18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. We are honored on
20 this first day of Council back to
21 recognize the week of September 9th to
22 the 15th as Arts in Education Week. I
23 want to thank all the members of the
24 Education Committee for being here and
25 for us being able to make this

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
4 we all know that arts education -- I'm a
5 product of arts education -- comprises a
6 rich array of disciplines including
7 dance, music, theatre, media arts,
8 literature, design, and visual arts, and
9 is a core academic subject which changes
10 young people's lives and an essential
11 element for a complete and balanced
12 education for all students; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
14 arts education enables students to
15 develop critical thinking and
16 problem-solving skills, imagination and
17 creativity, discipline and collaboration,
18 alternative ways to communicate and
19 express feelings and ideas, and
20 cross-cultural understanding, which
21 supports academic success across the
22 curriculum; and

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, arts
24 education contributes to increased
25 attendance and graduation rates, and

2 elevates academic achievement; and

3 Whereas, arts education
4 encourages personal growth outside of the
5 classroom, including increasing a
6 student's likelihood to participate in
7 civic life, volunteerism, altruism, and

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
10 today's economy requires students to
11 masterfully develop creative traits that
12 business leaders demand in a 21st century
13 workforce such as communicating through
14 words, images, sounds, and movement; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
16 arts are an integral part of life in the
17 United States, Pennsylvania and
18 Philadelphia, and are an integral part of
19 a complete education which contributes to
20 the vibrancy and vitality of communities
21 and the nation; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
23 the City of Philadelphia's Office of
24 Arts, Culture and the Creative Economy
25 observes National Arts in Education Week

2 with an annual A-Plus Art student
3 exhibition, featuring the work from more
4 than 200 students from our public schools
5 from across the City.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Now,
7 therefore, be it resolved, that the City

9 September 11 through 17 -- well, it's
10 really this week -- as Arts in Education
11 Week in Philadelphia.

12 Further resolved, that an
13 engrossed copy of this resolution be
14 presented to the Arts, Culture and
15 Creative Economy as a sincere expression
16 of the City Council of Philadelphia's
17 gratitude to honor this occasion.

18 And this is certainly signed by
19 the President and agreed to by everyone.

14 this positive impact on Philadelphia
15 students.

16 The Office of Arts, Culture and
17 the Creative Economy invites all of you
18 to continue the celebration of Arts in
19 Education Week in Philadelphia this
20 evening at the opening reception of the
21 Ninth Annual A-Plus Arts Student
22 Exhibition from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. in
23 Conversation Hall. The exhibition
24 features over 200 artworks from K through
25 12 students, representing all ten Council

3 Reform and Review.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
5 Council President. The Special Committee
6 on Regulatory Review and Reform issued a
7 report pursuant to Resolution No. 170179.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you.

10 Mr. Decker, please read the
11 report.

12 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
13 and members of the Council of the City of
14 Philadelphia, the Special Committee on
15 Regulatory Review and Reform, to which
16 was referred Resolution No. 170179,
17 entitled a "Resolution authorizing the
18 creation of a Special Committee on
19 Regulatory Review and Reform to identify
20 archaic, superfluous, and confusing
21 provisions in The Philadelphia Code and
22 in departmental regulations; and to
23 recommend revisions that streamline,
24 clarify and enhance the City's regulatory
25 environment, for the purpose of

2 accelerating the growth of well-paying
3 jobs in Philadelphia while ensuring the
4 safety and well-being of its residents,"
5 respectfully reports that the Committee
6 held hearings as authorized by Resolution
7 No. 170179 on September 12th, 2018 and
8 that the Committee issues to the Council
9 the attached report on the matters
10 discussed at the hearing.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

13 Our next order of business is
14 the consideration of the Calendar.

15 There being no bills on the
16 First Reading Calendar, the Chair
17 recognizes Councilman Henon for the
18 purpose of calling up resolutions and
19 bills on the Second Reading and Final
20 Passage Calendar.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. The following resolutions
23 and bills are being called up for the
24 Second Reading and Final Passage
25 Calendars today: Bill Nos. 180711,

2 180295-A, 180552, 180600, 180603. All
3 other resolutions and bills are being
4 held. In addition, 180555. All other
5 bills and resolutions are being held
6 today.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you very much, Councilman.

9 So before considering these
10 resolutions and bills, we will consider
11 our public comment session. It will go
12 as follows:

13 If you are interested in
14 testifying on a bill or resolution that
15 is on the Final Passage Calendar today,
16 we'd ask, if you have not already done
17 so, please sign up at the table to my
18 left.

19 When your name is called, you
20 will go to the podium in the middle of
21 the Council Chambers. There's a device
22 with a light on it. When the light turns
23 green, it will be your time to speak.
24 When the light turns yellow, you will
25 have 30 seconds to conclude your remarks.

2 When the light turns red, we'd ask that
3 you please adhere to our guidelines and
4 conclude your remarks. Thank you very
5 much for your anticipated cooperation
6 with these guidelines.

7 Mr. Decker, please call the
8 first name on the list.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Fred Snead-Ali,
10 commenting on 180100.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. SNEAD-ALI: Good afternoon,
13 Council President Darrell Clarke and all
14 his wonderful staff and Councilpeople
15 that's in this room and the people that's
16 here to represent what's going on in our
17 Philadelphia community. I'm here to
18 represent the Alpha Center that's Temple
19 proposed.

20 One thing that I would like to
21 say, when the snake came into our garden,
22 he came to our women. The snake of the
23 day is crack cocaine and opioid pills,
24 and the product that comes out of that,
25 we will have a problem. And because

2 Temple was trying to build a place, a day
3 care in honor of -- I mean, in respect of
4 autism or mental health or personal
5 health, I'm in 100 percent support of
6 that. That's it.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Gregory

10 Bonaparte, commenting on 180100.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. BONAPARTE: Good evening,
13 Council President --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MR. BONAPARTE: -- and staff.

17 I'm here, one, to represent Berean
18 Presbyterian Church that sits on Broad
19 and Diamond as a trustee and to represent
20 the pastor and the congregation. They
21 are totally in favor of the Alpha
22 building, because it can bring great
23 resources to the church as well as the
24 community. And that's all I got to say.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you very much for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
4 commenting on 180100.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

7 This is an official decree of the people
8 in writ to mandamus quo warranto and, as
9 such, requires immediate action and
10 remedy.

11 Every week, Council, Mayor, and
12 others transfer private property to the
13 government, probably illegally. I quote,
14 "A ship of state or government does not
15 drift into unconstitutional waters. It
16 is directed there by oath-violating
17 officials," end quote.

18 Council, Mayor, Governor,
19 Senator, and others were repeatedly
20 notified of my constitutional violation
21 allegations and know my rights were
22 violated, our Council, Mayor, Governor,
23 Senator, and others spending HUD
24 low-income housing money on the
25 commercial mall to be built on my stolen

2 home. Clearly, officials have declared
3 war on their constituents, the sovereign
4 people, violating numerous amendments.

5 Bill 180676 shows contempt for
6 the government. You have sworn an oath
7 to obey and protect. Borniable (ph)
8 proof of consent of the government must
9 be provided to fulfill your oath
10 constituents demanded of their
11 representatives.

12 The constitutions require
13 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
14 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
15 duty. Your oath of office requires you
16 to act or face prison.

17 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
18 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
19 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
20 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
21 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in
22 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
23 violated.

24 I call for the federal and
25 Commonwealth governments to perform their

1 9/13/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 constitutional obligations to investigate
3 and prosecute all involved in the theft
4 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
5 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
6 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
7 24 years is egregious, extraordinary,
8 oath-violating, and requires immediate
9 remedy.

10 A just government must obey the
11 rule of law. This color of law
12 government must have its Charter to
13 government revoked until a
14 constitutionally compliant government is
15 installed.

16 Public servants cannot refuse
17 their sworn duty to act any more than a
18 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
19 sovereign people require oath,
20 Constitution, and laws be enforced, and
21 jail is required for all who violate
22 oath, Constitution or law.

23 I remind Council, it takes a
24 lot of cooperation to create and allow
25 monumental corruption.

3 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: J. Bennetch,

6 commenting on 180100.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

9 afternoon.

10 MS. BENNETCH: Good morning.

11 My name is Jennifer Bennetch. I'm a
12 resident of North Philadelphia. I live
13 at 19th and Diamond Streets.

14 I am here to state my
15 opposition to the Alpha Center being
16 built in my neighborhood. Over the
17 years, I've lived in the same house for
18 ten years. I have watched the growth of
19 Temple devastate my neighborhood. I have
20 watched it push residents out. I have
21 watched it change policies and change the
22 way of the life of the people around me.

23 I have watched you, Mr. Clarke,
24 sell our neighborhood off to the highest
25 bidders for years. You allowed PHA to

2 remove long-term homeowners. You are
3 allowing Temple to run native North
4 Philadelphians out of this neighborhood.
5 Our numbers have decreased. Why are
6 there not a lot of people here? Because
7 you ran half of us out of the
8 neighborhood. There are no voters left.

9 North Philadelphia is being
10 destroyed by the growth of Temple, by
11 Eric Blumenfeld Developers that you're
12 bidding our neighborhoods off to and by
13 you allowing a housing authority, who is
14 there to provide housing for poor people,
15 to run poor people out of their
16 neighborhood.

17 This Alpha Center is not a good
18 idea. It's a bribe for Temple. It's a
19 way for them to make money, and it's
20 going to run the small day cares and
21 preschools out of the neighborhood. We
22 have small centers that are struggling
23 already, where the workers and the
24 educators understand the culture of our
25 children. They are used to our children

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2 and they are used to us, and they
3 properly educate them. And when somebody
4 comes and say "Alpha Center," what
5 happens? Everybody runs. Alpha, which
6 means a dominant person in a certain
7 spirit. So this is psychologically going
8 to lean people towards, oh, let me take
9 my kids out of here and run them over to
10 this Alpha Center.

11 This is Temple saying that we
12 are better than everybody else. We
13 already are alpha male around here.
14 Because they're clearly not saying that
15 our children are going to become alphas,
16 because they failed on five schools that
17 they were supposed to reform. This is
18 all a ploy for them to make money, for
19 them to bribe us into having a stadium in
20 our neighborhood, and then we have to
21 accept the stadium in order to get them
22 to clean up the trash after their own
23 students.

24 This is ridiculous. There has
25 to become a time that you realize that

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2 your constituents are North
3 Philadelphians. Your constituents are
4 not President Englert. Your constituents
5 are not Eric Blumenfeld and Ed Hillas
6 (ph). Your constituents are not --

7 (Applause.)

8 MS. BENNETCH: -- Kelvin
9 Jeremiah. Your constituents are us, the
10 poor people who are being ran out of our
11 neighborhoods, who have to live every day
12 in fear. Are you going to pass some kind
13 of law that's going to change my whole
14 way of life? Are you going to pass some
15 kind of bill -- are you going to give my
16 house away after I paid all my taxes and
17 my bills?

18 We don't want this center. We
19 don't need anymore peanuts from Temple,
20 because all they're doing is destroying
21 us, over-policing us, and stealing every
22 little bit of culture that we have left
23 in our neighborhood.

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony. Appreciate
4 it.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Michael Brody.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MR. BRODY: My remarks
10 originally said good morning. Good day,
11 City Council President and members of the
12 Philadelphia City Council. My name is
13 Michael Brody. I am President of the
14 Mental Health Partnerships, an
15 organization that provides behavioral
16 health services to the Greater
17 Philadelphia area to over 10,000 people,
18 as well as Delaware and Southwest New
19 Jersey. I want to thank the City
20 Council, and especially Councilwoman Gym,
21 for giving me the opportunity to speak on
22 a very important issue of suicide
23 prevention, a topic as you well noted a
24 few minutes ago that unfortunately hit
25 close to home for Council this past

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2 summer, and for considering a resolution
3 this week recognizing September 10th,
4 2018 as National Suicide Prevention Week.

5 One of the hallmarks of the
6 work we do at MHP is peer support. It is
7 one of our core beliefs that people with
8 a behavioral health condition can and do
9 recover from behavioral health issues.
10 Over 60 percent of our staff has lived
11 experience or has a family member with a
12 lived experience.

13 This past summer, one of our
14 managers received a text from somebody we
15 served, saying that she was thinking of
16 committing suicide. In response to that,
17 he asked her the three essential
18 questions: Do you have a plan? Do you
19 have intent? And do you have a means to
20 do that? And she said yes to all three.

21 He asked her, Do you want help?
22 And he sensed a hesitancy in her voice,
23 and when he asked her, What are you
24 hesitant about, she said, I'd like to get
25 some help, but I'm concerned about what's

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2 going to happen to my cat.

3 He listened and made
4 preparations to have somebody take care
5 of her cat such that she could go and
6 hospitalize herself and be taken care of.

7 After she was discharged from
8 the hospital, she called our manager to
9 thank him for two things. One, for
10 asking her if she needed to receive
11 treatment and care instead of forcing her
12 to receive that treatment and care. And,
13 second, and most importantly, really
14 listening to her needs and helping her to
15 create a plan for support. Because we
16 made the choice to actively listen and to
17 support her needs, she was able to make
18 use of services and made choices to
19 better her life, and today she is on her
20 path of recovery.

21 The recent losses of Kate Spade
22 and Anthony Bourdain and many others have
23 only served to highlight what we already
24 know, that suicide is the tenth leading
25 cause of death in this country in a

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2 series of complex and societal problems.
3 And like many mental health conditions,
4 this crosses lines of economic and social
5 status, race, and gender. It is the
6 second leading cause of death for people
7 ages 10 to 24 and is the tenth leading
8 cause of death in this country, trailing
9 only disease like cancer, heart disease,
10 and others.

11 These are disheartening
12 numbers, but I'm able to offer this ray
13 of hope that has been gleaned from the
14 day-to-day work that we do. With the
15 right support, suicide is preventable and
16 recovery is possible.

17 I want to thank you for your
18 time and ask that you continue to be
19 active listeners and to support services
20 that give people real choices to create
21 their own recovery journey.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Donna Richardson,
3 commenting on 180100.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 afternoon.

7 MS. RICHARDSON: Good morning,
8 everyone. My name is Donna Richardson.
9 I'm a Program Administrator for the
10 Norris Homes summer camp and after-school
11 program.

12 I am all for the Alpha Center.
13 Not to push anyone out, because we have
14 more kids than we have programs, so we
15 need the programs.

16 Also, I don't hear anyone
17 speaking about the halfway houses that
18 they're building. No protests. I don't
19 see nobody protesting these delis. No
20 protests. Or these stores that they're
21 building on the corners and acting like
22 they're grocery stores, but they're
23 selling all kind of narcotics out of
24 here. No protests. But we protest the
25 Alpha Center that's going to have for

2 special need children. You protest it?

3 Early childhood development,
4 you protest it? Or you're saying that
5 you're going to bring in employment,
6 which if we sit down and can guarantee
7 that there's employment will be in the
8 surrounding community, not for just a few
9 years and then you realize that maybe it
10 is just Temple employees, but you make
11 sure that that agreement sets out the
12 life of that program.

13 I don't see people protesting
14 the fact that you're walking in the
15 alleyways. You just want empty
16 alleyways, but then you see in the
17 suburbs you see all these beautiful
18 things. That's because the suburbs are
19 not going to let these little gas
20 stations keep being built all over, these
21 little corner stores that's not bringing
22 the value to it.

23 And why are we arguing about if
24 you own your house or rent your house?
25 Why is not everybody equal? So if you're

2 a homeowner, it means one thing, but
3 you're a renter, it's another thing? And
4 then you argue about PHA. How do you
5 know what PHA is really doing and not
6 doing if you have not walked in their
7 shoes? Because there's a lot of people
8 benefit from the PHA program. And if you
9 want to talk about PHA, let's talk about
10 the fact that they have an
11 entrepreneurship program and they have a
12 homeownership program and that they're
13 taking people back to schools for GEDs
14 and then send them out of the PhillySEEDS
15 program for scholarships, and they're
16 teaching them how to become entrepreneurs
17 and CDL and all the -- nursing programs,
18 but they're free. They're not costing
19 them nothing.

20 So I'm for the Alpha Center,
21 not just because it's Temple. No.
22 Because I'll fight Temple like anything
23 else if it's wrong, but I have seen where
24 our children that's went through the
25 program, math is up 63 percent, reading

2 is up 76. We came with children who were
3 low scored to honor roll students. A
4 couple of our children have left. They
5 went from our program into the summer
6 work program that was affiliated with our
7 program and to college. We have young
8 men that have just joined Temple's Police
9 Department and the City Police
10 Department. People are going out and
11 they're interested in. Do you know the
12 percentage of PHA residents who are now
13 owning their homes and are still in the
14 program to buy, and the kids are now
15 going to college? The dropout rate that
16 was once there, when it came to the
17 Norris community to see if they could put
18 any kids in a program who have dropped
19 out, they couldn't find one, and you're
20 against it.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you.

23 MS. RICHARDSON: I'm for it.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Ms. Richardson.

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2 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Jacqueline

4 Wiggins, commenting on 180100.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

7 afternoon.

8 MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon.

9 My name is Jacqueline Wiggins.

10 Bill 180100 is on hold again as

11 of today. Temple University wants to

12 amend Philadelphia Zoning Maps and adopt

13 a master plan amendment for the

14 University to approve construction on the

15 site of what is being called an Alpha

16 Center. It is to house the early

17 learning program, a dental clinic, etc.

18 My focus is on the early

19 learning center, as people and families

20 find affordable and convenient the Temple

21 University School of Dentistry. So why

22 that's in there, we don't know. But the

23 grave difficult piece is the early

24 learning center. First, it will be used

25 to conduct research on fragile,

2 vulnerable three- to five-year-olds. It
3 will also undercut existing small early
4 learning center businesses.

5 Black people and black families
6 do not need to be studied or researched
7 anymore. The reality is that black
8 children, black families do not need to
9 be test specimens or guinea pigs to
10 advance Temple University's College of
11 Education goal to secure continuing
12 research funding. How cagey, how
13 deceptive.

14 The card that I have, and I
15 think that every Councilmember should
16 have it by now, shows how Temple
17 University did not turn around five
18 schools. The reading and math scores are
19 abysmal. Now Temple wants our younger
20 children.

21 As the committee person of the
22 32nd Ward, 11th Division, a No Stadium No
23 Deal Coalition member, as a retired
24 teacher educator, and as someone who
25 knows this Alpha Center is being used to

2 gain favor for a 35,000-seat stadium to
3 be built at Broad and Norris, we implore
4 City Councilmembers to vote no, no, no on
5 180100.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Bianca Parker,
11 commenting on 180100.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. PARKER: Hello.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MS. PARKER: My name is Bianca
17 Parker and I'm a resident, and I want to
18 say no and urge my Councilmembers to
19 retract and do not allow the passage of
20 Bill No. 180100, which will authorize the
21 furtherance of predatory encroachment of
22 Temple University's campus footprint,
23 extend SP-IN district, building of a
24 research facility and expansion of Temple
25 Police surveillance and subject our

2 African American children to racial
3 experiments.

4 Camera surveillance is a common
5 research method utilized and studied.

6 Just as the Tuskegee experiments
7 exploited African Americans for scholarly
8 and scientific gains, Temple University
9 plans the Alpha Center for research of
10 African American North Philadelphia
11 preschool children. This plan also
12 competes with existing area day cares.

13 Temple failed four schools
14 during five years of the School District
15 funding contract. Young African American
16 children will be subject to mental health
17 treatment and studied. As staff
18 ungraded, Temple University students
19 would be treatment providers at the
20 psychology clinic. Patients of Temple
21 University psychology clinic would be
22 subject to research studies.

23 Temple must abandon plans for
24 Alpha Center to expand campus. Temple
25 must abandon plans to subject African

2 American children and African American
3 adults to research studies. And Temple
4 must abandon plans for a dental clinic
5 that already exists.

6 I'm going to voice opposition
7 to this travesty. I'm going to speak up
8 and out against Temple. And I urge my
9 Councilmembers to vote no to early
10 learning research and mental health
11 labeling of African American
12 preschool-age children in North
13 Philadelphia, and I urge the
14 Councilmembers to vote no to Bill No.
15 180100.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
18 you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Gina Case.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MS. CASE: Good afternoon. My
22 name is Gina and I'm from the Tacony
23 section of Philadelphia. I am here in
24 support of Councilwoman Cindy Bass's
25 proposal to offer regulation for recovery

2 homes in Philadelphia.

3 In 2017, 1,217 individuals lost
4 their lives to overdose. That's 1,217.
5 That's families, children, those that
6 love the person who are now left to deal
7 with raising children, financial
8 hardships in order to get through day to
9 day.

10 Councilwoman is proposing that
11 the 100 unlicensed homes in the City of
12 Philadelphia be regulated and licensed.
13 This would give an opportunity to offer
14 safe housing, treatment incentives, and
15 other resources to families for people
16 who are addicted.

17 Sometimes my brother would call
18 me and say, Hey, Gina, can you take me to
19 go get treatment? And we would run
20 around the City and we would go to a
21 hospital, and they'd say, You know what,
22 you're not capitated to here, you got to
23 go to the outpatient center here or come
24 back. Guess what? We don't have a bed.
25 Come back every morning at 7:00 and there

2 will be an inpatient bed ready for you.

3 You just have to keep coming back every

4 day at 7:00 a.m. until there's an

5 opening. And I would go with him, and

6 the fifth day there was an opening. The

7 problem was, the insurance then denied

8 him.

9 There's multiple times where

10 addicts know what they need and we don't

11 listen or we deny the financial piece to

12 support it. They're forced then to go to

13 recovery houses, and often unlicensed.

14 Let's talk about the

15 incarceration rate for those who are

16 addicted. What other option do they have

17 to fund their addiction? They're often

18 committing crimes, end up in the criminal

19 system. And, yes, there may be treatment

20 programs in the prisons, but there's no

21 real good plan for reintegration.

22 My brother died ten days after

23 release from prison. He was discharged

24 with no housing plan. He was told to go

25 to a recovery house, and he never had any

2 resources. While my mother would take
3 him in again and again, it also became
4 times where she couldn't handle it
5 anymore. It was times where her own
6 financial stress and personal emotional
7 stress became a lot, and that's why we
8 relied on these resources that are
9 available in the City of Philadelphia.
10 However, they weren't available
11 oftentimes to my brother.

12 I also just want to add that in
13 terms of the Councilwoman's -- just thank
14 you, Councilwoman, and I just want to add
15 that just for one second -- I
16 apologize -- that those in recovery pay
17 \$150 to \$200 a week to live there. They
18 also offer up their food stamps. It's
19 impossible to maintain that, and it's no
20 recovery in these recovery homes.
21 There's no professional in there
22 measuring data, using evidence-based
23 practices.
24 And that will complete my
25 testimony.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
3 you, ma'am. Thank you. Thank you, Ms.
4 Case.

5 The Chair recognizes --
6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:
8 Mr. Decker, before you call the next, the
9 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
11 Mr. Chairman. I just wanted to thank
12 Gina for her testimony and also for being
13 so gracious. She brought in a picture of
14 myself and her brother, James Fiorentino.
15 And so I just really wanted to say thank
16 you so much for sharing that. I believe
17 he was at one of our summer events where
18 this picture was taken, and just wanted
19 to recognize that as well.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Councilwoman.

23 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
24 please.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Ruth Birchett,

2 commenting on 180100.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MS. BIRCHETT: Many of you
5 Councilpeople received a copy of this
6 yesterday. It's Temple University's
7 report card for being the education
8 manager and organization for five
9 neighborhood schools from 2002 to 2007.
10 Temple University got a failing grade.
11 And now Temple University wants to
12 experiment on our children. We say no.
13 We're not having it.

14 I have served as a block
15 captain for 30 years in the City of
16 Philadelphia. I've served as a
17 democratic committee person, and now I
18 stand as ward leader, republican ward
19 leader, of the 32nd Ward. We're sick and
20 tired of the contempt of the Democratic
21 Party here in the City of Philadelphia,
22 particularly for poor neighborhoods such
23 as ours in North Philadelphia, and we are
24 going to answer to every wrong that's
25 been done to us at the ballot box. All

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2 of you come up for election next year.
3 You need to know, you need to know that
4 when councilmanic prerogative is invoked
5 and it's harmful to our communities, that
6 we are tired of it and we don't like your
7 buddy system of voting along with your
8 Councilpeople.

9 My question today is, what is
10 the purpose in the City Charter for
11 at-large members if you don't take --
12 aren't able to take an independent stand
13 on things?

14 We will not tolerate Temple
15 University continuing to use the
16 miserable statistics that we live under
17 every single day in our community to
18 encroach on our community to gain Ph.D.'s
19 and publications on our backs. We have
20 enough footprints on our backs in North
21 Philadelphia, thanks to John Street and
22 Darrell Clarke.

23 We're fed up. We're tired.
24 We're taxpayers too, and we expect you to
25 listen to us as well and not just

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2 disregard it.

3 It is an affront to every
4 citizen in the City of Philadelphia that
5 Councilman Clarke would push this bill
6 out of Rules Committee, then suspend
7 Council rules in order for it to go
8 directly to passage and be on the
9 Calendar today. That's not fair. It's
10 not right. It's not just in
11 Philadelphia, the birth place of America.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

14 Mr. Decker, our next speaker.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Kathleen

16 McGettigan, commenting on 180100.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MS. McGETTIGAN: Hello. If I
19 were to say that I live in Old City, I
20 don't care about what happens in North
21 Philadelphia, I don't care about the
22 social and economic welfare near
23 Philadelphia, I'm ignorant of what the
24 African American community in
25 Philadelphia has given to the world. I

2 don't care about Paul Robeson. I don't
3 care about John Coltrane. I don't care
4 about the possibility that we may have
5 future Coltranes, Marian Andersons, etc,
6 waiting in the wings in North
7 Philadelphia, if I didn't say that, I
8 would expect to be hissed out of this
9 Chamber, because it's not right.

10 Now, if you're going to build a
11 beer-proof fence around the 20th Ward and
12 make sure that -- station ICE agents at
13 the corner and make sure that nobody ever
14 leaves the 20th Ward and comes into Old
15 City, then fine. But I think the Alpha
16 Center is an issue for everybody in this
17 city, because what happens in North
18 Philadelphia impacts the rest of us.

19 Also, you can judge -- I think
20 the only way to judge the future
21 performance of the institution is based
22 on their past history. Well, Temple
23 University in five years ran four
24 Philadelphia schools into the ground.
25 Temple University is not alone in this.

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2 We all know about the Tuskegee
3 experiment. And closer to home, you can
4 read in Acres of Skin how the University
5 of Pennsylvania dermatology department
6 experimented on helpless prisoners. And
7 then more recently University of
8 Pennsylvania more or less doomed a young
9 man with a congenital disease by treating
10 him with an experimental, unproven
11 remedy, I think virus, but -- okay.

12 I think that's about it. So I
13 oppose the building of the Alpha Center
14 because I don't think it's for the
15 welfare of North Philadelphia. It's an
16 obvious attempt for Temple University to
17 encroach on areas outside of its current
18 area boundaries, and that means
19 gentrification. So I say pose it
20 (unintelligible) gets in the welfare of
21 Philadelphia at-large.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

25 Mr. Decker, our next speaker, please.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Norman O'Neill,
3 commenting on 180100.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. O'NEILL: How you doing,
6 City Council? My name is Norman O'Neill,
7 and I'm just here to reaffirm and speak
8 in support of the opposition of the Alpha
9 Center.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
13 you.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Rustin Ohler,
15 commenting on 180498.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. OHLER: Good afternoon,
18 Councilmembers. My name is Rustin Ohler,
19 COO and owner of Harman Deutsch
20 Architecture. I am here on behalf of the
21 BIA to give public remarks on Bill No.
22 180498, which is being re-called today,
23 in particular Section 16(a)
24 Administrative Review.

25 It is the limit of 30 days or

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2 120 days, as I believe is being proposed
3 today, that is our greatest concern and
4 causes an impossible hardship on the
5 owner of a property.

6 As a background, my
7 architecture firm has pulled hundreds of
8 zoning and building permits this year
9 alone. Due to the nature of our
10 business, I personally appear in front of
11 the ZBA on a weekly basis to assist
12 builders, developers, investors, and
13 homeowners in obtaining zoning variances.
14 Without these variances, their projects
15 and their properties would not be viable.

16 Unfortunately, due to
17 circumstances beyond our control that
18 arise through the remaining City approval
19 process, these variances require some
20 sort of amendment. On average, 30
21 percent of the variances we obtain
22 required an amendment in the past year.
23 This may have to happen at any point
24 throughout the process, even during
25 construction.

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2 Several of these factors are
3 entirely imposed on the owner of a
4 property due to rules and regulations put
5 into place by another City of
6 Philadelphia department, including, but
7 not limited to, Licenses and Inspections
8 with the adoption of the new building
9 code, Philadelphia Streets Department
10 with the checklist to approval process,
11 Philadelphia Water Department with the
12 stormwater approval and utility plan
13 approval process. Some of these
14 processes take months to complete and
15 result in dimensional changes to the
16 zoning variance as previously granted.

17 The majority of these
18 amendments are very small in nature.
19 Since this bill has been introduced, our
20 firm alone has had approximately a dozen
21 projects with necessary changes to pilot
22 houses, roof decks, elevator overruns,
23 parking configurations, first floor
24 recess entries, etc, that are minor
25 dimensional changes resulting in no

2 change to the use variances granted.

3 Because of the pending bill,
4 these haven't been able to be submitted.

5 All of these were determined after the
6 proposed 120-day period. Should this
7 bill pass as currently drafted, all of
8 these projects will require new zoning
9 applications, new refusals, new appeals,
10 new RCO meetings, and new ZBA hearings.
11 This process would not only cause an
12 unnecessary hardship to the property
13 owner, but would burden the City of
14 Philadelphia with an unnecessary use of
15 resources and time, and result in a total
16 failure to the zoning variance process.

17 The ZBA is already currently
18 overburdened by the amount of cases that
19 they hear, and it's continuously taking
20 longer to get hearing dates and have
21 notice in the decision process. This
22 would exacerbate this problem even
23 further by drastically increasing the
24 amount of cases the ZBA would need to
25 re-hear.

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2 These are just small examples
3 of the impact this bill will have on
4 construction and development in the City
5 of Philadelphia. The BIA feels that the
6 repercussions of this bill at this time
7 are beyond measure and that no time limit
8 to amend the previously approved variance
9 should be placed upon the recipient of a
10 variance issued by the Zoning Board.

11 In order for our city to
12 continue to prosper and its ongoing
13 development to continue, zoning variances
14 or special exceptions should be allowed
15 to be amended as long as the zoning
16 permit is valid and in full force and
17 effect.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you.

21 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
22 please.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Jeanette Patton,
24 commenting on 170675.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

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2 MS. PATTON: Yes. My name is
3 Jeanette Patton, but most of you know me
4 by the name of Pam Africa, minister of
5 concentration for the MOVE organization.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. PATTON: I'm here because
8 of the concern of the zoning -- the
9 ordinance of -- I can't see this really
10 good. Anyway, it's got to do -- what I'm
11 talking about is the zoning area that
12 deals with the 2400 block of 59th Street
13 and the zoning area. There was a
14 resolution passed here in June calling
15 for 2400 block of 59th Street to be named
16 Wilson Goode Way. I'm very opposed to
17 that, and the reason why I'm opposed to
18 that is because the former Mayor of
19 Philadelphia orchestrated a situation
20 where 11 members of my family, men,
21 women, children, was bombed to death, a
22 situation that was cause where we're
23 suffering today. My sister, Ramona
24 Africa, is in a hospital fighting for her
25 life because of what happened on May

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2 13th, 1985.

3 The reason again why I'm
4 bringing this up -- and I really want to
5 have a solution to a problem that is
6 getting ready to affect Philadelphia in a
7 very terrible way. When people found out
8 that in this district, this zoning
9 district, that this street was going to
10 be named Wilson Goode Way, people was
11 opposed. They went -- I'll do the
12 abbreviation -- WTF, WTF, WTF, and it
13 means simply what the -- and you can
14 figure out the other four letters that
15 begin with an F.

16 What is going on in this city
17 that you would name a street after a man
18 that was responsible for the murder of 11
19 men, women, and children? What the F are
20 you thinking about when we put neighbors
21 who had nothing to do with that, the
22 neighbors in the 1200 block of 59th
23 Street -- sir, please pay attention to
24 what I'm saying -- and the neighbors in
25 that area, the habit that you're bringing

2 to them, because that's become a point of
3 resistance, resistance to a bombing that
4 took place that killed 11 men, women, and
5 children.

6 I came today like I came before
7 in 1978 before the massacre of my family
8 and the murder of a cop by the
9 Philadelphia Police, James Ramp, and I
10 came to you before the May 13th, 1985
11 bombing to warn you about what is going
12 on here. These neighbors, my family is
13 all -- and the City of Philadelphia is on
14 the map again. You kind of had a scar
15 over top of the wound, but you done
16 ripped it open and people are looking
17 again at the City that dropped a bomb on
18 black men, women, and children. And this
19 also had to do with just what's happening
20 today, urban remains.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Ma'am, I
22 have to --

23 MS. PATTON: Sir, all I need --

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Your
25 three minutes are up, please.

3 light.

4 What I want to say, we got to
5 sit down and have a meeting and, you
6 know, to stop this. I'm begging, I'm
7 pleading, because all hell is going to
8 break out in this city because of an
9 illegal -- I mean, an unconscionable --

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Ma'am.

11 MS. PATTON: -- WTF resolution
12 calling for a street named after a
13 cold-blooded murderer. I'm telling you
14 this, we will not be stopped.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Ma'am, I
16 have to -- you had your three minutes.

17 MS. PATTON: We're on the move.
18 Thank you for your time.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you.

21 MS. PATTON: We will not be
22 stopped.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

25 Mr. Decker, our next speaker, please.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MS. ROGIN: I just want to
6 follow up with that. I was appalled when
7 I found out that this resolution was
8 passed. I sat around here -- sat in here
9 today and looked around and counted at
10 least over 11 African American elected
11 officials, black elected officials, that
12 I am praggng (ph) myself trying to
13 figure out how they could elect this kind
14 of resolution to have Wilson Goode be
15 named after a street, how that could have
16 even passed.

17 And I remember on that day May
18 13th, 1985 I woke up with a phone call
19 from a friend to turn on my television
20 because this city government was
21 attacking the family Africa known as
22 MOVE. And I watched it, and I watched
23 the whole thing unfold. I watched the
24 bomb drop. I watched that bomb dropped
25 on this family that had women and babies,

2 children, and I watched the fire burn.

3 And at the end of all of this, I saw

4 where Wilson Goode was going to come on

5 and have a press conference. Oh, boy, I

6 sat there with bated breath waiting for

7 him to come out, because I knew heads

8 were going to roll. But he came out, and

9 you know what he said? This man that you

10 want to name a street after came on the

11 TV and said that he took full

12 responsibility for it and if he had to do

13 it again, he'd do it again.

14 I am appalled that this City

15 Council would let a resolution like that

16 pass. It needs to be rescinded.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

19 Mr. Decker, anyone else?
