2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. We're going to get
4 started. If the visitors will retire
5 behind the rail and the members take
6 their seats, we'll get started. Thank
7 you for your cooperation.

8 Before we start, I'm going to
9 ask anyone -- the last couple of weeks
10 we've been having some intermittent cell
11 phones and other electronic devices go

2 PASTOR PREISINGER: Thank you,
3 President Clarke.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 You're welcome.

6 PASTOR PREISINGER: Thank you
7 especially to Councilwoman Cherelle
8 Parker, who I am here at her invitation
9 this morning. I bring the Council
10 greetings from Reformation Lutheran
11 Church in East Mount Airy, where I have
12 the privilege to serve as pastor. I have
13 been there for just over a year and, in
14 that short time, have learned that these
15 people whom God has entrusted to me care
16 about their neighborhood deeply, care
17 about the City deeply. And so it is with

15 actions in our country, I would just want
16 to take a moment to remind us that love
17 is always good policy.

18 I'd also like to take a moment
19 to remind the members of the City Council
20 about the tremendous opportunity that
21 they have to enact policies of love. As
22 Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
23 once said, we have before us the glorious
24 opportunity to inject a new dimension of
25 love into the veins of our civilization.

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2 My hope is that this great city that I
3 call home, this great city where I work
4 and serve might become more true to its
5 name, a city where neighbors treat one
6 another with love, a city where policies
7 are enacted that love and honor the
8 dignity of all people.

9 With all that said, let us
10 pray.

11 Holy and Gracious God, your son
12 Jesus provided us with a glimpse of your
13 heavenly kingdom where everyone is
14 treated with love. And so we pray this
15 day and every day that the world might
16 begin to look more like the kingdom of
17 God.

18 We pray for an end to violence,
19 for an end to greed, for an end to
20 injustice, and an end to racism. We pray
21 for an end to the diabolical cycles of
22 poverty that cripple so many. And we
23 pray that more people, Lord, would wake
24 up to their privilege and make room for
25 those voices that are so often ignored.

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2 Holy God, bless this City
3 Council. Bless these leaders. Bless
4 them and help all those who hold power
5 throughout our city to understand that
6 the power they have been given is a trust
7 from you to be used, not for personal
8 glory or profit, but for the service of
9 the people.

10 Drive from these leaders all
11 cynicism, selfishness, and corruption,
12 and guide their work with the spirit of
13 wisdom and charity.

14 Lord, in this city where the
15 history of love, justice, and liberty is
16 so strong, we pray for more of the same
17 in the future. May the actions and
18 decisions made here this day be inspired
19 by your holy spirit. May they bring our
20 city closer to your vision for this
21 world.

15 to provide for a decent, living wage; and
16 providing for the submission of the
17 amendment to the electors of
18 Philadelphia.

20 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. On behalf of and in
23 partnership with the Administration, I am
24 proud to join with the co-sponsors
25 Councilman Mark Squilla and Councilwoman

2 Blondell Reynolds Brown in introducing
3 this legislation because far too often
4 the collective voice of Philadelphia
5 residents does not seem to be heard at
6 the state level.

7 This legislation will put the
8 following question on the May 21st
9 ballot: Shall the Philadelphia Home Rule
10 Charter be amended to call on the General
11 Assembly to either increase the
12 Pennsylvania minimum wage now so that it
13 reaches \$15 an hour in stages by 2025 or,
14 Mr. President, allow the City of
15 Philadelphia itself to provide for a
16 decent, family-sustaining living wage for
17 working Philadelphians.

18 With such a ballot question, we
19 shall allow the citizens of Philadelphia
20 to formally weigh in on a state level
21 policy issue.

22 For those who may not know,
23 Pennsylvania's minimum wage of \$7.25 an
24 hour has been unchanged for the past ten
25 years while the cost of living has risen

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2 more than 13 percent since 2009.

3 Contrary to what many people
4 believe, the average employee earning
5 minimum wage is not a teenager working a
6 part-time job. According to the Economic
7 Policy Institute, the typical worker who
8 will benefit from a \$15 minimum wage is a
9 35-year-old woman with some college level
10 coursework who works full time, and
11 raising the minimum wage to \$15 will be
12 particularly significant for workers of
13 color. Nearly two-fifths, that's 38
14 percent, of African Americans and
15 one-third, that's 33 percent, of Latinos
16 would get a raise if the federal minimum
17 wage were increased to \$15.

18 Now, furthermore,
19 Pennsylvanians as a whole would benefit
20 if that action ever took place. If the
21 minimum wage were incrementally increased
22 to \$15 per hour, by the time of full-time
23 implementation, over a quarter of a
24 million Philadelphia residents, that's
25 nearly half of our workforce, they would

2 be affected by the wage increase.

3 Now, my co-sponsors on this
4 legislation have been avid supporters of
5 raising the minimum wage in Philadelphia.
6 We also know that Mayor Kenney signed
7 into law legislation sponsored by our
8 colleague Councilman Mark Squilla that
9 will make sure that all employees of the
10 City and City contractors earn what they
11 deserve, which is a minimum wage of \$15
12 per hour, and just two weeks ago our
13 colleague Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
14 Brown introduced a resolution urging the
15 Pennsylvania State Legislature to pass
16 Governor Wolf's proposal to raise the
17 minimum wage to \$12 an hour, with a
18 pathway to \$15 an hour for all workers in
19 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and her
20 resolution is on Final Passage today.

21 Raising the minimum wage,
22 Mr. President, is not a new idea. And
23 while I'd love for Pennsylvania to be a
24 leader on this issue, we are actually
25 well behind others. Currently there are

2 31 states and 41 cities in the United
3 States that have minimum wage levels
4 higher than the federal minimum wage of
5 7.25 per hour.

6 Furthermore -- this is very
7 important to note -- private local
8 employers like Jefferson have recently
9 raised their minimum wage to \$15 an hour
10 without any legislative incentive to do
11 so. Jefferson did that on its own, and
12 they are to be commended.

13 Philadelphians have a right to
14 counteract the narrative that raising the
15 minimum wage is a job killer. This
16 ballot question will allow Philadelphians
17 to say, if they so choose, that raising
18 the minimum wage is not a job killer. In
19 reality, it's an inequality killer, it's
20 a poverty reducer, it's a people
21 dignifier, and it's a work-life balancer
22 and, most importantly, it gives
23 Philadelphians the right to make sure
24 their voices are heard.

25 Thank you, Mr. President, and

9 Council President. I have one
10 non-privileged resolution. I'd like to
11 be heard after the title is read.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
15 resolution calling on the State
16 Legislature of Pennsylvania, the Governor
17 of Pennsylvania, and the federal
18 government to mandate these certain
19 education initiatives in Pennsylvania and
20 to mandate these initiatives nationwide.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

23 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
24 Council President. These initiatives, I
25 just want to elaborate, nothing that's

2 new, but the mandatory requirement of
3 teaching pre-K to twelfth grade financial
4 literacy, technology, including coding,
5 ninth to twelfth grade teaching
6 entrepreneurship classes, and ninth to
7 twelfth grade children have the
8 opportunity to work on a job one day a
9 week and go to school for four days a
10 week. This is great for Philadelphia.

11 It's great for the State of Pennsylvania,
12 and it's good for the whole nation. And
13 I met with Governor Wolf. I believe he's
14 a supporter of this. Congressman Evans
15 is a supporter. I've been working with
16 State Rep Jordan Harris in the
17 Legislature to try to make this happen.

18 But this is a bipartisan issue.
19 It is not democrat or republican. This
20 is about making sure our children have
21 the right tools when they grow up to be
22 adults to be successful in their lives.

23 So I hope -- by the way, it's
24 supported by all members of Council, and
25 I thank all members. I just hope we can

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

21 All those in favor say aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and these bills will be
4 placed on our First Reading Calendar
5 today.

6 The next order of business is
7 consideration of the Calendar, and I note
8 that the bills just reported from
9 committee with a suspension of the rules
10 have been deemed to have had their first
11 reading. They will be on our Second
12 Reading and Final Passage Calendar at our
13 next session of Council.

14 As there are no additional
15 bills on our First Reading Calendar, the
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
17 purpose of calling up bills and
18 resolutions that are on our Final Passage
19 Calendar today.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. The following resolutions
22 and bills are being called up for Second
23 Reading and Final Passage Calendar today:
24 Bill Nos. 190091, 190096, 180834, 190028,
25 190004, 180820, 180943, and 190007. All

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you very much, Councilman.

6 Before we consider the bills
7 and resolutions that are on the Final
8 Passage Calendar today, we will have our
9 public comment session.

10 If you are interested in
11 testifying on a bill on resolution that
12 is on the Final Passage Calendar today, I
13 would ask that you sign up at the table
14 to my left, if you have not already done
15 so.

16 When your name is called, you
17 will go to the middle of the Council
18 Chambers. There's a podium. There's a
19 device on that podium. When the light
20 turns green on that device, it will be
21 your time to speak. When it turns
22 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
23 conclude your remarks. When it turns
24 red, we'd ask that you please adhere to
25 our guidelines and conclude your remarks.

2 I want to thank you very much for your
3 anticipated cooperation.

4 Mr. Decker, if you call the
5 first witness to testify.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Cox,
7 commenting on 190004.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MR. COX: Hello. Good morning.
12 Thank you. My name is Joe Cox.

13 190004, Senior Citizens
14 Low-Income Special Tax Provision, by
15 extending the deadline for low-income
16 seniors to apply for a refund or
17 forgiveness of Real Estate Taxes. I
18 applaud this and any bill that aims to
19 help low-income people in the poorest big
20 city.

21 I'm going to read a poem about
22 the reality that we live in.

23 She used to live right there,
24 but she froze right there. Within a
25 block, a few banks. Over there you can

2 see skyscrapers. Not far, millionaires
3 are living. She used to live right
4 there, but she froze right there, on the
5 streets of Philadelphia, one of many.
6 But they say people over profits. I say
7 prove it. Words are pointless without
8 action.

9 RIP, Ginny, one of many.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Cora Turpin,
14 commenting on 190004.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 DR. TURPIN: Good morning. I
19 am Dr. Cora Turpin of the Concerned
20 Senior Citizens of Philadelphia. I am
21 also a committee person of the 5th Ward,
22 23rd Division for over 30 years.

23 I stand in support of Bill
24 190004, which provides tax relief for
25 people of low and modest income. I pray

2 that you have the courage to eliminate
3 the barriers and freeze the Actual Value
4 Initiative for all citizens, regardless
5 of income, at age 65 and above. This
6 bill doesn't do that.

7 It is the middle class that is
8 presently exempt from your consideration
9 of the tax reform that is bearing the
10 burden of all these AVI taxes. These are
11 your parents, who worked all their lives
12 to educate you and pay for their homes,
13 that you are now abandoning. These are
14 the people who bought homes in
15 Philadelphia under threat of losing their
16 jobs as a City employee in the 1970s.
17 These are the people who stabilized their
18 neighborhoods at that time to make them
19 desirable places to live when the fight
20 of property owners from the City was
21 excessively problematic.

22 I refuse to think that the
23 present City Councilpersons cannot
24 understand that the AVI is based on the
25 cost of construction. As developers

2 build new structures in old neighborhoods
3 all over the City, the value of property
4 rises and will continue to rise.
5 Construction costs never go down.

6 As the AVI sucks away the
7 buying power of people on fixed income,
8 the number of foreclosures for formerly
9 middle-class seniors will increase.

10 Don't live too long. It is
11 mathematically impossible to sustain
12 rising taxes on fixed incomes.
13 Homelessness of the middle class is
14 imminent. City Council has provided tax
15 breaks for the rich and for the poor.
16 Let the middle class survivors have the
17 peace of mind and a home in the
18 neighborhoods they settled. After all,
19 you can depend on their voting in every
20 election.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

24 (Applause.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Amber Hikes,

2 commenting on 180834 and 180820.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MS. HIKES: Good morning. My
7 name is Amber Hikes and I am the
8 Executive Director of the Mayor's Office
9 of LGBT Affairs for the City of
10 Philadelphia, and I am proudly in support
11 of Resolution 180834, which is an
12 amendment to change certain
13 gender-specific references, "councilman,"
14 "councilmen," "Councilmanic," to
15 gender-neutral references such as
16 "councilmember."

17 Titles such as councilman
18 create an environment in which women and
19 non-binary people have to carve out space
20 for themselves in ways that men do not.
21 This is not only in order to be addressed
22 with accurate language, but to exist
23 meaningfully and hold power in that
24 space. The barriers created by this type
25 of exclusive language keep gender

2 minorities from accessing leadership
3 positions that enable them to make
4 positive social change. Representation
5 of marginalized communities in positions
6 of leadership is invaluable to addressing
7 the needs of these communities. Creating
8 a culture in which non-binary people can
9 be properly identified and affirmed
10 within City Council roles fosters
11 positive representation in the City's
12 government.

13 For Philadelphia to actively
14 include gender-neutral language in one of
15 the City's oldest governing documents
16 would set a monumental precedent for
17 others to follow. This action would also
18 demonstrate our recognition of the
19 changing landscape in our society.

20 In short, this legislation
21 gives transgender, gender non-conforming,
22 and non-binary people a chance. It says
23 that they are worthy of being included in
24 our city's government and that they are
25 worthy of the effort it takes to

2 represent them.

3 We all believe this should be
4 true, but we do not demonstrate it
5 enough. So this legislation is an
6 opportunity for the City of Philadelphia
7 to pull up an extra seat at the table and
8 invite trans, gender non-conforming, and
9 non-binary people to sit down. This
10 legislation shows that members of our
11 non-binary community are not just
12 included, but they are also needed and
13 wanted.

14 So the Office of LGBT Affairs
15 wholeheartedly supports Bill No. 180834
16 and any measures to affirm and support
17 trans, non-binary, and gender
18 non-conforming people. This is a simple
19 change with an incredible impact.

20 Thank you so much.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Henry Sias.

25 (No response.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Henry Sias.

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not
5 here? Next name.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,
7 commenting on 180834.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MR. KING: My name is Clarc
12 King and I am speaking regarding 180834.
13 I am not convinced that gender-specific
14 statutes or legislation is necessary or
15 will increase the civility -- I'm sorry.
16 Anyway, I don't think the resolution will
17 increase civility among the members of
18 society.

19 I want to point out that men
20 and women, sex and children are economy
21 drivers, and what is happening is that
22 the economic rights and interests of the
23 worker, men and women, are being driven
24 into obscurity by political correctness.

25 The child is precious.

2 Financialization's hostility indicated by
3 low-wage economy, high unemployment, and
4 housing dedicated to finance's
5 gentrification demands our focus and
6 resolution. Irrationalism must be
7 identified. We must recognize that
8 poverty is caused by the Wall Street
9 system and work to undo the damage that
10 financialization has done to this great
11 city and the whole country.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Dwight Franks,
16 commenting on 190096.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MR. FRANKS: Yes. Hello. I
21 want to thank you for the resolution and
22 designation of 190096.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
24 just state your name for the record.

25 MR. FRANKS: Yes. My name is

2 Dwight Franks. I'm a veteran and a block
3 captain, and I thank you for the
4 resolution of 190096.

5 I've been having some problems
6 finding -- just trying to find a way to
7 go and get help as a veteran, so I thank
8 you, and I'll be visiting your office
9 very soon. Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
14 commenting on 190096, 181005-A, and
15 190074.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.
20 This is an official decree of the people
21 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
22 such, requires immediate action and
23 remedy.

24 Every week, Council, Mayor,
25 Governor, and others transfer private

2 property to the government, probably
3 illegally.

4 Can a first-class city treat
5 its people like they are second-class
6 citizens?

7 Last week I witnessed the
8 Oscar-worthy performance. The Council I
9 know hears your home was stolen, then
10 unanimously approves spending upwards of
11 120 million HUD low-income housing money
12 to build a mall on top of my stolen home.

13 Your oath, Constitution, and
14 law-violating actions speak louder than
15 your words.

16 Socialism, fascism, and
17 communism restrict and deny property
18 rights. Article IV, Section 4 requires
19 federal governments stop the invasion of
20 rights and maintain a republican form of
21 government. In cases of incompetent
22 legislators, look around you, executive
23 or presidential action is required.
24 Given this RICO-style conspiracy to deny
25 rights, Attorney General is required to

2 prosecute.

3 The constitutions require
4 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
5 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
6 duty. Your oath of office requires you
7 to act or face prison.

8 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
9 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
10 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
11 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
12 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
13 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
14 14-4056 appear violated.

15 I call on the federal and
16 Commonwealth governments to perform their
17 constitutional obligations to investigate
18 and prosecute all involved in the theft
19 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
20 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

21 The denial of God-given 42 USC
22 1982 property rights for 25 years is
23 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
24 and requires immediate remedy.

25 A just government must obey the

2 rule of law. This color of law
3 government must have its Charter to
4 govern revoked until a constitutionally
5 compliant government is installed.

6 Public servants cannot refuse
7 their sworn duty to act any more than a
8 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
9 sovereign people require oath,
10 Constitution, and law be enforced, and
11 jail is required for all who violate
12 oath, Constitution or law.

13 I remind Council, it takes a
14 lot of cooperation to create and allow
15 this monumental corruption.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you for your testimony.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna Hagins,
19 commenting on 170408.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MR. HAGINS: Great morning.

24 How you doing? I'm commenting on 170408
25 introduced by Reynolds Brown and Gym,

2 resolution calling and urging the School
3 District of Philadelphia to
4 permanently --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
6 just state your name for the record.

7 MR. HAGINS: Ogbonna Hagins,
8 O-G-B-O-N-N-A, Hagins.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you.

11 MR. HAGINS: To permanently
12 prohibit the suspension of
13 elementary-aged students from first
14 through fifth grade. I commented on this
15 about maybe six months ago and it's
16 absolutely a no-brainer, but I also want
17 to -- I want to also congratulate
18 Reynolds Brown for her service for City
19 Council for the past 20 years as well and
20 also Helen Gym for being the new drive
21 for education, you know. And there's a
22 need also in addition to not suspending
23 children, there's a need for safety in
24 our schools. And I just had a meeting
25 with some of the police officers from the

2 School District, and they only have about
3 300 police officers, and in 2000, there
4 were about 700. And there's just a lot
5 of issues that's happening that needs to
6 be addressed as well, on top of the fact
7 that we need a 21st century education
8 system that deals with science,
9 technology, engineering, arts, and math.

10 So absolutely don't suspend
11 children under the fifth grade, but we
12 have to develop tools so that we can
13 prevent the violence that's coming
14 obviously because our children are not
15 being educated and there are not jobs
16 being available for them because they're
17 not. There are tons and tons and tons of
18 jobs in the STEM area.

19 So that's one of the reasons --
20 oh, don't forget that our children have
21 to walk through these filthy,
22 littered-filled streets, you know. So we
23 need to address those areas as well. So
24 that's one of the reasons why I'm
25 supporting this bill, because of it being

2 an obvious thing, but I'm also glad to
3 say that I hope that I can join
4 Councilwoman Helen Gym as a
5 Councilperson, you know, here in these
6 Chambers to help to shape the minds of
7 the children of Philadelphia so that we
8 truly can be a 21st century world-class
9 city where we don't have all these
10 problems and we have so many solutions to
11 these problems. But we have to be
12 innovative and we have to use the
13 technology that we have.

14 Thank you. And that's it. So
15 I definitely am in favor of 170408.

16 Have a great day. Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, sir. Thank you for your
19 testimony.

20 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
21 other speakers on the public comment
22 list, Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 We will now consider our bills

10 know that you might need more than a name
11 to know a pronoun. You don't need to
12 have radical politics to say they and
13 them about an unidentified person that
14 pervades common speech.

15 To realize a more perfect
16 union, we need to affirmatively change
17 our customs and our linguistic habits to
18 leave pronoun choices to the person in
19 question, that we continue to shift that
20 has brought us police officers,
21 firefighters, and flight attendants where
22 gender titles once stood.

23 Today I ask my fellow members
24 of Council to take one such step to
25 rectify an archaic, but unnatural

11 section prohibiting retail establishments
12 from refusing to accept cash as a form of
13 payment.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Greenlee.

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. On the good old
20 dollar bill that's been around since Ben
21 Franklin has been walking the streets,
22 it's written, "This note is legal tender
23 for all debts, public and private."
24 Unfortunately, some places have popped up
25 recently that are called cashless, and

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2 that would be fine if everybody had the
3 same access to be able to walk into that
4 coffee shop, sandwich shop, salad place
5 and buy that product. Unfortunately,
6 it's been estimated nationwide 15 to 20
7 percent of people are unbanked, which
8 means they don't have credit and cannot
9 walk into those stores. In Philadelphia,
10 given unfortunately that we've been
11 called the poorest big city in America,
12 that number might be higher.

13 It inordinately affects
14 low-income, lower-income people,
15 minorities and immigrants. It's to me
16 just a fairness issue. This does not
17 stop any establishment from accepting
18 credit cards from any customer giving a
19 credit card as payment. It just says you
20 have to take the monetary unit of the
21 United States of America. So that's why
22 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez and I
23 introduced this bill. We just think it
24 gives everybody the same opportunity to
25 buy a product.

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2 Now, there might be a time in
3 the future where everybody has some kind
4 of access to some kind of card and all,
5 but we're not there now. We're not there
6 today. And all I'm saying is that -- all
7 we're saying is that people should be
8 treated equally and there shouldn't be,
9 even if it's unintentional, a sort of
10 tone out there that your business is not
11 welcome here, and that's unfortunately,
12 again, whether it's intentional or not,
13 what the cashless places I think are
14 giving out.

15 So I would hope that members
16 would support this bill.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

23 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
24 Council President. I have some concerns
25 regarding this bill that I just wanted to

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2 share.

3 As a city that already places a
4 high burden on businesses, we cannot
5 continue to dictate how entrepreneurs
6 choose to operate their business, and as
7 a city, we do need to be careful to pass
8 bills that are specific to our city,
9 because the effect could be to push
10 businesses over the county line. In New
11 Jersey, this type of bill is a statewide
12 application.

13 I also understand that we
14 cannot make everyone happy, but our
15 decisions are based on what's best for
16 the City as a whole. And this bill not
17 only affects businesses like Bluestone
18 and Sweetgreen, it places an even larger
19 burden on small business owners across
20 the entire City who take a huge risk to
21 create their business model.

22 I do applaud Councilman
23 Greenlee, and I understand his effort
24 towards fairness and his goal for this
25 bill. I just wish there was some middle

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2 ground we could reach that could address
3 the concerns I will now outline.

4 These are the effects I've been
5 told by our departments in the City that
6 this bill could have on our city:

7 Philadelphia will attract fewer
8 businesses. This is a real example.

9 Amazon called the Commerce Department and
10 advised them several times and said they
11 were considering bringing the Amazon Go
12 concept to Philadelphia, but this bill
13 would prevent that. This is a store that
14 would have approximately 100 jobs, and
15 although only a few of these exist
16 nationally, Amazon has made a recent
17 announcement that they're expecting to
18 have 300 of these Amazon Go stores in the
19 next few years. They explicitly told our
20 Commerce Department that this bill would
21 preclude them from coming.

22 Chains like Sweetgreen and
23 Bluestone Lane may not open any more
24 stores here and could potentially decide
25 to leave, losing jobs. Other chains are

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2 experimenting this concept nationwide and
3 may choose to pursue it and not expand in
4 Philadelphia.

5 For businesses that value
6 innovation and technology, Philadelphia
7 may not look as attractive. We may be
8 able to estimate the impact of not
9 bringing Amazon Go here, but we can only
10 guess how many other businesses may not
11 expand.

12 Cash businesses historically do
13 not report all of their sales. We will
14 experience a loss of revenue through
15 unreported income. Store owners who
16 accept cash seem to have a nightly
17 shortage due to cash errors that occur
18 just from making change. And on the flip
19 side, Sweetgreen and Bluestone reported
20 higher sales and profits because of this
21 model, which theoretically could have a
22 small positive impact on the City's sales
23 tax. It's the cash-only stores in the
24 City that really are the challenge to
25 ensure all taxes owed to the City are

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2 paid to the City. We want everyone to
3 pay their fair share, which then lowers
4 the overall burden.

5 Cashless business operators
6 state that not having cash on site
7 reduces the incidence of armed robberies
8 and ensures a safer environment for
9 patrons and employees. A reduction in
10 crime is a major benefit to all of us.

11 I also do not believe that
12 government should dictate how
13 entrepreneurs have to operate their
14 business. Long term the core of this
15 issue for us is to start teaching
16 financial literacy pre-K to 12 and
17 teaching everywhere in Philadelphia. And
18 while I do understand and I would like to
19 see the people who don't have credit
20 cards be able to shop there, I'm trying
21 to figure out if there is some middle
22 ground that we could achieve.

23 I totally understand all the
24 issues and I have empathy for the issues,
25 but I'm concerned about the loss of

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2 business taxes for the City, jobs, and
3 the messaging it sends. I'm open to an
4 amendment or adjustments, but I just
5 would like to see some sort of
6 compromise, if that's possible.

7 Thank you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman.

10 The Chair recognizes
11 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
13 Mr. President, and good morning again.
14 Councilman Domb's comments as given
15 through a business lens are, in my view
16 not being a businesswoman in the purest
17 sense of the word, are well taken and I
18 would not doubt at all that they're not
19 true.

20 On the flip side of that, three
21 things. One, Councilwoman Sanchez often
22 reminds us that we as elected officials
23 should always strike the delicate
24 balance. The decisions we make should
25 not be an either/or. The decisions we

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2 make on a regular basis and the challenge
3 for us is how we get to an "and." That's
4 number one.

5 Number two, we are the largest,
6 biggest poorest city in the country with
7 a 26 percent poverty rate, which
8 continues to be a noose around our necks,
9 and when we are elected to serve others,
10 that means that we have to look out for
11 the least of these. And knowing that we
12 have the largest poverty rate in the
13 country, that fact compels me to look out
14 for the least of these, who, quite
15 frankly, can't get a credit card.
16 They're worried about finding the cash,
17 getting the cash so that they can feed
18 their families.

19 And so while we should be
20 cognizant of large businesses that want
21 to come to Philadelphia, I care -- I'd
22 rather not have you if you're not going
23 to be with us to take care of people who
24 can't take care of themselves.

25 I think it's a brilliant idea.

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2 I was thrilled to watch the story on CBS
3 this morning with Gayle King, my favorite
4 anchor in the world. And so I applaud
5 Councilman Bill Greenlee for again being
6 consistent with his legislative record to
7 look out for the least of these, those
8 who can't afford a business card, those
9 who cannot afford a credit card, period.
10 I rest my case there.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilwoman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. I've only missed in my
18 tenure here two Council sessions. One of
19 them was in my second term and the other
20 was last week due to my brother. I will
21 never miss another Council session, God
22 willing, because in my absence, my good
23 colleague, Councilman Greenlee, decided
24 not to run again. So I guess because I
25 wasn't here, he made that decision.

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2 But I'm here for you now,
3 Brother.

4 And I want to say that
5 throughout my history dealing with him,
6 he has usually, if not 100 percent of the
7 time, 99 percent of the time, been on the
8 right side of the issue and, that is, the
9 least of thee, the least of thee. And
10 when we talk about the impoverished, I
11 think of one of my aunts, who will remain
12 nameless, because she got mad at me
13 because I shouted her out and she
14 actually watches these things. She keeps
15 her cash still in a napkin or a -- what
16 is it, a handkerchief that she ties up
17 and keeps in a special place, and she
18 does not trust banks. She does not trust
19 MAC cards. She checks everything twice
20 on receipts, and she is not where my
21 colleague is. And what the compromise
22 for me is not now. I didn't say not
23 ever, but not now.

24 Until we catch up with the
25 economy and the vast majority of people

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2 are working and working in a system where
3 they can afford to have a bank account
4 and a credit card, then we can reconsider
5 this, but until they're there, it matters
6 to me. And, you know, if I got -- she
7 may be, but she's mine, and I want to
8 make sure that she is as comfortable as
9 the new people that have chosen the path
10 of plastic when she goes to the store and
11 doesn't have to walk an extra two blocks
12 because she chose the legal tender of
13 this country. So I will be supporting my
14 colleague's bill.

15 Thank you, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Greenlee.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. Very quickly.

22 And, Councilman Jones, you were
23 right. You couldn't talk me out of not
24 running, so I figured let me do this
25 before you try to change my mind. Okay?

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2 So I appreciate that.

3 But I just want to say quickly,
4 I understand where Councilman Domb is
5 coming from, and he talked about a middle
6 ground. We did try to find middle ground
7 here. We have a number of exceptions in
8 the bill. We tried to work with groups
9 like Amazon to try to, as best as
10 possible, address their needs. I will
11 say, though, just saying "if you do this,
12 we will not come" doesn't work for me,
13 you know. Let's talk and try to work
14 stuff out, but just don't threaten us.
15 That doesn't work for me.

16 So in any event, I think this
17 is a reasonable bill. There could be a
18 time in the future, as a couple of the
19 members have said, where we don't need
20 it. I think we need it now. I think we
21 need to be fair to everybody, and we
22 don't need to send the message that your
23 business is not welcome here.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes
4 Councilwoman Parker.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. First, let me start
7 by thanking my colleague Councilman Bill
8 Greenlee for whom I have a great deal of
9 respect. Your track record in doing your
10 best to ensure that you proffer
11 legislation that would benefit the least
12 of thee has been unquestioned and
13 unrivaled, and I want to thank you for
14 that.

15 I also appreciate, Councilman
16 Greenlee, your comments about the
17 percentage of Philadelphians who are
18 unbanked.

19 And, Councilman Jones, you just
20 gave me a flashback when you talked about
21 that, what do you call it, the
22 handkerchief. It was a handkerchief for
23 my grandmother, and she really did roll
24 it up and she would pin it and stick it
25 somewhere. So like I really do get it.

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2 But I want to just note for the
3 record that I will be voting no on this
4 legislation and I do so because I
5 represent a neighborhood that is 95
6 percent deemed a middle neighborhood,
7 Mr. President. And just for the record,
8 for those of you who are not familiar
9 with the Ninth Councilmanic District,
10 Cheltenham Avenue is the dividing line
11 between Philadelphia and Montgomery
12 County. With Enon Tabernacle Baptist
13 Church there, the largest Baptist church
14 in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,
15 we've seen an influx of new growth and
16 new development in Cheltenham Mall and
17 Cedarbrook Mall, and I am grateful for it
18 all, because our people, although it's
19 Montgomery County, I constantly remind
20 those who represent the county that this
21 is a regional economy and Philadelphia
22 helps keep those malls alive.

23 However, what often gets lost
24 in the discussion is that Wadsworth
25 Avenue, Ogontz Avenue, Stenton Avenue,

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2 Old York Road, Rising Sun, and 5th
3 Street, they are trying to compete with
4 those malls.

5 In addition to that, when I got
6 elected in 2015, my first order of
7 business after getting reacquainted with
8 this district was to make sure we secured
9 funding to get a study done of commercial
10 corridors throughout the Ninth
11 Councilmanic District on the number of
12 vacancies, the types of businesses, and
13 what we could do to physically enhance
14 the aesthetic appeal.

15 With that being said, I went to
16 the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of
17 Commerce and I told them, I think you
18 guys should do a better job of
19 encouraging new retailers to move out of
20 Center City and into the veins and on the
21 hearts of our neighborhood commercial
22 corridors where we are bleeding, because
23 our small neighborhood-based businesses
24 are trying to compete with Walmart and
25 the others who are in those malls.

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2 And so while I understand the
3 inequity associated with those who are
4 banked and those who are not, at the same
5 time I'm thinking about the number of
6 vacancies that are on those corridors,
7 and what I would much rather do is get
8 those businesses who may have this model,
9 get them to agree to open up some stores
10 in some of our neighborhoods and let them
11 see through the traffic, from actual
12 consumer foot traffic, that there are a
13 number of people who come into those
14 stores and who want to patronize them,
15 but they don't because their model was
16 flawed because they don't accept cash.
17 So I'd rather get the owner to relocate.
18 Locate in my district, open up the
19 business, see how well you're doing with
20 your model. Then I want you to see how
21 much you're losing because you're not
22 accepting cash.

23 Because, Mr. President, quite
24 frankly, I don't have the luxury that
25 some of my colleagues have who are in

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2 these sexy neighborhoods where new
3 businesses are coming in and they're
4 banging down the doors to get every
5 little swath of land that they can get.
6 No. It's the other way for us. We're
7 trying to encourage people to come, and I
8 don't have the luxury to say this model
9 won't work for my neighborhood. I need
10 to get them there first.

11 And I want to again say to my
12 colleague Councilman Greenlee, respect
13 you, respect your work, respect the
14 intent of this bill, but for the reasons
15 I just noted, I will be voting nay.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you.

19 Councilman Domb.

20 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I just want
21 to back up what my colleague Councilwoman
22 Parker said, and this study may not be --
23 it's out there. It came out in December.
24 It's actually about the beverage tax, and
25 I think it's a learning lesson for us.

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2 And I voted for the beverage tax, but the
3 lesson that came out from three
4 economists, MIT, University of Michigan,
5 the University of Wisconsin, they did an
6 independent study, not from the beverage,
7 not from the Administration. The study
8 showed 42 percent of the sales lost in
9 the City were recaptured within zero to
10 six miles of the City line and the
11 suburbs. No change past six miles, but
12 that 42 percent that we lost in the City
13 was recaptured zero to six miles outside
14 of the City.

15 And so my point is that I just
16 would like us -- if this was a statewide
17 bill, I'd have a different opinion, but
18 when we pass bills that are specific to
19 the City, it does hurt those
20 neighborhoods on the borders of our city.

21 Thank you, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you.

24 The Chair recognizes
25 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
3 you. Again, as a lead co-sponsor with
4 Councilman Greenlee of this legislation,
5 I think all of us agree here in the City
6 of Philadelphia that we want businesses
7 and we want small businesses, but we also
8 want to send a message to businesses that
9 are locating in any part of the City of
10 Philadelphia that they are here to serve
11 everyone. And so sometimes unintended
12 consequences by business models need to
13 be revisited around who they're
14 excluding, particularly when you have
15 certain product lines.

16 I remind folks that it is the
17 poverty rate of the City of Philadelphia
18 that determines the rate of federal
19 contributions to the City of Philadelphia
20 to build out the infrastructure that will
21 now allow us to have these choice
22 neighborhoods. Poor people help
23 subsidize and build the core of this
24 city, and they deserve to be able to go
25 to any part of the City and consume at

2 any given time.

3 I do think that all business
4 models evolve, and we should spend as
5 much time pushing back -- we haven't had
6 a good pushback on banks since the
7 Councilwoman here back here -- about how
8 do we get that unbanked population access
9 to products. I know Councilman Green had
10 hearings on a municipal bank.

11 The fact of the matter is that
12 we're going to always have people
13 challenged around this banking, whether
14 it's because of our lack of immigration
15 situation, and we want businesses to
16 share our core values, that despite our
17 poverty rate, we are a city of
18 neighborhoods and we want everyone to
19 have access to every single neighborhood.

20 We are open. As Councilman
21 Greenlee and I contemplated this, we were
22 open. We listened to the Amazon Prime
23 and all of those other models, and this
24 is not the end of a discussion. We are
25 open as these models evolve and people

2 look to locate around the City what we
3 can do to ensure that it is not
4 discriminatory.

5 The other thing I like about
6 this bill is that the Human Relations
7 Commission, Rue Landau, who is a very
8 good friend of mine, is going to help us
9 promulgate regulations and policies
10 around how we implement it. A lot of
11 this is not the legislation, but how we
12 operationalize it. And guess what? I
13 have a lot of faith in Rue that she's
14 going to give us some really good
15 recommendations and a guideline to
16 implement this right, and if businesses
17 do come forward and legitimately can show
18 us that they don't discriminate, we had a
19 conversation around memberships and the
20 Costcos and all of those things.

21 So it's never an end to a
22 discussion in this legislative body. It
23 is always a continuation and putting a
24 pause button when we see something that
25 could send the wrong message to the

2 people that we are sent here to serve.

3 So I'm very proud to support
4 this. This is not an end of the
5 conversation. And Councilman Greenlee
6 may not be here next year, but I intend
7 to be here next year and will continue to
8 be open about other improvements to it.

9 Thank you, Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
