2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 We're going to get started. Sorry to be
7 a little tardy. First day back jitters
8 and some of the other things that we have
9 to go through. I appreciate you being
10 here today.

11 If the members will take their
12 seats and any visitors will retire behind

14 session.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you so much. Our next order of
15 business is the approval of the Journal
16 of the meeting of Thursday, December 13,
17 2018, and the Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Greenlee.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. I move that the
21 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
22 December 13th, 2018 be approved.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you. It has been moved and

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair thanks the gentleman.

20 The Chair now recognizes
21 Councilman O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. On behalf of the
24 republicans, there are no requests for
25 leave of absence.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair thanks the gentleman.

4 At this time, I would like to
5 dispense with the regular order of
6 business and I would like to thank
7 everyone who has come down to witness
8 their government in action. We genuinely
9 appreciate you being here. We hope that
10 your stay here is a knowledgeable one
11 but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,
12 so much so that you come back again. So,
13 again, thank you so much for being here
14 today.

15 At this time, the Chair
16 recognizes Councilman Green, who will
17 present a resolution recognizing the
18 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter on the
19 occasion of the 108th annual Founders'
20 Day of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity. Would
21 Thomas L. Battles, Jr., the 33rd -- the
22 33rd? All right. I was getting ready to
23 say. All right. I'm sorry. I
24 digress -- (continued) Grand Polemarch,
25 and those accompanying him please join

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2 the Councilman at the podium. Thank you
3 very much.

4 (Councilmembers and guests
5 approached podium.)

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Good
7 morning. Good morning. It's an
8 outstanding morning here in the City of
9 Philadelphia. It's not every day I get a
10 chance to wear this distinguished blazer
11 here in the Council Chambers, but we have
12 an opportunity to have the 33rd Grand
13 Polemarch, Thomas L. Battles Jr. of Kappa
14 Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Councilman, hold on one second.

17 Folks, could you all be quiet,
18 please.

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: -- that's
20 here with us this morning. In addition,
21 we have our 27th Northeast Province
22 Polemarch, Craig Chisholm; also our 48th
23 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter Polemarch, L.
24 Douglas Harrell, Jr. The Executive
25 Director of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity,

2 Incorporated, John Burrell, is also here
3 with us this morning.

4 And there's a strong connection
5 between the City of Philadelphia and
6 Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.
7 For me on a personal level, there's a
8 very strong connection, because I got
9 first introduced to this bond of
10 fraternity through my father, Walter
11 Green, Jr., who is a James Kidd awardee
12 of the Northeast Province. But in
13 Philadelphia, there's a strong connection
14 with Kappa Alpha Psi. One of our
15 founders, John Milton Lee, founded the
16 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter. He also
17 founded the Epsilon Chapter at Lincoln
18 University and the Lambda Chapter of
19 Temple University. In addition, if you
20 go right up Broad Street, we have our
21 international headquarters here in the
22 City of Philadelphia.

23 So there's a strong connection
24 between Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity,
25 Incorporated and the City of

4 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
6 you.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I knew the
8 Deltas would like that.

9 So with that, I will begin our
10 presentation this morning. Also this
11 year between July 30th to August 4th, we
12 will have the 84th Grand Chapter meeting
13 of this outstanding organization here in
14 the City of Philadelphia. Not only will
15 we have brothers, silhouettes, young men
16 and young ladies coming here to the City
17 of Philadelphia, but also spending money
18 in the City of Philadelphia, which in my
19 other hat as a member of City Council is
20 very important for our General Fund.

21 So with that, we'll begin.

24 108th annual Founders' Day of Kappa Alpha
25 Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.

2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
3 on January 5th, 1911, on the campus of
4 Indiana University at Bloomington,
5 Indiana, Elder Watson Diggs, John Milton
6 Lee, Byron K. Armstrong, Guy Levis Grant,
7 Ezra D. Alexander, Henry T. Asher, Marcus
8 P. Blakemore, Paul W. Caine, Edward G.
9 Irvin, and George W. Edmonds founded
10 Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated;
11 and

12 Whereas, through their vision,
13 these ten astute men founded a college
14 fraternity now comprised of functioning
15 Undergraduate and Alumni Chapters on
16 campuses and in cities throughout this
17 nation and the world, and through that
18 seed, a fraternal tree was grown whose
19 fruit of membership is now available to,
20 and now enjoyed by, well over 150,000
21 college men, regardless of race,
22 religion, or national origin; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
24 from its origin through today, Kappa
25 Alpha Psi Fraternity is a unique

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2 organization in that its members share a
3 common purpose of achievement in every
4 field of human endeavor, and this unified
5 purpose is exemplified every day by its
6 members in Congress, city halls,
7 courtrooms, boardrooms, newsrooms,
8 classrooms, concert halls, film and
9 recording studios, physicians' offices,
10 athletic fields, fields of combat,
11 pulpits, et cetera; and

12 Whereas, in addition to the
13 achievement of its members, Kappa Alpha
14 Psi Fraternity is dedicated to training
15 for leadership and through its various
16 programs, including the A-Man Initiative,
17 Achievement Academy, Guide Right, Kappa
18 Kamp, and Kappa League, has mentored
19 several young men in the past, current,
20 and future leaders of our country; and

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
22 members of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity
23 have a lifelong commitment to serving the
24 common person and, through this
25 commitment, have provided substantial

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,

9 of Philadelphia share a special bond in
10 that the Fraternity's International
11 Headquarters is located in Philadelphia
12 and, historically, the Greater
13 Philadelphia Region has been home to
14 hundreds of members in both the
15 Undergraduate and Alumni Chapters; now,
16 therefore, be it

17 Resolved, by the Council of the
18 City of Philadelphia, that we hereby
19 recognize the Philadelphia Alumni Chapter
20 on the occasion of the 108th annual
21 Founders' Day of Kappa Alpha Psi
22 Fraternity, Incorporated.

23 I'll be remiss in not also
24 acknowledging the achievement in this
25 building of Kappa's former Mayor John

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2 Street as well as the first Mayor of the
3 City of Philadelphia, W. Wilson Goode,
4 and also members of this legislative
5 body, Cecil B. Moore, George Burrell as
6 well.

7 Further resolved, that an
8 engrossed copy of this resolution be
9 presented to Thomas L. Battles, Jr., the
10 33rd Grand Polemarch of Kappa Alpha Psi
11 Fraternity, Incorporated, as evidence of
12 the sincere admiration and respect of
13 this legislative body.

16 the Chair recognizes Mr. Battles for

18 doesn't ring a bell, but Karen S. Coates

20 to the School District of Philadelphia,
21 because we here in this City of
22 Philadelphia working very closely, this
23 City Council along with our republican
24 colleagues in the Pennsylvania House,
25 would not have been able to get

13 MR. HAAS: Good morning. My
14 name is Don Haas. I'm here as a
15 representative of BOMA Philadelphia, and
16 I'm here today speaking on not just
17 behalf of BOMA Philadelphia but the
18 Philadelphia real estate community
19 represented by the real estate coalition,
20 which includes the Building Industry
21 Association of Philadelphia, Greater
22 Philadelphia Association of Realtors,
23 Homeowners Association of Philadelphia,
24 and the Pennsylvania Parking Association.
25 Together we stand united in opposition to

10 CHIEF CLERK: Bryan Bush,
11 commenting on 171112.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MR. BUSH: Good morning,
16 everyone. Council President Clarke and
17 members of Council, I'm Bryan Bush with
18 Sheet Metal Workers Local 19. I
19 appreciate you's having this hearing
20 today for us. I'm very happy that
21 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell is
22 sponsoring this for us and Councilwoman
23 Sanchez for having this hearing on the
24 legislation.

25 Many of my brothers and sisters

2 are here in the audience today to support
3 this public safety legislation as well.

4 Again, this is public safety
5 legislation. It's not about real estate.
6 It's not about gaining work or anything
7 else. There's a lot of different things
8 that are being thrown around out there
9 through the newspapers and everything
10 else, but this is basically -- it's for
11 public safety. It's something that
12 should be done. It's something that I
13 believe and that we all believe that will
14 put Philadelphia on the forefront, like
15 it is with pretty much everything else.

16 Listen, we've been in many
17 talks with L&I and other people as well,
18 and we're just looking for all your
19 support on this just to make this go
20 through, and it will be one step closer
21 to putting Philadelphia on that
22 forefront.

23 So I appreciate everything that
24 it took to get us here today. Of course
25 it's been eight years in the making, ever

1 1/24/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 since Fran Burns from L&I. Like I said,
3 this is about saving lives. Sprinkler
4 systems, they put out fires, but they do
5 not control the smoke. And what is it
6 that kills 80 percent of occupants in
7 buildings is the smoke. So that's why we
8 all need this legislation pushed through
9 today.

10 It's funny, reading some of
11 these different articles talking about
12 the Sheet Metal Workers just want this to
13 gain more work for their members. That's
14 not what it's about at all. We're all
15 working in these buildings as well. We
16 want to be safe also, and we want to be
17 able to help make everybody, all the
18 different occupants, safe as well.

19 So we appreciate this. We
20 appreciate your support. And we have no
21 problem with sitting down with BOMA after
22 this bill is passed. We have no problem
23 with that at all.

24 So thank you very much.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
5 got your message. Thank you.

6 Mr. Decker, please call the
7 next name.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
9 commenting on 170675, 181005, and 181044.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.
14 This is an official decree of the people
15 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
16 such, requires immediate action and
17 remedy.

18 Every week, Council, Mayor,
19 Governor, and others transfer private
20 property to the government, probably
21 illegally. Philadelphia brags all the
22 time about being the largest MLK
23 celebration. Dr. King fought for the
24 equal treatment guarantees of the
25 Constitution.

1 1/24/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 My home was stolen. My 25
3 years of government-caused expenses were
4 never paid. Most of Logan was paid, but
5 not me. Could any oath-bound official
6 look Dr. King in the eye and explain
7 this?

8 Tyranny has been defined as
9 that which the government does, but the
10 people cannot legally do. I cannot steal
11 someone's home or 25 years of their
12 labor.

13 Has Council, Mayor, Governor,
14 and others unanimously approved spending
15 upwards of 120 million low-income housing
16 HUD money to build a mall on my stolen
17 home? Why has the Attorney General and
18 FBI refused my multiple filings to
19 investigate and prosecute oath,
20 Constitution, and law violations?

21 The constitutions require
22 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
23 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
24 duty. Your oath of office requires you
25 to act or face prison.

2 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
3 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
4 Constitution Article I, Sections 1
5 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
6 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
7 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
8 14-4056 appear violated.

9 I call on the federal and
10 Commonwealth governments to perform their
11 constitutional obligation to investigate
12 and prosecute all involved in the theft
13 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
14 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
15 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
16 25 years is egregious, extraordinary,
17 oath-violating, and requires immediate
18 remedy.

19 A just government must obey the
20 rule of law. This color of law
21 government must have its Charter to
22 govern revoked until a constitutionally
23 compliant government is installed.

24 Public servants cannot refuse
25 their sworn duty to act any more than a

13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 All those in favor say aye.

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

21 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
22 authorizing the Committee on Public
23 Health and Human Services to hold
24 hearings on the increase in maternal
25 mortality among African-American women in

2 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilwoman
3 Bass.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
8 of the resolution.

9 (Duly seconded.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
11 been moved and properly seconded.

12 All those in favor say aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
20 recognizing, commemorating, and
21 celebrating the Centennial Anniversary of
22 the Historic First Korean Congress held
23 in Philadelphia from April 14th to April
24 16th, 1919, introduced by Councilman Oh.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

9 All those in favor say aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 ayes have it, and that resolution is
16 adopted.

17 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
18 other resolutions on the Final Passage
19 Calendar, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you very much.

22 Are there any speeches on
23 behalf of the minority?

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman

25 Oh.

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
3 much, Council President. September the
4 13th of last year I introduced a
5 resolution relating to the Department of
6 Human Services, DHS, and the issue of
7 removal of children from families.
8 Philadelphia has the highest rate of
9 child removal in the nation, three times
10 higher than New York City, four times
11 higher than Chicago. And while we
12 appreciate the work of DHS and all the
13 social workers who protect children,
14 there is a serious issue of lack of
15 guidelines, transparency, compliance with
16 the law, and uniform reporting standards,
17 and it is important that we explore this,
18 hopefully with DHS taking a lead in
19 ensuring that there are uniform
20 guidelines for hospitals, schools, and
21 other places in compliance with state
22 law.

23 To that end, we will be having
24 a hearing chaired by Councilwoman Cindy
25 Bass on Tuesday, February the 12th at

2 10:00 a.m. here in this Chambers, and I
3 encourage anyone who has additional
4 issues or issues to contact my office in
5 preparation of the hearing.

6 We will have national experts.
7 We will have leading attorneys and
8 advocates for children, along with
9 numerous victims of improper and illegal
10 separation of their children from their
11 families.

12 Thank you very much.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 On behalf of the majority?

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. Every year we single out
20 a municipal employee that exemplifies the
21 Philadelphia spirit and what being a
22 public servant is. I had an opportunity
23 during our break to go to one of my civic
24 meetings and I met a young lady. I met
25 her before, but I sat through her whole

2 presentation at this particular civic
3 association. Her name is Ms. Vicki
4 Riley. She works for the Revenue
5 Department. If my colleagues do not know
6 her, you need to Google her, look her up,
7 ask her to come out to one of your
8 events, because she went through a
9 presentation entitled "Tax Relief is
10 Knocking at Your Door," and she went
11 through every one of the programs that
12 people are eligible for, from LOOP that
13 you guys fought for to the senior citizen
14 tax freeze, broke it down, how much they
15 could save, how you could work out an
16 agreement with the Water Department and
17 not lose your home. You know we're big
18 on stopping Sheriff Sale.

19 But this young lady went
20 through this for about 45 minutes, citing
21 how each and every time we voted for
22 relief for taxpayers. If you do not know
23 her, get to know her, ask her to come to
24 your civic association. She has a
25 handout and knows by heart, can read it

2 backwards, tells how much if you make
3 this much money, you get this much back.

4 By the time she was done,
5 Mr. President, the civic group didn't
6 want to hear from me. I was like I'm
7 glad you're not running, because they
8 were so pleased with all of your effort,
9 all of this body's effort and painstaking
10 way we go through making sure that we
11 protect, as my colleague talks about,
12 Councilwoman Parker, middle
13 neighborhoods, that I did know we did
14 this much. And if you don't know or get
15 to know her, if you want her at your
16 civic, she will go out to them, and by
17 the time she's done, you will be proud
18 that she's a public servant on your
19 behalf and, more importantly, every
20 person that pays real estate taxes in the
21 City of Philadelphia will be glad they
22 met her.

23 So I encourage you to look up
24 Ms. Vicki Riley, and I want to thank her
25 publicly and on the record for going out

2 and talking about what is available to
3 real estate owners and particularly
4 owner-occupied people in the City of
5 Philadelphia. I was impressed.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 She's good.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: You know
9 her?

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Absolutely. She's good.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. Thank
13 you, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Squilla.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I'd like to remind
20 everybody today, right after Council, for
21 all members and Council and staff that
22 the African American Museum will be doing
23 a briefing across the street, especially
24 during this time. We had a great day of
25 service, Martin Luther King on Monday,

2 and with Black History Month coming up,
3 it's important to see if we can get some
4 folks over there to get the briefing from
5 the Museum.

6 So thank you so much.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Domb.

11 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
12 Council President. Yesterday afternoon
13 members of my staff and myself went to
14 the airport and we donated food,
15 non-perishables and other supplies to the
16 workers affected by the government
17 shutdown. After speaking with many of
18 the workers regarding their current
19 circumstances, we learned the biggest
20 need they have other than food is
21 actually basic supplies. They actually
22 have two rooms set up for the workers
23 there. They need basic supplies, hygiene
24 products, laundry supplies, pet foods,
25 diapers. It's very sad, these

2 Philadelphians are struggling to pay
3 their monthly bills and rent. So the
4 smallest donation can help them during
5 this time.

6 But the government shutdown is
7 more than politics. It is affecting the
8 lives of these hardworking individuals
9 around the country and in our city. I've
10 had people write me e-mails saying they
11 can't pay their rent this month because
12 they work for the federal government.
13 This is a disaster.

14 As friends and neighbors of
15 Philadelphia International Airport
16 workers, I encourage all of us to take a
17 trip to the airport, donate food,
18 supplies, gift cards, whatever you can do
19 but, most importantly, thank these
20 workers who are working now over a month
21 without any pay. It's pretty amazing.
22 And it's great to see and hear that TSA
23 union workers are showing up for work
24 every day without getting paid, but these
25 workers need our support and help. And

2 if anyone wants more information, please
3 contact my office. I'd be happy to help.

4 Thank you, Council President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
7 doing that. This is pretty much an
8 embarrassment to the rest of the world.

9 The Chair recognizes

10 Councilwoman Bass.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. And a couple of things I
13 just wanted to mention today. First of
14 all, I wanted to acknowledge that we have
15 here from Martin Luther King High School
16 in my district and also Roosevelt Middle
17 School, we have students here today with
18 us.

19 And if you all could stand.

20 This is the --

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: These are
23 the students from the Honorable Augusta
24 Clark Institute for Public Policy that we
25 have started at Martin Luther King High

2 School, learning about politics,
3 government, and really navigating life.
4 And so I really want to thank them for
5 all being down here today. They're doing
6 a great job, and we're just so proud to
7 have the opportunity to work with them.
8 So I just wanted to recognize and shout
9 them out.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Welcome.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you
13 for coming down.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for coming down.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Also I just
18 wanted to also mention that today we
19 introduced a resolution for hearings on
20 maternal mortality, and I wanted to make
21 sure that everyone understood what an
22 important issue this is. We're going to
23 have a lot of conversation about this
24 coming up in the future, but one of the
25 things that really struck me is that 75

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2 percent of all deaths in child birth are
3 African American women here in the City
4 of Philadelphia, and there is something
5 really grossly wrong with that figure.
6 And so we're going to get to the bottom
7 of it and try to attack this issue in a
8 substantive way, and look forward to the
9 hearings. We want to make sure that
10 everyone knows and is aware and want to
11 invite folks who are listening far and
12 wide to come and to participate and be a
13 part of a solution.

14 So thank you, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you for
17 bringing those awesome young people down
18 today.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
22 Council President. First, it feels good
23 to be back in the body with my colleagues
24 doing the business of moving the City of
25 Philadelphia forward.

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2 During our break, I did a lot
3 of work on an issue that's very near and
4 dear to my heart but I think is critical
5 as relates to the direction of the City
6 of Philadelphia, and that's the issue of
7 gun violence.

8 First, I want to acknowledge
9 you for working in partnership with the
10 District Attorney's Office, working in
11 partnership with the Chairman of Public
12 Safety, Councilman Curtis Jones, working
13 with Commissioner Richard Ross, as well
14 as the Special Committee on Gun Violence
15 where we participated in a press
16 conference yesterday on a bill you
17 introduced over ten years ago, which
18 revolves around reporting of lost and
19 stolen guns.

20 I said this before during the
21 press conference with the Mayor and their
22 plan around violence prevention: We are
23 really in a state of emergency. Any time
24 you have individuals who will run up in a
25 store and murder a young man while he's

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2 just purchasing something, any time you
3 have individuals who will run the streets
4 and rob a senior citizen and after you
5 take his money, you decide to shoot him
6 in his face, we are clearly in a state of
7 an emergency.

8 And so I look forward to all of
9 us rolling up our sleeves and addressing
10 this issue with the same level of urgency
11 as we do the opioid crisis or as we
12 address bike lanes throughout the City of
13 Philadelphia, because at the end of the
14 day when we turn on the news, I get sick
15 and tired of being sick and tired of
16 seeing young men being murdered in the
17 streets of Philadelphia as well as our
18 seniors being scared and afraid to come
19 out of their homes just to go to and from
20 their daily activities.

21 So I'm just sounding the alarm
22 that we have a lot of work to do.
23 There's some great things going on with
24 this city, but there's also other areas
25 that need the same level of attention or

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2 even more, and that's the issue of gun
3 violence. So I look forward to working
4 with everyone on this very critical and
5 important issue. I want to say thank you
6 very much.

7 But also I do want to say for
8 the record, I've been the subject of a
9 variety of different articles some time
10 ago in the past regarding how we do
11 business here in the City of
12 Philadelphia. I know recently there was
13 a caption inside one of our newspapers
14 talking about I received some type of
15 significant personal benefit from land
16 disposition deals here in the City of
17 Philadelphia, but for the record, that
18 newspaper, the Philadelphia Daily News,
19 has printed a correction. Somehow they
20 just somehow -- it was a little small
21 correction, but they did say we meant his
22 so-called friend received some type of
23 big payout or whatever they were trying
24 to get at. But nevertheless, for some
25 folks that may read the paper, I just

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2 want to correct the record for my own
3 personal reputation and integrity,
4 because I've always stood on operating in
5 decency and order. That's how my
6 grandmother raised me. So at some point
7 in time, I want to speak up for what's
8 right and stand on my own truth just to
9 correct the record for all the listeners
10 that's out there, my supporters, so they
11 can understand what's really going on
12 with what Councilman Kenyatta Johnson and
13 my work in the Second Councilmanic
14 District.

15 Thank you, Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you. We
18 know you well. We know you very well
19 that that wouldn't be the case. Thank
20 you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Green.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
24 Council President. I wanted to echo the
25 words and comments made by Councilmember

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2 Domb in reference to the work that he's
3 doing in helping people being impacted by
4 the federal shutdown. This is 34th day
5 of the shutdown. Eight hundred thousand
6 people have not had paychecks. This will
7 be the second paycheck they will receive
8 a pay stub with 0.00 on it. And I think
9 when we look at the news and TV and read
10 papers, sometimes we lose sight of the
11 fact these are actually real people,
12 especially here in the City of
13 Philadelphia, that are being impacted,
14 and it's going to have an impact not only
15 on our economy here in the City but also
16 the Commonwealth.

17 That's why I was encouraged by
18 Mayor Kenney's statement on Monday in
19 reference to various City agencies
20 providing opportunity for relief for
21 those federal workers who are dealing
22 with this shutdown through no fault of
23 their own. They have no resources,
24 although they're doing the work.

25 As Chair of the Gas Commission,

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2 I commend PGW on taking that similar
3 stance. So for those federal employees
4 who are having a challenge with their gas
5 bill, they can reach out to PGW. They
6 can call 215-235-1000. Also it is the
7 winter season and PGW has a number of
8 initiatives to help people, moderate and
9 low-income people and those who are
10 having challenges with their gas bill, to
11 feel free to reach out to PGW. I know
12 people can also reach out to the Water
13 Department as well as the Revenue
14 regarding their real estate and City
15 taxes.

16 Hopefully this shutdown will
17 come to a conclusion shortly. There are
18 bills that are being voted on today. It
19 seems like neither proposal will get
20 passed, but hopefully that will move
21 people forward to come into a resolution
22 so people will no longer be hurt in the
23 nation, the Commonwealth, and especially
24 here in the City of Philadelphia.

25 Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you very
4 much.

5 The Chair recognizes
6 Councilwoman Blackwell.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
8 you, Mr. President. I would like to
9 thank Councilman Domb for his remarks and
10 thank Councilwoman Bass for the
11 legislation she introduced today. I also
12 would like to thank a woman named
13 Robinson from Mantua who called me about
14 us partnering to do our part to help feed
15 people who are caught up in this federal
16 debacle that this President has caused.

17 And, finally, I would like to
18 remind folks that the senior tax freeze
19 deadline was extended to January 31st.
20 So please let your people know, and
21 anybody listening, please know that you
22 have more time to apply for a tax freeze.

23 Thank you, Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilwoman.

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2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Squilla.

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I forgot to mention too,
6 the African American Museum briefing also
7 does have lunch. So it's more of an
8 incentive to get there. It's an
9 important part to forget.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you. Thanks, Councilman.

13 That concludes the speeches on
14 behalf of the majority and minority, and
15 with that, the Chair recognizes
16 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
17 to adjourn.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
20 adjourned until Thursday, January 31,
21 2019 at 10:00 a.m.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
25 seconded.

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2 All those in favor?

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

8 ayes have it. Council will be adjourned

9 until Thursday, January 31, 2019, 10:00

10 a.m.
