2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. We're going to get
4 started. If visitors will retire behind
5 the rail, we will have our invocation.

6 To give our invocation this
7 morning, the Chair recognizes Rabbi Batya
8 Glazer of the Jewish Community Relations
9 Council of the Jewish Federation of
10 Greater Philadelphia. She is here today
11 as the guest of Councilman Domb.

12 I would ask all guests,
13 visitors, and members to please rise.

14 (Councilmembers, guests, and
15 visitors rise.)

16 RABBI GLAZER: Good morning.

17 At the front of every synagogue
18 there burns a light. That light reminds
19 us of the presence of God that is with us
20 at all times. The symbol of the Jewish
21 Federation of Greater Philadelphia is
22 that light, because we each carry that
23 light.

24 Each of you as elected
25 representatives of the people of

2 Philadelphia, you have a special role,
3 and we are all grateful for that role,
4 for you also carry that light.

5 When the community finishes a
6 book of The Five Books of Moses, which is
7 read every morning, every Shabbat morning
8 in synagogue, we say chazak, chazak,
9 v'nitchazek. Be strong, be strong and we
10 will strengthen one another. And we do
11 need one another and we do strengthen one
12 another.

13 This past Sunday, I was
14 privileged to be part of an interfaith
15 solidarity vigil at Rodeph Shalom
16 Synagogue where so many members of this
17 body, the government of the City of
18 Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of
19 Pennsylvania, the interfaith community,
20 and the general community came together
21 to strengthen one another. We need one
22 another.

23 This coming Shabbat, Saturday
24 in synagogue, and we are recognizing
25 solidarity Shabbat, and we invite every

3 with us to remind one another that we are
4 together.

5 As you begin your sacred work
6 today, I want to share the prayer or one
7 very similar to it that was read at the
8 Tree of Life Synagogue that morning and
9 every Shabbat morning for the leadership
10 of the United States of America.

11 Our God and God of our
12 ancestors, we ask your blessings for our
13 country, for its government, for its
14 leaders and advisors, and for all who
15 exercise just and rightful authority.
16 Teach them insights from your Torah that
17 they may administer all affairs of state
18 fairly, that peace and security,
19 happiness and prosperity, justice and
20 freedom may forever abide in our midst.

21 Creator of all flesh, bless all
22 the inhabitants of our country with your
23 spirit. May citizens of all races and
24 creeds forge a common bond and true
25 harmony to banish hatred and bigotry and

2 to safeguard the ideals and free
3 institutions that are the pride and glory
4 of our country. May this land under your
5 providence be an influence for good
6 throughout the world, uniting all people

10 nation. Neither shall they experience
11 war anymore.

12 And let us say amen.

14 RABBI GLAZER: Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you so much, Rabbi. We really
17 appreciate you being here today. Thank
18 you.

19 Council will be at ease.

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. Our next order of business is
23 the approval of the Journal of the
24 meeting of Thursday, October 25th, 2018,
25 and the Chair recognizes Councilman

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
4 you, Mr. President. I move that the
5 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
6 October 25th, 2018 be approved.

7 (Duly seconded.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you. It has been moved and
10 properly seconded that the Journal of the
11 meeting of Thursday, October 25th, 2018
12 stand approved.

13 All those in favor say aye.

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it, and that Journal is
20 approved.

21 And our next order of business
22 is requests for leaves of absence, and
23 the Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. On behalf of the

3 for Councilmember Squilla.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you, Councilman. Let the record
6 reflect that leave shall be granted for
7 Councilman Squilla.

8 The Chair now recognizes
9 Councilman O'Neill.

10 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. On behalf of the
12 republicans, there are no requests for
13 leave of absence.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair thanks the gentleman.

16 At this time, I would like to
17 thank everyone who has taken time out of
18 their busy day in spite of this wonderful
19 weather to come down to witness their
20 government in action. We genuinely
21 appreciate you being here. We hope your
22 stay here today is a knowledgeable one
23 but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,
24 so much so that you come back again. So
25 we really thank you.

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2 I'd like to recognize some
3 students from my district, Franklin
4 Learning Center, visiting us today in the
5 Chambers, and it's important because they
6 are embarking on a voting project to get
7 people out and to talk about the
8 importance of voting.

9 So I would like to recognize
10 them at this time.

11 And now I'm being told that
12 they're not here yet. So we'll recognize
13 them when they get here. Thank you. But
14 I would like to recognize Councilwoman
15 Jannie Blackwell at this time.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
17 you. Mr. President, we were privileged
18 enough to be at a wedding last week. One
19 of the members, of course, is a member of
20 our Commission. She's a retired leader,
21 administrator with the Philadelphia
22 school system, and she got married and
23 decided that -- they decided that they
24 would spend their first week visiting us,
25 and I'm honored to present to you

3 Could they stand.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Congratulations. Thank you. Thank you
7 so much.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
9 you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 now I'd like to recognize Councilwoman
12 Blondell Reynolds Brown.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
14 Mr. President, and good morning. Last
15 week, you, along with Councilman Green
16 and I, were thrilled to announce an
17 effort around the installation of solar
18 panels moving us one step closer to your
19 10,000 jobs, and this morning at that
20 press conference, two gentlemen
21 approached us about how City Council
22 works. These two gentlemen are making
23 going solar much, much easier, and we
24 want to welcome, therefore, Leroy Taylor,
25 who is the District Manager for Vivint

2 Solar, and Eric Wolf, who is the Sales
3 Manager for Vivint Solar. These men are
4 with an innovative company --

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: These two
7 young men are with an innovative company
8 providing homeowners with simple and
9 affordable clean energy for those of us
10 who want to go solar. This company
11 installs and maintains solar panels on
12 our homes for little or no cost.

13 So we welcome anybody who wants
14 to learn more about how City Council
15 works.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Awesome. Thank you.

19 Thank you, gentlemen.

20 Congratulations for your great work.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 the Chair now recognizes Councilman Domb.

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning,

25 Council President --

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 COUNCILMAN DOMB: -- my Council
5 colleagues and all in attendance today.
6 In the wake of Saturday's tragedy, we
7 must come together as a diverse body and
8 city and stand as a united front. In
9 order to move forward and end hatred and
10 violence in our world, we must stand
11 together as an entire city, first and
12 foremost.

13 Saturday's tragedy marks the
14 largest anti-Semitic attack in American
15 history. As Pittsburgh's oldest Jewish
16 congregation, Tree of Life is known as a
17 peaceful meeting place for all who
18 worship. The people of Pittsburgh will
19 not let this tragedy change that
20 sentiment.

21 As allies and friends to the
22 people of Pittsburgh, we stand together
23 in unity and support against hatred. We
24 need to do better, and we will do better.

25 Thank you, Rabbi Batya Glazer,

3 your presence provided a sense of
4 strength and healing for all of us.

5 I would like to have a moment
6 of silence to remember the 11 lives
7 tragically lost on October 27th, 2018 at
8 the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Will
10 members please stand for a moment of
11 silence.

12 (All Councilmembers and
13 audience members stand.)

14 (Moment of silence.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. Thank
17 you.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
20 will present a resolution recognizing
21 Richard Cornish. Would Mr. Cornish and
22 those accompanying him please join the
23 Councilwoman at the podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining Councilwoman Blackwell, we have
4 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown,
5 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Green,
6 and Councilman Oh and Councilman Jones
7 and Councilwoman Parker and Councilman
8 Domb.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. This is a real
11 pleasure for me. These are gentlemen who
12 have been around a long time. I met them
13 34, 35 years ago. Many women will
14 remember Zagoby's (ph). That was the
15 total experience for African American
16 women in Center City. When that closed
17 down, the men who came out of it, Frank
18 Altomare and John Toner, are here, and
19 shortly after that Richard Cornish joined
20 them. And we are here today because I've
21 been part of them all these years, ever
22 since that time, and I heard Richard
23 talking about helping children at
24 Children's Hospital. He has pictures
25 with him now.

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2 And if CHOP, if they have
3 arrived, I hope they will join us here as
4 well.

5 He has pictures of young
6 people. I remember hearing about one
7 young lady who said, I'm going to lose my
8 hair, but until that happens, I want my
9 hair red and I want it done this way or
10 that way. And it's a special calling
11 when you care enough about people, some
12 very disabled, very ill, to make them
13 feel better and do better because you
14 make them look better. And when Richard
15 got involved in this, finally after about
16 a year, they made it a formal program at
17 Children's Hospital of Philadelphia,
18 which you all know is in my district, and
19 we are just overjoyed. But when you
20 marry talent, when you marry commitment,
21 and when you marry service for others,
22 you know that's a special calling for me,
23 because that's what life is all about.
24 And I am honored to be here to present
25 this resolution signed by all of you in

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2 their honor.

3 Resolution recognizing and
4 honoring Richard Cornish for his work in
5 Children's Hospital of Philadelphia where
6 he gives of his time styling the hair of
7 both patients and caregivers for the
8 Salon Services Program, which raises
9 morale and instills joy and dignity in
10 those receiving his services.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
12 a native of Oklahoma, Richard Cornish
13 moved to Philadelphia at the age of 18
14 with big dreams. He began working at the
15 Center City hair studio Panache as an
16 assistant, and with hard work and
17 dedication he eventually became one of
18 the City's top hair stylists; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
20 Mr. Cornish is currently the coordinator
21 for the Salon Services Program at
22 Children's Hospital of Philadelphia,
23 affectionately known as CHOP. The
24 program was made possible by the generous
25 donation from the Gottschalchs, a family

2 with their own experience of spending
3 long hours in the hospital looking after
4 their sick child;

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: And
6 whereas, Mr. Cornish started as a
7 volunteer at CHOP until he became an
8 official employee when the Salon Services
9 Program was created. He now works two
10 and a half days a week providing his hair
11 styling services to patients and their
12 families in the hospital; and

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
14 Mr. Cornish and his colleague Amy Moore
15 provide special buzz cuts to patients who
16 are suffering from hair loss due to
17 chemotherapy treatment. Additionally,
18 twice a month they give parents and
19 caregivers in the Oncology Unit free
20 haircuts and blowouts. This service
21 offers a much-needed moment of relaxation
22 to those who are continually putting
23 their needs aside for the benefit of
24 their loved ones; and

25 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

2 Whereas, additionally, Mr. Cornish
3 provides his services to other units in
4 the hospital, including the Rehab Unit,
5 where a new cut can help uplift a
6 teenager recovering from addiction. He
7 also consults with transgender youth and
8 assists them in creating their new looks
9 that are more aligned with their gender
10 identity; and

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
12 these pop-up salons at CHOP give
13 caregivers and patients hope and enables
14 many of the patients to feel more like
15 "everyday people" and temporarily forget
16 their surroundings; and

17 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,
18 Mr. Cornish has expressed that this
19 service is important because these people
20 don't take care of themselves. It's
21 something -- that if these people don't
22 take care of themselves, it's something
23 that makes me feel amazing, because I get
24 to give my gift to those people who are
25 probably in more need of that gift than

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2 anyone; and

3 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Now,
4 therefore, be it resolved, that the
5 Council of the City of Philadelphia
6 hereby recognizes and honors Richard
7 Cornish for his work in Children's
8 Hospital of Philadelphia where he gives
9 of his time styling the hair of both
10 patients and caregivers for the Salon
11 Services Program, which raises morale and
12 instills joy and dignity in those
13 receiving his services.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
15 Further resolved, that an engrossed copy
16 of this resolution be presented to
17 Richard Cornish as a sincere expression
18 of the Council of the City of
19 Philadelphia's gratitude, admiration, and
20 recognition.

21 And let me say after some 34
22 years, these are my friends. We love
23 them.

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 the Chair recognizes Mr. Cornish for
4 remarks.

5 MR. CORNISH: Hi, everyone.
6 Thank you, Councilwoman Blackwell,
7 President Clarke, all of City Council. I
8 am privileged to be part of such a
9 forward-thinking organization like
10 Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. To
11 be able to provide salon services to
12 these patients, caregivers, siblings in a
13 hospital setting is truly empowering,
14 uplifting, and healing for the whole
15 family unit.

16 We at CHOP are the only
17 hospital that performs this service in
18 this way. I have met some of the most
19 amazing people on this journey.

20 I would also like to thank
21 Panache Hair Design and Frank and John.
22 Without their support, I would not be
23 able to do this. I would like to thank
24 the leadership of CHOP, Amy Moore. This
25 should be you up here. Without your

3 and you, this would not be possible.

4 Thank you. Thank you,

11 Thank you very much, and congratulations.

12 Our next order of business is

12 An ordinance amending Chapter
13 9-600 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
14 "Service and Other Businesses," by
15 amending Section 9-612, entitled "Fences
16 Around Automobile Wrecking Yards and
17 Junkyards and Buildings," and Section
18 9-613, entitled "Junk Dealers," to change
19 the section titles, add definitions,
20 update requirements for waste handling
21 facilities, licenses and salvage
22 transactions; and

23 An ordinance authorizing the
24 Procurement Commissioner and the Director
25 of Commerce to enter into a concession

3 management, and operation of an airport
4 advertising program at Philadelphia
5 International Airport; and

6 An ordinance authorizing the

11 including agreements that obligate
12 payment for delivery of such energy
13 supplies in future fiscal years, all
14 under certain terms and conditions.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you, Mr. Decker. Do you have any
17 additional communications?

4 this morning co-sponsored by Councilwoman
5 Bass and Councilman Derek Green.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
9 authorizing the Procurement Commissioner,
10 on behalf of the City, to enter into an
11 agreement with the Philadelphia Energy
12 Authority to purchase electricity and
13 certain attributes and benefits related
14 to the generation of such electricity
15 from a solar energy facility, Adams
16 Solar, for use at and in connection with
17 City facilities.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 that will be referred to committee.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Jones.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
13 Mr. President. Two bills.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance to
17 amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
18 changing the zoning designations of
19 certain areas of land located within an
20 area bounded by Roosevelt Boulevard,
21 Henry Avenue, a Railroad Right-of-Way,
22 and Scotts Lane.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Referred to committee.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Referred to committee.

17 And the Chair recognizes
18 Councilman Henon.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
20 Council President. Today I offer two
21 bills and one privileged resolution.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
25 amending Chapter 10-2200 of The

6 motivated by hatred toward certain

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Referred to committee.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
11 to amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
12 changing the zoning designations of
13 certain areas of land located within an
14 area bounded by Tolbut Street, Torresdale
15 Avenue, Pennypack Street, and the
16 Delaware Expressway.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Also
18 referred to committee.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
20 resolution recognizing December 5th as
21 AFL-CIO Day in Philadelphia in honor of
22 the decades of tireless work that the
23 American Federation of Labor and Congress
24 of Industrial Organizations has done on
25 behalf of working Philadelphians and

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
9 President, I have five bills.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
13 authorizing the Water Commissioner, the
14 Revenue Commissioner, and the Procurement
15 Commissioner, on behalf of the City of
16 Philadelphia, to enter into an
17 Intergovernmental Agreement with the
18 Philadelphia Municipal Authority pursuant
19 to which the City will assume certain
20 obligations under a contract the
21 Authority will enter into with Sensus USA
22 Incorporated to provide, install,
23 maintain and operate facilities and
24 equipment for the automated collection
25 and delivery of water usage data to the

3 City Department.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Referred to committee.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
7 amending the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by

10 commenting on 180351-A and 180958.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 morning.

14 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.
15 This is an official decree of the people
16 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
17 such, requires immediate action and
18 remedy.

19 Every week, Council, Mayor,
20 Governor, and others transfer private
21 property to the government, probably
22 illegally.

23 Justice Brandeis predicted
24 crime is contagious. If the government
25 becomes a lawbreaker, it breeds contempt

2 for the law. It invites every man to be
3 a law unto himself. It invites anarchy.

4 Jerry Sandusky, child abuser,
5 Larry Nassar, Michigan State gymnast
6 abuser, these government employees harmed
7 the people while oath-bound officials
8 enable these criminals by failing to
9 prosecute existing law.

10 Public officials are not immune
11 from suit when they transcend their
12 lawful authority by invading
13 constitutional rights.

14 Are Governor, Senator, Mayor,
15 Council, and others using HUD low-income
16 housing money to build a mall on my
17 stolen home? Opposition to my numerous
18 Seventh Amendment trial by jury appears
19 to create a RICO style conspiracy to deny
20 rights.

21 The people cannot be denied
22 their God-given right to convict
23 oath-violating officials. The
24 Constitutions require immediate remedy of
25 this breach of law, breach of close,

2 breach of fiduciary duty. Your oath of
3 office requires you to act or face
4 prison.

5 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,

8 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
9 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
10 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
11 14-4056 appeared violated.

12 I call for the federal and
13 Commonwealth governments to perform their
14 constitutional obligations to investigate
15 and prosecute all involved in the theft
16 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
17 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

18 The denial of God-given 42 USC
19 1982 property rights for 24 years is
20 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
21 and requires immediate remedy. A just
22 government must obey the rule of law.
23 This color of law government must have
24 its Charter to govern revoked until a
25 constitutionally compliant government is

3 Public servants cannot refuse
4 their sworn duty to act any more than a

11 lot of cooperation to create and allow
12 monumental corruption.

21 MR. HAGINS: Actually, it's
22 180729, an ordinance amending Section --

24 just state your name for the record.

25 MR. HAGINS: Yes. My name is

8 the maximum penalties to be assessed; all
9 under certain terms and conditions.

10 I am opposed to this because we
11 have to get to the solution as to why are
12 people dumping, and to add more money to
13 a fine is not going to stop people from
14 dumping.

15 I am a recycler. I've been
16 recycling in the City and observing trash
17 dumping and short dumping for the last
18 ten years, and to just throw money at the
19 problem is not going to do it. You know,
20 people have to know where they can dump
21 legally. There also has to be
22 opportunities for people who are dumping
23 less than a ton. Okay? Because if
24 someone is dumping a ton or more, they
25 have to go to a certified dumping place

2 and pay like \$70 to \$90 a ton. So a lot
3 of the so-called jackleg contractors,
4 they're not accumulating that much trash.
5 So they don't want to dump and pay \$70 to
6 \$90 to pay to dump 200 pounds worth of
7 debris as opposed to a ton.

8 So we really want to look at
9 how we can make it easier for those
10 people to dump, number one, and how the
11 City can gain revenue by providing
12 alternative dumping sites for those who
13 are not accumulating more than a ton.

14 So I would highly recommend
15 that this bill be set aside to talk about
16 how we can deal with some solutions. And
17 if anyone, any of the Councilpeople here
18 want to sit down with me for some
19 solutions to this problem, because we
20 don't want to always fine people.
21 Because if giving someone a ticket would
22 solve a problem, every time I got a
23 parking ticket I would never get another
24 one. So circumstances and situations is
25 what causes people to do these dumping

2 situations. And the City is just dirty
3 in general, so we need to -- and then
4 also just a certain area? There should
5 be no dumping in the entire City of
6 Philadelphia, not just in designated
7 areas.

8 So with that in mind, I really

10 that and come up with a better plan.

16 Are there any speeches on

19 Any speeches on behalf of the

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman

22 Oh.

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
24 much, Council President. This Sunday,
25 thanks to a lot of work done by you,

4 will be hosting the annual Veterans

5 Parade November the 4th at 12:00 p.m.

6 All the Councilmembers, of course all of

7 Philadelphia, is welcome and invited to

8 come out and celebrate and commemorate

9 our veterans, starting from City Hall to

10 Independence Mall. People who want to

11 gather at Independence Mall, there will

12 be festivities, a fantastic parade, and

13 other celebratory opportunities. So come

14 on out, 12 o'clock here in the City of

15 Philadelphia.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 On behalf of the majority, the

20 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

22 Mr. President. Today I introduced

23 legislation defining categories of

24 persons protected from hate crimes in the

25 City of Philadelphia. This new

1 11/1/18 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 legislation will clarify consequences for
3 crimes motivated by age, race, religion
4 or national origin.

5 I began looking at this
6 legislation after hearing from many
7 seniors in my district and have been
8 figuring out ways to address some of
9 their concerns and the ongoing safety
10 issues that have been taking place in
11 different neighborhoods, and a few years
12 ago, I don't know if you recall,
13 Councilman Jones and the Public Safety
14 Committee heard hate -- or held hearings
15 hearing people who have been victims of
16 hate crimes targeted by age and through
17 various ways, just age, through crafty
18 and slick persons that commit crime and
19 impersonations. So we were contemplating
20 ways to figure out how to address these
21 issues back then. And these seniors, who
22 were the foundations of our community,
23 they shared their fears that will become
24 targets of the crime because of their
25 age, not only is a current and any --

2 it's not in any current or any provisions
3 under state or local code, which makes
4 targeting of an individual or groups of a
5 crime based on age a crime in itself and
6 based on its own right.

7 So we can't leave our seniors
8 alone. We can't leave them vulnerable
9 this way. This bill is just a step
10 forward to correct the problem that
11 exists. Unfortunately, tragic events in
12 this past week in Pittsburgh and Kentucky
13 are reminders that we must ensure that
14 our hate laws and our hate crimes reflect
15 the values of our city in protecting
16 targeted communities, even in some cases
17 they are protected by state hate crime
18 code. That is why myself and our
19 colleagues here in this Council who
20 co-sponsored this bill are seeking to
21 expand the City's list of eligibility
22 hate crimes based on the included
23 characteristics of age, race, ethnicity,
24 color, religion, and national origin.

25 The hate crimes code is a

2 statement of the values and priorities.
3 We have valued people of all backgrounds.
4 We want our citizens, especially
5 vulnerable and marginalized groups,
6 including our senior citizens, to be
7 confident that the City will stand up and
8 protect them. There is no room for hate
9 or intimidation, a growing -- in our
10 city, who is growing, vibrant in many
11 diversities for hate crimes here in the
12 City of Philadelphia.

13 So we're going to make sure
14 that we send a message loud and clear to
15 our residents and anyone else who would
16 even consider inflicting harm on the most
17 vulnerable people in our City of
18 Philadelphia and targeted groups.

19 First, I want to thank
20 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown for
21 her leadership in bringing this bill
22 forward, which established Philadelphia's
23 hate crime code. The law shined a light
24 in ways that we can lead now and
25 encourage the state to improve its hate

2 crimes code.

3 And I'd like to also thank all
4 of the members who are joining us here
5 together in ensuring that we have an
6 up-to-date and reformed hate crime code
7 that truly reflects the diversity and the
8 groups here in the City of Philadelphia
9 that we all represent.

10 So thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. Two weeks ago I
17 introduced a moratorium on Sheriff Sales
18 in the City of Philadelphia with an
19 effort to try to collect data that
20 becomes information about the intensity
21 of what's going on. I want to thank the
22 Sheriff's Department. I want to thank
23 the Revenue Department for helping me to
24 gather that data and to share it with my
25 colleagues.

2 So I did a request for
3 information about just municipal water
4 and tax Sheriff Sales in my district. I
5 did not -- I cannot get the camera to
6 come in on this information. There were
7 over 300 imminently-in-jeopardy
8 properties in my district that will come
9 under the gavel of Sheriff Sales shortly.
10 That wasn't the problem for me. If it
11 was spread out evenly around my district,
12 150,000 people, that would be one thing,
13 but if you can see this map, information
14 becomes data -- data becomes information
15 and becomes useful when you ask for it
16 visually sometimes.

17 So if you look at some of my
18 poorest areas, which I will not identify
19 publicly, there is an intense level of
20 activity there. Some areas you're very
21 familiar with, because you gave them to
22 me, are equally in jeopardy of so many
23 transactions in a month or a year that it
24 will radically change the character of
25 the neighborhood.

2 So we need to get in front of
3 this before we have vanishing
4 historically significant neighborhoods
5 and make sure that people have every
6 opportunity to get in front of it.

7 We all know that sometimes
8 people can be in denial about their
9 circumstances and run and like an ostrich
10 put their head in the sand and just hope
11 it goes away. But what we can do,
12 working with the City of Philadelphia,
13 with the Sheriff's Department, is get
14 ahead of it and send street teams to
15 knock on these people's doors and say,
16 This problem won't go away by itself, A.
17 B, there's some help for you. There are
18 programs that are designed and funded in
19 part by this body that can help you save
20 your home.

21 For my people who hug -- and
22 all my colleagues are good, but some of
23 them really hug the folks in jeopardy and
24 then some of them are more frugal and
25 want to count the taxpayers' money, and I

2 appreciate both of them, but this kind of
3 logic where we allow this to go on for a
4 \$6,400 bill, then we create a yearly
5 \$12,000 bill because they're homeless is
6 penny wise and pound foolish.

7 So I'm going to be bringing
8 more information to this body so we can
9 make credible decisions. I would
10 encourage every District Councilperson,
11 every District Councilperson to get a
12 breakdown of a map to see where it's
13 going down so you can do the outreach
14 necessary to save your constituents.

15 Thank you, Mr. Pres.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Gym.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
21 very much, Council President. One of the
22 most exciting things about coming into
23 this Council was being part of a body
24 that has worked tirelessly to lift the
25 floor for Philadelphia's most neediest

2 residents. That most especially includes
3 some of our workers and in particular
4 emphasizes the value of what it means to
5 support labor in this City.

6 We support labor, we support
7 the rights of working people, and we also
8 recognize that those things are not in
9 conflict with good business, that smart
10 business practices and taking care of
11 your employees go hand in hand, and many
12 businesses in this city already do that
13 and support it. And that's why I was
14 really -- I wanted to express my
15 gratitude to the Committee on Law and
16 Government, which this week reported out
17 favorably the fair workweek legislation.

18 Over 600 people came into City
19 Council -- into City Hall that Tuesday
20 afternoon to say that they stood for this
21 bill. That's quite a cross-section of
22 the City of Philadelphia.

23 I'm very grateful to all those
24 folks who stood up and to my eight
25 colleagues who are sponsors, to the

2 members of the Committee, and especially
3 Committee Chairman Bill Greenlee, who has
4 championed labor rights for working
5 people in Philadelphia throughout his
6 tenure.

7 But I expect that many of you
8 on this Council are going to get quite a
9 few calls in the coming weeks, and I want
10 my fellow colleagues to know that my door
11 is open and that we have put in a lot of
12 time into this bill.

13 The push for a fair workweek
14 began over a year ago when dozens of
15 organizations came together to form a
16 fair workweek coalition driven by the
17 real stories of working Philadelphians.
18 We heard from families about the ways
19 their unstable schedules hurt them, their
20 families, and their children, working
21 moms who incur childcare costs or lose
22 childcare subsidies because their shifts
23 and paychecks change so drastically from
24 week to week. I heard from a college
25 student who had to choose between staying

2 in school or working at the job that paid
3 for that school, and he dropped out. I
4 heard from families who can't predict
5 their rent or put food on the table
6 because they don't know how many hours
7 they'll work that week or because their
8 shifts get cut.

9 But we've also heard from
10 businesses. I've met with over 80
11 businesses. We've held business labor
12 roundtables, and we have changed and
13 edited and evolved this bill into its
14 current state. The bill that you will
15 see and that we'll debate over the coming
16 weeks has 61 substantive and technical
17 amendments to the bill. They reflect a
18 significant level of engagement from
19 businesses, which have not only been
20 heard, they've been at the table, and the
21 dozens of amendments that the Committee
22 accepted reflect the sincere respect,
23 engagement, and collaboration that our
24 office has demonstrated from the start.

25 It's important for folks to

2 recognize this bill only applies to
3 hourly workers who make below \$24,000 a
4 year. They cannot go above the federal
5 overtime limit. These are our lowest
6 wage workers. And in a country in
7 which -- or in our own city where we have
8 the lowest unemployment rate and poverty
9 has ingrained itself, it is important to
10 remember that incomes for the top 20
11 percent in Philadelphia are up 13
12 percent, and for the top 1 percent,
13 they've increased by over 32 percent
14 since 2010. We celebrate that, but at
15 the same time, incomes for the bottom 60
16 percent are the same or have lowered
17 since 2007.

18 While I cannot and this body
19 cannot lift the minimum wage for those
20 workers in this city, the next best thing
21 we can do is provide stable schedules
22 that are predictable and sensible both
23 for business and those workers through
24 the fair workweek legislation. Those
25 workers deserve it. They're asking for

2 it. They have come to us with their
3 stories, and I'm hoping that we can hear
4 them.

5 And as I said, all of this City
6 Council have been in circumstances where
7 we can't please everybody with a piece of
8 legislation. It's just not going to meet
9 everybody's needs. I am committed to
10 getting this legislation right, but I am
11 also committed to having this Council
12 body raise the floor for workers who
13 deserve so much more than they are
14 getting from the wealthiest and most
15 successful and largest businesses in the
16 nation.

17 This only applies to large
18 businesses, 250 employees, 30 locations
19 or more nationally. They can subsidize
20 and profit across locations. These
21 workers rely on their jobs day to day.

22 So I look forward to the
23 conversation. My door is open to all my
24 colleagues, and please feel free to reach
25 out.

3 President.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
8 Council President. I wanted to thank my
9 colleague Councilman Domb for giving us
10 an opportunity to really mourn the tragic
11 event that happened at the Tree of Life
12 Synagogue in Squirrel Hill, Pittsburgh.
13 Also I want to commend Councilman Henon
14 for his legislation regarding hate
15 crimes. It's something that we need to
16 do in the City. I'm glad he took the
17 leadership.

18 Also, following on a more
19 positive, less somber perspective, I want
20 to thank you, Council President, for your
21 leadership in creating the Philadelphia
22 Energy Authority. Over the past
23 literally two, two and a half weeks,
24 there have been a number of initiatives
25 that have come out of the Energy

2 Authority.

3 One, the Energy Authority
4 received about a \$1.25 million grant from
5 the federal government to enhance the
6 Solarize Philly program. Just recently
7 the Energy Authority, also working with
8 the Office of Sustainability and the
9 Philadelphia Gas Works, were able to
10 achieve and win the Bloomberg American
11 Cities Climate Challenge. We were part
12 of the second round of cities that were
13 selected, which will bring back \$2
14 million to the City of Philadelphia to
15 look at sustainable energy ideas for the
16 City of Philadelphia. And then just two
17 days ago, we launched, along with the
18 Energy Authority and the Philadelphia
19 Water Department and American Water, the
20 water sewer line protection program.
21 This is an initiative that I've been
22 looking at for some time when I worked
23 with Councilwoman Tasco. It's a program
24 that's in a number of cities around the
25 country with the National League of

2 Cities. I know Councilmember Brian
3 O'Neill has also been pushing this for a
4 number of years. And so at the
5 announcement a couple days ago, we
6 provided some more information.
7 Residents will be getting postcards and
8 also letters from my fellow District
9 Councilmember colleagues about this
10 program, and we'll be having a briefing
11 in the Caucus Room in a few moments after
12 Council to provide some more information
13 about this initiative.

14 The main point of this
15 initiative is that the average home in
16 the City of Philadelphia is about 88
17 years old, and when you think about if
18 you have a water or sewer line that gets
19 interrupted or gets impacted, you're
20 talking about thousands of dollars in
21 repair costs to your water or sewer line
22 that you need every day. This program
23 provides, for about \$8 a month, the
24 ability to have your water and sewer line
25 that is your responsibility protected.

2 We're also working with local contractors
3 in the City of Philadelphia to provide
4 them with the opportunity to work on
5 these repair bills.

6 So we'll be having a briefing
7 this afternoon immediately following
8 Council. If anyone under the sound of my
9 voice wants to sign up for this program,
10 they can always call American Water at
11 1-844-765-7260. Once again, that's
12 844-765-7260. They can also go to the
13 American Water website, which is
14 www.awrusa.com/philadelphia. That's
15 www.awrusa.com/philadelphia.

16 I look forward to working with
17 my Council colleagues and having the
18 briefing this afternoon in the Caucus
19 Room.

20 So thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman. That's a great
23 program.

24 The Chair recognizes
25 Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 Anthony Monteiro, Michael Coard,

8 Year of the DuBois, and they've come out
9 with the mid-year assessment, and we want
10 to say that we are just honored to try to
11 be a part of this part of our history for
12 all that they do, and we are just honored
13 that they've come today and to receive
14 this information.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown. You want to
20 speak?

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Please.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
23 please.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: This
25 morning I rise to give a shout-out and a

2 congratulations to Attorney General Josh
3 Shapiro. He conducted a year-long search
4 to find someone to be brutally honest
5 about the diversity of the Attorney
6 General's Office. He made a commitment
7 to hiring people of color and women.
8 However, when he arrived, he saw it was
9 not reflected on their website. He,
10 therefore, hired Ebony Caldwell as the
11 first Officer of Diversity and Inclusion
12 since the formation of the office in
13 1683.

14 He has taken diversity from,
15 quote, "nice to have" to an agency
16 priority. Since 2016, his 2016 election,
17 our Attorney General has hired
18 three-fifths of his executive staffers
19 are now female and includes members of
20 the LGBTQ community. More specifically,
21 16 percent of all his new hires are
22 people of color. Women hires have
23 increased by 8 percent.

24 The new Director of Diversity
25 and Inclusion comes with her own

2 experiences that have informed why she
3 believes in Josh Shapiro's demand, as she
4 was one of the very few African American
5 students at Fredonia State University in
6 New York where she then left and dropped
7 out because she felt isolated and without
8 a place because of who she is, a black
9 female.

10 Before serving as Officer of
11 Diversity and Inclusion in the PA AG's
12 Office, she worked as the Affirmative
13 Action Coordinator at Monroe University
14 in New York City.

15 So I want to say thank you,
16 Attorney General Shapiro, for honoring
17 the commitment made. Thank you for
18 seeking to change the culture there at
19 the Attorney General's Office that's been
20 that way for centuries. And Attorney
21 General Shapiro and Caldwell believe as I
22 do, and research which tells us, that,
23 quote, "non-homogenous groups are simply
24 smarter together."

25 So when you work with people

2 that are different than you and bring
3 different experiences, they push your
4 thinking. The paradigm is shifting,
5 Mr. President, and the good news is that
6 the world is changing.

7 Thank you.
