11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
12 Minister, so much for those inspiring words.  
13 Appreciate it.

14 Council will be at ease.

15 (Council at ease.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

17 Our next order -- our next order of  
18 business is the Approval of the Journal of the  
19 meeting of Thursday, March 7, 2019.

20 And the Chair recognizes Councilman  
21 Greenlee.

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,  
23 Mr. President.

24 I move that the Journal of the meeting  
25 of Thursday, March 7, 2019 be approved.

1 (Duly seconded.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

3 It's been moved and properly second that the  
4 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March 7,  
5 2019 stand approved.

6 All those in favor, indicate by saying  
7 aye.

8 (Ayes.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
10 opposed?

11 (No opposition.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have  
13 it. And the Journal is approved.

14 Our next order of business -- have a  
15 little quiet over there, please. Thank you.

16 Our next order of business is request  
17 for Leaves of Absences.

18 And the Chair recognizes Councilman  
19 Henon.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
21 Mr. President. On behalf of the Majority, there  
22 are no requests for Leaves of Absences today.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks  
24 the gentleman.

25 Chair now recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

1           COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
2 Mr. President. On behalf of the Republicans,  
3 there are no requests for Leave of Absence.

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks  
5 the gentleman.

6           At this time, I would like to dispense  
7 with the regular order of business. And I would  
8 like to thank everyone who has taken time out of  
9 their busy day to come down and witness their  
10 government in action. We genuinely appreciate  
11 you being here. We hope that your stay here  
12 today is a knowledgeable one, but more  
13 importantly, a pleasurable one. So much so that  
14 you come back again.

15           So again, thank you for being here.

16           At this time, the Chair will recognize  
17 Councilman Johnson who will do a presentation on  
18 my behalf to Robert "Meek Mill" Williams. Also  
19 joining us today is State Senator Sharif Street.  
20 Would Meek Mill and those -- pardon me?

21           Oh, wait a minute. You want to do it  
22 right now? Let me finish this.

23           Before we bring the members up, I wanted  
24 to recognize Councilman Jones.

25           COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

1 Mr. President. I have to attend business  
2 outside of the building. I'd like to be excused  
3 and vote "aye" on all bills and resolutions.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
5 Councilman. The record shall reflect --

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: -- an "aye"  
8 vote on all bills and resolutions.

9 Well, would Meek Mill and those  
10 accompanying him, please, join the Councilman at  
11 the podium. And Senator Sharif Street, also.  
12 And I think we have Meek's family.

13 And joining Councilman Johnson we have  
14 Councilwoman Gym, Councilwoman Parker,  
15 Councilman Green, Councilwoman Bass and Cecil B.  
16 Moore's, the Martin Luther King Rec Center's  
17 infamous Eddie Hood. And is that it? You guys  
18 ready? We good? And Councilman Squilla and  
19 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

20 Good? Okay. Let's rock.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good morning,  
22 everyone.

23 Good morning, everyone.

24 (Good morning.)

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Today I am standing

1 here on behalf of Council President Darrell  
2 Clarke in partnership with Senator Sharif Street  
3 as we sit here and take a moment and honor  
4 Robert "Meek Mill" Williams. We want to take a  
5 moment to acknowledge him for his work as  
6 relates to criminal justice reform, but also  
7 being a shining example of a young man who has  
8 persevered, stayed strong in the face of  
9 adversity and, most importantly, used his  
10 platform as a message of positivity to our young  
11 people.

12 I, also, would like to acknowledge Mark  
13 Rubin of the Philadelphia 76ers. Let's give him  
14 a round of applause -- Mike Rubin.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Where is Mike at?

17 MEEK MILL: Come on up Mike.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Come on, man.

19 MEEK MILL: Nobody don't know --

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Don't be shy.

21 (Laughter.)

22 (Approaches podium.)

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: You know, being a  
24 young man who grew up in South Philadelphia and  
25 recognized the obstacles that we face, the

1 barriers that life put in front of you and being  
2 a young man who persevered through juvenile  
3 probation and being able to serve as the first  
4 African-American Councilperson in the 2nd  
5 Councilmanic District, it's truly an honor to  
6 get a chance to stand with my colleagues as we  
7 recognize Meek Mill for, most importantly, not  
8 only his entertainment expertise, but most  
9 importantly, how he really has stepped up and  
10 taking his advocacy to the next level to make  
11 sure that our justice system is just and fair  
12 for everyone.

13           And so at this particular time, I am  
14 going to also ask for Senator Sharif Street to  
15 say a few remarks. And we will present the  
16 official citation.

17           SENATOR STREET: Thank you.

18           Good morning.

19           (Morning.)

20           SENATOR STREET: You know, it is a  
21 pleasure and an honor to be here to present this  
22 congratulatory citation or, I guess,  
23 congratulatory resolution from the Senate for my  
24 friend, Meek Mill, my neighbor. We are from the  
25 same neighborhood.



1           Some will say accomplishments in  
2 entertainment are important. But why is the  
3 government doing this? It is because Meek  
4 hasn't just accomplished in entertainment. But  
5 when he was impacted by the criminal justice  
6 system in the way that so many people from North  
7 Philly are from our neighborhood, it's not  
8 unusual if you are from where we are from to be  
9 impacted by the criminal justice system.

10           He decided it wasn't enough for him to  
11 deal with his own personal situation, but he  
12 turned that into an advocacy and put power  
13 behind a movement for criminal justice so people  
14 from North Philly, from where we are from and  
15 people like our communities not only in this  
16 City and in this Commonwealth but across the  
17 country would be able to benefit from a reform  
18 system.

19           So similarly, he create -- he worked  
20 along with Jay-Z and Brother Rubin and others  
21 from across the country to put together a reform  
22 alliance. And so, we are acknowledging today  
23 not just a men who had personal success, but a  
24 man who had personal success that never forgot  
25 where he came from. And I know because I am

1 from there, too. Came back and gave away bikes  
2 and did the things that make people happy.  
3 Brought some joy in their life, sneakers, fixed  
4 up the school, is helping us with the rec  
5 center. But also understood that we need  
6 systemic change so that the circumstances and  
7 the things he went through, nobody else from  
8 North Philly or anybody -- anywhere else should  
9 have to continue to go through.

10 So, we congratulate the brother. And I  
11 could read all the citations, I don't think  
12 today. But we do want to say, he's an example  
13 not only to people in North Philly where he came  
14 from but to other people in entertainment who  
15 have had some success. It's not good enough for  
16 you to succeed for yourself. You got to help  
17 the next young man or young woman coming up  
18 behind you.

19 Congratulations, Meek.

20 MEEK MILL: Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So, most of you  
23 know I'm from South Philly. I'm going to be a  
24 little geographical today. We know Meek Mill is  
25 from North Philadelphia, but his foundation

1 started in South Philadelphia. Grandmom and the  
2 rest of the family. His uncle is a legendary DJ  
3 Grandmaster Neil from South Philadelphia. So,  
4 we want to share Meek Mill today with North  
5 Philadelphia.

6 But in all sincerity, I want to  
7 officially start the citation by saying:

8 Honoring and recognizing and  
9 congratulating Robert "Meek Mill" Williams for  
10 his philanthropic and criminal justice reform  
11 endeavors and naming March 15 through March 17  
12 of 2019 in the City of Philadelphia "Meek Mill  
13 Weekend."

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas, Robert  
16 Williams known to the world as Meek Mill is a  
17 critically acclaimed multi-platinum hip hop  
18 artist, song writer, entrepreneur, actor and  
19 criminal justice reform advocate that hails from  
20 North Philadelphia.

21 Whereas, Meek Mill evolved from  
22 Philadelphia's hottest underground rapper to one  
23 of the world's preeminent musical artist.  
24 Having released a slew of smash studio albums  
25 and singles, his latest studio album

1 Championships debuted at No. 1 on Billboards Top  
2 200 albums being his second chart topper  
3 following his 2015 album release, Dreams Worth  
4 More Than Money.

5 And also, I want to acknowledge that you  
6 just went platinum this week with Championships.  
7 Let's give him a round of applause for that.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas, Meek Mill  
10 is also the CEO of Dream Chasers, his music  
11 label imprint that he launched in 2012 and named  
12 after his mix tape series; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, since 2007,  
14 Mill has been entrapped in the criminal justice  
15 system and shoveled through the prison system  
16 over technical probation violations, all despite  
17 maintaining his innocence. His latest  
18 incarceration in November 2017 spurred the  
19 international #Free Meek Mill movement where  
20 artists, athletes and others publicly advocate  
21 on his behalf until he was released on bail on  
22 April 24, 2018; and

23 Whereas, after his release from prison,  
24 Meek Mill has used his public platform to  
25 generate awareness around the problems of the

1 criminal justice system including excessive  
2 probation regulations, a disproportionate bail  
3 system, the lack of rehabilitation programs  
4 available and how these problems  
5 disproportionately affect people of color; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
7 inspired by Meek Mills ongoing battles with the  
8 criminal justice system, business and  
9 entertainment leaders such as 76ers owner  
10 Michael Rubin, Patriots owner Robert Kraft, Nets  
11 co-owner Clara Wu Tsai, hedge fund manager and  
12 investor Daniel Loeb, cryptocurrency titan  
13 Michael Novogratz, and Vista Equity Partner and  
14 founder Robert Smith have all teamed up with  
15 renowned rapper Jay-Z and Meek Mill to launch  
16 the Reform Alliance in January 2019; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
18 co-chaired by Meek Mill, the Reform Alliance was  
19 formed to advance criminal justice reform and  
20 eradicate outdated policies that perpetuate  
21 injustice in the United States. Their goal is  
22 to reduce the number of people affected by  
23 parole and probation by 1 million over the next  
24 five years; and

25 Whereas, Meek Mill has donated over

1 60,000 bottles of water to the people of Flint,  
2 Michigan; given away thousands of backpacks and  
3 school supplies to children all across the City  
4 of Philadelphia and provided gifts to those in  
5 homeless shelters; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, this past  
7 fall, Meek Mill partnered with the City of  
8 Philadelphia and Puma to renovate basketball  
9 courts at 33rd and Oxford Street. In December,  
10 he teamed up with Puma and GoPuff to host a toy  
11 giveaway for over 3,000 children at the Martin  
12 Luther King Jr. Recreation Center, which is  
13 located at 22nd and Cecil B. Moore Avenue,  
14 giving away video game consoles, bicycles, art  
15 sets, sneakers, board games and an array of  
16 other toys to kids from schools and  
17 organizations across the Philadelphia area; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, additionally  
19 Meek Mill serves as one of the captains of  
20 Puma's newly-launched #Reform platform that  
21 enables human ambassadors from the world of  
22 sports, music and entertainment to advocate for  
23 social justice issues and champion cause to  
24 promote positive change. He is specifically  
25 spearheading reforms focused on criminal justice

1 reform, and all proceeds from sales of his  
2 #Reform-related products will be donated to  
3 charities working to reform the criminal justice  
4 system; and

5           Whereas, using all platforms available  
6 due to his celebrity, Meek Mill has teamed up  
7 with Amazon Prime Video and Jay-Z's ROC Nation  
8 for a six-part documentary series that will  
9 follow his own fight for exoneration while  
10 exposing flaws in the criminal justice system.

11           COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Now therefore, be  
12 it resolved that the Council for the City of  
13 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and recognize  
14 and congratulate Robert "Meek Mill" Williams for  
15 his philanthropic and criminal justice reform  
16 endeavors. And name March 15 through March 17  
17 of 2019 as "Meek Mill Weekend" in the City of  
18 Philadelphia.

19           Be it further resolved, that an  
20 engrossed copy of this resolution be presented  
21 to Meek Mill as evidence of the true and sincere  
22 sentiments of this legislative body. On behalf  
23 of Council President Darrell Clarke, Members of  
24 Council, we would like to officially present to  
25 you this citation on behalf of the City of

1 Philadelphia.

2 (Applause.)

3 MEEK MILL: Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the Chair  
5 recognizes Meek Mill for remarks.

6 MEEK MILL: I would like to say thank  
7 you to the City of Philadelphia, my mom, my  
8 family, my sister, son, niece and nephew here,  
9 ROC Nation, Michael Rubin.

10 As you know, the situation I've been  
11 through you, a lot of people didn't know when I  
12 came home I would focus on really trying to give  
13 young kids like me a fair shot coming up in the  
14 system. A lot of people in the beginning  
15 thought that it may have just been a part of my  
16 situation. But what we had started now, our  
17 foundation -- me, Michael Rubin, Robert Kraft,  
18 Jay-Z, Mike Novogratz, Clara Tsai -- we started  
19 a foundation.

20 And you know, just -- I wanted to do  
21 something where I felt important enough to give  
22 people like me coming up a fair shot in life.  
23 As you see, I got a seven year old son. My son  
24 seven years old. He may make mistakes in life.  
25 I don't want my son growing up in a world, a



1 place where if he decided to use marijuana one  
2 time, he could spend two or three years in a  
3 state penitentiary raised by people he don't  
4 know. I don't believe young kids, where we come  
5 from, minorities like myself, should have a shot  
6 like that. And I think we deserve better.

7           And I am trying to fight for the young  
8 kids that I actually spend time with and sat in  
9 prison with multiple times for not even  
10 committing crime. And I want to thank the  
11 people here for the support, because the support  
12 mattered a lot. I've been in prison a few times  
13 for probation and violations. But the one time  
14 that my City of Philadelphia showed me support  
15 was the one time I came out of prison. And I  
16 want to show the support back and do it for the  
17 people that actually stood up for me. So you  
18 know, that mean a lot.

19           Growing up in Philadelphia was my mom, a  
20 single parent home. She working eight hours a  
21 day, we actually are growing up in the streets  
22 in the wild, on the corner and not really having  
23 guidance. So you know, just having the support  
24 means a lot.

25           I want to thank everybody who ever

1 supported me to put me in this situation. And  
2 I'm not even really here to take credit. It's a  
3 part of my life. It's what I've been through.  
4 It's what I experienced. And you know, I just  
5 think that as a City of Philadelphia, me with a  
6 platform as being a musical artist, being known  
7 worldwide, I can use my voice to actually, you  
8 know, make things better.

9 This is not a call out for people to do  
10 crime and not go to jail. It's never been the  
11 case. It's a call out to get people who  
12 actually come up under different circumstances a  
13 fair shot in America. And that's the people I  
14 want to speak for. You do wrong, you get wrong.  
15 But I think in this life you deserve right if  
16 you living the right way. And you deserve a  
17 fair shot. And that's what I am here fighting  
18 for.

19 I want to shout out to people like Mike  
20 Rubin. He witnessed in my case. This is not a  
21 case of a wealthy guy, a White -- a wealthy  
22 White man seeing his friend go to prison, want  
23 to step up just because it's me. No. This  
24 turned into a case of him being introduced to  
25 something that he never seen personally with his

1 own two eyes of unfairness. And we spend a lot  
2 of time on prison visits, me explaining to him  
3 that this happens to thousand people on a daily  
4 basis.

5 Me, myself, I actually grew up in the  
6 early '90s where -- late '80s where crack laws  
7 were placed. And it wasn't men in our  
8 neighborhood, so you know, it kept the system  
9 flowing of young men going in and out of prison.  
10 You know, like I said, I got a seven-year-old  
11 son. I been in prison probably three or four  
12 times and state penitentiaries, country prison  
13 with people who got life in prison, murderers,  
14 rapists. And been in those situations three or  
15 four times without committing crime.

16 I'm employed. I employ people. I do a  
17 lot of charity in the City. I don't know. A  
18 lot of police officers, you may see me riding  
19 around these places. I try to keep it close and  
20 stick close to the place I come from and not  
21 really feel like I have to move to a whole  
22 different coast of the world.

23 You know, it's not a -- we got a lot of  
24 violence we got to fix here where a lot of  
25 people who look like me, die on a daily basis.

1 If you watch the news, a lot of young men die  
2 from gun violence. I still try to stick as  
3 close as I can and give my influence and, you  
4 know, bring what I can bring to the City of  
5 Philadelphia and, you know, make things a better  
6 place.

7 I cannot be a perfect person. I'm going  
8 to make mistakes. I'm 31 years old. I'm a  
9 young man. And you know, I want to be me.  
10 Today, I wanted to wear a suit. I wanted to  
11 look nice, but you know, I want to look like me.  
12 In situations like this, I'm wearing Milano. A  
13 young girl from Philadelphia, support her  
14 business. On tour --

15 (Applause.)

16 MEEK MILL: On tour, I wear -- it's a  
17 vest. It's not a real bullet proof vest. It's  
18 actually a kid from, like, West Philadelphia.  
19 He got a clothing line. He does not pay me to  
20 wear that. I wear it every tour night.

21 Basically stating, I do it for my City.  
22 And I appreciate everybody in here supporting  
23 me, whoever have support for me. And I am going  
24 to continue to do what I do.

25 And thank you for everything.

1 (Applause.)

2 SENATOR STREET: So Meek --

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Want to  
4 speak?

5 SENATOR STREET: I am not going to read  
6 this whole thing because we've already heard  
7 enough. But I do want to say, we thank you for  
8 not just in Philadelphia, but the laws that  
9 you've been trying to pass, you've been working  
10 are mostly state laws. So on behalf of the  
11 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the  
12 Pennsylvania State Senate, we also acknowledge  
13 the work that you've done and the work that  
14 you're going to do and all your success.

15 Congratulations, Meek. It's from the  
16 State.

17 (Applause.)

18 MEEK MILL: Thank you. I appreciate it.

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Go ahead, Mike.

20 MR. RUBIN: I just want to thank  
21 everybody for being here today. To see the City  
22 rally behind Meek is what makes Philadelphia  
23 great. I mean, Meek and I talk all the time  
24 about how do you take a bad situation and turn  
25 it into a positive. And we are all here doing

1 exactly that.

2 A year ago, I just said to Meek, the  
3 last time I was here, we were having rallies to  
4 get Meek out of prison for a crime he didn't  
5 commit. Today the City is standing behind him  
6 in the biggest way. And I got to say, I'm so  
7 proud of Meek for taking his negative situation  
8 and figuring out he we can together help  
9 millions of other people.

10 That -- and he said it right. I didn't  
11 think this stuff really happened. I didn't  
12 believe you can go to prison for not committing  
13 a crime. You know, I went to -- I had the, what  
14 I thought, was the unfortunate experience but it  
15 was really an incredible experience of going to  
16 court with him November 6, 2017. And for me,  
17 that opened my eyes to a world I didn't believe  
18 existed. And you know, I think in reality, Meek  
19 has been able to take this situation and say,  
20 how do I help millions of other people.

21 So, I am so proud of you. I'm so  
22 appreciative of everybody here in Philadelphia  
23 standing behind him. And I just want to say  
24 thank you. And it's -- we are just getting  
25 started, but I look forward to helping millions

1 of people together with Meek and all of our  
2 other partners and Desiree and ROC Nation. So,  
3 exciting times ahead.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

6 Council be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Okay. Thank  
9 you all. Quite an exciting moment.

10 At this time, the Chair recognizes  
11 Councilwoman Parker who will present a  
12 resolution congratulating and honoring the  
13 Pennsylvania Chapter of the National Coalition  
14 of 100 Black Women. Would Latifah Fields and  
15 those accompanying her, please, join the  
16 Councilwoman at the podium.

17 (Approaches podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And joining  
19 Councilwoman Parker we have Councilwoman  
20 Blackwell, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,  
21 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman Gym and  
22 Councilman Green and Councilman Domb, Councilman  
23 Johnson and Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez and  
24 Councilwoman Bass.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good morning,

1 everyone. It is indeed an honor --

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Councilwoman,  
3 hold on one second.

4 Could we have a little quiet, please.

5 Little quiet. Thank you.

6 Go ahead, Councilwoman.

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good morning,  
8 everyone. It is indeed an honor and a privilege  
9 that we as a Council gather today to  
10 congratulate and celebrate the National  
11 Coalition of 100 Black Women on the occasion of  
12 the 33rd Anniversary of the Madam C.J. Walker  
13 Awards Luncheon. I want to just acknowledge for  
14 the record that standing to my left is the  
15 founder Sylvia Webster.

16 Give her a round of applause.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: She is living,  
19 walking, breathing history. Sylvia, we thank  
20 you for your leadership. And you did it at a  
21 time when it wasn't in vogue for Black women to  
22 think that it was okay for Black women to get  
23 organized to advocate on behalf of their  
24 interests. So, we thank you for your vision and  
25 are proud to note that you will also be honored



1 this year at the Madam C.J. Walker Awards  
2 Luncheon.

3 In addition to that, I want to note that  
4 we all know that we lost a sister who  
5 contributed in a significant way to the City of  
6 Philadelphia. Some of you will remember when  
7 she worked here in our City Commissioner's  
8 Office. And I am speaking of none other than  
9 our Linda Watson. We send our deepest sympathy  
10 to her family. And her legacy will continue.

11 We are proud to note that the Coalition  
12 maintains strong leadership. It hasn't missed a  
13 beat with their new president Latifah Fields.  
14 And we want you to know that this Council is  
15 here to support you when and how we have to.

16 And finally, this is the 33rd year of  
17 the Madam C.J. Walker Awards Luncheon. And they  
18 have a mighty chair who is a part of our family.  
19 She has energy. And don't you think when you  
20 look at her, that she -- oh, she's a sweet  
21 softy. Listen, she's a ball of fire. Give it  
22 up for our Wilhelmina Moore.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: In addition to  
25 that, her co-chair is Theresa Lamore Redman.

1 And we thank you all for being here. The  
2 resolution reads as follows.

3 A resolution congratulating and honoring  
4 the Pennsylvania Chapter of the National  
5 Coalition of 100 Black Women on the 33rd  
6 Anniversary of the Madam C.J. Walker Awards  
7 Luncheon and for the organization's commitment  
8 to the educational, political and economic  
9 empowerment of African-American women throughout  
10 the City of Philadelphia.

11 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Whereas,  
12 the Pennsylvania Chapter of the National  
13 Coalition of 100 Black Women was founded in 1981  
14 by this lady Sylvia Webster whose purpose was to  
15 serve as a collective voice for progressive  
16 women of African-American descent committed to  
17 advocating for meaningful sociopolitical change;  
18 and

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas, the  
20 Pennsylvania Chapter of National Coalition of  
21 100 Black Women in 1982 swore in 42 trailblazing  
22 leaders of varying professional affiliations  
23 including the Honorable Marian B. Tasco,  
24 Charisse Lillie-McGill, Audrey R.  
25 Johnson-Thornton, the Honorable Augusta A.

1 Clark, Joanne Bell, Velma Goode, Leslie Kernodle  
2 and Dr. Marschal-Neil E. Young; and

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Whereas, the  
4 organization's leaders quickly sprung into  
5 action implementing an aggressive campaign to  
6 address the educational, economic, political and  
7 physical needs of women throughout the  
8 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania with a keen focus  
9 on urban cities in a array of programmatic and  
10 legislative remedies; and

11 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the  
12 organization boasts several signature programs  
13 that exhibit its unwavering mission, most  
14 notably the educational mentorship and  
15 scholarship awards program designed to support  
16 women and girls pursuing a post-secondary  
17 education and the Madam C.J. Walker Awards  
18 Luncheon; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the Madam  
20 C.V. Walker Awards Luncheon -- whereas, named in  
21 honor of the nation's first woman to become a  
22 self-made millionaire, Madam C.J. Walker Awards  
23 Luncheon celebrates local, female entrepreneurs  
24 who successfully operate their own companies and  
25 demonstrate sound business practices; and

1           Whereas, the Madam C.J. Walker Awards  
2 Luncheon also provides the Coalition's leaders  
3 with the opportunity to publicly acknowledge  
4 girls and women deeply invested in their  
5 academic, social and political advancement as  
6 recipients of its annual scholarship award; and

7           COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: If you  
8 haven't gone to the luncheon, you have no idea  
9 the power of women in one room.

10           Whereas, the Madam C.J. Walker Awards  
11 Luncheon in its 33rd year is a Coalition staple  
12 which continues to be a shining example of the  
13 organization's commitment to female economic  
14 empowerment by generating over a thousand  
15 attendees annually, beautiful attendees,  
16 providing a platform for networking, small  
17 businesses and strengthening the unbreakable  
18 bond of female comradery; and

19           COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, in addition  
20 to commemorating this auspicious luncheon, the  
21 Pennsylvania Chapter of the National Coalition  
22 of 100 Black Women reveal in several noteworthy  
23 accomplishments, including receiving the Susan  
24 G. Komen Awards -- Women's Champion Award, the  
25 Chapter of the Year Award from the National

1 Coalition of 100 Black Women, the rededication  
2 of the Iris V. Henderson Cancer Center at Mercy  
3 Hospital in memorium of a Coalition sister, and  
4 the leveraging of local resources alongside  
5 national leadership to successfully influence  
6 the confirmation of the first African-American  
7 female U.S. Attorney General Ms. Loretta Lynch;  
8 and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And whereas, as a  
10 member of the National Coalition of 100 Black  
11 Women since 1996, I am just honored to be here  
12 with you all. What an awesome group of women.

13 Whereas, in honor of Women's History  
14 Month and in the closing of Black History Month,  
15 the women of the Pennsylvania Chapter of the  
16 National Coalition of 100 Black Women continue  
17 to be lauded, and deservingly so as local  
18 leaders invested in the economic, educational  
19 and political advancement of our communities;

20 Now therefore, be it

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Resolved by the  
22 Council of the City of Philadelphia that hereby  
23 honors and recognizes the Pennsylvania Chapter  
24 of the National Coalition of 100 Black Women on  
25 the 33rd Anniversary of the Madam C.J. Walker

1 Luncheon, and for the organization's commitment  
2 to empowering African-American women throughout  
3 the City of Philadelphia;

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Further resolve that  
5 an engrossed copy of this resolution be  
6 presented to the National Coalition of 100 Black  
7 Women Pennsylvania Chapter as evidence of the  
8 sincere sentiments of this legislative body.

9 Congratulations.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the Chair  
12 recognizes Ms. Fields for remarks.

13 MS. FIELDS: Good afternoon, everyone.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Afternoon.

15 MS. FIELDS: On behalf of the National  
16 Coalition of 100 Black Women Incorporated  
17 Pennsylvania Chapter, we thank you once, twice  
18 and three times. As the ladies and gentleman  
19 said, if you did not receive your ticket, you  
20 are missing out. But don't fret, we do it  
21 again. So, save the date for March 20, 2020.  
22 And be -- just follow us on social media and  
23 follow what we are doing.

24 But we stand on the shoulders, we stand  
25 on the strong shoulders of such giants as Sylvia

1 G. Webster. And we will continue to lead the  
2 charge here in the City of Philadelphia as the  
3 progressive Black Women's organization we are.

4 Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So,  
7 congratulations. And Council, we have another  
8 speaker.

9 MS. WEBSTER: Good morning. I have very  
10 little to say. I am just happy that this  
11 organization is still functioning and still  
12 viable after thirty six years.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you and  
14 congratulations.

15 Council be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you and  
18 congratulations. Thank you.

19 At this time, the Chair recognizes  
20 Councilman Squilla who will present a resolution  
21 recognizing Larry Freedman. Would Mr. Freedman  
22 and those accompanying him, please, join the  
23 Councilman at the podium.

24 You want the -- Matt and all the -- come  
25 on guys. The Northern Liberties crew, come on

1 up.

2 (Group approaches podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Go ahead,  
4 Councilman.

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
6 Mr. President. And as somebody with the -- who  
7 shares a district in Northern Liberties with  
8 President Clarke and other Members of Council,  
9 understanding how important it is to have great  
10 community leaders.

11 And the reason why we always save the  
12 best for last is that the community is so  
13 important here in Philadelphia to make  
14 government work. We can't do it by ourselves.  
15 And we need to do it with the help from our  
16 community leaders. And Larry Freedman is one of  
17 those. So, today we are honoring and  
18 recognizing Larry Freedman for his tireless  
19 dedication to the City of Philadelphia and  
20 especially the Northern Liberties neighborhood.

21 Whereas, in 1986, Larry Freedman and his  
22 partner Natalie Wieters established a residence  
23 and sound studio and art business on North 2nd  
24 Street, Northern Liberties. Larry quickly  
25 became an active member of the Northern



1 Liberties Community, which was at that time  
2 seeing the first signs of rebirth after decades  
3 of population loss and disinvestment; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, in 1987,  
5 Larry joined the Northern Liberties Neighbor  
6 Association Zoning Committee. And in the early  
7 1990s, became its chair, a position he still  
8 holds today helping to oversee community input  
9 into a staggering volume of new development and  
10 helping to shape that development while  
11 preserving the community's fabric; and

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, Larry served  
13 on -- excuse me.

14 Whereas, Larry served on the NLNA Board  
15 of Directors for many years and co-founded the  
16 Northern Liberties Community Development  
17 Corporation, which redeveloped an historic  
18 building into the Garden Looms Affordable  
19 Housing Project; and

20 Whereas, Larry was a prime mover in a  
21 multi-year effort to secure a permanent home for  
22 the NLNA, the Northern Liberties Community  
23 Center. And in helping, raised approximately  
24 1 million in donations, grants and financing to  
25 complete the renovation of a group of abandoned,

1 blighted properties into a community gathering  
2 space with tax paying residential and commercial  
3 uses; and

4 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, Larry secured  
5 donations enabling the NLNA to begin and sustain  
6 weekly sidewalk sweeping in the community; and

7 Whereas, over the last three decades,  
8 Larry has devoted tens of thousands of daytime,  
9 evening and weekend hours to help residents and  
10 business owners with problems, to mediate  
11 disagreements and to mentor fellow NLNA board  
12 members and other community volunteers; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas, Larry has  
14 become the Dean of the City's RCO zoning chairs  
15 and a preeminent citizen authority on the City's  
16 zoning and building codes looked to and trusted  
17 by Members of City Council, zoning and land use  
18 attorneys, developers, business owners and  
19 residents alike; and

20 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas, Larry is  
21 unfailingly fair, friendly, good humored,  
22 diligent and he and Natalie are devoted, loving  
23 parents to their son Jessie.

24 And whereas, Larry is a model citizen  
25 who has poured his heart, mind, hands and

1 financial resources into our City as a resident,  
2 business owner civic leader, and whom all  
3 Philadelphians can be proud.

4 Now therefore, be it resolved, by the  
5 City Council of Philadelphia, that we honor and  
6 recognize Larry Freedman for his tireless  
7 dedication to making the City of Philadelphia a  
8 better place to live, work and play.

9 Further resolve, that this engrossed  
10 copy of this resolution be presented to Larry  
11 Freedman as evidence of the sincere sentiment of  
12 this legislative body.

13 Congratulations.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the Chair  
16 recognizes Mr. Freedman for remarks.

17 MR. FREEDMAN: Thank you, everybody.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You're  
19 welcome.

20 MR. FREEDMAN: I was prepared to kind of  
21 aim my remarks that way, but everybody is here  
22 now. So, I am just going -- can I just turn  
23 around?

24 (No.)

25 MR. FREEDMAN: I am exhausted. That's

1 all I have to say. Sean asked me to say nothing  
2 inappropriate, so I -- all I have is thank you.

3 (Laughter.)

4 MR. FREEDMAN: This is about  
5 volunteering, obviously. And I -- after all  
6 these years, I still don't know why anybody does  
7 it but -- because there's a lot of abuse, and  
8 that about sums it up. Maybe that's what the  
9 common denominator is.

10 But all the people that I worked with,  
11 all the boards, all the projects, all the  
12 committees and all the neighbors really who have  
13 come into zoning over the years, we have kind of  
14 figured it out together. And no offense to the  
15 other neighborhoods, but Northern Liberties is  
16 the best neighborhood in the City.

17 (Applause and hoots.)

18 MR. FREEDMAN: Yeah, right. Okay. What  
19 do I got to lose? I've been trying to get fired  
20 for 20 years, and Matt won't accept my  
21 resignation. And that's because the  
22 neighborhood is full of hard working people,  
23 dedicated people, talented people, tolerant  
24 people, fun loving people and so on and so  
25 forth.

1           And it's been an honor to be part of  
2 that. And to -- specially since in 1987, when I  
3 joined the Zoning Committee, holy cow, it took  
4 us two or three years. Joe, you can bear me  
5 out, we didn't have an applicant. I don't know  
6 what we were doing for three years. We were  
7 just meeting. It seemed like the right thing to  
8 do.

9           So obviously, everybody here behind me,  
10 thank you. There is a couple people in  
11 particular.

12           First of all, this didn't mention -- I  
13 don't want to be picayune, but it didn't mention  
14 the music festivals, which maybe I am the most  
15 proud of. So, I would like to thank Don  
16 Phillips. Don and I started the street  
17 festivals in the late '80s and early '90s that  
18 turned into Welcome America, which turned into  
19 the music festivals at Liberty Lands. And  
20 June 29, we have a music festival. So please,  
21 put that on your calendar.

22           Ira Upin, one of my best friends, has  
23 been a co-chair with me. And we had to get  
24 through the crazy era of Northern Liberties in  
25 the 2000s when we had ten to twelve applicants

1 per month. And I would say, Ira, can you do  
2 this. And he would -- he would do it beyond --  
3 he would do it on steroids to the point where I  
4 couldn't even listen back to what he brought me.  
5 But thank you, Ira, because that was great.

6 Matt Rubin who we got off to a rocky  
7 start -- that's right. But Matt and I decided  
8 to work together, and I think we have done some  
9 good things. So, thank you, Matt.

10 In 1987 when I joined the Zoning  
11 Committee in April, which is next month, that  
12 would be 32 years. I met Joe Maculiak. And Joe  
13 has been a dedicated, dependable, wonderful  
14 person, great friend. Over all these years, we  
15 still serve 32 years later. And I say this,  
16 Joe, with respect. Usually after a zoning  
17 meeting, attorneys will call me and say, thanks  
18 Larry. And by the way, who is that tall, skinny  
19 guy with the beard and glasses. He's kind of  
20 annoying.

21 (Laughter.)

22 MR. FREEDMAN: And then I would say,  
23 yeah, that may be, but he's our annoying. He's  
24 "my" annoying, and that's what we love about  
25 Joe. And thank you, Joe, for being annoying.

1 (Thank you.)

2 MR. FREEDMAN: So with that, my goodness  
3 gracious, I dedicate this to Natalie my wife,  
4 partner. Well, we became --

5 (Applause.)

6 MR. FREEDMAN: Thank you.

7 And the reason for that is, I have to  
8 say for, I don't know, 20 years, the immortal  
9 words I would hear two or three times a day as I  
10 was leaving to do something, Natalie would  
11 either open up the window or shout somewhere,  
12 "where you going now"? And I said, "I got to do  
13 this thing.

14 So, thank you, Natalie. I am going to  
15 give this to her right now. Get it over with.  
16 That's good. And I just want to say thank you  
17 everybody here. And I am glad you are up here,  
18 because I was going to invite you up so we can  
19 take a picture together.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

21 Council will be at ease.

22 (Council at ease.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Okay. Going  
24 to, hopefully, get through our regular session  
25 of Council. Okay. Thank you and

1 congratulations to all of our honorees today.

2 Our next order of business is  
3 Communications. And the Chair requests that the  
4 Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the messages from the  
5 Mayor to the Chief Clerk.

6 Mr. Decker, do you have it?

7 Will you, please, read those messages.

8 CHIEF CLERK: To the President and  
9 Members of the Council of the City of  
10 Philadelphia. I am pleased to advise you that  
11 on March 13, 2019, I signed the following bill  
12 which was passed by Council at its session of  
13 March 7, 2019, Bill No. 190006.

14 And I am submitting herewith for the  
15 consideration of your honorable body, a  
16 resolution approving the redevelopment contract  
17 of the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for  
18 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a portion  
19 of the Pennsport urban renewal area identified  
20 by the house number and street address as 1218  
21 South Second Street.

22 And a resolution approving the  
23 redevelopment contract of the Philadelphia  
24 Redevelopment Authority for the redevelopment  
25 and urban renewal of a portion of the model



1 cities urban renewal area identified by house  
2 number and street address as 2337 through 2345  
3 West Berk Street.

4 And a resolution confirming Council's  
5 agreement with a proposed budget for  
6 expenditures from the non-recording fees subfund  
7 of the Housing Trust Fund relating to affordable  
8 housing.

9 And an ordinance adding a new chapter  
10 12-3400 of The Philadelphia code, entitled "Use  
11 of an Automated Speed Enforcement System to  
12 Improve Safety on Roosevelt Boulevard," to  
13 provide for the use of automated cameras to  
14 determine speeding violations on Roosevelt  
15 Boulevard and to establish a system of  
16 enforcement and administration, all under  
17 certain terms and conditions.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

19 Mr. Decker, do you have any additional  
20 communications?

21 CHIEF CLERK: I have none,  
22 Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you  
24 very much. And our next order of business is  
25 Introduction of Bills and Resolutions.

1           And the Chair recognizes, Councilwoman  
2 Reynolds Brown.

3           COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Good  
4 morning. Good morning, Mr. President.

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

6           COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: I have two  
7 resolutions.

8           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
9 Councilwoman.

10          CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution  
11 recognizing JP Morgan Chase and company for its  
12 decision to divest from the private prison  
13 industry.

14          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Today's  
15 Calendar.

16          CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
17 resolution urging the United States Congress to  
18 reject President Trump's proposed budget cuts to  
19 the United States Department of Education.

20          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
21 be on next week's Calendar.

22          Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

23          COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,  
24 Mr. President.

25          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Welcome.

1           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Today I have  
2 one bill.

3           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
4 Councilwoman.

5           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you.

6           CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance to amend the  
7 Philadelphia Zoning Maps by changing the  
8 designation of certain areas of land located  
9 within an area bounded by 32nd Street, Market  
10 Street, 31st Street extended, Chestnut Street,  
11 30th Street and Arch Street extended, excluding  
12 all portions of the railyard currently owned by  
13 Amtrak.

14           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Referred to  
15 committee.

16           Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

17           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,  
18 Mr. President.

19           Today I offer one bill and, on your  
20 behalf, one resolution.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
22 Councilman.

23           CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance amending  
24 Title 10 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
25 "Finances, Taxes and Collections," to impose

1 liability and provide for the revocation of  
2 licenses for certain persons who permit human  
3 trafficking and voluntary servitude and related  
4 unlawful activity to occur on a property or in  
5 connection with a business.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to  
7 committee.

8 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
9 resolution approving the redevelopment contract  
10 of The Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for  
11 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a portion  
12 of the model City's urban renewal area  
13 identified by house number and street address as  
14 2337 through 2345 West Berk Street.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's  
16 Calendar.

17 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
19 Mr. President. I have no bills or resolutions  
20 today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
22 Councilman.

23 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.  
24 Council you have anything --

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council President,

1 I have three resolutions and one on your behalf.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Councilman,  
3 you have anything on behalf of Councilman Jones?

4 I see he had listed that he had one resolution.

5 You have it, Councilwoman? Okay. Thank  
6 you.

7 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution  
8 authorizing the Committees on Legislative  
9 Oversight and Children in Youth to hold hearings  
10 to examine issues relating to missing and  
11 exploited children and youth in Philadelphia.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Today's  
13 Calendar.

14 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
15 resolution honoring and recognizing and  
16 congratulating Robert "Meek Mill" Williams for  
17 his philanthropic and criminal justice reform  
18 endeavors, and naming March 15 through March 17,  
19 2019 "Meek Mill Weekend" in the City of  
20 Philadelphia.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Today's  
22 Calendar.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
24 resolution also naming Federal Street between  
25 19th Street and 20th Street, Arizona C. Stemmons

1 Way.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's  
3 Calendar.

4 And the Chair recognizes Councilman --  
5 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes. Council  
7 President, I just want to acknowledge the  
8 cosponsorship of the street renaming of the 1900  
9 block of Federal Street is also in partnership  
10 and on behalf of Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds  
11 Brown.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
13 Councilwoman. The record shall reflect that.

14 Chair recognizes Councilwoman  
15 Quinones-Sanchez.

16 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank  
17 you, Council President.

18 I have one bill and three resolutions.  
19 And I want to thank the women of Council for  
20 joining me this morning as we continue a  
21 conversation about domestic workers in the City  
22 of Philadelphia. I want to particularly thank  
23 Councilwoman Parker for agreeing to host this in  
24 Labor and Industry on this Women's Month  
25 celebration.

1           We want to acknowledge the 16,000  
2 domestic workers who every day take care of our  
3 children and our elderly in the City of  
4 Philadelphia.

5           Thank you.

6           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
7 Councilwoman.

8           (Applause.)

9           CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance amending  
10 Title 19 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
11 "Finance, taxes and collection," and Chapter  
12 19-4100 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
13 "Sugar-Sweetened Beverage Tax by --

14           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to --  
15 sorry.

16           CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
17 resolution authorizing the Committee on Labor  
18 and Civil Service to hold hearings to examine  
19 labor standards to domestic workers throughout  
20 the City of Philadelphia.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Today's  
22 Calendar.

23           CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
24 resolution authorizing City Council to hire and  
25 retain an independent third party to conduct

1 research and produce a study on the fiscal and  
2 economic impact on certain taxes and fees, and  
3 authorizing the Committed on Appropriations to  
4 conduct hearings to consider such study.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
6 be on next week's Calendar.

7 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
8 resolution confirming Council's agreement for a  
9 proposed budget for expenditures from the  
10 non-recording fees subfund of the Housing Trust  
11 Fund relating to affordable housing.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
13 also be on next week's Calendar.

14 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

15 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council  
16 President. I have no bills or resolutions  
17 today.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
19 Councilman.

20 Chair recognizes Councilman Parker.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: What a wonderful  
22 day, Mr. President.

23 Mr. President, I have one bill that is  
24 cosponsored by yourself along with  
25 Councilmembers Bass and Sanchez, and one



1 resolution that is also cosponsored by Members  
2 Greenlee, Taubenberger, Reynolds Brown, Squilla,  
3 Jones and Johnson.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
5 Councilwoman.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And ordinance adding a new  
7 Chapter 12-3400 of The Philadelphia Code,  
8 entitled "Use of An Automated Speed Enforcement  
9 System to Improve Safety on Roosevelt  
10 Boulevard," to provide for the use of automated  
11 cameras to determine speeding violations on  
12 Roosevelt Boulevard and to establish a system of  
13 enforcement and administration.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to  
15 committee.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
17 resolution authorizing City Council's Committee  
18 on Labor and Civil Service to hold hearings  
19 regarding parking -- parking workers deserving a  
20 living wage.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
22 be on this week's Calendar.

23 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning, Council  
25 President. No bills or resolutions today.

1 Thank you.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
3 Councilwoman.

4 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

5 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Good morning, Council  
6 President. I have one privileged resolution and  
7 one non-privileged resolution.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
9 Councilwoman.

10 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution  
11 declaring the week of March 17 to March 23, 2019  
12 as National Safe Place Week in the City of  
13 Philadelphia.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's  
15 Calendar.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
17 resolution urging Governor Wolf to make  
18 appointments to the Pennsylvania Charter Appeal  
19 Board and calling for a moratorium on its  
20 proceeding until all the board members are duly  
21 appointed and confirmed by the Pennsylvania  
22 Senate to serve in a four-year, unexpired terms.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
24 be on next week's Calendar.

25 Chair recognizes Councilman

1 Taubenberger.

2 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Good  
3 afternoon, Council President and colleagues.

4 I have no bills nor resolutions today.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
6 Councilman.

7 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
9 Mr. President. I have no bills or resolutions.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
11 Councilman.

12 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

13 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
14 Mr. President.

15 I offer one bill on your behalf, and one  
16 non-privileged resolution.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
18 Councilman.

19 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance amending  
20 Section 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code,  
21 entitled "Bicycle Lanes," by authorizing the  
22 Department of Streets as designated bicycle lane  
23 and to remove a travel lane on Market Street and  
24 John F. Kennedy Boulevard all between North 15th  
25 Street and North 20th Street.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
2 be referred to committee.

3 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged  
4 resolution approving the redevelopment contract  
5 of the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for  
6 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a portion  
7 of the Pennsport renewal area identified by  
8 house number and street address as 1218 South  
9 2nd Street.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's  
11 Calendar.

12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
14 Mr. President.

15 I offer one privileged resolution on  
16 behalf of Councilmember Jones and one bill. And  
17 I'd like to be heard after the title.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
19 Councilwoman.

20 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance amending  
21 Chapter 19-500 of The Philadelphia Code,  
22 entitled "Taxes and Rents General," by providing  
23 for a temporary tax amnesty program under which  
24 delinquent taxpayers may satisfy their past due  
25 tax obligations with a forgiveness of all or a

1 portion of accrued interest and penalties.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
3 recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
5 Mr. President.

6 I am honored to offer this bill today to  
7 provide much needed relief to those that owe  
8 taxes to the City of Philadelphia, even though  
9 it's less relief that those with ten-year tax  
10 abatements enjoy. And I do want to point out  
11 that amnesty would be offered to people who have  
12 an inability but a willingness to pay back  
13 taxes, versus abatements which allow people to  
14 walk away legally from a tax obligation for ten  
15 year.

16 This bill will be provide substantial  
17 relief and allow an opportunity for folks to get  
18 their fiscal affairs in order. And by doing so,  
19 it allows them to also get other fiscal matters  
20 in order in their lives.

21 I want to thank our cosponsors  
22 Councilmembers Oh, Johnson, Sanchez,  
23 Taubenberger, Reynolds Brown, Blackwell, Jones  
24 and Green.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

1           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
2 Councilwoman.

3           (Applause.)

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that bill  
5 will be referred to committee.

6           CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
7 resolution recognizing and honoring Ron Wilch  
8 who has risen to become one of the biggest  
9 forces in the Philadelphia fashion industry.

10          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will  
11 be on this week's Calendar.

12          Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

13          COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much,  
14 Council President. I offer no bills or  
15 resolutions today.

16          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
17 Councilman. That concludes our Introduction of  
18 Bills and Resolutions.

19          And our next order of business is  
20 Reports from Committee.

21          And the Chair recognizes Councilman  
22 Henon for a report from the Committee on Public  
23 Property and Public Works.

24          COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
25 Mr. President.

1           The Committee of Public Property and  
2 Public Works reports two bills with a favorable  
3 recommendation.

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
5           Mr. Decker, please read the report.

6           CHIEF CLERK: To the President and  
7 Members of this Council to the City of  
8 Philadelphia, the Committee on Public Property  
9 and Public Works to which is referred Bill No.  
10 190062, entitled "An Ordinance authorizing the  
11 Commissioner of Public Property, to acquire fee  
12 simple title or a lesser real estate interest to  
13 all or a portion of a parcel or parcels of land,  
14 together with the improvements thereon, in and  
15 about the area bounded by Trenton Avenue, East  
16 Auburn Street, Tulip Street and East Rush  
17 Street;" and

18           Bill No. 190099, entitled "An Ordinance  
19 amending Chapter 16-300 of The Philadelphia  
20 Code, entitled 'Maintenance and Supervision,' by  
21 adding a new section requiring that all City  
22 buildings and facilities install and maintain  
23 life sustaining medical equipment including  
24 Automated External Defibrillators and advanced  
25 first aid kits; and requiring the installation

1 of Automated External Defibrillators in  
2 connection with capital projects."

3 Respectfully, reports it has considered  
4 the same and returns the attached bills to  
5 Council with a favorable recommendation.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
7 The Chair again recognizes Councilman Henon.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
9 Mr. President. I move that the Rules of Council  
10 be suspended as to permit the first reading of  
11 this day Bill Nos. 190026 and 190099.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
14 It has been moved and properly seconded that the  
15 Rules of Council be suspended so as to permit  
16 first reading this day of Bill Nos. 190062,  
17 190099.

18 All those in favor say aye.

19 (Ayes.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
21 opposed?

22 (No opposition.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.  
24 The bills will be placed on our First Reading  
25 Calendar at our next session of Council.



1           That concludes our reports from  
2 committee. And our next order of business is  
3 the consideration of the Calendar. I note that  
4 the bills just reported from the committee with  
5 the suspension of the rules have been deemed to  
6 have had their first reading. They will be on  
7 our Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar at  
8 our next session of Council.

9           As there are no additional bills on the  
10 First Reading Calendar, the Chair recognizes  
11 Councilman Henon for the purpose of calling up  
12 resolutions and bills on the Second Reading and  
13 Final Passage Calendar.

14           COUNCILMAN HENON: Mr. President, the  
15 following resolutions and bills are being called  
16 up for Second Reading and Final Passage  
17 Calendars today. They are numbers 190163,  
18 180830, 190115, 180818 and 190102.

19           All other resolutions and bills are  
20 being held.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
22 Councilman. Before considering these bills and  
23 resolutions, Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

24           COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
25 Mr. President. And thank you for special

1 consideration. I know we started off with some  
2 pretty star struck presence here today in our  
3 presentations, which I think is incredible for  
4 the City of Philadelphia. But there are a lot  
5 of other people who also consider Philadelphia  
6 pretty special and have traveled great  
7 distances, especially during the time to  
8 celebrate and take pride in the Irish Heritage  
9 as we approach celebrating St. Patrick's Day on  
10 Sunday. And just coming off of an incredible  
11 parade where there is 20,000 people plus who  
12 participated to showcase their heritage and  
13 their proudness of family and faith and religion  
14 along Market Street and our great City here.

15 So, it is my privilege and honor as we  
16 have foreign dignitaries, people of other  
17 countries that come here and show their presence  
18 and respect and communicate with us, the economy  
19 and other kinds of humanity awards and rights  
20 that they want to share with us. And it is my  
21 privilege to present to you and recognize a  
22 member of Parliament Pearse Doherty.

23 Pearse Doherty has been here for the  
24 past several days. He marched in the parade.  
25 He has been visiting local AOHs and giving the

1 status and update on the Brexit situation over  
2 in Ireland, and the status of the economy, the  
3 potential impact it will have on the farmers not  
4 just in their field, in their economy, their  
5 trade, the visitors and the human rights that  
6 they live every day and the national agreements  
7 that they have signed in their peace treaties  
8 that are at stake.

9 So, it is my pleasure to present to you  
10 and recognize and thank Pearse Doherty, member  
11 of the Irish Parliament. Pearse Doherty, thank  
12 you for your visit here in the City of  
13 Philadelphia.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
16 Thank you for being here today. We appreciate  
17 it.

18 So before considering these bills and  
19 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar today,  
20 we will have our Public Comment session. If you  
21 have an interest in testifying on a bill or  
22 resolution that is on a Final Passage Calendar  
23 today, if you have not already done so, you may  
24 sign up to the table on the left.

25 When your name is called, you will go to

1 the middle of the Council chambers. There is a  
2 podium. There is a device on that podium. When  
3 the light turns green, will be your time to  
4 speak. When the light turns yellow, you will  
5 have 30 seconds to conclude your remarks. When  
6 the light turns red, we would ask you, please,  
7 adhere to our guidelines and conclude your  
8 remarks.

9 You will have three minutes to speak.

10 We want to thank you very much for your  
11 anticipated cooperation.

12 Mr. Decker, please, call the first name  
13 on the list.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval, commenting  
15 on 181063.

16 (Approaches podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Morning --  
18 I'm sorry, good afternoon.

19 MS. RAVAL: Hi. My name is Meena Raval.  
20 I'm a Philly resident. No one has paid me to be  
21 here this morning. I am here to talk about Bill  
22 No. 181063, otherwise known as PGW's public  
23 private partnership to develop and operate an  
24 L&G facility.

25 I think the public and public private

1 partnership refers to people like me that people  
2 like you should be representing. People like me  
3 think this project should not be approved. Some  
4 of your offices were visited by people like me  
5 yesterday.

6 We have heard that our own utility who  
7 wants this project so very much, has accused us,  
8 of people like me, spreading misinformation  
9 about this project. I would like to remind  
10 Council that the public advocate hired by the  
11 Philadelphia Gas Commission to represent  
12 interests of all rate payers also has raised  
13 concerns about this project, concerns which have  
14 been ignored. Concerns about making this  
15 decision based solely on a term sheet without  
16 looking at contracts. Concerns about the City  
17 being left with the risk.

18 The Minister opening today's session  
19 said "teach me to listen." Holding this  
20 thought, I would like to refer you all to  
21 tomorrow's global school strike for climate at  
22 over 1100 locations globally in over 90  
23 countries.

24 (Applause.)

25 MS. RAVAL: Thank you. Yes, we have a

1 school strike for climate in Philly, too. The  
2 striking youth have a list of demands so that  
3 they have a future on a liveable planet. One of  
4 their demands is to halt all fossil fuel  
5 development. This L&G Project is one such  
6 project.

7 Another demand is that every government  
8 decision at every level is a science-based  
9 decision, not just about money or a few jobs  
10 made today. Leading the Philadelphia strikes  
11 are three high school sophomores. This is what  
12 Sweet 16 looks like as these young become aware  
13 of their own sexuality, of their ability to  
14 reproduce. They are standing up for all of  
15 creation.

16 Okaying this project is a decision that  
17 affects all our residents inversely, meaning, in  
18 a bad way. I trust Council will consider my  
19 voice and the voices of the youth tomorrow in  
20 their deliberations.

21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for  
24 your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Mitch Chanin? Mitch

1 Chanin?

2 (No approach.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Robinson.

4 (Approaches podium.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on 181063.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
7 afternoon.

8 MS. ROBINSON: Good morning -- oh,  
9 afternoon. My name is Lynn Robinson. I'm a  
10 union member, voter, teacher, PGW customer,  
11 creative sole who is not sometimes diplomatic  
12 enough but actually means well, director of  
13 Neighbors Against the Gas Plants and member of  
14 the new Pass On Gas Philly Alliance or POGPA.  
15 Thank you for your kind attention to my message  
16 today.

17 Here is the rub. Let's reduce PGW's  
18 current debt down to a rounded-off figure of  
19 \$1 billion. An L&G plant, even if it brings in  
20 the unlikely projected maximum of 4 million a  
21 year will pay off PGW's debt in 250 years. If  
22 the revenue is closer to the guaranteed amount  
23 of \$1.3 million a year, it will take 769 years.  
24 The price of delaying a just transition to  
25 renewable energy is just not worth it.

1           Let's be clear about Bill 180 -- I'm  
2 sorry, 181063. A new L&G at Passyunk would  
3 guarantee more outdoor air pollution and disease  
4 for those living near the refinery. A new L&G  
5 would encourage an influx of more methane  
6 burning electrical generation plants. Like  
7 SEPTA's in Nicetown within City limits and  
8 result in a delay on renewable alternatives. An  
9 increase of onsite electrical generation using  
10 methane would mean more asthma, cancer, brain  
11 damage especially in children and elders, less  
12 productivity, lower academic achievement levels  
13 and continuance of Philadelphia's non-attainment  
14 status for ozone.

15           Selling gas to other locations  
16 encourages the same mess for them and will push  
17 the planet's warming trend. Too many of  
18 Philadelphia's incumbents have come under the  
19 influence of Marcellus Shale and conveniently  
20 remain blind to climate science. Natural gas  
21 with its unavoidable methane leaks is no better  
22 for the climate than coal or any other fossil  
23 fuel.

24           Open your eyes. According to the EPA,  
25 methane leaking into the air has 84 to 87 times



1 the potency of carbon dioxide in the air for the  
2 first 20 years. PGW must redefine its mission  
3 now. And I challenge Councilmember Green to  
4 step up to the plate and champion that cause.

5           There is no amendment to 181063 that can  
6 justify adding additional methane gas  
7 infrastructure to this City. That thought is  
8 blind to science. It needs a no vote based on  
9 the facts. What the City needs now is a  
10 Philadelphia style, green new deal so that we  
11 joint the worldwide effort to address the  
12 climate crisis by 2030.

13           A Philadelphia green new deal would  
14 provide plenty of living wage and union jobs to  
15 City residents. The people's question is, will  
16 Philadelphia City Council and Mayor continue to  
17 been Trump's left hand, or will you allow the  
18 necessary shift away from fossil fuels.

19           I also have a comment on 180729, which  
20 is a resolution for a new -- may I make a very  
21 one paragraph comment on this resolution for a  
22 new breed of law enforcement officers to direct  
23 City traffic? It's a charter change.

24           I just have a couple of questions.

25           What --

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Your time is  
2 up.

3 MS. ROBINSON: Oh, we're nodding. I  
4 thought that was the yes.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm saying,  
6 I'm nodding that your -- it's red.

7 MS. ROBINSON: Okay. Thank you very  
8 much.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You can  
10 leave -- ma'am, you can leave your testimony.  
11 It will be read into the record.

12 Thank you.

13 CHIEF CLERK: That --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh, I'm  
15 sorry. Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
17 Mr. President. Due to Council business up in  
18 the district, I would like to be recorded on the  
19 record voting aye on all bills and resolutions  
20 with the exception of voting no for Bill No.  
21 180830.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
24 Councilman. Let the record reflect, Councilman  
25 shall be excused.

1 CHIEF CLERK: Diane Monroe.

2 (Approaches podium.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on 190163 and  
4 180818.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
6 afternoon.

7 MS. MONROE: Good afternoon.

8 Thank you for allowing me to take  
9 several minutes of your precious time. I  
10 support Bill 180 -- I'm sorry. Diane Monroe,  
11 1117 Mount Vernon Street.

12 I support Bill 180830 for amending the  
13 Philadelphia House Home Room Charter to hire new  
14 class of employees as public safety and  
15 enforcement officers. And that one of the  
16 duties will be to patrol playgrounds. I am also  
17 advocating that there is a great need to patrol  
18 the playground located between 10th and Lemon  
19 Street and the 1000 block of Mount Vernon  
20 Street, which is in great need of rebuild and  
21 repairs.

22 This playground has been on the  
23 forgotten list too long, and need to be placed  
24 on the City's Recreation Department rebuild  
25 list. This playground only has two swings, no

1 sliding board or monkey bars. This playground  
2 has been in poor condition for decades. And the  
3 children as well as families do not feel safe to  
4 sit or to play there. The neighbors have  
5 created a committee to fix this playground up  
6 and to bring it to where it once was years ago.  
7 A place for families and children to be able to  
8 play, sit and enjoy associating with one  
9 another.

10 Patrolling the playground would be a  
11 great deterrent for people using it as a hangout  
12 for drug usage. Patrolling the playground would  
13 bring a feeling of safety to the community.

14 I also support Bill 190163. I also  
15 advocate that such properties be used to build  
16 affordable and workforce housing. Also,  
17 advocate that seniors should be -- all seniors  
18 should be qualified for the senior tax free  
19 program. You have seniors who make one penny  
20 too much to qualify, even though you have  
21 Homestead and LOOP. It's still not enough for  
22 the seniors caught in the middle.

23 Thank you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for  
25 your testimony.

1 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Imam Suetwedien Muhammad.

3 (Approaches podium.).

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
5 afternoon.

6 MR. MUHAMMAD: Good afternoon, Council.  
7 It's okay. It don't matter how you say it.

8 Good afternoon to all the  
9 Councilmembers. First of all, I would like to  
10 than Councilwoman Bass and those people who  
11 co-sponsored the tax amnesty bill and dealing  
12 with taxes. One of the things is that  
13 Philadelphia has been named the poorest, biggest  
14 City in the country.

15 I'm sorry. I'm Imam --

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Imam, do me a  
17 favor. Because you signed up to talk about a  
18 land bank, can you just start out saying you're  
19 here to talk about --

20 MR. MUHAMMAD: Land bank?

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That's what  
22 you signed up for because that bill is not on  
23 the Final Passage.

24 MR. MUHAMMAD: Okay. They signed me up  
25 under the wrong thing, but I will talk about the

1 land bank if you want me to.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yeah. Just  
3 to start out. Just humor me.

4 MR. MUHAMMAD: My name is Imam  
5 Suetwedien Muhammad, resident Imam of National  
6 Muhammad of Philadelphia for 30 years, and also  
7 the General President of the Muslim League of  
8 Voters for the Delaware Valley.

9 So, you want to talk about land bank.  
10 Land bank, that is good. I think right in line  
11 with that. I also want to mention that  
12 Philadelphia's been named the poorest, biggest  
13 city in the country. It also had 45 percent of  
14 its residents living under the poverty level,  
15 okay, with a \$313 million surplus. Twenty-six  
16 cranes is in the -- is operating in the City  
17 right now as we speak building skyscrapers.

18 And we just ask the question, with  
19 \$313 million surplus, why is 45 percent of the  
20 people living below the poverty level. Sheriff  
21 sales, \$168 million a year in sheriff sales.  
22 They taking homes in record numbers that great  
23 grandmom paid for, for 45 years. 30-year  
24 mortgage, a 15-year refinance. And then they  
25 come and take the home for \$5,000.

1 Unacceptable.

2           So, we here really this morning, again,  
3 we just like to thank Council and those who have  
4 enough gumption to even deal with the poverty.  
5 And eat -- the poverty is so big in each and  
6 every district in this City: 41 percent,  
7 36 percent. We got -- we have to change that.  
8 It's not fair. So, we come down here this  
9 morning to support the bills that have been  
10 putting out on behalf of that. And we just want  
11 to say really that it's time for us to change  
12 the City.

13           A great leader once said that the eyes  
14 of America is on Philadelphia. Well, he said  
15 the eyes of the world is on Philadelphia. And  
16 he said when Philadelphia comes together, the  
17 world will come together. It's time for  
18 Philadelphia to come together, get its act  
19 together. The country started here in this  
20 great City. If we want to make this City great  
21 again, make it great for everyone.

22           That's what we should do. Make it great  
23 for everyone.

24           (Applause.)

25           MR. MUHAMMAD: Ten year tax abatement,

1 and all we asking for is a little breathing  
2 room. You got land bank, you got lots all over  
3 the City and so forth. But they taking homes in  
4 record numbers. And we just ask really, just  
5 for a little breathing, just for a little  
6 breathing space. And again, we just -- for  
7 Philadelphia to be the poorest, biggest city in  
8 the country, we need to do something about that.

9 We come down here this morning because  
10 we figure that you all are supposed to be the  
11 gatekeepers. You all supposed to be looking out  
12 for the people. You are supposed to be guarding  
13 the entrance of the people. And we really don't  
14 see that happening, you know, in this City for  
15 the common people. It's like we been forgot.

16 Homelessness at record numbers. Murders  
17 at record numbers. Four people are being  
18 murdered in this City every night. Four people  
19 being murdered in the city. Got the highest  
20 murder rate in the City in the last ten years.  
21 And all we hear is no suspects, no motive. No  
22 suspects, no motives.

23 So --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
25 Imam.



1 MR. MUHAMMAD: -- we want this to be  
2 changed. Last thing I want to say is, we not  
3 going anywhere. We going to be here until these  
4 bills get passed, until this stuff is  
5 straightened out. We going to be here until  
6 whatever time it take. That's how long we going  
7 to be here.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
9 Imam, for your testimony.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Dr. Cora Turpin.

12 (Approaches podium.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on 190163.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15 afternoon.

16 DR. TURPIN: Good afternoon. I am  
17 Dr. Cora Turpin. I am from Northern Liberties.  
18 I am here for about the sixth or seventh time  
19 regarding transfer of property and cost of  
20 taxes. I am going to be commenting on Bill No.  
21 190163.

22 This is the beginning when the  
23 properties are transferred for development to  
24 occur. We understand that. I am all in favor  
25 of improving the City. My problem is that once

1 the properties are transferred and development  
2 takes place, the actual value initiative goes up  
3 for every resident in that area. They don't  
4 have to improve their properties. They just  
5 have to live where these expensive buildings are  
6 being developed.

7 I am one of the concerned citizens of  
8 Philadelphia. I have been here several times  
9 requesting that somebody have a decent  
10 conversation about the devastating effect this  
11 AVI is having on the senior citizens. Why  
12 Council will allow taxpaying seniors to be  
13 foreclosed on and become the people who take  
14 taxes because they need to be cared for once the  
15 foreclosures happen. I don't know. I can't  
16 understand the reasoning for that.

17 You have taxpaying seniors. You need to  
18 put a freeze on that AVI for people 65 and older  
19 because their incomes do not increase after that  
20 time. You need to keep them paying taxes. You  
21 have allowed for abatements and all kinds of tax  
22 considerations for the very poor and for the  
23 very rich. It is the middle income people who  
24 are paying the taxes all their lives that are  
25 being adversely affected, also. And we need to

1 have whatever it takes to freeze those taxes on  
2 the AVI for people 65 and older regardless of  
3 income.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for  
7 your testimony.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Arnold Neubauer. Arnold  
9 Neubauer?

10 (Approaches podium.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on 180831 and  
12 190115.

13 MR. NEUBAUER: Yes. Good afternoon.

14 I spoke to somebody, a few people, some  
15 time ago. Arnold Neubauer. And I'm here today  
16 to discuss the idea of financial literacy. A  
17 lot of people these days do not know the meaning  
18 of financial literacy. They think that an I-R-A  
19 or an IRA and a mutual fund is something -- Ira,  
20 could be somebody that lived down the street.  
21 (Chuckles) I'm sorry.

22 Anyway, I am here to introduce myself as  
23 who we are, what we do and how we can benefit  
24 the entire financial committee. What we try to  
25 do is make individuals and families financial

1 literate. Most families who are not financial  
2 literate, they don't know a thing about IRAs,  
3 mutual funds. And we work in areas of finance.  
4 And ladies and gentlemen, I am here today and --  
5 to explain to you the ideas of mutual funds.  
6 And I have some things here to show you that --  
7 there are three sheets here.

8 My goodness. What we are, what we do  
9 and how it can benefit us. The rule of 72, what  
10 we do, our score. And what we try to do is show  
11 you how we can reduce people's bills, credit  
12 scores, insurances, savings, et cetera. And  
13 retire anywhere between 3, 4, 5 million dollars  
14 when they are young and go into early ages.

15 My credit score is roughly 797. And I  
16 have some things that I would like to pass out.  
17 And I'd also like to address some other  
18 people -- yes. My purpose for here to come  
19 today is to meet with some constituents and hope  
20 the neighbors reduce their bills. And when we  
21 do, we can pay the individuals that we work with  
22 anywhere between 2, 3, 400 dollars for two,  
23 three, four hours worth of work part time. This  
24 is what we pay.

25 So, we reduce people's bills. We

1 educate them financially, and we pay the person  
2 part time who already has a regular job making  
3 5/10 dollars an hour, 15 dollars an hour, 2/300  
4 dollars for two/three hours' worth of work.  
5 That's part time.

6 If he is with us --

7 (At this time, Councilman Greenlee  
8 sitting in as Chair.)

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Sir, your three  
10 minutes are up.

11 MR. NEUBAUER: Thirty seconds. Thirty  
12 seconds. If he is with us for about three  
13 years, his income goes to between  
14 150,000/200,000 dollars a year.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Sir, I have to  
16 call it. Because we are trying to be fair to  
17 everybody. We are giving everybody three  
18 minutes. Thank you.

19 If you have written testimony, you can  
20 give it in. We will make sure it gets on the  
21 record.

22 Mr. Decker, our next speaker, please.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Esposito.

24 (Approaches podium.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on 190102 and

1 190115.

2 MS. ESPOSITO: My name is Kate Esposito.  
3 I'm here as co-chair of Powers Economic Dignity  
4 Team in support of Resolution 190115.

5 We all know how poor Philadelphia is.  
6 We all know that too many people are working too  
7 hard yet still living in poverty, especially  
8 black and brown workers. And we all know that  
9 Harrisburg turns its back on this City as it  
10 tightens the grip of wage preemption. Anything  
11 less than \$15.00 as a minimum wage is  
12 unacceptable. Families would benefit  
13 tremendously in the City if we could raise that  
14 wage to \$15.00, increasing physical and mental  
15 health, educational outcomes while decreasing  
16 food insecurity and stabilizing family life.

17 Paying less than a living wage when  
18 corporations and their CEOs benefit from  
19 extravagant tax breaks is equivalent to wage  
20 theft. Philadelphia should have the right of  
21 self-determination in raising the wage to help  
22 lift this City out of poverty and create a more  
23 perfect City of Brotherly Love and Sisterly  
24 Affection.

25 I look forward to voting on this

1 resolution on May 21. And want to thank  
2 Councilmembers Parker, Reynolds Brown and  
3 Squilla for making this possible.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you.

6 Mr. Decker.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Danny Baudes commenting on  
8 190102 and 190115.

9 (Approaches podium.)

10 MR. BAUDER: Good afternoon. My name is  
11 Danny Bauder from the Germantown section of  
12 Philadelphia, which is the best neighborhood in  
13 Philly. Sorry. Here on the bill from  
14 Councilperson Parker.

15 I applaud the steps that City Council  
16 has taken so far for establishing a \$15 minimum  
17 wage for City workers and contractors. Now is  
18 the perfect time for us to come together as a  
19 City and show the legislature in Harrisburg that  
20 we have a united voice and that enough is  
21 enough, and that workers deserve a raise not  
22 just in the City of Philadelphia but across the  
23 Commonwealth.

24 For too long, workers here in  
25 Philadelphia and across Pennsylvania have been

1 held in poverty by our pathetic minimum wage.  
2 And I am here on behalf of, you know, the AFL  
3 CIO and our president Pat Eiding. But more so,  
4 on behalf of my 150,000 sisters and brothers in  
5 our labor movement together to stand up asking  
6 you to vote yes on this bill.

7 Thank you very much.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you.

9 Mr. Decker, our next speaker.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Mike Hardaway.

11 (Approaches podium.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on a resolution  
13 introduced by Councilwoman Parker today  
14 authorizing the Committee on Labor and Civil  
15 Service to hold hearings regarding parking  
16 workers deserving a living wage.

17 MR. HARDAWAY: Hello. My name is Mike  
18 Hardaway. I'm here to speak on the resolution  
19 Councilwoman Parker introduced regarding parking  
20 workers.

21 I live in West Philly. Until recently,  
22 I worked for the parking company Town Park. I  
23 worked long hours for low pay, but I came in  
24 every day and did my job. I started speaking up  
25 for better pay, better working conditions and



1 for a union because I want a better life. I  
2 want to be able to pay my bills and lead a  
3 dignified life. I wanted my employer to listen  
4 to our concerns and approve things for my  
5 coworkers and me.

6 But when Town Park saw that I spoke at a  
7 rally to raise the wage for parking workers,  
8 they fired me. I feel like I was targeted for  
9 speaking up, and I lost my job. I filed charges  
10 with the National Labor Relations Board.

11 I wish I -- I wish I could say I was  
12 surprised, but this is not the first time I  
13 experienced poor treatment and bad working  
14 conditions. Working in the garages is hard  
15 work. You're in the heat and in the cold. The  
16 fans and the circulating systems do not always  
17 work.

18 In fact, recently circulation was down  
19 and debris from the neighborhood construction  
20 site flew right into my left eye. The company  
21 responding by saying I was not eligible for  
22 workers comp.

23 Before I worked in the parking industry,  
24 I worked at Wal-Mart. I got a leg injury and  
25 experienced the same poor treatment. I thought

1 that the parking industry with all the money it  
2 brings in would be better than Wal-Mart, but it  
3 is not. The parking industry makes a lot of  
4 money and gets away with paying their workers  
5 very little and treating us poorly. I was  
6 making 11 an hour because I was a cashier, but  
7 many of my co-workers made 7.25 and some even  
8 less.

9 A lot of my coworkers are immigrants and  
10 are afraid to speak up. Many of my coworkers  
11 have families to support and are desperate to  
12 hold onto their job or they will literally be  
13 put out on the streets. This is especially  
14 wrong when you consider the parking industry in  
15 Philadelphia made \$453 million in revenue last  
16 year.

17 My coworkers and I want to make these  
18 good jobs. We don't want a hand out. We are  
19 fighting to lift ourselves out of poverty. I am  
20 asking Council to investigate the parking  
21 industry. Their profits should not depend on  
22 our poverty.

23 I want to thank Councilwoman Cherelle  
24 Parker for her leadership in standing with us.

25 Thank you.

1 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you, sir.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Mr. Decker.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel commenting on  
5 190163 and 190115, 180830 and 181163.

6 MR. DANIHEL: Okay. This is the  
7 official decree of the people and writ of  
8 mandamus pro rata; as such, requires immediate  
9 action remedy.

10 Last week, state representatives, the  
11 Boyds commissioner, District Attorney, Mayor,  
12 and numerous other officials were personally  
13 informed that every week Council, Mayor,  
14 Governor and others transfer private property of  
15 the government probably illegally. The Ides of  
16 March is remembered for the removal of the  
17 tyrants from government.

18 Council stated, all I had to do to get  
19 paid for my stolen home was to file for trial by  
20 jury. Trial by jury has been filed for eight  
21 times. Has trial by jury been imposed an  
22 unconstitutionally denied. By oath,  
23 constitutional law bound officials eight times.  
24 Clearly, this Rico-style conspiracy to deny  
25 rights requires the Attorney General prosecute.

1 U.S. Attorney General McSwain correctly  
2 identified failure to perform a known duty or  
3 task is illegal and causes great harm. Military  
4 people know this actions as treason. While the  
5 main causes of 1776 was the theft of private  
6 property by the government. The Attorney  
7 General cannot deny equal protection of the  
8 laws, 14th Amendment.

9           The Constitution requires immediate  
10 remedy of this breach of law, breach of  
11 fiduciary duty. Your oath of office requires  
12 you to act or face prison 42 USC 1982, 1983,  
13 1985, 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA  
14 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1 through 28;  
15 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709, 711, 712, 713,  
16 716, 902 and other laws listed in SCOTUS,  
17 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear violated.

18           I call on the Federal and Commonwealth  
19 governments to perform their Constitutional  
20 obligations to investigate and prosecute all  
21 involved in the theft and illegal deed transfer  
22 of my home 1038 West Wyoming Avenue, the denial  
23 of God-given 42 USC 1982 property right for 25  
24 years is egregious, extraordinary oath violating  
25 and requires immediate remedy.

1           A just government must obey the rule of  
2 law. This color of law government must have its  
3 Charter to govern revoked until a  
4 Constitutionally compliant government is  
5 installed. Public servants cannot use sworn  
6 duty to act any more than a fireman can refuse  
7 to fight a fire. The sovereign people require  
8 oath, Constitutional law be enforced and jail is  
9 require for all who violate oath, Constitution  
10 or law.

11           I remind Council, takes a lot of  
12 cooperation to create and allow all this  
13 corruption.

14           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
15 Thank you for your testimony.

16           CHIEF CLERK: There are no other  
17 speakers in the Public Comment list,  
18 Mr. President.

19           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you  
20 very much. We will now consider the Calendar  
21 for the day's bills and resolutions.

22           And, Mr. Decker, please read the title  
23 of 190163.

24           CHIEF CLERK: A Resolution authorizing  
25 the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority to

1 dispose of certain properties located in the  
2 Fifth Councilmanic District, which will be  
3 transferred by the City to the Authority, by  
4 conveyance of such properties to the  
5 Philadelphia Land Bank.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
7 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,  
9 Mr. President.

10 I move the adoption of the resolution.  
11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
13 moved and properly seconded.

14 All those in favor, say aye.  
15 (Ayes.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
17 opposed?

18 (No opposition.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.  
20 190163 has been adopted.  
21 Mr. Decker, 180830.

22 CHIEF CLERK: A Resolution proposing an  
23 amendment to the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter  
24 providing for the mandatory establishment and  
25 hiring of a new class of employees within the

1 civil service system to be designated as "Public  
2 Safety Enforcement Officers," setting forth the  
3 duties of such employees and providing for the  
4 submission of the amendment to the electors.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Where is --  
6 thank you. Want to make sure everybody is here.  
7 This is a -- sorry. Need my script.

8 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee for  
9 a motion on the resolution.

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,  
11 Mr. President. I move the adoption of the  
12 resolution.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
15 moved and seconded that the resolution be  
16 adopted because Resolution No. 180830 is an  
17 amendment to the Home Rule Charter, requires  
18 two-thirds vote. Therefore, the question is,  
19 shall the resolution be adopted.

20 Mr. Decker, please call the role.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Bass?

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Blackwell?

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Domb.

1 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Aye.  
2 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Green?  
3 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Aye.  
4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Greenlee?  
5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Aye.  
6 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym?  
7 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Aye.  
8 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Henon is voting  
9 nay.  
10 Councilman Johnson?  
11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.  
12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Councilman Jones is  
13 voting aye.  
14 Councilman O'Neill?  
15 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Nay.  
16 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh?

1 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Squilla?

5 CHIEF CLERK: Council President Clarke?

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

7 Ayes are 13. The nays are 4.

8 Two-thirds of all members of Council has voted  
9 in the affirmative.

10 Resolution No. 180830 has been adopted.

11 Thank you.

12 Mr. Decker, 190115.

13 CHIEF CLERK: A Resolution proposing an  
14 amendment to the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter  
15 calling on the General Assembly to provide for a  
16 decent living wage.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
18 recognizes Councilwoman Parker for a motion on  
19 this resolution.

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Move for the  
21 adoption, Mr. President.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
24 moved and properly seconded. Because this  
25 Resolution is -- 190115 is an amendment to the

1 Home Rule Charter, it requires two-thirds vote.  
2 Therefore, the question is, shall the resolution  
3 be adopted.

4 Mr. Decker, please call the role.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Bass?

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Blackwell?

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Domb?

17 Majority of members having voted in the

19 adopted. Thank you.

20 Mr. Decker, please read the title of

21 180818.

22 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance providing for

23 the submission to the qualified electors of the

24 City of Philadelphia, a proposal set forth in a

25 Resolution approved by Council proposing an

1 amendment to The Philadelphia Home Rule Charter  
2 relating to the mandatory establishment and  
3 hiring of a new class of employees within the  
4 civil service system to be designated as "Public  
5 Safety Enforcement Officers;" setting forth the  
6 duties of such employees; and authorizing the  
7 appropriate officers to publish notice and to  
8 make arrangements for the special election.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This bill  
10 having been read on two separate days, the  
11 question is, shall the bill pass finally?

1 Majority of members present voting in the

3 Mr. Decker, 190102.

4 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance providing for  
5 the submission to the qualified electors of The  
6 City of Philadelphia of an amendment to The  
7 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter calling on the  
8 General Assembly to provide for a decent, living  
9 wage as approved by Resolution of the City  
10 Council; fixing the date of a special election  
11 for such purpose; prescribing the form of ballot

7 aye.  
8 Councilman Johnson?  
9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.  
10 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones is voting  
11 aye.  
12 Councilman O'Neill?  
13 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Aye.  
14 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh?  
15 COUNCILMAN OH: Aye.  
16 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Parker?  
17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Aye.  
18 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
19 Quinones-Sanchez?  
20 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Aye.  
21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Reynolds  
22 Brown?  
23 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Aye.  
24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Squilla?  
25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Aye.

1 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Taubenberger?

2 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Aye.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Council President Clarke?

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

5 The ayes are 17, the nays are 0.

6 Majority of the members present voting in the  
7 affirmative. The bill passes.

8 Mr. Decker, do you have any additional  
9 resolutions?

10 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution recognizing  
11 JP Morgan Chase and Company for its decision to  
12 divest from the private prison industry  
13 introduced by Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
15 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

16 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank you,  
17 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

18 (Duly seconded.)

2 criminal justice reform endeavors; and naming  
3 March 15 through March 17, 2019 Meek Mill  
4 Weekend in the City of Philadelphia. Introduced  
5 by Councilman Johnson on behalf of Council  
6 President Clarke.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair again  
8 recollect recognizes Councilman Johnson.

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you, Council  
10 President. I move for the adoption of the  
11 resolution.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
14 moved and properly seconded.

15 All those in favor, say aye?

16 (Ayes.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
18 opposed?

19 (No opposition.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.  
21 The resolution is adopted.

22 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
23 authorizing the Committee on Labor and Civil  
24 Service to hold hearings to examine labor  
25 standards for domestic workers throughout the

1 City of Philadelphia. Introduced by  
2 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
4 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

5 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Once  
6 again, I thank the women of Council and the  
7 enlightened men. And I move for its adoption.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
10 moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor, say aye?

12 (Ayes.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
14 opposed?

15 (No opposition.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.  
17 The resolution is adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
19 authorizing City Council's Committee on Labor  
20 and Civil Service to hold hearings regarding  
21 parking workers deserving a living wage.  
22 Introduced by Councilwoman Parker.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
24 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,

1 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
4 moved and properly seconded.

5 All those in favor, say aye?

6 (Ayes.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
8 opposed?

9 (No opposition.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have  
11 it. The resolution is adopted.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution declaring  
13 the week of March 17, to March 23, 2019 as  
14 National Safe Place Week in the City of  
15 Philadelphia. Introduced by Councilwoman Gym.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
17 recognizes Councilman Gym.

18 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,  
19 Council President. I move for the adoption of  
20 the resolution.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
23 moved and properly seconded.

24 All those in favor, say aye?

25 (Ayes.)

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
2 opposed?

3 (No opposition.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have  
5 it. And the resolution is adopted.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
7 recognizing and honoring Ron Wilch, who has  
8 risen to become one of the biggest forces in  
9 Philadelphia fashion industry. Introduced by  
10 Councilwoman Bass on behalf of Councilman Jones.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair  
12 recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
14 Mr. President. On behalf of Councilmember  
15 Jones, I move for the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been  
18 moved and properly seconded.

19 All those in favor, say aye.

20 (Ayes.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those  
22 opposed?

23 (No opposition.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.  
25 The resolution is adopted.

1 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other  
2 resolutions on the Final Passage Calender,  
3 Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you  
5 very much, Mr. Decker.

6 Are there any speeches on behalf of the  
7 minority?

8 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much  
10 Council President.

11 I just wanted to let everybody know that  
12 Monday, March 18 is the kickoff of Marital Arts  
13 Week. And for the Councilmembers, I put a flyer  
14 on your desk. If you go to the second page,  
15 there are these colorful, free-standing punching  
16 bags. Uh, \$1,400 value, courtesy of Asian World  
17 Martial Arts. You can punch them, kick them and  
18 take them home because we will be giving away,  
19 you know, the four bags to some lucky person who  
20 is in attendance.

21 We will have demonstrations, matches and  
22 speakers. And Councilman Squilla wants to do a  
23 match? Okay. So they are -- they are going to  
24 be delivered. So everyone, two to twelve noon  
25 come to the courtyard. And if you can tune in

1 to PHL17, 5:45, 6:45 and 7:45 in the morning,  
2 they will be doing some interviews preceding  
3 Martial Arts Week kickoff.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,  
6 Councilman. Speeches on behalf of the Majority.

7 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker?

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,  
9 Mr. President.

10 Mr. President, as a matter of personal  
11 privilege, we had an administrative error that  
12 took place early on during our session.

13 Mr. Holsten is here for Power. He has sat  
14 patiently throughout and just asks, as a matter  
15 of personal privilege, Mr. President, is he  
16 would be allowed to make his comments because  
17 nothing is written for him to give to the  
18 stenographer to put in the record.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes. I just  
20 want to say for the record, he did, in fact,  
21 sign up. But for whatever reason, his name  
22 wasn't called, so we don't set a precedent.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, sir. He did  
24 sign up.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So, the error

1 was on our behalf. All right. Thank you.

2 Reverend.

3 REVEREND HOLSTON: Thank you.

4 Reverend Gregory Holston, the Executive  
5 Director for POWER and Senior Pastor of James  
6 Memorial United Methodist Church here in the  
7 City of Philadelphia. And thank you for making  
8 that correction. Appreciate the whole Council  
9 moving quickly to do that. And I pray that we  
10 do that for everyone if that situation happens  
11 again.

12 First, I wanted to be here for the bill  
13 referencing the -- that will be on the ballot  
14 that Councilwoman Parker has put forward, the  
15 resolution, the non-binding resolution regarding  
16 the minimum wage.

17 The need to raise the minimum wage in  
18 the City of the Philadelphia is dire. It is --  
19 we are in an emergency situation. And we have  
20 been in an emergency situation for fifty years.  
21 The poverty level in the City of Philadelphia is  
22 intolerable. The 26 percent of people that live  
23 below the poverty line, but more importantly,  
24 about 70 percent of Philadelphians either are in  
25 deep poverty, in poverty, near poverty or low



1 income. 70 percent of the City. That means  
2 that almost everything we do has to be directed  
3 to lifting people out of poverty. And every  
4 mission and every calls and every bill we do has  
5 to do something about ending the incredible  
6 amounts of poverty in this City.

7 Now, so as I stand looking forward to  
8 vote on that non-binding resolution to send the  
9 message to Harrisburg that we have to raise the  
10 minimum wage. But I also want to say that we  
11 cannot -- we cannot lift up wages. We cannot  
12 build new businesses. We cannot have new jobs  
13 at any cost.

14 So, I stand also here in opposition of  
15 the plant that's being proposed by Philadelphia  
16 gas works in the southwest section of  
17 Philadelphia. I oppose it because of the -- of  
18 the quality of life, the asthma, all of the  
19 other health issues that arise from these kinds  
20 of plants. I have lived in South Philadelphia.  
21 I lived near these plants. I have had my own  
22 daughter have asthma for the first 12 years of  
23 her life. And it took -- and it took us leaving  
24 and moving out of the city for her to be able to  
25 have a life so that she can be able to breathe

1 each and every day.

2 We are talking about toxic schools, but  
3 we have toxic communities. And we allow these  
4 toxic communities to continue to exist. I have  
5 buried too many people with special kinds of  
6 cancers. I have buried too many people who  
7 have -- friends of mine who have lived with  
8 these kinds of cancers. I have buried too many  
9 folk for health reasons in this City. It is not  
10 worth it to have that plant in South  
11 Philadelphia -- Southwest Philadelphia and  
12 poison those communities even more no matter how  
13 many jobs are involved, no matter how many  
14 pennies are on the dollars that come back to the  
15 City. It does not matter. The health of our  
16 children are more important than that plant.  
17 And I stand with those who stand against it, and  
18 we will continue to fight against that plant  
19 until all kinds of fossil fuel plants are no  
20 longer poisoning our children in this City of  
21 the Philadelphia.

22 End poverty, yes; but not at any cost.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

24 REVEREND HOLSTON: Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you

1 very much.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That  
4 concludes our speeches by members of Council and  
5 others.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilwoman  
7 Reynolds Brown for a motion to adjourn.

8 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank you,  
9 Mr. President. I move that Council stand  
10 adjourned until Thursday, March 21, 2019 at  
11 10:00 a.m.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
14 It's been moved and properly seconded that the  
15 Council stand adjourned until Thursday, March  
16 21, 2019 at 10:00 a.m.

17 All those in favor, say aye.

18 Say aye?

19 (Ayes.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.  
21 Those opposed?

22 (No opposition.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.  
24 Thank you all very much.
