2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning.

4                   (Good morning.)

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Sorry to be late again. If I can have  
7 your attention, we're going to get  
8 started.

9                   So we've established a quorum.

10 If the guests and visitors will retire  
11 behind the rail, we can start today.

12                   We're going to have our  
13 invocation, and to give our invocation  
14 this morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor  
15 Omar Barlow of the New Covenant Church.  
16 Pastor Barlow is here today as the guest  
17 of Councilman Green.

18                   I would ask all guests,  
19 visitors, and members to please rise.

20                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
21 visitors rise.)

22                   PASTOR BARLOW: Thank you. Let  
23 us look to the Lord.

24                   Father, as we govern for the  
25 sake of the City, may you give us wisdom.

2           And as we govern, may we make a  
3           commitment to fairness, justice, and  
4           equity. And may we remember the most  
5           vulnerable, the children, the elderly,

10          in Philadelphia because you gave us your

21                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22          Thank you so much. And, again, Pastor,  
23          thank you so much for those inspiring  
24          words.

25                         Our next order of business is

3                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
4           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
5           majority, there are no requests for  
6           leaves of absence today.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
8           Chair thanks the gentleman.

9                   The Chair now recognizes  
10          Councilman O'Neill.

11                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
12          Mr. President. On behalf of the  
13          republicans, there are no requests for  
14          leave of absence.

15                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
16          Chair thanks the gentleman.

17                  At this time, I would like to  
18          dispense with the regular order of  
19          business and I would just like to welcome  
20          and thank everyone who has taken time out  
21          of their busy day to come down to witness  
22          their government in action. We hope your  
23          stay here is a knowledgeable one but,  
24          more importantly, a pleasurable one, so  
25          much so that you come back again. So,

2 again, thank you for being here.

3 At this time, the Chair  
4 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,  
5 who will present a resolution on my  
6 behalf to Girard College. Would  
7 Dr. Heather Wathington and those  
8 accompanying her please join the  
9 Councilwoman at the podium.

10 (Councilmembers and guests  
11 approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
13 joining Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, we  
14 have Councilman Greenlee, Councilman  
15 Green, and Councilwoman Blackwell also.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I want to  
17 say thank you very, very much to Council  
18 President for this special honor. On a  
19 personal note, my brother was an  
20 attendee, former student at Girard  
21 College many, many years ago, and I  
22 shared when we -- at the inaugural  
23 welcoming of the new President how he  
24 literally started climbing the walls  
25 there at Girard College, and my mother

2           was smart enough to take him out before  
3           he was booted out. And so Girard College  
4           holds a very, very special place in  
5           Angelo Reynolds' heart, because it did  
6           leave an imprint, as he too was a young  
7           man without a father who wanted a chance  
8           to excel in an environment that was  
9           nurturing. And so I thank you,  
10          Mr. President.

11                       Honoring, recognizing, and  
12          celebrating Girard College for the 50th  
13          Anniversary of its desegregation.

14                       Whereas, Girard College was  
15          founded and funded by Stephen Girard to  
16          house and educate the underserved, but  
17          was limited to "poor white male orphans,"  
18          per Stephen Girard's will, and remained  
19          so, despite challenges well into the 20th  
20          Century;

21                       COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
22          legal challenges were begun by  
23          African-American lawyer and then 5th  
24          District City Council Member Raymond Pace  
25          Alexander in the 1950's. As a legal

2           advisor on the famous Brown versus Board  
3           of Education case, Alexander likely  
4           anticipated a favorable Supreme Court  
5           ruling in that case, which would bode  
6           well for his campaign against Girard  
7           College's racial ban;

8                       Whereas, after making its way  
9           through the Courts, without hearing oral  
10          arguments, the United States Supreme  
11          Court unanimously reversed the ruling by  
12          the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania  
13          upholding the Board of City Trust's  
14          decision to deny admission to two  
15          African-American boys, citing the  
16          guidelines codified in Stephen Girard's  
17          will. However, in an effort to  
18          circumvent the integration of Girard  
19          College following the Supreme Court's  
20          ruling, the Orphans' Court removed the  
21          Board of City Trusts as trustee of  
22          Stephen Girard's estate and appointed 13  
23          new trustees for Girard College,  
24          effectively making the school a private  
25          institution; and

2                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
3           in 1965, Cecil B. Moore, Esquire saw his  
4           election as President of the local NAACP  
5           as a mandate for direct action on civil  
6           rights and a militant desegregation  
7           program that included Girard College.  
8           Unnerved by the race riots that had  
9           consumed North Philadelphia the previous  
10          summer, Moore promised to "rededicate  
11          Philadelphia's civil rights campaign to  
12          improving the condition of  
13          African-Americans" and hoped to use the  
14          Girard College campaign as an outlet for  
15          the energy and frustrations of the black  
16          community; and

17                   Whereas, Cecil B. Moore,  
18          Esquire led seven months of protests with  
19          a group of teens and young adults known  
20          as the Freedom Fighters around Girard  
21          College's walls, which attracted national  
22          media attention and participation from  
23          outside civil rights figures such as  
24          Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., CORE's James  
25          Farmer, and National NAACP President Roy

2           Wilkins; and

3                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

4           Whereas, ultimately through legal  
5           challenges filed by Cecil B. Moore, the  
6           Federal courts ruled that  
7           African-American students seeking  
8           admission to Girard College were denied  
9           equal protection under the 14th Amendment  
10          and concluded that they could not be  
11          denied admission to Girard College  
12          because of their race. The Third Circuit  
13          Court of Appeals unanimously upheld the  
14          ruling and the U.S. Supreme Court refused  
15          to hear an appeal of the Third Circuit  
16          Court ruling, thus paving the way for the  
17          integration of Girard College; and

18                       Whereas, brave young men  
19          Theodore Hicks, William Dade, Carl Riley,  
20          and Owen Gowans III personally took on  
21          the challenges of desegregating Girard  
22          College as its first students of color,  
23          and did so with considerable tenacity,  
24          strength, as well as grace. A special  
25          exhibit is on view in Founder's Hall for

2           the remainder of the 2018-'19 school year  
3           commemorating this history;

4                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Now,  
5           therefore, be it resolved, by the Council  
6           of the City of Philadelphia, that we  
7           hereby honor, recognize, and celebrate  
8           Girard College on its 50 years of  
9           desegregation and those early students  
10          that braved the racism on that day.

11                   Be it further resolved, that an  
12          engrossed copy of this resolution be  
13          presented to Girard College's new  
14          President and all those assembled and  
15          those who fought tirelessly to  
16          desegregate the Girard College.

17                   This is introduced by myself on  
18          behalf of our President Darrell Clarke  
19          and sponsored by all the members of  
20          Philadelphia City Council. Bravo.

21                   (Applause.)

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
23          the Chair recognizes Dr. Wathington for  
24          remarks, please.

25                   DR. WASHINGTON: On behalf of

2           Girard College, we'd like to thank City  
3           Council and everyone assembled here and  
4           all of us who have been engaged in the  
5           struggle over the last 50 years to make  
6           sure that Girard College maintains its

12 The Chair recognizes  
13 Councilwoman Bass.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
15 Mr. President. Nothing today.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
19 Oh.

20 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,  
21 Council President. I offer one  
22 privileged resolution co-sponsored by  
23 Councilmembers Henon, Green,  
24 Taubenberger, and Squilla.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 9/20/18 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS

2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged  
4 resolution Recognizing and Celebrating  
5 the Band of Brothers Family Reunion in  
6 Philadelphia.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
8 that will be on this week's Calendar.

9 That concludes our introduction  
10 of bills and resolutions.

11 And the Chair recognizes  
12 Councilwoman Blackwell.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
14 you, Mr. President. I neglected to  
15 introduce some young people from Penn who  
16 came to us as guests of Anjali Chainani,  
17 who works for the Mayor. You all  
18 remember Anjali. The Mayor and I were in  
19 her wedding here. She's working on her  
20 Ph.D. They're all Ph.D. students working  
21 on issues like public policy and  
22 planning, and I would appreciate you  
23 recognizing them at this time.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25 Thank you.

2                   Please stand up.

3                   (Applause.)

4                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
5 you.

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
7 Thank you, Councilwoman.

8                   Welcome.

9                   Our next order of business is  
10 the reports from committee, and the Chair  
11 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez  
12 for a report from the Committee of  
13 License and Inspection.

14                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
15 you, Mr. President. The Committee on  
16 Licenses and Inspections reports one bill  
17 with a favorable recommendation.

18                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19 Thank you, Councilwoman.

20                   Mr. Decker, please read the  
21 report.

22                   CHIEF CLERK: To the President  
23 and members of the Council of the City of  
24 Philadelphia, the Committee on Licenses  
25 and Inspections, to which was referred

1                   9/20/18 - STATED - REPORTS  
2           Bill No. 160151, entitled "An ordinance  
3           amending The Philadelphia Code by adding  
4           a new provision authorizing the City of  
5           Philadelphia to issue municipal  
6           identification cards to City residents,  
7           establishing standards, confidentiality  
8           provisions, and other related items  
9           regarding the cards," respectfully  
10          reports it has considered and amended the  
11          same and returns the attached bill to  
12          Council with a favorable recommendation.

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14          Thank you.

15                   The Chair again recognizes  
16          Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

17                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
18          you, Mr. President. I move that the  
19          rules of Council be suspended as to  
20          permit first reading this day of Bill No.  
21          160151.

22                   (Duly seconded.)

23                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you. It has been moved and  
25          properly seconded that the rules of

2                   Council be suspended so as to permit  
3                   first reading this day of Bill No.  
4                   160151.

5                   All those in favor say aye.  
6                   (Aye.)

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
8                   Those opposed?

9                   (No response.)

10                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
11                  ayes have it, and the bill will be placed  
12                  on our First Reading Calendar today.

13                  And our next order of business  
14                  is consideration of the Calendar. I note  
15                  that the bill just reported from  
16                  committee with suspension of the rules  
17                  has been deemed to have had a first  
18                  reading. This bill will be on our Second  
19                  Reading and Final Passage Calendar at our  
20                  next session of Council.

21                  As there are no additional  
22                  bills on the First Reading Calendar  
23                  today, the Chair recognizes Councilman  
24                  Greenlee for the purpose of calling up  
25                  the resolutions and bills on the Second

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
4 you, Mr. President. The following  
5 resolutions and bills are being called up  
6 from the Second Reading and Final Passage  
7 Calendar today: Nos. 180756, 180761,  
8 180763, 180764, 180768, 180769, 180775,  
9 180776, 180784, 180600-A, 180077-A,  
10 180498-A. All other resolutions and  
11 bills are being held.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13 Thank you.

14 Before considering the bills  
15 and resolutions today that are on the  
16 Final Passage, we'll have to have our  
17 public comment session. It will go as  
18 follows:

19 If you haven't already signed  
20 up for a bill or resolution that's on the  
21 Final Passage Calendar today, you may  
22 sign up at the table to my left.

23 When your name is called, you  
24 will go to the middle of the Council  
25 Chambers. There's a podium. There's a

2           device on that podium. When the light  
3           turns green, it will be your time to  
4           speak. When the light turns yellow, you  
5           will have 30 seconds to conclude your  
6           remarks. When the light turns red, we'd

9                        I believe the public comment  
10           may be somewhat lengthy today, so we're  
11           really asking you to cooperate with  
12           respect to those particular guidelines  
13           and take your three minutes.

14                       So, Mr. Decker, are we ready  
15           for the first name?

16                       You will have three minutes to  
17           conclude your remarks.

18                       CHIEF CLERK: Kathleen  
19           McGettigan.

20                       (No response.)

21                       CHIEF CLERK: Kathleen  
22           McGettigan, commenting on 180100.

23                       (Witness approached podium.)

24                       MS. McGETTIGAN: Two things. I  
25           was very embarrassed last week at the

2           first meeting of City Council after  
3           summer break. I'm really glad that  
4           Frederick Wiseman, the documentary  
5           filmmaker, wasn't here with his camera,  
6           because if he had been here and he had  
7           portrayed on film how City Council  
8           behaved, how they came in two hours late  
9           and they clowned around, posing for  
10          selfies, I think that there would be  
11          people on the banks of the Limpopo River  
12          in Africa, Siberian villages who after  
13          watching Boris Johnson's bad hair day  
14          would be laughing themselves silly at the  
15          antics of City Council.

16                    And I'm also very upset because  
17          I would like to see City Council  
18          introduce Bill, I believe, 180100  
19          regarding the Alpha Center, because, I  
20          mean, stop trying to wear people down.  
21          If you're decent, vote it up or down.

22                    Finally -- excuse me. Have  
23          some intestinal fortitude.

24                    Finally, I would like to say  
25          that I believe it is one year now since

1           9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           the anniversary of Hurricane Maria, and  
3           as we all know, about a little less than  
4           3,000 people died in 9/11. Well, it  
5           seems that the latest figures say that  
6           about 3,000 Puerto Ricans perished, some  
7           died slow, lingering, painful deaths due  
8           to cancer or drinking dirty water or not  
9           being able to get kidney dialysis. Well,  
10          since we have the second largest Puerto  
11          Rican population outside of Puerto Rico  
12          and since 8 percent of the Philadelphia  
13          population is Puerto Rican and since I  
14          saw City Council through things like  
15          memorizing Art Appreciation Week and  
16          memorizing athletes who have been dead  
17          for maybe 20 years last week, it seems  
18          that maybe we should have a moment of  
19          recognition for the Puerto Ricans who  
20          perished during Hurricane Maria.

21                            That's it.

22                            COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23          Thank you.

24                            (Applause.)

25                            CHIEF CLERK: Stanley

2 Straughter.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Mr.

5 President?

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,

7 Councilwoman.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

9 you. I hope that you will allow -- I

10 know we have a few more people than

11 perhaps we could have. This is such a

12 special issue, and we have leaders from

13 not only our city and state, but our

14 country and abroad. So I hope that you

15 will allow them and all of those who are

16 here for Bill No. 180761 about the

17 creating a Special Committee on 400 Years

18 of African American History. I hope that

19 they will now come forward and take a few

20 minutes to say what they want to say.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Sure.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

24 you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Yeah.

3 Mr. Lopez, can you help them,  
4 individuals who are speaking on that.

5 (Witnesses approached podium.)

6 MR. STRAUGHTER: I would just  
7 briefly say thank you very much for this  
8 opportunity, both Council Lady Blackwell  
9 and all City Council endorsing the  
10 400-year commemoration of free Africans  
11 being enslaved in the United States. And  
12 we have scholars and activists here,  
13 beginning with Dr. Molefi Asante, Dr.  
14 Diane Turner, the President of the  
15 African American Museum in Philadelphia,  
16 and many others that are here to speak in  
17 remarks.

18 So thank you. I will yield my  
19 time to Dr. Asante.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Mr. Straughter.

22 DR. ASANTE: Mr. President,  
23 members of the City Council, I rise in  
24 the name --

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just

2 state your name for the record, please,  
3 Doctor.

4 DR. ASANTE: I'm Molefi Kete  
5 Asante.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
7 Thank you.

8 DR. ASANTE: Chair of the  
9 Department of Africology at Temple  
10 University.

11 I rise in the name of the 20  
12 Africans who landed in Port Comfort,  
13 Virginia near Jamestown in 1619 to  
14 support the resolution for the Special  
15 Commission for the commemoration of 400  
16 years of African presence here.

17 I rise in the name of the more  
18 than 100 African ethnic groups and  
19 nations - Bamileke, Fulani, Efe, Asanti,  
20 Fanti, Wolof, Mandinka, Kongo, Ga - who  
21 came to this country not as slaves but as  
22 persons, as African people, who were  
23 later enslaved in America.

24 I rise to support this  
25 resolution in the name of the African who

2 experienced the brutal dispossession and  
3 disempowerment that came with the  
4 enslavement itself and those who died on  
5 the slave ships and whose bodies were  
6 buried in the oceans to energize those  
7 oceans. I rise in their name and in the  
8 names of those who were resilient and who  
9 lived through the suffering of  
10 segregation and discrimination in America  
11 and, like my ancestors in Georgia, who  
12 picked cotton and worked in the tobacco  
13 fields. I rise in their names to support  
14 this Special Commission for 400 Years.

15 And I rise also in the names of  
16 those who became scientists and poets  
17 because of the work that their ancestors  
18 have done, and I support this Special  
19 Resolution.

20 And thank you very much.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Doctor.

23 (Applause.)

24 PROFESSOR PALMER: Good

25 morning, Mr. President and Council. My

2           name is Professor Walter Palmer.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4           Doctor, hold on one second, because we  
5           have a list here.

6                   Stan, are we going to go by the  
7           list or by -- Councilwoman, how --  
8           they're in a particular order. So should  
9           we ignore the order and just let those --  
10          just let the people that you've indicated  
11          are going to speak? Okay. I just didn't  
12          want to miss anybody.

13                   Good morning.

14                   PROFESSOR PALMER: Good  
15          morning, Mr. President and City  
16          Councilmembers, as well as the guests  
17          that are here. My name is Professor  
18          Walter Palmer, University of Pennsylvania  
19          where I teach American racism, a course I  
20          helped create 50 years ago.

21                   I think that this resolution is  
22          very important, and I think as it  
23          recognizes 40 years of slavery inside of  
24          America, we need to recognize the fact  
25          that Africans have helped to build

2 civilizations all across the world.

3 Less than a dozen European  
4 nations kidnapped, robbed, and stole  
5 Africans and brought them to all parts of  
6 the world. They took them into the  
7 Caribbean and West Indies. They took  
8 them into Puerto Rico. They took them  
9 into Haiti, into Brazil. They took them  
10 into Mexico, into Peru. They were sent  
11 all over the world. And those Africans  
12 which are in Cuba and in Puerto Rico and  
13 in Mexico are the same as the Africans  
14 who are here. We're African Americans.  
15 They're African Brazilians, African  
16 Chileans, African Peruvians. And the  
17 reality is for us to really not only look  
18 at the work that Africans helped to build  
19 here in this nation and this economy, but  
20 the continued work that they've done all  
21 over the world, where America has segued  
22 into all these economies to further  
23 fasten America's hold on world economies.

24 I think it's important for us  
25 to recognize the fact that the reason we

2           come this late, a hundred years later, to  
3           have this recognition lies largely  
4           because of the fact that many of us have  
5           benefited from the largesse of the  
6           African people and, at the same time,  
7           have never really stood up to fight for  
8           them.

9                         We have a division with inside  
10           of our own communities where African  
11           Americans for the most part have a  
12           disdain for poor black people and they  
13           have a disdain for African people. And  
14           until we start to close those gaps, we  
15           will never be able to make the change.

16                        And I hope that this Commission  
17           is more than show and tell, that it's  
18           more than artsy-craftsy, touchy-feely,  
19           that it really works towards trying to  
20           restore to the African not only his  
21           greatness but also the process of its  
22           economies.

23                        The idea just simply having  
24           show and tell is to me irrelevant unless  
25           we also build economies amongst the

2           people in the country who will be of  
3           African descent, as well as those  
4           Africans who go on the continent. And I  
5           stand here for this august body to once  
6           again ask and require that you make sure  
7           there is teeth in such a commission.

8                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you, Doctor.

10                       (Applause.)

11                       MS. ADEN: Good morning. My  
12           name is Patricia Wilson Aden, and I'm the  
13           President and CEO of the African American  
14           Museum in Philadelphia. The African  
15           American Museum in Philadelphia brings  
16           diverse communities together in greater  
17           appreciation of the black experience  
18           through the combined narratives of art,  
19           history, and culture. Our museum was the  
20           first institution built by a major U.S.  
21           city to house and to celebrate in the  
22           work of African Americans.

23                       In the four decades since its  
24           creation, the African American Museum has  
25           become a premier destination within our

2 region's cultural landscape, serving over  
3 80,000 visitors, including 20,000  
4 school-age children. The Museum serves  
5 the community as a gathering place, an  
6 educational resource, and a steward of a  
7 vast collection of art and artifacts.  
8 Our audience gains a unique perspective  
9 on the art history and culture of African  
10 Americans in the African diaspora.

11 On behalf of the Museum and the  
12 constituency we serve, I would like to  
13 applaud Councilwoman Blackwell for  
14 introducing the resolution to create the  
15 Special Committee on 400 Years of African  
16 American History. As the region's  
17 foremost cultural institution dedicated  
18 to the celebration of history and culture  
19 of African Americans and the African  
20 diaspora, the African American Museum  
21 supports the creation of the proposed  
22 Special Committee, and pledges our  
23 commitment to supporting its critical  
24 mission.

25 Born from the unprecedented

2           tragedy of the slave trade, the story and  
3           presence of people of African descent on  
4           North American soil is yet one of  
5           triumph. Ours is a complex history of  
6           challenges and injustices interwoven with  
7           achievements of unequal consequence.

8                         From the moment that those  
9           20-odd Negroes arrived at Old Point  
10          Comfort in August of 1619, black people  
11          have influenced and informed the history  
12          and culture of this nation. The American  
13          story cannot and should not be told  
14          without reference to and acknowledgment  
15          of our presence and our role. Yet we  
16          know that our contributions, the  
17          hardships, and prejudice committed  
18          against us, coupled with our hard-won  
19          achievements, the bravery of our heroes,  
20          the leadership of our trailblazers, and  
21          the impact and influence of our  
22          innovators have too often been ignored,  
23          dismissed, and misinterpreted. It is  
24          only fitting that Philadelphia create a  
25          Special Committee tasked with

2           commemorating the 400th anniversary of  
3           the arrival of Africans in the English  
4           colonies that would eventually become  
5           America.

6                        More important than the  
7           commemoration of this state is the  
8           Special Committee's charge to plan  
9           programs to acknowledge the impact of  
10          slavery, racial discrimination, and to  
11          coordinate and support scholarly  
12          research. This charge closely aligns  
13          with the work of the African American  
14          Museum in Philadelphia. We're eager to  
15          ensure that the work of the Federal  
16          Commission and the proposed Special  
17          Committee has meaningful impact and  
18          tangible outcomes.

19                        Thank you.

20                        (Applause.)

21                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22          Councilwoman, did you want to -- you want  
23          to do it now?

24                        COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: If I  
25          can.

3 Folks, if you will allow us to go a  
4 little off script. We just want to have,  
5 time specific, a recognition. The Chair  
6 recognizes -- and we'll come right back  
7 to the issue.

8 The Chair recognizes  
9 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

10 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Yes.

11 Thank you. And as an Afro-Latina, I want  
12 to not take away from the importance of  
13 the testimony that is here, but I'm going  
14 to ask my Council colleagues and this  
15 Council and all of the folks visiting us  
16 here today, at 11:50 across the world and  
17 in Puerto Rico, folks will be standing  
18 together in a moment of silence to grieve  
19 the 3,000 families, as some of our  
20 visitors have alluded today, in the  
21 one-year celebration of Hurricane Maria  
22 in Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin  
23 Islands.

24 I want to thank in particular  
25 all of the Philadelphians who in one way

2 or another helped us as we raised money  
3 and welcomed thousands of new  
4 Philadelphians who arrived from Puerto  
5 Rico since the storm. I particularly  
6 want to thank all of the agencies,  
7 Philadelphia Housing Authority and all of  
8 the non-profits organizations who stood  
9 together during this incredible time.

10 We are all frustrated with the  
11 slow response of our federal government,  
12 and I hope that our fellow Americans in  
13 the Carolinas do not have to endure what  
14 Puerto Ricans and our friends in the U.S.  
15 Virgin Islands did during these Hurricane  
16 Irma and Hurricane Maria.

17 I want to thank all of my  
18 colleagues and everyone in the  
19 Philadelphia area who somehow fundraised,  
20 joined us at the many, many events. At  
21 12:00 noon, Representative Cruz and other  
22 elected officials will be raising the  
23 ceremonial flag at Antonio Pantoja  
24 School. On Monday, as I have done in the  
25 last 11 years, we will be raising the

2 Puerto Rican flag, and I hope that my  
3 colleagues would join us.

4 My young cousin in Puerto Rico  
5 said to me when I visited this summer  
6 about the storm and the effects  
7 afterwards, We have lost -- and I'll say  
8 it in Spanish first.

9 (Councilwoman talking in  
10 Spanish.)

11 We have lost so much that we  
12 have even lost the ability to fear.

13 So I ask that all of you join  
14 me, stand in one moment of silence for  
15 all of the folks that we lost, the  
16 thousands of folks in Puerto Rico and the  
17 U.S. Virgin Islands.

18 (Moment of silence.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
20 you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22 Thank you, Councilwoman.

23 You can proceed. Thank you.

24 MS. TURNER: Diane Turner,  
25 curator. I bring you peace and freedom

2           from Mr. Charles Blockson, curator  
3           emeritus and the Charles L. Blockson  
4           Afro-American Collection, where we house  
5           more than 700,000 items about African  
6           American history and culture.

7                     The creation of a commission in  
8           this city is not only timely and  
9           important, but critical during these  
10          times. This year marks the 150th  
11          anniversary of the birth of W.E.B.  
12          DuBois. On display in the Blockson  
13          Collection is an exhibit celebrating  
14          W.E.B. DuBois and the Philadelphia Negro.

15                     DuBois is one of our nation's  
16          most prolific and innovative scholars,  
17          but is little known to many and is often  
18          just a footnote in our classrooms. In  
19          his book, The Souls of Black Folk  
20          published in 1903, he writes, quote, "The  
21          problem of the 20th century is the  
22          problem of the color line," end quote.

23                     I stand before you today in the  
24          21st century to say that this remains a  
25          problem that has not been resolved. We

2 need a commission.

3 W.E.B. DuBois also states,  
4 quote, "Herein lies the tragedy of the  
5 age. Not that men are poor. All men  
6 know something about poverty. Not that  
7 men are wicked. Who is good? Not that  
8 men are ignorant. What is true? Nay,  
9 but that men knows so little of men."

10 This is true about of African  
11 American history. We know so little, yet  
12 African American history is American  
13 history, and African Americans are among  
14 the oldest Americans.

15 Next year marks 400 years of  
16 the African presence in English colonies,  
17 but there are scholarly studies that show  
18 that Africans were in America BC. We  
19 need a commission.

20 In 2016, Mr. Blockson had the  
21 Pennsylvania slave trade state marker  
22 placed along the Delaware River near  
23 Independence Seaport Museum to  
24 commemorate the lives of enslaved  
25 Africans brought as early as 1639. His

1           9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           commitment and dedication has resulted in  
3           markers throughout the City.

4                     In talking with Mr. Blockson,  
5           he stated the following: The year 2019  
6           gives the City of Philadelphia a great  
7           opportunity to place a city marker to  
8           commemorate the enslavement of men,  
9           women, and children of African descent.  
10          He recommends that, quote, "The honorable  
11          members of City Hall and the Council  
12          unveil a city marker to commemorate the  
13          peculiar institution of enslavement in  
14          the so-called City of Philadelphia."

15                     So we strongly support this  
16          Commission, and we thank Councilwoman  
17          Jannie Blackwell for introducing it.

18                     Thank you.

19                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Ma'am, just for the record, just state  
21          your name. We didn't get your name.

22                     MS. TURNER: Oh, I did at the  
23          beginning. Diane Turner, curator of the  
24          Charles L. Blockson Afro-American  
25          Collection.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 MS. BA: Good morning.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
7 morning.

8 MS. BA: My name is Youma Ba.

9 I'm the President of Echoes of Africa,  
10 and also I'm a mother in the City of  
11 Philadelphia. I have a daughter who is  
12 ten years old who was born here.

13 As African, we are more than  
14 50,000 in the City of Philadelphia who  
15 come directly from Africa in the couple  
16 of years back to maybe 1980s, and also we  
17 all have almost kids in the City of  
18 Philadelphia. We thank the Councilwoman  
19 Blackwell to give us the opportunity to  
20 work with the community in the City of  
21 Philadelphia.

22 We're supporting this committee  
23 because as we know as African descent,  
24 also we have a lot of issue in this  
25 country because sometime the

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2           misunderstanding, our kids who just got  
3           here maybe a couple of years and people  
4           who have been here more than 400 years  
5           ago who come.

6                         We want this committee to  
7           happen, to help all the community to be  
8           able to work together, to understand also  
9           together.

10                        We say thank you to the  
11           Councilwoman and hope so you are going to  
12           accept this committee.

13                        Thank you.

14                        (Applause.)

15                        COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, can  
16           you read our next speaker, please.

17                        MS. GLADNEY: Hi. I'm  
18           Vanjessica Gladney and I'm representing  
19           the University of Pennsylvania's Penn  
20           Slavery Project. So our project started  
21           last year, and our university had come  
22           forward a few years ago saying that we  
23           had nothing to do with the slave trade  
24           here in Philadelphia, and the reason we  
25           are on semester number three is because

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2           our university -- that turns out to be  
3           not true. And during our research, I  
4           realized that Pennsylvania and  
5           Philadelphia itself has a huge stake in  
6           American history, and I think it's really  
7           important for this committee to be based  
8           in Philadelphia. The Declaration of  
9           Independence was signed here -- or  
10          written, signed, the Constitution, the  
11          Bill of Rights. This is where America  
12          was born.

13                        America was built by slavery.  
14          The American Revolution was paid for by  
15          slave labor. And if there's one city  
16          that's going to commemorate the 400th  
17          anniversary of slaves on this soil of our  
18          country, it should definitely be  
19          Philadelphia, and University of  
20          Pennsylvania is excited to support and be  
21          involved in all the things we want to see  
22          happen next year.

23                        So thank you.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you

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2 for your testimony.

3 Can you state your name for the  
4 record and you may --

5 MS. RAGSDALE: Good morning.

6 My name is Gwen Ragsdale. My husband, J.  
7 Justin Ragsdale, and I own and operate  
8 the Lest We Forget Slavery Museum. It's  
9 the only museum in Philadelphia with  
10 actual slavery artifacts that my husband  
11 has been collecting for the last 60  
12 years.

13 This is a middle passage  
14 shackle. This is what our people were  
15 forced to wear as they were brought from  
16 Africa to the Americas and other parts of  
17 the world. Depending on how many  
18 enslaved Africans they had would  
19 determine how the shackle would be used.  
20 One rung would come off and go around the  
21 ankle of one African. The other rung  
22 would go around the ankle of another  
23 African, and they would be shackled  
24 together for the duration. It took two  
25 to three months to get from the shores of

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2           West Africa to the shores of South  
3           Carolina. It was a suffering trip.

4                       Those men who worked in those  
5           ships were former prisoners who had been  
6           let out of prison by the queen of England  
7           and told that they would get money at the  
8           end of the trip, that they could have  
9           access to any of the females while they  
10          were on that trip. Many of those women  
11          would be pregnant before they got to  
12          their final destination.

13                      The horrors didn't end there.  
14          It only began. It followed by hundreds  
15          of years of slavery. We must remember  
16          the legacy of slavery. We cannot forget  
17          it. It's important to understand that  
18          aspects of slavery are still with us  
19          today.

20                      We are so happy that  
21          Councilwoman Blackwell produced this  
22          resolution to commemorate this part of  
23          American history. This is not black  
24          history. This is American history, and  
25          it's important that we recognize that.



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2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
5 for your testimony.

6 Please state your name for the  
7 record and you may proceed with your  
8 public comment.

9 MR. GAFAR: My name is Duke  
10 (ph) Abdul Gafar and I'm the Chairman of  
11 the 400-year Coalition. And what we have  
12 done, we've come together to actually  
13 perpetuate this for a whole year next  
14 year.

15 Most struggles have talked  
16 about the slavery movement, but we want  
17 to present how the shackles of slavery  
18 have been mental and the shackles have  
19 been on the minds of our people for 400  
20 years, and that's because it was  
21 misinformation. It was  
22 misrepresentation. It was de-franchise  
23 of the African American.

24 So our coalition will have one  
25 event every week next year for 52 weeks.

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2           So whether it be like black history where  
3           it's one month, we will have an event  
4           every week commemorating the 400-year  
5           struggle.

6                         (Applause.)

7                         MR. GAFAR: So when you see --  
8           we have a website. We have some  
9           information that we'll be passing up, a  
10          website, and we'd like you to put hashtag  
11          400 years. We'd like to see that all  
12          over social media so that we will be  
13          represented in this struggle.

14                        Thank you.

15                        (Applause.)

16                        COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
17          for your testimony.

18                        Can you please state your name  
19          for the record and you may proceed with  
20          your public comment.

21                        MR. RAGSDALE: I am J. Justin  
22          Ragsdale and I am chief curator for Lest  
23          We Forget the Black Holocaust Museum here  
24          in Philadelphia. I'm the other half.  
25          Gwen Ragsdale is my wife. I am her

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2 husband. So we really don't have a name.

3 But what it is, we really want

4 this to happen. This is very, very

5 important and we can't -- I can't say it

6 enough. We say it forceful. We can go

7 into anything we want to do, but we don't

8 talk about the horrors of slavery, and

9 that's very important that our children

10 know it, because it's the fallout that's

11 coming from this that's on them because

12 they don't know what happened to us.

13 We paid a heavy price to get

14 here, and we got to let them know. It's

15 very important.

16 So that's all I can say. You

17 know the rest.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you

19 for your testimony.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. COARD: My name is Michael

22 Coard. I'm with a group called ATAC,

23 A-T-A-C, Avenging the Ancestors

24 Coalition. And I'm really not sure what

25 I am going to say. I just hope that the

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2           enslaved ancestors guide the words I'm  
3           about to say for the next two minutes.  
4           And the first thing they told me to say  
5           is this: Imagine that right now as we're  
6           sitting here with our colleagues and  
7           maybe our spouses, maybe our children,  
8           that some martians come down from outer  
9           space and they take your co-worker, they  
10          take your wife, they take your husband,  
11          they take your son, they take your  
12          daughter, and they take you up to Mars.  
13          And when you're in Mars, they take away  
14          your English language. They take away  
15          your American nationality. They take  
16          away your Christian religion, your Muslim  
17          religion, your Judaic religion. They  
18          take away everything that made you what  
19          you were here on earth.

20                    So now you're in Mars. You're  
21                    not a martian because you're not from  
22                    Mars. You're no longer an earthling  
23                    because you're not on earth anymore.

24                    For 246 years, from 1619 until  
25                    1865, that was the story of Africans in

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2 America. But it didn't stop in 1865.  
3 Many people think that the 13th  
4 Amendment, quote/unquote, freed the  
5 slaves, ended slavery. It did not. The  
6 13th Amendment doesn't say slavery and  
7 involuntary servitude are hereby  
8 abolished, period. It doesn't say  
9 slavery and involuntary servitude are  
10 hereby abolished, exclamation point. It  
11 says slavery and involuntary servitude  
12 are hereby abolished, comma, except  
13 following conviction for a crime.

14 So after the slave codes came  
15 the black codes, and the black codes were  
16 laws to criminalize black people. The  
17 law of vagrancy today came out of that.  
18 Vagrancy in 1865 is the same legal  
19 definition as it is in 2018, being in  
20 public with no visible means of support.  
21 So black people enslaved for 246 years,  
22 here comes the 13th Amendment, they're  
23 so-called freed. The county sheriff  
24 comes along, pardon my language, and  
25 says, What are you niggers doing out

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2 here?

3 They say, We have no job, we  
4 have no real estate, we have nothing.

5 Okay. You have nothing.

6 You're a vagrant.

7 They were convicted, and from  
8 that, we have mass incarceration today.

9 Let me wrap this up in 30  
10 seconds by saying this: I fully support  
11 what Councilwoman Blackwell is trying to  
12 do, because the story of slavery in  
13 America is not just America in general.  
14 It's Pennsylvania, beginning in 1684.  
15 The man on top of this building, William  
16 Penn, was a slaveholder, held three at  
17 his Pennsbury Manor.

18 And in my final ten seconds,  
19 let me say this: In terms of the history  
20 right here in Philadelphia, not just at  
21 6th and Market where George Washington  
22 enslaved black people, but at Front and  
23 Market, the London Coffee House,  
24 beginning in 1754, black men, women, and  
25 children were bought and sold.

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2 So the story of slavery is not  
3 just an American story. It's a  
4 Philadelphia story. Philadelphia helped  
5 to break it. Philadelphia got to help to  
6 fix it.

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
10 for your testimony.

11 Clerk, could you read the name  
12 of our next speaker, or since we're a  
13 little bit out of order, is there anyone  
14 here who has signed up for public  
15 testimony and has not had the  
16 opportunity? Please approach the public  
17 comment podium. State your name for the  
18 record and you may proceed.

19 (Witnesses approached podium.)

20 MR. DANIHEL: Okay. My name is  
21 Joseph Danihel.

22 This is an official decree in  
23 writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as  
24 such, requires immediate action and  
25 remedy.

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2                   Every week Council, Mayor, and  
3 others transfer private property to the  
4 government, probably illegally.

5                   Ben Franklin stated, You have a  
6 republic if you can keep it. Founding  
7 fathers hated democracy, calling the mob  
8 rule or two wolves and a sheep voting on  
9 who is for dinner.

10                   The United States of America is  
11 a constitutional republic, which means  
12 agents and agencies are contractually  
13 bound to protect the rights of the  
14 people, as Governor, Senator, Mayor,  
15 Council, and others violated Constitution  
16 and law to wage war on the people.  
17 Violating the Constitution in the very  
18 place it was written is illegal. Is the  
19 Attorney General enabling criminal  
20 behavior as he has accused the Pope and  
21 others of? Why has the Attorney General  
22 refused his sworn duty?

23                   Government stealing private  
24 property was a major cause of the  
25 American Revolution. The people require



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2           auditable proof from their  
3           representatives to prove consent of the  
4           government exists. The Constitution  
5           demands it.

6                     The constitutions require  
7           immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
8           breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
9           duty. Your oath of office requires you  
10          to act or face prison.

11                    42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
12          1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
13          Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
14          through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
15          712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
16          SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
17          violated.

18                    I call for the federal and  
19          Commonwealth governments to perform their  
20          constitutional obligation to investigate  
21          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
22          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
23          1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of  
24          God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
25          24 years is egregious, extraordinary,

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2           oath-violating, and requires immediate  
3           remedy.

4                     A just government must obey the  
5           rule of law. This color of law  
6           government must have its Charter to  
7           government revoked until a  
8           constitutionally compliant government is  
9           installed.

10                    Public servants cannot refuse  
11           their sworn duty to act any more than a  
12           fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
13           sovereign people require oath, law, and  
14           constitutions be enforced, and jail is  
15           required for all who violate oath,  
16           constitution or law.

17                    I remind Council, it takes a  
18           lot of cooperation to create and allow  
19           monumental corruption.

20                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
21           for your testimony.

22                    You may state your name for the  
23           record and proceed with your public  
24           comment. Thank you.

25                    MS. COOPER: Good afternoon.

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2           My name is Donna Cooper. I'm the  
3           Executive Director of Public Citizens for  
4           Children and Youth, and I am here to urge  
5           Council at this point to vote not to  
6           approve the Keystone Opportunity Zone  
7           bill. That bill requires much more  
8           review by members of Council.

9                        This morning's Inquirer began  
10           with a story of our libraries cutting  
11           back hours. My library in my  
12           neighborhood will no longer have Saturday  
13           hours. Four blocks away a hotel is  
14           proposed by a millionaire, and that bill  
15           eliminates all taxes, sales, corporate,  
16           and property taxes, on that building for  
17           ten years. Your action today will make  
18           that possible, while the citizens of my  
19           neighborhood can no longer bring their  
20           children to the library on a Saturday.

21                       This morning's Inquirer  
22           included a letter from a parent who  
23           wondered why she can't send her child to  
24           her neighborhood elementary school  
25           because the kindergarten classes are

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2 full. That bill today will enable my  
3 neighborhood in Fishtown to have  
4 millionaires who will get tax breaks on  
5 properties for ten years in a community  
6 with two Stephen Starr restaurants. This  
7 is not a blighted community. Developers  
8 are tripping over themselves from LA to  
9 New York to invest in Fishtown, to invest  
10 in North Philly. At 17th and Lehigh a  
11 property will get a ten-year tax break,  
12 corporate millionaires.

13 (Applause.)

14 MS. COOPER: It is ironic that  
15 we began today's Council session with a  
16 pastor who asked us to think about equity  
17 and justice and we listened to nine  
18 people talk about the Blockson Collection  
19 on slavery, and we are about to give  
20 millionaires, 25 of them, ten years tax  
21 free, injuring our City services,  
22 injuring our children, and injuring our  
23 schools.

24 So don't take my word for it.

25 Hold the bill. You look at the

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2 properties. You look at the properties  
3 by Ikea that's being given a tax break.  
4 You look at the properties of the Arsenal  
5 Business Center where charter schools are  
6 getting paid by the School District for  
7 rent and the owners of those buildings  
8 are going to be tax free on their rent  
9 profits for the next ten years. Don't  
10 take my word for it. Just vote to hold  
11 the bill over, learn about the  
12 properties, and decide if they meet the  
13 state definition of blight, because the  
14 purpose of this Keystone Opportunity Zone  
15 is to stimulate development where it  
16 otherwise wouldn't happen. That isn't on  
17 Delaware Avenue in South Philly. That  
18 isn't in Fishtown. That isn't currently  
19 at 17th and Lehigh. And I bet you when  
20 you look a little bit deeper you'll agree  
21 with me that especially today given how  
22 this Council session began with that  
23 pastor calling us to fight for equity and  
24 justice, it's worthwhile to give this  
25 bill more review.

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2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you for your testimony.

6 MR. HAGINS: Great morning. My  
7 name is Ogbonna Hagins and I'm here to  
8 speak about 170408, which was introduced  
9 by Councilmembers Reynolds Brown and  
10 Councilwoman Gym.

11 To permanently eliminate  
12 suspending children from the fifth grade  
13 below is really like a no-brainer. But  
14 one of the things that we need to do  
15 while we're not suspending them is to  
16 make sure that those fifth graders or  
17 those fourth graders are reading on grade  
18 level, because we know that 40-some-odd  
19 percent of our children are not reading  
20 on grade level. So now you don't suspend  
21 them, but you're also not providing them  
22 with what they need to survive in this  
23 world.

24 And also on the education note,  
25 and particularly on the enslavement

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2 issue, Christopher Columbus is still  
3 celebrated in our schools. Why is that  
4 tyrant, the boy that was lost, the one  
5 that is responsible for a lot of the  
6 things that happened to Africans and  
7 Afro-Americans, why is he still being  
8 celebrated in 2018 when we know that he  
9 was lost and what it did to us as African  
10 people in this country?

11 So we need to also identify  
12 while we're keeping the kids at school,  
13 we need to identify those great students  
14 that are excelling that may not have an  
15 opportunity to go to college. We need to  
16 be able to support them. This city needs  
17 to be able to support them. I want to  
18 give an example with my son, who has done  
19 everything right. My son, Zaki Hagins,  
20 who is in the Netherlands right now  
21 studying music. We went to people on  
22 this Council to try to get funding to get  
23 my son what he needed, but we had to go  
24 all around the City leaders that should  
25 be identifying people from the City who

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2           can build this city up, not just ignore  
3           them and say, okay, you know, well, they  
4           come from a poor family or a poor area.  
5           It's your responsibility to identify  
6           people in this community that can build  
7           this community up, not just to say you  
8           know what, let's keep them in school,  
9           let's do this. No. You got to do a lot  
10          more, and particularly the Afro-Americans  
11          in this Council, to always -- or to  
12          continue to celebrate Christopher  
13          Columbus when you know what Christopher  
14          Columbus was responsible for for our  
15          ancestors. You ought to be ashamed of  
16          yourself. Our ancestors are spinning in  
17          their grave knowing that they died for  
18          the right to vote, and you're in office  
19          as Afro-Americans and you're not  
20          supporting the Afro-Americans in this  
21          city? Yo, y'all got to get it together.  
22          Y'all got to get it together.

23                    (Applause.)

24                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25           Thank you for your testimony, sir.



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2 Good afternoon.

3 MS. AFRICA: Good afternoon.

4 My name is Pam Africa and I'm dealing  
5 with Resolution 170675 introduced by  
6 Councilmember Jones and it's dealing with  
7 the ordinance to amend the Philadelphia  
8 Zoning Maps by changing the zoning  
9 designation to certain areas of land  
10 located within an area bounded by  
11 Woodbine Avenue, Upland Way, 59th Street,  
12 Lancaster Avenue, and 62nd Street. It  
13 also -- what I'm talking about is also  
14 dealing with a resolution. I don't know  
15 the name, but it fits right in here, and  
16 already talking about naming a street.  
17 Well, they done it, named the street  
18 after Wilson Goode, Wilson Goode's Way.  
19 I'm very opposed to that.

20 I was here last week. And I  
21 got a lot more information that I found  
22 out now that I didn't have then. One of  
23 the things I'd like to say, two quotes by  
24 John Africa. No one has the right to do  
25 wrong. Second quote, just because it's

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2           legal don't make it right.

3                         We had a meeting with  
4           Councilman Jones dealing with the fact  
5           that no one in my family was notified  
6           about him naming the street after Wilson  
7           Goode. No one in the Osage Avenue who  
8           homes was devastated and are, you know --  
9           and who has been suffering for over 30  
10          years behind the act on May 13th, 1985.

11                        Also who wasn't notified was  
12          the people, the residents in the area  
13          where he was going to actually put the  
14          street. This has caused a lot of  
15          problems, and, you know, we came here  
16          looking for conflict resolution. And I  
17          went to different Councilpeople. They  
18          didn't remember signing any resolution,  
19          and I told Mr. Thomas -- I mean Mr. Jones  
20          that what he did was very devious and  
21          deceptive, and I went on to prove it.  
22          Because when you name a street after W.  
23          Wilson Goode, that is newsworthy. If the  
24          news media really had known that on June  
25          21st a street was being named after W.

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2           Wilson Goode, Wilson Goode's Way, then it  
3           would have been front page news. It  
4           would have been the talk of the media.  
5           And you know it would have been  
6           worldwide, because there's no way we  
7           would have stood by and allowed it.

8                         So I'm saying it was devious  
9           and deceptive because people didn't know,  
10          and Mr. Thomas came -- Jones came to a  
11          meeting last night that was pulled  
12          together by the community to deal with  
13          this. What he said was he was wrong for  
14          not contacting us. He was wrong for not  
15          allowing the residents in that area and  
16          all to be able to respond to this. He  
17          said he was wrong because he did the  
18          wrong thing throughout the whole thing,  
19          right, but Mr. Goode is a mentor of his.  
20          So this is a friendship thing dealing  
21          with a situation where it has caused such  
22          turmoil in this entire city.

23                         I have a document, a paper that  
24          was -- an article that was in the  
25          newspaper that was done by Attorney

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2           Michael Coard who spoke here a few  
3           minutes ago, who talked about the  
4           devastation. I'd like to make sure  
5           everybody get a copy of it --

6                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We  
7           just want to make sure --

8                        MS. AFRICA: -- so they know  
9           what it is we're talking about.

10                      And when he said that he would  
11           not rescind this street despite the fact  
12           that the community stood up, Osage Avenue  
13           who suffered, my family who suffered, and  
14           the people within the area that he's  
15           putting the street at is suffering now.  
16           And, you know, he should not have the  
17           right to do that, and what he said is  
18           that he do have the right to put a sign  
19           up in somebody's neighborhood without  
20           contacting the people to find out how do  
21           you feel about this and, you know, how do  
22           we feel about this. You murdered my  
23           children. You murdered our family. How  
24           do --

25                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.

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2 Africa.

3 MS. AFRICA: The time is up?

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Just --

6 MS. AFRICA: Let me say what I  
7 want, right?

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just  
9 give me some conclusion.

10 MS. AFRICA: Number one, I want  
11 that street rescinded and, you know, and  
12 then I think in all fairness, because no  
13 due process was done here whatsoever,  
14 there need to be a City Council hearing  
15 dealing with the naming of that street.  
16 The Osage neighbors should be here. We  
17 should be here.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19 Ma'am, come on. If you could just --

20 MS. AFRICA: That's what we  
21 want.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
23 Because we got a lot of people that want  
24 to speak on this issue.

25 Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

3 MS. GAILLIARD: Hello. My name  
4 is Milele Gailliard and I actually am a  
5 representative directly pertaining to the  
6 Overbrook Farms Association as well as  
7 the Wynnefield Residents Association, and  
8 so this is also in accordance with the  
9 introduction by Curtis Jones regarding  
10 170675. And so I want everyone here to  
11 know, especially you, that I personally  
12 took the time to walk the streets and I  
13 communicated with 18 blocks worth of  
14 residents directly affecting where the  
15 Wilson Goode Way would take place of the  
16 name changing. Not one person that I  
17 communicated with, just as recently as  
18 this Saturday and also going back to just  
19 yesterday, were aware of it, and no one  
20 had any communication to talk with them.

21 So what I need is for this to  
22 be immediately opposed when it even comes  
23 to a communication of zoning and mapping,  
24 because there is a lack of transparency  
25 with you and our community in relation to

2           how things are changing. We get the  
3           feel-good things. We know when Villanova  
4           helps to keep up our blocks. We know  
5           about the school giveaways and things of  
6           that nature, but it seems as if when it  
7           comes to the serious things that  
8           pertaining to, you know -- are you being  
9           confused and have something to do with  
10          maybe spot zoning, where it's like an  
11          immediate need for someone in the  
12          community have something changed  
13          personally with their actual residency.

14                    I also communicated with St.  
15          Joe's University, their public relations  
16          and community outreach. They too did not  
17          know. And the reason why I communicated  
18          with them is because I learned from  
19          reading on social media that potentially  
20          people will be in my neighborhood one  
21          block away from where I live and  
22          protesting, and there's students around  
23          there.

24                    I am an educator. I actually  
25          have students who attend St. Joseph's

2           University. I said they need to have an  
3           alert.

4                        So there literally is an  
5           alerting situation right now where things  
6           need to be halted immediately, because  
7           the Wynnefield Residents Association, who  
8           I also spoke with, their leadership, and  
9           Overbrook Farms, neither of them were  
10          made aware, not until I took the time out  
11          and additional people in my community  
12          block, my -- Jewish neighbors, they  
13          coming up to me on Yom Kippur yesterday  
14          asking me why is this happening. I'm  
15          going down my block, Channel 10 is asking  
16          me what's going on.

17                      So, therefore, there needs to  
18          be a little bit more outreach on your  
19          behalf outside of this room in relation  
20          to this. So, yes, you did come last  
21          night to Penn Memorial Church to talk  
22          with us. However, you lied. You said  
23          right then and there when one of our  
24          residents asked you is there some zoning  
25          getting ready to take place, is there

2           anything getting ready to transpire with  
3           changing the streets or anything of that  
4           nature, you gave us a look and you said  
5           no.

6                        So if there's anyone else who  
7           can attest to what I heard yesterday  
8           evening, I need you all to stand up.

9                        (Some audience members  
10          standing.)

11                      MS. GAILLIARD: So, therefore,  
12          like I said, I live on the block  
13          immediately that is going to be next door  
14          to what's happening with this name  
15          change, and this is what made me  
16          investigate further. So this is why I'm  
17          here today.

18                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19          Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

20                      (Applause.)

21                      MS. BIRCHETT: My name is Ruth  
22          Birchett. I'm here to speak on Council  
23          Bill 180100 in opposition to Temple  
24          University building an Alpha Center at  
25          1301 Diamond Street. I'm addressing

2           today Councilmembers, some of whom are  
3           saying they have not heard about this  
4           until last week at all.

5                         This bill was voted out of the  
6           Rules Committee. It also -- Council  
7           rules were suspended on June 14th to  
8           allow for it to come now directly to a  
9           vote. On June 14th also, our  
10          Councilmember, Darrell Clarke, in holding  
11          this bill sent his staff throughout the  
12          audience to all of us who were signed up  
13          to testify, saying that if we would not  
14          testify, he would also hold a community  
15          meeting. That has not happened. And I  
16          say to you that last week on the  
17          testimony of Greg Bonaparte, who  
18          testified in behalf of Berean  
19          Presbyterian Church, also happens to be a  
20          25-year employee of Temple University.  
21          Mr. Ali, who testified as well for the  
22          gang association, also happens to be a  
23          30-year employee of Temple University.  
24          And then the young lady from the  
25          Philadelphia Housing Authority who

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2 testified, in my view, brings  
3 irrelevance, because if indeed Temple  
4 University and the Housing Authority want  
5 to do something in collaboration around  
6 an early learning center and want to have  
7 their children experimented on and early  
8 diagnosed with psychology, its different  
9 psychological conditions, then let them  
10 have that to themselves, but not the  
11 children of our community. We do not  
12 need early diagnosis, as we stated  
13 before.

14 Temple University was an EMO  
15 for five community schools, and after  
16 five years of sucking up the money, they  
17 did not turn those schools around, and  
18 now they're coming after our little  
19 babies, and we say no. No to the  
20 psychology students at Temple University  
21 and the education students at Temple  
22 University getting their Ph.D.'s and  
23 Master's on the backs of our children.

24 No, they will not attend the  
25 psychology clinic. What elementary

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2 school or what day care center in this  
3 city has a psychology clinic attached to  
4 it? Probably none.

5 We say no.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

8 (Applause.)

9 MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
11 afternoon.

12 MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon.

13 My name is Jacqueline Wiggins. I am here  
14 to talk about Bill 180100. It has been  
15 held again. How long can this be held?  
16 The things that the former speaker, Ruth  
17 Birchett, mentioned are real.

18 And we also had discussion  
19 about the Special Committee on 400 Years  
20 of African American History. I think the  
21 thing that folks need to understand is  
22 that when African people came into the  
23 Americas, they came with skills, with  
24 trades. They came with things. And to  
25 have an outcome from a university, Temple

2           University, to have an outcome in North  
3           Central Philadelphia with Dunbar, after  
4           five years Dunbar, reading scores 18  
5           percent, math 17 percent; Tanner Duckrey,  
6           reading 25 percent, math 32 percent;  
7           Elverson, Ferguson, John Wanamaker. This  
8           is criminal, and now Temple University  
9           wants our three- to five-year-olds.

10                   I should hope that with this  
11           delay, Councilmembers, that you are  
12           digging deep and doing the research that  
13           is called for with respect to no vote on  
14           180100. Our children and our families do  
15           not need to be researched any further.

16                   Tuskegee was mentioned last  
17           week, Henrietta Lacks. What must we do  
18           to have you understand clearly? This is  
19           a wrong.

20                   Councilmembers, reach deep. Do  
21           your homework. Do the research and vote  
22           no, 180100.

23                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24           Thank you for your testimony.

25                   (Applause.)

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2 MS. PARKER: Hello. My name is  
3 Bianca Parker and I'm a resident, and I  
4 want to say no and urge my Councilmembers  
5 to reject and do not allow the passage of  
6 Bill No. 180100, which will authorize the  
7 furtherance of predatory encroachment of  
8 Temple University's campus footprint,  
9 extend SP-IN district, building of a  
10 research facility, and expansion of  
11 Temple police surveillance and subject  
12 our African American children to racial  
13 experiments.

14 Camera surveillance is a common  
15 research method utilized in studies.  
16 Just as the Tuskegee experiments  
17 exploited African Americans for scholarly  
18 and scientific gain, Temple University  
19 plans the Alpha Center for research of  
20 African American North Philadelphia  
21 preschool children. The plan also  
22 competes with existing area day cares.

23 Temple failed four schools  
24 during five years of the School District  
25 funding contract. Young African American

1           9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           children will be subject to mental health  
3           treatment and study as staff, ungraded,  
4           Temple University students will be  
5           treatment providers at the psychology  
6           clinic. Patients of Temple University  
7           psychology clinic will be subject to  
8           research studies.

9                     Temple must abandon plans for  
10           Alpha Center to expand campus. Temple  
11           must abandon plans to subject African  
12           American children and African American  
13           adults to research studies, and Temple  
14           must abandon plans for dental clinic that  
15           already exists.

16                     I'm going to voice my  
17           opposition to this travesty. I'm going  
18           to speak up and out against Temple. And  
19           I urge my Councilmembers to vote no to  
20           early learning research and mental health  
21           labeling of African American  
22           preschool-age children in North  
23           Philadelphia and urge my Councilmembers  
24           to vote no to Bill No. 180100.

25                     Thank you.

2                   (Applause.)

3           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4   Thank you for your testimony.

5                   MS. PEEBLES: Good morning,  
6   City Council, City Council President  
7   Darrell Clarke, who is our District  
8   Councilman. My name is Paula Peebles and  
9   I'm here today asking City Council and  
10   I'm hoping everybody is paying attention,  
11   because right now in the country they're  
12   talking about a blue wave in November,  
13   and in Philadelphia we're talking about a  
14   people's wave next year. And while we're  
15   talking about that, because all too often  
16   we come here to City Council about our  
17   community. As I indicated, I am an  
18   indigenous member of North Philadelphia.  
19   That means I was born and bred. And  
20   since I could remember, we have always  
21   had to fight -- and you know this,  
22   Mr. Clarke -- had to fight Temple  
23   University from encroaching on our  
24   community.

25                   Here we find ourselves now

2           having to protect our small children, our  
3           toddlers, and those yet unborn from being  
4           subjected to a research facility right  
5           there in the heart of North Philadelphia  
6           at 13th and Diamond.

7                         We keep coming here every week  
8           appealing to Council. Darrell Clarke has  
9           one vote. We're appealing to all the  
10          rest of you. You vote no against this.  
11          You talk about children, Norris Homes  
12          doesn't even exist now. I know they're  
13          going to say, oh, Paula, we're rebuilding  
14          Norris Home. But when they rebuilt  
15          public housing in North Philadelphia, it  
16          is depopulized, which means if it was 800  
17          people in Norris Home, when they build  
18          back in favor of Temple, there are 300  
19          families. That's what they're doing in  
20          our community.

21                        And so we are appealing to  
22          Council, and you're hearing it firsthand  
23          from Paula. I'm appealing on behalf of  
24          my people in North Philadelphia to  
25          rescind or vote down Bill 180100, because

2           it will totally decimate the young  
3           children coming up in North Philadelphia.  
4           We could use that land better. And as I  
5           often tell Councilman Darrell Clarke's  
6           staff, we need housing, affordable  
7           housing, in North Philadelphia. We don't  
8           need them to continue --

9                           (Applause.)

10                          MS. PEEBLES: -- to build  
11           apartment buildings.

12                          They have closed out Freedom  
13           Theatre. My young daughter who lives in  
14           Los Angeles graduated from Freedom  
15           Theatre, but my 14-year-old grandson  
16           can't go to Freedom Theatre, because no  
17           longer exists.

18                          So they're pushing us out.  
19           They're pushing our culture out, Darrell.  
20           And what I'm saying to you -- President  
21           Clarke. And what I'm saying to you is  
22           that we can't stand for this any longer.  
23           And don't get mad at us, because November  
24           7th starts next year's election. Don't  
25           get mad at us when we oppose you, because

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2 you've opposed us for four years.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 Good afternoon.

7 MR. JONES: My name is Arnold  
8 Jones and I'm speaking on behalf of Bill  
9 170765 in reference to the street naming  
10 for Wilson Goode.

11 The opening prayer mentioned  
12 praying for children. So I just want to  
13 mention five children: 7-year-old  
14 Tomasa, 9-year-old Delitia, 10-year-old  
15 Phil, 11-year-old Netta, 13-year-old  
16 Tree, and 25-year-old Rhonda. Those  
17 names might not ring a bell to everybody,  
18 but they were five of the victims of the  
19 MOVE bombing.

20 So my thing is, at this time  
21 when this occurred, I was 16 years old.  
22 I lived on 54th and Locust. My mother  
23 was flustered, frustrated, frightened.  
24 She didn't know what was going on. It  
25 took me almost 20 years to realize

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2 actually what happened.

3 So my thing is, with all the  
4 hard work that every one of you have to  
5 do, there's one thing we have to remember  
6 as men, as fathers, as African men, as  
7 black men, we must protect our children.  
8 We must stand for justice.

9 (Applause.)

10 MR. JONES: There's no way that  
11 anyone could possibly believe that the  
12 street should be -- any street should be  
13 named after Wilson Goode, because the  
14 reality is he was the Mayor, he was in  
15 control, and he was complicit in that  
16 crime. Those murders rest on the hands  
17 of the City of Philadelphia. We cannot  
18 have that happen.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 (Applause.)

23 MR. McCLURE: Good afternoon,  
24 Council President, members of City  
25 Council. My name is Matt McClure. I'm

2           here today as a resident. I'm a zoning  
3           attorney, but I'm here to give comment on  
4           Bill No. 180295 introduced by  
5           Councilwoman Bass as well as Bill No.  
6           180498 introduced by Councilwoman  
7           Blackwell. I'm here on behalf of the BIA  
8           and as a resident.

9                         Both pieces of legislation are  
10           very important and well intentioned.  
11           However, we have fears that there's going  
12           to be significant unintended consequences  
13           from both pieces of legislation.

14                         Bill No. 180295 makes many  
15           important changes to some highly  
16           technical provisions dealing with the  
17           Zoning Board of Adjustment, specifically  
18           changes to the One Year Rule. However,  
19           these changes to the One Year Rule we  
20           believe could frustrate developers'  
21           efforts to practically negotiate with  
22           RCOs and instead force them to hearings  
23           and contested hearings rather than to  
24           negotiate because of fear of the  
25           implication of the One Year Rule.

1           9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   There are also other important  
3 timing requirements in this legislation  
4 that are impossible for an applicant  
5 really to comply with, given the limited  
6 resources of the Zoning Board of  
7 Adjustment.

8                   Regarding Bill No. 180498-A,  
9 this bill makes again some highly  
10 technical changes to the Zoning Board's  
11 ability to grant minor adjustments called  
12 administrative adjustments that take  
13 place many times a year or two after the  
14 actual zoning approval to deal with some  
15 technical changes that you find out from  
16 site conditions. Again, these changes  
17 sometimes happen close to the building  
18 permit phase and after financing actually  
19 has been secured for a project.

20                   We think the unintended  
21 consequence will be -- a lot of needless  
22 cases are going to go to the Zoning Board  
23 and also will really frustrate the  
24 building for projects to go forward at  
25 the last minute, even for some very minor

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2 tech changes.

3 So on behalf of the BIA and  
4 members of the zoning community, we ask  
5 that the legislation be held and amended  
6 following meetings with a working group  
7 of zoning attorneys, community members,  
8 and City officials. This is important  
9 legislation. It's important to get it  
10 right, and we have plenty of people who  
11 are willing to work to make sure this  
12 legislation gets done right.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 MR. GRIGOS: Good afternoon.

17 My name is Hercules Grigos. I'm a zoning  
18 attorney in Philadelphia. I'm here to  
19 speak on Bills No. 180295 and 180498.  
20 While I'm usually here in my capacity  
21 representing a client, I come here today  
22 to respectfully request that these bills  
23 be held for additional comment.

24 With regard to Councilwoman  
25 Blackwell's bill regarding the

2           administrative review process, I agree  
3           that the process is vague and needs to be  
4           better articulated with clear standards.  
5           However, the proposed timeframe does not  
6           allow enough time for architects,  
7           engineers, and City departments to review  
8           the fully designed building plans, which  
9           are much more detailed than the zoning  
10          schematics that go before the ZBA and  
11          RCOs.

12                        As currently written, this bill  
13          will create situations where necessary  
14          minor changes that come out of the  
15          building code, Streets Department, and  
16          Water Department review cannot be  
17          implemented without restarting the  
18          process and having the full RCO and ZBA  
19          process to widen a driveway, add a stair  
20          tower or reduce a unit. I think the City  
21          developers and the community would  
22          benefit from additional discussion to  
23          narrowly tailor these bills -- this bill  
24          and address only those minor changes.

25                        I thank you for your time.



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2 I'll make myself available to you and  
3 your staff to continue the discussion.

4 With regard to Councilwoman  
5 Bass's bill regarding the One Year Rule,  
6 I also think that this has unintended  
7 consequences. I think the City and  
8 developers would benefit from additional  
9 discussion on this bill. And I believe  
10 that anything that we can do to continue  
11 collaboration between developers,  
12 communities, and RCOs I think we can work  
13 on that, and I'd like to offer my time to  
14 work with Council on that.

15 So thank you very much for your  
16 time.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 MS. HAYBURN: Good afternoon.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
21 afternoon.

22 MS. HAYBURN: My name is  
23 Christa Hayburn, and I want to thank you  
24 for the opportunity to speak on behalf of  
25 WOAR, Women Organized Against Rape, today

1           9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           regarding the proposed resolution of  
3           180768 by Councilmember Johnson  
4           reauthorizing the Violence Against Women  
5           Act here in Philadelphia.

6                       Over the last year, the Me Too  
7           movement has created a platform for  
8           victims and survivors of sexual violence  
9           and opportunity to be heard. It has  
10          opened the door for victims and survivors  
11          like myself to feel safe to come forward  
12          and tell someone that they have been  
13          sexually victimized.

14                      The Violence Against Women Act  
15          provides people who have experienced  
16          sexual violence and those who have not a  
17          lifeline to receive comprehensive and  
18          preventative sexual assault services from  
19          organizations like WOAR.

20                      Supporting Councilmember  
21          Johnson's resolution today will  
22          reauthorize the VAWA, which is critical  
23          in protecting our community from harm,  
24          helping victims to access the help, hope,  
25          and healing they need and deserve.

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2 Why should you all support  
3 Councilmember Johnson's resolution today?  
4 The Violence Against Women Act saves  
5 lives, money, and benefits the residents  
6 of Philadelphia. Statistics show one in  
7 five women and one in 71 men will be  
8 raped at some point in their lives. In  
9 the U.S. alone, one in three women and  
10 one in six men have experienced some form  
11 of sexual violence.

12 The lifetime cost of rape per  
13 victim costs \$122,461. Annually rape  
14 costs the U.S. more than any other crime  
15 at a staggering \$127 billion in both  
16 tangible, which includes medical care,  
17 criminal justice, lost wages, and  
18 treatment, as well as intangible, pain  
19 and suffering.

20 Eighty-one percent of women and  
21 35 percent of men report significant  
22 short-term and long-term impacts such as  
23 post-traumatic stress as well as  
24 healthcare, and the statistics go on.  
25 But what I want to share is this: Rape

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2           continues to be the most underreported  
3           crime here in Philadelphia.

4                       By supporting this bill and  
5           reauthorizing the Violence Against Women  
6           Act, we together as a community can  
7           continue to fund prevention strategies  
8           that will help teach people how to  
9           respond to sexual violence from occurring  
10          in the first place, preventing harm to  
11          our children, families, and loved ones.  
12          By not supporting it, today's resolution,  
13          all of the momentum that we gained in the  
14          last year will be lost. Let's keep up  
15          the momentum, moving forward together as  
16          a community and support Councilmember  
17          Johnson's reauthorization.

18                       Thank you.

19                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20          Thank you for your testimony.

21                       (Applause.)

22                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
23          Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

24                       COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
25          Mr. President. I just wanted to

2           acknowledge for the record that 180295 is  
3           being held as we are working out some  
4           additional details to try to reach some  
5           compromise on that bill. So I just  
6           wanted to --

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
8           Those were the bills that were just  
9           referenced by the two prior speakers?

10                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Yes. About  
11           the prior speakers, yes.

12                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13           Thank you, Councilwoman.

14                   MS. CALHOUN: Good afternoon.  
15           My name is Aminata Sandra Calhoun. I am  
16           here to address Bill 170675 in reference  
17           to Councilman Curtis Jones, Jr.

18                   I want to speak to you in this  
19           way: This bill is not just political.  
20           It's a human matter. And the reason it's  
21           a human matter, because you made it a  
22           human matter when you expressed -- when  
23           we asked you could you rescind and when  
24           you said you could not -- that you could  
25           rescind. You could rescind, but you

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2 won't, this is where it's a human matter.

3 When you took the position to  
4 highly disrespect your constituents,  
5 which was human, when they spoke out to  
6 you and said, no, this is not what we  
7 want, well, you made it a human matter,  
8 showing high disrespect, disregard. And  
9 for that, you are done, Councilman Curtis  
10 Jones. You are done. And as you express  
11 that Goode is your mentor, well, upon you  
12 being done, then you can go work for W.  
13 Wilson Goode.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
18 afternoon.

19 MS. EL MEKKI: Good afternoon.

20 My name is Aisha K. El Mekki. I came to  
21 speak about the same issue. I'm  
22 seriously disappointed that City Council  
23 signed the resolution introduced by  
24 Councilman Curtis Jones to add former  
25 Mayor Wilson Goode's name to the 2400

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2 block of North 59th Street.

3 Mr. Goode admits that it was a  
4 horrible mistake. We all make mistakes,  
5 but as moral individuals, we have to try  
6 to correct them. In my opinion, he needs  
7 to try to seek forgiveness. He needs to  
8 seek redemption. Mr. Goode should be  
9 working every day to do whatever he can  
10 to attempt to right that wrong. No, he  
11 can't bring the people back, of course.  
12 He can't really undo that horror, but he  
13 can and should work to alleviate some of  
14 the trauma that has been -- that the MOVE  
15 family has suffered. Instead of saying  
16 if they come to me I'll help them, he  
17 should be asking them what can I do.

18 In my humble opinion, he could  
19 work to have the innocent members of  
20 their family released from prison where  
21 they've been for the last 40 years.  
22 We're supposed to build a city, not bomb  
23 it.

24 We see signs all over the  
25 place, says see something, say something.

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2 I'm saying something.

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. EL MEKKI: There will be a  
5 demonstration tomorrow when this addition  
6 is added to the street at 10:00 a.m. at  
7 the 2400 block of North 59th Street. I  
8 hope you will join us.

9 Thank you for your time.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. STUTMAN: Good afternoon.

14 My name is Christine Stutman. I'm the  
15 Executive Director of Lutheran Settlement  
16 House. Thank you for the opportunity to  
17 speak to you today about how the Violence  
18 Against Women Act helps to support  
19 victims and survivors of domestic  
20 violence, as well as prevention efforts  
21 to make sure this type of violence in our  
22 community ends. I would like to  
23 recognize City Council's continued  
24 support of Lutheran Settlement House and  
25 our sister agencies who are here today



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2           and the work that we are all doing to  
3           prevent domestic violence and to support  
4           those who have experienced it.

5                       Every person deserves to live  
6           without violence, and VAWA helps ensure  
7           we have the vital resources needed to  
8           make this work possible. Thank you,  
9           Councilman Johnson, for introducing this  
10          resolution.

11                      In light of the recent tragic  
12          loss of Linda Rios-Neuby, we can all feel  
13          how detrimental domestic violence is to  
14          our community and even to our own mental  
15          health and well-being as bystanders.  
16          VAWA helps fund counseling and support  
17          services like we provide at Lutheran  
18          Settlement House to support survivors and  
19          also their family members. Despite this,  
20          Congress only approved VAWA until  
21          December 2018. This is unacceptable and  
22          reflects a gross oversight of just how  
23          big an impact violence has on all of us.

24                      I am grateful that those of us  
25          in this room all share the same sense of

1           9/20/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           urgency in reauthorizing VAWA and hope  
3           our joint advocacy will help others  
4           recognize the gravity of this issue as  
5           well. I hope we will push for at least a  
6           five-year authorization period so that  
7           there is security and stability in our  
8           services.

9                        Before I finish, I would like  
10           to extend a special thank you to Council  
11           President Clarke and to Councilman  
12           Greenlee for their support and  
13           involvement in our Men Can initiatives  
14           over the years. Men Can encourages men  
15           to join efforts in speaking out to  
16           prevent and eliminate domestic violence.  
17           Your leadership has been invaluable, and  
18           on behalf of all of us at Lutheran  
19           Settlement House, I thank you both for  
20           your work with LSH.

21                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22           Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

23                        (Applause.)

24                        MS. LISITSKI: Good afternoon.

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

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2 afternoon.

3 MS. LISITSKI: I'm Jeannine  
4 Lisitski, the Executive Director at Women  
5 Against Abuse, and I'm pleased to be here  
6 today in support of Councilman Johnson's  
7 resolution to reauthorize the Violence  
8 Against Women Act. And I also want to  
9 thank all of the members, because we in  
10 Philadelphia are fortunate that we have a  
11 City Council that stands behind fighting  
12 towards ending domestic violence in our  
13 city. All of you have been incredibly  
14 supportive.

15 The Violence Against Women Act,  
16 which was enacted in 1994, is the  
17 landmark legislation that creates funding  
18 for life-saving services for victims of  
19 DV, and it puts essential protections in  
20 place. In fact, it was the first U.S.  
21 federal legislation acknowledging  
22 domestic violence as a crime, and it  
23 provided federal resources to encourage  
24 coordinated community responses to  
25 combatting this violence.

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2 Its reauthorizations which took  
3 place in 2000, 2005, and 2013 have  
4 enhanced the legislation by creating a  
5 much-needed legal assistance program, by  
6 expanding the definition of crime to  
7 include sexual assault, dating violence,  
8 and stalking. The bill was also  
9 strengthened to include new focus areas  
10 such as prevention, rape crisis centers,  
11 and culturally specific services.

12 Through the years, the  
13 reauthorizations have built a much more  
14 holistic approach to addressing these  
15 crimes by creating new programs to meet  
16 emerging needs of communities, working to  
17 ensure protections for some of the most  
18 vulnerable, including indigenous women,  
19 immigrant victims, LGBTQ plus victims,  
20 college students, and even public housing  
21 residents.

22 Other important examples of the  
23 protections available through VAWA  
24 include prevention of unjust evictions  
25 for survivors in federally subsidized

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2 housing by creating an emergency housing  
3 transfer option so that no victim has to  
4 choose between having a home and being  
5 safe; also a provision of a process for  
6 immigrant victims to apply for new visas  
7 so that they're not forced to stay with  
8 an abusive partner out of fear of being  
9 deported or being separated from their  
10 U.S.-born children.

11 In addition to these crucial  
12 protections, VAWA also provides grants  
13 administered through Department of  
14 Justice Office of Violence Against Women.  
15 And just to summarize, we've gotten  
16 millions and millions of dollars here in  
17 Philadelphia through those grants to  
18 really make a difference and start  
19 preventing domestic violence.

20 There's many other ways that  
21 VAWA has helped us, but just in closing,  
22 I would say that the latest bill makes  
23 modest enhancements based on the needs of  
24 victims, specifically investing in  
25 evidence-based prevention, protecting

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2 victims and communities from abusers with  
3 access to firearms.

4 I won't go on, because I'm out  
5 of time.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. Thank you very much for your  
8 testimony.

9 MS. LISITSKI: Thank you very  
10 much.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your work.

13 This is our last speaker today.

14 MS. WILSON: Yes. Good  
15 afternoon. My name is Katherine Miller  
16 Wilson. I'm the Executive Director of  
17 HIAS Pennsylvania, an immigration refugee  
18 resettlement agency and a partner of  
19 Women Organized Against Rape and Women  
20 Against Abuse and many of the other folks  
21 that testified today. And I just want to  
22 highlight their remarks and support  
23 Councilman Johnson's resolution in  
24 support of the Violence Against Women  
25 Act.

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2                   Immigrant victims of domestic  
3 violence unfortunately are numerous. Our  
4 office serves more than 150 immigrant  
5 victims per year. VAWA most particularly  
6 offers to immigrant women the ability to  
7 self-petition for status, which is  
8 critically important for their safety.  
9 In most cases when a person is married,  
10 their husband petitions for immigrant  
11 status on their behalf. In the case of a  
12 battered spouse, their husband holds that  
13 against their head and says, I will not  
14 petition for you and I will take your  
15 children and you'll never see them again  
16 unless you do what I say.

17                   So this is a critically  
18 important remedy, and I'm here to  
19 represent that we serve many, many, many  
20 immigrant victims of domestic violence,  
21 and this is a critically important bill.  
22 So thank you very much, and thank you for  
23 your time.

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25           Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

9           to recognize that our first speaker  
10          raised the issue of Puerto Rico, and I  
11          appreciate her concern. I just wanted to  
12          let everyone know that Councilwoman Maria  
13          Quinones-Sanchez has been a leader in  
14          helping Puerto Rico, not only raising  
15          over \$300,000, not only visiting the  
16          island of Puerto Rico numerous times, but

19                   I was at the Concilio's annual  
20          event, and they pointed out that when she

22          would not stay in a hotel. She stayed in

17                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
18                   Mr. President. I just want to remind not  
19                   just this body but the City of

5                   In light of our extremely low  
6                   turnout in the voter participation over  
7                   the past several years, I think our  
8                   Commissioners, led by Chairwoman Lisa  
9                   Deeley and our other Commissioners, have  
10                  done an extraordinary job over the past  
11                  three years, along with this legislative  
12                  body, educating our youth, going in our  
13                  schools, having mock elections, going out  
14                  to events and really trying to change how  
15                  people view what it's like to come out to  
16                  vote, whether they're voting for a super  
17                  hero in the booths or they're voting for  
18                  someone that they write in, just  
19                  encouraging people that it is something  
20                  that our country fought for and has been  
21                  our right to vote and we should exercise  
22                  that right to vote.

23                  Unfortunately, when you have a  
24                  spike in elections, depending upon the  
25                  election and midterms, they vary off

3 presidential elections, we can be as  
4 upward as 60 percent, but the baseline is  
5 really around 17 percent. And I want to  
6 thank our Commissioners here in the City

8 working with outreach programs with each  
9 and every member of this body, raising  
10 light to encouraging people to increase  
11 turnout, increase participation on issues  
12 that are important for you, whether it's  
13 affordable housing, whether it's some of

16 Councilwoman Blackwell recognizing the

12                  COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,

14 couple announcements.

15                  One, immediately following the

8                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
9                   Domb.

10                  COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
11                  Council President. The unfunded pension  
12                  liability is the most serious fiscal  
13                  challenge to confront us as a city. At  
14                  present, the City has an unfunded pension  
15                  liability of approximately 6.1 billion,  
16                  excluding other post-employment benefits  
17                  like medical coverage, which would  
18                  increase the total unfunded liability to  
19                  more than \$8 billion.

20                  Since 1999, the City has  
21                  incurred an estimated cost of  
22                  approximately 237 million from  
23                  distributing DROP. Overall the City has  
24                  awarded more than 1.5 billion to  
25                  municipal employees enrolled in the

2                   program.

3                   The legislation I introduced  
4                   today would amend the eligibility clause  
5                   for enrollment in DROP. Going forward as  
6                   of January 1st of 2019, this legislation  
7                   would not allow future exempt and  
8                   non-union represented employees, either  
9                   hired or appointed, to participate in  
10                  DROP. To be clear, the legislation does  
11                  not modify eligibility for any current  
12                  employees and will not alter ratified  
13                  collective bargaining agreements.

14                  As our largest financial  
15                  obligation, we need reforms that will  
16                  improve the overall pension system, and  
17                  the collective goal here is to protect  
18                  everyone's financial interest, pension  
19                  earners, taxpayers, and the City of  
20                  Philadelphia's future.

21                  Thank you.

22                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23                  Thank you, Councilman.

24                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
25                  Johnson.
