2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning. We're going to get started.  
4 Thank you. If members will take their  
5 seats and if all visitors will retire  
6 behind the rail, I would appreciate it.  
7 Thank you.

8                   To give our invocation this  
9 morning, the Chair recognizes Rabbi Ari  
10 Lev Fornari of Kol Tzedek. She's here  
11 today as the guest of Councilwoman Gym.

12                   I would ask all members and  
13 guests to please rise.

14                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
15 visitors rise.)

16                   RABBI FORNARI: Last night and  
17 today Jews around the world, including  
18 right here throughout the City of  
19 Philadelphia, celebrate the holiday of  
20 Purim, and we read from the story of  
21 Esther, which takes place in ancient  
22 Persia, a story about power, subversion,  
23 and survival.

24                   Twice the story instructs us  
25 nahafochu, turn it upside down. The way

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2           things are, says the story of Esther, the  
3           injustice in the world is not inevitable,  
4           it is not necessary, and it is our  
5           responsibility to invert it.

6                        On Purim, as we walk the line  
7           between the absurd and the profound, we  
8           dress up in costumes and drink to excess  
9           to soften the judgments of ourselves and  
10          others. We celebrate those who leverage  
11          their power for good, those who organize  
12          the powerful into just action, and the  
13          importance of staying connected to  
14          pleasure and joy in a deeply broken  
15          society.

16                       Esther is the hero of the Purim  
17          story. The Jewish people are living in  
18          the sprawling Persian Empire and are  
19          saved from Haman's evil scheme to  
20          annihilate them.

21                       One of my teachers explains  
22          that the most important verse in the  
23          entire Megillah, in the entire story of  
24          Esther, a verse that represents the  
25          pivotal turning point in the Purim story

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2           comes near the end of Chapter 4 when  
3           Mordecai sends a message to now Queen  
4           Esther urging her to reveal her identity  
5           to King Ahasuerus and plead on behalf of  
6           the Jewish people. Remarkably,  
7           Mordecai's message to Esther hinges on  
8           two simple words, two words that promise  
9           nothing and change everything. Mi yodea,  
10          Mordecai says. Who knows? Who knows?  
11          Perhaps it was for such a time as this  
12          that you ascended to power.

13                 These are the words that set  
14          Esther in motion that inspire her to take  
15          action, in spite of her own resistance,  
16          in spite of her fears about her own fate,  
17          in spite of her doubts about her own  
18          position and power in the king's court.  
19          Who knows?

20                 In this remarkable exchange  
21          between Mordecai and Esther, something  
22          amazing happens. "Who knows" becomes not  
23          an excuse, but an invitation. Consider  
24          the possibilities, says Mordecai, that  
25          you are here for a purpose. Consider the

2           possibility that there is something  
3           bigger and more important than your fear.  
4           Consider the possibility that you have  
5           more power than you imagine.

6                        Consider the possibility that  
7           it is up to us to act out of love and  
8           responsibility for each other, to make  
9           sure that every community, that every  
10          resident of the City of Philadelphia has  
11          access to the basic building blocks of a  
12          dignified life, access to equitable  
13          funding for our schools, standing access  
14          to a world free from the expansion of  
15          fossil fuels, access to affordable  
16          housing and an end to the tax abatement.  
17          Who knows, if it wasn't for just a time  
18          as this, that you are sitting on City  
19          Council.

20                       This is the legacy of Mordecai  
21          and Esther, and they bequeath it to us, a  
22          legacy of humility and hope of radical  
23          uncertainty and radical responsibility.

24                       What are our obligations in  
25          this topsy-turvy world? To take care of

2           each other, to expand our circle of  
3           concern, to affirm the possibility of  
4           sweetness and generosity in the face of  
5           uncertainty, love, and fear.

6                       Who knows? Consider the  
7           possibility that this is why we are here,  
8           that in the face of a world of violence  
9           and uncertainty, we are commanded to be  
10          responsible for each other, to feed each  
11          other, to care for those in need, to  
12          increase peace and love and justice in  
13          our world.

14                      As Jews, we know what it feels  
15          like to be hunted and haunted by those  
16          who believe we are less than fully human.  
17          All of us as people of faith and  
18          conscience know that we live in an  
19          interconnected world and that injustice  
20          and violence anywhere tears at the fabric  
21          of God's creation.

22                      So may you who serve our city  
23          stay awake to the call to celebrate life  
24          and beauty, to uplift human dignity, and  
25          to use your power to turn things around.

2 And let us say, amen.

3 (Amen.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you so much, Rabbi, for those  
6 inspiring words.

7 Council will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much. And, again, Rabbi,  
11 thank you for those inspiring words. We  
12 really appreciate it.

13 Our next order of business is  
14 the approval of the Journal of the  
15 meeting of Thursday, March 14th, 2019,  
16 and the Chair recognizes Councilman  
17 Greenlee.

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
19 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
20 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March  
21 14th, 2019 be approved.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. It has been moved and  
25 properly seconded that the Journal of the

4                   All those in favor say aye.  
5                   (Aye.)

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
7           Those opposed?

8                   (No response.)

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
10           ayes have it, and the Journal is  
11           approved.

12                   And our next order of business  
13           is requests for leave of absence, and the  
14           Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

15                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
16           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
17           majority, there are no requests of leave  
18           of absence today.

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20           Chair thanks the gentleman.

21                   The Chair now recognizes  
22           Councilman O'Neill.

23                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
24           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
25           republicans, there are no requests for



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2           leave of absence.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4           Chair thanks the gentleman.

5                   At this time, I would like to  
6           dispense with the regular order of  
7           business and I would like to welcome  
8           everyone who has come down to witness our  
9           government in action today. We genuinely  
10          appreciate you being here. We hope your  
11          stay here today is a knowledgeable one  
12          but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,  
13          so much so that you come back again. So,  
14          again, thank you for being here.

15                   At this time, the Chair  
16          recognizes Councilman Domb, who will  
17          present a resolution honoring Vernon  
18          Odom. Would Mr. Odom and those  
19          accompanying him please join the  
20          Councilman at the podium.

21                   And the big news tonight is  
22          Vernon Odom.

23                   (Councilmembers and guests  
24          approached podium.)

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold

2           on.

3                       Folks, can we have a little  
4           quiet, please. Thank you.

5                       COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning,  
6           everyone. I came to Philadelphia in 1976  
7           right after school, and the first news  
8           show I watched was Action News. And back  
9           in the late '70s, going back in time,  
10          many of you don't remember that it was  
11          Jim Gardner, it was Jim O'Brien, may he  
12          rest in peace, Mark Howard, and Vernon  
13          Odom. And today we're honoring Vernon  
14          Odom as he retires from his position as  
15          an Action News Reporter for 6ABC after 42  
16          years.

17                      Whereas, Mr. Odom has been  
18          covering the Philadelphia news for over  
19          four decades and his reign on Action News  
20          has spanned the terms of seven mayors;  
21          and

22                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
23          arriving in Philadelphia in 1976,  
24          Mr. Odom has become a Philadelphia  
25          institution through his

2           to-the-point interview style and his  
3           empathetic, fair approach to reporting;  
4           and

5                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
6           educated at Morehouse College for his  
7           undergraduate degree and Columbia  
8           University for his post-graduate degree  
9           in broadcast journalism, Mr. Odom has  
10          spent the past fifty years as a reporter;  
11          and

12                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,  
13          born in Atlanta, Georgia and raised in  
14          Akron, Ohio, journalism runs in  
15          Mr. Odom's family. Vernon's  
16          great-grandfather launched the second  
17          African American run newspaper in the  
18          nation.

19                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And  
20          whereas, his sister, Maida Odom, was a  
21          long-time reporter for the Philadelphia  
22          Inquirer and now teaches journalism at  
23          Temple University. Mr. Odom's wife,  
24          Wanda Motley Odom, with whom he has two  
25          children, is also a former Inquirer

2           reporter; and

3                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,

4           Mr. Odom got his start as a reporter in

5           Georgia covering stories in the deep and

6           still partially segregated South. The

7           first news story that accelerated him to

8           national attention was his interview with

9           Coretta Scott King after Martin Luther

10          King's assassination. It was an event

11          that shook the nation and Mr. Odom had

12          the first and only interview for days;

13          and

14                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,

15          Mr. Odom covered momentous events both in

16          Philadelphia and around the world. In

17          Philadelphia, he covered many big stories

18          such as the accident at Three Mile

19          Island, the MOVE disaster, and Wilson

20          Goode's election as the City's Mayor and

21          the first African American politician to

22          hold that position.

23                   COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,

24          Mr. Odom has reported from hot spots like

25          post-Cold War Russia and Somalia where he

2 covered the humanitarian crisis. He  
3 covered the release of Nelson Mandela and  
4 South Africa's first free elections. Of  
5 his career as a reporter, Mr. Odom says,  
6 quote, "It's been a great ride and a  
7 ringside seat to the world," end quote.

8           COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And  
9 whereas, with his unshakeable  
10 understanding of politics, Mr. Odom has  
11 excelled in his career. His ability to  
12 ask direct, well-informed questions  
13 causes some politicians to squirm, but  
14 helps Mr. Odom get to the heart of the  
15 matter and tell the story; and

16           COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,  
17 Mr. Odom's peers describe him as a mentor  
18 for young reporters and his interviewees  
19 say that he is so likeable that even when  
20 he's reporting on a story that's  
21 unfavorable for them, they can't help but  
22 answer his questions; and

23           COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:  
24 Whereas, but before I enter that, I have  
25 a point of personal privilege and that I

2           must bring out to this body. I've known  
3           Vernon Odom longer than anyone else in  
4           this room for me personally. He covered  
5           a story when I was in arboriculture class  
6           and going to the tree-climbing class of  
7           Penn State University in Fairmount Park.  
8           That morning I had a full head of hair, a  
9           heck of a lot thinner, and I was 70 feet  
10          up in a sycamore looking at the  
11          Philadelphia Zoo, and who was there  
12          alongside with me in a tree covering this  
13          for Channel 6ABC is Reporter Vernon Odom.  
14          I'll never forget the day. It meant a  
15          lot to me. I know you've done thousands  
16          of stories, but it was pretty neat.

17                       Whereas, recently awarded  
18          "Person of the Year" by Broadcast  
19          Pioneers of Philadelphia, Mr. Odom  
20          represents the best of the best.  
21          Throughout Mr. Odom's career, the realm  
22          of newscasting has changed tremendously,  
23          but Mr. Odom has remained a steady, deep  
24          voice presence that viewers can trust to  
25          put the story first; and

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2                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
3           although Mr. Odom has retired, he has no  
4           plans of slowing down. Future plans  
5           include a potential book reflecting on  
6           his fifty years as a reporter and  
7           voiceover work that he's previously had  
8           to turn down. Mr. Odom loves the news  
9           and, therefore, will always be ready to  
10          provide commentary, analysis, or give  
11          lectures on the news; and

12                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Well, I  
13          don't have a sycamore story, but I do  
14          know that Vernon Odom has earned the  
15          admiration of our great City through his  
16          commitment to steadfast and honest  
17          reporting; now, therefore, be it

18                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Let me  
19          say that I'm honored. I'm sorry I didn't  
20          think of it myself, and that I remember  
21          when Vernon first came, Lucien and I were  
22          here together, and he came from the  
23          beginning, doing a fabulous job of being  
24          great to us and our city, and we're  
25          grateful to be part of this resolution.

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2                       Resolved, that the Council of  
3 the City of Philadelphia, hereby  
4 recognizes and honors Vernon Odom for his  
5 service to the Philadelphia community.

6                       (Standing ovation.)

7                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
8 the Chair recognizes Mr. Odom for  
9 remarks.

10                      MR. ODOM: Thank you. Thank  
11 you very much. Thank you,  
12 Councilmembers, for those kind words and  
13 remembrances.

14                      To Mr. Taubenberger, sometimes  
15 I wound up up a tree myself. That's why  
16 I didn't react that day.

17                      But I thank the Councilmembers.  
18 And, Council President Clarke, I don't  
19 mean not to recognize you, sir. I'm  
20 reminded of one of your predecessors  
21 today. I love this room. I spent many  
22 hours in this room covering all the  
23 intrigue and all of the fire and  
24 brimstone and hot air sometimes, but it's  
25 been a magnificent experience keeping my



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2           eye on things and staying long after to  
3           find out what really happened there, what  
4           really took place there and trying to get  
5           the background on the story. But it's  
6           always been a wonderful place of people  
7           who were champions of free speech.

8                         Ninety-eight percent of the  
9           time over the years -- and this goes back  
10          a long time ago -- folks in this room,  
11          the duly elected officials, have always  
12          been trying to do the right thing and be  
13          progressive out of love for their town.  
14          There have been some fallbacks and some  
15          missteps and things like that, but always  
16          this has been a positive place for free  
17          speech and people expressing their  
18          feelings and people loving this great  
19          city.

20                        I'm reminded today -- I see the  
21          vote was 17 to nothing. Joe Coleman, one  
22          of your venerable predecessors,  
23          Mr. Clarke, used to always say, Vernon, I  
24          can't do a damn thing unless I can get  
25          nine votes in there. I gotta have them.

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2           And I thank you, Darrell. I know you had  
3           to push through to get all 17 unanimous  
4           for me this time. When Allan Domb's  
5           office first called me, I said, well, I  
6           may be able to squeak through there 10-8  
7           or something, 10-7 or something like  
8           that. But I'm very honored. I'm very  
9           thrilled to be here.

10                   This city, as many people don't  
11           know, is not my hometown. I'm not from  
12           Philadelphia originally, but I came here  
13           43 years ago. And I'm especially  
14           sentimental with Mrs. Blackwell here  
15           today, because she and the late Lu  
16           Blackwell were very kind to me and told  
17           me a lot about what was going on in town  
18           and kept me posted. And there's so many  
19           people I'd like to thank today, but I'm  
20           deeply honored, and the City has been  
21           very good to me, as the great Latin ball  
22           player would say. It's provided me with  
23           a wonderful wife and a wonderful family,  
24           two children who are all born and raised  
25           in Philly, PA. And when I came here, I

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2           was nervous. I was coming from Atlanta,  
3           which was a much smaller southern town  
4           then, and I didn't know what was going to  
5           happen. I was very, very shy and bashful  
6           and sort of a country guy, who didn't  
7           know what was going to happen in this big  
8           city, and it's been a wonderful  
9           experience. And I'm not dying, folks.  
10          I'm going to get up and run around the  
11          room here. I'm in perfectly good health.

12                        And I thank the City and its  
13          wonderful people, who have always been  
14          very kind and accepting of me, and it's  
15          been a magnificent choice I made. I  
16          could have gone back to my hometown area  
17          of Cleveland, Ohio at that time, but  
18          Philly was the right place for me. I  
19          never figured out why, but the car headed  
20          up 95 and it got here before 95 was  
21          completed.

22                        I want to thank everybody for  
23          this wonderful city. And some of the  
24          people I've known here were --  
25          Councilwoman here just told me she was

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2           four years old when she first remembers  
3           me on television. Well, that's  
4           fantastic, because I watched most of the  
5           political careers here develop,  
6           Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown, a  
7           longtime friend of mine, and I'm very  
8           thrilled and happy, and I thank you for  
9           this award. It means a heck of a lot.

10                   (Applause.)

11                   MR. ODOM: It's overwhelming.  
12           And I won't bore you, but thank you for  
13           having me and I deeply appreciate it.  
14           Thank you so much for all the  
15           Councilmembers for recognizing my hard  
16           work and my dedicated work to this  
17           wonderful city. I have -- as I said,  
18           I've enjoyed it. And Denise James, my  
19           colleague out there, is waving to me, so  
20           that means it's time, with my wife not  
21           here, that means it's time for me to wrap  
22           it up and get off.

23                   So thank you, everybody. I  
24           appreciate it so much. You have no idea.

25                   (Applause.)

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2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3       Council will be at ease.

4                   MR. ODOM: One other thing I'd  
5       like to do, if I can, if I can get the  
6       mic back on. I didn't acknowledge two  
7       members of the management team at 6ABC  
8       where I've been working for so long doing  
9       what I did with whom I did. Tom Davis,  
10      the News Director and Vice President of  
11      Channel 6, and Rob Royal, who is one of  
12      the Executive Producers.

13                  Raise your hands, guys, and say  
14      hello so the crowd can see you.

15                  (Applause.)

16                  MR. ODOM: But I'd like to  
17      thank them for coming down today and  
18      taking time out of their busy schedule to  
19      be here to stand with me today. And I'm  
20      sorry I didn't mention them in my earlier  
21      remarks.

22                  Council President, I actually  
23      got you to turn the mic back on. I've  
24      seen you turn it off a few times.

25                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Only

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2           for you, Vernon.

3                       MR. ODOM: And already I'm  
4           hearing about all of the intrigue going  
5           on with the elections coming up and  
6           things like that, just like I used to do  
7           in the old days when I was covering City  
8           Council. Nothing has changed. The more  
9           things change, the more they stay the  
10          same. But it's been fascinating.

11                      Thank you so much.

12                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you.

14                      (Applause.)

15                      (Council at ease.)

16                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17          Thank you and, again, congratulations for  
18          your service to our city.

19                      At this time, the Chair  
20          recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
21          will present a resolution proclaiming  
22          March 2019 as Social Work Month. Would  
23          Liz Hersh and those accompanying her  
24          please join the Councilwoman at the  
25          podium.

2                   (Councilmembers and guests  
3 approached podium.)

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
5 joining the Councilwoman, we have  
6 Councilman Oh, Councilwoman Blondell  
7 Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman Parker,  
8 Councilman Henon.

9                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
10 Mr. President, we really should be  
11 calling this Liz Hersh and Homeless Week.  
12 But we are honored to have our wonderful  
13 friends and committed people to be here  
14 today to receive this resolution.

15                   Resolution hereby proclaiming  
16 March 19th as Social Work Month, and  
17 encouraging all Philadelphians to support  
18 the Social Work profession.

19                   COUNCILMAN OH:   Whereas, the  
20 primary mission of Social Work is to  
21 enhance human well-being and help meet  
22 the basic needs of all people, especially  
23 the most vulnerable; and

24                   Whereas, every day Social  
25 Workers address the emotional,

2           psychological, economic, and/or physical  
3           needs of millions of people; and

4                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:  Whereas,  
5           Social Workers help people function  
6           better in their environments, improve  
7           their relationship with others, and solve  
8           personal and family problems through a  
9           wide range of services; and

10                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:  Whereas,  
11           Social Workers are employed in many  
12           different organizations and industries,  
13           including private and public agencies,  
14           hospices and hospitals, schools and  
15           universities, businesses and foundations,  
16           military branches and veteran's centers,  
17           and others; and

18                      Whereas

19                      COUNCILMAN GREEN:  Whereas, the  
20           City of Philadelphia depends on Social  
21           Workers to accomplish many of their  
22           functions in serving its citizens.  The  
23           Office of Homeless Services especially  
24           relies on Social Workers to fulfill their  
25           important missions of making homelessness

2           rare, brief, and non-reoccurring in the  
3           City of Philadelphia. Just last year,  
4           the Office of Homeless Services assisted  
5           16,549 persons; and

6                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
7           Social Workers serve a key role in our  
8           society. It takes a special person to  
9           dedicate their lives to helping the most  
10          vulnerable among us. Social Workers must  
11          find compassion daily in order to assist  
12          people who are often facing extremely  
13          difficult life circumstances. We are  
14          grateful for the work Social Workers do  
15          for our city and we are in awe of their  
16          dedication to serving others.

17                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Now,  
18          therefore, be it resolved, that the  
19          Council of the City of Philadelphia,  
20          hereby proclaims March 2019 as Social  
21          Worker Month, and encourages all  
22          Philadelphians to support the Social  
23          Service Work program.

24                   Further be it resolved, that an  
25          engrossed copy of this resolution be

2           presented today to the Office of Homeless  
3           Services as a sincere expression of the  
4           City Council of the City of  
5           Philadelphia's gratitude, admiration, and  
6           recognition.

7                         Congratulations.

8                         (Applause.)

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
10           the Chair recognizes Ms. Hersh for  
11           remarks.

12                        MS. HERSH:   Thank you,  
13           Councilwoman Blackwell.   Thank you so  
14           much for all your support.   Thank you to  
15           all of you.

16                        This was not my idea.   This was  
17           Eric Williams' doing.   He took the  
18           leadership and he said we have to get  
19           recognized for the hard work that the  
20           social workers at the Office of Homeless  
21           Services and throughout the City do.

22                        Every day while we are warm and  
23           safe and well fed, there are thousands of  
24           people within this city who don't have  
25           enough to eat and who don't have a place

2           to go home to. We shelter them. We help  
3           them find a way forward towards work or  
4           some other kind of dignified way to make  
5           a living and, most importantly, to have a  
6           place to live so that they can have a  
7           better life for themselves. And this is  
8           the work that social workers do day in  
9           and day out.

10                        So I take my hat off to all the  
11           social workers at the Office of Homeless  
12           Services, the unsung heroes and heroins  
13           who help this city be a better place, who  
14           extend a helping hand day in and day out  
15           to those in need, who maintain hope, who  
16           are a guiding light, and who live out  
17           that resolve that we can have a better  
18           life for everybody here in Philadelphia.

19 The Commonwealth of

20 Pennsylvania passed Act 484 known as the

21 Community College Act of 1963. It

22 mandated equal funding from three

23 sources - the State one-third, the City

24 one-third, and students one-third.

25 Although there have been changes to Act

2           484, the State law continues to call for  
3           at least one-third of the funding for  
4           community colleges to come from each  
5           community college's local sponsor, in  
6           that case the City of Philadelphia.

7                        Because the City has not been  
8           meeting its mandatory minimum  
9           appropriations to Community College of  
10          Philadelphia for many years, students  
11          have been burdened with higher tuition  
12          costs. For this fiscal year's \$134.7  
13          million operating budget, students  
14          provide 55 percent of the revenue while  
15          the State provides 24 percent and the  
16          City provides only 19 percent. That is a  
17          shortfall of \$19,250,000.

18                       The Mayor's proposed municipal  
19          budget for Fiscal Year 2020 unveiled two  
20          weeks ago falls short by \$18 million of  
21          the State-mandated one-third of Community  
22          College's proposed operating budget.

23                       We held a hearing on March  
24          12th; that is, the Committee on Education  
25          chaired by Councilwoman Blackwell and the

2           committee chaired by myself, to examine  
3           why the City of Philadelphia has not been  
4           providing the minimum revenues required  
5           by the State to fund Community College of  
6           Philadelphia so that the City can begin  
7           the process of developing a plan to meet  
8           its financial obligation.

9                         Community College of  
10          Philadelphia is a vital asset to the City  
11          with approximately 27,729 students. It  
12          is the City's responsibility to ensure  
13          that it has the resources to serve its  
14          students. Its role is crucial to  
15          strengthening the regional workforce in  
16          an increasingly technological and global  
17          world.

18                        Furthermore, it is an  
19          invaluable resource in our community in  
20          addressing some of the most pressing  
21          issues, such as violence, homelessness,  
22          and addiction.

23                        The last time the City provided  
24          33 percent was 1983. Over the past 21  
25          years, if you total the amount of

2           shortfall in State-mandated funding, that  
3           would equal 326 thousand -- I'm sorry;  
4           \$326,396,291.

5                        I heard a poll today on the  
6           news, and it revealed that today more  
7           than ever in our history Americans do not  
8           feel they have a real opportunity to  
9           improve their lives. High tuition costs  
10          of university colleges, other things,  
11          account for that, but Community College  
12          of Philadelphia and community colleges  
13          across America provide real quality  
14          opportunities for education at an  
15          affordable price.

16                        Thank you.

15 at our next session of Council.

16 As there are no additional  
17 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the  
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the  
19 purpose of calling up bills and  
20 resolutions that are on the Final Passage  
21 Calendar today.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
23 Mr. President. The following resolutions  
24 and bills are being called up from the  
25 Second Reading and Final Passage

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you.

8                   Before considering these bills  
9           and resolutions that are on our Final  
10          Passage Calendar today, we will have our  
11          public comment session. The public  
12          comment session must be on a bill or  
13          resolution that is on the Final Passage  
14          Calendar today.

15                  If you have not already signed  
16          up, you may sign up at the table to my  
17          left for a bill or resolution that's on  
18          passage today.

19                  When your name is called, you  
20          will go to the middle of the Council  
21          Chambers. There's a podium. On that  
22          podium, there's a device. That device  
23          has a light. When the light turns green,  
24          it will be your time to speak. When the  
25          light turns yellow, you will have 30

7                     Mr. Decker, please call the  
8           first name on the list.

9                     CHIEF CLERK: Emily Davis,  
10          commenting on 181063.

11                    (Witness approached podium.)

12                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
13          morning.

14                    MS. DAVIS: Hi. My name is  
15          Emily Davis and I ask you to please vote  
16          down Bill 181063, which would allow the  
17          City to enter a contract for a liquefied  
18          natural gas plant. At a time when the  
19          City is trying to lower its carbon  
20          footprint, this is not a time to permit  
21          the building of new facilities that  
22          support a system based on hydrocarbons.

23                    We have heard about the costly  
24          results of extreme weather; for example,  
25          Nebraska and Mozambique happening this

1           3/21/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           week, that have plagued the world in  
3           recent years. Ninety-seven percent of  
4           scientists believe climate change is  
5           caused by humans, and they know what  
6           humans are doing to cause that climate  
7           change. One of these activities is  
8           burning hydrocarbons.

9                         Scientists also know that one  
10           of the effects of climate change is  
11           extreme weather. These disasters are  
12           very costly. Our government says that in  
13           2018, there were 14 weather and climate  
14           disaster events that exceeded a cost of  
15           one billion dollars each across the  
16           United States. So Philadelphia is right  
17           in wanting to lower its carbon footprint.

18                         The financial advantage of this  
19           LNG plant is questionable. The annual  
20           budget of the City of Philadelphia is  
21           over \$4 billion. The income from this  
22           facility is projected to be less than 0.1  
23           percent of that. There are also  
24           questions about the private partner.

25                         I agree PGW needs help, but

2           this is not it. As we transition away  
3           from the use of natural gas in our homes,  
4           we will need the support of PGW, but  
5           while one part of PGW maintains the old  
6           system and shrinks in size, a new part  
7           supporting sustainable energy sources and  
8           energy efficiency could be expanding.

9                        Please do not support this bill  
10           or any bill that supports new  
11           infrastructure for fossil fuels. The  
12           costs outweigh the benefits. Don't be  
13           complicit in our own destruction.

14                        (Applause.)

15                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16           Thank you for your testimony.

17                        CHIEF CLERK: Tomea  
18           Sippio-Smith, commenting on 190198.

19                        (Witness approached podium.)

20                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
21           afternoon.

22                        MS. SIPPIO-SMITH: Good  
23           morning. My name is Tomea Sippio-Smith.  
24           I am the Education Policy Director at  
25           PCCY. Thank you for the opportunity to

2           testify in support of the resolution  
3           today.

4                        Pennsylvania's charter school  
5           law gives the Charter Appeals Board, or  
6           the CAB, tremendous power. It is the  
7           only body that hears charter school cases  
8           if a charter school appeals Philadelphia  
9           School Board's decision to deny, revoke,  
10          or renew a charter school application.  
11          It can override the local School Board's  
12          decision and allow charter schools to  
13          open or continue to operate, unless and  
14          until the District challenges the CAB  
15          decision in Commonwealth Court.

16                      Currently, five of the members  
17          of the CAB are serving expired terms.  
18          All were appointed by the former Governor  
19          Tom Corbett. One seat is vacant. PCCY  
20          is calling for a moratorium on CAB  
21          proceedings until all Board members are  
22          serving unexpired terms and the vacancy  
23          is filled.

24                      To be clear, the petition was  
25          not launched as an attack on the

2           Governor. While we call on Governor Wolf  
3           to appoint new members, the Senate has at  
4           least as much at stake to fill the seats  
5           with Board members serving unexpired  
6           terms and filling the vacancy.

7                         While the Governor appoints,  
8           the Senate must also approve any new  
9           appointees. One of the reasons we called  
10          attention to the current situation was to  
11          bring all parties to the table to resolve  
12          this issue.

13                        For Philadelphia and its  
14          students, this resolution matters. The  
15          Philadelphia School District just  
16          regained local control and has a new  
17          School Board. It just exercised an  
18          option not to approve charters for three  
19          new schools. If the charter appeals the  
20          decision, the CAB hears the case. It  
21          removes the decision from the  
22          Philadelphia School District, a district  
23          that receives high marks on its  
24          authorizing from pro-charter  
25          organizations that promote high level

2           quality authorizing and places the  
3           decision right back in the hands of the  
4           State.

5                         Considering the gravity of  
6           their reviews and the impact their  
7           decisions have on Philadelphia's public  
8           school students, placing a moratorium on  
9           the CAB proceedings until all Board  
10          members are serving unexpired terms and  
11          the seat is filled, the open seat is  
12          filled, this is the correct decision and  
13          course of action.

14                        Thank you.

15                        (Applause.)

16                        CHIEF CLERK: David Loeb,  
17          commenting on 190194.

18                        (Witness approached podium.)

19                        MR. LOEB: Hello, members of  
20          Council, Council President Clarke. I'm  
21          here to comment on Bill 190194 to  
22          authorize a study to assess the impact of  
23          certain taxes. And now of course this is  
24          about the soda tax. And, look, we need  
25          to keep this tax in place. And so I want

4           to repeal or reduce the soda tax.

5                     Pre-K is just so important for  
6           the City, and we need to preserve the  
7           funding stream that makes pre-K possible.

8                     So thank you again, Councilman  
9           Squilla, for not signing on to the effort  
10          to repeal the soda tax, and I look  
11          forward to watching you continue to fight  
12          for pre-K and for Philly's children.

13                    Thank you.

14                    (Applause.)

15                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16          Thank you for your testimony.

17                    CHIEF CLERK: Reynelle Brown  
18          Staley, commenting on 190198.

19                    (Witness approached podium.)

20                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
21          afternoon.

22                    MS. STALEY: Good afternoon.

23          My name is Reynelle Brown Staley and I  
24          serve as Policy Director at the Education  
25          Law Center, an organization dedicated to

2           ensuring that all of Pennsylvania's  
3           children have access to quality public  
4           education.

5                       Three weeks ago today, ELC  
6           released a new report on equity in  
7           Philadelphia's charter schools titled  
8           "Safeguarding Educational Equity:  
9           Protecting Philadelphia Students' Civil  
10          Rights Through Charter Oversight," and  
11          you have copies of that report on your  
12          desks. In it we identified a range of  
13          unaddressed equity issues in charter  
14          schools in areas such as enrollment  
15          practices, special education, and  
16          education of English learners. We  
17          highlighted the role of Philadelphia's  
18          Board of Education in guarding against  
19          discriminatory practices in the City's  
20          charter schools, but we also noted the  
21          need for stronger charter oversight and  
22          accountability at all levels to protect  
23          students' civil rights. Today I offer  
24          testimony on an area where change is  
25          sorely overdue, the State Charter Appeal

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2           Board.

3                   The CAB is a uniquely powerful  
4           body in the realm of charter oversight.  
5           Local school boards have the power to  
6           deny a charter application or not renew  
7           it or revoke an existing charter. The  
8           CAB has exclusive authority to affirm or  
9           overturn these local school board  
10          decisions. The CAB's decisions aren't  
11          the act of judges trained to strictly  
12          interpret the law and apply precedent.  
13          The six members of the CAB are  
14          Governor-appointed, Senate-confirmed  
15          community members granted tremendous  
16          power over their term. By law, CAB  
17          members should be a parent of a  
18          school-aged child, a school board member,  
19          a certified teacher, a faculty member of  
20          a higher education institution, a member  
21          of the business community, and a member  
22          of the State Board of Education. Their  
23          qualifications are defined, and their  
24          terms are limited at a recognition that  
25          the Board should reflect the views of the

2           community and change in composition over  
3           time.

4                     Our report and a wealth of  
5           national research indicate that current  
6           thinking about charter school oversight  
7           needs to evolve. We need to evaluate how  
8           well a charter school is doing, not just  
9           by looking at academic and financial  
10          performance, but at the students they're  
11          serving as well. A school may position  
12          itself to perform well on academic  
13          measures by enrolling students who  
14          already have some measure of educational  
15          privilege when they enter their doors.  
16          Likewise, a school can position itself to  
17          perform well on financial measures by  
18          enrolling students who require fewer  
19          resources and services to achieve  
20          academic success.

21                    If we focus on academic and  
22          financial performance to the exclusion of  
23          equity, we incentivize charters to  
24          underserved students with the greatest  
25          educational needs, a phenomenon that's

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2           happening right now in Philadelphia.

3                       The members of the CAB need to  
4           be revisited by law and to reflect our  
5           current understanding of charter  
6           oversight. We support the work of  
7           Council to bring needed attention to this  
8           issue and ensure that the CAB members are  
9           duly appointed, duly confirmed, and  
10          serving unexpired terms. Given the  
11          tremendous power the CAB has to impact  
12          the well-being of our students in our  
13          district, it's important that  
14          Philadelphia, the site of more than half  
15          of the State's brick and mortar charters,  
16          use its influence to urge Harrisburg to  
17          act.

18                       Thank you.

19                       (Applause.)

20                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you for your testimony.

22                       CHIEF CLERK: Lisa Haver,  
23          commenting on 190198.

24                       (Witness approached podium.)

25                       MS. HAVER: Good morning,

2           Council President.

3                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
4           afternoon.

5                       MS. HAVER: Good afternoon,  
6           Council President Clarke, members of City  
7           Council. My name is Lisa Haver. I'm a  
8           retired Philadelphia teacher, co-founder  
9           of the Alliance for Philadelphia Public  
10          Schools. I'm speaking today on behalf of  
11          the members of APPS to urge Council to  
12          pass Resolution 190198 calling for a  
13          moratorium on all PA Charter Appeal Board  
14          proceedings until Governor Wolf can make  
15          appointments. I want to thank  
16          Councilmembers Gym, Blackwell, and  
17          Greenlee, whose records show consistent  
18          support for public education, for  
19          co-sponsoring the resolution.

20                      Last year we shook off the yoke  
21          of State control and restored local  
22          control to our public schools. Both  
23          Mayor Kenney and this Council reaffirmed  
24          their commitment to funding the City  
25          schools. The Mayor, Council, and the

2           community will continue to fight for the  
3           best education for our schoolchildren.

4                     Council has taken steps to  
5           increase its own oversight of the  
6           District. The new Board of Education is  
7           working hard to manage our schools  
8           through more public engagement and  
9           community meetings and in new meetings  
10          where the public can be heard and where  
11          true deliberation on issues is taking  
12          place.

13                    The Board made a definitive  
14          statement last month when it unanimously  
15          rejected three clearly inadequate  
16          applications for new charter schools.  
17          Those decisions should be final. The  
18          Board is responsible for representing the  
19          people of the City and how the District  
20          spends its money. That's why it makes no  
21          sense that even with our return to local  
22          control, an obscure Board made up of  
23          State appointees should have the power to  
24          overrule the decisions of our local  
25          School Board. The Charter Appeals Board

2           meets in Harrisburg and is made up of  
3           individuals who are unknown to this  
4           community, do not live in this community,  
5           do not pay taxes in this community, and  
6           have no accountability in this community.

7                        The Charter Appeal Board is  
8           currently made up of appointees of former  
9           Governor Corbett, most of whose terms  
10          have expired. The power to decide which  
11          schools this District or any district  
12          creates or chooses not to cannot be made  
13          by political appointees with no  
14          connection to this district.

15                      When we lost 24 public schools  
16          in 2013, there was no legal appeal for  
17          the students or the parents of those  
18          schools. Agree or disagree, that  
19          decision was final.

20                      The Charter Appeal Board should  
21          be abolished. It is wrong for local  
22          officials to be overruled by an  
23          out-of-town group of unknown political  
24          appointees, and until it is, we're  
25          calling for a moratorium on all CAB

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2           proceedings until the expired terms can  
3           be filled by Governor Wolf.

4                     Philadelphians have the right  
5           to determine what is best for our city  
6           and what is best for the stakeholders of  
7           the School District.

8                     Thank you.

9                     (Applause.)

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you for your testimony.

12                    CHIEF CLERK: Valerie Villines,  
13           commenting on 190192.

14                    (Witness approached podium.)

15                    MS. VILLINES: Good morning to  
16           Council President Clarke, the members of  
17           City Council, and all those assembled  
18           here. My name is Valerie G.C. Villines,  
19           President of Beta Delta Zeta Chapter, the  
20           Philadelphia Graduate Chapter of Zeta Phi  
21           Beta Sorority, Incorporated.

22                    I can't tell you how humbled I  
23           am to stand before you representing a  
24           chapter that the principal founder of  
25           Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated was

2           a member of and chartered nearly 75 years  
3           ago.

4                     Imagine an African American  
5           woman who founded an organization nearly  
6           100 years ago and the organization is  
7           still thriving, with over 125,000  
8           college-educated women and with chapters  
9           that exist not only in the United States  
10          but also around the globe.

11                    Imagine a woman who defied the  
12          typical stereotypes that existed with  
13          sorority and fraternity life in the early  
14          1900s and founded an organization that  
15          was based on service, scholarship,  
16          sisterhood, and finer womanhood. This  
17          woman's name was Arizona Cleaver Stemons.  
18          She was the first national President of  
19          Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated.  
20          She attended Howard University where Zeta  
21          was founded on January 16th, 1920 and  
22          completed her graduate and post-graduate  
23          studies in the field of social work. And  
24          ironically on today, you just proclaimed  
25          the month of March as Social Workers

2           Month, so thank you for that.

3                       She was responsible for  
4           chartering numerous undergraduate and  
5           graduate chapters throughout the United  
6           States, including Ada (ph) Chapter at  
7           Temple University here in Philadelphia  
8           and Beta Delta Zeta Chapter, the chapter  
9           that I stand here representing today.

10                      She resided on the 1900 block  
11           of Federal Street in South Philadelphia  
12           for 52 years. Her address was 1915  
13           Federal Street, and currently the house  
14           is owned by my chapter and we  
15           affectionately call it the Founder's  
16           House.

17                      It is because of the  
18           contributions of Founder Emeritus Stemons  
19           that I proudly stand before you in  
20           support of Resolution 190192 for the  
21           co-naming of the 1900 block of Federal  
22           Street to Arizona C. Stemons Way, and on  
23           behalf of my chapter, I wish to thank  
24           Councilman Kenyatta Johnson, Councilwoman  
25           Blondell Reynolds Brown, and the other

2           members of Council who co-sponsored this  
3           resolution. Additionally, I'd like to  
4           also thank our sorer Katherine Gilmore.

5                     My chapter greatly appreciates  
6           you and thanks you for your

10                    (Applause.)

11                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Mr. Decker, I think we have four ladies  
13           that are going to testify on this.

14                     Why don't you all just tee up  
15           so you can just all come up. We'll call  
16           the names.

17                     Mr. Decker, call the names.

18                     CHIEF CLERK: Tajman Kelley,  
19           Jennifer Santiago, Saniah Johnson, and  
20           Diane Wilson.

21                     (Witnesses approached podium.)

22                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23           Thank you, Mr. Decker.

24                     Good afternoon.

25                     MS. KELLEY: Good afternoon,

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2           President and members of the Philadelphia  
3           City Council. My name is Tajman Kelley.  
4           I am a member of Beta Delta Zeta Chapter  
5           of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated,  
6           where I serve as the First Vice  
7           President.

8                         It is an honor to stand before  
9           you today and encourage that this  
10          resolution comes to life. As a humble  
11          member of this organization, I recognize  
12          what my founder, Arizona Stemons, at a  
13          young age on the campus of Howard  
14          University did when her and four other  
15          members decided to join -- to originate  
16          this sorority. They dedicated their life  
17          to principles of scholarship, service,  
18          sisterly love, and finer womanhood.

19                        She took those principles and  
20          came here to the City of Philadelphia and  
21          worked for the Department of Human  
22          Service. As you, she has dedicated her  
23          life to serving the City, just as you  
24          have.

25                        By passing this resolution, it

2           is a testament to her legacy and the  
3           legacy of the sorority, and I highly  
4           thank you and I encourage you to continue  
5           recognizing the members of our sorority.

6                     Thank you.

7                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you for your testimony.

9                     (Applause.)

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
11           afternoon. Just state your name for the  
12           record.

13                    MS. SANTIAGO: Good afternoon.  
14           My name is Jennifer A. Santiago, Esquire.  
15           I am a proud member of Zeta Phi Beta  
16           Sorority, Incorporated. However, my  
17           presence here today is as the President  
18           of the National Pan-Hellenic Council for  
19           Southeastern Pennsylvania.

20                    (Applause.)

21                    MS. SANTIAGO: Thank you.

22                    Our Council currently serves  
23           all of the Philadelphia area, Montgomery  
24           County, Delaware County, and Bucks  
25           County. Our Council represents all nine

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2           members of what has commonly been called  
3           the Divine Nine. We serve 23 chapters.

4                       We stand here proudly  
5           supporting Resolution 190192, because the  
6           recognition of one founder of any of our  
7           organizations is a recognition of all of  
8           our organizations. It is the recognition  
9           of all of the hard work and the service  
10          that all of our organizations are founded  
11          on.

12                      We may wear different letters,  
13          we may wear different colors, but all of  
14          our organizations are founded on service  
15          and scholarship. By City Council  
16          recognizing my founder, Arizona Cleaver  
17          Stemons, you are saying to the City of  
18          Philadelphia we thank you, Divine Nine.  
19          We thank you for the service that you  
20          proudly give to our city. We thank you  
21          for all that you do.

22                      So we thank you, City Council,  
23          for looking at us, looking at our most  
24          transient founder, Arizona Cleaver  
25          Stemons, and saying to Zeta Phi Beta



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2           Sorority, Incorporated that we thank you  
3           for not leaving South Philadelphia, for  
4           not leaving the 1900 block of Federal  
5           Street. We thank you for continuing to  
6           provide outstanding service that your  
7           founder put forth and designated as a  
8           principal founding formation. We thank  
9           you for not going astray. We thank you  
10          for continuing on the path that was set  
11          forth almost 100 years ago.

12                        Again, standing before you as  
13          the President for the National  
14          Pan-Hellenic Council, what I frequently  
15          tell our Council is that we were not  
16          divine until we were all nine. The  
17          biblical meaning of the word "nine" is  
18          God's perfect love. And so we thank you,  
19          City Council, for allowing the Divine  
20          Nine to be God's perfect love to your  
21          constituents.

22                        Thank you.

23                        (Applause.)

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you for your testimony.

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2                   MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
4 afternoon.

5                   MS. JOHNSON: I'm Saniah M.  
6 Johnson, CPA, the immediate past  
7 President of Beta Delta Zeta Chapter,  
8 immediate past Chairman and President of  
9 Girls, Incorporated of Greater  
10 Philadelphia and Southern New Jersey,  
11 past Board member of the National  
12 Organization of Girls, Incorporated, a PA  
13 delegate for Vision 2020, a Philadelphia  
14 native. I lived throughout the City, in  
15 Nicetown, West Philly, across the street  
16 from the Blackwell family home actually,  
17 and I now reside in the Eighth District  
18 of Philadelphia in Cindy Bass's area.

19                   I rise and represent  
20 Philadelphians. I rise and represent the  
21 many members of our organization, the  
22 hundreds in the City of Philadelphia, the  
23 tens of thousands around the world, and I  
24 rise on behalf of women and girls in  
25 support of the recognition of a woman in

2           this city who has impacted the entire  
3           United States and beyond and will become  
4           a symbol for all that we and you as the  
5           City Council will recognize a woman in a  
6           meaningful way in the address of the 1900  
7           block of Federal Street.

8                        So we thank you for supporting  
9           this resolution, Councilman Johnson, and  
10          we thank you for this obvious recognition  
11          of women during Women's History Month and  
12          as we observe Finer Womanhood Month.

13                       Thank you.

14                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Thank you for your testimony.

16                       (Applause.)

17                       MS. WILSON: Good afternoon.

18                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
19          afternoon.

20                       MS. WILSON: I am Diane Wilson,  
21          the 11th State Director for the  
22          Commonwealth of Pennsylvania of Zeta Phi  
23          Beta Sorority, Incorporated. I am also a  
24          proud member of Beta Delta Zeta Chapter.

25                       I am a teacher by profession,

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2 so that caused me to research the reasons  
3 why streets are renamed and the  
4 controversies. I found one of the main  
5 controversies often centers around losing  
6 the identity of the street, even when the  
7 name of the street is tied to a person or  
8 an event. That led me to research how  
9 Federal Street was named. I discovered  
10 that it was because it was a road between  
11 two federal properties, the old  
12 Schuylkill Arsenal, which was located on  
13 Grays Ferry Avenue, and the original  
14 Philadelphia Navy Yard, which began in  
15 1776 on Front Street and Federal Street.

16 Now, many people use the  
17 renaming of a street as a way to honor  
18 someone. Change a street name and you  
19 change the way people think about the  
20 City. It's where ideology meets asphalt.  
21 Arizona Cleaver Stemons' ideology has  
22 resulted in a 99-year-old organization  
23 that continues to effect change, raise  
24 consciousness, and encourage high  
25 scholastic achievement. Just as her idea

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2           to found an organization transcended the  
3           boundaries of Howard University, we, the  
4           members of the Philadelphia graduate  
5           chapter of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority,  
6           Incorporated, feel her legacy should  
7           transcend the boundaries of 1915 Federal  
8           Street.

9                        Thank you.

10                       (Applause.)

11                       CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval,  
12           commenting on 181063.

13                       (Witness approached podium.)

14                       MS. RAVAL: Hi. My name is  
15           Meenal Raval. I'm a Philly resident.

16                       Wait a minute. That's from  
17           last week. How did that happen?

18                       I'm still a Philly resident and  
19           I'm here today to speak on Bill No.  
20           181063 authorizing PGW to enter into a  
21           public-private partnership with Liberty  
22           Energy Trust to develop the Passyunk  
23           Energy Center.

24                       You must know that gas is a  
25           fossil fuel, that adding to our

2           dependency of fossil fuels at this late  
3           stage of a planetary climate fever is  
4           immoral and dangerous.

5                        Today as I passed through  
6           security, I was stopped because I had a  
7           steel fork in my bag. We weren't talking  
8           about a pitchfork, but a dinner fork.  
9           Many of us keenly aware of our city's  
10          litter problem and our oceans choking  
11          with plastic have chosen to avoid using  
12          single-use plastics, single-use plastics  
13          such as forks, water bottles, straws, and  
14          check-out bags, because single-use  
15          plastics are made of fossil fuels, which  
16          we need to use so much less of.

17                       I want to thank Councilman  
18          Squilla for leading on reducing our  
19          city's usage of single-use plastic bags.

20                       So while my fork waits for me  
21          by the security team, I'm here asking how  
22          can Council consider a steel fork  
23          dangerous and not consider a large fossil  
24          fuel project dangerous?

25                       (Applause.)

2                   MS. RAVAL: So please vote down  
3 Bill 181063 when it comes up for a vote.

4                   I'm also here to speak about  
5 Bill No. 181067 introduced December 6th  
6 of last year by Councilmember Reynolds  
7 Brown. This bill calls for public  
8 hearings about executing the Mayor's  
9 Municipal Energy Master Plan which calls  
10 for all of the City's municipal  
11 facilities to use 100 percent renewable  
12 energy by 2030. By the way, 12  
13 municipalities in Greater Philadelphia  
14 have passed resolutions to transition  
15 their energy use to 100 percent renewable  
16 community-wide, public and private. We  
17 can offer a presentation to any of you  
18 who want to learn more about the Ready  
19 for 100 Renewable Energy Campaign.

20                   Thank you.

21                   (Applause.)

22                   CHIEF CLERK: Nelida Sepulveda,  
23 commenting on 190194.

24                   (Witness approached podium.)

25                   MS. SEPULVEDA: Good afternoon.

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3           afternoon.

4                   MS. SEPULVEDA: Buenos tardes.

5           My name is Nelida Sepulveda. I am a  
6           51-year-long resident of Philadelphia.  
7           Much of that time was spent in District  
8           7, but for the last 20 years, now I am  
9           living in District 9. I am here to  
10          comment on Bill 190194, which authorizes  
11          a study on the impact of certain taxes.  
12          I'm also here to ask that City Council  
13          continue to support the beverage tax, as  
14          it directly benefits thousands of three-  
15          and four-year-olds.

16                   We need to have more  
17          opportunities for children, not less. It  
18          is clear and the data supports that  
19          children in early learning opportunities  
20          do much better than those children that  
21          do not have those opportunities. It is  
22          the most important investment we can make  
23          to ensure that our children are growing  
24          up to be contributing members of society  
25          and leaders in our communities.



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2                   I wish to thank my City  
3           Councilmember, Cherelle Parker, for  
4           standing by the 2,200 children right now  
5           who are in Philly pre-K and for not  
6           co-sponsoring the bill to repeal or  
7           reduce the beverage tax.

8                   Thank you.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you.

11                   (Applause.)

12                   CHIEF CLERK: Sheila Armstrong,  
13           commenting on 180729.

14                   (Witness approached podium.)

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
16           afternoon.

17                   MS. ARMSTRONG: Good afternoon.

18           This microphone is not for me. I'm  
19           already a loud mouth.

20                   How y'all doing, everyone? My  
21           name is Sheila Armstrong. I'm here to  
22           speak about the ordinance -- what did I  
23           write down on that paper? It was the  
24           Ordinance 18029 -- all right. I lied.  
25           Okay. My name is Sheila Armstrong and

2           I'm here today because I'm just here to  
3           serve Councilman Clarke his papers for  
4           the hearing tomorrow. Okay? I'm running  
5           against him, and it's hard to try to  
6           track you down, sir. Okay? So here is  
7           me officially serving you your -- because  
8           I'm challenging you since you're  
9           challenging me. Tit for tat. Hi. You  
10          should have just left me alone.

11                         Here you go. So one of y'all  
12          court people, can y'all give him -- oh,  
13          all right. Thank you.

14                         That's all I needed.

15                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16          Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

17                         (Ms. Armstrong talking without  
18          the microphone.)

19                         MS. ARMSTRONG: Oh, talk in the  
20          mic. Okay. Still my time. All right.

21                         I live in a low-income  
22          community, ladies and gentlemen, and all  
23          this conspiracy that is going on in this  
24          city has not hit my community. It has  
25          not been there. In the past three years

2           we've been holding the title of the  
3           poorest urban city in the whole nation,  
4           and that is a disgrace to me. Okay?

5           Because all of y'all been here more than  
6           three years, more than five years, and  
7           some of y'all ten years. So how we going  
8           to have a plan to address poverty for my  
9           community? That's just wrong. Maybe  
10          because y'all didn't care so much. Maybe  
11          y'all didn't want to do so much or  
12          anything like that.

13                    I don't care. I'm not even  
14          here. The problem -- the reason why I'm  
15          here, sir, is because I'm tired of the  
16          politics and games. All I want to do is  
17          run my race. I told everybody I wanted  
18          to run my race. Everybody you got call  
19          me, I told them I ain't want nothing. I  
20          was running my race that God purposed on  
21          my heart. I told you that when I met  
22          with you at Dunkin Donuts, and I told you  
23          the other day when you and Greenlee --  
24          hey, Councilman Greenlee. Remember me?  
25          Sheila Armstrong, when you were standing

2           on the corner supporting your friend?  
3           Support your friend at that hearing  
4           tomorrow too. Okay?

5                     And also -- because this is  
6           just wrong. I'm not scared. I always  
7           spoke up for what was right. I am a  
8           woman of faith and a woman of God, and I  
9           do what he purposed on my heart. He told  
10          me to run this race, and that's what I'm  
11          gonna do.

12                    I asked you to leave me alone,  
13          just let me run the race, because it's a  
14          message I had to give to the people, but  
15          you made it about you, sir. It was never  
16          about you. I told you it was never about  
17          you. It was about the people I serve in  
18          my low-income community that ain't  
19          getting the services. But y'all helping  
20          y'all friends do something. I'm tired of  
21          this. Enough is enough. Enough is  
22          enough.

23                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
24          Thank you.

25                    (Ms. Armstrong talking without

1           3/21/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           microphone.)

3                   CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

4                   (Ms. Armstrong talking without

5           microphone.)

6                   (Witness approached podium.)

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you.

9                   (Ms. Armstrong talking without

10          microphone.)

11                   MR. DANIHEL: Okay. Good

12          afternoon. This is an official decree of

13          the people in writ of mandamus quo

14          warranto and, as such, requires immediate

15          action and remedy.

16                   Every week Council, Mayor,

17          Governor, and others transfer private

18          property to the government, probably

19          illegally.

20                   The U.S. Attorney General

21          McSwain correctly identified the failure

22          to perform a known duty or task is

23          illegal and causes great harm. No

24          attorney people know this action is

25          treason.

1           3/21/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   For over 90 times in this very  
3 room, I have decreed government officials  
4 to act and have suffered greatly from  
5 their failure to perform a known duty or  
6 task. Council Chambers are usually  
7 occupied by the Philadelphia Police. In  
8 fact, the Police Commissioner has been in  
9 Council recently. The State Police, upon  
10 discussions, have ceded their authority  
11 to the armed Philadelphia Police. The  
12 Philadelphia Police have witnessed in  
13 their presence in my case over 90 times a  
14 conspiracy to deny numerous God-given  
15 rights, including among other things I'll  
16 name, 42 PA CS 8902, conduct which  
17 imperils my personal security or private  
18 property rights. It is, therefore,  
19 decreed to the police officers to perform  
20 their duty to arrest every Councilperson  
21 and staff.

22                   The constitutions requires  
23 immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
24 breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
25 duty. Your oath of office requires you

2           to act or face prison.

3                     42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,

4           1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA

5           Constitution, Article I, Sections 1

6           through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,

7           711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws

8           listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,

9           14-4056 appear violated.

10                    I call on the federal and

11           Commonwealth governments to perform their

12           constitutional obligations to investigate

13           and prosecute all involved in the theft

14           and illegal deed transfer of my home,

15           1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

16                    The denial of God-given 42 USC

17           1982 property rights for 25 years is

18           egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,

19           and requires immediate remedy.

20                    A just government must obey the

21           rule of law. This color of law

22           government must have its Charter to

23           govern revoked until a constitutionally

24           compliant government is installed.

25                    Public servants cannot refuse

1           3/21/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           their sworn duty to act any more than a  
3           fireman can refuse to fight a fire.

4                     The sovereign people require  
5           oath, Constitution, and law be enforced,  
6           and jail is required for all who violate  
7           oath, Constitution or law.

8                     I remind Council, it takes a  
9           lot of cooperation to create and allow  
10          this monumental corruption.

11                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12          Thank you for your testimony, sir.

13                    CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
14          other speakers on the public comment  
15          list, Mr. President.

16                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17          Thank you very much.

18                    That concludes our public  
19          comment session, and our next order of  
20          business is bills and resolutions on our  
21          Final Passage Calendar.

22                    Mr. Decker, please read the  
23          title of 190188.

24                    CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
25          urging the United States Congress to

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds  
7           Brown.

8                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
9           Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

10                   (Duly seconded.)

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12           Thank you. It's been moved and properly  
13           seconded.

14                   All those in favor say aye.

15                   (Aye.)

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17           Those opposed?

18                   (No response.)

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20           ayes have it, and Resolution 190188 is  
21           adopted.

22                   Mr. Decker, 190189.

23                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
24           approving the redevelopment contract of  
25           the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority

2           for the redevelopment and urban renewal  
3           of a portion of the Model Cities Urban  
4           Renewal Area, identified by house number  
5           and street address as 2337 through 2345  
6           West Berks Street.

7                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
8           Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

9                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
10          you, Mr. President. I move the adoption  
11          of the resolution.

12                        (Duly seconded.)

13                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
14          been moved and properly seconded.

15                        All those in favor say aye.

16                        (Aye.)

17                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18          Those opposed?

19                        (No response.)

20                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
21          ayes have it. 190189 is adopted.

22                        Mr. Decker, 190192.

23                        CHIEF CLERK: A resolution also  
24          naming Federal Street, between 19th  
25          Street and 20th Street, "Arizona C.

1           3/21/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           Stemons Way", in honor of Arizona  
3           Leedonia Cleaver Stemons, the initiating  
4           Founder of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority,  
5           Incorporated, one of the largest  
6           organizations for women in the country.

7                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
8           Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

9                    COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council  
10          President, I proudly move for the  
11          adoption of the resolution.

12                   (Duly seconded.)

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
14          been moved and properly seconded.

15                   All those in favor say aye.

16                   (Aye.)

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
18          Those opposed?

19                   (No response.)

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
21          ayes have it. 190192 is adopted.

22                   (Applause.)

23                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
24          Congratulations.

25                   Mr. Decker, 190194.

2                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
3 authorizing City Council to hire and  
4 retain an independent third party to  
5 conduct research and produce a study on  
6 the fiscal and economic impact of certain  
7 taxes and fees; and authorizing the  
8 Committee on Appropriations to conduct  
9 hearings to consider such a study.

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

12                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
13 very much, Council President. In 2016, I  
14 was proud to be part of a legislative  
15 body that passed 13 to 4 a bold  
16 investment in children, communities, and  
17 neighborhoods that have too often been  
18 left behind. Pre-K, Community Schools,  
19 the rebuilding of our public spaces are  
20 bold investments in fragile institutions  
21 for whom there are far too few lobbies.

22                   When we passed this bill, we  
23 knew that we could no longer talk about  
24 the crisis of disinvestment and neglect  
25 in children or in our neighborhoods in

2           terms of charitable ventures, hopes and  
3           possibilities, but we had to take big  
4           actions, major investments, because we  
5           know that combatting poverty will never,  
6           will never be cheap.

7                         And this week my own  
8           Councilmember, Councilwoman Blondell  
9           Reynolds Brown, held a hearing in which  
10          we talked about how the children of  
11          Philadelphia are poisoned in our city at  
12          rates that are higher than Flint,  
13          Michigan. We had to take a stand.

14                        Pre-K, Community Schools,  
15          Rebuild remain a legacy achievement for  
16          this Council, but from the moment we even  
17          breathed this idea into possibility, we  
18          have been under relentless attack by the  
19          American Beverage Association, which has  
20          spent millions of dollars to divide us,  
21          and I know that they will spend millions  
22          more. They will not stop. It is their  
23          millions that put us in litigation for  
24          years and held up the expansion of pre-K  
25          to less than a fraction of what it should

1           3/21/19 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           have been by this time. It was their  
3           millions that held up the keeping down of  
4           the Community Schools initiative to half  
5           of what it should be by this time. And  
6           it was their millions that prevent -- or  
7           only now just allowed for the first  
8           ribbon-cuttings to be allowed for the  
9           Rebuild program.

10                   Now, let me be clear, because a  
11           lot of people wonder what's wrong with a  
12           study. We've had plenty of studies that  
13           examine the impacts of the beverage tax.  
14           We've had it from the National Bureau of  
15           Economic Research, expert economists.  
16           The City Controller put one out. And in  
17           December I supported, along with this  
18           Council, Resolution 18116 [sic] calling  
19           for a study and hearings on the beverage  
20           tax. But how long are we going to allow  
21           this to continue? And how long are we  
22           going to allow this body to be used for  
23           the mere interest of one particular  
24           lobby?

25                   So I am going to vote no

1           3/21/19 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           against a duplicative resolution clearly  
3           drafted and peddled by the Beverage  
4           Association as a companion to a pre-K  
5           killing legislation, and I'm going to  
6           urge my colleagues to vote no, because  
7           combined with a pre-K killing  
8           legislation, this is not an honest study.

9                        This resolution calls for an  
10           independent study, but it does not call  
11           for a neutral one. And I am not  
12           interested in facilitating the creation  
13           of a so-called independent study. I am  
14           interested in one that examines this tact  
15           from a neutral standpoint, that can see  
16           the positive benefits of this tax for  
17           years to come. Economists around the  
18           country are studying the benefits of  
19           pre-K and this tax. Let's wait and  
20           debate their work.

21                       Now, I am as good government a  
22           person as anyone in this city. I have  
23           fought for transparency and  
24           accountability for struggling  
25           institutions all my life, but I have done

2           so from the belief and the understanding  
3           that we have to bring a sense of purpose  
4           and investment to fragile institutions  
5           long neglected and underfunded. And I  
6           can tell you that I can see through a  
7           charade whose purpose is to drum up  
8           opposition that will only breed cynicism  
9           and distrust on the signature initiative  
10          in this city.

11                        So that is why I'm voting no.  
12          Because I'm thinking of the families in  
13          our communities, the Rebuild  
14          ribbon-cuttings, our growing Community  
15          Schools, and I'm thinking of the families  
16          and the children whose lives hang on the  
17          balance, and I'm not going to let them  
18          down. So I'm going to buy into this  
19          narrative and vote no.

20                        Thank you.

21                        (Applause.)

22                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23          Thank you.

24                        The Chair recognizes  
25          Councilwoman Parker.

2                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
3 you, Mr. President, and thank you,  
4 Councilwoman Gym, for sharing your very  
5 well-meaning and heartfelt comments.

6                   I too am going to be voting no  
7 on this resolution, and my rationale is  
8 less about the beverage industry, because  
9 I respect my colleagues who were a no  
10 when we voted on this.

11                   I served for ten years in a  
12 body that consisted of 203 members and I  
13 agreed to disagree with a lot of them on  
14 a lot of different issues, but this, what  
15 I call, a thinly veiled attempt at  
16 demonstrating what W.E.B. Du Bois called  
17 the double consciousness, a double  
18 consciousness.

19                   I stand by my vote that was  
20 cast for the tax, and I do that  
21 unapologetically, and for those who were  
22 against it, you had a right to be. But  
23 this idea of now using this legislative  
24 format to put this issue on an agenda so  
25 that it can be used as a form of

2           political weaponry against our colleagues  
3           who were for it is a little insulting to  
4           me. And I say it to you, Mr. President,  
5           because what I immediately thought about  
6           was the third-party independent  
7           audit/review/study that we just conducted  
8           of the Office of Property Assessment. I  
9           thought about the independent third-party  
10          study that we did of retirement security  
11          for private-sector workers in the City of  
12          Philadelphia and, Mr. President, both of  
13          them were done without a resolution.  
14          Both of them were done, Mr. President,  
15          with all due respect, by your power and  
16          authority as the leader of this body.  
17          And any of us who are interested in  
18          acquiring a third-party independent study  
19          or audit of anything, we have the ability  
20          to garner up the support of our  
21          colleagues and we can go and request one,  
22          and we do that with you.

23                        In addition to that,  
24          Councilwoman Gym already referenced the  
25          studies that had taken place already. I

2           say to each of my colleagues who cast a  
3           vote, we will vote on many different  
4           things in this body and we will make some  
5           tough choices. For those of us who have  
6           chosen -- and some of us are coming under  
7           what appears to be an insurmountable  
8           amount of heat because you chose to take  
9           the tough vote -- I say thank you for  
10          standing up and not allowing this  
11          issue -- because it's the timing for me,  
12          Mr. President.

13                        Now, you see, if this were  
14           introduced -- and you talked about the  
15           resolution that was passed some time ago,  
16           but if this was done, let's say -- this  
17           is '19 -- '16, in the middle of '17, you  
18           know, I probably would have thought about  
19           it a little differently, but to do it now  
20           and not only do it when you're calling  
21           for a third-party independent  
22           study/audit/review, but at the same time  
23           to introduce a bill that could, in  
24           essence, repeal it. So wait. Are you  
25           telling me that you think you know what

2           the results of the data is going to be  
3           before you get it because you introduced  
4           an instrument that could, in essence,  
5           repeal the tax?

6                        I say to residents in the Ninth  
7           Councilmanic District -- open up the  
8           phone, because I want to note this for  
9           the record. I want to specifically say  
10          to all of my pre-K providers, because  
11          you've been calling me since this was  
12          introduced, we have 16 centers in the  
13          Ninth Councilmanic District; 359 were the  
14          total slots that were allocated; 347 were  
15          filled, and that's an average fill rate  
16          of 97 percent. I want to say to you all  
17          of, particularly the African American  
18          women small business owners who I fought  
19          very hard for during this process so that  
20          you could get back-room technical support  
21          to professionalize your home-based  
22          businesses that were supporting our  
23          community, I am not going to abandon you.

24                       I respect the right of my  
25          colleagues to be where they are going to

2           be, but I do not have a double  
3           consciousness about my decision.

4                        In addition to that, I really,  
5           really want to affirm the timing that  
6           this was introduced at the same time that  
7           the bill and that is used as a form of  
8           political weaponry, and to my colleagues  
9           and particularly the two who I know are  
10          feeling it the most right now, thank you  
11          for your consciousness. Thank you for  
12          your integrity. Thank you for your  
13          morality and standing for what you  
14          believe in.

15                        Thank you, Mr. President.

16                        (Applause.)

17                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18          Thank you, Councilwoman.

19                        The Chair recognizes  
20          Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

21                        COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
22          you, Council President. I'm going to  
23          give my colleagues the respect that they  
24          aren't willing to give to me and allowing  
25          me to use the vote, the vote of

1           3/21/19 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           confidence that my constituents, when  
3           they vote for me, give me to sit here and  
4           support and defend them.

5                     Ensure, Similac, and other  
6           products have been unintended  
7           consequences of what folks -- and I have  
8           been adamantly against this from day one,  
9           because I spent 11 years in this Council  
10          promoting and changing the trajectory of  
11          business tax reform in the City of  
12          Philadelphia, the BRT tax, use and  
13          occupancy tax, single sales factor. So I  
14          am against regressive taxes across the  
15          board. Shame on us, and I consider  
16          myself a progressive, shame on us if we  
17          believe that funding good things only  
18          comes at the expense of poor people.

19                     (Applause.)

20                     COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I will  
21          not fall for that.

22                     The timing of this is  
23          appropriate because it is until recently  
24          that this has been declared lawful. And  
25          if it's going to be part of a portfolio

2           of revenue, whether I'm for or against  
3           it, we should look at unintended  
4           consequences.

5                     I'm okay with people  
6           disagreeing on my strategy and my tactic.  
7           I do not take it personal. But please,  
8           please don't question my motivation.  
9           Please do not question when I sit here  
10          and defend the people in deep poverty in  
11          this district and question my commitment  
12          to public education. I have taken a  
13          whole lot of difficult votes here around  
14          public education and my support for young  
15          people. It's not an either/or.

16                    So thank you very much, Council  
17          President.

18                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19          Thank you, Councilwoman.

20                    COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I ask

21          all of my colleagues to continue to  
22          support a process. We don't have to be  
23          comfortable with it. We don't always  
24          have to agree with it, but we do have to  
25          be respectful that we come here

2           representing interests, and my interests  
3           are poor people in my community, store  
4           owners who are now being audited  
5           against for this legislation. So I will  
6           stick to process that I got elected to  
7           serve.

8                         Thank you.

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you, Councilwoman.

11                         (Applause.)

12                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
13           Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

14                         COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
15           you, Mr. President. Just very quickly.  
16           I'll be voting for this resolution. I  
17           understand some of the concerns that were  
18           raised. I think it, in fairness, could  
19           be called duplicative of some other  
20           studies that are being done, but I don't  
21           think it necessarily should be a bad  
22           thing to ask for a study.

23                         I will say, though, that it  
24           should not be interpreted in any way that  
25           some of the members that might be voting

2           for this resolution are in any way in  
3           favor of undoing the soda tax. I want to  
4           state for the record, if the vote came up  
5           again, I'd vote the same way I did the  
6           last time. I think the soda tax was  
7           necessary. I understand some of the  
8           concerns about it, but, again -- and I  
9           would certainly not be for a bill to undo  
10          it at this point.

11                        But I think it is -- we have  
12          asked for studies on a lot of things over  
13          time, and I think it's reasonable,  
14          although I understand the concern, to ask  
15          for this particular study, and I would,  
16          with some hesitation, vote for this  
17          resolution.

18                        Thank you, Mr. President.

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Thank you, Councilman.

21                        The Chair recognizes  
22          Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

23                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes,  
24          Mr. President. I am trying to be as  
25          tight with my comments as possible, and

2           so let me start where Councilman Bill  
3           Greenlee left off.

4                     If the vote came up again, I  
5           would be for the soda tax. The record  
6           should reflect, however, that when we had  
7           the discussions of the soda tax X number  
8           of months ago, it was my office that  
9           looked for alternatives. We looked at  
10          what other municipalities were doing, and  
11          we learned late that the container tax  
12          was a possible alternative, but because  
13          my staff and I did not do our homework  
14          early enough, we could not secure the  
15          vote for the container tax. And the jury  
16          is still out on whether or not the  
17          container tax may have indeed achieved  
18          the same end, with less onerous outcomes  
19          and circumstances to small business.

20                    I have learned as a teacher  
21          that data matters. Data, research  
22          matters, be it 9 o'clock in the morning  
23          or midnight, and it's my understanding,  
24          yes, agreed that a number of studies were  
25          done before the initiative was

2           implemented. Now we have data during the  
3           actual execution of that initiative, and  
4           that data should inform us on how and  
5           what we do going forward.

6                     And so I am for subsequent  
7           research that gives us information that  
8           we did not have but for the soda tax.

9                     Secondly, I actually took a  
10          tour of Shop Rite with Jeff Brown, and I  
11          was disheartened to learn that seniors  
12          are being taxed with the Ensure and  
13          parents who have children who take  
14          Similac are being taxed with the sugar in  
15          Similac. So that is an unintended  
16          consequence. Yes, we should continue the  
17          soda tax, but there is value in looking  
18          to see how and if it is necessary for us  
19          to exempt some of those unintended  
20          consequences.

21                    So, yes, research has value. I  
22          don't care what time it is on the clock.  
23          And the hope is that now that this  
24          important measure has been put in place  
25          and has given us -- because I did ask for

2           the data on how our councilmanic  
3           districts are faring. Children are  
4           benefiting. Parents are benefiting. It  
5           was a necessary action, not a comfortable  
6           one, but a necessary action. We took it.  
7           We need to stand by it. However, there's  
8           still value in getting subsequent  
9           information based on the new evidence  
10          that that research will give us.

11                    So I'm for it now. I'm for it  
12          later. I'm always for data and research,  
13          because we can never have too much  
14          information upon which we use to make  
15          responsible decisions.

16                    Thank you, Mr. President.

17                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18          Thank you, Councilwoman.

19                    Councilman Oh, are you good?

20          Never mind?

21                    COUNCILMAN OH: I'm good.

22                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
23          Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

24                    COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
25          Mr. President. I just wanted to say a

2           couple of things, and I know that there's  
3           been a lot of conversation in the last  
4           week about the bill and the resolution  
5           around soda tax, but I just wanted to  
6           address a couple of things.

7                     The first is that just today,  
8           Ernest Owens from Philadelphia Magazine  
9           came out with what I think is an  
10          excellent article around soda tax and the  
11          disparities in how we have this mixed  
12          message of saying that, well, we want you  
13          to keep drinking soda and have this  
14          unhealthy habit to pay for these programs  
15          and, at the same time, we want you to  
16          stop drinking soda because it's unhealthy  
17          and we'll figure it out some other kind  
18          of way. It's a really strange, mixed  
19          message. So I just really want to  
20          encourage folks to check that article out  
21          for themselves, and I really think it  
22          will give a lot of people a whole  
23          different perspective on this argument in  
24          terms of who is actually paying the tax.  
25          And as I've said before, it's almost as

2           if for folks in poor communities, it's  
3           saying, okay, well, we're going to help  
4           you with your children, we're going to  
5           fix your children, but y'all going to pay  
6           for it. And so that's something that  
7           really needs to be looked at.

8                        As far as the vote and the  
9           timing of the vote, I do take exception  
10          with suggesting that the timing of the  
11          vote is an issue because it's election  
12          time. You are who you are who you are.  
13          You should have your conscience on at all  
14          times. I believe as a member of this  
15          body that how we would vote today should  
16          not differ if it was coming up on  
17          Election Day, if it was the day after  
18          Election Day. Where you are and where  
19          you stand should not be relevant as it  
20          relates to a particular time of year or  
21          election season.

22                       And the one last thing I wanted  
23          to point out is that as far as I know  
24          from speaking with my colleagues,  
25          everyone who has signed onto the bill and

2           the resolution have agreed that the  
3           programs are important. The programs  
4           should stay. How do we fund them is the  
5           question, and that is what folks are  
6           going to be looking at, how do we make  
7           sure that we keep universal pre-K, how do  
8           we make sure that we keep Rebuild and we  
9           keep our Community School programs but,  
10          at the same time, find a better and more  
11          stable way to pay for them.

12                    So I just really wanted to be  
13                    on record with just a couple of things,  
14                    and I look forward to voting for this  
15                    resolution.

16                    Thank you, Mr. President.

17                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18                    Thank you, Councilwoman.

19                    (Applause.)

20                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
21                    Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

22                    COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
23                    Council President. I think everyone on  
24                    this Council is in favor of pre-K and  
25                    Rebuild. I don't think that's the

3           introduced the resolution back in  
4           December to look at this, I had a  
5           different theory on this and I just  
6           wanted to take a look at it, and that is  
7           called the theory of elasticity, where  
8           because at some point -- because there's  
9           been studies done, independent studies,  
10          three economists, I think Yale,  
11          University of Minnesota, University of  
12          Wisconsin, that showed that 42 percent of  
13          the beverage sales in Philadelphia were  
14          reduced. This is an independent study,  
15          not paid for by beverage or the  
16          Administration. Yet within zero to six  
17          miles of the county road, 42 percent of  
18          the sales were increased. And so my  
19          interest is knowing if we were to adjust  
20          the rate, could we still get the same  
21          revenue and should we study that, because  
22          I'd rather have -- if people are going  
23          over and driving to Bucks County or South  
24          Jersey or the Main Line, at least I'd  
25          rather have the business in our city, I'd

2           rather have the jobs in our city, and I'd  
3           rather have the taxes in our city. So my  
4           question is, if we study this, could one  
5           of the questions be on the elasticity of  
6           the rate, if we lower it to one and a

8           we achieve the same revenue and not have  
9           people drive over the line.

10                    So thank you, and I hope that's  
11           part of this study. Thank you.

12                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
13           right. Well, I'm not supposed to speak  
14           up here, so I won't. There's some  
15           limitations of being the Council  
16           President.

17                    Okay. So we have a motion.  
18           Did we do the motion? We need a motion.

19                    Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez

9                   And just for the benefit of any seniors

12                  note for the record that the Ensure that  
13                  Dorothy Parker, my grandmother, used to  
14                  drink and many of you drink -- and I'll  
15                  see you all at the West Oak Lane Senior  
16                  Citizens Center in a few minutes -- it is  
17                  not taxed, but you do know that the very  
18                  specific milkshakes that some doctors  
19                  prescribe, that is what is referenced.  
20                  So, again, the cans of Ensure, Councilman  
21                  Johnson, that I used to go to Pickwell  
22                  for to get for my grandmother, they are  
23                  not taxed, because facts matter too.

24                  In addition to that, to the  
25                  pre-K providers and all of the mothers

3           to note for the record that baby formula  
4           is specifically exempted. If you go  
5           anywhere and they are taxing your Similac  
6           or your Enfamil, they are doing it  
7           against this law, because this law

9                   And I just thought that it was  
10          important while we want to ensure that we  
11          have a data-driven and research-based  
12          process and the last study -- and  
13          elasticity of the tax, Councilman Domb, I  
14          think getting that data is going to be  
15          good. We went through it for the  
16          cigarette tax, so I'm well aware of that  
17          kind of process, but the misinformation  
18          that is often distributed and then I have  
19          to go out and talk to my constituency  
20          today and will have to undo when a senior  
21          citizen says to me, I know you did it in  
22          '16 and I know what you said the reason  
23          was or why you did it, Cherelle, but I  
24          didn't know that my regular Ensure was  
25          being taxed. That's wrong. In addition

3                   specifically exempted.

4                   And I want to just note for  
5                   again the record, I will never, ever  
6                   question what is on the inside of my  
7                   colleagues and what drives us, but there

9                   make me believe otherwise that the timing  
10                  of this legislation being proper -- and  
11                  I'm referencing both the bill along with  
12                  the resolution -- that the timing is so  
13                  that it will significantly impact those  
14                  people particularly in Council districts  
15                  who have opponents that are being funded  
16                  from the industry, and if somebody wants  
17                  me to think otherwise, you're going to  
18                  have a whole lot of convincing to do.
