4 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those  
5 inspiring words.

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much.

10 And our next order of business  
11 is the approval of the Journal of the  
12 meeting of Thursday, September 20th,  
13 2018, and the Chair recognizes Councilman  
14 Greenlee.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
16 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
17 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,  
18 September 20th, 2018 be approved.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. It has been moved and  
22 properly seconded that the Journal of the  
23 meeting of Thursday, September 20th, 2018  
24 stand approved.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4           Those opposed?

5                   (No response.)

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7           ayes have it, and the Journal is  
8           approved.

9                   The next order of business is  
10          requests for leaves of absence, and the  
11          Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

12                  COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
13          you, Mr. President. On behalf of the  
14          majority, a leave of absence is requested  
15          for Councilwoman Gym and Councilman  
16          Henon.

17                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
18          Chair thanks the gentleman. Leave shall  
19          be granted.

20                  The Chair now recognizes  
21          Councilman Oh.

22                  COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
23          much, Council President. On behalf of  
24          the minority, there are no requests for  
25          leaves of absence.

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2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
3 Chair thanks the gentleman.

4                   At this time, I will take a  
5 moment to thank everyone for taking time  
6 out of their busy day to come down to  
7 witness their government in action. We  
8 hope your stay here today is a  
9 knowledgeable one but, more importantly,  
10 a pleasurable one, so much so that you  
11 come back again. So, again, thank you so  
12 much for being here today.

13                   At this time, the Chair  
14 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger, who  
15 will present a resolution recognizing 2nd  
16 Lieutenant John Edward James, Jr. and the  
17 Museum of the American Revolution.

18                   Would the 2nd Lieutenant John  
19 Edward James, Jr. and those accompanying  
20 him please join the Councilman at the  
21 podium.

22                   (Councilmembers and guests  
23 approached podium.)

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
25 joining Councilman Taubenberger, we have

7                           COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

8           Mr. President, thank you very much.

9                           As a City Councilman, I get to  
10           see a lot of things and get to meet a lot  
11           of people, but nothing has moved me so  
12           much as what I witnessed over the summer  
13           in Lieutenant James, Jr. becoming a 2nd  
14           Lieutenant. This is a wrong that was  
15           righted, but it took about 75 years.

16                          The Army was segregated. Most  
17           everyone knows that. That was wrong.  
18           Today it is a diverse group that is the  
19           pride of this country, showing every  
20           aspect and every ethnicity that the  
21           United States has, because what collects  
22           us as Americans is not a race, a group or  
23           religion or anything like that. It's an  
24           idea for freedom, and Lieutenant James  
25           serves that.

2                   It also motivated me because it  
3 was the last act of World War II that you  
4 could possibly see, someone getting a  
5 promotion 75 years that they should have  
6 gotten it before. What also motivates  
7 me, and people know that I like history,  
8 my ancestors, my mom and dad, come from  
9 Germany. Lieutenant James and people  
10 like him, men and women, brave men and  
11 women, liberated my ancestral homeland.  
12 Today Germany stands as a great  
13 democracy, allied with other democracies  
14 working out the problems of the world.  
15 And what is very interesting -- this is  
16 very ironic, and I'm a little off script,  
17 but maybe it's the Lord working. We have  
18 a group of students from Frankfurt,  
19 Germany here today, because Frankfurt,  
20 Germany is our sister city, and I would  
21 like to ask those students to stand and  
22 be recognized as well, because this fits  
23 in very well.

24                   (Applause.)

25                   (Councilman talking in German.)

2 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

3 You're here in historic times, because  
4 what you're about to see and see a man be  
5 honored who helped liberate it, bringing  
6 a democracy to Germany, and because of  
7 that democracy, we have a great  
8 relationship between Philadelphia and  
9 Frankfurt.

10 A resolution honoring and  
11 recognizing 2nd Lieutenant John Edward  
12 James, Jr. for his service during World  
13 War II and recognizing the Museum of the  
14 American Revolution, Chairman and acting  
15 CEO General John Jumper for righting the  
16 wrongs of the past and helping to  
17 commission Private John Edward James to  
18 2nd Lieutenant. And as a person, I was  
19 honored to be in that room at that  
20 moment.

21 Whereas, Edward James, Jr. was  
22 born in Johnstown, Pennsylvania;

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
24 Mr. James began serving in the United  
25 States Army at the age of 21 in 1941 as a

2           private, bravely serving in a total of  
3           five overseas campaigns and serving his  
4           country with distinction and grace; and

5                    COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
6           throughout Mr. James' service in the U.S.  
7           Army, he received a total of five war  
8           medals, including a Good Conduct Medal,  
9           American Defense Service Medal, American  
10          Campaign Medal, a World War II Victory  
11          Medal, and a European African Middle  
12          Eastern Campaign Medal; and

13                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, in  
14          1942, Mr. James completed his officer  
15          candidate training at The Infantry School  
16          at Fort Benning, only one of 21 out of  
17          200. Mr. James should have been  
18          commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant and  
19          assigned to the 242nd Quartermasters  
20          Battalion; and

21                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
22          his commission as a 2nd Lieutenant in the  
23          242nd Quartermaster Battalion would have  
24          put him in charge of white officers,  
25          leading to his commission being denied,

2           with Mr. James remaining a private;

3                       COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
4           after his family pursued the issue for  
5           years, the Deputy Assistant Secretary of  
6           the Army official declared that the Army  
7           would approve Mr. James' commission on  
8           March 2018; and

9                       COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
10          to honor this momentous occasion, the  
11          Museum of the American Revolution, with  
12          its Board Chair and Acting CEO General  
13          John Jumper, decided to hold the  
14          commissioning ceremony at the Museum to  
15          celebrate the event and to help right the  
16          wrongs of the past; and

17                      COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
18          Mr. James comes from a family of  
19          patriots. His great-great-great  
20          grandfather served during the American  
21          Revolutionary War as a Sergeant in the  
22          Continental Army and was at the Valley  
23          Forge encampment in 1777 through 1778;  
24          and

25                      COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

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2           Whereas, another relative during the  
3           American Revolutionary War was a farmer,  
4           and provided supplies to the Continental  
5           Army. Lastly, another relative served  
6           during the War of 1812 as the private in  
7           the 2nd Regiment of Ballawe's Virginia  
8           Militia fighting to maintain America's  
9           freedom; and his grandfather served in  
10          the 1st U.S. Colored Infantry during the  
11          Civil War; and

12                    COUNCILMAN OH:   Whereas,  
13           helping to right the wrongs of the past  
14           and honoring our veterans are a few of  
15           the things that we can do as a  
16           legislative body;

17                    COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:   Therefore,  
18           be it resolved, by the Council of the  
19           City of Philadelphia, that it hereby  
20           congratulates 2nd Lieutenant John Edward  
21           James, Jr. for his recent commission and  
22           thanking him for his service during World  
23           War II, as well as thanking General John  
24           Jumper and the Museum of the American  
25           Revolution for hosting the commission.

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2                   COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

3           Further resolved, that an engrossed copy  
4           of this resolution be presented to 2nd  
5           Lieutenant John Edward James, Jr. as a  
6           sincere expression of the Council of the  
7           City of Philadelphia's gratitude,  
8           admiration, and recognition.

9                   Congratulatory.

10                   (Standing ovation.)

11                   DR. LANE: We would like to  
12           extend sincere gratitude to the  
13           Councilman and to this body for this  
14           recognition. My father is very proud to  
15           be an American, because only in this  
16           country can injustice be rectified. Now,  
17           the wheels of God may grind slowly, but  
18           they grind exceedingly fine.

19                   Thank you very much.

20                   (Applause.)

21                   DR. LANE: For those who may  
22           not know, he turned 98 in June.

23                   (Applause.)

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25           Council will be at ease.

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2 (Council at ease. )

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you very much. A true American  
5 hero.

6 At this time, the Chair  
7 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will  
8 present a resolution for Philadelphia  
9 Minority Business Enterprise Week. Would  
10 Iola Harper and those accompanying her  
11 please join the Councilman at the podium.

12 (Councilmembers and guests  
13 approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
15 joining Councilman Jones, we have  
16 Councilman Squilla, Councilman Greenlee,  
17 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman  
18 Parker, Councilman Green, and  
19 Councilwoman Blackwell and Councilwoman  
20 Quinones-Sanchez and Councilman Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Are we all  
22 included? Because that's what it's about  
23 today and during MED Week, being all  
24 included. That's what America should  
25 look like and that's what the Minority

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2           Enterprise Development Week tries to  
3           emphasize and ensure.

4                        I want to thank Iola Harper,  
5           Deputy Commerce Director leading the  
6           Office of Economic Opportunity, Alice  
7           Dungee-James and her staff for keeping  
8           the torch of MED Week alive for 34 years.  
9           That's a clap.

10                       (Applause.)

11                       COUNCILMAN JONES: I want to  
12           emphasize that this is important at the  
13           federal and at the state and here in  
14           these Chambers at the local level.

15                       At the state level, I'm going  
16           to have to give them their proper,  
17           because in 1955, a survey went out to  
18           small businesses in the Commonwealth of  
19           Pennsylvania, and on that survey it  
20           included a question: Would you hire a  
21           Negro? Surprisingly, that survey came  
22           back overwhelming majority said no. So  
23           in the following year, Pennsylvania Act  
24           in 1955 P.L. 744 created the Human  
25           Relations Commission. It dealt with

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2           housing discrimination and employment  
3           discrimination and now economic  
4           discrimination by way of economic  
5           inclusion.

6                         Here in Philadelphia it was the  
7           late great Lucien Blackwell who put forth  
8           Chapter 17-500 in this body. It was  
9           passed and then signed by Wilson Goode,  
10          who was the Mayor, and put into our law.

11                        I want you to know that the  
12          people you see here continue that legacy,  
13          continue that fight. A guy by the name  
14          of Bilal Qayyum was the first Chairman of  
15          the local MED Week celebration. And you  
16          might think that that would be an easy  
17          thing. You might think that that would  
18          be a no-brainer, but at the time, you're  
19          talking about systems that were put in  
20          place to keep the status quo as it was.

21                        Less than one half of one  
22          percent of Philadelphia's procurement  
23          went to women and minorities. Less than  
24          one half of one percent in a city of the  
25          first class the size of Philadelphia went



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2           to women and minorities, and thus the  
3           struggle started and has continued.

4                     Today we've made great strides,  
5           but we still have a long way to go. You  
6           see, the "no Negros allowed" signs are no  
7           longer there, but "if you can't afford  
8           it, you can't have it" signs still  
9           continue. And by leveling the playing  
10          field, by creating as it was a middle  
11          class and upper middle class that showed  
12          a highway out of extreme poverty and  
13          poverty is the way to make long-lasting  
14          change.

15                    So, therefore, it is  
16          appropriate that we support the National  
17          Minority Business Development Agency  
18          recognizing October 1st through October  
19          5th, 2018 as the Philadelphia Minority  
20          Enterprise Development Week, and provides  
21          critical information, resources, and  
22          opportunities and inspiration to minority  
23          and female businesses in the City of  
24          Philadelphia.

25                    COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,

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2 since 1983, the United States President  
3 has proclaimed a National Minority  
4 Enterprise Development Week observance to  
5 recognize the outstanding achievements of  
6 minority business enterprises, also known  
7 as MBEs, and to honor those corporations  
8 and financial institutions that support  
9 minority business development. Annual  
10 regional conferences and activities are  
11 organized by the United States Department  
12 of Commerce Minority Business Development  
13 Agency in collaboration with the U.S.  
14 Small Business Administration and the  
15 Office of Government Contracting and  
16 Business Development; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

18 Whereas, the MED Week celebration was  
19 started locally, as Councilman Jones  
20 said, in Philadelphia in 1984 to honor  
21 and promote minority-owned businesses in  
22 the Philadelphia area. The organizers of  
23 the first MED Week were Barbara Daniel  
24 Cox, former Director of Mayor Wilson  
25 Goode's Women's Commission, and Bilal

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2           Abdul Qayyum, as he has just said, then  
3           Deputy Director of the City Commerce  
4           Department; and

5                        COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
6           the 34th Anniversary of Philadelphia MED  
7           Week is sponsored by corporations, local  
8           colleges, universities and hospitals,  
9           local and regional government agencies  
10          and organizations that are committed to  
11          supporting opportunities for minority  
12          businesses; including co-chairs: the  
13          African American Chamber of Commerce, the  
14          Asian American Chamber of Commerce of  
15          Greater Philadelphia, Greater  
16          Philadelphia Hispanic Chamber of  
17          Commerce, the City of Philadelphia  
18          Commerce Department, and the MBDA  
19          Business Center of Pennsylvania; and

20                       COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
21          it is during MED Week that the City of  
22          Philadelphia also recognizes the critical  
23          role of OEO Officers in assisting the  
24          departments in meeting their broad  
25          responsibilities for developing policies,

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2           programs, practices and strategies to  
3           achieve its goals regarding M/W/DSBE  
4           participation on City contracts; and

5                        COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
6           small businesses in Philadelphia and  
7           across the country are the cornerstone of  
8           economic growth, creating two-thirds of  
9           the net new jobs in the country and  
10          comprising 50 percent of America's  
11          employment; and

12                      COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
13          the sources of capital, technical  
14          resources, and contracting opportunities  
15          are essential to the development, growth,  
16          and prosperity of minority businesses and  
17          MED Week will host some of the most  
18          prominent contracting organizations and  
19          resource providers that stand for the  
20          success of small businesses in the  
21          community; and

22                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
23          Philadelphia MED Week has grown  
24          exponentially since its inception and  
25          this year includes over 40 sponsors

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2           offering more than 30 workshops,  
3           seminars, and networking opportunities  
4           across the region including: "City of  
5           Philadelphia Open for Business Expo,"  
6           "Minority Venture Capital Forum," "Launch  
7           Your Digital Marketing Strategy," "Doing  
8           Business with the Philadelphia Gas  
9           Company," "Philadelphia Airport 2018  
10          Annual Business Opportunity Forum," and  
11          "Lighting the Torch," and many, many  
12          more; now, therefore, be it

13                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Resolved,  
14           by the Council of the City of  
15           Philadelphia, that it hereby supports the  
16           National Minority Business Development  
17           Agency and recognizes October 1st through  
18           October 5th, 2018 as Philadelphia  
19           Minority Enterprise Development (MED)  
20           Week, which provides critical  
21           information, resources, opportunities,  
22           and inspiration to the minority business  
23           community.

24                   Further resolved, that this  
25           engrossed copy of this resolution be

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2           presented to the Philadelphia MED Week  
3           Committee as evidence of the strong  
4           support and sincere sentiments of this  
5           legislative body.

6                           (Applause.)

7                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you.

9                           And the Chair recognizes Ms.  
10          Harper for remarks.

11                          MS. HARPER: Good morning. I  
12          am thrilled to accept this proclamation  
13          on behalf of all of these people standing  
14          behind me and others who were not able to  
15          make it today. For us, this is a most  
16          wonderful time of year. It is the time  
17          that we celebrate thousands of minority,  
18          women, and disabled-owned firms who power  
19          the economic growth of this city.

20                          This year's theme is Elevate  
21          Equity, with the goal being to  
22          intentionally correct and begin to  
23          balance the flow of economic opportunity  
24          and information to hundreds of diverse  
25          businesses across the City who stand

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2           ready to provide outstanding competitive  
3           goods and services.

4                       The 30-plus events planned for  
5           MED Week have been specifically and  
6           intentionally designed to position  
7           diverse businesses in the City to easily  
8           access decision-makers, opportunities,  
9           and information that are not always  
10          readily accessible. And as you peruse  
11          the program for the week, you will see  
12          that agencies like the School District,  
13          SEPTA, Housing Authority, City Council,  
14          over 17 City departments, U.S. Department  
15          of Transportation, Airport, PIDC, Peirce  
16          College, Temple, Drexel, Penn, CCP, PA  
17          Turnpike Commission, Energy Authority,  
18          and over 20 economic development and  
19          lending agencies across the City have all  
20          stepped up to say that they have  
21          opportunity, information, and resources  
22          for our diverse businesses in the City.

23                       For OEO, every week is Minority  
24          Enterprise Development Week, and I would  
25          like to sincerely thank every staff

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2 member of OEO, many of whom are standing  
3 up here with me today. Every single day  
4 they work on elevating equity, along with  
5 and on behalf of the 2,957 diverse  
6 businesses that have elected to become  
7 part of the OEO registry.

8 I want to thank all of our  
9 event co-chairs and MED Week partners,  
10 because they too help remove barriers and  
11 create opportunities that help  
12 minority-owned firms create jobs,  
13 increase their capacity, and experience  
14 the sustainable growth that will make  
15 them significant contributors to the  
16 economic health of the City.

17 And, finally, I want to thank  
18 the members of City Council for  
19 recognizing the importance of this week.  
20 I invite you all to join us for the  
21 official MED Week kick-off scheduled for  
22 Monday, October 1st, where we will honor  
23 Marla Hamilton, Vice President of PIDC,  
24 as the 2018 OEO Champion and Councilman  
25 Curtis Jones, Jr. as the 2018 Advocate of



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2           the Year. So I hope to see you all with  
3           us next week.

4                     Thank you so much.

5                     (Applause.)

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you.

8                     Council will be at ease.

9                     (Council at ease.)

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you. We have one more  
12           presentation. Thank you very much. At  
13           this time, the Chair recognizes  
14           Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, who will  
15           present a resolution recognizing Le  
16           Chapeau Project.

17                    Would Steve Garguilo and those  
18           accompanying him please join the  
19           Councilwoman at the podium.

20                    (Councilmembers and guests  
21           approached podium.)

22                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
23           joining the Councilwoman, we have  
24           Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman  
25           Johnson, Councilman Oh, and Councilman

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2           Greenlee and Councilman Domb and  
3           Councilwoman Blackwell.

4                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
5           Mr. President.

6                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
7           Councilman Green.

8                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: It's no  
9           secret that I love the arts. I love more  
10          the performing and theatre arts because  
11          of the movement it provides. The fine  
12          arts require you to be able to create  
13          amazing images with your hands. And so  
14          while I can't do anything in the fine  
15          arts category, not anything, I have an  
16          amazing appreciation for those who have  
17          been gifted with the ability to take an  
18          intangible image in their head and reveal  
19          it on canvas for us all to enjoy.

20                        And with that, I am recognizing  
21          Le Chapeau Project and its artists on the  
22          occasion of their one-day art gallery  
23          showcasing international artists and  
24          challenging the negative narrative  
25          surrounding immigrants and individuals

2           from Africa, Asia and the Americas.

3                       Whereas, in January 2018, let's

4           do a rewind, during a conversation in the

5           Oval Office concerning immigration

6           policy, President Trump balked at the

7           prospect of allowing immigrants from some

8           majority non-white nations to enter the

9           United States, allegedly describing them

10          as countries. The White House did not

11          deny the veracity of the reports; and

13          Whereas, the Founders of Le Chapeau

14          Project, currently living in Morocco and

15          Mexico, were among those who listened to

16          the President's comments with dismay.

17          The organization Le Chapeau Project was

18          formally established in 2018 to

19          democratize engagement with art.

20          Curating one-day-only art galleries

21          around the world, Le Chapeau Project

22          showcases contemporary artists from

23          around the globe who would not be

24          presented in typical galleries. After

25          the President's remarks, they chose to

4           countries. Thus, the art exhibit was  
5           conceived, named after President Trump's

8           the exhibit is a one-day art gallery  
9           showcasing artists hailing from at least  
10          15 countries, including Haiti, Mauritius,  
11          Mexico, Morocco, Rwanda and Tunisia, as  
12          well as art from local Philadelphians.  
13          The exhibit will allow audience members  
14          to explore art from countries demeaned by  
15          President Trump like never before. Hear,  
16          hear; and

17                       COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the  
18          art exhibit will be experiential and  
19          feature many different types of media,  
20          including sculpture, paintings,  
21          performances, photography, and video.  
22          One room in the exhibit will be entirely  
23          dedicated to the life and work of  
24          renowned Tunisian documentary  
25          photographer Sophia Baraket, who passed

4           Chapeau Project chose to hold the

9           UNESCO World Heritage City in the United  
10          States. People look to Philadelphia as  
11          representing American values, making the  
12          City the perfect place for the people to  
13          reaffirm that they will not stand for  
14          racism or xenophobia; and

15                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
16          the art exhibit is further made possible  
17          by the generous participation of its  
18          diverse and talented roster of artists,  
19          including -- I will say the first name so  
20          that I don't mess up their last --  
21          Wandulu from Rwanda, Bruno from Uganda,  
22          Ruth from Mexico, Dina from Morocco,  
23          Zaahirah from Mauritius, Amine from  
24          Tunisia, Merieme from Morocco, Mwarv from  
25          Kenya, Salim from Algeria, Lorena from

17           "shitholes" -- I said it -- captivated  
18           the world for a week in January, and it's  
19           absurd to think that someone would  
20           characterize nationalities, entire  
21           countries, entire populations in such a  
22           way. And so of course it was all the  
23           news headlines. It was protests. But  
24           instead of just complaining about it and  
25           making other Facebook posts or meme about

12          And so this is our opportunity to say  
13          hats off to these remarkable artists.

14                        So you heard the diversity of  
15          the countries that these artists come  
16          from. The type of art that's going to be  
17          on display tomorrow includes photography,  
18          painting, sculpture, there's performance  
19          art from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. as well. So  
20          there will be some live dancing and  
21          poetry, all kinds of really great things.  
22          So that will all be on display tomorrow,  
23          Adrienne Theatre, 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

15           because I was poor, because I was on  
16           welfare, that I wasn't going to amount to  
17           nothing. But with my work, I'm trying to  
18           say I'm more now. I'm capable of more  
19           than that. What I'm trying to do with my  
20           work is, I'm going to say that everybody  
21           here is capable of something great,  
22           something amazing, and don't let nobody  
23           tell you anything different from that.

24                    Thank you.

25                    (Applause.)

9 introduced by me, passed by this body.  
10 We stopped Sheriff Sales, and we were  
11 reminded that we had no authority over  
12 the Sheriff's Department. We were  
13 reminded that we had no authority over  
14 the Courts. But we reminded them that we  
15 have authority over their budgets.

16 What we talked about that time  
17 was stopping it for a time because at  
18 that moment, the largest number of  
19 Sheriff Sales in the history of the City  
20 of Philadelphia had occurred. We pumped  
21 the brakes, stopped it, forced advocates,  
22 banks, consumers to sit at the table and,  
23 as a result of it, created the Mortgage  
24 Diversion Program, which since that time  
25 has saved over 12,000 homes. Again --

10 reviewed in concert with tax abatements,  
11 with Sheriff Sales, with deep poverty in  
12 some of these communities where people  
13 are having problems making ends meet. In  
14 addition, things like tangled titles and  
15 other things create barriers for us to  
16 give them assistance.

17 So we need to take a look at  
18 this, and not forever but a look at this,  
19 to see if we can't adjust the dials a  
20 little bit to help citizens, because,  
21 yes, we're in a booming economy, but  
22 progress isn't forward for all people,  
23 and it's time to take a look again with a  
24 moratorium on Sheriff Sales.

8           northeastwardly therefrom.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10          Referred to committee.

11                   CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance  
12          to amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by  
13          changing the zoning designations of  
14          certain areas of land located within an  
15          area bounded by Wharton Street, 11th  
16          Street, Reed Street, and 12th Street.

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
18          Referred to committee.

19                   CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance  
20          authorizing the revision of lines and  
21          grades on a portion of City Plan No. 196  
22          by striking from the City Plan Trenton  
23          Avenue from Clearfield Street to  
24          Allegheny Avenue.

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Referred to committee.

3 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance  
4 amending Section 17-1305 of The  
5 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Compensation  
6 Required to Be Paid to Employees," to  
7 revise the compensation required to be  
8 provided in connection with application  
9 of the Philadelphia 21st Century Minimum  
10 Wage Standard; and amending Section  
11 19-2604 of the Code, entitled "Tax Rates,  
12 Credits, and Alternative Tax  
13 Computation," to make the wage rates  
14 related to the tax credit for new job  
15 creation consistent with Section 17-1305.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
17 the Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
19 Mr. President. And I want to thank a lot  
20 of people for the last bill introduced  
21 here. It's important as we look to move  
22 the needle to end poverty that we  
23 collaborate together and work together.

24 I want to first thank  
25 Councilman Goode for the initial

3           legislation, much appreciated. Also  
4           working with the Administration, the  
5           Mayor's Office, especially Deputy Mayor

9           everybody.

10                    This bill as introduced is an  
11           Administration bill that I'm introducing,  
12           but it's also co-sponsored by Councilman  
13           Johnson, Councilwoman Sanchez, Councilman  
14           Jones, Councilwoman Bass, Councilman  
15           Henon, Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman  
16           Blackwell, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,  
17           Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman Gym,  
18           and Councilman Green. So this just shows  
19           you what could happen when people do work  
20           together.

21                    We appreciate everyone's  
22           support and, again, thanking POWER for  
23           their diligence in making this come  
24           forward.

25                    Thank you very much.

9                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
10                  you, Mr. President. The Committee on  
11                  Appropriations reports three bills with a  
12                  favorable recommendation.

13                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14                  Thank you, Councilwoman.

15                  Mr. Decker, please read that  
16                  report.

17                  CHIEF CLERK: To the President  
18                  and members of the Council of the City of  
19                  Philadelphia, the Committee on  
20                  Appropriations, to which was referred  
21                  Bill No. 180739, entitled "An ordinance  
22                  amending Chapter 21-1600 of The  
23                  Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Housing  
24                  Trust Fund,' to authorize the  
25                  establishment of separate sub-funds to

16                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

21                   (Duly seconded.)

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23          Thank you. It has been moved and

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
10           ayes have it, and these bills will be  
11           placed on our First Reading Calendar  
12           today.

13                   Our next order of business is  
14           the consideration of the Calendar.

15                   I note that the bills just  
16           reported from committee with a suspension  
17           of the rules have been deemed to have had  
18           a first reading. These bills will be  
19           placed on our Second Reading and Final  
20           Passage Calendar at our next session of  
21           Council.

22                   As there are no additional  
23           bills on the First Reading Calendar, the  
24           Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee for  
25           the purpose of calling up resolutions and

4 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

9 180498-AA, 170678-AA, and 160151. All  
10 other resolutions and bills are being  
11 held.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13 Thank you.  
14 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
15 Squilla.

16 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
17 Mr. President. I mentioned all the  
18 co-sponsors on there and I skipped the  
19 first one, which is our Council President  
20 Clarke, who co-sponsored the 21st century  
21 wage, and I really want to appreciate  
22 that and his leadership on this, and also  
23 that Philadelphia being able to lead by  
24 example is so important to be able to  
25 show the folks not only in the City but

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2 throughout the Commonwealth that  
3 Philadelphia is taking the lead on  
4 hopefully ending poverty.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. Keep up that  
8 great work, sir.

9 Before considering resolutions  
10 and bills, we will consider our public  
11 comment session. Our public comment  
12 session will go as follows:

13 If you are interested in  
14 testifying on a bill or a resolution that  
15 is on the Final Passage Calendar today,  
16 if you haven't already done so, you can  
17 sign up at the table to my left.

18 When your name is called, you  
19 will go to the middle of the Council  
20 Chambers. There's a podium, a device on  
21 that podium. When the light turns green,  
22 it will be your time to speak. When the  
23 light turns yellow, you will have 30  
24 seconds to conclude your remarks. When  
25 the light turns red, we would ask that

6                     Mr. Decker, please call the  
7           first name.

8                     CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
9           commenting on 180347-A and 180351-A.

10                    (Witness approached podium.)

11                    MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.  
12           This is an official decree in writ of  
13           mandamus quo warranto and, as such,  
14           requires immediate action and remedy.

15                    Every week Council, Mayor, and  
16           others transfer private property to the  
17           government, probably illegally.

18                    Council did not celebrate the  
19           birth of the U.S. Constitution and should  
20           be ashamed. This government refuses to  
21           get consent of the Governor to act,  
22           stealing homes and other private property  
23           without due process, as recently noted in  
24           federal court. Yet, Council, Mayor,  
25           Governor, Senator, and others continue to

2 wage war on constituents.

3 Attorney General would rather  
4 go after the Pope than to prosecute this  
5 RICO style conspiracy to deny rights.

6 Oath-violating officials must  
7 be prosecuted. If committing one crime  
8 one time would send normal people to  
9 jail, then why are oath-violating public  
10 servants not prosecuted? Fourteenth  
11 Amendment: Nor shall the people be  
12 deprived of life, liberty or property,  
13 nor deny any person equal protection of  
14 the law. How then were most compensated,  
15 but I have been repeatedly denied my  
16 God-given rights?

17 The constitutions require  
18 immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
19 breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
20 duty. Your oath of office requires you  
21 to act or face prison.

22 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
23 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
24 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
25 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,

2           712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
3           SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
4           violated.

5                   I call for the federal and  
6           Commonwealth governments to perform their  
7           constitutional obligations to investigate  
8           and prosecute all involved in the theft  
9           and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
10          1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

11                   The denial of God-given 42 USC  
12          1982 property rights for 24 years is  
13          egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,  
14          and requires immediate remedy.

15                   A just government must obey the  
16          rule of law. This color of law  
17          government must have its Charter to  
18          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
19          compliant government is installed.

20                   Public servants cannot refuse  
21          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
22          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
23          sovereign people require oath,  
24          Constitution, and laws be enforced, and  
25          jail is required for all who violate



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2 oath, Constitution or law.

3 I remind Council, it takes a  
4 lot of cooperation to create and allow  
5 monumental corruption.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Maisha Ongoza.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MS. ONGOZA: Good afternoon.

9 I'm Maisha Ongoza, a retired educator and  
10 university administrator. I'm speaking  
11 on Resolution 180832, the renaming of the  
12 street after Patty Jackson, who I love.  
13 I just want to ask Councilperson  
14 Kenyatta -- and I'm originally from South  
15 Philly -- did you make your community  
16 aware that you were renaming the street?  
17 Did the people on the block -- and I love  
18 Patty. I have nothing against it. I'm  
19 just asking about the process, because I  
20 live in the community where a street was  
21 renamed and there was no process and no  
22 notification of community people by  
23 Councilman Jones, and we were told that  
24 he did not have to notify us for  
25 renaming. The policy says that you do

2           not have to notify the community.

3                        So we would like to put a  
4           petition that that policy needs to be  
5           changed, especially if you're naming  
6           something after such a controversial  
7           figure.

8                        I walk past that street every  
9           day and walk my dog, and if I had known  
10          and my neighbors had known -- and none of  
11          them knew. We canvassed for five hours  
12          door to door, and no one knew this was  
13          happening.

14                       So I'm hoping Councilperson  
15          Kenyatta can let us know what was his  
16          process for naming the street after  
17          Patty, and I'm saying thank you for doing  
18          that, but I'm also questioning how come  
19          we didn't get the same respect and due  
20          process from Councilperson Curtis Jones.

21                       Thank you.

22                       (Applause.)

23                       CHIEF CLERK: Linda Randolph,  
24          commenting on 180832 and 170675.

25                       (Witness approached podium.)

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2                   MS. RANDOLPH: I kind of wanted  
3 to follow up on -- I wanted to address  
4 Curtis Jones and ask him again, the  
5 community is asking him again to rescind  
6 this resolution that was passed.

7                   The claims at the ceremony that  
8 Wilson Goode made, that he will not be  
9 defined by just one day, just one regular  
10 old day in his life, he's not being  
11 defined by just one day. He's being  
12 defined by that day, the days after, the  
13 weeks after, the months and the years  
14 after that he refused to do anything  
15 about bringing the people responsible for  
16 that historical tragedy to justice, the  
17 person that dropped the bomb, the police  
18 officers that shot the children as they  
19 were trying to escape the fire, the  
20 people that let the fire burn the whole  
21 community down, the whole block down.  
22 None of them. He did not have the guts  
23 or the courage to bring any of them to  
24 justice.

25                   The name Wilson Goode is a

2           disgrace. It's an embarrassment to this  
3           City. You cannot -- at best, he was a  
4           coward. You can't erase just three.  
5           You're going to put up a sign as an  
6           attempt to erase the history of what his  
7           name is connected to in the City.

8                        So I'm going to quote an  
9           African American woman years ago right  
10          here that said that we are making a moral  
11          plea to a man and to a city government  
12          that does not have a moral conscience.

13                       So if we have to continue to  
14          come here, if we have to continue to  
15          march and protest, we will do so until  
16          that sign comes down.

17                       (Applause.)

18                       CHIEF CLERK: Jeanette Patton,  
19          commenting on 170675.

20                       (Witness approached podium.)

21                       MS. PATTON: Yes. I'm here for  
22          the third time speaking on that and, you  
23          know, I'd like to address all of City  
24          Council for the people who said I didn't  
25          know, I didn't understand what was

2 happening, it was a mistake. Well, I'm  
3 saying mistakes can be corrected. And  
4 Curtis Jones, Councilman Curtis Jones,  
5 attempted to rewrite history. When he  
6 sent that resolution around, no one in  
7 here who said aye or yea, whatever it is,  
8 to pass it, nowhere on it did it mention  
9 about the bombing, and that's very, very  
10 important. And so I'm saying it was  
11 written on a lie, because if that was put  
12 in there, I would hope the morals of  
13 people who read it would have said, no,  
14 we can't do that.

15 That's your friend, and he's  
16 more than likely a lot of people friends  
17 in here, but morally there's no way that  
18 we can put up a sign saying Wilson  
19 Goode's Way when he's responsible for the  
20 murder of 11 men, women, and children,  
21 burned to death.

22 These children, men and women,  
23 had ran out the house. They were shot in  
24 the alleyway. One child was fist up in  
25 the air and her arm shot off, and then

2           thrown back, bodies thrown back into the  
3           building. This is another fact that was  
4           left out of here.

5                     But what I'm asking City  
6           Council, because Mr. Jones told us that  
7           it can be rescinded, that City  
8           Councilmembers have the right to put in a  
9           resolution to have that rescinded. But  
10          what he said, if you did, then what he  
11          would do is oppose it.

12                    So what I'm asking people,  
13          anybody in City Council, do you have the  
14          nerve to stand up and do the right thing?

15                    Already it has been a split in  
16          the City behind the situation that Curtis  
17          Jones has started. I'm saying we need  
18          to -- my sister, Ongoza, who is a very  
19          well respected person, almost got locked  
20          up last week at the ceremony. And, you  
21          know, Mr. Goode said he didn't ask for  
22          this, but being that you, Curtis, put it  
23          in and he said you, the rest of City  
24          Council, voted on it, then, you know,  
25          he's not going to disappoint y'all. To

2           hell with us, right? The babies that was  
3           murdered, the men and women that was  
4           murdered, the loss of the Osage Avenue,  
5           not even to mention people who have dogs  
6           and cats and birds that were burned to  
7           death.

8                     You know -- wait a minute. I  
9           notice that -- oh, there you are,  
10          Mr. Clarke. And, you know, we would  
11          really like to have a meeting with y'all,  
12          because this city is going up into  
13          turmoil. This is going around the world.  
14          We'd like to bring closure to this, but  
15          it only can be done by doing the right  
16          thing.

17                    On the MOVE, thank you, long  
18          live John Africa. City Council, please  
19          do the right thing.

20                    (Applause.)

21                    CHIEF CLERK: Bianca Parker,  
22          commenting on 180100.

23                    (Witness approached podium.)

24                    MS. PARKER: Hello. My name is  
25          Bianca Parker. I'm a resident, and I

2           want to say no and urge Councilmembers to  
3           reject and do not allow the passage of  
4           Bill No. 180100, which will authorize the  
5           furtherance of predatory encroachment of  
6           Temple University's campus and footprint,  
7           its then SP-IN district, building of a  
8           research facility and expansion of Temple  
9           police surveillance and subject our  
10          African American children to racial  
11          experiments.

12                        Camera surveillance is a common  
13          research method utilized in studies.  
14          Just as the Tuskegee experiments  
15          exploited African Americans for scholarly  
16          and scientific gain, Temple University  
17          plans the Alpha Center for research of  
18          North Philadelphia African American and  
19          preschool children. This plan competes  
20          with existing area day cares.

21                        Temple failed four schools  
22          during five years of the School District  
23          funding contract. Young African American  
24          children will be subject to mental health  
25          treatment and studies as staff, ungraded

2           Temple University students will be  
3           treatment providers at the psychology  
4           clinic. Patients of Temple University  
5           psychology clinic will be subject to  
6           research studies.

7                     Temple must abandon plans for  
8           this experiment center that they call  
9           Alpha Center. They must abandon plans to  
10          subject African American children and  
11          African American adults to research  
12          studies. And Temple must abandon plans  
13          for a dental clinic that already exists.

14                    Again, I'm going to voice my  
15          opposition to this travesty and I'm going  
16          to speak up and out against Temple. And  
17          I want Councilmembers to vote no to early  
18          learning research and mental health  
19          labeling of African American  
20          preschool-aged children in North  
21          Philadelphia.

22                    Also I want to say that I was  
23          at this known community meeting this  
24          Tuesday, and myself spoke and was opposed  
25          to this experiment center, and everyone

2           there, the community members, also was  
3           opposed to it as well. So if the  
4           community members don't want it, then  
5           they don't want it.

6                     Thank you.

7                     (Applause.)

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you for your testimony.

10                    CHIEF CLERK: Jacqueline

11           Wiggins, commenting on 180100.

12                    (Witness approached podium.)

13                    MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon,  
14           City Councilmembers.

15                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
16           afternoon.

17                    MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon,  
18           City Councilmembers. My name is  
19           Jacqueline Wiggins. I am a long-term  
20           resident of North Central Philadelphia,  
21           also a committee person, 32nd Ward, 11th  
22           Division. Bill 180100 having to do with  
23           Temple University wanting to amend its  
24           zoning map to build a structure called  
25           the Alpha Center is what I am speaking

2           to.

3                         Finally, as the previous  
4           speaker said, a known community meeting  
5           was held at Penrose Recreation Center,  
6           11th and Susquehanna, this past Tuesday.  
7           Here are a few words that I heard at that  
8           meeting: Why build this thing at 13th  
9           Street? No more encroachment, Temple.  
10          Temple never fulfilled the charrette  
11          agreement. That building will be for  
12          Temple in the end. This was a quiet  
13          neighborhood until the students came.  
14          Take that center back to campus where  
15          there is land. Take that center to Broad  
16          and Diamond.

17                        The people who were there were  
18          more than upset, concerned or agitated.  
19          They were unabashedly outspoken that they  
20          do not want this center there, and the  
21          fact that other programs that already  
22          exist somehow were added on to what was  
23          to be programs in the center when it  
24          first was just three was really amazing.

25                        So, once again, I'm asking City

3           close attention to what is going on. We  
4           have a right to be notified about what is  
5           going on in our community. We have every  
6           right to know what is going on in our

11                        CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
12           other speakers on the public comment  
13           list, Mr. President.

14                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15           Thank you very much.

16                        That concludes our public  
17           comment session. We will now consider

19                   Mr. Decker, please read the

21                   CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
22          amending Title 14 of The Philadelphia  
23          Code, entitled "Zoning and Planning," by  
24          amending the One Year Rule; modifying  
25          certain public notice requirements and
