2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started.
4 We've established a quorum. I'd ask for
5 all the guests and visitors to please
6 retire behind the rail. Thank you very
7 much.

8 To give our invocation this
9 morning, the Chair recognizes the
10 Reverend Renee McKenzie of the Church of
11 the Advocate, also of the Fifth
12 Councilmanic District. She is here today
13 as the guest of Councilwoman Reynolds
14 Brown.

15 I would ask all members,
16 guests, and visitors to please rise.

17 (Councilmembers, guests, and
18 visitors rise.)

19 REVEREND MCKENZIE: Good
20 morning.

21 (Good morning.)

22 REVEREND MCKENZIE: Anna Julia
23 Haywood Cooper was born an enslaved woman
24 in 1858. She went on to become an
25 educator, a scholar, an author, and a

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2 speaker and a person who fought for
3 African American liberation. She says
4 that -- Anna Cooper says that each of us
5 have within us the singing something in
6 our soul and in our spirit, and it's the
7 singing something that helps us connect
8 with when we are faced with injustice.
9 She said everyone has it. And of course
10 we know that she was speaking especially
11 to the African American community,
12 because that's who she was writing for,
13 but I don't think it was exclusively for
14 them or for us. We all have the singing
15 something.

16 So my invocation today, my
17 prayer over you today is that God will
18 reach that singing something inside of
19 you, so when you come face to face with
20 injustice, that you will respond from
21 that just place inside, that that singing
22 something will ring and justice will
23 prevail.

24 God's blessings upon you as you
25 begin your work. God's blessings upon

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you so much for those inspiring
8 words. We genuinely appreciate you being
9 here.

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you and, again, thanks for those
14 inspiring words.

15 Our next order of business is
16 the approval of the Journal of the
17 meeting of Thursday, October 11, 2018,
18 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Greenlee.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. I move that the
22 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
23 October 11th, 2018 be approved.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you. It has been moved and
3 properly seconded that the Journal of the
4 meeting of Thursday, October 11, 2018
5 stand approved.

6 All those in favor say aye.

7 (Aye.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Those opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 ayes have it, and the Journal is
13 approved.

14 Our next order of business is
15 requests for leave of absence, and the
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. On behalf of the
19 majority, there are no requests of leave
20 of absence today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair thanks the gentleman.

23 And the Chair now recognizes
24 Councilman Oh.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

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2 much. On behalf of the minority, there
3 are no requests for leaves of absence.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 Chair thanks the gentleman.

6 At this time, I would like to
7 dispense with the regular order of
8 business and I would like to thank
9 everyone who has taken time out of their
10 busy day to come down to witness their
11 government in action. We genuinely
12 appreciate you being here. We hope your
13 day here today is a knowledgeable one
14 but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,
15 so much so that you come back again. So,
16 again, thank you so much for being here.

17 At this time, the Chair
18 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
19 present a resolution recognizing October
20 as Breast Awareness Month. Would Traci
21 Smith and those accompanying her please
22 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

23 (Councilmembers and guests
24 approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I

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2 think there should have been --

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: You might
4 want to clarify for the record, but we
5 understood.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Councilwoman, you know what, I understand
8 this is being broadcast live. Breast
9 Cancer Awareness Month. I was simply
10 reading the script.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. On today it is with
13 extreme honor and privilege that we are
14 able to present this resolution to the
15 leadership and supporting team of an
16 organization who I just learned about in
17 April of 2017 through the Philadelphia
18 Chapter of The Links, and it was during
19 this time on April the 8th that we
20 partnered with this organization for an
21 event relative to breast cancer awareness
22 and for survivors and to encourage women
23 to thrive. What was different -- and
24 this is just for me. What was my
25 education is that I was very much

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2 familiar with many of the mainstream
3 organizations that we automatically know
4 because we think of their brands.

5 And, Evelyn Sample-Oates, I'm
6 going to ask you to come up and join us
7 because you were with us during that
8 time. Sorry to call you out that way,
9 Evelyn.

10 We knew of them and we knew of
11 their brand, but I had never heard of a
12 Traci's BIO and that an organization
13 specifically geared, welcoming of all
14 women but very much geared toward
15 supporting African American women and
16 women of color whose networks and needs
17 may be a little different and challenging
18 in different ways than with others. Then
19 when I saw Traci Smith, the founder, one
20 of the founders of the organization,
21 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, I took her
22 to heart, because she's a home girl for
23 me. She grew up in the West Oak Lane
24 community near the 19th and Cheltenham
25 area where I was raised by my

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2 grandparents, and that same commitment to
3 neighborhood, that same commitment to
4 service that many of us learned in our
5 earlier years, Traci has taken that and
6 given it 1,001 percent of everything that
7 she has and put into this organization.

8 So it's with that in mind that
9 I want to thank all of my colleagues for
10 being able to support this resolution and
11 to very intentionally -- and I want you
12 to know we're very intentionally singling
13 out Traci's BIO for this effort and that
14 they, in their own right, are leaders in
15 helping women who are survivors of breast
16 cancer.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
19 after a year of helping others feel as
20 good as she felt, Traci founded Traci's
21 Beautiful Inside and Out (Traci's BIO) --
22 it's out of order? Excuse me. I'll be
23 back.

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: A resolution
25 recognizing October as Breast Cancer

5 mission is to help survivors maintain a
6 level of normalcy.

7 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
8 you, Councilman Jones, for your
9 excitement.

10 Whereas, Breast Cancer
11 Awareness Month is an annual
12 international health campaign organized
13 by major breast cancer charities every
14 October to increase awareness of the
15 disease and to raise funds for the
16 research into its cause, prevention,
17 diagnosis, treatment, and cure. The
18 campaign also offers information and
19 support to those affected by breast
20 cancer; and

21 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, Breast
22 Cancer Awareness Month was founded in
23 1958 in October. Its aim from the start
24 has been to promote mammography as the
25 most effective weapon in the fight

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2 against breast cancer; and

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

4 Whereas, each year in the United States,
5 more than 240,000 women get breast cancer
6 and more than 40,000 women die from the
7 disease. Other than skin cancer, breast
8 cancer is the most common cancer among
9 American women. Getting mammograms
10 regularly can lower the risk of dying
11 from breast cancer; and

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
13 most breast cancers are found in women
14 who are 50 years old or older, but breast
15 cancer also affects younger women. About
16 10 percent of all new cases of breast
17 cancer in the United States are found in
18 women younger than 45 years of age. Men
19 also get breast cancer, but it is not
20 very common; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
22 when breast cancer is detected early and
23 is in the localized stage, the 5-year
24 relative survival rate is 100 percent.
25 Early detection includes doing monthly

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2 breast self-exams and scheduling regular
3 clinical breast exams and mammograms;

4 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

5 Whereas, in Philadelphia, Traci Smith is
6 a breast cancer survivor who is also a
7 mother, entrepreneur, and philanthropist
8 who was born and raised in West Oak Lane.
9 She was educated in the School District
10 of Philadelphia and received her diploma
11 from Franklin Learning Center; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, in
13 2013, Traci received the devastating news
14 from her doctor that she had breast
15 cancer. Traci chose not to see this as a
16 negative, but rather she faced it
17 positively. Every time she went to
18 chemotherapy, she received rave reviews
19 on her personal appearance. She lived
20 her life with the affirmation that "I am
21 beautiful both inside and out,"
22 regardless of the loss of her hair,
23 nails, and eyelashes; and

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: And I'm
25 back.

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2 Whereas, after a year of
3 helping others feel as good as she felt,
4 Traci founded Traci's Beautiful Inside
5 and Out (Traci's BIO) in 2014 with her
6 best friend and business partner Phyllis
7 Young. The mission of the organization
8 is to help women who are battling cancer
9 maintain a level of normalcy while going
10 through an abnormal process; and

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
12 Traci's BIO is a 501(c)(3) organization
13 dedicated to supporting the breast cancer
14 survivor community. Its mission is to
15 provide help and inspire hope to all
16 those affected by breast cancer through
17 beautification, education, and support
18 services;

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
20 the organization provides women with
21 services and resources to assist them
22 with the life-changing experience of
23 breast cancer, while providing them with
24 a sisterhood to help them not only
25 survive but thrive while tapping into

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2 one's inner strength; and

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,
4 Traci's BIO celebrates life, and to date,
5 she has served over 25 women with photo
6 shoots, hair and make-up makeovers, and
7 more. This is only the beginning for
8 Traci, as she has more life to live and
9 more to give; and

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
11 Traci also founded Each One Teach One
12 Childcare Learning Center in 2002 with
13 her business partner, Ms. Young. Today
14 there are five of these centers and one
15 Christian academy spread throughout the
16 Philadelphia area, serving West
17 Philadelphia, Germantown, Darby, and
18 Southwest Philadelphia. Traci and Ms.
19 Young serve 350 young scholars each
20 school year and up to 500 each summer;
21 and

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Now,
23 therefore, be it resolved by the Council
24 of the City of Philadelphia, that it
25 hereby recognizes October as Breast

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2 Cancer Awareness Month and honors Traci's
3 Beautiful Inside and Out, a non-profit
4 breast cancer support organization whose
5 mission is to help survivors maintain a
6 level of normalcy.

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Further
8 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
9 resolution be presented to Traci's BIO as
10 evidence of the sincere sentiment of this
11 legislative body.

12 Congratulations.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Before
15 the Council President recognizes Traci
16 for remarks, I just want to encourage
17 everyone in the audience and those who
18 may be watching us at home to learn more
19 about Traci's BIO by visiting their
20 website, www.tracisbio.org. Information
21 about the organization is there and, most
22 importantly, just like any other
23 organization, you can make a contribution
24 at any level in which you like if you're
25 interested in supporting their efforts.

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2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 the Chair recognizes Ms. Smith for
5 remarks.

6 MS. SMITH: Well, good morning,
7 good morning, good morning, and I just
8 want to say thank you so much for
9 recognizing Traci's BIO.

10 I started this organization at
11 the worst time. I had a mastectomy, I
12 had no hair, and I just finished
13 radiation. And so I needed something
14 more other than what the doctors were
15 giving me. I needed a sisterhood, I
16 needed something more spiritual, and I
17 needed something more mental. I figured
18 if I needed this, there were other ladies
19 that also as well needed that. So I
20 started the organization because it was a
21 need. It was my duty, because there are
22 a lot of people that lose their life to
23 breast cancer. I am the fortunate one to
24 say that I am a survivor, and so there
25 was a need for me to grab the hand of the

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2 person that was going through what I went
3 through and say you too can be a survivor
4 as well.

5 And so I thank you not only for
6 just recognizing me, but understand that
7 it is my job, it is our job that we see
8 someone going through breast cancer, to
9 reach out and say, sister, you can do it
10 as well.

11 And so I thank you for
12 recognizing this organization. And,
13 again, it is my honor to be here, but I'm
14 only doing my job.

15 Thank you.

21 Thank you, and congratulations, and

7 (Councilmembers and guests
8 approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 joining Councilwoman Blackwell, we have
11 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Oh,
12 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman, I
13 believe, Parker, and Councilman Green.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
15 you, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 You're welcome.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
19 Resolution hereby proclaiming the week of
20 October 15, 2018 as Philly Financial
21 Literacy Week.

22 Whereas, Philly Financial
23 Literacy Week is a citywide, week-long
24 celebration hosted by the People's
25 Innovative Movement, honoring financial

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2 planning, community development,
3 education and wealth building throughout
4 the City of Philadelphia; and

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
6 according to Forbes Magazine, 44 percent
7 of Americans don't have enough cash to
8 cover a \$400 emergency, 43 percent of
9 student loan borrowers are not making
10 payments, 38 percent of U.S. households
11 have credit card debt, and 33 percent of
12 American adults have zero dollars saved
13 for retirement; and

14 Whereas, making sound financial
15 decisions is key to increasing one's
16 wealth, and households making poor
17 financial decisions experience more
18 financial hardship which creates a
19 perpetuating cycle that keeps communities
20 impoverished in entire geographic
21 regions; and

22 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
23 Whereas, financial literacy should be
24 taught early and consistently over time
25 so that children can overcome many of the

2 challenges their parents have faced; and

3 Whereas, in Philadelphia,

4 financial education in schools is lacking

5 as there is no requirement for one to be

6 taught personal finance in order to

7 receive a high school diploma; and

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, Philly

9 Financial Literacy Week will be filled

10 with dozens of educational, entertaining,

11 celebratory and networking events,

12 workshops, panel discussion, boot camps

13 and more. The First Annual Philly

14 Financial Literacy Week will have themed

15 days that celebrate and educate

16 Philadelphians on various aspects of

17 financial literacy; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,

19 the educational topics featured during

20 this week include: credit and money

21 management, life insurance and

22 retirement, small business and financial

23 planning, benefits of homeownership,

24 student loan education, and stock market

25 education;

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Now,
3 therefore, be it resolved that the
4 Council of the City of Philadelphia,
5 hereby proclaims the week of October 15th
6 2018 Philly Financial Literacy Week.

7 Further resolved, that an
8 engrossed copy of this resolution be
9 presented to the People's Innovation
10 Movement as a sincere expression of the
11 Council of the City of Philadelphia's
12 gratitude, admiration and recognition.

13 Congratulations.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
16 the Chair recognizes Mr. Smith for
17 remarks.

18 MR. SMITH: First and foremost,
19 I want to say thank you all for honoring
20 this historic week, but I think this is
21 the beginning, and this is actually a
22 civil rights movement that is impacting
23 all of our communities here in the City
24 of Philadelphia. And with everything in
25 me and in my network, I will continue to

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2 bridge that gap with information and
3 resources to the communities, to the
4 underserved community of Philadelphia to
5 give them hope and a sense of dignity and
6 pride to take control of their economic
7 liberating life.

8 I have a tremendous committee
9 that I have aligned with myself, and this
10 movement doesn't just end with us. It
11 starts with all the policymakers to help
12 us continue to fight, as we are hosting
13 workshops in various councilmanic
14 districts across the City of
15 Philadelphia. We actually have a
16 workshop tonight at Awbury Recreational
17 Center for homeownership. Tomorrow we
18 will be at Jardel -- I'm sorry; Max Myers
19 Recreational Center in the Northeast, and
20 then on Saturday we're having two
21 workshops, one in the morning with
22 Amber's Magical Savings Box, which is an
23 interactive book that teaches young kids
24 how to save, and then later on also
25 during that same time at Jardel

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2 Recreational Center at Cottman Avenue
3 we'll be having the stock market
4 education with former stockbroker John
5 Proctor.

6 So we encourage the City of
7 Philadelphia to participate, and if you
8 need more information, you can find us at
9 www.cpimovement.org.

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, and congratulations.

17 At this time, the Chair
18 recognizes Councilman Squilla, who will
19 present a resolution recognizing the 85th
20 Anniversary of the Ukrainian Genocide of
21 1932 through 1933. Would Ulana
22 Mazurkevich and those accompanying her
23 please join the Councilman at the podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining Councilman Squilla, we have
4 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Domb, and
5 Councilwoman Gym.

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Good
7 morning. Today we'd like to do a
8 resolution recognizing the 85th
9 Anniversary of the Ukrainian Genocide
10 from 1932 to 1933.

11 Whereas, the Ukrainian
12 Community of Greater Philadelphia, a
13 dynamic community with many organizations
14 and institutions, is in sadness
15 commemorating the 85th Anniversary of the
16 Ukrainian Genocide. 85 years ago, the
17 Soviet leader Joseph Stalin and his
18 totalitarian regime committed an act of
19 genocide through the implementation of an
20 engineered famine, confiscating land,
21 grain and animals from the Ukrainian
22 people, resulting in the deaths of up to
23 10 million innocent men, women and
24 children;

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,

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2 this genocide, Holodomor, meaning "Murder
3 by Starvation," was specifically designed
4 by the Soviet regime to punish
5 independent-minded Ukrainians for their
6 resistance to its economic, political,
7 and social oppression; and

8 Whereas, at the height of the
9 Holodomor in 1933, Ukrainians died at the
10 rate of 25,000 a day, with nearly a third
11 of its victims being children less than
12 10 years old; and

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, even
14 as the Soviets continued to export
15 Ukraine's grain to the rest of the world,
16 Ukrainian farmers, who tended to the
17 farms in the "bread basket of the
18 U.S.S.R." were tragically starved to a
19 slow and painful death; and

20 Whereas, hundreds of archival
21 KGB documents created during this
22 genocide detailed and described the
23 Soviet regime's actions and intention to
24 destroy Ukraine's national identity by
25 deporting and executing Ukraine's

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2 religious, intellectual and cultural
3 leaders, prosecuting or executing any
4 others who dared to speak of the famine
5 or to speak against the Soviet
6 authorities publicly, further
7 destabilizing Ukraine's political
8 structure; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
10 under the global theme "Ukraine
11 Remembers, the World Acknowledges," it is
12 necessary that the Ukrainian Genocide,
13 Holodomor 1932 to 1933, be officially
14 recognized by the global community as a
15 tragic and heinous crime against humanity
16 to prevent similar tragedies from
17 occurring in the future; now, therefore

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Be it
19 resolved, by the Council of the City of
20 Philadelphia, that we hereby designate
21 the month of November 2018 as "Ukrainian
22 Genocide Remembrance Month" in
23 Philadelphia.

24 Further resolved, that an
25 engrossed copy of this resolution be

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2 presented to Ulana Mazurkevich,
3 President, Ukrainian Community Committee
4 of Philadelphia, further evidencing the
5 sincere sentiments of this legislative
6 body.

7 Thank you, and congratulations.
8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 the Chair recognizes Ms. Mazurkevich for
11 remarks.

12 MS. MAZURKEVICH: Thank you.
13 Thank you, Councilpeople. Thank you very
14 much for this resolution. As was said,
15 85 years ago, Ukraine's borders were
16 closed and slowly, slowly Moscow
17 implemented a famine, a genocidal famine,
18 which totaled seven million deaths.

19 The playbook of Moscow
20 continues today. They denied, denied,
21 denied that a famine was raging in a
22 country that was known as the bread
23 basket of Europe. All the food stops
24 were being taken out of Ukraine.
25 Millions were dying daily. As we said, a

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2 total of over seven million.

3 So I call upon you today. We
4 are having a commemoration of this
5 heinous, tragic event. We are having the
6 commemoration at 1 o'clock at the Mayor's
7 Reception Room. There is a fantastic
8 telling exhibit on the Holodomor. It is
9 a mouthful, Holodomor, famine by
10 starvation, and we urge you please to
11 come and show solidarity with Ukraine and
12 with Ukraine's people. As was noted, the
13 Ukrainian community in Philadelphia is a
14 very vibrant, dynamic group, and the
15 Ambassador of Ukraine will be attending
16 this event. So please come down to the
17 Mayor's Reception Room at 1 o'clock and
18 show your solidarity with Ukraine and its
19 people.

20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, and congratulations.

4 Our next order of business is
5 communications. Would the
6 Sergeant-of-Arms deliver the messages
7 from the Mayor to the Chief Clerk.

8 And, Mr. Decker, if you will
9 please read those messages.

10 CHIEF CLERK: To the President

24 Month in Philadelphia.

25 At the National Federation of

2 the Blind, we believe that blindness is
3 not the characteristic that portrays who
4 we are or what our future allows. We
5 also are happy that City Council will
6 help us to bring awareness and raise
7 expectations for those with low vision
8 and blindness, for low expectations
9 actually create obstacles for people who
10 are blind and their dreams. We want
11 everyone to know that they can live the
12 life that they wish to live and that
13 blindness is not what defines their
14 future.

15 We also know that faith is
16 defined by the hope and the belief in
17 things unseen. So it is an honor and a
18 privilege of mine to be a part of this
19 resolution saying that faith -- every
20 morning getting up and walking by faith
21 and not by sight, knowing that the Lord
22 did not give us the spirit of fear but
23 gave us the spirit of love, power, and a
24 sound mind.

20 requires immediate action and remedy.

21 Every week, Council, Mayor,

25 Are Governor, Senator, Mayor,

18 becoming the legalized version of the
19 criminals. Would soldiers risk their

14 constitutional obligations to investigate
15 and prosecute all involved in the theft
16 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
17 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

18 The denial of God-given 42 USC
19 1982 property rights for 24 years is
20 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
21 and requires immediate remedy.

22 A just government must obey the
23 rule of law. This color of law
24 government must have its Charter to
25 govern revoked until a constitutionally

3 Public servants cannot refuse their sworn

18 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilwoman
19 Blackwell.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. I move for the
24 adoption.

25 (Duly seconded.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
3 been moved and properly seconded.

4 All those in favor say aye.
5 (Aye.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution

16 for promoting Cardiac Health Awareness in
17 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilman
18 Henon.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: I move for
20 the adoption.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
23 been moved and properly seconded.

24 All those in favor say aye.
25 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilman Taubenberger.

20 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
21 you, Council President. I move for the
22 adoption of the resolution.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
25 been moved and properly seconded.

18 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

20 Mr. President. I move for the adoption

21 of the resolution.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

24 been moved and properly seconded.

25 All those in favor say aye.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, and that resolution is

10 recognizing October 2018 as Filipino
11 American History Month in the City of
12 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilman
13 Oh.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
17 much. I move for the adoption of the
18 resolution.

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
21 been moved and properly seconded.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

4 ayes have it. That resolution is
5 adopted.

6 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
7 other resolutions on the Final Passage
8 Calendar, Mr. President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

11 Any speeches on behalf of the
12 minority?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
15 going to wing it. The screen is a little
16 out of kilter.

17 No speeches on behalf of the
18 minority. And on behalf of the majority?

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Jones.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
22 Mr. President and colleagues. I want to
23 thank you for your support on Resolution
24 No. 180851-A. I introduced it two weeks
25 ago and it dealt with the temporary

2 moratorium on residential property
3 foreclosures.

4 So now what are the next steps?
5 We've had a meeting with the Revenue
6 Department. We've had a meeting with the
7 Sheriff's Department. We're having a
8 meeting with several of the courts, and
9 we are in the data-gathering phase.

10 What does that mean? We want
11 to know how well, for example, the
12 Mortgage Foreclosure Program is working.
13 We want to know how many of those
14 foreclosures are for bank and private
15 sales versus public auctions due to water
16 and taxes. We want to take a look at how
17 well some of the programs are working.

18 There are several programs that
19 are already on the books to help people
20 in trouble. There's the homestead
21 exemption. There's the senior citizens
22 tax freeze. There's the real estate tax
23 installment plan. There's the active
24 duty reserving guard tax credit, just to
25 name a few. But a lot of people don't

2 know about them. A lot of people choose
3 to see the letter, put it on the
4 mantelpiece and deny what's going on.

5 So the question becomes in this
6 data-gathering phase what are the facts?
7 If the housing counselor programs have
8 adequate counselors to cover the amount
9 of people being oppressed, depressed, and
10 re-gentrified out of neighborhoods in a
11 caseload manner, if I have a caseload of
12 25 per day or per week, can I reach all
13 of those people in a timely fashion to
14 put together the type of paperwork needed
15 to save their homes?

16 So we're going to look at this.
17 Some of the successes, we're going to
18 talk about some of them too. Since the
19 program was established, over the last
20 decade we've saved 11,888 homes. This is
21 something you guys did in this Council by
22 passing that moratorium. That has saved
23 21,000 homeowners through the Mortgage
24 Diversion Program. To date, in the
25 system now, there are 5,900 people

2 currently participating in that program.

3 And what we need to do, whether
4 you are my more conservative members that
5 are bean counters and count budgets or
6 whether you are my not so conservative
7 members that want to save every soul,
8 this deliberation makes sense to both
9 sides, because if we put somebody out,
10 make them homeless for \$6,400 on average
11 and then spend \$15,000 a year to put them
12 in a shelter, to put them in temporary
13 housing, where does that make dollars and
14 absolutely no sense?

15 So I want to encourage you to
16 stand fast on this temporary moratorium
17 as we take a look at who is being
18 impacted and make sure that those who are
19 capable of paying Councilman Domb
20 actually do pay and those who are
21 besieged through impacts that they cannot
22 control, such as deep poverty, that they
23 are saved, and it will make sense at the
24 end of the day budgetarily.

25 Thank you, Mr. President, and

2 thank you, colleagues.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman. Continue to do
5 that good work.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Johnson.

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
9 Council President. I want to commend my
10 colleague Councilman Curtis Jones for
11 calling on this moratorium. We also are
12 partnering on how we look at redlining
13 and the discrimination of banks that
14 provide loans for home repairs and also
15 individuals to become first-time
16 homebuyers in conjunction with this
17 issue, but also how we look at the
18 collection of taxes, not so much for
19 individuals who are poor and people who
20 live in deep poverty but also those who
21 own parcels of land, those who own a
22 significant amount of real estate here in
23 the City of Philadelphia and we aren't
24 going aggressively after them to pay
25 their taxes as we are going after those

2 individuals who live in primarily
3 low-income neighborhoods.

4 So, again, I commend my
5 colleague for stepping up to the plate on
6 this particular issue. And this is a
7 great segue into an event that I'm
8 hosting on October the 25th at the Yesha
9 Ballroom at 23rd and Snyder. We will be
10 hosting the First-Time Homebuyer and
11 Lending Fair in partnership with the
12 Urban Affairs Coalition.

13 Again, we believe that it's
14 critically important that we encourage
15 people to build wealth, and the number
16 one way to build wealth in America is by
17 becoming a first-time homebuyer. And so
18 we encourage everyone who is listening to
19 come out to participate. It's from 6:00
20 to 8:00 p.m. and, again, that's at Yesha
21 Grand Ballroom on Thursday, October the
22 25th of 2018.

23 Also, Council President, I am
24 hosting two meetings in two parts of my
25 district for the Second Councilmanic

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2 District Neighborhood Clean and Green
3 Advisory Board. We've been looking at
4 the issue all throughout the summer since
5 I've been hosting On Your Block meetings
6 around particularly litter, trash,
7 illegal dumping and, most importantly,
8 finding ways to clean and green our
9 community. And so we've been successful
10 in turning abandoned lots to beautiful
11 green spaces and also making sure that
12 community groups have an opportunity to
13 have ownership in some of these lots so
14 they can have high-quality places for
15 them to enjoy themselves in our
16 neighborhoods in the midst of all the
17 development that's taking place.

18 And so the first meeting is
19 going to take place on Thursday, November
20 the 8th at Myers Recreation Center from
21 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., and that's at 58th and
22 Kingsessing Street, and the second
23 meeting will be in South Philadelphia on
24 Tuesday, November the 13th at Bryant
25 Baptist Church at 19th and Federal

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2 Streets in South Philadelphia from 6:00
3 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

4 Thank you very much, Council
5 President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. Always on the
8 case.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Henon.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. Today I introduced a
13 piece of legislation to protect our land
14 from zoning for industrial and
15 manufacturing use in the City of
16 Philadelphia. I've been sitting on the
17 bill for some time. We hear it in caucus
18 all the time, I'm holding it, holding it,
19 holding it, because of the financial
20 impact it may or may not have until we
21 fully vet it out. But as we introduce
22 this month earlier, this month currently,
23 in the beginning of the month, as
24 Manufacturing and Industry Month, we have
25 the opportunity to do all we can. And

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2 I've been a staunch, as many other
3 members of this Council, staunch member
4 of or a proponent for advancing
5 manufacturing causes. And we once were
6 the Workshop of the World. It means we
7 made a whole lot of stuff. So we make
8 stuff. We're the makers workshop of the
9 world. We make movies. That's an
10 industry. We make widgets. We make
11 hats. We have Stetson hats. We make a
12 lot of things here, and a lot of it is
13 coming from our own residents of the City
14 of Philadelphia.

15 I'm proud, I mentioned a few
16 times, we had our career expo yesterday
17 in the manufacturing and industry. There
18 were over 50 employers looking for over
19 1,000 people. There was nowhere near
20 1,000 people there. There were a lot of
21 people, but there's nowhere near 1,000.
22 That means there are jobs to be had.
23 That means we need to keep -- as I'm
24 trying to showcase and provide a
25 different vision of what people think

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2 manufacturing and industry is. It's not
3 smoke stack and dirty pollutant
4 industries anymore and irresponsible
5 business owners that are taking advantage
6 of its workers. It's advanced
7 manufacturing. It is STEM. It is things
8 that we're learning in our schools and
9 things that we should be learning in
10 schools if we're not.

11 So it's a real opportunity to
12 promote and protect our industrial
13 property. I'm going to start with my
14 district as an overlay, and that's what
15 this bill does. When it applies, it
16 prohibits certain uses, and those uses
17 are stated in the legislation. I'll be
18 coming back with enabling legislation to
19 define the maps on what sections and
20 parts of my district where it's
21 appropriate. But in one of those
22 prohibited uses, it's junkyards and these
23 salvage yards where you have all these
24 peddlers where people are just destroying
25 our neighborhoods, taking advantage of

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2 others' less fortune and trying to profit
3 off it, and they're doing it illegally.
4 Some are operating illegally and
5 squatting on our land right now, on
6 Philadelphia land, and they're
7 irresponsible with some of the properties
8 that we have especially next to our
9 waterways.

10 So the Workshop of the World
11 continues. People are looking for jobs.
12 There are jobs available. Again, please
13 contact my office. We can connect you
14 with end users who are -- employers who
15 are looking for employees and
16 Philadelphia employees, people who live
17 in our neighborhoods. And this is an
18 incentive overlay that really kind of
19 protects, as we have been protecting the
20 use of industrial land and the
21 preservation of industry, because
22 industry changes, the economy changes,
23 but I don't know of -- I always hear
24 nobody won a war without any foot
25 soldiers, right? And nobody operates a

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2 business without people. We got the
3 people, and we got a high dense public
4 school and neighborhood people who are
5 looking to go to work.

6 So this is in one part my
7 mission to see that we remain the
8 Workshop of the World, along with a lot
9 of partners here in City Council, PIDC,
10 the Commerce Department, Planning, and
11 especially my staff and my office, who I
12 relentlessly try to push to find some
13 incentives in how we can preserve what we
14 have, because we're pretty cool, we're
15 pretty awesome, and we want to attract as
16 much business as we can here in the City
17 of Philadelphia and employ our workers.

18 So thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman. A good job is the
21 best social service program you can have.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Parker.

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
25 you, Mr. President. First, let me just

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2 start by reading just a few notes into
3 the record. This is a statement
4 regarding the proposed facility for
5 unaccompanied minors at 5201 Old York
6 Road, which is in the Ninth Councilmanic
7 District.

8 Last night I received a call in
9 which I was informed very briefly about a
10 proposal to house unaccompanied minors at
11 5201 Old York Road. It's also known as
12 Logan Plaza in the Ninth Councilmanic
13 District.

14 I want to note for the record
15 that prior to last night, Mr. President,
16 no one affiliated with this proposal had
17 contacted my office to discuss it despite
18 the long time presence of this complex in
19 the Logan neighborhood and the
20 relationship it had built with the
21 community.

22 While being here as the
23 representative for this body, I want to
24 be very clear with my constituents who
25 are thinking about this issue relative to

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2 land use, that we are still in fact in
3 gathering mode to gain information about
4 the status of the proposal, but I do want
5 to make it clear. I mean, people heard
6 from Mayor Kenney. I want it to be clear
7 that I, as the District Councilperson,
8 also stand opposed to this property being
9 used for this purpose.

10 This is an affront not only to
11 the Logan community but to Philadelphia
12 as a whole as a Sanctuary City that
13 desires to give everyone a chance to
14 realize the American dream regardless of
15 their immigration status, Mr. President.
16 It is unacceptable for the federal
17 government in its attempt to force this
18 upon us.

19 I will stand with the people of
20 Logan and particularly any other
21 organizations that are interested in
22 joining in this fight if they're ardently
23 opposed to the planned facility.

24 Let me also just note for the
25 record that if there is anyone that is

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2 interested in engaging in any kind of
3 civil action or public protest, I want us
4 to remember that we need to get the facts
5 first and that the people who live in
6 this community deserve to be informed and
7 deserve to be foremost in the discussion
8 about what is being proposed for their
9 community.

10 I also want to note for the
11 record that, Councilwoman Sanchez and
12 Councilwoman Gym, you all have taken a
13 great lead in this effort when issues
14 like this have come up previously, and as
15 we gain more facts about this case very
16 specifically as it relates to land use,
17 as the bigger picture is unveiled, do
18 know that I will count on each of you to
19 assist us and stand in solidarity with
20 the residents who live here about
21 speaking about what they have a right to
22 have a voice in what goes in their
23 community, and for the rest of my
24 colleagues.

25 We will stand in solidarity to

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2 help protect the human rights and the
3 dignity of these children. And I just
4 wanted to make sure I noted that,
5 Mr. President, for the record.

6 On a much more positive note, I
7 want to note that on tomorrow at 11
8 o'clock, I am hoping that you,
9 Mr. President, all of our colleagues, and
10 anyone who is listening will join us on
11 tomorrow, Saturday, October the 20th,
12 from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on the 1400
13 block of Vernon Road. This is our
14 ribbon-cutting and block party for the
15 improvement of the commercial corridor.

16 Now, Mr. President, you know,
17 government doesn't always get things
18 right. The left hand doesn't always talk
19 to the right hand, but the people in this
20 community have been waiting a mighty long
21 time to see some of their tax dollars
22 reinvested back into their community.
23 And we've had a lot of tragedy over the
24 years on that corridor. Some of it was
25 very public, but, Mr. President, we don't

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2 just have a press conference when there's
3 a tragedy in our community. We did what
4 we needed to do, and that was to roll up
5 our sleeves, use a data-driven and
6 research-based process to try to leverage
7 as many public and private resources as
8 we possibly could to make change on that
9 corridor.

10 And so I just quickly need to
11 say a special thanks to Mayor Kenney,
12 along with Director Epps, Commerce
13 Department, Salim Wilson and that mighty
14 team over at Commerce. We'll be with
15 Reverend Waller tomorrow and probably
16 almost every other spiritual leader in
17 that region, along with our schools and,
18 most importantly, the Mount Airy
19 Community Council, the residents who live
20 there, our State Senator Art Haywood. If
21 you're listening, State Senator Art
22 Haywood, if you don't deliver on those
23 state funds, that part of this project
24 wouldn't be done. And to our former
25 State Representative Tonyelle Cook-Artis,

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2 who is here but who is no longer in the
3 State House, we want to say thank you,
4 because it was also your work while you
5 were in the Pennsylvania General Assembly
6 that helped to secure these dollars.

7 So we're going to have fun.
8 Face painting tomorrow, free food, free
9 activities, seniors. And, most
10 importantly, Mr. President, I want you to
11 know, because we should be very proud of
12 this, along with all of our colleagues,
13 that aside from celebrating the aesthetic
14 and physical improvement of this
15 corridor, Mr. President, there have been
16 over 225 inquiries of people who are
17 waiting in line, because they said this
18 is nice to see this on Vernon Road for
19 the commercial corridor, but we want to
20 know what's going to be available to help
21 us who own these houses that Councilman
22 Curtis Jones was just talking about in
23 his bill around the corridor.

24 So there will be a line.
25 They're waiting for the home loan

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2 product. We told them it's coming, don't
3 kill us, we'll be ready in every Council
4 district in 2019, but the people in
5 neighborhoods are going to benefit
6 tomorrow.

7 And I needed to say thank you
8 to my colleagues, all of you, for
9 advocating for neighborhood commercial
10 corridors and to Ira Goldstein, who is
11 going to kick it off and talk about the
12 data relative to the importance of
13 investing in middle neighborhoods. And,
14 Wells Fargo, this doesn't happen without
15 your private donation.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you. That was genuinely a brighter
19 light. Thank you. Thank you,
20 Councilwoman.

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilwoman Blackwell.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
24 you, Mr. President. I rise today to say
25 thank you. I mentioned last week that we

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2 were having this program, the Lucien E.
3 Blackwell Community Center opening that
4 we fought for for 18 years. I want to
5 thank the Mayor. I want to thank
6 Chairman Brady. I want to thank you --
7 I'm sorry about your accident -- the
8 members of Council who came, a special
9 thanks to Bill Greenlee and Maria
10 Quinones-Sanchez, and so many people were
11 there. Many of you know that Bill
12 Keller, the State Rep, was the checker on
13 the waterfront. We had him. We had the
14 former President of Lu's union. His
15 local was Local 1332. We had ward
16 leaders, elected officials. We had so
17 many people, and we were so grateful,
18 because as I said, it was full circle for
19 me. Parkway West School used to be
20 Sulzberger. When Lu went there and when
21 his family went there, they called it
22 Sulzy. Now it's Parkway West.

23 But we were there. His
24 family's grocery store was -- the whole
25 site was there where they learned how to

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2 deal with people and love public service.
3 And I am just so grateful, and one of my
4 folks was telling me from Malcolm X.
5 Park, boy, you must have really loved
6 your husband, you were -- people were
7 telling me, I've seen you unlike I've
8 seen you before. But like I told my ward
9 last night, if you waited 18 years for
10 something, you'd be moved too to finally
11 get it.

12 So certainly we thank the City.
13 We thank Kelvin Jeremiah and the whole
14 PHA family, and we thank all of you, the
15 universities, all who were there, and
16 we're grateful.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilwoman. It's an awesome
20 facility. You are to be commended.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We're
22 trying to catch up with you,
23 Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
25 knew you had to throw that in there.

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman. Good work.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
4 you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
8 Council President. This week I had an
9 opportunity to do a ride-along with
10 Officer Smith, who is a community
11 relations officer in the 14th Police
12 District, and in riding throughout the
13 14th Police District, I had an
14 opportunity to come upon Vernon Road, and
15 I had to commend my colleague
16 Councilwoman Parker for really being in
17 the vineyard to address that issue of
18 bringing commercial corridors and showing
19 what can be done.

20 Having worked in the Ninth
21 Council District, I saw what that
22 commercial corridor looked like, and to
23 drive by that commercial corridor, I was
24 really just amazed and surprised and glad
25 to see how much the Vernon Road

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2 commercial corridor had been transformed.
3 So congratulations. It shows and
4 demonstrates what we can do when we work
5 together collectively as both the public
6 and private sector.

7 Also I just want to remind my
8 colleagues and thank them for their
9 ongoing support for the people in the
10 autism community. This Saturday, October
11 20th, we'll have the annual Walk Now for
12 Autism Speaks event at Citizens Bank
13 Park. Registration starts at 9:00 a.m.
14 The event will start at 10:00 a.m. Once
15 again, my wife, Sheila Mitchell-Green,
16 will be the Co-Chair of this year's walk.
17 We have a goal of raising over \$435,000.
18 We're already over \$321,000, and
19 hopefully we'll get to our goal on
20 Saturday or shortly thereafter.

21 And just to remind people in
22 reference to the impact of autism, when
23 my son was diagnosed in 2003, one out of
24 every 200 children were identified on the
25 autism spectrum. Now it's one out of

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2 every 59, one out of every 37 boys and
3 one out of every 151 girls, and it
4 impacts boys four to one. And when you
5 think about that number going from in
6 2003 to now 2018, many of these young
7 people who were children will become
8 adults. So this is going to have a major
9 impact not only on the City of
10 Philadelphia, the Commonwealth of
11 Pennsylvania, but our nation. And I want
12 to thank my colleagues for always
13 supporting. We'll be out there, as we
14 always are, with our Team Julian Green
15 balloons. So if you come out to Citizens
16 Bank Park on Saturday, October 20th,
17 registration is at 9:00 a.m. The walk
18 will start at 10:00. Please look for our
19 green balloons.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
23 your continued awesome work on that very,
24 very important issue.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

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2 Squilla.

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. I just wanted to
5 reiterate the invitation by the Ukrainian
6 community for the 1:00 p.m. presentation
7 in the Mayor's Reception Room down on the
8 second floor at 1 o'clock. So if anybody
9 could attend, happy to see you down
10 there.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
15 Mr. President, I forgot to thank him as
16 well.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 You're welcome. Thank you. Thank you,
19 Councilwoman.

20 The Chair recognizes
21 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. Eleanor Roosevelt said
24 that beautiful young people are accidents
25 of nature, but beautiful old people are

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2 works of art.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 There you go.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: We want to
6 invite all of our colleagues to join
7 Representative Donna Bullock, who has
8 partnered with both your office and my
9 office, to see 500 seniors who are
10 beautiful works of art tomorrow, tomorrow
11 at Temple University, Liacouras Center,
12 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. where we
13 will be under the big top, the Golden
14 Life Senior Fair. Over 50 senior
15 services providers, food, entertainment
16 for 500 old people who we know are works
17 of art.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

21 It's going to be a great time. I
22 understand they have some awesome live
23 entertainment that's going to be there
24 too.

25 The Chair recognizes

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2 Councilwoman Gym.

3 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
4 very much, Council President. I just
5 wanted to echo Councilwoman Parker on her
6 really wonderful remarks about standing
7 up for justice in these times.

8 I want to thank you for your
9 leadership, Councilwoman Parker. I also
10 really want to thank other members of
11 this entire body for being incredibly
12 supportive around issues of civil and
13 human rights. Councilman Johnson and I
14 have been working together for a long
15 time about the residential treatment
16 facilities for young people. We all know
17 that congregant care facilities and a
18 mass incarceration mentality towards
19 young people are neither effective,
20 humane or appropriate settings. And
21 whether you are a child seeking refuge
22 from Honduras or a child born in this
23 city, we're going to try and change this
24 situation.

25 But specifically regarding the

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2 shelter that the federal administration
3 says will serve unaccompanied minors, the
4 first thing I would like to add on a more
5 broad level is that no one should believe
6 this administration when they say that
7 these children were never separated from
8 their families. We know from multiple
9 investigations that this administration
10 has had a routine policy of reclassifying
11 all children separated at the border as
12 unaccompanied minors and that they have
13 lied to the American public consistently
14 and relentlessly about these cruel and
15 inhumane separations. But that does not
16 in any way negate the fact that we do
17 have children who had traveled hundreds
18 of miles under terrifying conditions as
19 refugees from unprecedented violence and
20 terror in their home countries, and we as
21 a nation have to welcome them and figure
22 out the next phase in their journey and
23 let them know that they are loved, that
24 they will not be abandoned or alone in
25 their journey to find a family and a home

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2 in this country.

3 But I do think that as we
4 continue to seek information about the
5 municipal requirements licensing and et
6 cetera about the facility, we should be
7 very conscious about the horrifying track
8 record of the particular provider, which
9 is known as VisionQuest, based out in
10 Arizona, a for-profit entity that has
11 been cited in national news reports and
12 locally for numerous complaints at
13 different points about 12 deaths that
14 occurred in their care on the West Coast.
15 After the homicide at Wordsworth, I
16 received numerous calls almost
17 immediately from families and young
18 people here that terrible things were
19 also happening at VisionQuest. So it was
20 thus no surprise when our own DHS ended
21 its contractual relationship with
22 VisionQuest over a year ago here in
23 Philadelphia as well as their other
24 facility across the state due to their
25 poor performance.

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2 So as we look into the
3 responsibilities of us as a municipal
4 authority about licensing and permits, a
5 full investigation of VisionQuest should
6 occur and there should be full
7 transparency about all their issues,
8 including any death of children that
9 occurred under their watch, runaways,
10 complaints of child abuse, and a lack of
11 oversight, all of which are apparently
12 fairly common with this agency. And this
13 city should have no interest in allowing
14 for incompetent or poor providers to
15 operate under any level of jurisdiction,
16 federal or local, when young, vulnerable
17 children's lives are at stake.

18 And so I want to thank this
19 Council for being vigilant and pledge to
20 work very closely and in collaboration
21 with my other partners on Council to make
22 sure that we keep our children and all
23 the world's children in the best care.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Very
5 important issue.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Domb.

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
9 Council President. I have two comments,
10 one short and one a little longer. But I
11 want to mention on behalf of Councilwoman
12 Parker that she asked me to mention that
13 Vernon Road won the Best Block Impact
14 Award as part of the 2018 Storefront
15 Challenge. So congratulations, Vernon
16 Road. It's a contest, by the way, that's
17 created by the Community Design
18 Collaborative in the City's Department of
19 Commerce to recognize design excellence
20 in storefront facade improvements.

21 The second piece has to do with
22 personal financial literacy this week
23 Councilwoman Blackwell introduced, and I
24 thought we could turn that inside to our
25 own government. So I'm going to share

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2 some facts about the economy that I think
3 we all need to be aware of and what's
4 coming in the next two or three years.

5 In 2016 when I started and
6 several of my colleagues who were
7 freshmen started, our budget for this
8 city was \$4 billion. Today it's 4.7
9 billion, a 17.3 percent increase over
10 three years against inflation of 5.7
11 percent. We went up \$700 million. Sixty
12 percent of that went to salaries,
13 benefits, pensions. Two and a half
14 percent went to education, 20 million.
15 Four hundred and twenty million were for
16 salaries, benefits, and pensions.

17 The reason why I bring this up
18 is because a recent article in Forbes
19 mentioned 50 percent of the country's
20 economists are predicting a recession in
21 2020. Half.

22 Now let's bring that to
23 Philadelphia. Our local economy since
24 2012 to 2018 for buildings in excess of
25 four stories, we have completed

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2 construction of 2 million to 4.8 million
3 of square feet. These are buildings that
4 require 24 to 30 months advanced
5 planning. On the books today for 2020,
6 which is less than 18 months away,
7 123,000 square feet. Let me put that in
8 context. 2012 to 2018, 2 million to 4.8
9 million; in 2020, 123,000 square feet.

10 And I mention this only because
11 I want us to be sensitive to what's going
12 on in our local economy and with our
13 citizens. We all have seen many citizens
14 whose real estate taxes have dramatically
15 increased over the last few years,
16 dramatic, and I'm not sure going into
17 2020 that that can continue.

18 I also want to say this,
19 because I want to make sure that whatever
20 we do in our city is competitive and we
21 have a level playing field, especially
22 compared to the suburbs. I want to bring
23 this up because I think it's important in
24 any bill that we think about introducing
25 going forward, we think about these

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2 factors and the economy.

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes

7 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

9 you, Mr. President. Today at 3 o'clock

10 Councilman Squilla and I will be joining

11 the Mayor at the Emergency Response

12 Center at 4th and Spring Garden. This is

13 after his declaration last week of a

14 health crisis in the City, in particular

15 Kensington, as it relates to this opioid

16 addiction. And I want to thank the

17 Administration for heeding our call.

18 I know Councilman Squilla and

19 I, Councilman Domb who has been

20 incredibly supportive, the conditions of

21 Kensington, we are in the eyes of the

22 country. Just this week the New York

23 Times declared Kensington the "Walmart of

24 Heroin," and it is a narrative that will

25 take us years and years to get away from,

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2 but the conditions there are very
3 similar.

4 And I need to remind people of
5 the '80s in my own neighborhood of
6 Hunting Park when we had the drug
7 epidemic, and at that particular time, we
8 had a public safety strategy of
9 containment and we arrested our way
10 through that, and the trauma related to
11 what happened post all of that situation
12 was never dealt with.

13 In Kensington, we have to do
14 things differently, and I have been one
15 of the folks, the most progressive folks,
16 around needle exchange, the placement of
17 clinics, methadone clinics and others.
18 In fact, some of my constituents in
19 Fishtown call me the methadone queen for
20 being responsible in how we address this
21 plight across the City.

22 But in Kensington, poor people
23 have the right to live in safe and a
24 clean community, and that's not what we
25 have. We have an occupation of 700

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2 people in addiction, many who are not
3 from the City, who have created a crisis
4 situation where children are walking
5 through needles, through open drug
6 utilization, through prostitution and
7 open sex.

8 This declaration is a step in
9 the right direction, but this Council and
10 this Administration has to be more
11 intentional in how we provide a quality
12 of life for the folks in Kensington and
13 help people through what is a lifetime
14 journey of recovery as they deal with
15 their addiction. One thing is not more
16 important than the other. It is both of
17 those things that must happen.

18 And I continue to work and
19 believe that our behavioral health
20 system -- I know many of you attended a
21 briefing last week from CBH. I can tell
22 you that we still have a lot of work to
23 do to meet people where they are around
24 treatment and services. At the same
25 time, we have to be responsible and

2 ensure that we are taking care of
3 Philadelphians and working with the
4 counties and helping folks go back home.

5 We can't have a plan where we
6 are going to say that we have housing for
7 the 700 people in addiction there, and we
8 can't tell residents in that community
9 that we're going to be able to provide
10 that housing. And until that happens, we
11 are not willing, that we don't have the
12 political will to break down these
13 encampments.

14 You've heard me talk about this
15 often. I've been incredibly frustrated
16 at our inability and unwillingness to
17 disrupt lawlessness in the defense of the
18 young people that we are traumatizing,
19 traumatizing every single day.

20 I'll give you an example.
21 Conwell is a special admit school, high
22 academic achieving school in the midst of
23 this. Their enrollment decreased by
24 almost 50 percent this year, because
25 parents, once their kids were selected

2 and visited Conwell, as much as the
3 academic programing was one that they
4 wanted for their children, they were
5 unwilling to put their children in harm's
6 way. And we're working with the School
7 District, because the School District has
8 to come up with a bussing alternative to
9 get the 380 kids that we still have at
10 this school to school, and we have to
11 figure out how we get the children who
12 live there who walk to that school, how
13 do we get them to the school safely. And
14 that's a difficult task.

15 And so I remind folks that --
16 some folks have said I'm empathetic. I'm
17 not. I have buried cousins due to
18 addiction. I have an uncle who is in
19 addiction that the entire family is
20 working around. So when people give me
21 numbers, I give them names. And so I am
22 not being cold when I ask that Last Stop
23 be closed, because they have people in
24 addiction sleeping in crates and don't
25 have humane conditions for people to go

2 to the bathroom and some basic needs.

3 Now, folks will say, well, it's
4 better than being in the street. That
5 may be true, but it is unacceptable to
6 get the folks in that community to
7 continue to tolerate this stuff.

8 I helped open two respite
9 centers in Kensington. I have now called
10 for them to be shut down in the next six
11 months because we have been unable to
12 guarantee the public safety of the folks
13 in Kensington, and as a result of that,
14 we're killing the Kensington commercial
15 corridor.

16 This is not an either/or, but
17 we have to, we have to give long-term
18 residents and those folks who live in
19 Kensington, we have to win back their
20 confidence that we can keep them safe.

21 We cannot let folks in
22 addiction who have no control of their
23 lives occupy a neighborhood and there be
24 no "or else" strategy.

25 And so today I will stand with

2 the Mayor, because I got elected to
3 attempt to work through all of these
4 problems, but I can tell you that I'm
5 still not convinced, I'm still not
6 convinced that we are willing to be
7 disruptive and do what is necessary for
8 the residents of Kensington.

9 As all these safe injection
10 sites happen -- and I had the pleasure on
11 being on WURD debating Governor Rendell,
12 who has been a great supporter of mine,
13 on their quest for a safe injection site.
14 I'm not the person who has said no to
15 looking at harm reduction, but until you
16 can convince me -- and I've said this
17 over. If you can't convince me, you're
18 not convincing 16 other members of
19 Council, right, that a safe injection
20 site strategy that is not part of a real
21 reform continuum of care is going to be
22 the answer.

23 Tomorrow I will go to New York
24 and I will sit with the Health
25 Commissioner of New York, who is in the

2 process of setting up six sites -- not
3 Staten Island. Won't say why, right? We
4 all know why -- six sites, and with the
5 Director of Vancouver, who has 26 sites,
6 and has now said the safe injection sites
7 are not enough, because their overdoses
8 are going up, we are now going to give
9 away the drug. And so he's going to sit
10 in a panel with me tomorrow to talk about
11 how Canada, who has universal healthcare,
12 minimum income, and affordable housing,
13 how they now, in order to deal with their
14 overdoses, are going to give away heroin
15 because fentanyl has gotten to Canada.

16 So, folks, I appreciate
17 Councilwoman Bass and her committee.
18 We've had many hours of discussions about
19 this. We will now be hosting another
20 session. We have postponed what was
21 originally scheduled for October 23rd to
22 give the Mayor and his team and this new
23 declaration an opportunity to work. The
24 Mayor has said we're going to do this for
25 three months. If things don't work,

2 we're going to change it up.
3 This is not a Kensington
4 problem. This is a citywide problem.
5 This is a Southeastern Pennsylvania
6 problem. And it is a crisis, because
7 white men between 22 and 50 are dying,
8 although it is important to note that
9 there's a growing number of Latino and
10 African Americans. We're probably going
11 to lose more to opioid overdoses than we
12 will to shootings this year. So it is a
13 crisis across the board, but how we
14 address this issue is about race and
15 economics. And my community in Hunting
16 Park who suffered the trauma -- I am a
17 child product. The reason I got involved
18 in community development in Hunting Park
19 was because of the drug epidemic in
20 Hunting Park at 8th and Butler. In fact,
21 my first march was when Jesse Jackson
22 came into the City to talk about that,
23 and I was about 15 years old.
24 So I have lived this, and I am
25 outraged that folks on the Twitter war,

2 the foundations and folks from the
3 outside who are coming to tell me that
4 I'm insensitive. I'm not that one. You
5 are not going to come into the Seventh
6 Councilmanic District and tell me that I
7 have not lived this every single day.

8 And so, again, I want to
9 acknowledge the Administration and what
10 we're going to do today at 3 o'clock. I
11 want to ask my Council colleagues to be
12 more engaged in this discussion, because,
13 remember, Vancouver has 26 sites. How
14 many are you taking, Councilman Johnson?
15 Exactly.

16 So let us be clear that if
17 there's anything that I've demonstrated
18 in this Council floor is, that I know how
19 to legislate for the Seventh and in the
20 best interest of the entire city. And so
21 while I may be at the forefront of this
22 with Councilman Squilla, this is
23 impacting all of us, and the strategy has
24 to be a citywide strategy and everybody
25 has to play a part in this.

2 So don't parachute in to tell
3 me what you think I should do, because if
4 you can't put it on your corner, don't
5 come and tell anybody in my neighborhood
6 that we're going to put it on theirs.

7 Thank you very much, Council
8 President.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Strong. Strong.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Oh.

14 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
15 much, Council President. I just wanted
16 to say in corroboration and support of
17 Councilwoman Maria Quinones-Sanchez, who
18 has in the entire time that I've known
19 her been at the forefront of dealing with
20 just terrible conditions that exists in
21 her district, that she has run for office
22 and has tackled, this heroin opioid issue
23 has been just one of the most difficult
24 issues because of the polarization of
25 people and the fact that they have dug in

2 their heels without really looking at the
3 actual evidence and data with an open
4 mind.

5 What the Councilwoman is saying
6 is very true, and we discussed this on
7 the Heroin Opioid Task Force in our
8 recommendations. The final
9 recommendation, which was very heated,
10 with a lot of conflict, was finally
11 resolved with a recommendation that the
12 City further look and consider the
13 evidence of safe injection sites. There
14 were as many people on that Task Force
15 opposed to safe injection sites as there
16 were who were saying it should be looked
17 at. And most people had no real answer,
18 because we did not really have a chance
19 to fully look at the data. There was not
20 a recommendation for safe injection
21 sites. What was raised is exactly what
22 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez said, that
23 while the reports that back up the safe
24 injection sites have come out, all of
25 them were co-authored by the founder of

2 the singular site in Canada.

3 The problem they face is with
4 fentanyl. A single injection of heroin
5 can be lethal. And so as she said,
6 shockingly -- and people may not know
7 this -- that they have decided to provide
8 the heroin itself to ensure that it
9 doesn't have fentanyl, and that is
10 leading to a whole other set of issues in
11 Canada, things that are issues that I
12 think would be explosive here in
13 Philadelphia.

14 Meanwhile, we do have proven
15 ways of helping to prevent, to deter, and
16 to help cure those who have addiction.
17 They do work. They need funding. They
18 need resources. We are fighting at a
19 stalemate right now over something that
20 is untested, that isn't working out well,
21 and we're not putting resources into the
22 things that really do work.

23 But I certainly stand with
24 Councilwoman Sanchez and this Council
25 body.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 That concludes our speeches on
6 behalf of the minority and majority.

7 And with that, I recognize
8 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
9 to adjourn.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
12 adjourned until Thursday, October the
13 25th at 10:00 a.m.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you. It has been moved and
17 properly seconded that Council stand
18 adjourned until Thursday, October 25th,
19 2018 at 10:00 a.m.

20 All those in favor say aye.

21 (Aye.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Those opposed?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 ayes have it.

3 Thank you all very much.

4 (Stated Meeting adjourned at

5 1:00 p.m.)
