4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you very much.

6 Before we move into our next
7 session of our Council, I would like to
8 take a moment to recognize our friends
9 and family members from our municipal
10 unions. I think it's appropriate that we
11 do this prior to the Mayor.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Because at the end of the day, without
15 them, we can't do what we do. So I just
16 want to thank them so much for being
17 here.

18 Okay. You guys ready?

19 The time has come for us to
20 consider the Mayor's presentation of his
21 annual budget. The Philadelphia Home
22 Rule Charter states that the Mayor shall
23 submit to Council, no later than 90 days
24 before the end of the fiscal year, his
25 Operating Budget message and proposed

2 Operating Budget ordinance for the
3 ensuing fiscal year.

4 At this time, the Mayor shall
5 submit to Council the recommended Capital
6 Program and Capital Budget as the City
7 received from the City Planning
8 Commission, to the extent approved by the
9 Mayor.

10 I now appoint the following
11 committee to escort the Mayor to the
12 Council Chambers: Councilman Henon,
13 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilman
14 Greenlee, Councilman Taubenberger, and
15 Councilman Oh.

16 (Brief pause.)

17 SERGEANT-OF-ARMS: Council
18 President, the Mayor has arrived.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Ladies and gentlemen, I am pleased to
21 introduce the Mayor of the City of
22 Philadelphia, Mayor James F. Kenney.

23 (Applause.)

24 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you,
25 everyone, and good morning. And I want

2 to thank you, Council President Clarke
3 and members of City Council for inviting
4 me to speak today. It's always great to
5 be back in this Chamber where I spent so
6 many years.

7 I want to give a special
8 mention to my friends Blondell Reynolds
9 Brown and Bill Greenlee, who I've had the
10 pleasure of calling colleagues and who I
11 will continue to call on for advice as
12 they move on soon to the next phase of
13 their lives. I know they'll still be
14 working hard until the end of this year,
15 but can we give them a round of applause
16 for their years of service.

17 (Standing ovation.)

18 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you.

19 Philadelphia, as you know, has
20 been glowing in the national spotlight of
21 late - another post season run by the
22 Eagles, an impressive young Flyers team,
23 and a Sixers team that is the talk of the
24 NBA. And of course in the past week, a
25 baseball superstar who could have gone

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2 anywhere chose Philadelphia, not just to
3 play here, but to make it his home and to
4 raise his family.

5 Welcome to Philly, Bryce
6 Harper. And we're pleased to see the
7 first move is to go Trout fishing.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: It feels like
10 yesterday when I stood here in 2016 and
11 proposed our Administration's first
12 Budget and Five Year Plan. I'm proud of
13 what we've achieved so far on vital
14 issues like education, public safety,
15 growing jobs, and increasing equity in
16 our neighborhoods.

17 Today I present the Fiscal Year
18 2020 Budget and the Five Year Plan that
19 will help us achieve even more.

20 Before I do, though, I ask you
21 to indulge me for a few minutes. Time
22 travel with me to 2024, and let's ask
23 ourselves a simple question: What can
24 we, the City of Philadelphia, be in five
25 years?

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2 Join me in imagining what our
3 city has the potential to look like, feel
4 like, and offer to our residents,
5 workers, and visitors five years from
6 now.

7 When I think about our future,
8 as I often do, the first thing that comes
9 to mind will not surprise you. It's the
10 foundation of what makes any small town
11 or large city great - a high performing
12 public school system.

13 In 2024, every five-year-old
14 starts their first day of kindergarten
15 ready to learn, because they participated
16 in a quality pre-K program.

17 Every child has the opportunity
18 to attend a great public school in their
19 own neighborhood. Whether it's
20 District-run, charter, magnet, CTE or
21 special admit, parents and caregivers
22 know their children are receiving a
23 world-class education in a safe,
24 nurturing learning environment.

25 Our schools have the necessary

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2 resources to ensure students read on
3 grade level by the time they enter fourth
4 grade and then graduate on time, ready
5 for college and career.

6 In 2024, more schools have been
7 modernized to create spaces for play,
8 creativity, and learning. And they are
9 thriving school communities, offering
10 enriching after-school programs and
11 engaging residents of all ages.

12 Our schools attract diverse
13 educators because our teachers and
14 administrators are supported, trained,
15 and paid fairly.

16 (Applause.)

17 MAYOR KENNEY: In 2024,
18 Philadelphia has a strong and growing
19 economy, with lower unemployment,
20 increased job opportunities, a higher
21 median income, and fewer Philadelphians
22 living in poverty.

23 We've attracted and retained
24 small businesses and large corporations
25 alike. These companies chose to

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2 relocate, stay, and grow here because of
3 all that our talent, research
4 universities, location, affordability,
5 and rich quality of life have to offer
6 their employees and companies.

7 We have a skilled workforce
8 that's qualified for these new
9 family-sustaining jobs in growing
10 industries.

11 And in 2024, more college grads
12 choose to stay in Philadelphia, in the
13 Philadelphia region, because Philadelphia
14 is where they can build a successful
15 career, set down roots, and one day raise
16 a family if they choose.

17 Our thriving tourism industry
18 continues to set records, and
19 Philadelphia remains a destination for
20 large-scale events, day trips, and
21 everything in between.

22 Our investments in
23 transportation and infrastructure have
24 paid off, evidenced by streets that are
25 in good repair, roadways that are less

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2 congested, and public transportation that
3 connects Philadelphians from all corners
4 of our city to economic opportunities.

5 In 2024, our treasured
6 neighborhood parks, recreation centers,
7 and libraries are well maintained.
8 Residents benefit from quality programs
9 and events year-round.

10 And as neighborhoods are
11 developing, longtime residents share in
12 their community's success because we've
13 invested in housing affordability.

14 We've expanded opportunities
15 for minority, women, and disabled-owned
16 enterprises who are doing more business
17 with the City than ever so that the
18 companies that receive City contracts
19 truly mirror what Philadelphia looks
20 like.

21 In 2024, Philadelphians feel
22 safe because the City is safe. Our
23 overall crime rates are at the lowest
24 they've been in nearly half a century,
25 and we continue to experience a decline

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2 in violent crime.

3 Vacant properties that once
4 attracted crime and contributed to blight
5 have been redeveloped and support
6 thriving communities.

7 In 2024, Vision Zero has
8 successfully reduced traffic fatalities,
9 and drivers, bikers, and pedestrians
10 respectfully share our roads.

11 Kensington is no longer known
12 as the epicenter of the opioid crisis.
13 Instead, the nation is learning from the
14 Philadelphia Resilience Project about how
15 we collectively fought and conquered the
16 epidemic that claimed the lives of over
17 1,200 people at its peak in 2017.

18 Far fewer people experience
19 homelessness because residents have
20 access to a broader continuum of housing
21 resources and a range of affordable
22 housing options.

23 In 2024, after dramatically and
24 safely reducing our prison population and
25 recidivism through criminal justice

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2 reforms, we have become a national model
3 for building a more fair, equitable, and
4 just society.

5 And we're investing funds once
6 spent on incarceration into other
7 services that everyone can enjoy, like
8 cleaner and smoother streets, great
9 public spaces, education, job training,
10 and the other core services that improve
11 the quality of our lives.

12 In this Philadelphia of 2024,
13 our government is more efficient and
14 effective. We've earned the trust of
15 taxpayers because we are smart and
16 responsible with their money.

17 Our fiscal situation is strong,
18 with a healthier Pension Fund and
19 impressive bond ratings that minimize our
20 borrowing costs.

21 Smart tax reforms, coupled with
22 improved tax collections and expanded
23 payment relief programs, have benefited
24 taxpayers who face legitimate hardships
25 while also contributing to our overall

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2 fiscal health.

3 Antiquated internal systems are
4 long gone, and new tech-based tools
5 streamline processes, resulting in
6 increased efficiency and better services
7 for our residents.

8 I could keep going and going.
9 If there is one thing Philadelphia is not
10 short on, it is goals and aspirations.

11 But the truth is, everything I
12 just described, this grand five-year
13 vision, is attainable if we continue to
14 work together, as we've done over the
15 last three years.

16 It's why we've already made
17 significant progress on creating great
18 schools in every neighborhood.

19 The Plan includes \$1.2 billion
20 in General Fund contributions to the
21 School District. That's over \$700
22 million more than would have gone to the
23 District without the commitment we all
24 made last year. Let me repeat that. The
25 City is providing \$1.2 billion, over \$700

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2 million in new funding, to ensure the
3 School District continues its positive
4 momentum and never again is forced to
5 make devastating cuts that put our
6 children's future in jeopardy.

7 (Applause.)

8 MAYOR KENNEY: We did this
9 because these are all of our kids, no one
10 else's, and it's incumbent upon us to do
11 what is right by them so they can reach
12 their full potential.

13 This past year brought a major
14 milestone. We returned our schools to
15 local control for the first time in
16 nearly two decades.

17 (Applause.)

18 MAYOR KENNEY: Our new School
19 Board, under the amazing leadership of
20 President Joyce Wilkerson, is making
21 great strides.

22 (Applause.)

23 MAYOR KENNEY: The Board
24 established committees to focus on
25 important issues like student

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2 achievement, finance and facilities, and
3 parent and community engagement. They
4 appointed student board representatives,
5 and they are establishing a Parent and
6 Community Advisory Committee, because as
7 Councilmembers Reynolds Brown and Gym
8 have often said, representation matters.

9 These additional voices ensure
10 that the most important stakeholders, our
11 students and parents, have their voices
12 heard.

13 These actions and the hard work
14 of Superintendent Hite and the District
15 employees are already paying off.
16 Moody's Investor Services assigned an
17 investment grade rating for the School
18 District for the first time since 1977.
19 Now the District outlook is "stable" as a
20 result of new revenues and strong
21 District management, an upgrade that can
22 save the District millions in future
23 borrowing.

24 And last month the District
25 celebrated three consecutive years of

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2 improvement among both District-led and
3 charter schools citywide. More students
4 have strong reading skills and are
5 graduating on time. More classrooms are
6 modernized, and the District is investing
7 more than a billion dollars in capital
8 improvements.

9 In addition, all schools now
10 have counselors and nurses, and all
11 elementary schools have instrumental
12 music and art classes, as Councilmember
13 Blackwell has long fought for.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR KENNEY: Schools are
16 expanding computer science education so
17 our kids are trained for technology-based
18 jobs, as Councilman Domb has urged, and
19 they're investing in literacy and math
20 coaches for our hard-working teachers.

21 I'd like to acknowledge
22 Superintendent Dr. William Hite for his
23 leadership and commitment to our
24 students' success.

25 (Applause.)

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2 MAYOR KENNEY: Since he
3 launched the District's Action Plan four
4 years ago, we have twice as many
5 high-performing schools and 50 percent
6 fewer lower performing schools. And I
7 think he deserves a round of applause.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: I want to tell
10 you, Dr. Hite, the City is proud to work
11 alongside you and your team on many
12 shared priorities every day. A positive
13 result of local control has been
14 increased collaboration between the
15 District and our Administration.

16 One example of this is how
17 we've been piloting new forms of
18 behavioral health supports in 21 schools,
19 and we are initiating a broader process
20 to redesign behavioral health services in
21 all schools.

22 Another is the Community
23 Schools initiative, which was championed
24 by Council President Clarke. Our 12
25 Community Schools offer programs and

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2 services for thousands of Philadelphians,
3 including students, families, and
4 residents.

5 Whether it's after-school
6 programs, food pantries, adult education
7 classes or job training, we're meeting
8 people where they are, at their
9 neighborhood school, to provide services
10 that they need.

11 We plan to designate five more
12 Community Schools this coming school year
13 and three more by Fiscal Year '21,
14 bringing our total to 20. This timeline
15 helps us increase after-school activities
16 and summer jobs for students within our
17 Community Schools.

18 To meet the District's academic
19 goals, we developed the citywide
20 Out-of-School Time Initiative, which
21 provides safe spaces and quality
22 programming for kids. Next month, DHS
23 will ask for proposals for OST programs
24 that align with the District goals around
25 early literacy and career readiness.

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2 And we plan to invest a million
3 dollars to further this work and to
4 leverage the \$4.4 million that the
5 William Penn and Knight Foundations have
6 invested in the building of a quality OST
7 system.

8 To improve the career-readiness
9 of our students and to respond to the
10 needs of local employers, we also plan to
11 create a new joint Office of Career
12 Connected Education with the District.
13 This will increase career exposure and
14 job opportunities for our students and
15 create a more seamless experience for
16 employees to engage with the District.

17 This budget proposes resources
18 to enable the start-up of this office and
19 to match funds that Dr. Hite will also be
20 allocating in his budget that will also
21 include placing an additional ten career
22 counselors in high schools who will
23 support our students' career readiness.

24 To increase the amount of
25 quality summer jobs available for our

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2 high schoolers, we plan to invest an
3 additional \$1 million per year and to
4 expand dual enrollment programs to give
5 students the chance to earn college
6 credits while they're still in high
7 school. We plan to increase support for
8 our Community College by \$1.3 million a
9 year, bringing the total to nearly 34
10 million.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR KENNEY: This funding
13 increase will also enable the College to
14 continue important programs like Power Up
15 Your Business, a neighborhood-based
16 approach championed by Councilmember
17 Parker to support small business owners.

18 And for our youngest learners,
19 we'll grow Philadelphia pre-K to serve
20 3,300 three- and four-year-olds next year
21 and 5,500 kids by the year 2023.

22 (Applause.)

23 MAYOR KENNEY: We all know that
24 participation in quality pre-K helps our
25 kids gain skills that last a lifetime,

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2 but it also helps their parents return to
3 the workforce and it helps our PHLpreK
4 providers, most of which are minority or
5 women-owned small businesses, improve the
6 quality of their programs and pay their
7 teaching staff higher wages.

8 While education has always been
9 our Administration's top priority, this
10 budget ensures that economic growth is
11 inclusive and benefits all
12 Philadelphians.

13 Thanks to the leadership of
14 Councilmember Squilla, we are taking an
15 important step to ensuring our own
16 workforce earns a living wage by
17 gradually raising the minimum wage of
18 City workers and contractors to \$15 an
19 hour. This budget --

20 (Applause.)

21 MAYOR KENNEY: This budget
22 includes over \$14 million to account for
23 these increases over the next five years.

24 We'll also start compensating
25 our summer interns in the Mayor's

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2 Internship Program, because we know that
3 too often unpaid internships can
4 undermine diversity and inclusion by
5 shutting out people from underrepresented
6 communities.

7 The Plan adds almost \$5 million
8 for workforce development initiatives
9 that help prepare our residents for
10 family-sustaining jobs. These include:

11 The City as Model Employer
12 initiative that hires individuals who
13 face barriers to employment and helps our
14 government build a more diverse and
15 talented workforce;

16 The Mural Arts Guild program,
17 which gives youth and adults who have
18 been engaged with the criminal justice
19 system, the opportunity to give back to
20 their communities while developing
21 professional skills and earning a wage;

22 And the Greater --

23 (Applause.)

24 MAYOR KENNEY: And the Greater
25 Philadelphia Technology Industry

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2 Partnership led by the Office of
3 Workforce Development working in
4 partnership with more than 15 employers
5 to develop a comprehensive approach for
6 connecting Philadelphians to the tech
7 industry. This is one of the three
8 industry partnerships launched or
9 expanded with Philadelphia Works and
10 partners this year.

11 We're also working to launch a
12 transparent data system that tracks
13 workforce development metrics and
14 progress across a common set of measures.

15 To better support the small
16 businesses that employ a large portion of
17 our city's labor force, we're expanding
18 supports on commercial corridors and
19 grants for CDCs.

20 This is the kind of support for
21 our business community that has long been
22 championed by Councilmember Oh.

23 Plus, more resources will be
24 dedicated to our ongoing business
25 attraction work, including the

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2 Philadelphia Global Identity Project, an
3 effort to elevate Philadelphia's
4 international presence and develop shared
5 marketing messages and materials for the
6 City to attract business capital and
7 talent.

8 All of this is being bolstered
9 by a \$3.75 million increase to the
10 Commerce budget over five years.

11 The complaint I hear most often
12 from our residents -- and I'm certain you
13 hear it as well -- is about the condition
14 of our streets.

15 Our constituents will be
16 pleased to hear that our Administration
17 is committing to improving Philadelphia
18 roadways. Over this six-year Capital
19 Program, more than \$200 million will be
20 invested in reconstruction and
21 resurfacing of City streets, allowing the
22 Streets Department to repave 131 miles of
23 streets annually by Fiscal Year '23.

24 This is the largest single
25 investment in the Capital Program,

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2 accounting for almost one-fifth of the
3 total Capital Program, and will enable
4 residents and visitors to notice a
5 dramatic improvement in the quality of
6 our streets.

7 We'll also continue
8 implementing CONNECT, the strategic
9 transportation plan that we've unveiled
10 this past year. CONNECT makes clear, if
11 we are to thrive as a city, we must take
12 steps to ensure that growth benefits the
13 lives and daily experience of all of our
14 residents, especially those who have been
15 historically underserved and who live in
16 neighborhoods that have been disconnected
17 from jobs and opportunities.

18 This major transportation
19 investment includes traffic safety
20 improvements that are part of Vision
21 Zero, ADA ramp reconstruction, traffic
22 control and signal modernization,
23 restoring historic streets, Roosevelt
24 Boulevard improvements, a high-quality
25 bicycle network, and much more.

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2 To further promote traffic
3 safety, we created, for the first time in
4 our city's history, Neighborhood Slow
5 Zones. Slow Zones are clearly marked
6 sections of residential streets where
7 speed limits will be posted 20 miles per
8 hour and traffic-calming tools like speed
9 cushions are installed.

10 This leads me to another one of
11 our major neighborhood revitalization
12 projects - Rebuild.

13 Through Rebuild, we are making
14 a historic investment of hundreds of
15 millions of dollars to restore our
16 recreation centers, playgrounds, and
17 libraries that have been neglected for
18 decades.

19 (Applause.)

20 MAYOR KENNEY: The Capital
21 Program continues the multi-year \$48
22 million pledge as well as three
23 borrowings made possible by the
24 Philadelphia beverage tax to complete
25 everything from small projects like

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2 fixing leaking roofs and replacing
3 boilers to multi-million dollar
4 renovations.

5 These investments will
6 revitalize our community facilities so
7 residents no longer have to put up with
8 the conditions they've dealt with for
9 decades.

10 Since the Pennsylvania Supreme
11 Court upheld the beverage tax in July,
12 we've been full steam ahead with Rebuild.
13 We completed the first borrowing,
14 celebrated our first groundbreaking, and
15 are launching new projects across the
16 City.

17 And we remain committed to our
18 diverse hiring goals, championed by
19 Councilmember Parker, so people of color
20 can benefit from the construction work
21 made possible by Rebuild.

22 While Rebuild supports capital
23 improvements for recreation centers and
24 libraries, I'm committed to their
25 operations as well. We plan to increase

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2 support for the Free Library of
3 Philadelphia so all of our neighborhood
4 libraries can provide six-day service.

5 (Applause.)

6 MAYOR KENNEY: Another area
7 where we worked together toward a shared
8 goal was on maintaining housing
9 affordability. As a result, we're
10 dedicating \$80 million to the Housing
11 Trust Fund over six years to implement
12 the City's first comprehensive Housing
13 Action Plan.

14 Through this plan, made
15 possible because of Councilmember
16 Sanchez's leadership, we'll be able to
17 provide greater protections for our most
18 vulnerable residents and preserve
19 affordable housing. We will help
20 families buy their first home, homeowners
21 avoid foreclosure, and renters avoid
22 eviction.

23 Housing stability is critical
24 to maintaining a high quality of life,
25 but so is investing in our health.

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2 Thanks to Councilmember Bass's advocacy,
3 the City has taken action to improve
4 health outcomes for all Philadelphians.

5 We'll continue this momentum by
6 making new investments in the programs
7 for the Department of Public Health to
8 prevent asthma in children, address our
9 city's obesity epidemic, and promote
10 healthy neighborhoods. We will expand
11 support for families with new babies and
12 improve walkability and the safety of
13 low-income housing.

14 And we will open a new City
15 Health Center to better serve residents
16 of North and Northeast Philadelphia, a
17 shared priority of Councilmembers O'Neill
18 and Taubenberger.

19 Improving public safety is
20 another key aspect of building a strong
21 future for Philadelphia.

22 Police Commissioner Richard
23 Ross has done a stellar job of
24 instituting many police reforms that have
25 not only benefited the force, but also

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2 the public it serves. But I know he
3 agrees with me when I say there's no way
4 we can create a safe and just city
5 without addressing the intractable issue
6 of gun violence that still plagues our
7 city. It cuts lives short, destroys
8 families, and sows fear in law-abiding
9 residents.

10 As Councilmembers Johnson and
11 Jones know well, gun violence
12 disproportionately impacts men and boys
13 of color. They, along with Council
14 President Darrell Clarke, have been
15 speaking this truth for far too long. We
16 cannot police our way out of this
17 problem, and there's no magic solution
18 that can solve it.

19 Recognizing that this is
20 unacceptable and we need to take a new
21 approach, our Office of Violence
22 Prevention recently released the
23 Philadelphia Roadmap to Safer
24 Communities, the City's first
25 comprehensive citywide anti-violence

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2 strategy in over a decade.

3 The Roadmap focus on
4 prevention, intervention, enforcement,
5 and reentry. By taking a public health
6 approach to gun violence, we have
7 developed strategies to address the
8 underlying factors that contribute to the
9 violence in our communities.

10 We plan to invest over \$30
11 million over the Five Year Plan to
12 implement this Roadmap, and we'll build
13 on our Administration's successful
14 criminal justice reforms by improving
15 reentry programs and establishing the
16 Office of Reentry Partnership in the
17 Managing Director's Office.

18 This Office will support
19 successful reintegration of formerly
20 incarcerated individuals to thrive in
21 their communities. As part of the new
22 Roadmap to Safer Communities, we will:

23 Improve analytical capacity and
24 technology to implement the Police
25 Department's Operation Pinpoint strategy;

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2 Create an Injury Prevention
3 Unit within the Department of Public
4 Health that's focused gun violence
5 prevention;

6 Establish Neighborhood Resource
7 Centers to provide those on probation
8 with the supports they need to succeed.
9 This effort wouldn't be possible without
10 the partnership of the Courts and the
11 leadership of Councilmember Jones;

12 We'll build an infrastructure
13 for synchronized hotspot activities that
14 combines intelligence-based policing and
15 supportive social services;

16 Offer community-targeted impact
17 grants to provide more support to
18 community-based violence prevention
19 programs serving individuals at a high
20 risk of violence;

21 Expand the City's Community
22 Crisis Intervention Program to ensure
23 teams are available in communities that
24 experience high rates of gun violence;
25 and

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2 Enhance greening of vacant lots
3 and sealing vacant homes in high-risk
4 neighborhoods.

5 We're committed to doing this
6 right, so we'll be continuously
7 evaluating our efforts. Like the
8 Resilience Project, we'll assess what's
9 working and what isn't, and we'll change
10 course appropriately when needed.

11 To further improve public
12 safety, this budget includes additional
13 investments in our Police and Fire
14 Departments, priorities urged by
15 Councilmembers Henon and O'Neill.

16 These include 50 new police
17 officers and more body-worn cameras,
18 enough for every officer by this coming
19 fiscal year. Our Capital Budget calls
20 for investments in police facilities,
21 including the Police Administration
22 Building, new facilities for the 22nd and
23 2nd Police Districts, with substantial
24 renovation to the 15th Police District,
25 and making necessary improvements to the

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2 Police Academy training facility.

3 This year the Fire Department
4 is expected to choose a site for a
5 Logistics Hub, creating a central
6 location for vehicle storage and
7 training. Fire stations will be
8 renovated, and new commercial laundry
9 equipment will be installed.

10 Over the next five years, seven
11 companies will reopen across the City.
12 New apparatus will be procured to serve
13 these new companies, as well as replace
14 older equipment for engine, ladder, and
15 medic companies. These investments will
16 help Commissioner Thiel and his team
17 continue to improve response times,
18 better protect property, help save lives,
19 and keep our firefighters safe.

20 This year --

21 (Applause.)

22 MAYOR KENNEY: This year
23 brought both progress and continued
24 challenges as we battle the opioid
25 crisis. While the Kensington section of

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2 the City has borne the brunt of it, we
3 know that drug addiction, homelessness,
4 and related issues are happening citywide
5 and have drained public resources for
6 years.

7 So in October we launched the
8 Philadelphia Resilience Project, a new,
9 coordinated response by over 35
10 departments and agencies that is building
11 off the important groundwork of the
12 Mayor's Task Force to Combat the Opioid
13 Epidemic.

14 The Resilience Project is
15 focused on seven areas: cleaning major
16 encampments, improving public safety,
17 reducing street homelessness, reducing
18 trash and litter, reducing overdoses, and
19 increasing access to treatment, and
20 increasing community response.

21 So far, we cleared the last of
22 four large encampments humanely. In
23 fact, more than half the residents in the
24 encampments accepted housing or services.
25 We've also developed ways to prevent new

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2 encampments from forming.

3 Just as important as the safety
4 of the residents of that community, we
5 worked with local schools and volunteers
6 to create safe corridors for children
7 walking to and from school. We've
8 expanded the Police Assisted Diversion
9 Program into the East Division, which
10 provides those with minor drug and other
11 offenses the opportunity to get help
12 rather than be arrested. We've also
13 expanded housing options and improved
14 access to treatment.

15 And to beautify the
16 neighborhood, we've held four major
17 cleanups spanning hundreds of blocks,
18 removing 275 tons of trash and debris and
19 more than 300 abandoned vehicles.

20 We installed needle drop boxes
21 and launched a new program called the
22 Kensington Initiative for Needle
23 Disposal, or KIND, that has removed over
24 3,000 discarded needles from the streets
25 while employing people who suffer with

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2 addiction.

3 We've distributed thousands of
4 doses of Narcan to prevent overdoses and
5 prevented the spread of infectious
6 disease. We created a Community Advisory
7 Committee and engaged civic associations
8 and residents and the business community
9 to join us in this work.

10 We could not do it without the
11 support and input of Councilmember
12 Sanchez and Squilla. No Council
13 districts have been more impacted, and
14 their partnership has been invaluable in
15 this fight.

16 Because we know the Resilience
17 Project is on the right track, this
18 budget calls for \$7.6 million this coming
19 year, or \$36 million over five years, so
20 we can achieve our long-term goals.

21 For example, the Plan adds \$26
22 million over five years to the Office of
23 Homeless Services' budget to provide the
24 emergency, temporary, and long-term
25 housing needed to reduce the number of

2 people who are unsheltered. Additional
3 funding is dedicated to the Department of
4 Public Health for a toxicologist at the
5 Medical Examiner's Office, and \$6.5
6 million over five years is provided to
7 the Department of Behavioral Health and
8 Intellectual disAbility Services for
9 community outreach, recovery housing, and
10 supports for expanded syringe exchanges.

11 The opioid crisis is not just a
12 Kensington problem. It's a Philadelphia
13 problem. The City and partners have
14 taken action to stem the epidemic by
15 educating the public, reducing opioid
16 prescribing, improving access to
17 treatment, and holding opioid
18 manufacturers and distributors
19 accountable. It's my hope that I can
20 stand before you in future years without
21 needing to propose further investments
22 because we stemmed the tide of the
23 underlying causes of these systemic
24 issues.

25 We also hear residents loud and

2 clear about how clean the City is or
3 isn't. This budget includes \$2.3 million
4 next year and \$11.7 million over the life
5 of the Plan to implement street sweeping
6 in more neighborhoods.

7 We'll launch a pilot program in
8 six neighborhoods this spring that will
9 test the combination of mechanical brooms
10 and blowers. Next spring we will
11 continue to explore the program and,
12 where possible, ask residents to move
13 their cars as we work to keep streets
14 clean.

15 (Applause.)

16 MAYOR KENNEY: Many of the
17 investments that we are proposing come
18 because the City ended the last fiscal
19 year with a strong fund balance. We are
20 also being prudent, so we are proposing
21 to deposit \$92 million of fund balance
22 money by the end of the Plan into the
23 Rainy Day fund in case of emergencies or
24 an economic downturn.

25 We're seeing signs that we're

2 turning the corner in the health of the
3 Pension Fund. The fund grew in the past
4 year, meaning we saw more contributions
5 than payouts. Let me say it again. We
6 saw more contributions than we paid out
7 money.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: This is the
10 result of our reforms, including
11 increased contributions from City
12 workers, the implementation of a new
13 hybrid benefits plan that we negotiated
14 in labor contracts, and contributing more
15 than we're required to do under state
16 law. We're doing our part in addition to
17 asking our employees to do theirs.

18 We thank all our municipal
19 unions, whose leaders are in the Chamber
20 today, for stepping up. Fixing the fund
21 won't be easy, but we're headed in the
22 right direction, so I want to thank them
23 all.

24 (Applause.)

25 MAYOR KENNEY: While the City's

2 property assessment system has made great
3 strides since AVI, we have heard the
4 concerns that you voiced and raised in
5 your audit. Our Administration is
6 committed to continually look for ways to
7 improve and best reflect changes in the
8 market. OPA is adopting a series of a
9 dozen substantial recommendations that
10 I'm convinced will ensure public
11 confidence in the assessments in the
12 future.

13 Another way this budget invests
14 in Philadelphia is empowering each of us
15 to stand up and be counted. We will meet
16 the state's mandate of having secure
17 voting machines in place for the next
18 presidential election. And as
19 Councilmember Green has urged, we will
20 make sure every Philadelphian is counted
21 in Census 2020. To help --

22 (Applause.)

23 MAYOR KENNEY: To help all
24 Philadelphians get an official ID,
25 something we all need, we'll soon launch

2 the PHL City ID program.

3 These efforts to make
4 government work better may sound boring
5 to the average person, but I'm sure you
6 agree with me that it's often the most
7 rewarding part of our work.

8 You know, on a related note,
9 this might actually come as some shock,
10 but some people think that I don't really
11 enjoy being Mayor.

12 It probably has a little
13 something to do with my overly expressive
14 face. You've heard the saying "wear your
15 heart on your sleeve." Well, I've come
16 to learn that I literally show my
17 emotions on my face.

18 The truth is, I do love my job.
19 I'm frustrated often by where we are,
20 because I can see our tremendous
21 potential.

22 I get frustrated by our
23 persistent intergenerational poverty. We
24 know that at least a quarter of our
25 residents are struggling to keep a roof

2 over their heads and food on the table.

3 It's simply unacceptable that our

4 neighbors are unable to meet their basic

5 needs.

6 But then I go to my weekly

7 school visit, which always makes me feel

8 better. At Dobbins CTE High School, one

9 of our Community Schools, I hear about a

10 job training program through Philly Works

11 and Unite Here that's preparing adults in

12 the community for guaranteed union jobs,

13 earning at least \$15 an hour.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR KENNEY: I'm frustrated

16 that despite a relatively low

17 unemployment rate and job growth that

18 outpaces the national average, our median

19 income actually dropped in 2017.

20 But then I think of the

21 international companies like WuXi AppTec

22 that continue to invest in our city and

23 bring more high-wage jobs here, and local

24 leaders like La Colombe and Jefferson

25 that have stepped up to pay all of their

2 workers a living wage.

3 I also get frustrated when I
4 read reports of drug overdoses or spikes
5 in homelessness, like we experienced last
6 August.

7 But then I go to a Resilience
8 Project cleanup with over a hundred
9 volunteers working to revitalize their
10 neighborhood. They remind me that
11 Philadelphians are resilient, and
12 together we will overcome the opioid
13 epidemic.

14 I'm frustrated when I meet with
15 people who are dealing firsthand with the
16 ravages of gun violence, mothers burying
17 their children, kids growing up without a
18 parent, communities torn apart. It
19 weighs on me heavily, like I know it does
20 for all of you.

21 But then I get to go to a
22 PHLpreK program and I'm reminded how
23 perfect our three- and four-year-old
24 babies are. Everything we're doing to
25 invest in their education will pay off

2 for them, and I know they'll be more
3 likely to make healthy choices as they
4 get older.

5 You get my point. I'm often
6 frustrated by the challenges we face, but
7 it's not because the problems are too big
8 to solve. Frankly, it's just the
9 opposite. We already have what we need
10 to make Philadelphia a city that works
11 for us all.

12 And I know that this Budget and
13 Plan will help us achieve the 2024 vision
14 that I described earlier. I look forward
15 to continuing to work alongside you to
16 make Philadelphia the shining example of
17 what a diverse, inclusive, and prosperous
18 city this can be.

19 And I thank you very much for
20 all your hard work. God bless you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Folks, as you leave, can you please be a
24 little quiet, because we do have to
25 adjourn the Council session officially.

2 So the members need to stay in their
3 seats as people leave. We have to
4 adjourn.

5 I'm going to ask everybody who
6 is not a Councilperson to please remove
7 yourself from the floor of Council.

8 If anyone is going to leave,

10 you're going to stay, you have to be
11 quiet so we can conclude our Council
12 session. Thank you for your cooperation.

13 This part will be a little
14 anti-dramatic, but it's a part of what we
15 have to do.

16 We're assuming we don't have
17 any speeches on behalf of the minority?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Speeches on behalf of the majority?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 There being none, the Chair recognizes
24 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
25 to adjourn.
