2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. We're going to get
4 started. If the members will take their
5 seats and any visitors retire behind the
6 rail, we'd appreciate it, and we will
7 have our invocation.

8 To give our invocation this
9 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor
10 Yvonne Yates of Gather the People House
11 of Prayer. She is here today as the
12 guest of Councilwoman Cindy Bass.

13 I would ask all guests,
14 visitors, and members to please rise.

15 (Councilmembers, guests, and
16 visitors rise.)

17 PASTOR YATES: I'd like to
18 acknowledge the President Darrell Clarke
19 and acknowledge Councilwoman Cindy Bass
20 for the invite and Councilwoman Jannie
21 Blackwell, who is other family.

22 Let us pray.

23 Our Father, which art in
24 heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom
25 come, thy will be done, on earth as it is

2 in heaven. Give us this day our daily
3 bread and forgive us our trespasses, as
4 we have forgiven those who have
5 trespassed against us. Lead us not into
6 temptation, but deliver us from evil, for
7 thine is the kingdom, the power, and the
8 glory forever and ever.

9 My Father, my God, we do come
10 by the blood in the name of Jesus. We
11 come, Father God, because we love you and
12 adore you and appreciate you. We thank
13 you for all that you have done and all
14 that you will do.

15 We thank you, Father God, for
16 the City being the City of Brotherly
17 Love. So, Father God, we ask for a
18 blessing upon our Mayor. We ask for a
19 blessing, Father God, upon the City
20 Council, everyone. We ask for a
21 blessing, Father God, for the Sheriff's
22 Department.

23 But, Father God, you asked me
24 and you said a long time ago, if we ask
25 anything in your son's name, that you

18 to kill, steal, and destroy, but you came
19 that we may have life and have it more
20 abundantly.

21 So we bring life instead of
22 death. We bring love, Father God,
23 instead of hatred. We bring unity and
24 oneness among all that is here and all
25 that is out there. For the enemy thinks

16 through this city, Father God, we know
17 that the hatred is in this city, but we
18 take authority today, don't we? We take
19 authority today and we say that it's not
20 going to happen anymore.

21 We cover our children with the
22 blood, for children are an inheritance
23 unto you. They are your inheritance,
24 God.

25 We cover our men, Father God,

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2 because our men have been seen and Satan
3 wants to destroy them. We won't allow
4 it. We won't allow it, Father God.

5 So because let my speech be
6 great seasoned with salt so that we know
7 how to answer another.

8 Father, we are here because we
9 need you. We are here because we want
10 you. We're here, Father God, because
11 there is nothing that we can do without
12 you. And, Father, we are one nation
13 under God.

14 So we give you back your
15 authority. Because we have not, because
16 we ask not. So I'm asking for peace.
17 I'm asking for love. I'm asking for joy.
18 I'm asking for oneness. I'm asking for
19 unity among us all.

20 In Jesus' name, amen.

18 promote community values in Scouts from a
19 young age, by instilling in them the
20 values of the Scout Oath and Law; and

22 the Scout Law encourages Scouts to be
23 trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly,
24 courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful,
25 thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent -

4 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

5 Whereas, Scouting is more inclusive than
6 ever with character building, leadership
7 development, outdoor skills training,

10 throughout our region; and

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
12 the Cradle of Liberty Council, Boy Scouts
13 of America's time-tested, life-changing
14 Scouting programs are made possible
15 through the selflessness of its network
16 of more than 4,000 volunteers, hundreds
17 of chartered partner organizations and
18 generous contributions from its donors;
19 and

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
21 this dedication to the youth of
22 Philadelphia is paramount to the
23 continued development of the City's
24 younger generations, who will become the
25 future leaders;

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2 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Resolved, by
3 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
4 that we hereby honor, recognize, and
5 celebrate the 109th birthday of the Boy
6 Scouts of America.

9 Section 2-305, "Office of Property

11 Powers and Duties," requiring that real

12 estate taxes imposed by Title 19 of The

13 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Finance,

14 Taxes and Collections," Chapter 19-1300,

15 "Real Estate Taxes," be levied on the

16 assessed value of taxable real property

17 as established for the immediately

18 preceding stated year in any year in

19 which the audit provided for under

20 Subsection 2-305(2)(s) finds that overall

21 property assessments in the City do not

22 meet industry standards for accuracy.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,

2 Council President. There has been much
3 controversy over the property assessments
4 by the Office of Property Assessment,
5 OPA, and this body, yourself and
6 Councilman Squilla in particular, have
7 offered and produced remedies for
8 homeowners and others.

9 I will say that my concern is
10 that we have over the course of several
11 years questioning OPA, at least from my
12 perspective, not been getting a
13 satisfactory answer as to the accuracy
14 and methodology of the assessment
15 process, leaving many areas of the City
16 overassessed in many senses.

17 Now that this has been brought
18 out, the Administration says they will
19 not move forward with property
20 assessments on a citywide basis. They
21 will do it on an individual basis, but
22 that leaves the 10.5 percent overall
23 assessment increase on residential
24 properties intact.

25 I'm not sure how we can keep

2 that intact when we have just had an
3 audit that says the methodology is
4 inaccurate. It would seem to me that a
5 lot of people, especially people who are
6 less informed, from poorer neighborhoods,
7 have not appealed and, therefore, they'll
8 be stuck with an assessment that appears
9 to be inaccurate and unreliable.

10 The bill I offer for our
11 consideration is that when an audit of
12 the property assessment process has found
13 it to be unreliable, rather than freezing
14 the process at the questionable or
15 unreliable rate, that we go to the
16 previous year. And so for anyone who has
17 or hasn't appealed their property
18 assessments, we would go to the year
19 before rather than keeping the
20 questionable year.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 That will be referred to
25 committee.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 providing for the submission to the

17 The Chair again recognizes

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. I move that the
21 rules of Council be suspended so as to
22 permit first reading this day of Bill

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you. It has been moved and
3 properly seconded that the rules of
4 Council be suspended so as to permit
5 first reading this day of Bills No.
6 180820, 180943, 190007.

7 All those in favor say aye.

8 (Aye.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Those opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 ayes have it, and these bills will be
14 placed on our First Reading Calendar for
15 today. Resolution No. 180834 and 190028
16 will be placed on the Final Passage
17 Calendar at our next session of Council.

18 That concludes our reports from
19 committee. The next order of business is
20 consideration of the Calendar.

21 I note that the bills just
22 reported from committee with a suspension
23 of the rules have been deemed to have had
24 a first reading. They will be on the
25 Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar

2 at our next session of Council.

3 As there are no additional
4 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
5 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
6 purpose of calling up resolutions and
7 bills on the Second Reading and Final
8 Passage Calendar.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. The following resolutions
11 and bills are being called up for the
12 Second Reading and Final Passage
13 Calendars today: Bill Nos. 190064,
14 190065, 190076, 180888-A, 180993, and
15 170467. All other resolutions and bills
16 are being held.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you.

19 Before considering the bills
20 and resolutions on the Final Passage
21 Calendar, we will have our public comment
22 session. It will go as follows:

23 If you are interested in
24 testifying on a bill or resolution that
25 is on the Final Passage Calendar today,

3 sign up at the table to my left.

4 When your name is called, you
5 will go to the middle of the Council
6 Chambers. There's a podium. There's a
7 device on that podium. When the light
8 turns green, it will be your time to
9 speak. When the light turns yellow, we
10 would ask that you give 30 seconds to
11 conclude your remarks. And when the
12 light turns red, we'd ask that you please
13 adhere to our guidelines and conclude
14 your remarks. I want to thank you very
15 much for your anticipated cooperation.

16 Mr. Decker, please call the
17 first name on the list.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Dr. Patrick "PJ"
19 Brennan, commenting on 180888-A.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 DR. BRENNAN: Good morning.
24 Good morning, Council President Clarke
25 and members of City Council. I'm

2 Dr. Patrick J. Brennan, Chief Medical
3 Officer at the University of Pennsylvania
4 Health System. I'm here to provide
5 testimony on behalf of Penn Medicine in
6 support of Bill No. 180888-A. The bill
7 requires pharmaceutical sales
8 representatives to register and share
9 their promotional materials with the
10 City. Most importantly, it also bans
11 manufacturers of controlled or federally
12 scheduled drugs from giving gifts of any
13 kind, large or small, to doctors and
14 healthcare providers.

15 Opponents of this important
16 legislation have made a number of claims
17 in order to stall and defeat it. They
18 claim it will have little impact on the
19 opioid crisis and that there is little
20 evidence to demonstrate that gift bans
21 are effective. They claim that the rate
22 at which opioids are dispensed is falling
23 and that relatively small gifts like
24 meals should not be prohibited because
25 they don't influence physician

2 decision-making.

3 Let's discuss the facts.

4 Decades of study make it clear that

5 meetings between doctors and sales reps

6 lead to changes in the way physicians

7 prescribe medications. And let's be

8 clear about this. These meetings are

9 about sales, not education. It's not

10 necessary to reinvent the wheel here. We

11 know that banning meals changes

12 interactions with physicians. Why would

13 it be any different for opioid

14 prescribing?

15 As we begin to grapple with

16 years of overprescribing, rates are just

17 now starting to decline, but it's far too

18 soon to declare victory. We're a long

19 way from there and we need to continue

20 our work to address overprescribing.

21 The authors of a study just

22 published last month in the Journal of

23 the American Medical Association using

24 county-level data from across the country

25 demonstrated that an increase in

2 marketing of opioids was associated with
3 more overdose deaths in those counties
4 one year later. The authors further
5 conclude that it is the widespread
6 payment of gifts of low monetary value to
7 many physicians that are most
8 influential. The industry spends tens of
9 millions of dollars per year marketing
10 directly to doctors.

11 Opponents claim this bill would
12 be bad for business, leaving Philadelphia
13 on the outside looking in as pharma
14 industry opportunities pass the City by
15 in favor of friendlier rules elsewhere.
16 Let's consider the facts again. Penn
17 Medicine banned pharmaceutical company
18 gifts to our clinicians nearly 13 years
19 ago, and collaboration with the industry
20 has continued to flourish since then.
21 Discoveries developed in our laboratories
22 and tested in clinical trials are finding
23 their way to more patients each day,
24 proving that academia/industry
25 collaborations are bearing fruit more

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2 than ever before. In fact, of the 40 FDA
3 drug approvals in the last fiscal year,
4 four, or 10 percent, were made possible
5 by research conducted in West
6 Philadelphia at Penn Medicine.

7 At Penn Medicine, we trust our
8 physicians and healthcare providers to
9 act in the best interest of our patients
10 and we allow industry representatives to
11 meet with our providers, but the
12 patients' best interests are primary.
13 We're interested in the development and
14 sharing of new knowledge and the creation
15 of new products to benefit humanity and
16 not marketing persuasion on our
17 prescribing practices. We prohibit
18 gifts, however small, because
19 independence, transparency, and trust are
20 crucial in the patient-provided
21 relationship.

22 In conclusion, Philadelphia has
23 the opportunity to be a leader by
24 implementing commonsense safeguards to
25 limit activities that have been shown

2 through scientific research to encourage
3 inappropriate or overprescribing. On
4 behalf of Penn Medicine, I can speak from
5 experience that the benefits of a
6 proposal like the one before you today
7 far outweigh any perceived shortcomings.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Sharon Brigner,
13 commenting on 180888-A.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MS. BRIGNER: Hi. My name is
18 Sharon Brigner. I am a registered nurse
19 here on behalf of the Biopharmaceutical
20 Research and Manufacturers of America,
21 PhRMA, and we oppose the bill.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Chris Molineaux,
25 commenting on 180888-A.

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2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning.

5 MR. MOLINEAUX: Good morning,
6 members of City Council and thank you for
7 the opportunity to speak during today's
8 Council meeting. I'm Chris Molineaux,
9 President and CEO of Life Sciences
10 Pennsylvania, the statewide trade
11 association that represents more than 800
12 member organizations, including small
13 biotech companies, pharmaceutical
14 manufacturers, academic research
15 institutions including the University of
16 Pennsylvania, Temple, and Jefferson,
17 medical device makers, patient advocacy
18 groups, and service providers that
19 support this industry. On behalf of that
20 community and our membership, we oppose
21 this bill.

22 As we know all too well, the
23 opioid epidemic is one of the worst
24 public health crises our country has
25 faced in the past century. Its effects

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2 are far-reaching and community agnostic.

3 I'm sure every one of us in this room has
4 personally felt the consequences of this
5 ongoing emergency.

6 I want to make it clear from
7 the outset that the life sciences
8 community of Pennsylvania is committed to
9 doing everything in its power to curb
10 this tragic epidemic. In fact, a number
11 of our member companies are working on
12 novel non-opioid medicines to treat
13 chronic and acute pain, as well as
14 tamper-resistant delivery modalities for
15 these medicines.

16 Additionally, as a public
17 advocacy organization, working to address
18 this issue has been one of our top
19 priorities for several years in
20 discussions with legislators of the state
21 and federal levels.

22 There are five provisions, five
23 key provisions, of this bill that are
24 particularly troublesome. The first is
25 the requirement that pharmaceutical sales

2 reps register and pay up to a \$250
3 registration fee. It's important to note
4 that 87 percent of the medicines that are
5 prescribed, the opioid medicines that are
6 prescribed, are generic medicines and
7 don't have much of a sales force at all.
8 So this would accomplish nothing. It's
9 nothing more than a thinly veiled tax.

10 The second provision that
11 Dr. Brennan just talked about was banning
12 gifts to physicians, and specifically in
13 the bill it cites mugs and pens. These
14 are already prohibited by the pharma code
15 of interactions with physicians. In
16 fact, they've been banned for ten years
17 through that code. There are warehouses
18 across New Jersey and Pennsylvania full
19 of pens and mugs that are not going to
20 those offices.

21 A third provision would
22 prohibit meals. And the idea that meals
23 influence prescribing behavior is not
24 only insulting to physicians, but it's
25 absurd on its face. Meals -- I'll give

2 you an example. We usually use anecdotes
3 in these hearings. A friend of mine was
4 diagnosed recently with gallstones.
5 After his diagnosis, he was given a
6 prescription for ten Oxycodone. He
7 needed two of them. His wife picked up
8 the prescription. She showed no
9 identification. Their address was
10 incorrect. She walked out with the ten
11 Oxycodone. In fact, they gave her 11
12 accidentally. After his surgery a week
13 later, they gave him another prescription
14 for 20 Oxycodone. He needed three of
15 those. This has nothing to do with a
16 bagel or a cup of coffee given to a
17 physician.

18 Finally, to submit
19 information -- the bill provides a
20 provision that requires manufacturers to
21 submit their marketing material to the
22 Department of Health. These materials
23 are already reviewed by the FDA with an
24 annual budget of \$5 billion. I'm not
25 sure about the Department of Health's

2 budget or capabilities to review these
3 materials, but we don't believe they need
4 to be reviewed again.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 MR. MOLINEAUX: Thank you for
8 your time.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Peter Bentivegna,
12 commenting on 180888-A.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MR. BENTIVEGNA: Good morning.
17 My name is Peter Bentivegna. I'd like to
18 thank Council for allowing me to speak
19 this morning.

20 Regarding Bill 180888,
21 restricting the activities of
22 pharmaceutical representatives and also
23 specifically addressing the selective
24 studies and comments from Penn this
25 morning, I'd like to say it is admirable

2 that City Council and leaders Councilman
3 Greenlee and Councilwoman Bass are trying
4 to address and stem the opioid epidemic
5 in Philadelphia. I am very empathetic to
6 the patients and families struggling with
7 addiction and loss. This is a serious
8 problem. I'm here today to help City
9 Council help those families.

10 At the same time, I'm also here
11 today to save my job and my colleagues'
12 jobs. Like 98 and a half percent of all
13 pharmaceutical representatives, we have
14 nothing to do with the opioid crisis or
15 narcotics, and over 94 percent of us
16 carry no drug with any risk whatsoever of
17 addiction.

18 We live, work, and act with
19 integrity and decency and trust, as you
20 all do at your jobs. If you and 98 other
21 of your colleagues would not want to lose
22 your job because a politician in
23 Harrisburg or Washington or Virginia has
24 transgressed, then you agree that I and
25 my colleagues should not have our jobs

2 taken from us.

3 For expediency, I will briefly
4 explain that the bill will cause us to
5 lose our jobs because simple meals are
6 the setting of choice by which most
7 doctors choose to be educated about the
8 overwhelming and ever-changing volume of
9 information about all drugs, diseases,
10 guidelines, laws, insurance influences,
11 et cetera. The meal is simply, but
12 critically, a necessary stopping point
13 where and when most doctors ask us to
14 provide education. If meals are
15 disallowed, as they were in other cities,
16 then our companies will remove our
17 positions from the company, as they did
18 in those cities. It does not matter that
19 in an admission of "oops, we got it
20 wrong" those cities later retracted that
21 legislation.

22 To begin, nowhere in the bill
23 or supportive documents does it say, nor
24 can it say, what are the causes or
25 solutions of the opioid crisis, because

2 nobody in the country has the answer yet
3 to either the causes or solutions. In
4 the last three to ten years,
5 representative numbers, spending, and
6 activity have decreased each year.
7 Opioid prescriptions have gone down each
8 year since 2016. Yet the opioid crisis
9 has grown and increased in that
10 timeframe. The entire premise of the
11 bill that degenerate representatives are
12 the main cause of the opioid crisis is
13 truly as false as it sounds.

14 Also by the bill's own
15 acknowledgement, similar restrictions
16 legislated in Washington, DC, Chicago
17 and, most recently, New Jersey have been
18 resounding failures. I called City
19 Councilmembers in those cities and asked
20 two simple questions: Did the
21 legislation restricting pharmaceutical
22 representatives have any impact in
23 reducing the opioid crisis, and what was
24 the impact of the legislation on business
25 income and tax revenue from their city?

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2 The answers were consistent and
3 foretelling for this City Council. Exact
4 quotes that I was given by City Council
5 offices in those two cities are, quote,
6 This legislation had no impact on the
7 opioid crisis. We still have a similar
8 crisis to the rest of the country.

9 No, no, no. It, the
10 legislation, didn't reduce the opioid
11 deaths or crisis.

12 Quote, We have been having
13 increasing struggles with our budget and,
14 quote, specific to the hospitality and
15 restaurant industry, reported loss of
16 jobs, income, and overall business.

17 Einstein said the definition of
18 insanity is doing the same thing and
19 expecting different results.

20 I thank you for your time and
21 kind considerations of me, my colleagues,
22 and our families and those in the City
23 who depend on us for education and
24 support.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Emmanuel Bussie.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MR. BUSSIE: Good morning,
8 Council President and members of City
9 Council. I want to start the way I
10 always start, by acknowledging that this
11 is the brightest, the most technology
12 savvy, competent Council that we've ever
13 had. My name is Emmanuel Bussie, for the
14 record, commenting on 190040, I believe,
15 the oversight or --

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: 27.

17 MR. BUSSIE: So I'm going to
18 begin -- I want to talk about oversight
19 and inquiries, but I want to begin with a
20 little, just a brief, maybe one minute of
21 history.

22 The year was 1991. I was
23 working on one campaign, Rodney Jamison.
24 Darrell Clarke was working on another
25 campaign, John Street. It was three

2 women running against one man.

3 On Election Day, Frank Oliver,
4 who was the ward leader at the time, told
5 Darrell Clarke's team he can't pass out
6 literature on 29th Street. Me, working
7 on an opposite campaign, not being able
8 to mind my business, not seeing that was
9 fair, threw the literature away of the
10 campaign I was working on and immediately
11 started working on Darrell Clarke's
12 campaign on Election Day. The rest is
13 history.

14 I became constituent service.
15 I became the designated ward leader for
16 the 29th Ward of John Street. Darrell
17 Clarke and I worked in John Street's
18 office doing constituent service whenever
19 I got off work. We became good friends.

20 I share that to say that the
21 reason I did that, because I didn't think
22 it was fair for a ward leader to tell
23 Darrell Clarke's team he couldn't pass
24 out literature.

25 So fast forward to 2019, I'm

2 now opposing my good friend, who now
3 believes I'm not his friend, because I
4 don't believe it's fair for him not to
5 hold a hearing on on-street parking. I
6 don't believe it's fair for him to have
7 one set of rules for Cherelle Parker and
8 move her bill out of a committee when it
9 was being held up and not move David Oh's
10 bill out of committee when it's being
11 held up. I just think it's unfair to
12 have two sets of rules for two different
13 Councilpeople. I don't think it's fair.
14 And me, again, not being able to mind my
15 business, have encouraged 65 community
16 activists and leaders to also join me and
17 say that's not fair.

18 Speaking on oversight, imagine
19 if your Congressperson would not perform
20 oversight on Donald Trump. Imagine how
21 outraged you would be if that body of
22 Congress would not perform oversight on
23 Donald Trump.

24 We now have a sitting
25 Councilperson that's indicted, and what

2 we're asking this body to do is to have
3 oversight. Your Charter gives you that
4 power to do oversight. Section 4 --
5 Chapter 4, Section 2-40 gives you the
6 power to do oversight.

7 We call on this body, the most
8 intelligent, sophisticated, tech savvy,
9 integrity-driven body that Council has
10 ever had, to do oversight. The people
11 demand it. We deserve it. You should do
12 it.

13 Imagine if Congress told you,
14 I'm not going to do oversight on the
15 Trump committee -- on the Trump
16 Administration. You would be outraged.

17 So we're asking you guys to do
18 oversight, to allow the Ethics Committee
19 to look into Local 98 and its conduct,
20 its tentacles and how far it reached into
21 our local government, into our economy.

22 All we're asking is for oversight.

23 Thank you for your time.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Idris Guytan,
3 commenting on 170408.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good
8 morning. I'm here to speak for Idris
9 Guytan. He had to get away and get back
10 to school, an outstanding student. I'm
11 going to read a statement for him. We
12 also want to say that we are here -- I'm
13 here from Community College to support
14 the education bill that was brought up,
15 resolution.

16 The statement that I'm going to
17 read is by Hazim Hardeman, and some of
18 you may know him because he is now a
19 Rhodes Scholar who went through Community
20 College.

21 I understand that the board and
22 the college administration is making
23 proposals to the faculty and staff that
24 they believe are in the best interest of
25 CCP students. Respectfully, I can tell

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2 you that from my experience studying at
3 the college, that an increase of workload
4 for faculty would have meant an inferior
5 education for me.

6 Not having teachers who had to
7 contend with overly burdensome teaching
8 lows, I was able to receive
9 individualized instruction both inside
10 and outside of the classroom that not
11 only greatly contributed to my
12 development as a student and thinker, but
13 was vital considering I and countless
14 other students entered the college with
15 different levels of preparedness.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Excuse me. Ma'am, do me a favor, just
18 mention the word "suspension" once. I
19 know you're not talking about what you
20 listed. Just say "suspension" for the
21 record.

22 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm
23 sorry, sir. I didn't understand.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
25 signed up for school suspensions and

2 you're speaking about Community College,
3 but just say the word "suspension." Just
4 do me a favor.

5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:

6 Suspension.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you. Thank you.

9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: At

10 Temple University, for instance, a
11 professor with a teaching assignment and
12 no research responsibilities only teaches
13 12 credits a semester. The same is true
14 at other area universities, such as
15 Drexel. At Temple this allowed me to
16 develop close relationships with
17 professors which provided -- which proved
18 to be fundamental to my achievement, as
19 it was they who recognized opportunities
20 and possibilities for me that I could not
21 envision for myself.

22 If the college is serious about
23 providing a world-class education, they
24 have to at least keep up with respectable
25 institutions on their home turf.

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2 Furthermore, if the college is as
3 committed to making my story a staple of
4 what CCP represents, as a subsequent
5 celebration of accomplishments suggests,
6 that it must avoid making decisions that
7 would undercut the conditions of that
8 possibility. A 15-credit teaching load
9 at the college would do just that. The
10 students whose parents can afford it
11 comparatively have well-supported faculty
12 and staff at Temple, Drexel, and Penn and
13 Oxford. The kids who can't get
14 overworked faculty and staff at Community
15 College. Please fight this reality.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank
19 you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
23 commenting on 181005-A, 190076, and
24 181044.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

1 2/7/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.

5 This is an official decree of the people
6 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
7 such, requires immediate action and
8 remedy.

9 Every week, Council, Mayor,
10 Governor, and others transfer private
11 property to the government, probably
12 illegally.

13 Dr. King protested with a sign
14 that said, I am a man. To be allowed to
15 own, will, inherit, and sell your
16 property whenever you want or wherever
17 you want is a guarantee provided in
18 constitutions and laws. Inversely,
19 having your 42 USC 1982 property rights
20 stolen is a clear sign of slavery.

21 In fascism, socialism, and
22 communism, property rights revert to the
23 government. The Constitution requires
24 the federal government guarantee a
25 republican government. Picking

2 neighborhoods to forcibly redevelop is
3 unconstitutional and violates your sworn
4 oath.

5 Eminent domain requires
6 government purchase property for public
7 use. Taking without just compensation
8 first made or secured is
9 unconstitutional.

10 Why has the DA, the Attorney
11 General refused my numerous filings to
12 investigate and prosecute oath,
13 Constitution, and law violations? The
14 constitutions require immediate remedy of
15 this breach of law, breach of close,
16 breach of fiduciary duty. Your oath of
17 office requires you to act or face
18 prison.

19 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
20 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
21 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
22 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
23 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
24 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
25 14-4056 appear violated.

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2 I call on the federal and
3 Commonwealth governments to perform their
4 constitutional obligations to investigate
5 and prosecute all involved in the theft
6 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
7 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

8 The denial of God-given 42 USC
9 1982 property rights for 25 years is
10 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
11 and requires immediate remedy.

12 A just government must obey the
13 rule of law. This color of law
14 government must have its Charter to
15 govern revoked until a constitutionally
16 compliant government is installed.
17 Public servants cannot refuse their sworn
18 duty to act any more than a fireman can
19 refuse to fight a fire. The sovereign
20 people require oath, Constitution, and
21 law be enforced. Jail is required for
22 all who violate oath, Constitution or
23 law.

24 I remind Council, it takes a
25 lot of cooperation to create and allow

2 this monumental corruption.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony.

5 CHIEF CLERK: There are no

6 other speakers on the public comment

7 list, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 Councilwoman, you want to for

11 the record?

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Yes,

13 Mr. President. We have decided that we

14 will be calling up Bill No. 181044. Is

15 that all right?

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

17 I just wanted it for the record that we

18 will be calling that Bill 181044.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Yes.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

23 you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We

25 will now continue with our Calendar.

2 And, Mr. Decker, can you please
3 read the title of 190064.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
5 urging the Pennsylvania State Legislature
6 to pass Governor Wolf's proposal to raise

8 pathway to \$15 an hour, for all workers
9 in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
12 Brown.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 All those in favor say aye.

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 ayes have it. That resolution is
25 adopted.

2 Mr. Decker, please read the
3 title of 190065.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
5 urging the Trump Administration to
6 maintain Federal Mercury and Air Toxics
7 Standards.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
10 Brown.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. I again move for the
13 adoption.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
16 been moved and properly seconded.

17 All those in favor say aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it. Resolution 190065 is
24 adopted.

25 Mr. Decker, 190076.

2 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
3 authorizing the Philadelphia Land Bank to
4 dispose of 5423 through 27 Lena Street
5 located in the Eighth Councilmanic
6 District.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
11 of the resolution.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
14 been moved and properly seconded.

15 All those in favor say aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it. 190076 is adopted.

22 Mr. Decker, please read the
23 title of 180888-A.

24 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
25 amending Title 6 of The Philadelphia

1 2/7/19 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 Code, entitled "Health Code," by adding a
3 new Chapter 6-1200, entitled
4 "Pharmaceutical Sales and Marketing
5 Practices," to provide for registration
6 of pharmaceutical manufacturer agents and
7 certain other requirements; and to
8 prohibit gifts by pharmaceutical
9 manufacturers and their agents to health
10 care practitioners.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
14 you, Mr. President.

15 I ask everyone to bear with me
16 a little bit. I'm under the weather
17 here. But I didn't take any medication,
18 just for the record.

19 You heard from Dr. Brennan from
20 University of Pennsylvania sawed off
21 today, and I just want to read in the
22 commentary he put just in the very
23 beginning the few first couple of
24 sentences to start off where we're kind
25 of coming from on this.

2 Dr. Brennan says, quote,

3 Imagine walking out of your doctor's
4 office just as a pharmaceutical sales rep
5 is walking in. The rep shows up with
6 lunch for your doctor and the staff and
7 is carrying brochures about a medication
8 your doctor just prescribed for you. It
9 would make you wonder, wouldn't it? Am I
10 about to start a treatment that my doctor
11 thinks is best for me or is this a
12 product of someone's free lunch, unquote.

13 And when you see that, I think you get
14 worried, and then when you know through
15 multiple studies that the doctor quoted
16 and others that often times that
17 overprescribing comes because of the
18 gifts or the meals that even if it's
19 small -- and some of them are not small.
20 I'm going to get into that in a minute --
21 that the doctor provided, and I think you
22 would get really worried then. Then I
23 think you'd start to get angry when you
24 know that that prescription then led to
25 people getting addicted and getting that

2 slow fall down the hill into addiction
3 and maybe being one of 100 people a
4 month -- and I'm going to repeat that a
5 few times -- 100 people a month
6 approximately die from overdoses in the
7 City of Philadelphia.

8 And Councilwoman Bass and I
9 introduced this bill, and I know there's
10 some question, is it an Administration
11 bill, whose bill is it. Well, I think
12 we're proud to say it's our bill, and
13 it's our bill because it's the right
14 thing to do. And all we're asking is
15 that doctors -- I'm sorry; pharmaceutical
16 reps register after the fact given their
17 information so we can stay ahead of the
18 problem, and that's the whole idea behind
19 this bill, to stay ahead of the problem
20 and bar any kind of enticement to the
21 doctor, and that is for controlled
22 substances and what they call
23 psychoactive medications, things that can
24 become addictive. And it seemed to me
25 and I said -- I know I said this in

2 December. It seemed to me like a
3 no-brainer. Why would you even want to
4 question that the medicine you're getting
5 is for the right reasons and not because
6 of some enticement? And I'm not saying
7 every doctor overprescribes, the whole
8 people get addicted. I am not saying
9 that. But the results are the results.
10 The studies are the studies. And 100
11 people are dying a month.

12 But, you know, as I said
13 before, the Councilwoman and I, we just
14 wanted to deal with the facts. We just
15 wanted to show and try to get the right
16 thing done. The Councilwoman as the
17 Chair of the Public Health Committee
18 twice continued a hearing so that we
19 could try to work something out. We held
20 the bill in December from the full
21 Council to try to work something out, and
22 I know that was at your request also.
23 But we found out pretty soon we were
24 being played. There wasn't an honest
25 discussion.

2 At the first meeting, pharma
3 and some others came in. They didn't
4 even provide any written amendments, any
5 change. Basically just tried to talk us
6 out of doing it. When that was clear,
7 then they went the opposite direction.
8 They came in with all kind of amendments,
9 most of which either would make the bill
10 pointless or just had nothing to do with
11 the bill. And we made a pledge at that
12 moment, look, we will keep working with
13 you, but this bill should go forward and
14 we'll work on reasonable amendments. And
15 last week we put in reasonable
16 amendments. We cut the medications down
17 to only 15 percent of the drugs that are
18 out there being prescribed, 15 percent,
19 the most dangerous drugs. And we took
20 out any references, any concern that this
21 could affect conventions. But apparently
22 that wasn't enough. And pharma to me --
23 my humble opinion, but I'll stick to
24 it -- they knew they couldn't win on
25 their own, so they pulled other people

2 in, other people that maybe didn't even
3 need to be in this, IBX, the Convention
4 Center, the Visitors people, all that
5 because they thought, well, maybe that
6 could stop this bill. Because that's all
7 they wanted to do. They went into an
8 honest discussion; they just wanted to
9 kill this bill and show who got the power
10 in this city.

11 Well, we weren't going to go
12 with that. We were going to keep
13 fighting for this bill. And I don't know
14 where it's going to go today. A lot of
15 members are betwixt and between. I just
16 hope they think about it a little bit
17 more. And I'm going to keep repeating,
18 100 people a month die from overdoses,
19 real people.

20 And speaking of real people,
21 just today a friend of mine said her
22 cousin, mother, four children, went in
23 for knee surgery, got overprescribed.
24 Now she's somewhere in Kensington. They
25 don't even know where the hell she is.

2 And they think the next time they'll see
3 her is in a cemetery. That's just one
4 example. I'm going to give a couple more
5 as we go on.

6 And I'm sorry I'm taking a lot
7 of time, and maybe you're lucky because
8 my voice might give out before I'm
9 finished, but this is important, because
10 we're talking about people. We're
11 talking about people, and we're talking
12 about reality here. That's the reality
13 out there. People are dying.

14 And with all due respect to our
15 friends in the hospitality industry, I
16 just have a real concern with a couple of
17 things they said in a letter, because,
18 first of all, they keep talking -- and,
19 see, this is what you do when you try to
20 oppose a bill. I know it. We've been
21 around a little bit. You don't talk
22 about the real issue. You talk about
23 over here and up there and under here and
24 on the side, and that's what they keep
25 trying to do. And one of the things that

2 is in the letter from Julie Coker Graham
3 and John McNichol, good people, doing
4 their job over there, is that it should
5 be limited to opioids. Now, how many
6 times -- and I think we've gone on record
7 a number of times saying this isn't just
8 about opioids. In fact, it's more about
9 other addictive drugs that are coming up.
10 If we limited this bill to opioids, I
11 think it's the equivalent of saying we
12 put a smoke detector in the building
13 after it caught fire. Because the
14 opioids are out there. This bill will
15 not stop most of that. In fact, opioid
16 use has already gone down a little bit
17 because they've been out there so long.
18 We're trying to get the next and the next
19 line of addiction taken care of.

20 And it is also written in this
21 letter that this bill, although
22 right-minded, is false-promising. I
23 don't know what that means. We never
24 said it was the solution to the whole
25 problem. We said we would sit down and

2 talk about other things, but we didn't
3 false-promise anything. We didn't say it
4 was a total solution, but we said it will
5 have an effect, and experts say it will
6 have an effect. And I think they know a
7 little bit more than, in all due respect,
8 the Visitors people do.

9 And then they said they will
10 work to enact real change. Well, this is
11 real change. This is a start. So it's
12 not the end, but it's a start. But what
13 we keep hearing is, we'll sit, we'll
14 study, we'll do a committee, we'll do
15 this. And I just remember Councilman
16 Jones's statement about paralysis by
17 analysis. That means nothing gets done
18 for a long time. And may I repeat, 100
19 people die a month.

20 Now, these people, Julie and
21 John and all the good people, they have
22 their own lenses, and I understand that.
23 They got to worry about what they see.
24 First of all, I don't see why this
25 bill -- because, again, we took out any

2 reference to conventions. This bill,
3 they shouldn't even be in this anymore.
4 This is over as far as they're concerned.
5 We took care of their problem. But the
6 reason they're still in it is, the
7 pharmaceutical industry is threatening
8 that just because we had the audacity in
9 this city to put some regulations in
10 against them, that they might not come
11 here anymore and they could ruin our
12 economy. That's the kind of people we're
13 dealing with? We're going to get held
14 hostage by those folks? But, again,
15 these folks have their -- Julie and John
16 have their lenses, but don't our lens
17 have to be a lot wider? Doesn't it have
18 to include a whole lot of people? And,
19 again, let me give you an example of
20 somebody it should include.

21 The Public Health Committee had
22 a hearing back in December up in
23 Kensington, and I'll be honest with you,
24 after about two hours, I was getting
25 tired and hungry and I was trying to

2 figure out how I could lean out the door
3 a little bit. But then a young man stood
4 up, about 13 years old, lived in either
5 probably Councilwoman Sanchez's or
6 Councilman Squilla's district. You know
7 they intersect up there. And he said
8 that he's lucky because he gets a ride to
9 school every day, but as he's riding,
10 some of his classmates are stepping over
11 and around addicts laying on the
12 sidewalk, needles stuck out of their
13 neck. And he just says, why is that
14 right? What are you guys -- what can you
15 guys do about that?

16 So what I would say to all of
17 the members here, we just don't have to
18 answer to our friends here in the
19 industry. We have to answer to kids like
20 that. He can't afford lobbyists. He
21 can't threaten anybody in here. He's
22 just a kid that wants to go to school.
23 Don't we owe him too? Don't we owe him
24 that maybe he can live a decent life up
25 there and doesn't have to go through that

2 chaos?

3 Now, again, when there's a
4 bill -- when you're trying to kill a
5 bill, you do the whole "end of the world"
6 theory. We've heard it so many times.
7 The world is going to end. People aren't
8 going to come to the City. We're going
9 to fall into the great abyss, and that's
10 the kind of things we're kind of hearing
11 out of this. And I always think back to
12 Councilwoman Tasco -- and I think it was
13 during paid sick leave -- who said many
14 times, I heard about the world ending
15 and, Lord, here I sit and the world
16 hasn't ended. And if we pass this bill,
17 the world hasn't ended, but it ended for
18 100 people a month and it ended for their
19 families or at least a part of their
20 families. That's who we should worry
21 about. That's who should have the
22 priority here, and that's what this vote
23 will come down to, in my opinion, is
24 priority.

25 Now, please, get me right. I

2 don't think any of the 17 of us don't
3 care about this issue. None of us want
4 to see this happen. None of us want to
5 see what's happening in Kensington.

6 Nobody wants to see people on Chestnut
7 Street with their dogs lying there.

8 Nobody wants to see people dying. But
9 are we going to do something? And this

10 is not -- I'll be the first one, because

11 we've been real here. We've been telling
12 the truth. We're not saying it's the

13 solution. I'll keep repeating that. But
14 it's something. We need to move forward.

15 We need to show people that we're doing
16 something substantive, and this is

17 substantive. And if it saves 10, 20, 30
18 percent of those people, and I think it

19 could, isn't that worth it? They're
20 people's lives. And all we're asking the

21 pharmaceutical reps is to work a little
22 harder, work a little harder to get into

23 your meetings. Don't have to come in
24 with pizza and steaks. And, by the way,

25 it must be more than pizza and steaks

1 2/7/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 because, again, we're hearing from these
3 high-priced restaurants they're going to
4 lose hundreds of thousands of dollars.

5 It's not about pizza and steaks and ham
6 sandwiches, I guess. I don't know what
7 it's about. It's pretty bad when the
8 opponents can't even get their own
9 stories straight. And we've been
10 straight. We've been saying the same
11 thing the whole time.

12 So I hate to put people on the
13 spot. It's not my style. But after a
14 while, you got to make a decision. You
15 got to take a stand on what is the most
16 important thing.

17 Some people are going to be
18 upset with us. I understand that. But
19 there's a lot of people that we're going
20 to help if we pass this bill. I truly
21 believe it. And maybe there's little
22 pieces -- and it doesn't take effect for
23 180 days, so there's little pieces that
24 maybe we can work in. But we just have
25 to think, why are these people fighting

2 this bill so hard? Why are they fighting
3 it that hard? Just because they can't
4 bring a sandwich in? There's got to be
5 more going on than that. Or are they
6 just trying to bully us? Are they just
7 trying to show that they're going to
8 knock down anything that a city does?

9 Well, you know, look, I wasn't
10 a tough guy, but I hung around tough
11 guys. I was smart enough to do that when
12 I was a kid, and I know you stand up to
13 bullies. And we got to stand up here,
14 and we got to stand up for people. We
15 got to stand up for those hundred people
16 that die each month and their families.

17 I'm sorry I'm getting
18 emotional. I'm sorry.

19 One last thing. There's
20 another group of people that's going to
21 be looking at us, at what we do today,
22 and they're people that right now don't
23 know who we are, maybe don't even know
24 City Council meets in Room 400 on a
25 Thursday. And that may sound strange

2 that they're looking at us now, but
3 here's what I mean. If we pass this bill
4 and it takes effect, there's going to be
5 people who are going to go into a
6 doctor's office and because that doctor
7 did not get any kind of enticement, he's
8 much more likely not to overprescribe.
9 And instead of going down that hill of
10 getting into addiction, in prostitution,
11 in stealing, in laying in some doorway
12 somewhere and then possibly lying in a
13 cemetery some day, those people are going
14 to just go about their lives. They're
15 going to get the proper treatment and
16 they're going to go about their lives.
17 Again, they don't know who we are, and
18 maybe in two years we're going to walk by
19 that person on the street. Again, they
20 don't know who we are. We don't know
21 them, but we did something for them. We
22 did something for them, and we owe them,
23 we owe the people that. We owe their
24 families. And I'm sorry to get emotional
25 here, but this is important, and we got

2 to make a choice. We got to make a
3 choice of where we are.

4 We're not trying to hurt
5 anybody. I don't think we'll hurt
6 businesses here. I think this is all a
7 lot of hooey. It's the same thing they
8 do every time we try to do something for
9 people. Businesses come in and say we're
10 going to end -- we're going to be so
11 anti-business and we're sending the wrong
12 message. What message are we sending to
13 the people who are dying?

14 I'm sorry, Mr. President.

15 I urge, respectfully urge, all
16 members of Council to vote for this very,
17 very reasonable bill.

18 Thank you, sir.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Let
23 me recognize Councilwoman -- you want me
24 to do Councilwoman Bass first?

25 The Chair recognizes

2 Councilwoman Bass.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. And I want to first start
5 by saying to my colleague just how proud
6 I am of you for that speech. I don't
7 know if that means anything, but I'm just
8 really in awe of what you just said,
9 because you really made the case as to
10 why we should vote for this bill.

11 This should be a no-brainer.
12 There's not a whole lot to think about
13 when we have people dying on our
14 sidewalks throughout the City at an
15 enormous rate here in the City of
16 Philadelphia. We have to do something.
17 And we can't leave it up to industry to
18 do something about a problem that they
19 have taken a hands-off approach to. They
20 have stepped away from this problem.
21 They have done nothing, and all along
22 could have done many, many, many things
23 to address this issue.

24 And so I just want to say that
25 this has been quite an interesting

2 process. Councilmember Greenlee and I
3 have held this bill. We've held numerous
4 meetings with the pharmaceutical industry
5 and others. We've added some of their
6 amendments, and we've hoped all along for
7 some form of compromise. Nothing.

8 We could have proceeded in
9 December, but in that same spirit of
10 compromise, we held. Meanwhile, the same
11 folks who asked us to work with them and
12 assured us that they would bring
13 something back to the table if we held
14 back in December spent that time, rather
15 than working with us, lobbying members of
16 this body with claims of doom and
17 destruction over an inability to buy
18 lunches and give gifts to doctors.

19 Truth be told, we can point to
20 doom and destruction happening right now
21 in our city, although it's not as visible
22 to most because it's, as we say, in the
23 cut. Outside and far away from most of
24 our Center City sidewalks is the
25 destruction that is occurring in the

2 lives of people who have been on the
3 receiving end of heavily written
4 prescriptions that have led us down this
5 path. We didn't arrive here by some sort
6 of mistake or happenstance.

7 In a legislative body in which
8 we always say we put people in front of
9 profits, I don't see how we can vote
10 against this bill. I want to ask that
11 members vote their conscience and vote
12 what makes sense. I ask the members to
13 vote for this bill. It's the right thing
14 to do. It is going to make a difference,
15 and it's going to be on the right side of
16 history.

17 A couple of things I just
18 wanted to address besides that. One of
19 the speakers on behalf of the industry
20 said that they were committed on this
21 issue. Well, I haven't seen it.
22 Councilman Greenlee hasn't seen it. The
23 City of Philadelphia isn't seeing it. We
24 don't see any commitment to this city in
25 terms of doing something, anything

2 significant about the opioid or addictive
3 drugs beyond opioids, because we know
4 that opioids are on the way out and that
5 other drugs are on the way in. And so
6 what is being done? Absolutely nothing
7 by industry. We have no support, no help
8 for this crisis that we are dealing with
9 every single day.

10 The other thing I wanted to
11 address was a letter that went around
12 that said essentially that this bill
13 doesn't do anything. This was from the
14 industry. Well, if the bill doesn't do
15 anything, what's the problem with passing
16 it? If the bill doesn't mean anything,
17 if it's such a marshmallow, what is the
18 problem?

19 And so, Councilman, I am going
20 to disagree with you on one thing you
21 said, and that was that when we met with
22 these folks, that we got played. I don't
23 think we got played. We did our jobs.
24 We did the right thing. We tried to find
25 a spirit of compromise. We tried to work

2 with folks who said they wanted to work
3 with us. You can only take people at
4 their word, and if their word isn't worth
5 anything, then what can you do about
6 that? And so we didn't get played, but a
7 whole lot of other people got played.

8 And so now it's time to vote
9 and to see where folks are. And, again,
10 I just want to ask people, ask members of
11 this body to vote their conscience and be
12 on the right side of history.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

16 (Applause.)

18 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

21 with the Board of Ethics, as a member of
22 the Independence Health Group Public
23 Policy and External Affairs Advisory
24 Board, I will be recusing myself and
25 abstaining from voting on Bill No.

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilwoman.

6 The Chair recognizes

7 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes,

9 Mr. President. Likewise, after

10 communication with the Board of Ethics

11 and as a member of the Independence

12 Health Group Public Advisory and External

13 Affairs Advisory Board, I will be

14 recusing myself and abstaining from

15 voting on Bill No. 180888-A.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 The Chair recognizes

20 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

21 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

22 you, Mr. President. I want to thank

23 Councilman Greenlee and Councilwoman

24 Bass, because I saw firsthand, both on

25 the Committee's side as Vice Chair of the

1 2/7/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Committee and through this process, their
3 willingness to sit down and talk about
4 this issue.

5 I did not engage in the debates
6 early on because this was not supposed to
7 be an opioid bill. It was really looking
8 at general rules and regulations. As
9 someone who is at the epicenter of this
10 opioid addiction, I can tell you
11 Councilman Greenlee's stories are true,
12 and there are a lot of bad actors.

13 At the hearings, I asked the
14 Administration to tell me what we were
15 doing internally about how we police
16 ourselves and regulate those doctors and
17 those folks within our own ranks. Over
18 the last four or five years, I have held
19 dozens of hours of hearings, talking
20 about reform within our own behavioral
21 health system.

22 The federal government shut
23 down four centers in my community for
24 Medicaid fraud and overprescribing. The
25 federal government. What I ask the

2 Administration and the Health Department
3 in particular is, what are we doing, so
4 that before we ask the private market to
5 do something, that we can look ourselves
6 in the mirror and say we're doing
7 everything we can.

8 Today I don't feel comfortable
9 that we're doing enough within ourselves
10 and then asking the industry to do
11 something.

12 I totally support some form of
13 registry. I totally support the notion
14 that we should know who's in our market
15 and what they are doing. I am
16 uncomfortable at this given time, and I
17 have faith in our ability if this gets
18 voted down today to come back and look at
19 something, but the Administration has to
20 tell and provide better direction around
21 what we are asking people to do versus
22 just telling people what they cannot do.

23 On this legislation, after we
24 put this out of Committee, I got calls
25 from several medical providers in my

2 district, people who normally don't
3 engage with City government, and they
4 asked me to come in. And I went into
5 their medical facilities and I talked to
6 them, and it was clear that there was a
7 lot of misinformation. There continues
8 to be misinformation.

9 My concern and the reason --
10 and we all look for the reason for why
11 not -- is I have asked for many reforms.
12 I have doctors that are getting paid and
13 reimbursed by the City that are working
14 seven days a week, 12 hours a day, and I
15 have no way of stopping them because we
16 don't have internal rules and
17 regulations.

18 And so what I'm asking is that
19 we develop those in ourselves, and then
20 we can ask the private market to do what
21 we know can happen based on our own
22 operational ability to monitor ourselves.
23 And for that reason, as I said to both
24 sponsors of the bill, because I support
25 the spirit and the intent of this bill,

2 for that reason, I will be voting no.

3 Thank you, Council President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilwoman.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Greenlee.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. Just quickly. I'm
10 not going to dispute some of the
11 criticism Councilwoman Sanchez has for
12 the Administration. She knows more about
13 that. She's worked hard on it for years.
14 I guess my question would be, what's that
15 got to do with this bill? We're trying
16 to do something here.

17 I'll totally agree and I think
18 we said earlier that we're willing to
19 work with whoever and however to help
20 solve this problem, and if the
21 Administration hasn't done what they need
22 to do, then they need to do it and we
23 need to keep working with them.

24 But, again, this is a very
25 simple bill, a bill that experts have

2 said can have an effect, can have an
3 effect, maybe not overwhelming, but I
4 guess with all due respect, if somebody
5 else isn't doing right, then we don't do
6 the right thing? I guess I don't
7 understand that. I don't understand that

10 bill today, in my opinion, and if we pass
11 it, we should work on the issues
12 Councilwoman Sanchez said and any other
13 issues that are out there, but I guess I
14 don't understand being against this bill
15 because the Administration hasn't done
16 what they need to do. Because if that's
17 true -- and, again, I'll take her at her
18 word on that, because I'm not an expert
19 on that issue, but I guess I just don't
20 understand that kind of argument. We got
21 something before us today that can have
22 some effect on people in districts all
23 over the City. And this problem isn't --
24 one thing about addiction, it ain't
25 discriminatory. There's people getting

10 think that's a reason not to be
11 supportive of this bill.

22 of other sales in the area of \$107, \$108
23 a foot to \$290 a foot and we're selling
24 this at \$17 a foot. That's what I'm
25 against, the value.

3 in my opinion, it's worth every bit of
4 \$20 million. And when the article was
5 written in the Inquirer by Joe DiStefano,
6 a developer, several, called me about the
7 property who weren't aware of it. One of
8 them told me for the same deal, they
9 would pay 20 million, but the RFP was too
10 late. But it just demonstrates to me
11 that we did not sell this at the right
12 price.

13 I like the uses. I love
14 everything that's going on. It's just
15 the wrong value, and that's why I'm
16 voting no.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, sir.

20 The Chair recognizes
21 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

22 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
23 you, Council President. And I've talked
24 with Councilwoman Blackwell around this
25 and I made the question during the

2 hearing in which I was present, not a
3 member of Public Property but present. I
4 have a real concern about its future use
5 and the opportunities that may exist
6 where the City of Philadelphia will be
7 funding some of the potential tenants and
8 then paying rent in a deal where we're
9 giving a massive reduction. And I've
10 expressed this to the Administration.
11 We've had similar situations both at 8th
12 and Girard, which is in your district,
13 that I have not totally engaged because
14 it's not in my district, but I think it
15 sets a pattern. If we're going to do as
16 we do with our non-profits when we do
17 nominal transactions or reduced
18 transactions for an end purpose, that
19 they are clarified, justified, recorded,
20 and transparent.

21 The opportunity for many
22 City-funded programs to be in that
23 facility and that that not be reflected
24 in the price or potential future leases
25 is of a concern to me, and for that

2 reason, I will vote no.

3 Thank you.

17 with one caveat. I live and work in a
18 world that if it's not in writing, it
19 doesn't exist. And so I have learned
20 just a few moments ago that Councilwoman
21 Blackwell has in writing that the new
22 entity with its new use and new tenants
23 will not, will not jeopardize or put out
24 of business a 30-year-old entity known as
25 Kirkbride, which has been in the business

3 homeless children and families, and those
4 who are suffering with drugs.

5 So with that, I'm delighted to
6 support in favor of this bill.
