23 BISHOP ROBINSON: Let us bow
24 our heads in the word of prayer.

25 Eternal God and Father, we

1 11/15/18 - STATED - APPROVAL OF JOURNAL

2 We will now move forward with
3 the approval of the Journal and the
4 meeting of Thursday, November 21, 2018,
5 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Greenlee.

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
8 you, Mr. President. I move that the
9 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
10 November 1st, 2018 be approved.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you. It has been moved and
14 properly seconded.

15 All those in favor say aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it, and the Journal is
22 approved.

23 Our next order of business is
24 requests for leaves of absence, and the
25 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. There are no requests of
4 leave of absence today.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair thanks the gentleman.

7 The Chair now recognizes
8 Councilman Oh.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
10 much, Council President. On behalf of
11 the minority, there are no requests for
12 leave of absence.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 Chair thanks the gentleman.

15 At this time, I would like to
16 dispense with the regular order of
17 business and I would like to thank
18 everyone who has come down to witness
19 their government in action today. We
20 genuinely hope that you have a day that's
21 knowledgeable and also pleasurable, so
22 much so that you come again. So, again,
23 thank you so much for being here today.

24 At this time, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will

2 present a resolution recognizing The
3 Links. Would Presidents Caroline
4 DeMarco, Linda Meade, Mahlene Lee, and
5 those accompanying them please join the
6 Councilwoman at the podium.

7 (Councilmembers and guests
8 approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 I think we would need all members of
11 Council.

12 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
13 morning, everyone. To those of you who
14 are seated in the Chambers and to those
15 of you who are watching at home, it is a
16 distinct honor and privilege for this
17 City Council of Philadelphia to honor an
18 organization whose very founding is in
19 tune with that of our nation, in that it
20 has great roots right here in our
21 wonderful City of Philadelphia.

22 It is with that in mind that I
23 am reminded of a conversation that took
24 place two years ago to the left of where
25 I am standing right now with Councilwoman

2 Blondell Reynolds Brown, Stephanie Marsh,
3 and Evelyn Sample-Oates about an article
4 that was written about individuals and
5 organizations who did not understand the
6 very structure of national African
7 American fraternal and sorority
8 organizations. And at that time, we
9 said, well, people don't understand that.
10 Although we have these national
11 organizations, there are very distinct
12 chapters, and each chapter is very proud
13 of its work.

14 So on today, it is an honor to
15 recognize The Links, Incorporated and
16 very specifically the founding
17 Philadelphia Chapter, the Delaware Valley
18 Chapter, along with the Penn Towne
19 Chapter.

20 Now, it is with that in mind --
21 and I have a list of people who I have to
22 recognize, and I know you all will grant
23 us some leeway here, but we must start
24 with those who have a direct connection
25 with this legislative body and, that is,

2 and two of them are no longer with us,
3 but the late Councilwoman Ethel Allen,
4 along with that great one, Gussie Clark;
5 our Marian Tasco, the boss lady who acts
6 like she's retired but she still tells
7 everybody what to do; Morgan Cephas,
8 where are you, Morgan Cephas, who our
9 Council President acknowledged.

10 Another connection to the City
11 is Dominique Casimir. People don't know
12 that Dominique Casimir and our Public
13 Property has one of the most challenging
14 positions in the City of Philadelphia
15 behind the scenes that people don't know
16 about, and we're proud of you, Dominique.

17 In addition to that, Doris.
18 Doris Smith, where are you, Link Doris
19 Smith? Doris Smith, who is the Chair of
20 our Civil Service Commission.

21 In addition to that, we need
22 to -- and I hope she's standing somewhere
23 where everyone can see her, because she
24 should be. She made history in 1983 when
25 her husband became the first African

2 American Mayor of our great city, but we
3 all know that beside every great man who
4 does a great thing, there's a very, very
5 great and strong woman. Where is First
6 Lady Velma Goode? Thank you. Give her a
7 round of applause, please.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And you
10 also know she is the mother of Councilman
11 Wilson Goode.

12 Next I want to acknowledge a
13 lady -- and I didn't know this until we
14 were researching this, and in the end,
15 I'm going to tell you why this is
16 important to acknowledge; that is, Link
17 Julie Coker Graham. Julie, where are
18 you? Julie, why don't you just come up
19 front, because someone at home needs to
20 see you. There's a young girl at home
21 who needs to see this.

22 Link Julie Coker Graham is the
23 President and CEO of the Philadelphia
24 Convention and Visitors Bureau. Now, in
25 prep for this presentation, I wanted to

2 know, well, how many are there like you,
3 Julie Coker in the nation. Councilwoman
4 Reynolds Brown, you know that there are
5 over 900 convention and visitor bureaus
6 in the United States and there are only
7 three African American female presidents.
8 That's Philadelphia; Alexandria,
9 Virginia; and Newark. However, Link
10 Julie Coker Graham is the only African
11 American woman president in a large
12 metropolitan city and the largest in the
13 nation. Hard work.

14 Thank you, Link Julie. Thank
15 you. Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Now we
18 want to make sure that we acknowledge our
19 current Vice President of the
20 Philadelphia Chapter, Link Leah Smith
21 Sheppard. And I want you -- you can hold
22 your applause until I get through them
23 all. My colleagues will start hitting me
24 in the back of the head.

25 Next from the Penn Towne

2 Chapter is the President of Judges in the
3 Court of Common Pleas; that is, the
4 Honorable Sheila Woods-Skipper. And a
5 lady who we all know. I tell people I am
6 a graduate of the School District of
7 Philadelphia. I remind them that I'm a
8 graduate of the Dr. Constance E. Clayton
9 School District of Philadelphia from the
10 Penn Towne Chapter.

11 And from the Delaware Valley
12 Chapter, we have Veronica Hill-Milbourne.
13 She is a Councilwoman in Horsham Township
14 and is a chain. Federal Law Judge,
15 Frederica Massiah-Jackson, Court of
16 Common Pleas, Past President Judge.
17 Cheryl Bullock, where are you? Cheryl
18 Bullock acts like she's retired too from
19 U.S. Senator Casey's office, but she is
20 also the Delaware Valley Vice President.

21 Leslie Graves. Leslie Graves,
22 I need to make an appointment. You know
23 what I'm talking about. Delaware Valley
24 Correspondent Secretary. And Dominique
25 we mentioned.

2 In addition to that, with the
3 School District of Philadelphia, and
4 you've seen her here quite often, she's
5 usually here every week, and anything
6 that we have to do relative to the School
7 District of Philadelphia, it all -- and I
8 really do mean it all. It doesn't matter
9 what time of the day it is. We call my
10 sponsor, Evelyn Sample-Oates. Give her a
11 round of applause, please.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: My
14 colleagues will talk about the history of
15 the organization, but I now want to
16 introduce the presidents so that when
17 they do speak at the end of the
18 presentation, you will at least know
19 something about them.

20 There is Link Caroline DeMarco,
21 who is President of the Penn Towne
22 Chapter. Link Caroline is currently the
23 Vice President for Selling and Marketing
24 Excellence in Customer Capabilities and
25 Operations at GlaxoSmithKline where she

2 has amassed over 25 years of management
3 and leadership experience. During this
4 time and in other various capacities
5 within GlaxoSmithKline, she was
6 responsible -- and please pay
7 attention -- for the direct and indirect
8 contract sales of over \$5 billion.

9 Link Caroline is a graduate of
10 Howard University. And now I know there
11 are some loyal Olympics fans who are
12 watching, and when you see her -- are you
13 somewhere where people can see you? Just
14 move up a bit. Someone saying, wait, her
15 face looks so familiar. You're right.
16 Link Caroline was selected by the GSK
17 Commercial Executive Team and the 2002
18 Olympic Committee to serve as a torch
19 bearer for the 2002 Winter Games Torch
20 Relay right here in Philadelphia. That's
21 our Penn Towne Chapter President.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Link
24 Linda Wormley Meade, if you could now
25 just move a little closer so that people

3 And my colleague Councilwoman
4 Blondell Reynolds Brown reminds me that
5 the apple doesn't fall far from the tree.
6 You know, Joe Meade, Link Linda Wormley
7 Meade's son, was on her staff.

8 Link Linda is a co-founder and
9 principal in the Epsilon Group LLC, an
10 educational consulting firm that
11 contracts with several local non-profits.
12 She has also served with distinction for
13 over 40 years as a veteran educator and
14 administrator in both public and higher
15 education. And long before it became
16 popular, and I wanted to note this for
17 the record, Link Linda was on the front
18 line of the battle to acquire funding for
19 what was then called the
20 out-of-school-time movement, but now we
21 call it the push for after-school
22 programming. That led to her membership
23 in the Pennsylvania School Youth
24 Development Network.

25 Now, there's someone here who

2 is also saying, I am familiar with the
3 history of Lincoln University and I know
4 that name, Linda Wormley Meade. Well, if
5 you're thinking that, you too would be
6 correct. She is the Linda Wormley Meade
7 who is the trailblazing and chartering
8 leadership development specialist on
9 Lincoln's campus who helped pave the way
10 for many young women pursuing academic
11 excellence at Lincoln University, my alma
12 mater. She holds certificates and
13 degrees from Lincoln, Temple, and
14 Marywood Universities. In addition to
15 that, her husband, connecting Link Meade
16 is here. Dr. Meade, where are you?
17 Raise your hand so people can see our
18 connecting Links. Hello.

19 And in addition to that, I want
20 to get to our next President, Dr. Mahlene
21 Duckett Lee. Where are you, Dr. Mahlene?
22 Link Mahlene is the co-founder and
23 current President and CEO of Divi Holding
24 Company, which specializes in
25 organizational engineering. She is --

2 and listen to this -- six Sigma-trained
3 and an expert in systems analysis who
4 advises clients in both the public and
5 private sectors on strategic planning and
6 implementation, program development, and
7 change management. She is also a veteran
8 educator and administrator in both public
9 and higher education. She holds degrees
10 and certificates from Cheyney University,
11 Antioch College, Penn State, and MIT.
12 Yes, I just said MIT, for the record. In
13 addition to that, Link Mahlene, your
14 father was?

15 DR. LEE: A Philadelphia Star
16 of the Negro League.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: In
18 addition to that, in addition to that,
19 talk about legacy, she is an athlete in
20 her own right in the area -- Councilman
21 Curtis Jones is here -- in track and
22 field.

23 And so I want you to give our
24 three Presidents a round of applause.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Now we

3 will start with our resolution

4 presentation. It's a resolution

5 recognizing and honoring members of The

6 Links, Incorporated's Philadelphia,

7 Delaware Valley, and Penn Towne Chapters.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: The Links,

9 Incorporated, an international

10 not-for-profit corporation, was conceived

11 when a small group of friends in 1946,

12 led by co-founders Sara Strickland Scott

13 and Margaret Hawkins of Philadelphia,

14 organized a service-oriented women's club

15 in the aftermath of World War II. Today,

16 their visionary actions have expanded

17 from a modest group of nine women to a

18 membership of more than 15,000 women of

19 color -- I would say 15,000 dynamic,

20 exceptional women of color -- in 288

21 chapters located in 42 states, the

22 District of Columbia, the Bahamas, and

23 the United Kingdom.

24 Councilman.

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,

2 The Links, Incorporated is one of the
3 nation's oldest and largest volunteer
4 service organizations of extraordinary
5 women who are committed to enriching,
6 sustaining, and ensuring the culture and
7 economic survival of African Americans
8 and other persons of African ancestry;
9 and

10 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: The City
11 of Brotherly Love and, as Councilwoman
12 Blondell Reynolds Brown, Sisterly
13 Effectiveness -- a powerhouse of women
14 here. Congratulations.

15 Whereas, The Links, Inc.'s Core
16 Values are Friendship, Integrity,
17 Honesty, Service, Commitment, Family
18 Relationships, Courage, Respect for Self
19 and Others, Legacy, Confidentiality,
20 Responsibility, and Accountability; and

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
22 Links members contribute more than one
23 million documented hours of community
24 service annually, strengthening their
25 communities and enhancing the nation.

2 The organization is the recipient of
3 awards from the United Nations
4 Association of New York and the Leon H.
5 Sullivan Foundation for its premier
6 programs; and

7 Whereas, the outstanding
8 programming of The Links, Inc. has five
9 facets which include Services to Youth,
10 The Arts, National Trends and Services,
11 International Trends and Services, and
12 Health and Human Services. The programs
13 are implemented through strategies such
14 as public information and education,
15 economic development, and public policy
16 campaigns; and

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I'm just
18 going to take a moment of point of
19 personal privilege to bring you greetings
20 on behalf of my sister, your fellow Link,
21 Dr. Valerie Green-Amos, the President of
22 the Harbor Area Chapter of the Links, and
23 congratulations on your anniversary.

24 I had to do that or I would
25 hear it at home or from California.

2 Whereas, the Philadelphia
3 Chapter of The Links recognizes the
4 importance of its legacy as the founding
5 chapter and strives to maintain a level
6 of excellence and commitment to the
7 Philadelphia Community that comes with
8 that responsibility; and

9 Whereas, over 30 years ago, the
10 Philadelphia Chapter adopted the M. Hall
11 Stanton School. Then Mayor Wilson Goode
12 helped make the adoption ceremony quite
13 an event for the School District and the
14 City. The school remained a part of the
15 Chapter's programming until its closing;
16 and

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
18 the Philadelphia Chapter is proud to have
19 among its membership the first African
20 American First Lady of the City of
21 Philadelphia, Link Alumna Velma W. Goode,
22 who has been a member for 35 years. She
23 spearheaded the creation of the Sarah
24 Scott Academic Scholarship, which has
25 supported numerous girls since its

2 creation in 1994. She also served as
3 Secretary, Treasurer, and Vice President
4 of the Chapter; and

5 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

6 Whereas, over the past five decades, the
7 Delaware Valley Chapter's membership has
8 grown to over 50 members who have
9 instituted programming that includes, but
10 is not limited to voter registration,
11 education drives, anti-bullying
12 curriculum development, supplementary art
13 education workshops, refurbishment of
14 historic buildings on the National
15 Registry of the Underground Railroad, and
16 health screenings. The Delaware Valley
17 Chapter also provides assistance to
18 historically black colleges and
19 universities, specifically Cheyney
20 University and Lincoln University in the
21 Philadelphia region, through career
22 employability workshops and emergency
23 grants in aid; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

25 Whereas, the Philadelphia Chapter

2 currently supports many initiatives
3 throughout the City, but its focus is on
4 the following programs: One, a
5 partnership with the Paul Robeson High
6 School for Human Services, with a
7 four-year biweekly program that began in
8 2015 with a cohort of then 9th grade
9 female students; two, a partnership with
10 the Salvation Army of Greater
11 Philadelphia in the adoption of a "safe
12 house" for women wanting to escape from
13 human trafficking and sex exploitation;
14 and, three, the awarding of scholarships
15 each year in the name of the founders and
16 donations of historically black colleges
17 and universities; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
19 the Delaware Valley Chapter of The Links,
20 Incorporated was officially chartered and
21 installed on November 21st, 1964 under
22 the sponsorship of the Founding
23 Philadelphia Chapter and became the
24 second Links chapter in the Greater
25 Philadelphia Metro Area. The 11 founding

2 members directed their programming to
3 expand community outreach to the Links'
4 facets to underserved people of African
5 ancestry living in Philadelphia,
6 Delaware, Bucks, Chester, and Montgomery
7 Counties; and

8 Whereas, one of the biggest
9 events run by The Links, Incorporated is
10 an annual food packaging project formally
11 known as STOP Hunger Now. The event is
12 hosted by the Delaware Valley Chapter,
13 and other Chapters also participate. To
14 date, Links have packaged over 100,000
15 meals to combat hunger in developing
16 nations in the Caribbean and Africa; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
18 Penn Towne Chapter of The Links, Inc. was
19 chartered in Philadelphia on September
20 6th, 1975 by 25 dynamic friends and is
21 known for its dynamic programming,
22 fundraising acumen, and its dedication to
23 improving opportunities for women and
24 youth; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

2 the Penn Towne Chapter is currently
3 composed of over 60 remarkable women who
4 are most well known for their strategic
5 alliance with Methodist Services, where
6 they provide programming on healthcare --

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: --
8 self-care, parenting skills,
9 anti-bullying, and promoting healthy diet
10 and exercise for women and children, and
11 their Together for West Philadelphia
12 Initiative is in partnership with
13 Methodist Services and Lankenau Hospital.

14 And we were talking in the
15 back. Hey, men, we better keep up.

16 Whereas

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, the
18 members of The Links, Inc. are
19 influential decision-makers and opinion
20 leaders. The Links, Inc. has attracted
21 many distinguished women who are
22 individual achievers and have made a
23 difference in their communities and the
24 world. There are business and civic
25 leaders, role models, mentors, activists,

2 volunteers who work toward common visions
3 by engaging like-minded organizations and
4 individuals for partnerships; and,
5 therefore, be it

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Come on,
7 Councilman Squilla.

8 Someone read his lines. We're
9 going to split this line.

10 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA AND
11 COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, by the Council
12 of the City of Philadelphia that we
13 hereby recognize and honor the members of
14 The Links, Incorporated Philadelphia,
15 Delaware Valley, and Penn Towne Chapters.

16 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And I wore
17 my green for The Links.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Further
20 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
21 resolution shall be presented to The
22 Links, Incorporated's Philadelphia,
23 Delaware Valley, and Penn Towne Chapters
24 as evidence of the sincere sentiments of
25 this legislative body.

2 The resolution was introduced
3 by Councilmembers Parker, Green, and
4 Reynolds Brown, supported by all members
5 of Council. And I do need to ask you to
6 give a huge round of applause for my
7 colleagues, especially the guys who
8 responded to the green SOS in the middle
9 of the night.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: As a
12 matter of personal privilege -- and so,
13 listen, two people have arrived,
14 connecting Link Kelvin Johnson is here,
15 along with heir Link, Joe Meade is here.
16 Don't duck, Joe Meade. We see you.

17 In addition to that, I wanted
18 to just say for the record -- and I know
19 my colleagues, both the men and the
20 women, will appreciate this -- about two
21 weeks ago, we were out in the community
22 and I had a chance to speak to some young
23 women who came from the Hill-Freedman
24 World Academy School, and they asked a
25 question that you don't expect to

3 that is, how do you do your job --
4 because my son, Langston, who is six, was
5 with me. How do you do your job and be a

10 and all of that, but what I did tell them
11 is that you do it by having a strong
12 village and a strong network.

13 The network that you see
14 standing here today and in particular
15 someone who we did not acknowledge
16 earlier, but for each and every one of us
17 standing here, she's played a role in
18 helping us to not only get here, but has
19 been a corporate leader, a mentor, and is
20 currently the President of the Blue Cross
21 Foundation. Where is Reverend Dr. Lorina
22 Marshall-Blake? Where are you, Rini?

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: In
25 addition to that, I want to say to you

14 Presidents DeMarco, Meade, and Lee for
15 remarks.

16 MS. DeMARCO: Thank you so
17 much. It is such an honor and a
18 privilege, and these are truly some
19 wonder women and they truly are a
20 village, and what I love about these
21 women -- and I just can't say enough.
22 Thank you so much, thank you so much,
23 Cherelle Parker, because you made all
24 this happen. We started this two years
25 ago, so I'm so grateful. But these

3 service for at least 48 hours. I know
4 some of you are like it's a whole lot

10 community. And I'm so proud and I'm so
11 honored and I'm so humbled to have this
12 recognition for our beloved Links,
13 Incorporated, for Penn Towne, and it is
14 just an honor. And I thank you, Council
15 President. Thank you so much, Link
16 Cherelle. I so appreciate it. And to my
17 Link sisters, fellow Presidents, thank
18 you.

19 MS. MEADE: First of all, good
20 morning, everyone. I was given a
21 direction by my double sister, Cherelle
22 Parker, to have words to deliver today,
23 and so I followed the script. I'm going
24 to make it short, however.

25 To Council President Darrell

5 citizens so assembled, I'm Linda Wormley
6 Meade, President of the Delaware Valley

8 I humbly and honorably accept
9 the resolution and recognition from this
10 renowned legislative body on behalf of
11 our Chapter's 70-plus intergenerational
12 members and our 11 visionary charter
13 members.

14 Like our founding Philadelphia
15 Chapter, Delaware Valley was forged in
16 reaction to society factors that
17 suppressed the economic, educational, and
18 social progress of the African American
19 community. Turning back the clock to the
20 1960's, 11 members living in the
21 Philadelphia metropolitan area witnessed
22 and lived under the yolk of racial
23 discrimination and segregation in
24 education, housing, and the denial of
25 economic job opportunities. In response,

2 across this nation African Americans
3 mobilized into self-advocacy
4 organizations to break down these
5 barriers and gain equality through civil
6 rights. It was thus into this
7 environment that in 1961, Gertrude Taylor
8 and her ten friends, believing that there

10 sponsorship and appealed to the
11 Philadelphia Links for a charter.

12 Since that time, over the past
13 five decades, Delaware Valley has adopted
14 the mission of Linkdom to enrich,
15 sustain, and ensure the cultural and
16 economic survival of African Americans
17 and other people of African ancestry.
18 Delaware Valley's membership has expanded
19 from those 11 members, who were teachers,
20 social workers, and health professionals,
21 to 70 women with such varied careers as
22 doctors, dentists, lawyers, CEOs, CFOs,
23 entrepreneurs, politicians, and even
24 elected officials.

25 I bring up the fact that within

3 served in our chapter. Of course,
4 there's previously mentioned the
5 Honorable Marian Tasco, who I'm sure can
6 wave her hand somewhere, and I know she's
7 looking down and smiling upon us, Link
8 Augustus Clark, Honorable Link Augustus
9 Clark.

10 Our past presidents have
11 included such distinguished women as
12 Judge Frederica Massiah-Jackson of the
13 Common Pleas Court and Dr. Ann G.
14 Waiters, Superintendent of the William
15 Penn School District.

16 Our chapter's history has been
17 replete with examples of ambitious
18 programming, novel projects, and
19 award-winning initiatives.

20 Presently the climate of our
21 nation has created and emboldened the
22 rise of bigotry and racial hostilities.
23 This has motivated our members to realize
24 that our efforts must proceed with
25 greater zeal and passion to ensure

2 justice for all future generations. As
3 Links, we are prepared to pursue our
4 mission and partner with members of the
5 Philadelphia City Council and all
6 like-minded individuals and organizations
7 in this campaign for civility, fairness,

9 Again, thank you for your
10 recognition and of our commitment to
11 community service. And, Delaware Valley,
12 we are the chapter that's on the move.

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 DR. LEE: Good morning. I'm
16 Mahlene Duckett-Lee and I am honored to
17 be the President of the Philadelphia
18 Chapter of The Links, Incorporated,
19 which, as you have heard this morning, is
20 the founding chapter of The Links.

21 I just want to thank
22 Councilwoman Cherelle and I want to
23 acknowledge our First Lady, our former
24 First Lady, Velma Goode, who are both
25 members of the Philadelphia Chapter. And

11 and bond with all Link members across the
12 nation and now, as you have heard, across
13 the ocean. The most recent chapter or
14 one of the most recent chapters to be
15 chartered into the organization is in the
16 United kingdom. And just as here in our
17 country, the women there are dynamic.
18 They're leaders of the country. They
19 serve in government as well as in
20 business and all occupations that you
21 have heard represented within our group.

22 We have, as all Links have
23 done, we have committed to doing the best
24 that we can for our community. I'm a
25 native Philadelphian, so I'm very much

3 that are part of our city, and I'm also
4 aware of some of the challenges that the

20 (Council at ease.)

22 Thank you. I'd like to recognize a group
23 of lobbyists, a special group. The Chair

10 contributions to the students of the
11 Overbrook School for the Blind.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

18 also was epileptic, could have used those
19 kinds of medications to be an alternative
20 to some of the things she was forced to
21 take. I get that. But conversely, when
22 you start talking about the availability
23 of those services in impacted areas that
24 have issues like parking, like issues
25 like security, that requires local input.

16 justice reform in our state.

17 Criminal laws are state laws.
18 Stewart Greenleaf, a former prosecutor,
19 has introduced 20 bills over the course
20 of his career that deal with criminal
21 justice. At the end of his career, he's
22 introduced three bills that passed on
23 October 24th of this year. The first is
24 a Safe Harbor bill -- well, he has
25 introduced and passed three bills. The

2 Safe Harbor bill prevents the prosecution
3 of child victims of human trafficking and
4 sexual exploitation for crimes that they
5 were forced to commit.

6 Post-conviction DNA testing has
7 been expanded under his latest bill based
8 on new technology that makes DNA testing
9 more accurate.

10 And, finally, he was able to
11 extend Post-Conviction Relief Act for
12 newly discovered evidence from the very
13 short time of 60 days to one year.

14 I wish it were more than one
15 year. I don't think there should be any
16 time limit to newly discovered evidence,
17 but it was -- it only got out of the
18 State Senate by one vote and then passed
19 the House. There is no city or county
20 that will benefit greater than
21 Philadelphia for this type of just
22 criminal reform.

22 Second Reading and Final Passage
23 Calendars.

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
25 Mr. Chairman. The following resolutions

25 wishing to speak, we will hold faithfully

3 When you begin speaking, you

15 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

19 This is an official decree of the people

20 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as

21 such, requires immediate action and

22 remedy.

23 Every week, this Council,

24 Mayor, Governor, and others transfer

25 private property to the government,

3 As we celebrate veterans, let
4 us not forget in 1775 in this very cradle
5 of liberty, the Army was formed. The
6 people had enough of the abuse of
7 government. The people realized that

10 being stolen and unfair taxes were being
11 levied, resulting in the Declaration of
12 Independence.

13 In honor of these first
14 veterans, the people must rededicate
15 ourselves to prosecute any in government
16 that violate oath, Constitution, and law.

17 Veterans give their last
18 measure to keep the people free and
19 protect the people against all threats,
20 foreign and domestic. Would veterans
21 volunteer to serve overseas knowing their
22 government was stealing their neighbor's
23 home?

24 Justice Brandeis predicted
25 crime is contagious. If the government

6 The constitutions require

10 to act or face prison.

11 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
12 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
13 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
14 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
15 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
16 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
17 14-4056 appear violated.

18 I call on the federal and
19 Commonwealth governments to perform their
20 constitutional obligations to investigate
21 and prosecute all involved in the theft
22 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
23 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

24 The denial of God-given 42 USC
25 1982 property rights for 24 years is

2 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
3 and requires immediate remedy.

4 A just government must obey the
5 rule of law. This color of law
6 government must have its Charter to
7 govern revoked until a constitutionally

10 duty to act any more than a fireman can
11 refuse to fight a fire. The sovereign
12 people require oath, law, and
13 constitutions be enforced, and jail is
14 required for all who violate oath,
15 Constitution or law.

16 I remind Council, it takes a
17 lot of cooperation to create and allow
18 monumental corruption.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

21 Mr. Decker, before you read the next
22 speaker, the Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

24 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
25 you, Mr. Chair. I want to be recorded as

20 colleagues. I stand here -- my name is
21 Emmanuel Bussie speaking for the record.
22 I'm a Different Kind of Democrat. I
23 speak for 61 community activists and
24 community leaders throughout the City.

25 I'm in support of the bill to

9 for Bobby Henon and Bill Green, but your

10 budget is a reflection of your priority.

11 I know you guys heard that a million

12 times. We rely on you, our elected

13 Councilpeople, to be our voice. We

14 really don't expect Bobby Henon to be the

15 voice of brown people. We really don't

16 expect Al Taubenberger to be the voice of

17 brown people and black people. We don't

18 expect it, but we do expect in North

19 Philadelphia for Curtis Jones to be a

20 strong voice for black and brown people.

21 In North Philadelphia, in West

22 Philadelphia, we expect Kenyatta Johnson

23 to be a strong voice for black and brown

24 people.

25 We are going to, as Councilman

2 Jones alluded to, we're going to look to
3 you guys to be, no matter what bills or
4 laws get passed through the state or fed,
5 we're going to look to you guys to be
6 your champions and our voice in Council

9 If you take, for example, the
10 critical issues in our city, right?
11 Housing, jobs, and public safety. Every
12 day that I come here and you guys don't
13 address one of those three, to me you're
14 kind of not doing what we expect you to
15 do. Who addresses the critical issues in
16 our city, if not you? If not you, who?
17 Right?

18 You take the homicide rate in
19 2017, it topped 2013, '14, '15, '16. And
20 at 292, the homicide rate right now in
21 '18 will top that deadly year. Who
22 addresses that?

23 You have the ability, Council,
24 to solve the critical issues in our city.
25 All you got to do is make up your mind,

2 right? All you got to do is decide that
3 I can as a body solve the critical
4 systemic issues that face our city. You
5 can do this, right? It just takes you
6 changing your mind to do it. You can
7 change this city by just changing your

10 that, then how? How?

11 You take the \$20 million that's
12 allocated for housing. Just take that
13 for example. 20 million a year, hundred
14 million dollars over the next five years.
15 That's less than a half of a penny of
16 every dollar spent on our budget. So how
17 can you say to me that that's addressing
18 the critical issue when you only
19 allocated a half of a penny to address
20 it?

21 If you got a problem in your
22 house, you're not going to address a half
23 a penny of every dollar you spend to
24 address it. This is what we call -- this
25 is what we would like for you to do, to

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Oh.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
17 much, Council President. I want to again
18 thank our Council body for taking on
19 critical issues. We passed a resolution
20 urging the State Legislature to amend the
21 Post-Conviction Relief Act so that when
22 new evidence is discovered after 60 days
23 or after a year, thanks to State Senator
24 Stewart Greenleaf, that the evidence can
25 be reviewed by a court of law.

2 Unfortunately for Eric Riddick,
3 who has spent 26 and a half years in
4 jail, the evidence that became known over
5 the course of these 26 years will not be
6 considered by a court of law, will not be
7 looked at by a judge, and the court
8 itself has criticized the PCRA. That
9 left us with the only option of filing a
10 petition for a pardon from the Board of
11 Pardons and the Governor of Pennsylvania.

12 I've included on everyone's
13 desk a copy of that petition with the
14 evidence. I am urging the Governor and
15 the Board of Pardons to consider the
16 evidence, let the evidence speak for
17 itself. And I am happy to report that I
18 had a very productive conversation with
19 Lieutenant Governor Michael Stack, who
20 will bring this before the Pardons Board,
21 and we shall see what happens.

22 The problem is, it takes
23 between two and three years for a
24 petition to even be looked at by the
25 Board of Pardons. And when asked that

2 this be expedited, the response has been
3 they are not able to expedite because
4 they have to take it in the order filed.
5 They don't have enough manpower to look
6 at these petitions in a timely fashion.

7 What I have tried to present
8 is, pardons are for people who are
9 guilty. They're guilty and they're
10 asking for a pardon. They are not
11 supposed to be innocent people in prison
12 and, therefore, there is no avenue for
13 evidence of innocence to be considered
14 outside of this pardon process or a
15 filing of a federal habeas corpus.

16 So with that, the pardon
17 process, we are urging that the Pardon
18 Board look at the evidence. If they find
19 that the evidence indicates that the
20 person petitioning is not guilty, to
21 expedite that so that person is released
22 from prison.

23 Thank you.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. I want to simply say
8 thank you to the members of this body for
9 supporting the resolution honoring the
10 election of Shirley Chisholm as our
11 country's first African American female
12 Congresswoman. With last week's historic
13 midterm elections, it is imperative to
14 look back at all of the sisters whose
15 shoulders we stand upon, because clearly
16 there was a seismic shift on November
17 6th.

18 For the first time, women are
19 going to be more than represented in our
20 United States Congress. In fact, 101
21 women were elected to serve in Congress
22 for the first time ever. More than a
23 dozen states will add women to their
24 House delegations, including the
25 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which used

2 to have the grade of a D plus when it
3 comes to women being elected to Congress.
4 Now we have four, having moved from the
5 point of zero.

6 Councilman Jones, you're well
7 aware that Ilhan Omar and Rashida Tlaib
8 are the first two Muslim women going to
9 Congress, and Deb Haaland and Sharice
10 Davids will be the first two Native
11 American Congresswomen going to Congress.

12 Councilwoman Sanchez, if she
13 were here, would be delighted to know
14 that Veronica Escobar and Sylvia Garcia
15 will be the first two Hispanic
16 Congresswomen going there from Texas.
17 And then we have Alexandria
18 Ocasio-Cortez, who will be the youngest
19 woman elected to Congress at the tender
20 age of 29. Ayanna Pressley will be the
21 first black Congresswoman from
22 Massachusetts. She's fabulous. Johana
23 Hayes will be the first black woman from
24 Connecticut. We now have 35 women headed
25 to the freshmen class of Congress.

2 Last Wednesday morning at 8:00
3 a.m., my daughter called me from a
4 conference in New York City asking me a
5 variety of questions about the election.
6 She said, So what happened in Florida?
7 And what really happened in Georgia?
8 Does she get a recount? And what about
9 Texas? My reply today is different than
10 it was last Wednesday when I thought we'd
11 lost all three states to conservative
12 politicians with hateful agendas. Today
13 my reply is that we lost Texas. We were
14 optimistic. But the fight continues in
15 Florida and Georgia. We went from blood
16 red states possibly to purple states.

17 Today we're not accepting any
18 more underhanded attempts to suppress
19 voters. Voters showed up and showed out.
20 Today we have a reason for optimism,
21 because the balance of power is back in
22 play.

23 And so in closing, we need to
24 say a huge thank you to those across the
25 Commonwealth who showed up, particularly

2 here in Philadelphia where we had a 51
3 percent gubernatorial General Election
4 turnout, the highest it has been since
5 1994, where we only beat -- where we beat
6 that by one percentage point. A huge
7 thank you to Philadelphia voters,

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
14 you, Mr. President. I certainly agree
15 with all that Councilwoman Blondell
16 Reynolds Brown has said.

17 I'd also like to note that
18 Councilman Oh has done an excellent job
19 in fighting for this young man, Eric
20 Riddick. I remember when he was born.
21 And I commend him for that and as well as
22 Maria for talking about Joanna McClinton.
23 As you all know, she's also a preacher
24 and a lawyer. So she comes well
25 qualified. Her mother is a preacher too

3 has undertaken, and we congratulate her
4 for moving up already as she is in the

6 I also want to note that we put
7 envelopes on each desk for NACA,

10 information because it reminds me,
11 Mr. President, of a trip we took with you
12 to talk about help for homeowners, and
13 this is information -- and we have more
14 if you need it -- that will allow people
15 to get mortgage pre-approvals. Those
16 with low credit scores and low income can
17 get information. And from November 29th
18 to December 2nd, it's right in our area.
19 And we are just honored that we have a
20 chance to at the Convention Center give
21 out information for our citizens to help
22 them become homeowners.

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
7 Council President. I just have a few
8 comments. Last year myself as the Chair
9 of the Council Committee on Disabilities
10 and my colleague Councilman Al
11 Taubenberger participated in the Special
12 Olympics polar plunge. That is coming up
13 again this year on November 30th at
14 Drexel University at 1 o'clock. I will
15 be plunging once again. I hope other
16 colleagues will join me in the polar
17 plunge for the great cause. Last year we
18 had the Philly's GM, Gabe Kapler. This
19 year the new Sixers GM, Elton Brand, will

22 Two, I want to thank my

10 process going to next year.

11 I just want to remind those who

12 are listening that as you recycle, make

13 sure your products are empty, clean, and

23 elections, and elections have
24 consequences, and as a result of our
25 current President's decisions on trade

3 of food, a surplus of food here in the
4 United States, and we are particularly
5 concerned about how it's going to be
6 distributed to those who are in need here

10 possible, and we want to make sure that
11 we'll be able to get the information on
12 what is going to be happening with the
13 U.S. Department of Agriculture in the
14 next month.

15 This is going to be a very big
16 job for our food banks, and they've never
17 seen such an influx of food like this
18 before. There's going to be issues
19 around storing, transporting, and
20 distributing all of these provisions, and
21 it's going to come with some challenges.
22 So we're going to hear about their plans
23 for taking this on and so that so many
24 people can take advantage of this
25 surplus.

13 welcome.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
17 Council President. I just want to take
18 this opportunity to thank my colleagues
19 and you, Council President, in your
20 support of the amendment to the fiscal
21 impact statement, including job growth
22 and job loss.

23 The fiscal future of the City
24 is one of our most important challenges,
25 and as a Council body, we're often tasked

2 with making challenging but certainly
3 important financial decisions on behalf
4 of the City, and I think this information
5 will help us make those decisions.

6 I also wanted to mention that
7 this week we all heard about the news
8 that Amazon selected Arlington, Virginia
9 and Queens, New York. I want to take
10 this moment, though, to thank everyone
11 who worked on this proposal. It was
12 tremendous cooperation from the
13 Administration, Commerce Department,
14 business community, PIDC, the chambers,
15 Select Philadelphia, many other
16 organizations, including many
17 universities, and I think we saw a
18 tremendous collaborative effort, which
19 was great for the City. So thank you to
20 all of them.

21 The information that was
22 collected, though, must be used to help
23 our city grow its taxpaying base, because
24 keep in mind, of the 20 largest companies
25 in Philadelphia, only four pay all taxes.

2 Only four. In the last ten years
3 actually, Philadelphia has had the third
4 slowest job growth rate of the top 20
5 major U.S. cities, and there are two
6 major taxes that hinder this growth - the
7 income portion of the BIRT tax, called
8 the net income, and the City wage tax.
9 Companies do not move into the City
10 because of these two taxes. They don't
11 want to pay the net income portion of the
12 BIRT and they don't want to have to give
13 their employees a 3.7 or 3.8 percent
14 increase on the wage tax. That's the
15 main reason why they don't move in. It's
16 also a burden on those that are here to
17 expand.

18 So if we're serious about not
19 being the third slowest job growth city
20 out of the top 20, we need to take steps
21 going forward to address both of these
22 taxes.
