Councilmembers with the courage to stand
5 up to John Dougherty and the building
6 trades.

7 Bobby Henon, it don't take a
8 lot of courage to say I'm against raising
9 taxes, but what it do take a lot of
10 courage to do, to say the building trades
11 are unfair for only hiring one percent
12 women in the building trades. What it do
13 take a lot of courage to say, that the
14 building trades are unfair for only
15 having 24 percent minority participation
16 when we represent 65 percent of the City.

17 We need our Councilmembers
18 at-large like Helen Gym and Taubenberger
19 and Bobby Henon, not at-large, but we
20 need you guys to stand up for the things
21 that are systemically wrong with our
22 system, not to baby easy bull crap like
23 don't raise our taxes. We see through
24 the games. But what we need you to do is
25 have the courage to stand up for what's

2 right and what's in the best interest of
3 our city.

4 What they're allowed to do is
5 pick the good ones apart. The Maria
6 Quinones-Sanchez and the Cindy Bass and
7 the Curtis Jones, they have to vote on
8 legislation that they don't really
9 necessarily agree with because they don't
10 want to get broken off by the Mayor.
11 They don't want to get segregated by the
12 Mayor. We need you guys in City Council
13 to stand together. We got your back.
14 That is why we here.

15 Benjamin Franklin said any fool
16 can criticize and most fools do. We
17 don't come here to criticize. We come
18 here to have your back, and what's
19 offensive to us or what we find
20 disturbing is when we come to have your
21 back and you don't have each other's
22 back. And what we trying to say to
23 y'all -- and I don't understand how you
24 don't recognize that this is a different
25 day in Philadelphia. We're here to

2 support you. We're here to support the
3 good Councilmembers that want to stand up
4 for us, but have the courage to do so.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony,
7 sir.

8 (Applause.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: Rochelle Bilal,
10 commenting on 180108.

11 (Applause.)

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 afternoon.

15 MS. BILAL: Good afternoon,
16 Council President and City
17 Councilmembers. I'm commenting on
18 180108, 180124, 160248, 180384, and I got
19 to do it in three minutes, so I'm getting
20 these numbers out, 180167 and 170854.

21 First, let me say that we know,
22 Councilpeople, that you have been bullied
23 and you have been fighting in reference
24 to Rebuild. We know that you've gotten
25 phone calls. We know that everybody is

2 talking about whether you going to run
3 again or not. But let me say this to
4 you: You're a human being first, and if
5 you don't have a City Council job, you'll
6 still be a human being afterwards. Do
7 not let them bully you into this.

8 No MOU with the building trades
9 has succeeded and worked for the past 25
10 years. If you do not get it written in a
11 contract, it will not work for anybody in
12 this city. I'm saying to you when it
13 comes down to MOUs, they're like chewing
14 gum, you eat it, when the sweetness is
15 gone, you throw it out. Let's not do
16 that this time.

17 People in this city want to
18 work. They need the jobs. Young people
19 that go through these training things,
20 they can go into the building trades, but
21 they need to stop blocking them with a
22 bunch of rhetoric.

23 So, please, when you get to the
24 MOUs in this, make them write it down.
25 Make them sign an agreement or a

2 contract, not an MOU that has not worked
3 in this city for 25 years. And we
4 support you in your struggle in reference
5 to Rebuild.

6 Second, 160248. I came and I
7 said this before. If we are going to
8 give new people occupancy tax and relief,
9 then the people that's been paying the
10 taxes for 25, 30 years in this city need
11 a break first. 160248 now says you can
12 come from New York, start a business, we
13 going to give you a break, but those that
14 struggled to pay it every day, you don't
15 say nothing to them. We've been paying
16 it. Stop waiving it. I say vote no on
17 that.

18 I say vote -- I agree for
19 170854. I agree. Vote yes.

20 And increase -- I got 28
21 seconds. 180167, before you vote on
22 that, I understand you want to increase
23 it for those that come in, buy low, sell
24 high. That's flipping. Fine, but you
25 got people caught up in that

2 gentrification that now has to sell their
3 house and now you want to penalize them
4 more by increasing the transfer real
5 estate taxes. I think take a minute,
6 look at a program that can help them so
7 they can help themselves.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Chantay Love,
13 commenting on 180108.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. LOVE: Good afternoon. I'm
18 speaking on Bill 180108, and we had -- I
19 had a prepared statement, but two days
20 ago one of my staff member's husband, who
21 is a construction worker, and his -- the
22 owner of his construction company took
23 him to a site to do an evaluation, and
24 the people there thought he wasn't
25 supposed to be there. He's his lead man.

2 And someone on the site, another building
3 company, took and stabbed him in the
4 side, collapsed his lungs. He's in the
5 hospital now. Just finished getting a
6 house in North Philadelphia about a month
7 ago, who looks like he's going to be out.

8 And what I'm saying today is
9 that, City Council, we're asking you to
10 stand strong, because building trades
11 have had a history of racism, but not
12 only that, if we're asking them, they
13 should want to build something better,
14 and their infrastructure and how they
15 create and how they treat people should
16 be different. They should want -- that
17 we should want people in our communities
18 to have a say, but also to say how about
19 that young man who said, I helped build
20 that, I helped create that, I helped do
21 that. And it should be those who live
22 here to do that, and that we have to
23 change how we operate. We must demand
24 it. And I know that it's hard. I know
25 that it's hard, but you should be asking

2 for the same thing at the Convention
3 Center, that they all sign a contract.
4 We should have contracts that say that.

5 It's only those contracts that
6 hit their pocket that will allow them to
7 be different, and that the United States
8 is watching us. They watching us do
9 crime reform. They're also requiring
10 that we do politics different.

11 I shouldn't have to stand here
12 to say that I have a construction worker
13 ready to try to save his life because
14 there has been a whole, whole culture to
15 say that black and brown people do not
16 matter, that we build countries and build
17 worlds, but that we do not matter to take
18 part in this. And I'm asking that if you
19 don't have the courage to say no, then
20 guess what? Table it until you do for a
21 week, at least a week, so that you can at
22 least renegotiate.

23 And I thank you for having this
24 opportunity.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Reuben Jones.

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: He's
7 not here?

8 CHIEF CLERK: Pamela Williams.

9 (No response.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Paula Peebles,
11 commenting on 180108.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. PEEBLES: Good afternoon,
14 everyone.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. PEEBLES: I'm speaking to
18 Bill 180108, which my colleagues have
19 already addressed, so I won't reiterate
20 what they have spoke to, but what I would
21 like to do is appeal to Council to stand
22 in solidarity with the people and the
23 voters of this city and to oppose any
24 MOUs.

25 Many of you already know I'm a

2 developer here in Philadelphia, very
3 familiar with construction in this town.
4 And so we are appealing to you not to go
5 for the okeydoke of MOUs. You know how
6 many MOUs we've had with Temple
7 University with the building trades?
8 Johnny Doc is the same doc that he's
9 been. His union is racist.

10 So we're asking you to have
11 guts. Don't fear Doc for 2019. Fear our
12 votes. Fear our votes.

13 (Applause.)

14 MS. PEEBLES: And so please
15 don't just table it. Remove the idea of
16 an MOU. We need a contract, something
17 that we can actually have a legal
18 document that we can take into court. We
19 have a whole list of lawyers that stand
20 with the people pro bono. So we're
21 appealing to you Councilpeople. And we
22 won't forget. As you can see, we're very
23 engaged. We won't forget if you vote
24 against the people.

25 Don't fear Johnny Doc. Fear

2 our vote. No stadium, no deal.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you for your testimony.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Majid Alsayegh.

7 (No response.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Majid Alsayegh.

9 (No response.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Craig Williams,
11 commenting on 180108.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 afternoon.

15 MR. WILLIAMS: Good afternoon,
16 President Clarke, members of the City
17 Council. My name is Craig Williams and
18 I'm here representing two of my
19 businesses, the Williams Group, real
20 estate developer, and Pride Enterprises
21 Incorporated, builder and construction
22 manager. I'm here to speak in support of
23 Bill No. 180124 and the importance of
24 having mandated significant minority
25 inclusion on Rebuild projects.

2 Philadelphia is the United
3 States' fifth largest city behind New
4 York, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Houston.
5 Unlike those cities, Philadelphia has a
6 majority-minority population. Wikipedia
7 indicates that in 2016 45 percent of the
8 population was white and 55 percent of
9 the population was non-white. Of that 55
10 percent, 44 percent were African
11 American. Add Latinos and it's well
12 above 50 percent. Latino is a cultural,
13 not a racial distinction, but we're not
14 here to split hairs. Suffice it to say,
15 that Philadelphia is a majority black and
16 brown city.

17 However, the point is that
18 black and brown Philadelphians, while
19 prominent in numbers, command less than
20 one percent of the local economy of the
21 City. The Bureau of Labor and Statistics
22 indicate that in 2018 unemployment for
23 Philadelphia's white population is at 4.3
24 percent. For blacks it's 7.3 percent.
25 Comparatively for other minorities, it's

2 3 percent for Asians and 5.4 percent for
3 Latinos. African Americans by far are
4 the most unemployed and once again black
5 and brown people lag well behind other
6 demographics.

7 Pew research states poverty is
8 the one -- is one of Philadelphia's most
9 enduring problems. At 25.7 percent, the
10 poverty rate is the highest among the
11 nation's top ten largest cities, and
12 nearly half of all poor residents are in
13 deep poverty, defined as 50 percent below
14 federal poverty lines, below the federal
15 poverty line. It is worth noting that in
16 recent years Philadelphia's poverty rate
17 has been relatively stable. However,
18 among -- am I running out of time? Well,
19 you know what, I'm going to cut to the
20 conclusion.

21 Obviously the statistics paint
22 a picture where the participation in the
23 local economy is quite unbalanced, and
24 the Philadelphia Rebuild program with its
25 stipulated participation levels, both at

2 the labor level as well as the contract
3 level, are designed and intended to
4 address this disparity. This is critical
5 from an economic and employment
6 standpoint as well as from a development
7 standpoint.

8 The neighborhoods where these
9 people live are at the fringe, and in
10 order to make them attractive to
11 developers like myself and to make it
12 feasible, we need for the economic
13 prosperity of the City to be shared in
14 those neighborhoods.

15 Thank you for your time.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

18 Clerk, can you read the name of
19 our next speaker, please.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Michael Bowman,
21 commenting on 180108.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. BOWMAN: Good afternoon,
24 Council President Clarke and members of
25 City Council. My name is Michael Bowman

1 6/7/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and I am Principal of Rittenhouse
3 Strategies LLC, which is a consulting
4 firm focused primarily on real estate
5 development, construction, and diversity
6 and inclusion-related services.

7 Rittenhouse Strategies is
8 currently partnering with the Fairmount
9 Park Conservancy as a project user for
10 the Rebuild Philadelphia program. I
11 appear before Council today to testify in
12 support of the Rebuild Philadelphia
13 initiative, which I believe will be a
14 model for progressive urban economic
15 policy, particularly as it relates to
16 promoting the growth of diverse
17 businesses in our great city.

18 Philadelphia City Council has
19 long recognized the need for greater
20 access to economic opportunities for
21 diverse businesses in the City of
22 Philadelphia. Nevertheless, recent data
23 shows that in our majority-minority city,
24 80 percent of Philadelphia businesses are
25 white-owned, with 10 percent owned by

2 Asians and only 2.4 percent by African
3 Americans. National statistics also
4 clearly show that minority-owned
5 businesses face significant challenges in
6 the marketplace. By way of example, 50
7 percent of minority businesses are in
8 industries with the lowest sales
9 nationwide, and on average minority-owned
10 businesses are much less likely to
11 procure financing from traditional banks
12 or other lending institutions.

13 Again, the statistics are clear
14 that minority-owned businesses, both in
15 Philadelphia and across this country,
16 face many challenges, which is why I
17 wholeheartedly support the policy goals
18 enunciated in the Rebuild initiative
19 plan; in particular, the program's
20 diverse business participation goals as
21 well as, importantly, the
22 capacity-building infrastructure that has
23 been contemplated for the program.

24 As Council knows and in my
25 experience as a consultant addressing

2 these issues, it is not enough to provide
3 an opportunity for diverse firms to bid
4 on work. Rather, given the historical
5 and persistent barriers, I believe that
6 the City of Philadelphia gets it right
7 here in creating a program that will,
8 among other things, ensure timely
9 payments to diverse firms, perform
10 business assessments for these firms,
11 facilitate access to capital, and even
12 utilize diverse firms still going through
13 but not yet completing the certification
14 process.

15 For these reasons, I
16 wholeheartedly support this Rebuild
17 initiative and look forward to its
18 enactment.

19 I thank Council President
20 Clarke and City Council, and this
21 concludes my testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Willie
23 Singletary, commenting on 180108.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. SINGLETARY: Thank you for

2 this opportunity to stand today. As a
3 kid growing up in Southwest Philadelphia
4 attending Comegys, Shaw, and West
5 Philadelphia High School, I remember
6 being given an assignment in school and
7 having to go to Kingsessing Library to
8 research the topic. I became a regular
9 so much so that Mr. Elam, the librarian,
10 and staff knew me by name. And I could
11 not wait until the summer to go to
12 Kingsessing Summer Camp and Recreation
13 Center where I went every summer until I
14 was old enough to get a Phila job and
15 work there. The late Mr. Thomas, who was
16 one of the lifeguards, and Selena who ran
17 the rec center, we did not have the best
18 equipment. As a matter of fact,
19 sometimes we didn't have equipment at
20 all. We didn't have many different
21 things, but we had volunteers who came
22 and made the summer camp special for us.
23 People taught us the value of teamwork,
24 like people like Mr. Abe and Mr. Jerry,
25 each one teach one. Yet we learned

2 lessons there that could not be replaced,
3 and it was about family.

4 I am excited about the new rec
5 centers and the new libraries. However,
6 we cannot build these rec centers and
7 libraries without having true diversity
8 and inclusion. We have a vested
9 interest, social equity, and true
10 diversion and inclusion. We have a Mayor
11 who has promised us inclusion, and
12 according to analysis completed in
13 February, that 66 percent of Kenney's
14 high level appointments are white, 22
15 percent are black, 8 percent are Latino,
16 3 percent are Asian and 1 percent are
17 Native American. Philadelphia's
18 population is 36 percent white, 41
19 percent black, 14 percent Latino, 7
20 percent Asian, and less than 1 percent
21 Native American. We have to turn this
22 thing around. But yet --

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. SINGLETARY: -- he's trying
25 to push down our throat and everyone's a

1 6/7/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 contract that's against diversity. But
3 he halted Catholic Charities' contract
4 with DHS and foster care because they
5 didn't have diversion, because they
6 wouldn't put people -- kids in same sex
7 marriages. Yet he want to make us do
8 this.

9 And I want to say this: In
10 this 500 building out project and all of
11 these projects that come, we have to
12 start now. In 2013, the most reliable
13 figures are that 80 percent of the
14 building trades were not us, were white.
15 And as African Americans, we have the
16 highest population in the City. We have
17 a black President of Council. We have
18 eight, eight, eight black City Council.

19 (Applause.)

20 MR. SINGLETARY: We have three
21 other minorities.

22 There's a book that the late
23 Senator Hardy Williams told me read
24 called "Blood and Power" by Stephen Fox.
25 And as a kid in Southwest, I don't hate

2 the game -- they say don't hate the
3 player; hate the game. I'm not against
4 Johnny Doc, because you know why? He's
5 doing what he wants to do for his people,
6 but we have leaders in City Council, and
7 it's time for you to stand up for your
8 people who are going to vote for us.

9 Thirty seconds, I promise I'll
10 be out of here. Thirty seconds I'm
11 wrapping.

12 Kenyatta Johnson, I thank God
13 for you, but late Senator Anthony
14 Williams told you before politics, before
15 power, and before money and even before
16 friendship, put the people's interests.

17 Councilwoman Blackwell --

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you.

20 MR. SINGLETARY: -- in 1971 --

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Rev?

22 MR. SINGLETARY: -- when you

23 and Lu --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Rev?

25 MR. SINGLETARY: -- helped

10 microphone.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Reverend?

13 (Mr. Singletary talking without
14 microphone.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Amen.

17 (Mr. Singletary talking without
18 microphone.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Wrap
20 it up.

21 (Mr. Singletary talking without
22 microphone.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Reverend, Reverend, you got to wrap it
25 up. Amen. All right.

5 Okay. Rev, Rev, Rev, you got three
6 minutes. You're like on number seven.
7 Wrap it up.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you very much for your testimony,
12 Reverend.

13 Next name.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Marion Johnson.

15 (No response.)

16 CHIEF CLERK: Marion Johnson.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.

18 Johnson.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on

21 180124.

22 MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 afternoon, Ms. Johnson.

25 MS. JOHNSON: -- Council

2 President and members of Council and also
3 to the very important other people who
4 are assembled here for various reasons.

5 I just want to say that I came
6 today to go on record for Bill No.
7 180124. That's the Rebuild, in regard to
8 Rebuild. And I've been here already in
9 regards to Barrett Playground. I'm going
10 to link these closely together.

11 I have lived 45 years in the
12 Logan area, and out of those 45 years, I
13 spent a lot of time at Barrett Recreation
14 Center as though it was my home, my
15 family and I and some other people from
16 the community, taking on the
17 responsibility of cleaning that place,
18 painting that place, and making it a safe
19 place for our children in the community.
20 We've lived on promises, promises, and
21 promises. And I just want to point out
22 it's not because we have "don't care"
23 people in our community. It's because
24 the City doesn't give us the proper
25 assistance that they're supposed to give

2 us, and that's done by certain areas.

3 And I make that statement freely because

4 my daughter and I, we travel around and

5 check other recreation centers and take

6 pictures and identify what's good in

7 certain neighborhoods but not ours. And

8 not because we are no working people. We

9 try very hard. That's how we hung in

10 that playground, keeping those doors open

11 and safe for the children.

12 I just want to get to the
13 point. I support this bill specifically

14 because I've been told that the Rebuild

15 will be making the recreation centers

16 safe and clean. That's because we have a

17 commitment saying that, providing we're a

18 certain number on that Rebuild list.

19 However, we're hanging in there just the

20 same and holding people to their word.

21 Now, I'll get to the end of
22 what my message is today. I'm here

23 specifically for that Rebuild, and if

24 there's some flaws in it, I'm only

25 supporting that because I'm not

1 6/7/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 knowledgeable that there's problems in it
3 for our people. And I say our people.
4 I'm just doing a follow-up here.

5 But I also want to point out
6 that I support that bill because I've
7 been told we're on the list and that
8 Barrett will not be patched up like it
9 was back in the '80s when they patched it
10 up just good enough to keep those doors
11 open.

12 So I wanted to say that I've
13 been -- we, along with some people who
14 have suffered ills because they're even
15 in the immediate -- walk out their doors
16 at that playground. But to get to the
17 bottom of it, we've been told that that
18 Rebuild money will rebuild that
19 recreation center. So that's why I'm
20 here today. In fact, I was the first one
21 in here today and been waiting here
22 patiently ever since, because we feel
23 it's worth the while.

24 But I also want to say that
25 when we did a walkthrough in the latter

2 part of 2017, it was done with
3 Councilwoman Cindy Bass along with the
4 Mayor who we had asked to come, and they
5 responded. At that time, we felt
6 comfortable because the Mayor did state
7 after seeing the holes in the walls, the
8 cement cracked up where the children play
9 in the areas that, yes, these things do
10 need to be resolved by being built. So
11 that's why I went on record supporting
12 this Rebuild.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you.

15 MS. JOHNSON: I'm going to
16 end -- I could say more, but I know the
17 time is -- and I don't want to be
18 disrespectful, but I do want to make this
19 point. Councilwoman Cindy Bass is now
20 our Councilperson in that area for that
21 playground, and I just want to go on
22 record saying thank God that she has come
23 aboard now. We've been meeting with her.
24 She has inherited this situation.
25 However, she has made a firm commitment

2 to stand by us to make sure that that
3 recreation center gets its fair share of
4 being rebuilt like it needs to be.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 MS. JOHNSON: So I just wanted
9 to -- she didn't know that I was going to
10 be here today, and I may be rattling on.
11 It's because I'm a little emotional about
12 it after hearing all of these things
13 said, but I wanted to go on record making
14 it clear that she came aboard. She's
15 worked with us hand in hand, and we know
16 she had certain obstacles that reported
17 out clearly. I'm a former City Council
18 worker too.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 She's going to take care of it.

21 MS. JOHNSON: Yeah. So I want
22 to go on record and join with these
23 people here saying that we certainly
24 thank God for Councilwoman Cindy Bass
25 coming aboard, because now it looks like

2 we got some help to fight, fight, fight
3 with us.

4 (Applause.)

6 Okay. Thank you, Ms. Johnson. Thank

10 (No response.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Craig Matthews.

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Craig Matthews not here?

15 CHIEF CLERK: Phyllis Walker,
16 commenting on 180569.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 afternoon.

20 MS. WALKER: Hello. My name is
21 Phyllis Walker and I live in the 51st
22 Ward, 10th Division, Councilwoman
23 Blackwell's district. I've been a
24 community activist out in our community
25 for almost 38 years.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.

3 Walker, talk into the mic.

4 MS. WALKER: Almost 38 years.

5 And I brought with me today some

6 information. I really didn't know what I

7 was running into, but I got a great

8 education once I got here. I brought

9 some pictures. You're talking about

10 giving the Redevelopment Authority more

11 properties. In the 51st Ward, we have

12 properties that they have not developed.

13 They're holding onto them, and that's

14 fine. I'm for progress, but when you're

15 in a community and people are already

16 hopeless and living a hopeless life, it's

17 very difficult to tell a child we're

18 going to send you into a school district

19 and raise money for a school district and

20 send them into a structured environment,

21 and then once they come outside of that

22 door, they're living in an environment

23 that's like a war zone.

24 To give the Redevelopment

25 Authority more properties, I understand

2 you need progress, but I've been fighting
3 this since 1999 when I had dark hair.
4 The Daily News recorded it, same
5 properties, same Redevelopment Authority,
6 and you want to give them more
7 properties.

8 If you would pass these around
9 to Council, someone. I have them here
10 for you to look at them. I had to go
11 through one whole year of trying to find
12 out who owned the properties. First they
13 sent me to Public Property, then to the
14 Redevelopment Authority, and nobody
15 wanted to take ownership. The sad part
16 is, citizens like myself, we have nobody
17 to hold anybody accountable once you give
18 people properties and things of this
19 nature.

20 So I came here today, and I was
21 told to just put my name on the list and
22 I could be heard, but then I realized I
23 had to do some real political stuff to be
24 heard, which is very sad, when I'm a
25 citizen, taxpaying citizen, disabled.

2 The Redevelopment Authority is breaking
3 many laws, the disability law. They're
4 breaking the City Ordinance 11-505, and
5 nobody cares.

6 So what I'm trying to say here
7 is, I don't mind you giving people more
8 properties, but let's make them
9 accountable for fixing the ones they're
10 holding on to until some developer can
11 come through and pay them big bucks to
12 fix them. In my neighborhood, that can't
13 continue to happen.

14 So I gave you this, because
15 Public Property fixed their part. When I
16 went to the Redevelopment Authority,
17 matter of fact, I had to go to the Land
18 Bank and talk to Paulette in Jannie's
19 office, Councilwoman Blackwell's
20 office -- I'm sorry, Councilwoman
21 Blackwell -- to talk to them to say help
22 us get this resolved. It's not that the
23 people don't care. It seems to me that
24 City Council has lost its place in the
25 people's lives. They forgot who they

2 serve. They serve us. They serve
3 citizens.

4 So I'm here to say let's not
5 give them any more property until they
6 can be responsible for what they already
7 have.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Esposito,
12 commenting on 180409.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MS. ESPOSITO: Good afternoon.

17 Thank you, Mr. President, members of
18 Council. I'm here in my role as Co-Chair
19 of POWER's Economic Dignity Team,
20 Philadelphians Organized to Witness,
21 Empower and Rebuild, an inter-faith
22 social justice organization that's
23 dedicated to the vision that Philadelphia
24 can and should become a city of
25 opportunity that works for all.

2 In that spirit, I stand here
3 today in support of Councilwoman Bass's
4 resolution calling on Comcast Spectacore
5 to rescind its naming rights agreement
6 with Wells Fargo for Philadelphia's
7 premier multipurpose arena based on its
8 extensive history of unethical banking
9 practices.

10 Wells Fargo has become
11 synonymous with corporate malfeasance of
12 the highest caliber, a litany of
13 practices resulting in being fined \$185
14 million for fraudulent reopening
15 unauthorized client accounts, resulting
16 in customers' fees and charges, predatory
17 lending disproportionately to black and
18 brown homebuyers, resulting in increased
19 rates of foreclosure in already
20 distressed neighborhoods and negatively
21 affecting homeowner credit.

22 This bank continues to haunt
23 homeowners who are trapped in ballooning
24 mortgage payments and are forced to
25 consider bankruptcy to stay afloat,

2 forcing Philadelphia to sue Wells Fargo
3 for violations of the federal Fair
4 Housing Act. Ordered to cap its assets
5 at \$1.95 trillion by the Federal Reserve,
6 you know it's bad when Wells was fined a
7 billion dollars by current federal
8 regulators, the most ever, for including
9 unnecessary insurance costs in auto
10 loans, affecting hundreds of thousands of
11 customers. And all of this just
12 scratches the surface.

13 This bank, too morally bankrupt
14 to house Philadelphia's accounts, never
15 seems to give up in its pursuit of
16 hubristic greed. No shameful brand
17 should be too big for Philadelphia's most
18 powerful corporate citizen. Comcast to
19 banish from this mighty arena.
20 Spectacore needs to divorce itself from
21 Wells Fargo for its own sake so as not to
22 be judged by the company it keeps on its
23 facade.

24 Sitting in South Philadelphia
25 on I-95, thousands of people pass by it

2 every day. Millions attend concerts and
3 enjoyable activities there, and in the
4 summer of 2016, a near perfect political
5 convention took place there that many of
6 us look back upon with fond nostalgia.
7 Yet the name Wells Fargo is fixed on it
8 like a badge of shame.

9 What does that say about us as
10 a city? What does that say to those of
11 us walking into the space who have been
12 defrauded, denied a loan, cheated by the
13 nasty practices of this corporate and
14 villainous bema?

15 Thirty more seconds.

16 This begs the question, why do
17 we need corporate branding on this
18 structure at all? Why can't it be named
19 after someone who exemplified courage,
20 beauty, and dignity like Marian Anderson
21 or an ideal promulgated here by the
22 founders and be called the We, the
23 People, Center or a name that says
24 something about us as a city based on a
25 character trait that we can be proud of

2 during these dark days, like the
3 Philadelphia United Center.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
5 right.

6 MS. ESPOSITO: Therefore, POWER
7 calls upon Comcast to step up, be a
8 better angel, corporate citizen, and
9 denounce the Wells Fargo stigma for
10 something morally righteous and
11 infinitely better.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Renee Wilson,
16 commenting on 180409.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 afternoon.

20 MS. WILSON: Good afternoon,
21 Council President and members of Council.
22 Hello. My name is Renee Wilson and I'm a
23 member of Unite Here. I'm here today to
24 speak in support of the resolution to
25 rename the Wells Fargo Center.

2 Most of our members are low
3 income and living check to check. I am
4 appalled to hear about the scandal
5 surrounding Wells Fargo's business
6 practices, from opening fraudulent
7 accounts to predatory lending practices,
8 and all I can think of is that these are
9 not practices that benefit working people
10 like our members.

11 I think that the Wells Fargo
12 name has become a stain on our city, and
13 that if we want to put our best face
14 forward as a city, then they must -- the
15 name must be changed.

16 Thank you very much.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Penny McDonald.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 afternoon.

24 MS. McDONALD: Good afternoon.

25 My name is Florence Penny McDonald and

2 I'm the Executive Director over Community
3 Forgiveness and Restoration, a
4 faith-based reentry program, and I'm here
5 to support House Bill -- I'm sorry;
6 Council Bill 180537 --

8 understand. That means you've been
9 somewhere else. I got you.

10 MS. McDONALD: Yes. I've been
11 on the fighting field for many, many
12 folks and many, many places.

13 I'm here to support the bill
14 for respectfully requesting that Governor
15 Wolf grant a pardon to Eric Riddick in
16 consideration for the evidence
17 established in his innocence.

18 Now, I've been on the field
19 working with inmates at Graterford for
20 over 12 years, and I've had the occasion
21 to minister to inmates who have committed
22 crimes and who are rehabilitated and who
23 will be coming home soon, and our
24 organization helps to provide resources
25 for them in terms of housing and jobs and

2 et cetera, but I've also had the occasion
3 to talk to young men who were
4 incarcerated who are innocent, and
5 because of our laws, if they don't
6 provide the evidence to show that they're
7 innocent within the first year, it's
8 called time bar. That means they can't
9 bring it forth.

10 Now, I've also attended many
11 hearings in reference to innocent people
12 who are incarcerated. There's no
13 mechanism in our government for them to
14 come out, even though the state knows
15 that they are innocent.

16 So I'm asking here today that
17 you join with me with Congressperson
18 [sic] David Oh that we would be in
19 agreement to petition the Governor to
20 grant this young man, Eric Riddick, his
21 freedom.

22 I also want to say that if you
23 were falsely accused of a crime and
24 because of the shock of being
25 incarcerated and not knowing what you're

2 going to do or how you're going to get
3 out and there's no mechanism for you to
4 get out, how would you feel? Would you
5 want somebody to represent you? Would
6 you want someone to fight for you? Well,
7 we need to change some of our laws. We

9 disgrace that we have people inside and
10 there's no mechanism for them to get out.
11 So we need to change the laws, and I
12 thank you very much for your allowing me
13 to speak.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
18 commenting on 180537, 180569, 180577,
19 180580, 180384, and 180397.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 afternoon.

23 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

24 I too am a victim of the RDA and its
25 corruption.

2 This is an official decree of
3 the people in writ of mandamus quo
4 warranto. As such, requires immediate
5 action and remedy. Every week Council,
6 Mayor, and others transfer private
7 property to the government, probably
8 illegally.

9 From Kimball v. California, few
10 protections are as essential to the
11 individual liberty as the right to be
12 free from unreasonable seizures.

13 The last few weeks the Council,
14 the District Attorney have been talking
15 about wrongly convicted persons. Yet my
16 home was stolen and the Council, Mayor,
17 and others have not provided any
18 compensation or constitutionally required
19 immediate remedy. This shows clear
20 intent to violate oath, Constitution, and
21 laws. When did by the people, for the
22 people become screw the people?

23 Consent of the government is
24 required before you act. People never
25 gave consent to steal my home, steal my

2 just compensation and oppose my Seventh
3 Amendment trial by jury.

4 The Attorney General is
5 required by law to investigate this
6 RICO-style conspiracy to deny rights. If
7 committing one crime one time would land
8 people in jail, why has no prosecution of
9 all officials involved commenced?

10 The constitutions require
11 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
12 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
13 duty. Your oath of office requires you
14 to act or face prison.

15 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
16 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
17 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
18 through 11, 26 PA CSA 701, 703, 705, 708,
19 709, 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed
20 in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056
21 appear violated.

22 I call for the federal and
23 Commonwealth governments to perform their
24 constitutional obligations to investigate
25 and prosecute all involved in the theft

2 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
3 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

4 The denial of God-given 42 USC
5 1982 property rights for 24 years is
6 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
7 and requires immediate remedy.

8 A just government must obey the
9 rule of law. This color of law
10 government must have its Charter to
11 govern revoked until a constitutionally
12 compliant government is installed.

13 Public servants cannot refuse
14 their sworn duty to act any more than a
15 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
16 sovereign people require oath,
17 Constitution, and laws be enforced. Jail
18 is required for all who violate oath,
19 Constitution or law.

20 I remind Council, it takes a
21 lot of cooperation to create and allow
22 monumental corruption.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Jacqueline

2 Wiggins, commenting on 180384.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon.

7 My name is Jacqueline Wiggins and I am
8 concerned about Bill 180384 introduced by
9 Councilman Greenlee for you, Council
10 President Clarke.

11 As a resident of North Central
12 Philadelphia, a taxpayer, recently
13 reelected committee person of the 32nd
14 Ward, 11th Division the wording in 180384
15 "inter alia," which means among other
16 things, gives me great anxiety. Why?
17 Because it looks like the stadium.

18 For over two years, the Stadium
19 Stompers made up of residents, Temple
20 University students, and others and now
21 with a coalition called the No Stadium,
22 No Deal Coalition has informed and
23 alerted this City about Temple
24 University's move to build a 35,000 seat
25 stadium in North Central Philadelphia in

2 a highly residential, high-poverty
3 neighborhood.

4 The words "inter alia," among
5 other things, can mean only the stadium.
6 Temple University and you, Council
7 President Clarke, are part of this
8 gentrification move.

11 forward to City Council about a stadium.
12 We are opposed as residents to a Temple
13 University-proposed 35,000 seat football
14 stadium at Broad Street to 16th Street
15 and Norris Street to Berks. It will mean
16 campus encroachment into a residential
17 community, permanent closure of 15th
18 Street from Norris to Montgomery, and
19 these streets -- some of these streets
20 are named in this bill, nuisance
21 tailgating, traffic and parking
22 congestion, homeowner real estate taxes
23 that are already increasing, exploitative
24 research and programming targeting North
25 Philadelphia families by Temple

2 University, environmental impact on
3 residential quality of life, low wage
4 part-time Temple University faculty, and
5 undue tuition hardship on Temple
6 University students. This is a travesty.

7 Thank you.

9 Thank you for your testimony.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
12 other speakers on the public comment
13 list, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you very much.

17 don't normally do. I just want to use my
18 Council President privilege. Nothing

20 somebody. You guys always recognize

14 the history of the airport, going from in
15 some cases tips to \$12 and -- what is it?
16 What's the standard, 12.30? \$12.30, a
17 living wage. We can do better and we
18 will do better, but from tips to
19 something where they can go home and pay
20 the bills, that is something that we can
21 stand on as being for the people.

22 Me personally, in another
23 lifetime I ran the Minority Business
24 Enterprise Council. Based on the work of
25 Councilman, late, great, Lucien

2 Blackwell, and continued by his soldier
3 wife who is now in this body, and I
4 witnessed it, the Brandywine development
5 is one of the largest private-sector
6 voluntary minority inclusion plans that
7 I've ever witnessed. It is
8 precedent-setting. It is going to change
9 zip codes in the City of Philadelphia.

10 There is not a time when I sat
11 in this Chamber and not heard Blondell
12 Reynolds Brown begin a sentence on where
13 are females and where are minorities and
14 end on a tirade about us doing better.

15 So it is important for the
16 Johnny Docs of the world to represent the
17 trade union. It is important for my
18 brothers and sisters that are different
19 types of democrats to push the envelope,
20 but it is not factual that this body has
21 not been in and continues to be in that
22 fight.

23 Now, for me in the Fourth
24 District, land of the brave, home of the
25 free, minority and female participation

2 is a given. We are putting \$50 million
3 at 59th and Market Street, and we are not
4 afraid to walk away from a deal, close
5 down a site if it does not reflect the
6 diversity of this city.

7 We were given in this agreement
8 the ability to stop Rebuild projects.

9 Now, what we do when the lights
10 are on and the TV cameras are blaring is
11 one thing. What we do when we walk on a
12 construction yard some day in the near
13 future and see something wrong and step
14 to it, that's when the courage has to be
15 there, to say that irrespective of how
16 much my children need a track or a rec
17 center or any of that, if it's not built
18 with their parents, then we don't need
19 that project. That's when the courage,
20 that's when the fortitude has to step up.
21 And I don't doubt not a person in this
22 room's ferocity to do that. See, when
23 the cameras went on, I saw Cherelle
24 Parker hold it down and say we're not
25 building anything. It wasn't public. So

2 I know it was deeply in her heart to do.

3 It wasn't grandstanding.

4 So I want to say on the record

5 that I saw you and saw you in action and

6 was proud to be called your colleague.

7 So it's a long history of this

8 in this room, and it's not going to end

9 today for those of us who care deeply

10 about both things. I want a rec center.

11 Kendrick is the second oldest rec center

12 in the City of Philadelphia. In

13 Wynnefield there are no fields where kids

14 can play football. So Imma get some of

15 that, but Imma get it with the kids from

16 the barber shop being a part of it. I

17 believe we can do both.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes

22 Councilwoman Parker.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

24 you, Mr. President.

25 Mr. President, I wanted to note

3 to get to our session on time, I missed a
4 very important event in the Ninth
5 Councilmanic District. Now, I forget
6 what other colleagues were able to boast
7 about having a school with a music studio

10 released an original album called "What's
11 Going on," a collection of original
12 student songs.

13 Now, either you were born
14 during that time or you heard your
15 parents sing those songs, but to some
16 people, they know where that title
17 "What's Going on" comes from, Marvin Gaye
18 and the Motown Sound.

19 And so I want to give a special
20 thanks to Hill-Freedman World Academy

22 technology teacher, Ezechial Thurman. In

3 Kimmel Center with them now, and
4 Philadelphia's past poet laureate,
5 Yolanda Wisher.

6 Now, Mr. President and
7 colleagues, it is odd when you hear
8 yourself, but U.S. Senator Casey and I
9 were visiting the school at the same
10 time, and for those who remember "What's
11 Going On," the song opens with a whole
12 lot of people talking and having a
13 conversation and you don't know who is
14 who, but you hear all these words. So,
15 colleagues, if you happen to listen to
16 this song and you hear a familiar voice,
17 that will be U.S. Senator Casey and
18 Cherelle Parker.

19 And so I want to say to those
20 kids thank you so much for helping to
21 train us and teach us how to say our
22 names correctly in the screen. My only
23 challenge is, I don't know how to tell
24 people to buy it. I sent a text to a
25 friend, and she says where can you go,

3 Chestnut Street and get the album. She
4 said, they do that anymore. You got to

6 So we will get that and we will

10 admit middle and high school in Northwest
11 Philadelphia, and I want you to know you
12 made us proud.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

15 Awesome. Thank you. Thank you,
16 Councilwoman.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Henon.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
20 Mr. President. I just wanted to remind
21 everybody that we do have a Public
22 Property and Public Works hearing
23 following the commencement of the end of
24 this Council session. I know we have a
25 little gathering that we have that we're

10 Johnson.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
12 Council President. On Saturday at 11:00
13 a.m. at 23rd and South Street, we will be
14 naming the 2300 block of South Street
15 after late, great Honorable Lois
16 Fernandez, the founder of Odunde. And so
17 I encourage all of you who have known the
18 great work of Ms. Lois Fernandez and
19 bringing African culture to the City of
20 Philadelphia, and the life and -- her
21 life and legacy has been carried on by
22 her daughter, Bumi Fernandez. So come on
23 out and let's celebrate her life during
24 this Odunde weekend. I'll also be joined
25 by my Council colleague from the Third

10 Awesome. Great lady. Thank you,
11 Councilman.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Green.

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
15 Council President. I just want to echo
16 the words that were said earlier by both
17 Councilman Jones and others in reference
18 to work that we do in this body. I also
19 want to thank my colleague Councilwoman
20 Cherelle Parker for acknowledging
21 Hill-Freedman World Academy, which is my
22 son's school. Mr. Ezechial Thurman was a
23 Lindback Award winner this year. He
24 formerly was at Houston Elementary, is
25 now at Hill-Freedman. Hopefully he will

3 album that just came out. So we're
4 hoping that will occur.

5 Also I just want to remind for
6 those who are listening, currently right

11 by Council. So, Councilmembers, it's
12 going to be there. Hopefully your staffs
13 are there and really learning how we can
14 use technology as a better way to provide
15 information to our constituents as well
16 as provide information between City
17 departments. So that's going on right
18 now in City Hall, Room 576.

19 Also I want to remind people
20 that tomorrow at 2 o'clock in the Caucus
21 Room we'll be doing a screening and
22 briefing regarding Plastic China. This
23 is a film that's about 90 minutes long.
24 We're doing a condensed version tomorrow
25 at 2 o'clock. Food will be provided.

3 perspective in reference to plastic and
4 the environment once you get a sense of
5 the documentary. It talks about the
6 issues and concerns of plastic in the
7 world and how that's really impacted

10 So hopefully tomorrow at 2 o'clock
11 Councilmembers and/or staff can attend
12 this briefing in the Caucus Room.

13 And, finally, I want to thank
14 my colleagues for supporting bills today
15 180392 and 180393. It continues to
16 demonstrate our ability to promote
17 diversity here in the City of
18 Philadelphia, especially in reference to
19 the LGBTQ community. It really shows
20 that we as a city are at the forefront of
21 promoting diversity in the City of
22 Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection.

23 Also reminding people that we
24 are kicking off Pride Month today.
25 There's a flag-raising on the apron of

3 culminates with a whole month of
4 activities as well as the pride parade on
5 Sunday afternoon. And then in a few
6 moments as we conclude Council, we'll be

9 show our support for people of all
10 backgrounds and persuasions regardless of
11 how they express their gender or their
12 orientation.

13 So thank you, Council
14 President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

19 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
20 you, Council President. City Council has
21 always been proactive in its support for
22 affordable, accessible housing and
23 homeownership. Yesterday City Council's
24 Committee on Finance reported out
25 favorably two bills which direct

2 construction impact tax revenue to the
3 Housing Trust Fund for the production and
4 preservation of affordable housing.
5 Today Council adopted an amendment for
6 mixed-income housing bonus.

7 As a former community activist
8 and now a community advocate, I respect

10 activists and advocates who have joined
11 us in Council all week long. Moreover, I
12 agree with them, Philadelphia needs more
13 resources now more than ever to keep our
14 families safe, warm, and healthy in their
15 homes.

16 For this reason, I continue to
17 fight, as I have my entire political
18 career, for social justice and equality.
19 I encourage our activists and our
20 advocates to continue to voice their
21 support for more resources. I welcome
22 the continued debate on how those
23 government resources get appropriated
24 throughout the City. But we simply
25 cannot wait to appropriate more resources

2 for the production and the preservation
3 of housing as our city grows more
4 stratified and segregated each day.

5 All Philadelphians have a right
6 to live affordably in neighborhoods that
7 they choose, where they can share and
8 have access to good schools, good
9 transit, and good jobs.

10 Thank you, Council President,
11 for your leadership. I want to thank
12 Councilman Mark Squilla for the creation
13 of the Philadelphia first equitable
14 development plan. I want to thank all my
15 colleagues, particularly our Chair,
16 Councilwoman Blackwell, for sitting
17 through three hours of testimony
18 yesterday and for supporting our efforts.
19 I look forward to working with the rest
20 of our colleagues through final passage.
21 We cannot wait no more.

22 Thank you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilwoman.
