2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started.
4 Thank you.

5 To give our invocation this
6 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor
7 Steven Wilson of Fifteenth Street Baptist
8 Church. The pastor is here today as the
9 guest of Councilman Allan Domb.

10 I would ask all guests,
11 visitors, and members to please rise.

12 (Councilmembers, guests, and
13 visitors rise.)

14 PASTOR WILSON: Good morning.
15 (Good morning.)

16 PASTOR WILSON: Let us pray.

17 Our Father and our God, God of
18 Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, God of all
19 glory, we come because we know you to be
20 a God who answers prayers. We come
21 before you because we understand that
22 apart from you, we can do nothing that is
23 meaningful, nothing that is everlasting.

24 We invite your presence into
25 this place. We pray right now that you

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2 would fill this place with your presence.
3 We pray for such a time as this. We need
4 your wisdom. We need your strength. We
5 need your power.

6 Open our eyes that we might see
7 solutions to the problems that we find
8 before us. Open our ears that once again
9 we may hear the clarion call of Malcolm,
10 once again we may embrace the dreams of
11 Martin, once again we may move in the
12 spirit of Dr. Henry Moskowitz.

13 We need you, oh great Jehovah.
14 We need you right here and right now to
15 lift us up. Lift us up above our mortal
16 concerns. Lift us up above our pride,
17 our prejudice, our partisanship and bring
18 us to a place of unity. Help us to shape
19 and fashion and make this city what it
20 ought to be.

21 We pray right now in the
22 matchless name of Jesus, the Christ.

23 Amen and amen.

24 (Amen.)

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2 Thank you, Pastor.

3 Council will be at ease.

4 (Council at ease.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you for those inspiring words,

7 Pastor. We genuinely appreciate it.

8 Our next order of business is

9 the approval of the Journal of the

10 meeting of Thursday, February 21st, 2019,

11 and the Chair recognizes Councilman

12 Greenlee.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

14 you, Mr. President. I move that the

15 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

16 February 21st, 2019 be approved.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. It has been moved and

20 properly seconded that the Journal of the

21 meeting of Thursday, February 21st, 2019

22 stand approved.

23 All those in favor say aye.

24 (Aye.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Those opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 ayes have it, and that Journal is
6 approved.

7 The next order of business is
8 requests for leave of absence, and the
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. On behalf of the
12 majority, there are no requests of leave
13 of absence today.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair thanks the gentleman.

16 The Chair now recognizes
17 Councilman O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of the
20 republicans, there are no requests for
21 leave of absence.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair thanks the gentleman.

24 At this time, I would like to
25 dispense with our regular order of

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2 business and I would like to thank
3 everyone who has taken time out of their
4 busy day to come down to witness their
5 government in action. We genuinely
6 appreciate you being here to witness what
7 we do here in City Council and, again,
8 thank you, and please feel free to come
9 back whenever you have time. We really
10 appreciate you being here.

11 At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
13 present a resolution honoring
14 Philadelphia's Living Legends. Would
15 Joan Myers Brown; Grace Clarke, on behalf
16 of Stanley Clarke, great family member,
17 if I say so myself; Bill Jolly; and
18 Solomon Jones and those accompanying them
19 please join the Councilman at the podium.

20 (Councilmembers and guests
21 approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 joining folks at the podium, we have
24 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman
25 Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman Blackwell,

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2 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman
3 Parker, Councilman Johnson, and
4 Councilwoman Bass and also Councilman
5 Derek Green.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good
7 morning, everyone.

8 (Good morning.)

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: We're going
10 to wake up in here. Good morning,
11 everyone.

12 (Good morning.)

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: There we go.
14 A little energy, because the people
15 behind me have a lot of energy, and they
16 want to share it with you today.

17 Today is February 28th. It is
18 the last day in the shortest month on the
19 calendar. It is also Black History
20 Month. And I want you to know that
21 before I go into the Carter G. Woodson
22 Park, why Black History Month is
23 important to me and little boys and girls
24 throughout the City of Philadelphia is
25 because of my great-grandfather, William

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2 O. Spencer. Now, as a kid -- he was from
3 South Philly too, from the P.

4 We as kids used to play in my
5 grandfather's basement, and he had a wood
6 shop and one of the favorite things for
7 the grand-kids to find was a saber. It
8 was a sword. It was like you could get
9 hurt. And we would grab a pipe and grab
10 a sword and we would cling the things
11 together. My grandmother would have had
12 a fit had she known what we were doing.
13 But I had no idea what that saber was
14 from or for, and at the time, when you
15 watched cowboy movies and stuff like
16 that, the role of the African American
17 men and women were diminished roles. We
18 were the cook, we were the butler, we
19 were the guy who handed the general the
20 sword, and in my mind, that's who my
21 grandfather was, until I read his
22 obituary, until I understood that he was
23 a Rough Rider, until I understood that he
24 went up those hills himself. He was not
25 the cook. He was the soldier at the

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2 front line and was a hero after that to
3 me.

4 But I am but one of tens of
5 thousands of Philadelphia young people
6 who probably had that same opinion about
7 their ancestors, not knowing the truth of
8 their contributions.

9 So Carter G. Woodson understood
10 that too, and he was an African American
11 historian, author, journalist, convinced
12 that the role of his own people in
13 American history was diminished. The
14 history of other cultures were also being
15 ignored, but he realized he needed to do
16 the research to make sure that our place
17 in history was memorialized.

18 And so here today the evolution
19 of that going from a week to a month to
20 our own is here today. We have to
21 recognize people in our culture, in our
22 city that have made not just local
23 contributions but international
24 contributions that will ripple throughout
25 international history, and we are proud

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2 of you, and we're here to tell you that
3 today. All right?

4 So what we want to do is
5 propose this resolution honoring and
6 celebrating Philadelphia's Living
7 Legends: Joan Myers Brown, Stanley
8 Clarke, Bill Jolly, my neighbor, and
9 Solomon Jones, who ain't no hustler.
10 That's an inside joke. He gave a speech
11 and it was a line he used. It was good.
12 So I told him I was always going to
13 remember that.

14 These are people who
15 communicate in dance, music, literature,
16 journalism throughout Philadelphia and
17 then historically throughout our nation.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Note of
19 personal privilege. But for this lady to
20 my left, 40 years ago when I was 30
21 pounds thinner, she gave me an
22 opportunity to live my dream as a
23 professional dancer. Because in her time
24 as a black ballerina, she didn't have the
25 opportunity to exhibit her craft. She

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2 has created thousands of dancers across
3 the nation that go on to Broadway and
4 Vegas and travel around the world. So I
5 am eternally grateful to this woman by
6 the name of Joan Myers Brown.

7 Whereas, Joan Myers Brown has
8 made significant contributions to the
9 national and international dance
10 communities. She is the founder of The
11 Philadelphia Dance Company,
12 affectionately know as Philadanco, and
13 the founder of The Philadelphia School of
14 Dance Arts. In 1988, Brown founded the
15 International Conference of Black Dance
16 Companies, and just a few years later,
17 founded the International Association of
18 Blacks in Dance; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
20 Brown has received a host of accolades
21 throughout her lifetime, including awards
22 from The Philadelphia Tribune, the
23 African American Museum in Philadelphia,
24 and membership to the Distinguished
25 Daughters of Pennsylvania, which is a

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2 humbling honor and a huge deal in the
3 Commonwealth. In 2012, she was
4 designated as one of the "Ten Best
5 Philadelphians" by Philadelphia Magazine,
6 and received the National Medal of the
7 Arts, the nation's highest civic honor
8 for artistic excellence, which was
9 presented to her by none other at the
10 White House than President Barack Obama;
11 and

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
13 Stanley Clarke is a four-time Grammy
14 winner winning recording artist,
15 performer, composer, conductor, arranger
16 and producer, as well as one of the most
17 eminent figures in the world of acoustic
18 and electric bassists. Clarke's esteemed
19 presence in the music industry was
20 celebrated when he was named Rolling
21 Stone Magazine's very first "Jazzman of
22 the Year"; and

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: And he's the
24 President's cousin.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

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2 originally from North Philadelphia.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
4 you know, not to go back, but they're
5 getting ready to build a school in Joan
6 Myers Brown's honor. So that's going to
7 be a special, special gift to us as well.

8 Whereas, Clarke is also the
9 recipient of Bass Player Magazine's
10 Lifetime Achievement Award, is a member
11 of the Guitar Player Magazine's "Gallery
12 of Greats" and has been honored with the
13 addition of his hand impressions to
14 Hollywood's, quote/unquote, "Rock Walk."
15 To ensure that other young, talented
16 artists can follow in his legacy, he
17 established The Stanley Clarke
18 Foundation, a charitable organization
19 which awards scholarships to aspiring
20 musicians each year; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
22 Bill Jolly is a three-time Emmy Award
23 winning composer, arranger, musical
24 director and keyboardist. Jolly's
25 compositions have been featured across

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2 the airways on major networks like NBC,
3 ABC, CBS, MTV, HBO and Showtime. And he
4 went to Overbrook, Curt just told me.
5 And he has appeared in endorsement ads
6 for major companies, such as Verizon,
7 Hyatt, and Bose; and

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, Bill
9 Jolly has also used his talents in
10 directing large-scale award ceremonies,
11 including The Emmy Awards, The Marian
12 Anderson Awards, and the Rhythm and Blues
13 Foundation Awards. In addition, he has
14 arranged musical tributes to Earth Wind
15 and Fire, Billy Joel, Queen Latifah, Bon
16 Jovi, Nina Simone, and Chaka Khan, and
17 has performed musically for five U.S.
18 Presidents; and

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
20 Solomon Jones is an Essence bestselling
21 author and award-winning journalist who
22 has been featured nationally on NPR's
23 Morning Edition and CNN's Headline News.
24 Jones is currently a columnist for the
25 Philadelphia Daily News and a host for

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2 Praise 107.9. In addition, he is a
3 blogger and frequent on-air commentator
4 for NPR affiliate WHYI; and

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
6 an instructor at the Philadelphia School
7 District's Parent University, Jones has
8 served as Spokesman for the District's
9 Read for Your Life program. Jones has
10 also served on the board of the
11 Philadelphia Committee to End
12 Homelessness, visited each of
13 Philadelphia's municipal prisons to
14 promote reading, and served on the
15 Community Advisory Board of The Doe Fund,
16 an organization that helps homeless men
17 reclaim their lives;

18 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
19 Whereas, all of these living legends, in
20 great and diverse ways, have positively
21 impacted the City of Philadelphia via the
22 enrichment of Philadelphia's culture
23 through the arts, through the mentorship
24 of Philadelphia youth, and the provision
25 of valuable information to our citizens.

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2 These Living Legends have, and continue
3 to make, the lives of Philadelphia
4 citizens better; now, therefore, be it

5 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Resolved, by
6 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
7 that it hereby honors and celebrates
8 Philadelphia's Living Legends: Joan
9 Myers Brown, Stanley Clarke, Bill Jolly,
10 and Solomon Jones, who are leaders in the
11 areas of dance, music, literature, and
12 journalism in the Philadelphia area, as
13 part of the commemoration of Black
14 History Month.

15 Further resolved, that an
16 engrossed copy of this resolution be
17 presented to every one of our Living
18 Legends as further evidence of the
19 sincere respect and admiration of our
20 legislative body.

21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 the Chair recognizes Joan Myers Brown,
25 Grace Clarke, Bill Jolly, and Solomon

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2 Jones for remarks.

3 MS. BROWN: Well, anyone that
4 knows me, any time they ask me to speak,
5 I say I wish they had asked me to dance.
6 But now that I've gotten a little older,
7 I guess I have to say something.

8 First of all, I'd like to thank
9 Blondell for being a wonderful dancer and
10 a wonderful City Councilwoman.

11 You know, the arts in
12 Philadelphia sometimes get pushed aside
13 and not accounted for, but what we do, we
14 do all year long, not just Black History
15 Month, not just every week. So we invite
16 you to support us even more, support our
17 youth and make sure that the arts
18 continue.

19 The vote today for the school,
20 I'm not worried about the school being in
21 my name. I'm worrying about the school
22 happening. So we want to make sure the
23 schools continue to do their work and
24 that the new school that the vote will be
25 for it, that we can move on.

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2 So I thank you, and I thank you
3 on behalf of everyone in Philadelphia
4 that has benefited from the arts, because
5 it has to continue.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Don't everybody come up at once.

10 MS. CLARKE: Good morning. I
11 wanted to say thank you so much for
12 honoring my brother. He couldn't be here
13 today, but I know that he's extremely
14 grateful and thankful with your
15 gratitude, and I am so proud of him.

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. JOLLY: Thank you so much.

19 I am so honored by this award today that
20 I almost had to check the spelling to
21 make sure this wasn't meant for Billy
22 Joel.

23 I'm very thankful, first of
24 all, to God; secondly, to my mother
25 Rowena Jolly, my father Elton Jolly, and

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2 my daughter Bianca Jolly. Those are the
3 inspirations in my life. And I want to
4 thank my good friend and my neighbor,
5 Curtis Jones. He doesn't know, but I
6 used to watch him back in Overbrook High
7 School when he was in Student Government
8 and I used to see him get up and speak
9 and then watch the women chase him down
10 the hall. So naturally that when it
11 became my chance, I became the president
12 of the school, thanks to him.

13 Thank you so much, and very
14 much appreciate this award.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. JONES: Well, thank you so
17 much for this award. It's interesting,
18 when I was listening to them read my bio,
19 they read the parts about me working on
20 behalf of homelessness, and I do that
21 because I rose out of homelessness to
22 become who I am to work in this
23 Philadelphia City Council, to work for a
24 Congressman of the United States, and to
25 realize my dream of becoming a

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2 journalist.

3 I love this city because its
4 streets shaped me. I love this city
5 because this is where I live and raise my
6 family. I love this city because it has
7 taught me so much. And as I watch
8 members of City Council, sometimes I'm on
9 you, and y'all know that, right, but if
10 you're doing the right thing, I'm with
11 you, because I love this city because
12 this city is my family.

13 And so, Councilman Jones, I'm
14 with you when you fight against prisons.

15 Councilwoman Blackwell, I'm
16 with you when you fight for the homeless.

17 Councilwoman Bass, I'm with you
18 when you fight against the tax abatement.

19 Councilwoman Parker, I'm with
20 you when you fight against the marijuana
21 facility.

22 Councilwoman Gym, I'm with you
23 when you fight for a fair workweek.

24 Councilman Clarke, I'm with you
25 when you fight to make sure that black

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2 developers actually get to develop
3 properties in gentrifying communities
4 here in Philadelphia.

5 Councilman Oh, I'm with you
6 when you fight for homeowners' rights.

7 Councilwoman Sanchez, I'm with
8 you when you fight to get people out of
9 addiction, because that is where I come
10 from, and you never know who these people
11 are going to become.

12 And so I want to thank you so
13 much, not only for honoring me, but
14 honoring where I come from in this City
15 of Philadelphia and all the people who
16 are going to rise up to be so much more
17 than I will ever be.

18 Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 Council will be at ease.

23 (Council at ease.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, and congratulations to our

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2 Living Legends.

3 I'd like to go off script a
4 little bit and take a moment to recognize
5 one of our own, who has been a longtime
6 member of the City Council family, Joyce
7 McKeown, the Veterans Coordinator.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Stand up, Joyce. Always shy, but always
11 putting the work in. And she's retiring
12 after 35 years in City Council.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: When
15 did you start, when you were like 5?
16 Because I know you're only like 39 or
17 something like that.

18 MS. McKEOWN: We're the same
19 age.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 We're the same age? All right. Good
22 comeback.

23 But Joyce, of those 35 years,
24 31 of those were working for the Veterans
25 Advisory Commission. I see we have some

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2 of our members of the military here, and
3 I want to thank them so much for their
4 service, for making sure that we stay
5 safe and we continue to be able to
6 practice democracy in the way that we do.
7 I actually see a Commission member here.
8 Thank you.

9 So Joyce actually was here
10 since 1984, and she started out working
11 for Al Pearlman, Councilman, way, way
12 back. I didn't know that.

13 But, Joyce, we just want to say
14 on behalf of the City Council and its
15 family, we really appreciate what you've
16 done, not only your commitment to City
17 Council and the citizens but, more
18 importantly, your commitment to our
19 wonderful, wonderful members of the
20 service. You've been great. You'll be
21 missed, but I'm sure that you'll be
22 coming back and volunteering and telling
23 Carlo and Wanda, keep a space for me,
24 because I'm going to come in. I'm still
25 going to collect my pension, but I'm

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2 going to come in.

3 All right. Joyce, thank you so
4 much.

5 MS. McKEOWN: Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you. So awesome.

9 Our next order of business is
10 communications, and the Chair requests
11 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the
12 messages from the Mayor to the Chief
13 Clerk.

14 Mr. Decker, please read those
15 messages.

16 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
17 and members of the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia, I am pleased to advise you
19 that on February 27, 2019, I signed all
20 the bills which were passed by Council at
21 its session on February 14, 2019; and

22 I am submitting herewith for
23 the consideration of your honorable body
24 an ordinance constituting the
25 Twenty-Second Supplemental Ordinance to

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2 the Restated General Water and Wastewater
3 Revenue Bond Ordinance of 1989, as
4 supplemented; authorizing the Bond
5 Committee to issue and sell one or more
6 series or subseries of tax-exempt or
7 taxable water and wastewater revenue
8 bonds and revenue refunding bonds; and

9 An ordinance amending Chapter
10 19-1400 of The Philadelphia Code,
11 entitled "Realty Transfer Tax," to
12 clarify the definition of "Value"; and

13 An ordinance authorizing the
14 Parks and Recreation Commissioner and the
15 Procurement Commissioner to enter into a
16 Concession Agreement with Loveluck for
17 the design, construction, management and
18 operation of a food and beverage
19 concession in the Fairmount Park Welcome
20 Center in John F. Kennedy Plaza, also
21 known as Love Park; and

22 An ordinance amending Chapter 9
23 of Subcode A of Title 4 of The
24 Philadelphia Code (The Philadelphia
25 Administrative Code), entitled "Fees," to

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2 further provide for administrative fees
3 in connection with accelerated review of
4 various permit applications; and to
5 establish a special surcharge in
6 connection with such accelerated reviews,
7 all under certain terms and conditions.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you, Mr. Decker. Do you have any
10 additional communications?

11 CHIEF CLERK: I have none,
12 Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you very much.

15 And with that, we will move to
16 the introduction of bills and
17 resolutions, and the Chair recognizes
18 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Good
20 morning, Mr. President. No bills or
21 resolutions today.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes
25 Councilwoman Blackwell.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
3 you, Mr. President. Today I have two
4 privileged resolutions, one
5 non-privileged resolution, and one bill
6 on your behalf.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you, Councilwoman.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
10 you.

11 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
12 constituting the Twenty-Second
13 Supplemental Ordinance to the Restated
14 General Water and Wastewater Revenue Bond
15 Ordinance of 1989, as supplemented;
16 authorizing the Bond Committee to issue
17 and sell one or more series or subseries
18 of tax-exempt or taxable water and
19 wastewater revenue bonds and revenue
20 refunding bonds.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Referred to committee.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
24 resolution hereby proclaiming March 2019
25 as Social Work Month, and encouraging all

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2 Philadelphians to support the Social Work
3 profession.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Today's Calendar.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
7 resolution Recognizing and Honoring Lynne
8 Carter for her momentous induction into
9 the Pennsylvania Boxing Hall of Fame.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Today's Calendar.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a
13 non-privileged resolution authorizing the
14 Commissioner of Public Property to
15 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
16 Redevelopment Authority, without
17 consideration, deeds conveying
18 conditional fee simple title to certain
19 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with
20 the buildings and improvements thereon,
21 situate in the Forty-Fourth Ward of the
22 City of Philadelphia.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 that will be on next week's Calendar.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

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2 Greenlee.

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
4 you, Mr. President. On your behalf, I
5 offer one bill.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
9 authorizing the Parks and Recreation
10 Commissioner and Procurement Commissioner

25 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

12 MR. BARNUM (through
13 interpreter): I'll hand over the
14 microphone to my voice for the
15 interpreter.

16 Good morning, Committee. My
17 name is Harry Barnum. I'm a deaf
18 advocate around the City of Philadelphia.
19 I do have a question on No. 170408, which
20 has been postponed for many, many months
21 and I don't understand what's happening
22 with that. What's going on with Council?
23 Is there going to be a vote? Are we
24 going to talk about the schools and
25 what's happening with suspending of young

2 children? This has been on the books for
3 a very long time, on the agenda for a
4 long time. Are we taking this seriously?
5 Is there a way this can be voted?

6 I just put this out there for
7 you all and I would like to know what's
8 happening with that particular bill.

9 Thank you very much for your
10 time.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Judith
15 Palkon-Millar, commenting on 190074.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MS. PALKON-MILLAR: My name is
18 Judith Eleanor Palkon-Millar and I am
19 basing my three minutes on 190074, the
20 Scouts. I'm actually speaking for future
21 voters, the boys and girls in our City of
22 Philadelphia, and I'm going to say good
23 morning, good afternoon, Council and
24 anyone sitting on that side of the rail,
25 and I'm going to say good morning, good

2 afternoon to anyone sitting on this side
3 of the rail that still believes in a
4 democratic society.

5 I'm going to talk a little bit
6 about what happened last week when I
7 heard someone bring up the term limit
8 bill presented last Thursday. I hope
9 it's not going to be politics as general
10 in the City of Philadelphia. I never
11 thought I would address Council, but
12 after last week when I felt the
13 frustration of the two individuals who
14 came into the room interrupting the start
15 of the Council meeting, I felt I had a
16 need to speak.

17 Who is their Councilperson?
18 They needed a voice and felt that their
19 voice wasn't being heard, so that was the
20 only way to be heard, by disrupting the
21 session.

22 I am proposing that the limit
23 bill be put on the May 21st ballot for
24 the people of Philadelphia to decide, or
25 even better, if you are not being

2 challenged, then the ballot should have
3 your name and next to it, I do not
4 reelect this person. Give your
5 constituents a voice, a choice. They can
6 either vote you in or vote you out. Let
7 the people of Philadelphia decide. Show
8 the people of Philadelphia that you
9 actually represent them, not politics as
10 usual in Philadelphia.

11 I have a question for each and
12 every one of you. Why are we one of the
13 major cities in the United States that
14 don't impose municipal council limit
15 terms? Why is that? Can't you feel the
16 frustration of the City? Are you really
17 that oblivious to your constituents?

18 I don't understand the
19 opposition to term limit bills. I think
20 the longer some Councilmembers stay in
21 office, the easier it is for you to make
22 some poor choices because you think you
23 can, and I'm going to refer to the Sunday
24 Inquirer article. You do things and
25 you're not held accountable. I don't

2 understand that.

3 And here's another thought. If
4 you haven't been able to change the City
5 in two or three terms, don't you think
6 it's time for you to step aside and let
7 someone else try to make a change?

8 Let the people of Philadelphia
9 know that you represent them, not
10 yourselves. Pass the term limit bill or
11 put it on the ballot. Let the people of
12 Philadelphia make that decision.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Aja Beech,
18 commenting on the resolution introduced
19 today by Councilman Taubenberger.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MS. BEECH: Hello. Hi. Thank
22 you so much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MS. BEECH: My name is Aja

2 Beech and good morning, Councilpeople and
3 everyone in attendance today. I'm
4 honored and humbled to be speaking to
5 you.

6 My name is Aja Beech and I was
7 born with clubbed feet. As a child, I
8 spent years in and out of wheelchairs
9 while being treated at Shriners Hospital
10 for Children, an organization that
11 provides necessary operations for
12 children of families that could not
13 otherwise afford it. I also raise a son
14 with autism.

15 Too often people with
16 disabilities are not listened to. It can
17 feel as if you are pulled into a riptide,
18 deep into the depths of the ocean where
19 screams turn into air, the voices of
20 people with disabilities becoming drowned
21 out, as if we do not deserve to have
22 autonomy in any decision. We need to be
23 heard.

24 People with disabilities and
25 especially children with disabilities are

2 far more likely to experience assaults
3 than any non-disabled person. According
4 to the World Health Organization,
5 children with disabilities are four times
6 more likely to experience any kind of
7 violence. The Ruderman Foundation
8 estimates that as many as two children
9 with disabilities are murdered every week
10 in the United States.

11 As it is in many oppressive and
12 abusive relationships, the aggressor will
13 blame the victim for the violence.
14 Unfortunately, when people with
15 disabilities are assaulted and even
16 murdered by caregivers, there is a larger
17 narrative that excuses that violence,
18 implying a person with a disability is
19 either too burdensome or that killing
20 them is somehow an act of mercy.

21 I sincerely thank Councilman
22 Taubenberger for bringing more of the
23 awareness to Disability Day of Mourning
24 and violence against those with
25 disabilities, and I thank all of

1 2/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia City Council that voted
3 unanimously on this resolution last year
4 declaring March 1st as Disability Day of
5 Mourning in Philadelphia, to raise the
6 awareness of filicide and the murders by
7 caregivers of children and adults with
8 disabilities.

9 There are many things
10 Philadelphia City Council can continue to
11 do over the years to reduce filicide and
12 increase autonomy for people with
13 disabilities. Some of these things are
14 recognizing when crimes against people
15 with disabilities should be classified as
16 hate crimes and speaking out against them
17 in our communities; ensuring housing in
18 districts you represent have a fair
19 number that are truly accessible, meaning
20 physically accessible for those with
21 varying needs and financially accessible
22 for those living on Social Security;
23 working to make our school buildings more
24 accessible and healthier for all
25 children; and making all Philadelphia

2 public transit truly accessible so that
3 more people with disabilities can go to
4 and from doctors' appointments and jobs
5 in a self-reliant way as they are
6 comfortably able to do so.

7 In closing, the most important
8 thing all of us can do is to lead with
9 love and kindness in the face of
10 difference. Thank you so much for your
11 time today, and I hope you will all vote
12 on the resolution Disability Day of
13 Mourning today recognizing tomorrow,
14 March 1st, as Disability Day of Mourning
15 and that you will all join us in the
16 Caucus Room tomorrow at noon to
17 commemorate the day.

18 Thank you very much.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

3 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

4 This is an official decree of the people
5 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
6 such, requires immediate action and
7 remedy.

8 Every week, Council, Mayor,
9 Governor, and others transfer private
10 property to the government, probably
11 illegally.

12 Just like Dr. King protested, I
13 am a man. My 42 USC 1982 property rights
14 are the same as all the people clearly
15 designated as beneficiaries of the
16 constitutional contracts.

17 Are Council, Mayor, Governor,
18 and others using RDA and Land Bank and
19 other agencies to eyeball the people's
20 private property to figure out the best
21 use?

22 Communism, socialism, and
23 fascism do not care about private
24 property rights. You have no property
25 rights. Fortunately, Article IV, Section

3 guarantee a republican form of
4 government. Clearly, oath-violating
5 officials require prosecution before this
6 chaos of stealing homes in Philadelphia
7 gets worse. Can a first-class city treat
8 its people like second-class citizens?

9 The constitutions requires
10 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
11 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
12 duty. Your oath of office requires you
13 to act or face prison.

14 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
15 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
16 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
17 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
18 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
19 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
20 14-4056 appear violated.

21 I call on the federal and
22 Commonwealth governments to perform their
23 constitutional obligations -- I guess not
24 today -- to investigate and prosecute all
25 involved in the theft and illegal deed

2 transfer of my home, 1038 West Wyoming
3 Avenue.

4 The denial of God-given 42 USC
5 1982 property rights for 25 years is
6 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
7 and requires immediate remedy.

8 A just government must obey the
9 rule of law. This color of law
10 government must have its Charter to
11 govern revoked until a constitutionally
12 compliant government is installed.

13 Public servants cannot refuse
14 their sworn duty to act any more than a
15 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
16 sovereign people require oath,
17 Constitution, and law be enforced, and
18 jail is required for all who violate
19 oath, Constitution or law.

20 I remind Council, it takes a
21 lot of cooperation to create and allow
22 this monumental corruption.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. I want to offer a
12 friendly reminder to my colleagues and
13 our staff that this is our seventh annual
14 celebration of African American History
15 Month, and today we will be lifting up
16 and celebrating Congresswoman Shirley
17 Chisholm, the first African American
18 woman elected to the United States
19 Congress. That will be followed by song,
20 music and, of course, dance from
21 Philadanco and then a delicious soul food
22 meal.

23 Thank you, Mr. President. We
24 want to invite all of the staff
25 downstairs.

3 Thank you, Councilwoman.

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman
5 Jones.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
7 Mr. President, and thank you, colleagues,
8 for approving the resolution calling on
9 the Administration to increase summer job
10 slots for 2019.

11 As we approach budget, as we
12 approach the hearings to review the
13 anti-violence plan that was put forth by
14 the Mayor, a key component is youth
15 summer jobs. We have, I believe, 11,000
16 slots. That's not bad. That's good
17 work. It's good budget work, but there
18 are 18,000 requests by young people to
19 fill those slots. So I went to public
20 school, but that means 7,000 young people
21 will go without a job this summer.

22 I think that is a good
23 investment on behalf of the City of
24 Philadelphia to increase the amount of
25 jobs to reduce the amount of violence.

2 Often a summer job for a young person is
3 a first job for a young person. It gives
4 them an opportunity to be in a workplace
5 and learn workplace norms, like being on
6 time, being polite, how much of a job you
7 may not want to have later on in life and
8 why you need to go to school not to have
9 it. But if they are idle during the
10 summer, if they're left to their own
11 devices during the summer, to some degree
12 it is our fault. So we need to, as my
13 colleague says, step up to the plate and
14 find the gap of those 7,000 slots.

15 The Urban League and Urban
16 Coalition and our friends over at the
17 Coalition do their part to raise
18 private-sector money, but we have to find
19 it. We have to dig deep, because the
20 investment in that hundred dollars a
21 week, it takes a hundred dollars a day to
22 incarcerate. So do the math. Let's do
23 the right thing.

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 The Chair recognizes

5 Councilwoman Parker.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

7 you, Mr. President. Last week,

8 Mr. President, our colleague Councilman

9 Derek Green alluded to the Committee on

10 Commerce and Economic Development in a

11 hearing that was held by the Committee on

12 February the 19th to examine Power Up

13 Your Business, a free business training

14 program created by the Community College

15 of Philadelphia.

16 I wanted to just note today,

17 Mr. President, that the program was

18 developed in 2016 in collaboration with

19 Dr. Guy Generals and CCP as a result of

20 the discussion about the beverage tax.

21 One of the most common refrains

22 during the beverage tax debate was that

23 it could hurt neighborhood small

24 businesses in low-income communities, so

25 we wanted to find ways to support and

2 reinforce those type of businesses.

3 The initial funding for Power
4 Up was \$2.4 million for three years.
5 That was the \$800,000 funding level per
6 year. Future funding will be subject to
7 budget negotiations this year.

8 We wanted to add that Power Up
9 is unique because it focuses primarily on
10 businesses located on commercial
11 corridors and smaller businesses. They
12 can't have more than a million dollars in
13 annual revenue, and it focuses on those
14 micro and small businesses who have been
15 getting by on a wing and a prayer without
16 much guidance.

17 Power Up includes a 12-week
18 36-hour peer-based learning experience,
19 as well as a series of workshops that
20 entrepreneurs can attend. We officially
21 launched in 2017, and Power Up has helped
22 hundreds of small businesses in every
23 Council district and nearly every zip
24 code in our city. So far, 120 businesses
25 have completed the ten-week peer-based

2 cohort. Additionally, 806 people have
3 attended the Storefront Workshop series
4 and 529 business owners have attended the
5 Community and Partnership workshops.
6 More than 84 percent of the participants
7 have been people of color and nearly 71
8 percent, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
9 have been women.

10 Today you will find on your
11 desk a black bag just for my colleagues
12 that says Power Up Your Business on the
13 outside, and inside the bag are a variety
14 of informational materials related to the
15 program. I want my district colleagues
16 to know that inside each of your
17 respective bags, you will very
18 specifically find a bag that includes
19 testimony and/or letters of support from
20 small businesses located in your
21 respective districts who have been
22 through the program.

23 Finally, I must mention that
24 Community College is currently accepting
25 applications for its next Power Up Your

2 Business cohort at its Northeast campus.
3 Applications are due by March the 29th.
4 I hope you will all promote this
5 opportunity. And as a city that wants to
6 be a pro-growth, pro-neighborhood, and
7 pro-business city, Power Up Your Business
8 is essential because it reaches into
9 neighborhoods, which are the veins of our
10 great city.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilwoman. Great program.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Johnson.

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
17 Council President. I just want to take a
18 minute to address two issues that we've
19 been working on this past week that are
20 very significant. One, I want to take a
21 moment to acknowledge my partner in the
22 area of juvenile justice, Councilwoman
23 Helen Gym, for arriving in City Council
24 and stepping up to the plate and
25 addressing the issue of juvenile justice.

2 She has made sure that we put on the
3 forefront some of the abuse of the
4 children who are sent to Glen Mills. She
5 has stayed on the case when it comes to
6 holding the leadership at Glen Mills
7 Schools accountable.

8 Our primary purpose of sending
9 our young people there is for treatment
10 and rehabilitation, and they should not
11 come out of Glen Mills worse off than how
12 they have gone into Glen Mills. And so
13 in working in partnership with
14 Councilwoman Helen Gym, holding DHS
15 Commissioner Figueroa accountable in this
16 process, as well as tomorrow working in
17 partnership with Helen Gym to call on the
18 state to do an investigation into Glen
19 Mills, the whole operation, but, most
20 importantly, the City of Philadelphia
21 shouldn't even be doing business with
22 Glen Mills.

23 And so I just want to take a
24 moment to acknowledge her, because she
25 stayed on the case. I worked with her

2 with her task force, but nevertheless at
3 the end of the day, if we aren't keeping
4 our children safe and we aren't providing
5 a bright future for them, then what's the
6 purpose of the job that we're doing day
7 to day? And so I just want to take a
8 moment to acknowledge my colleague Helen
9 Gym, because she definitely deserves to
10 be acknowledged for this particular work.

11 But also I've been doing this
12 work for about ten years in the State
13 House as a State Representative and now
14 as a Councilperson, and I enjoy the work
15 that I'm doing, but you also have
16 significant bright spots when we do this
17 work. In my district and Councilman Mark
18 Squilla's district have been terrorized
19 over this last week by a creep who
20 decided to prey on women, and all
21 throughout social media, all throughout
22 my inboxes, rather it's Facebook or
23 Instagram or telephones to my office, not
24 only just from women but also men who are
25 terrorized that a sexual predator was

2 going through the neighborhood,
3 assaulting women. But I'm proud that the
4 citizens of South Philadelphia, the
5 citizens of the City of Philadelphia
6 stepped up to the plate, provided the
7 needed video surveillance coverage to the
8 Philadelphia Police Department, as well
9 as the tips needed for the Philadelphia
10 Police Department to get this creep off
11 the street. I'm hoping our District
12 Attorney, Larry Krasner, puts this guy
13 under the jail. But it's a bright spot
14 for me because we came together as a city
15 and showed that we can unify around an
16 issue to make sure our women are safe.

17 We found out that beyond the
18 initial reported assaults that were
19 reported to the Philadelphia Police
20 Department, there may be other
21 individuals who were assaulted, who are
22 of an immigrant background, who may not
23 feel comfortable coming forward. But on
24 our canvassing out in the community, we
25 worked in partnership with WOAR, which is

2 Women Organized Against Rape, and we're
3 calling on for any young lady who has
4 been assaulted, if they would like to
5 call an organization to get some support
6 so they can come forward, that number for
7 WOAR is 215-985-3333. And, again, that
8 number is 215-985-3333.

9 Thank you very much, Council
10 President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Domb.

15 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
16 Council President. I just want to
17 commend Councilwoman Parker on this Power
18 Up program, because one of the major
19 factors here is that the money we're
20 investing, the \$800,000, is giving us as
21 a city from taxes from these businesses
22 13 percent a year. It's a better
23 investment than what our pension fund
24 does. So my point is that we should
25 expand this program dramatically.

2 There's nothing like preventing
3 crime by having people own their own
4 businesses. And so whatever we can do.
5 I made a statement at the hearing I would
6 be in favor of going to \$5 million a
7 year. But this is a very, very important
8 program. With the kind of returns that
9 we saw, this is something we should
10 invest in.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman. We'll make note
14 of your aye vote as we enter into the
15 budget season, sir.

16 That concludes our speeches on
17 behalf of the minority and majority, and
18 the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
19 Reynolds Brown for a motion to adjourn.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. As we move to a motion to
22 adjourn, I appeal to my colleagues to
23 stay with us, staff to join us as we
24 celebrate Black History Month.

25 And with that, I move that
