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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 We're going to get started.

7 To give our invocation this
8 morning, the Chair recognizes Minister
9 Carvin Haggins -- I'm sorry, sir -- of
10 Southern Baptist Church. He is here
11 today as the guest of Councilman David
12 Oh.

13 I would ask all guests,
14 visitors, and members to please rise.

15 (Councilmembers, guests, and
16 visitors rise.)

17 MINISTER HAGGINS: Good
18 morning.

19 (Good morning.)

20 MINISTER HAGGINS: Let us pray.

21 Heavenly Father, we come this
22 morning, Lord, thanking you for all
23 things, Lord. Right now, Lord, we ask
24 you to watch over the City Council, Lord.
25 Allow their decisions to be concise,

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2 Lord. Allow them to be precise, Lord.

3 Allow them to be for the people over
4 profit, for we know with people there
5 come profit, Lord.

6 We ask you just to guide the
7 hearts and minds of our Council
8 President, our Councilmembers. Guide the
9 hearts and minds of our Mayor, Lord.

10 We ask you to look over our
11 first responders, Lord. Find a way to
12 find respect between them and the public,
13 Lord, them giving and receiving as well
14 as the public the same, Lord.

15 We ask you as you're developing
16 our city and it thriving, Lord, we ask
17 you to develop the people which are in
18 those communities, Lord. Allow them to
19 be grown like trees instead of plucked
20 like weeds, Lord.

21 We ask you, Lord, that you just
22 elevate this whole inspiration, Lord. We
23 ask you to move each person that's in
24 this room right now, to let our tongues
25 be guided and our thoughts be moved in

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2 your way and your will, Lord.

3 In all these things we pray in
4 Jesus Christ's name.

5 Amen.

6 (Amen.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you so much, Pastor. Appreciate
9 it.

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you very much. And, again,
14 Minister, thank you for those inspiring
15 words.

16 Our next order of business is
17 the approval of the Journal of the
18 meeting of Thursday, March 21st, 2019,
19 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Greenlee.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. I move that the
23 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March
24 21st, 2019 be approved.

25 (Duly seconded.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. It has been moved and
4 properly seconded that the Journal of the
5 meeting of Thursday, March 21st, 2019
6 stand approved.

7 All those in favor indicate by
8 saying aye.

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and the Journal is
15 approved.

16 Our next order of business is
17 requests for leaves of absence, and the
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
20 Mr. President. On behalf of the
21 majority, there are no requests of leave
22 of absence today.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair thanks the gentleman.

25 The Chair now recognizes

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2 Councilman O'Neill.

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. On behalf of the
5 republicans, there are no requests for
6 leave of absence.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair thanks the gentleman.

9 At this time, I would like to
10 dispense with the regular order of
11 business and I would like to thank
12 everyone who has taken time out of their
13 day to come down to witness their
14 government in action. We hope that your
15 day is a knowledgeable one but, even more
16 so, a pleasurable one, so much so that
17 you come back again. So, again, thank
18 you for being here today.

19 At this time, the Chair
20 recognizes Councilman David Oh, who will
21 present a resolution recognizing the
22 winners of the PHL LIVE Center Stage.
23 Would David Ivory and those accompanying
24 him please join the Councilman at the
25 podium.

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2 (Councilmembers and guests
3 approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 also joining Councilman Oh, we have
6 Councilman O'Neill, Councilwoman Bass,
7 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: All right. So
9 I'll ask the following people and all
10 those involved with PHL LIVE Center Stage
11 to come forward. If you are a winner,
12 would you please stand in front. So that
13 will be Chill Moody; Justin Nordell,
14 Philadelphia Folksong Society; Thomas
15 Camarda, Jazz It Up Philly; Louis
16 Scaglione, President of the Philadelphia
17 Youth Orchestra; Jenny DeHuff,
18 Journalist; Lovett Hines from the
19 Philadelphia Clef Club of Jazz; Rahsaan
20 Lucas, AfroTaino Productions; Vance
21 DeBose, President of Ruffhouse Records;
22 David Ivory, Grammy-nominated engineer;
23 Ghetto Reese on behalf of Sonya McDuffie,
24 Black Maverick Entertainment; Craig
25 White, the Sound Doctor; Mr. Miggs,

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2 Headhunter Entertainment; Cyndy Drue,
3 102.9 WMGK; Brent Porche, 93.3 WMMR;
4 Marilyn Rodriguez, Ahora Si; Bryant
5 Sanders, Photography; Alvin Clay, iRadio
6 Philly; Sem Pierre, Forge Recordings;
7 Andre Saunders and Will. And our
8 winners - the Jayplayers, PRLM CHLD, DJ
9 Slick, Jada Fete, Microphone, Sabriya,
10 Justin Gonzalez, I-Know Brasco, Peace and
11 the City Grease, Camille, of course Brian
12 Cronin, That Mag. And might I say that
13 our invocation was done by two-time
14 Grammy-award winner Carvin Haggins.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are
16 you ready, Councilman?

17 COUNCILMAN OH: All right.
18 Thank you very much, Council President.

19 So this was our --

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Councilman, hold on one second.

22 Folks, can we have a little
23 quiet, please.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: This was our
25 5th Annual PHL LIVE Center Stage, a free

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2 platform for musicians. Just upload your
3 YouTube video at PHLlive.org, and we have
4 Grammy-award winners, Grammy-nominated
5 folks, top music industry, who will judge
6 those videos and then you get to perform,
7 the five finalists, live at some of our
8 best venues.

9 Shout out to Trocadero, which
10 is closing, that for five years has
11 hosted our award show. And win a
12 thousand dollars, free studio recording
13 time, but the most important thing is to
14 have these excellent folks make a
15 judgment, and with all their abilities,
16 we have in front of us the ten category
17 winners and the People's Choice winners.

18 And so with that, this is a
19 resolution recognizing and honoring the
20 2018 winners of PHL LIVE Center Stage.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
23 PHL LIVE Center Stage is a music
24 initiative established by Councilman
25 David Oh as Chairman of the Committee on

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2 Global Opportunities and the

3 Creative/Innovative Economy; and

4 Whereas, PHL LIVE Center Stage

5 provides local musicians with exciting

6 opportunities to be discovered and

7 promoted and to achieve success here in

8 Philadelphia; and

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, PHL

10 LIVE Center Stage's performances and

11 Award Show are structured across 10

12 different genres of music, bringing

13 diverse musicians together. The 10

14 different genres are Rock, Hip-Hop, Jazz,

15 Classical, Gospel, Country/Folk, World,

16 Pop, R&B, and DJ, in addition to the

17 "People's Choice" Award which is selected

18 as the 11th category; and

19 Whereas, this year's finalists

20 performed live in prominent local venues:

21 World Cafe Live, Milkboy, Hard Rock Cafe,

22 Reformation Lutheran Church, the Clef

23 Club of Jazz, Settlement Music School,

24 Voltage Lounge, The Fillmore

25 Philadelphia, and Warmdaddy's; and

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2 Whereas, the final winners for
3 each genre, announced in December at the
4 Trocadero Theatre during the 5th Annual
5 PHL LIVE Center Stage Award Show, were
6 decided by judges who are considered
7 experts in the industry; and

8 Whereas, the "People's Choice"
9 Award is voted on by the audience before
10 and during the Award Show at the
11 Trocadero Theatre; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
13 Whereas, the winning artists from each
14 genre receive top prizes such as \$1,000
15 cash, studio recording time, music
16 videos, documentaries, and opening at
17 major concerts; and

18 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
19 Rock category is Peace and the City
20 Grease; and

21 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
22 Hip-Hop category is I-Know Brasco; and

23 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
24 Jazz category is Wack Cheddar; and

25 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: This is, I

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2 think, the most creative group we've ever
3 had around us up here.

4 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
5 Classical category is Justin Gonzalez;
6 and

7 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
8 Gospel category is Microphone; and

9 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
10 Country/Folk category is the Jayplayers;
11 and

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I want to
13 personally salute Councilman Oh for just
14 lifting up and celebrate those gifted
15 with song and those of you who share it
16 with us.

17 And whereas, the 2018 winner of
18 the World category is Jada Fete; and

19 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
20 Pop category is Sabriya; and

21 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
22 R&B category is Camille; and

23 Whereas, the 2018 winner of the
24 DJ category is DJ Slick; and

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the

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2 2018 winner of the "People's Choice"
3 category is PRLM CHLD; now, therefore, be
4 it

5 Resolved, by the Council of the
6 City of Philadelphia, that it hereby
7 recognizes and honors the 2018 winners of
8 the PHL LIVE Center Stage.

9 Further resolved, that an
10 engrossed copy of the resolution be
11 presented to David Ivory as evidence of
12 the gratitude of this legislative body.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 the Chair recognizes Mr. Ivory for
16 remarks.

17 MR. IVORY: Thank you very
18 much.

19 Good morning, everyone, and
20 what a great morning it is for us.

21 COUNCILMAN OH: I'm going to
22 interrupt just to say he did all the
23 early albums of The Roots.

24 MR. IVORY: He's funny.

25 I got to say that Councilman Oh

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2 is one of the biggest cheerleaders of all
3 of the music business here in
4 Philadelphia, and I truly thank you for
5 that.

6 Obviously thanks go out to
7 Councilman Oh and his incredible staff
8 who work extremely hard to make this PHL
9 LIVE event a success. To all the judges,
10 the volunteers, and interns who show up
11 to support this event, they do it for one
12 reason and one reason only - to celebrate
13 the great music being made right here in
14 the City of Philadelphia.

15 Can you believe it? This is
16 five years, right?

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. IVORY: The dedication to
19 providing a vehicle for emerging talent
20 here in the City is crucial in protecting
21 our great musical history. We all must
22 support and bring awareness to everyone
23 and how much of our homegrown music and
24 artists contribute to our local economy
25 and how important it is as a community to

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2 provide an environment to support them.

3 Speaking of supporting our
4 music community, a recent PHL finalist in
5 the R&B category, Julian King, has just
6 moved to the next round of The Voice.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. IVORY: Also many of you
9 may know, with Councilman Oh's leadership
10 and City Council's support, the Music
11 Industry Task Force was formed more than
12 a year ago to identify and come up with
13 recommendations to help foster the
14 development of the music business here in
15 the City. Initiatives like having old
16 and new Philadelphia music playing as you
17 travel through the Philadelphia
18 International Airport to parking relief
19 for musicians loading in and out of
20 venues all contribute to the pride and
21 respect we have for our music industry
22 and for the work that's being done by the
23 Music Industry Task Force.

24 In the beginning, PHL LIVE
25 represented an idea, an idea that we can

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2 do more as a community to showcase our
3 talent. Now with so many venues closing,
4 it has turned into a need. And as some
5 of our finalists start rising through the
6 music business ranks, we must provide the
7 same opportunity for those about to come
8 up.

9 This is a great city. This is
10 a great music town, and thanks to all of
11 you, it will remain that way.

12 Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Council will be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And,
18 again, congratulations.

19 At this time, the Chair
20 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
21 will present a resolution recognizing
22 Amir Ford, Kasir Sadiq Patterson, Tauhid
23 Collins, Kashon Crawley, Zahier Perkins,
24 Emmanuel Patterson, and Darryl Jones.
25 Would the young men and those

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2 accompanying them please join the
3 Councilwoman at the podium.

4 (Councilmembers and guests
5 approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
7 joining the Councilwoman, we have
8 Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman Brown,
9 Councilwoman Bass, Councilman Johnson,
10 Councilman Oh, and Councilman Curtis
11 Jones.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
13 you, Mr. President. We are honored to
14 make this presentation for young people
15 who have done their part to try to help
16 in the lives of others.

17 We note that we have a mother
18 and grandmother here for Tauhid Collins,
19 as he is no longer with us, and we are
20 honored that they have come to be here to
21 accept our presentation.

22 The Council of the City of
23 Philadelphia is pleased and proud to
24 honor and recognize Kashon Crawley,
25 Darryl Jones, Tauhid Collins, Emmanuel

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2 Patterson, Zahier Perkins, Kasir Sadiq
3 Patterson, Amir Ford, and Quashon Brown
4 for their display of altruistic bravery
5 in assisting one of their fellow
6 residents; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
8 on Sunday, April 22nd, 2018, a two-car
9 collision took place near 59th Street and
10 Washington Avenue, leaving one car
11 smoking and flipped onto its side and
12 having knocked out the traffic lights for
13 that intersection; and

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: A woman and
15 her children were trapped inside a
16 flipped over vehicle, unable to remove
17 themselves, as the car continued to
18 release smoke; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
20 Kashon Crawley, Darryl Jones, Tauhid
21 Collins, Emmanuel Patterson, Zahier
22 Perkins, Kasir Sadiq Patterson, Amir
23 Ford, and Quashon Brown were playing
24 basketball nearby and heard the woman
25 scream for help. They immediately rushed

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2 to the vehicle to assist in freeing the
3 woman and her children. Despite the
4 danger to their safety, they proceeded to
5 break through the car windows and doors
6 in order to liberate the woman and
7 children from the wreckage; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
9 the quick thinking and selfless actions
10 of these young men led to the safe
11 outcome of a potentially deadly
12 situation. Neighbors who witnessed the
13 act of heroism expressed pride in the
14 boys; and

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the
16 actions of Kashon Crawley, Darryl Jones,
17 Tauhid Collins, Emmanuel Patterson,
18 Zahier Perkins, Kasir Sadiq Patterson,
19 Amir Ford, and Quashon Brown serve as a
20 shining example of bravery,
21 civic-mindedness, and the very definition
22 of brotherly love;

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So this is
24 a bright moment serving in this chamber
25 having the opportunity to honor these

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2 young people who were in the right place
3 at the right time, and I just want to put
4 on notice the Daily News and the Inquirer
5 and Channel 10 and Channel 6 to make sure
6 you cover the positivity that our young
7 people are doing here in the City of
8 Philadelphia.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: This is
11 what it's really about.

12 Therefore, by virtue of this
13 citation, the Council of the City of
14 Philadelphia wishes to thank and honor
15 Kashon Crawley, Darryl Jones, Tauhid
16 Collins, Emmanuel Patterson, Zahier
17 Perkins, Kasir Sadiq Patterson, Amir
18 Ford, and Quashon Brown for acts of
19 selflessness and heroism in the aid of
20 those in need. We extend to them the
21 respect and appreciation of this
22 legislative body, and we all want to say
23 congratulations.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

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2 the Chair recognizes Michelle Collins for
3 remarks.

4 MR. FORD: How y'all doing? I
5 don't really know what to say, but I just
6 thank everybody for coming out and
7 everybody for appreciating our bravery
8 and what we did. And if I could do it
9 again, I would.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. FORD: There's a lot of bad
12 stuff going on in my neighborhood, and to
13 come out for something like this, it mean
14 a lot, and I just -- I don't know. Thank
15 you. Thank you, everybody.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you.

19 Council will be at ease.

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you and, again, congratulations for
23 your serious heroism.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Taubenberger.

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2 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
3 you, Mr. President. I'd like at this
4 point to acknowledge a Pennsylvania State
5 Trooper who is with us, a former staffer
6 of this very City Council under
7 Councilman Jack Kelly. His name is Matt
8 Taubenberger, and I would like him to
9 stand up and be recognized.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
12 right. Thank you, sir.

13 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: And
14 he happens to be my son, and a very proud
15 dad I am.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

18 And thank you for your service,
19 sir.

20 At this time, the Chair
21 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
22 who will present a resolution honoring
23 Philadelphia's philanthropic women
24 leaders in recognition of Women's History
25 Month. Would Tiffany Tavarez and those

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2 accompanying her please join the
3 Councilwoman at the podium.

4 (Councilmembers and guests
5 approached podium.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
7 Mr. President.

8 As is our custom every March,
9 we like to lift up women on the occasion
10 of the celebration of Women's History
11 Month. We have lifted up and celebrated
12 women in the arts, women in tech, women
13 in entrepreneurship/small business, and
14 this year after conferring with my staff
15 we thought it appropriate given the
16 season that we are in, that of service,
17 that we would honor Philadelphia's
18 philanthropic women leaders. So I'm
19 honored and privileged to be a part of
20 saluting a diverse group of women that
21 embody the spirit of service through
22 civic leadership and their commitment to
23 philanthropy.

24 We know that philanthropy is a
25 cornerstone of society that has

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2 positively helped shape our country and
3 the City and indeed influences our
4 future. It is a force of power that
5 meets all kinds of needs in all of our
6 communities across 141 square miles of
7 the City of Philadelphia.

8 It's imperative that
9 Philadelphia continue to lift up its
10 philanthropic leaders and encourage each
11 one of them to continue their fight
12 against poverty and all the negative
13 factors and challenges facing our city.

14 These women around me
15 understand and appreciate the legacy we
16 must all bestow: to inspire people to
17 think about what they can do, large or
18 small, for the corner of the world that
19 they occupy. Not to mention these women
20 have pledged to invest in themselves and
21 to other women, particularly younger
22 women, who are committed to building a
23 bench of high-quality young leaders.

24 It's vitally important to help
25 each other and know we can't walk in each

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2 other's shoes. We can certainly walk
3 side by side to them to support each
4 other.

5 Lorina Marshall-Blake's -- one
6 of her favorite authors and mine too,
7 said it best: I have learned that you
8 shouldn't go through life with a
9 catcher's mitt on both hands. You need
10 to be able to throw something back.

11 And so with that, a resolution
12 honoring Philadelphia Philanthropic Women
13 Leaders in Recognition of Women's History
14 Month.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
16 philanthropy plays a vital role in the
17 health and vigor of the City of
18 Philadelphia and our nation. By working
19 together with non-profits, businesses,
20 government, and everyday citizens,
21 philanthropy improves community
22 conditions and contributes to the civic
23 life and leadership through the
24 responsible use of networks, research,
25 and advocacy; and

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
3 according to Giving USA's Annual Report
4 on Philanthropy for the Year of 2017,
5 charitable giving, for the first time
6 ever, exceeded \$400 billion in 2017,
7 spurred by growth from individuals,
8 foundations, giving by bequest, and
9 corporations. In fact, giving by
10 individuals in Fiscal Year 2017 increased
11 by 14.27 billion; and

12 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
13 Pennsylvania Foundation reported that
14 Pennsylvania is home to 5,299 foundations
15 with a giving amount of 1.1 billion in
16 2017. Accordingly, the Philadelphia Area
17 is home to 1,916 foundations with assets
18 of 14.6 billion and a giving amount of
19 1.3 billion in 2015; and

20 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
21 Whereas, philanthropy plays an important
22 role in the development of good business.
23 A 2017 survey by Robert Half Management
24 Resources found that social
25 responsibility is important for firms as

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2 they serve communities, improve employee
3 morale, networking, reputation-building,
4 brand awareness, and recruiting and
5 retention benefits; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
7 it is imperative that Philadelphia
8 continue to lift up its philanthropic
9 leaders for those that stand on the
10 forefront of social change, while
11 continuously developing creative and
12 innovative solutions that positively
13 transform our lives every day. Desmond
14 Tutu said it best, "Do your little bit of
15 good where you are; it is those little
16 bits of good put all together that
17 overwhelm the world"; and

18 Whereas, the Reverend
19 Dr. Lorina Marshall-Blake is the
20 President of Independence Blue Cross
21 Foundation and Vice President of
22 Community Affairs at Independence Blue
23 Cross. Reverend Marshall-Blake was
24 instrumental in helping to define IBC
25 Foundation's mission of leading solutions

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2 for healthier communities in 2011. Under
3 her leadership, the IBC Foundation has
4 established itself as a philanthropic
5 local powerful force and received the
6 2014 Corporate Foundation of the Year
7 Award from the Association of Fundraising
8 Professionals, Greater Philadelphia
9 Chapter. As an expert in philosophy,
10 Ms. Marshall-Blake has coined the phrase,
11 quote, "We are meant to serve. We must
12 reach back and give back," and I would
13 say pull somebody up along the way. In
14 addition to her corporate responsibility,
15 Reverend Marshall-Blake serves as an
16 associate minister at the Vine Memorial
17 Baptist Church. She exhibits a strong
18 commitment to the community and is
19 affiliated with over 30 professional and
20 civic organizations. Reverend
21 Marshall-Blake is also an Honorary Fellow
22 of the American Academy of Nursing, and
23 has been honored for her leadership and
24 community service by a gazillion
25 organizations such as the NAACP, Girl

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2 Scouts of Eastern Pennsylvania, who are
3 here today, the Philadelphia Tribune, the
4 League of Women Voters, Philadelphia
5 Business Journal, Living Beyond Breast
6 Cancer, and the United Way of Greater
7 Philadelphia and Southern New Jersey; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
9 Sharmain Matlock-Turner, a/k/a the
10 General, is the President and CEO of the
11 Urban Affairs Coalition. She began her
12 tenure in 1999, as the first woman to
13 lead the Coalition. Mrs. Matlock-Turner
14 and her team of more than 350 employees
15 create partnerships and build consensus
16 to help families reduce poverty and
17 improve the quality of life in the
18 region. Under Mrs. Matlock-Turner's
19 leadership, the Urban Affairs Coalition
20 has successfully managed more than \$1
21 billion in social capital invested in
22 initiatives that include, but are not
23 limited to, programs to end homelessness,
24 HIV/AIDS education, quality pre-K, and a
25 key consultant in improving contracting

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2 and employment opportunities for women
3 and people of color in commercial
4 construction. Mrs. Matlock-Turner also
5 serves on several boards, including
6 Peirce College Board of Trustees,
7 Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia,
8 and Mayor Kenney's Workforce Development
9 Steering Committee. In addition,
10 Mrs. Matlock-Turner has received numerous
11 awards recognizing her hard work and
12 commitment to families and communities.
13 Over the years, she has been the
14 recipient of the Citizen Volunteer of the
15 Year Award from the United Way of
16 Southern Pennsylvania and New Jersey, the

19 Cross Clara Barton Award, and the Women
20 in the NAACP Award. Sharmain
21 Matlock-Turner has dedicated her career

25 say about Evelyn Hidalgo that I met her

19 else's willingness to give.

20 I wouldn't have been a
21 Philadelphian or gotten into the field I
22 did if it wasn't for those who wanted to
23 give me the same opportunity that all of
24 us try to provide for others.

25 We know that philanthropy is

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Henon.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. I have no bills or
19 resolutions today. Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you, Councilman.
22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Jones.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. Please, I'm addicted,

6 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
7 resolution condemning Pennsylvania State
8 Representative Stephanie Borowicz's
9 religious invocation on the day of the
10 swearing-in of the first Muslim woman to
11 ever serve in the General Assembly as
12 Islamophobic and inappropriate.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
14 week's Calendar.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES:
16 Mr. President, may I speak on that?

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Sure. The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Jones.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. I just want to take a
22 moment to talk about religious tolerance.
23 William Penn, the founder of
24 Pennsylvania, was an advocate for
25 democracy, freedom of speech, freedom of

2 religion, and found his way here because
3 he himself faced religious persecution in
4 England.

5 But today we face a lack of
6 tolerance, a lack of acceptance, a lack
7 of inclusion, and that lack of tolerance
8 and acceptance starts all the way up in
9 the White House, goes through our State
10 House, and winds up in our individual
11 homes and playgrounds. That top-down
12 kind of lack of tolerance started in the
13 White House, but the other day was
14 exhibited in the State House. Where
15 there should be brotherly love and
16 sisterly affection, there was a visceral
17 nature to a speech as Movita
18 Johnson-Harrell, the first Muslim woman
19 sworn in to the State House, was being
20 sworn in.

21 Now, I have a good relationship
22 with all my colleagues, and whether I'm
23 at 2 Street in South Philly or in the
24 hinterlands of the Northeast, my
25 colleagues make me feel welcome. They

2 accept me as I am. I don't have to
3 change who I am. And I want them to know
4 if they come to my district, I'm not
5 saying everybody will ever agree with
6 them all the time on every topic, but
7 they will never ever feel unwelcome in my
8 district or in an environment I happen to
9 be in.

10 That kind of tolerance to one
11 another is taught, and it has a rippling
12 effect. It is courtesy to allow people
13 to express their ideas, be who they are,
14 and then accept them where they are
15 without making them feel less than.

16 And so I would encourage our
17 colleagues at the state level to be more
18 civil. Maybe it will trickle up to the
19 White House and the -- what is he?
20 Number what? Forty-five? Maybe he will
21 catch on to that as well, and maybe it
22 will go global. But it starts with us.
23 It extends to the State House, and we
24 just can't sit by and let people just
25 deliberately make people feel

2 uncomfortable and unwelcome.

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. I move that the rules of

13 All in favor please indicate by
14 saying aye.

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it, the motion carries, and we
21 will consider the Consent Agenda shortly.

22 The Chair again recognizes
23 Councilman Henon for the purpose of
24 calling up bills and resolutions on the
25 regular Second Reading and Final Passage

3 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. In addition to the bills
5 being considered on the Consent Agenda,
6 the following resolutions and bills are
7 being called up from Second Reading and
8 Final Passage Calendars today: They are
9 Bill Nos. 190214, 190215, 190216, 190217.
10 All other bills and resolutions are being
11 held.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 Before considering the bills
15 and resolutions on our Final Passage
16 Calendar today, we will have our public
17 comment session. It will go as follows:

18 If you have signed up at the
19 table to my left -- if you have not, you
20 may do so now.

21 When your name is called, you
22 will go to the middle of the Council
23 Chambers. There is a podium. There is a
24 device on that podium. When the light
25 turns green on that device, it will be

3 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to

10 Mr. Decker, please call the
11 first name on the list.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Patricia Libbey,
13 commenting on 181063.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. LIBBEY: Good afternoon. I
18 am here to speak about the liquefied gas
19 plant in Southwest Philadelphia. Some
20 things I would like to remind, notify the
21 City Council of, because they're going to
22 be voting on this, I take it, pretty
23 soon.

24 Easter is a wonderful time of
25 giving, especially for children. They

2 love the baskets. They love the things
3 in the baskets. They want the candy.
4 They want the marshmallow bunnies, all of
5 that.

6 With our natural gas plant,
7 we're going to be giving some amazing
8 gifts to the children in Southwest
9 Philadelphia as well as across
10 Pennsylvania. We're going to be giving
11 the gift of going to see Jesus up in
12 heaven before they see their mothers'
13 faces, because they're going to be
14 stillborn, but they'll get to see him
15 before maybe we do.

16 Secondly, things that we can
17 put in their Easter baskets. We can add
18 the masks for those who have asthma so
19 that they can easily find them when they
20 need them. We can put in the skin creams
21 for all those red rashes that they're
22 going to have. I've heard that spoken
23 about in Harrisburg before the Harrisburg
24 building.

25 We can put in the pain

2 medications, all their Tylenol for their
3 stomachaches so hard that they can't even
4 go to school. We've heard about that
5 happening too.

6 Of course, there's always the
7 things maybe that are too big for the
8 Easter baskets, the medications for
9 cancer and the treatments, the various
10 treatments they'll be receiving for that.
11 And, of course, for those with the
12 neurological problems we're going to be
13 creating, we can give them the special ed
14 teachers that will be able to help them
15 through their education.

16 We're such wonderful donors to
17 all of these children in our city and
18 across our state and across our nation
19 with what we're doing with gas and with
20 fracking. I hope you all consider this,
21 remember this as you get the baskets
22 together for your children,
23 grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

24 Have a blessed Easter.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Nicole Karsch,
5 commenting on 181063.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MS. KARSCH: I'm here to speak
10 in opposition to Bill 181 --

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
12 state your name for the record.

13 MS. KARSCH: My name is Nicole
14 Karsch. I'm here with the Sunrise
15 Movement to speak in opposition to Bill
16 181063, but more than that, I'm here to
17 speak in favor of a green new deal for
18 Philadelphia.

19 We have 11 years to radically
20 mobilize every aspect of our society in
21 alignment with what science and justice
22 demand in order to avoid the climate
23 crisis, a jobs crisis, and a healthcare
24 crisis, and we need solutions to do that.
25 A green new deal would guarantee that we

2 have 100 percent renewable energy
3 infrastructure. It would guarantee that
4 every person who wants a good
5 union-paying job would have one, and just
6 one and not three to make rent. And it
7 would guarantee that the people who have
8 been at the front line of environmental
9 racism in Philadelphia for generations
10 would receive justice.

11 The people living in Southwest
12 Philadelphia are in South Philadelphia
13 with asthma rates because of the oil
14 refineries. They don't deserve a new gas
15 plant going up in their backyard.

16 The energy contract for the LNG
17 plant is a 25-year commitment to fossil
18 fuels, and we have 11 years to radically
19 move our society away from fossil fuels,
20 so it doesn't make sense to sign people
21 up for jobs where for 14 years of it we
22 don't want to be burning fossil fuels.
23 We don't want it to be economically
24 feasible.

25 But I really wish that I wasn't

1 3/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 even talking about this, because I only
3 want to talk about solutions, but until
4 that bill goes on hold, I fear for my
5 future that I'm going to take on a gas
6 plant. I'm going to take on the death
7 that we're going to create by moving away
8 from fossil fuels and then publicly
9 owning a gas plant for the next 15 years.

10 So that's why it's very
11 important that we hold the bill on LNG,
12 but really talking about a green new deal
13 as a solution. The Sunrise Movement sent
14 the Philadelphia green new deal draft to
15 every member of Council earlier this
16 week. We sent a questionnaire that you
17 can fill out so that we can endorse you
18 and your candidacy.

19 We're asking people in
20 Philadelphia to step up and champion
21 solutions or step aside, because we have
22 a lot of people who are running for seats
23 who are willing to champion the solution,
24 and we're running out of time.

25 And so that is where I will

2 leave you. I really hope that we can
3 work together for these solutions.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 MS. KARSCH: Thanks.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Abby Leedy,

9 commenting on 181063.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

12 afternoon.

13 MS. LEEDY: Hello. My name is

14 Abigail Leedy. I'm 17 years old and I'm

15 a senior at Central High School.

16 The proposed LNG plant is a

17 liquefied natural gas plant, and I was

18 taught in my public school that plants

19 like it are good because they're not

20 coal. The fact is that extracting

21 natural gas and burning it in our

22 community still releases massive amounts

23 of greenhouse gases into our atmosphere.

24 It also releases nitrous oxide, which

25 causes asthma and other extremely

2 dangerous respiratory diseases.

3 I ask Council what you all
4 think will happen if we knowingly give
5 our most vulnerable communities asthma,
6 which young people are more likely to
7 develop, and then send them into public
8 schools that often do not have full-time
9 nurses.

10 When we release even more
11 carbon and methane and climate-destroying
12 gases into the air, is it somehow okay
13 because it's caused by natural gas and
14 not coal or something worse?

15 I'm here today because better
16 than coal is not a metric we have the
17 luxury to use anymore. We cannot say
18 that poisoning our children and
19 communities and releasing greenhouse
20 gases that continue to create the climate
21 crisis is okay, because we could
22 hypothetically be killing people faster.

23 The fact is that young people
24 in Philadelphia will spend much longer
25 breathing this air than you will. The

1 3/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 air you create now, the air you vote to
3 contaminate or not is the air we will
4 have to breathe for the rest of our
5 lives. The damage you will cause if you
6 look to approve the LNG gas plant is
7 damage that will be felt most by the
8 people too young to vote you in or out of
9 office.

10 The fact is that beyond just
11 our air, the consequences of burning
12 fossil fuels are the consequences we will
13 live with for the rest of our lives. The
14 fact is that every fossil fuel project,
15 natural gas or otherwise that this
16 Council approves, will create dire,
17 life-threatening, family and
18 community-destroying consequences that we
19 will live with for the rest of our lives,
20 that I will live with for the rest of my
21 life.

22 Plants like LNG don't just
23 poison our air. They create and continue
24 to create the climate crisis. Plants
25 like LNG are the climate crisis.

1 3/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 You can do something. You all
3 have a choice. I know it's hard to see
4 it, but the climate crisis, the floods,
5 the droughts, the hurricanes, the fires,
6 the poisoned air and water, the unlivable
7 future, the destruction that will follow
8 me, it starts with votes like this one.
9 It starts with people saying it's easier
10 to stick with small incremental change,
11 and natural gas is probably okay, but
12 it's just one small plant in one corner
13 of one city that's cheaper or that the
14 lobby is pushing for that are convincing
15 and have deep pockets, but ignoring the
16 science because it's convenient. It
17 starts with legislators elected to serve
18 the interests of the people. Serving the
19 interest of the fossil fuel industry
20 instead, even at the time, it feels like
21 a small concession.

22 I want to be clear. The
23 climate crisis starts with votes like
24 this one. It starts with you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Leslie Spina,
5 commenting on 170408.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MS. SPINA: Good afternoon,
10 members of City Council. My name is
11 Leslie Spina. I'm the Executive Director
12 of Kinder Academy. We operate five
13 highly rated childcare centers in
14 Northeast Philadelphia. We've been a
15 partner with the School District of
16 Philadelphia for more than ten years.
17 We've been in the Keystone STARS program,
18 a quality initiative, from the inception
19 and have operated the highest levels from
20 the beginning. We serve a diverse
21 population in the Northeast. The one
22 thing they have in common is economic
23 instability.

24 Typically I would be here to
25 talk to you about the importance of early

1 3/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 childhood education, the impact of said
3 on the future of our city. Although that
4 is near and dear to my heart, today I'm
5 here to talk about student suspension and
6 expulsion.

7 At a time when we are seeing
8 disproportionate numbers of brown and
9 black children facing suspension and
10 expulsion, especially boys, something
11 must be done. Sadly, we see this trend
12 in early care and education too. Now is
13 the time to do something.

14 So although I said I'm not here
15 to discuss early care and education,
16 that's only half true. In seeking out
17 solutions to the suspension and expulsion
18 escalation in our schools, there's one
19 preventative measure that I can suggest.
20 Research shows that there's a correlation
21 between access to high-quality early
22 childhood education programs and
23 environments and later school success.

24 Invest early and invest wisely.
25 Expose children to an environment where

2 expectations are high, hands-on learning
3 opportunities abound, and becoming a
4 productive part of the community is the
5 expectation, laying the foundation for
6 ongoing and continued success. This is
7 what our children need, and this is what
8 our community needs.

9 We are so fortunate that our
10 great city sees value in this, sees the
11 values in our youngest citizens, our
12 children. By enacting the sweetened
13 beverage tax, this City Council took
14 steps to ensure that our children enter
15 school on a level playing field. Dollars
16 from this tax fund a variety of programs
17 that support children and communities,
18 including early care and education
19 through the development of Philly Pre-K,
20 a preschool program for three- and
21 four-year-old children in our city.

22 The children that have been
23 fortunate enough to access the so far
24 limited numbers of spots available in
25 this program have benefited from

1 3/28/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 high-quality, hands-on experiences led by
3 qualified teachers in classrooms with
4 age-appropriate and developmentally
5 appropriate materials and activities.

6 Again, research indicates that
7 children that receive an early childhood
8 experience that is high in quality with a
9 developmentally sound curriculum and
10 aligned to appropriate milestones and
11 expectations are set on a course, a
12 trajectory of ongoing school success.
13 The research shows that investing in
14 high-quality early care and education
15 return seven to tenfold for every dollar
16 we spend. We see gains in reduced grade
17 retention, reduced juvenile crime and
18 incarceration, reduced teen pregnancy,
19 reduced special education placement,
20 higher overall educational attainment,
21 including increased school graduation
22 rates.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

25 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Regi Huc,
3 commenting on 170408.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 afternoon.

7 MR. HUC: Good afternoon. My
8 name is Regi Huc and I'm an
9 Administrative Director for TYL II
10 Preschool and Learning Central Preschool
11 located in West Philadelphia in District
12 3 represented by Councilwoman Blackwell.
13 I'd like to thank Councilwoman Blackwell
14 for voting for the original sweetened
15 beverage tax bill and not co-sponsoring
16 the recently introduced Bill 190183 that
17 could potentially eliminate the sweetened
18 beverage tax.

19 Both Learning Central Preschool
20 and TYL II are STAR 4 centers, and TYL II
21 currently partners with Philly Pre-K with
22 60 slots to provide high-quality early
23 learning opportunities for the community.
24 High-quality centers like ours are an
25 important component to reducing

2 suspension/expulsion of elementary-aged
3 students, and Philly Pre-K is essential
4 to our ability to give children and
5 families the services they need.

6 With Philly Pre-K, people do
7 not have to look outside of their
8 community for opportunities to properly
9 educate and prepare their children for
10 life outside the home. Literacy and
11 academics are important, but much more
12 goes on at our centers. Firstly, we are
13 a safe space. We protect children. We
14 are there to ensure no child is being
15 abused or neglected. We are all mandated
16 child abuse reporters.

17 We provide nutritious meals for
18 children who are hungry. This has a
19 direct impact on their cognitive
20 development, their ability to focus,
21 listen, and be happy children.

22 We can recruit and afford to
23 pay people who are educators and not
24 babysitters, people with degrees that
25 pair academic knowledge and their love

2 for children to partner with parents in
3 their child's development.

4 In high-quality centers like
5 ours, children practice socializing in
6 safe spaces. They practice what
7 behaviors are acceptable and what
8 behaviors cause conflict. Teachers help
9 them to engage with their peers and
10 adults in the program. The kids work
11 independently. They learn self-control,
12 self-discipline, and gain self-awareness.

13 Parents are also introduced to
14 how children function outside of the home
15 and how to engage in communicating with
16 teachers about challenging personal
17 issues and concerns or the expectations
18 and dreams they have for their children
19 in an appropriate manner.

20 Philly Pre-K allows us to be a
21 hub for the community and to help
22 children develop socially and emotionally
23 within their community. Early support,
24 identification, and intervention are the
25 keys to preventing many social and

2 emotional issues that children might
3 experience in grade school.

17 believe it is a benefit for the young
18 children and help them gain the
19 fundamental skills they need to prepare
20 them for higher learning.

21 I am a grandmother of twin boys
22 that have been attending the preschool
23 program for two years at TYL II. They
24 are reading, writing, and have basic math
25 skills. It is also helping them with

2 their social skills as they enjoy
3 interacting with other children.

4 The teachers and staff are very
5 nurturing, and students are keeping them
6 focused and interested in learning. This
7 is an excellent program and good for all

10 kindergarten and help them learn and grow
11 in a healthy way.

8 180938 is a package of bills
9 that have been introduced by Councilwoman
10 Reynolds Brown dealing with the serious
11 issue of childhood lead poisoning. Two
12 of these bills have already been passed,
13 and this bill, one of the two, require
14 that in pre-1978 City-owned or occupied
15 properties or the involvement of
16 expenditures in properties of primarily
17 City funds, a lead-safe certification
18 would be required.

19 I have to say that Councilwoman
20 Reynolds Brown and her staffer Julian
21 Thompson have been real champions, true
22 champions of prevention of childhood lead
23 poisoning.

24 The requirement of a lead-safe
25 certification before occupancy after the

2 renovations in these properties would be
3 basically a visual inspection by a
4 certified lead inspector and also doing
5 dust wipes in accordance with EPA
6 standards to determine whether or not
7 hazardous dust still remains in the
8 property. This bill, like the other
9 bills and two that are coming up, are
10 critical, and I strongly hope that
11 members of the City Council support these
12 bills.

13 Thank you.

12 Last week, Council honored yet
13 another 6ABC employee, with the ceremony
14 attended by Disney ABC management.
15 Beware of the source. Is a reporter of
16 facts maxim? Would a reporter of facts
17 be happy to receive an award that would
18 make Joseph Goebbels proud? Has
19 mainstream media refused to keep the
20 people informed? Is mainstream media
21 receiving quid pro quo awards for doing
22 so? Should Disney, CBS, NBC, and others
23 be required by the people to report facts
24 or be denied access to public airwaves?

25 Jefferson stated, if we are to

2 remain free, it is the responsibility of
3 every American to be informed.

4 The U.S. Attorney General
5 McSwain correctly identified the failure
6 to perform a known duty or task is
7 illegal and causes great harm. Military

10 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
11 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
12 duty. Your oath of office requires you
13 to act or face prison.

14 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
15 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
16 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
17 through 28, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
18 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
19 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
20 14-4056 appear violated.

21 I call on the federal and
22 Commonwealth governments to perform their
23 constitutional obligations to investigate
24 and prosecute all involved in the theft
25 and illegal deed transfer of my home,

3 The denial of God-given 42 USC
4 1982 property rights for 25 years is

23 Those opposed?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

3 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
10 been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
19 Recognizing and Honoring Project HOME on
20 the Occasion of its 30th Anniversary,
21 introduced by Councilman Oh.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you
25 again. I move for the adoption of the

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2 resolution.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
5 been moved and properly seconded.

6 All those in favor say aye.

7 (Aye.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Those opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

13 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
14 other resolutions on the Final Passage
15 Calendar, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

18 Any speeches on behalf of the
19 minority?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Speeches on behalf of the majority?

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilwoman Gym.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you

2 very much, Council President.

3 So Glen Mills School, after 193
4 years of being in business, is formally
5 shut down. At its peak, it housed about
6 a thousand young men and boys. It spoke
7 at the time to the mass
8 institutionalization and incarceration of
9 young men in the criminal justice system
10 and the juvenile justice system. It had
11 a culture of intimidation, aggression,
12 and abuse, and it promoted these under
13 the belief that somehow it would be okay
14 if the boys didn't talk about it, if they
15 hid behind the glamorous grounds of their
16 facility, if they could show off star
17 sports and behind beefed-up staff
18 members.

19 Those things came to light in a
20 shocking video last June that showed a
21 young man being beaten multiple times by
22 staff members that finally started a
23 criminal investigation, but it took a
24 couple of us in this body to stand up and
25 demand that DHS and our City agencies

2 would not reopen intake to that building
3 and to that facility until we were
4 assured that those boys could be safe.
5 And then in February, there was a
6 horrifying expose by the Philadelphia
7 Inquirer and a Pulitzer Prize-winning
8 reporter, who we're grateful is here in
9 this city, named Lisa Gardner who exposed
10 how serious the abuse was, how long it
11 had been going on, how traumatic it was
12 to young people, and the fact of the
13 matter was was that this wasn't just
14 about whispers and rumors anymore. This
15 wasn't just about stories that were told,
16 but that it was real crime, a conspiracy
17 to intimidate and harass, a coverup that
18 was happening at the highest levels. And
19 with a hundred million dollars of City
20 money at stake that goes from DHS into
21 residential treatment facilities, we had
22 a call to action.

23 I think the thing that was
24 really hard through this whole process
25 was, we demanded that our boys be pulled

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2 immediately, and thank God they were,
3 because when the state came in and
4 published their report two days ago and
5 ordered an emergency removal of those
6 boys based on the belief that their very
7 lives were actually in danger, those
8 things all happened between the date that
9 the Inquirer posted its investigation in
10 February until the state action declared
11 an emergency removal order. That
12 included a young man who had a jaw broken
13 in an assault by two staff members, was
14 told to put his broken bones on ice, not
15 sent to a medical facility, and was sent
16 to the nurse the next day. That included
17 individuals who were punched in the face,
18 punched in the chest, young men who were
19 intimidated, harassed, told to sign
20 papers.

21 This was more than just
22 something that was done by a group of
23 rogue agents. This is a problem that is
24 happening in residential treatment
25 facilities all across the United States.

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2 We are implicated and complicit when we
3 do not take action. They do not have
4 appropriate oversight, and we are doing
5 wrong by young people.

6 So I want to thank my colleague
7 on this, the person I would call and text
8 in an emergency and panic about what was
9 happening so that he could talk to me
10 through some of this stuff. I want to
11 thank Kenyatta Johnson for being an
12 extraordinary partner in this. I want to
13 thank all the members of this body who
14 allowed the Committee on Children and
15 Youth to move forward on a full task
16 force last June, even when it was not
17 quite certain about what we had to do,
18 but you heard the call that action had to
19 be taken.

20 We are reducing the number of
21 young people. We have raised the
22 attention of the courts. It has gone all
23 the way up to the state. But it started
24 in this body with the people around this
25 room who took the time to listen to the

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2 stories of young people in April of 2018,
3 whose stories were so often overlooked,
4 whose stories were neglected and not
5 heard, but this body heard them.

6 Change has happened. Justice
7 will always be elusive, but at least
8 change is happening. I'm grateful to
9 this body. I'm angry that it took us
10 this long to have something move on stuff
11 that we knew was going on for a really
12 long time. But justice will come for
13 some. Peace and resolution will take a
14 long time coming, but this body is on the
15 right path. I'm grateful to every single
16 person who stood up in a moment of
17 extreme injustice. And the fact that a
18 municipal city body helped lead this
19 charge really means the world to me and
20 should emphasize even more how important
21 our work is to calling people to
22 accountability and seeking justice when
23 it's needed.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Green.

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
6 Council President.

7 I want to remind my colleagues
8 that we will be having a briefing after
9 Council today with the Barristers'
10 Association of Philadelphia. I'm a proud
11 member of the Barristers' Association,
12 having been an attorney for over 20
13 years.

14 The Barristers' Association was
15 established in 1950. It represents
16 professional needs and development needs
17 of black lawyers in the City of
18 Philadelphia, and as part of the national
19 Bar Association, there's approximately a
20 thousand lawyers and jurists in the
21 region who are members of the Barristers'
22 Association.

23 So I hope my colleagues will
24 join me in this briefing how we can
25 partner in the future regarding the

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2 number of issues that are important for
3 justice in the City of Philadelphia and
4 where the Barristers can play a role to
5 help your staff and help members of this
6 body and the City as a whole.

7 One other thing I wanted to
8 raise was the resolution I introduced
9 today. I introduced a resolution
10 condemning the Trump administration on
11 their decision to zero out funding to
12 Special Olympics. This is something that
13 is -- I couldn't even -- I can't even
14 begin to form the words to articulate my
15 anger and the just ridiculousness of this
16 type of concept.

17 Councilwoman Blackwell
18 introduced a resolution regarding the
19 Penn Relays Carnival. On that same day,
20 Special Olympics of Pennsylvania will
21 have their spring games here in the City
22 of Philadelphia, something I've attended
23 over the years. And the audacity that
24 the Education Secretary of the federal
25 government, Betsy DeVos, who is only in

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2 that position because she is married to
3 Dick DeVos, who is the CEO of Amway, she
4 has no qualifications to be the Education
5 Secretary. When she was going through
6 her confirmation hearings, myself and
7 some members of this body protested
8 outside Senator Toomey's office during
9 the Tuesdays with Toomey movement,
10 because she was not qualified to be
11 Education Secretary. And she
12 demonstrated her lack of qualifications
13 during her Senate confirmation hearing.
14 When various members of Congress asked
15 her about the IDEA Act, she had no idea
16 what that meant. The IDEA Act is
17 legislation that basically enables to
18 make sure that people with disabilities,
19 especially young people with
20 disabilities, get access to public
21 education. She had no clue what that
22 legislation meant. Yet she wanted to be
23 the Education Secretary.

24 October 2017 she took away 72
25 regulations to help to protect students

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2 with disabilities and took those out of
3 the things that she does as Education
4 Secretary. And then with this proposed
5 budget where President Trump in March
6 25th of this year proposed a \$4.72
7 trillion budget, they zeroed out funding
8 for Special Olympics. Her statement was
9 she was taken out of context to a lot of
10 great organizations and that the news
11 media -- I think she even used the phrase
12 "fake news" -- was incorrect.

13 But budgets demonstrate where
14 people's responsibilities are, what their
15 desires and what they want to do and what
16 they value, and the fact that we zeroed
17 out Special Olympics is just
18 unbelievable. The fact that this
19 administration has spent \$45 million
20 alone just in travel from Washington, DC
21 to Mar-a-Lago and Bedminster and that you
22 will not spend \$17 million out of a \$4.72
23 trillion budget on Special Olympics for
24 the least of us in this country?

25 It's something I just could not

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2 believe as an elected official that we
3 would have this type of perspective in
4 the White House. Where are the John
5 McCains of the world? I'm glad that at
6 least two republican senators, both
7 Senator Blunt and Congressman Cole, said
8 this will not pass, and I'm hoping other
9 members of the President's
10 administration -- I'm sorry; the
11 President's party step up in Congress to
12 make sure this does not happen. But it
13 just truly demonstrates the nature and
14 the mentality we have currently in our
15 federal government. And we'll be voting
16 on this resolution next Thursday, which
17 coincidentally as we go into April next
18 month is Autism Awareness Month, and the
19 fact that we even have to have a
20 conversation about zeroing out dollars
21 for young people who do not have
22 lobbyists like people for Boeing and
23 other large corporations even lobby for
24 funding is just unbelievable.

3 Thank you, Councilman. I concur.

4 The Chair recognizes

5 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes,

7 Mr. President.

8 To Councilman Derek Green, I
9 would say that's the truth. Mayor Street
10 often said that society will be judged on
11 how we treat our children. Therein lies
12 the truth.

13 To Councilwoman Gym and
14 Councilman Kenyatta, thank you for being
15 strong, active, engaged listening voices
16 for those young people at Glen Mills. As
17 a former residential counselor at a
18 facility for adjudicated delinquent girls
19 that was the sister school to Glen Mills,
20 it's regretful that 30 years later they
21 had to have their license taken away from
22 them for the right reasons.

23 On another topic, there are 16
24 zip codes in Philadelphia covering nine
25 out of ten councilmanic districts where

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2 more than 10 percent of our children
3 still get screened with elevated lead
4 levels.

5 With that back text, I want to
6 thank my colleagues for your vote on Bill
7 No. 180938. One criticism we received in
8 the gazillion meetings that I've had with
9 both the Administration and others who
10 care about this issue is that government
11 was not doing enough, where is
12 government's responsibility when it comes
13 to buildings that are affected with lead.
14 And so this bill today will require that
15 City buildings which undergo a major
16 renovation now also must be certified as
17 lead free and lead safe.

18 My office has traveled to
19 Baltimore, Maryland to see how they do
20 it. We've sat down with folks from
21 Rochester, and we attended a national
22 conference on lead a couple of weeks ago,
23 all in an effort to figure out how we can
24 do better with regards to children being
25 poisoned by lead.

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2 We are looking for a win-win
3 scenario, not a win-lose scenario. So
4 our discussions will continue with the
5 landlord community, advocates, and the
6 Administration as we seek to do better
7 with regards to children being poisoned
8 by lead.

9 Lastly, if I can have a gig
10 where I can do arts and culture nine days
11 a week, I'd be a happy soul. In that
12 spirit, I want to lift up Councilman Oh
13 for your Philly LIVE Center Stage. It is
14 a rich, diverse mix of genres and all
15 aspects of music. So I salute you,
16 Councilman Oh, for just putting
17 Philadelphia on center stage when it
18 comes to the rich talent we have here in
19 our City. Congratulations.

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilwoman.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Domb.

25 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,

2 Council President. I'd be remiss if I
3 didn't bring this up at this time and,
4 that is, that we're three weeks away from
5 the EITC filing, and there's only two
6 more Council sessions after this. I just
7 want to repeat some numbers for those
8 that are listening.

9 We have 400,000 people in the
10 City in poverty, 228,000 qualified for
11 the Earned Income Tax Credit, 40,000 do
12 not apply. We continue to leave a
13 hundred million dollars in Washington,
14 DC.

15 And to give you some examples,
16 if you have no children under the age of
17 17, the maximum credit is \$506, but you
18 can file back three additional years. So
19 you're talking about just over \$2,000.

20 If you're a single parent and
21 you have two children under the age of 17
22 and your income is 44,000 or less, or
23 you're a couple, two children under the
24 age of 17, your income is 51,000 or less,
25 you can get checks from the federal

2 government of up to \$5,700 and you can
3 file back three additional years, for a
4 total of \$23,000. That's a lot of money.

5 The Revenue Department does a
6 good job in helping us. United Way does
7 a great job. Campaign for Working
8 Families does a great job also. They'll
9 fill out the returns for free.

10 So I just want to mention it
11 because we're two weeks away, Council
12 President, and I think it bothers all of
13 us that we leave this money on the table
14 when 10 percent of our people in poverty
15 could get these checks.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
22 Council President.

23 I just wanted to bring to the
24 attention a very serious issue that we're
25 facing, not only as a city but also as a

2 nation on two fronts. One is the issue
3 of youth gun violence here in the City of
4 Philadelphia. Today I'll be out in my
5 community talking to residents and
6 consoling some family members regarding
7 the double homicide that took place in
8 the Point Breeze community.

9 So we must stay vigilant in
10 making sure that, one, we get the guns
11 off the street; two, provide alternatives
12 for our young people to get involved in
13 things that are positive as opposed to
14 picking up guns.

15 But also there was a report in
16 the Philadelphia Daily News some time ago
17 this month that talked about the life
18 expectancy of African American young men.
19 There are a variety of different issues,
20 such as, again, gun violence, health, and
21 other negative side-effects of living in
22 low-income environments that have a
23 significant impact on the life expectancy
24 of African American young men.

25 So being a father of two boys

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2 that I'm raising here in the City of
3 Philadelphia, it's a critical concern of
4 mine that they grow up in an environment
5 where they can grow and thrive, as their
6 dad, and I have that same urgency for
7 other people's children.

8 So we must stay laser-like
9 focused on, one, getting the guns off the
10 street and making sure that we're
11 aggressively pushing forward a strategy
12 to reduce gun violence here in the City
13 of Philadelphia and also making sure
14 we're paying a close eye on addressing
15 the issue of life expectancy of African
16 American young men.

17 Thank you very much, Council
18 President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 There being no additional
22 speeches, the Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
24 to adjourn.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
