2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. We're going to get
4 started. We're running very late. If
5 the members will take their seats and all
6 visitors and guests will retire behind
7 the rail, we can get started.

8 And if we can ask for a little
9 quiet, please, so we can have our
10 invocation. Thank you.

11 To give our invocation this
12 morning, the Chair recognizes the
13 Reverend Owen Gowans of Mount Moriah
14 Temple Baptist Church. He is here today
15 as the guest of Councilwoman Blondell
16 Reynolds Brown.

17 I would ask all members,
18 guests, and visitors to please rise.

19 (Councilmembers, guests, and
20 visitors rise.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Again, Reverend, thank you so much. We

12 really appreciate you being here today.

13 Our next order of business is

14 the approval of the Journal of the

15 meeting of Thursday, March 28, 2019, and

16 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

18 you, Mr. President. I move that the

19 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March

20 28, 2019 be approved.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you. It has been moved and

24 properly seconded that the Journal of the

25 meeting of Thursday, March 28, 2019 stand

3 All those in favor say aye.

4 (Aye.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Those opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 ayes have it, and that Journal is
10 approved.

11 And our next order of business
12 is requests for leaves of absence, and
13 the Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. On behalf of the
16 majority, there are no requests of leave
17 of absence today.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair thanks the gentleman.

20 The Chair now recognizes
21 Councilman O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. On behalf of the
24 republicans, there are no requests for
25 leave of absence.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair thanks the gentleman.

4 At this time, I would like to
5 dispense with the regular order of
6 business and I would like to thank
7 everyone who has taken time out of their
8 busy day to witness their government in
9 action. We genuinely appreciate you
10 being here today. We hope that your stay
11 here today is a knowledgeable one but,
12 more importantly, a pleasurable one, so
13 much so that you come back again. Again,
14 thank you so much for being here.

15 At this time, the Chair
16 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
17 will present a resolution recognizing
18 Lynne Carter.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Would Ms. Carter and those accompanying
22 her please join the Councilwoman at the
23 podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining Councilwoman Blackwell, we have
4 Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman Bass,
5 Councilwoman Gym, Councilman Henon, and
6 Councilman Green and Councilman Domb.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
8 Mr. President, tell me what the Boxing
9 Hall of Fame doesn't mean in
10 Philadelphia.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Councilwoman, it means we need a bigger
14 stage, I'll tell you. This is great.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Yes,
16 indeed.

17 We are honored. We want to
18 recognize some people. I have a little
19 list. I don't have them all because
20 Judge Jackie Frazier-Lyde is standing
21 right in front of me, and we are so happy
22 to have some of those, and you let us
23 know so that if I don't mention you, tell
24 Lynne. She'll make sure she mentions
25 you.

2 Champ Tim Witherspoon; Champion
3 Nate Miller; boxing promoter Vernoca
4 Michaels, Blue Horizon, we all know her;
5 boxing writer George Hanson; even from
6 college, Elmer Smith, former Daily News
7 editor, who has been honored here in this
8 Council.

9 MS. CARTER: And boxing writer,
10 Ken Hissner.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: All
12 right. At the end, Mr. President, we'll
13 ask that John DiSanto and Elmer Smith
14 make remarks, along with Lynne, if that's
15 all right, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Absolutely.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
19 that took a long time to narrow that
20 down, I'm telling you.

21 We are so honored to present
22 this resolution recognizing and honoring
23 Lynne Carter for her momentous induction
24 into the Pennsylvania Boxing Hall of
25 Fame.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: You
4 all know this reminds me of Lucien
5 Blackwell. Just cannot help it.

6 Whereas, in February of 2019,
7 Lynne Carter was inducted into the
8 Pennsylvania Boxing Hall of Fame; and

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas, a
10 Philadelphia native, Lynne Carter has had
11 a career in boxing for over 35 years.
12 She was an apprentice under Commissioner
13 James J. Binns, Executive Secretary
14 Francis Walker, and Chief Inspector
15 Charles Campbell. She was trained by
16 Smokin' Joe Frazier, the former
17 Heavyweight Champion of the World, and
18 Carol Polis, the first female Boxing
19 Judge in the United States, on the basics
20 of boxing; and

21 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, in
22 1982, she became one of the first females
23 to start judging in Philadelphia, and
24 later became licensed in New Jersey. Her
25 goal was to work in Atlantic City, even

2 though at the time that was a challenging
3 task in a male dominated field; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
5 during her career, Lynne has had to
6 overcome many obstacles. Her knowledge
7 of the sport would be questioned because
8 of her gender. However, Lynne did not
9 let the negativity of other people stop
10 her ambition; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
12 Lynne's reputation grew with time and she
13 established herself as one of the elite
14 judges of the sport. She was the first
15 female to judge a fight in Connecticut.
16 She was the first African American female
17 to judge a fight in New Jersey.
18 Additionally, she was the first African
19 American female to judge for the World
20 Boxing Association, the World Boxing
21 Organization and the World Boxing Union;
22 and

23 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: And
24 whereas, I've been waiting almost 40
25 years to stand here.

2 And whereas, Lynne has judged
3 over 750 boxing matches across six
4 different continents. She has judged
5 many world title matches, including Johns
6 Hopkins I, Judah-Rangel, Ademek-Gunn,
7 Gamgoa-Solis, Ibragimov-Briggs, as well
8 as many other non-title fights; and

9 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
10 Lynne has received many awards and
11 accolades for her work. In addition to
12 being inducted into Pennsylvania Boxing
13 Hall of Fame this year, in 2012, Lynne
14 was inducted into the New Jersey Boxing
15 Hall of Fame; and

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
17 Lynne has crossed paths with many legends
18 in the sport. She herself has become a
19 legend in her own right. She has paved
20 the road for other women to enter into
21 the boxing arena and the boxing world.
22 She has trained, she has assisted
23 upcoming female apprentices in
24 Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and she will
25 continue to be her best and strive for

2 more; and

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And

4 whereas, Lynne Carter, Eighth District

5 resident, 22nd Ward committee person;

6 now, therefore, be it

7 Resolved, that the Council of

8 the City of Philadelphia, hereby

9 recognizes and honors Lynne Carter for

10 her momentous induction into the

11 Pennsylvania Boxing Hall of Fame.

12 Further resolved, that an

13 engrossed copy of this resolution be

14 presented to Lynne Carter as a sincere

15 expression of the Council of the City of

16 Philadelphia's gratitude, admiration, and

17 recognition.

18 Congratulations.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

21 you, Dr. Portay too. I see you.

22 They come from here and far.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Councilwoman Blackwell, you want Ms.

25 Carter to speak first or do you want the

2 other individuals?

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: No.

4 She wants to speak last.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Okay.

7 Mr. Smith.

8 MR. DiSANTO: Hello, everyone.

9 I'm John DiSanto from the Pennsylvania
10 Boxing Hall of Fame, and we're obviously
11 all here to celebrate Lynne. She's truly
12 had an historic career, more than 35
13 years judging, as you've heard, judging
14 important fights all over the world, and
15 as a result, next month, May 19th, she
16 will be officially inducted into the
17 Pennsylvania Boxing Hall of Fame.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. DiSANTO: Lynne made it
20 through the ballot process, and her name
21 was on the ballot and she received the
22 most votes in her category, which is the
23 non-boxer category, and this is a very
24 tough category, because boxing judges
25 compete with managers, who compete with

2 trainers and cut men and everyone that
3 doesn't actually put on the gloves. So
4 very competitive category and it's an
5 honor very well deserved.

6 Lynne has been at it for, as I
7 said, more than 35 years and she's going
8 strong. So she still got a long ways to
9 go in this business.

10 So anyway, so congratulations,
11 Lynne.

12 MS. CARTER: Thank you. Thank
13 you, John.

14 (Applause.)

15 MR. SMITH: Thank you for this
16 opportunity to come here and say
17 something about my friend. Lynne and I
18 don't see each other as much as we used
19 to when I was still in the boxing game,
20 but if I was to characterize her
21 friendship in any way, I would say two
22 words - ever and always. If she was ever
23 your friend, she was always your friend.

24 She's always my friend, but she
25 is somebody who -- when I left this

2 Chamber years ago as a City Council
3 reporter and went into sports and covered
4 boxing, I expected that I was in the
5 business that is not necessarily
6 distinguished by its integrity. Lynne
7 Carter represented real integrity. I
8 remember when she started, I remember
9 when Smokin' Joe was working with her and
10 Carol, Eva Shain and others who preceded
11 her, and I just knew from the first time
12 I met her that she had the kind of
13 character and integrity that would stand
14 her in good stand in a business that was
15 the wrath of both, to be frank about it.
16 And she's done and been everything that I
17 assumed that she would be. She's carried
18 herself with dignity and distinction, and
19 she is one of the best boxing judges that
20 I've seen across the years.

21 (Applause.)

22 MR. SMITH: Those of you who
23 know me know that I'm a feminist, and so
24 to some extent, what we are celebrating
25 here is a victory for feminism over the

2 years.

3 I remember when Lynne started,
4 you weren't supposed to be doing this.
5 This was not a job for a woman,
6 especially a woman who did not grow up in
7 that sort of rough and tumble world of
8 boxing. But she comported herself so
9 well. She's distinguished herself over
10 the years, and I'm honored to have this
11 chance to say a few words in her behalf.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 the Chair recognizes Ms. Carter for
15 remarks.

16 MS. CARTER: First, I'd like to
17 say thank you to Council President
18 Darrell Clarke, Councilwoman Jannie
19 Blackwell, and all members of City
20 Council. This is such an honor. You
21 talk about, wow, I came here with a
22 speech. I think I forgot it. Okay? I'm
23 so excited. I'm so excited with so many
24 people that have come out to support me
25 in this boxing world - my friends, my

2 family, my neighbors from Vernon House,
3 you know, and it's just overwhelming
4 right now.

5 But I just want to tell you a
6 little bit about me and how I got
7 started. I was young. I was in my 20's
8 and I decided I had to look for a job.
9 So a friend of mine, we were looking for
10 this job, and prior to that, I had gone
11 to the fight with four brothers, okay?
12 And I liked it, and I picked the winner
13 of the fight.

14 So they said, you know, wow,
15 you're pretty good.

16 So I said, okay, I'm pretty
17 good at picking these winners. So since
18 I'm looking for a job, I went up to the
19 State Athletic Commission right out
20 nowhere and said, listen, I want to be a
21 judge. And they tried to discourage me a
22 little bit, and I said, no, I want to be
23 a judge.

24 And so they said, well, where
25 are you going to train?

2 I didn't know nowhere to train,
3 because I didn't know nobody in that.
4 Okay? And so the only place I knew was
5 Smokin' Joe Frazier's gym that was on
6 Broad Street. So I said, okay.

7 We took the subway up there.

8 We went up there to Smokin' Joe
9 Frazier's, and I walked into the
10 secretary and I said, excuse me, but I'd
11 like to speak to Joe Frazier.

12 And she said, well, who is this
13 girl coming up in here to speak to Joe
14 Frazier? And she says, well, what is it?

15 I said, listen, I want to be a
16 boxing judge and I want Joe Frazier to
17 train me. And she probably thought I was
18 crazy.

19 Well, Joe wouldn't come out at
20 first, and then he did come out. And
21 then the funny part about it was, the
22 secretary -- Joe asked me a question
23 about a champion, and he said, what do
24 you think? Do you think they'll be a
25 good champion?

2 And I was going to say yes, and
3 she was behind him saying, no, no, no,
4 no. So I said, no, of course not.

5 He said, Imma train you. He
6 said, I don't like judges, I don't like
7 referees, and I don't like announcers,
8 but I'm going to train you. And you know
9 what? And that's how it started.

10 I went to that gym religiously
11 for three or four days a week, and it was
12 a very, very popular gym. Everybody was
13 coming to Joe Frazier's then. I didn't
14 pay no attention to none of that. I came
15 there to learn, to find out what I had to
16 do, because I know I was breaking into a
17 man's world. And it's truly a man's
18 world. And he trained me. He did
19 everything. He trained me on the basics
20 of boxing. He made me get in the ring
21 and put the -- act like I'm boxing with
22 him, and he showed me all the basics.
23 And once I did that and got my license in
24 New Jersey, my goal was -- no; my license
25 in Philadelphia. My goal was New Jersey.

2 I got that license in Philadelphia in
3 three months. I was in New Jersey in
4 September, and then it began.

5 I was so nervous the first
6 fight that I did. I mean, so, so nervous
7 that it was a glass in front of me and I
8 went to get that glass to have a drink of
9 water. I couldn't even reach it. I
10 could not reach that glass. I said, oh,
11 my God. But when the bell rang, I got --
12 you know, that was it.

13 And then them people that came
14 to the fight in New Jersey on the
15 Tropicana on Tuesday night fights, they
16 were the worst. What's that young girl
17 know up there? What she know about
18 boxing?

19 I'm like, oh, my God. So that
20 made me even nervous. I'm the only
21 female down here. They treat me -- I got
22 to sit downstairs and wait. I can't go
23 up with the guys in the room. I had to
24 do everything separate because I was the
25 only female and the first black female in

2 there.

3 So it was just -- it was
4 something. Okay? But once I got
5 started, now -- like I said, I was
6 nervous then. Now I can walk in the
7 room, hey, y'all. What's up? You know
8 what I'm saying? So that meant such a
9 difference.

10 But I want to just say a couple
11 of highlights that took place in my life
12 with boxing. Boxing has been very, very
13 good to me. Okay? It has allowed me to
14 travel around the world to places that I
15 would never see. You know what I'm
16 saying? I got my favorite places I like,
17 Japan and China and Italy and South
18 Africa, you know. It has done this for
19 me, and the good part is, you get paid.
20 You know, you meet everybody, you see all
21 these people out there, you meet some of
22 the best people in the world, and you get
23 paid. Okay?

24 And another highlight was --
25 one of my other favorite highlights is,

2 in 1984 I got a letter from the
3 Philadelphia Bar Association, and they
4 were honoring pioneers, you know, women
5 pioneers. So I wasn't going to go to
6 that. I was working. I wasn't going to
7 go. I thought, well, let me go around
8 here and get some lunch. So I didn't
9 even invite anybody. I had two tickets.
10 Because I'm kind of low profile. I don't
11 really say a whole lot about what I do or
12 whatever the case may be. Matter of
13 fact, my family probably don't know all
14 the stuff that took place with me.

15 But anyway, I said, let me go
16 around here. So I went around there, and
17 it was all these people there from the
18 Bar Association and the people that they
19 were honoring. It was the first female
20 black gynecologist, Dr. Helen Dickens.
21 It was Mae Jemison, the first female
22 astronaut, and it was Lynne Carter. I'm
23 like, what? So the funny part is, all
24 the time that I've been judging boxing, I
25 never -- I'm low-keyed with it, so half

2 the people, like I said, don't know,
3 because I don't never talk about it, you
4 know. I never talk about it.

5 So I'm like nervous right now.
6 So many -- so the other thing too was
7 like being trained by Joe Frazier. I
8 didn't realize that that was such a big
9 deal, but he was such an icon, you know,
10 and him and I got a good relationship.
11 That's how I met Jackie and Pete and all
12 these people in boxing.

13 They have great people in
14 boxing, you know. And even today, I have
15 to say this, because we have some people
16 that came down today from New York, Robin
17 and Eddie and Jean Grant. They're judges
18 and referees from New York. Okay?
19 Bernard just texted me last night and
20 said, Lynne, I'm not going to be able to
21 come. I'm still in LA. Larry Hazzard
22 was supposed to come and say a few words.
23 He said, Lynne, we got this big fight
24 next week I gotta get ready for, and he
25 has to get it situated because --

2 Rhonda's going.

3 But those people was coming
4 out, just like people today. I am so
5 thankful for everybody that came out to
6 support me today. Y'all have no idea how
7 elated I am about all of this. I mean,
8 we got a crowd up in here, don't we?

9 (Applause.)

10 MS. CARTER: So I won't hold
11 you too much longer, but what I do have
12 to say, y'all, I'm trying to say, I tried
13 to train women and tried to say, listen,
14 I'll teach you, because I would like to
15 see more women. We only have nine women
16 in the world. Okay? We have nine women
17 in the world, and I'm thankful for being
18 the first to be able and to do a lot of
19 these things in all the world
20 organizations and this and that. And now
21 I give seminars, the whole nine yards.
22 Who would have thought this? I never
23 thought boxing would have brought me
24 here. I never thought -- because my
25 favorite sport is basketball. So I never

2 thought.

3 So I just want to say thank you
4 to everybody. Thanks for all my friends.
5 Thanks for my family. Thanks for just
6 everybody that came down from out of
7 town. It is just a blessing, and I want
8 to say thank you, Jesus. Hear me?

9 So thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Council will be at ease.

13 (Council at ease.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you and, again, congratulations.

16 At this time, the Chair
17 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. Together with you, I
20 wanted to welcome 20 students from
21 Friends Select School. They're up in the
22 balcony to our left here, watching our
23 government in action. One of the fine
24 schools in the City.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Please stand.

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: So I
4 wanted to recognize them.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Thank you for coming down. Appreciate
8 you being here today.

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
10 you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
14 Mr. President.

15 For too long, Mr. President, my
16 colleagues and I, who are loyal
17 Philadelphia fans, have been subject to a
18 fan among us who supports a
19 non-Philadelphia team. Today that will
20 change.

21 Support our Philadelphia teams,
22 whether it's the Phillies, the Sixers,
23 the Eagles, the Flyers, all Philadelphia
24 teams. So I'd like to call upon William
25 Foster to please remove his Dallas

2 Cowboys hat.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN DOMB: And replace
5 it with a Philadelphia sports team hat.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
8 my God.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you. Thank you. And next week you
12 will be inducted into the Cameraman's
13 Hall of Fame. Thank you so much.

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 At this time, the Chair
16 recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

17 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Yes,
18 Mr. President. At this time, I would
19 like to ask for a standing moment of
20 silence. Councilman David Oh's mother
21 passed away on Friday. She was 98.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you.

24 Will you all please stand.

25 (All Councilmembers, guests,

2 and visitors standing.)

3 (Moment of silence.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Our
5 condolences, Councilman.

6 Thank you. At this time, the
7 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones, who
8 will present a resolution recognizing Ron
9 Wilch. Would Mr. Wilch and those
10 accompanying him please join the
11 Councilman at the podium.

12 (Councilmembers and guests
13 approached podium.)

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Ladies and
15 gentlemen, Ron Wilch, a proud resident of
16 the Eighth Councilmanic District, once
17 said that the suit won't make the man,
18 but the suit will make the interview. He
19 said, dress for the job you want, not the
20 job you have, and taught a lot of people
21 in this room that want to claim it how to
22 build a wardrobe. And for a lot of
23 people who came from inner cities where
24 that wasn't the norm, he said -- and I'll
25 do it in my Ron Wilch voice -- first you

2 must have your blue suit. It must be
3 red, white, and blue - white shirt,
4 striped tie, and blue suit. And then you
5 build your browns and then you build your
6 stripes and then you build your wardrobe.
7 And for me some years ago, that was a
8 very important lesson, because I was a
9 poor boy from West Philly and we didn't
10 talk about those things.

11 But Mr. Wilch and his lovely
12 family and particularly his wife, Julie,
13 took that concept around the world as an
14 ambassador for the City of Philadelphia
15 and the fashion industry. He went and
16 traveled the world wide, from China to
17 Chinatown, from the Far East to the Far
18 Northeast, where he taught in prisons.
19 He taught not only the art of tailoring,
20 but the art of fashion and took it to a
21 new height, all the way up to Madison
22 Avenue from Philadelphia Prisons, from
23 Fashion Montage, which was always in
24 Germantown, to Boys to Bosses. And just
25 a second to talk about that, how that

2 building of a wardrobe for a young person
3 on their first interview was critical.
4 You only have one chance to make a first
5 impression. If you choose to make that
6 impression making a statement and having
7 clothing that is unacceptable, then that
8 is a conscious decision, but to make sure
9 that it wasn't an unconscious decision,
10 and that is what I've always loved about
11 them.

12 And as you can see, behind me
13 all of the people, well dressed people,
14 here always follow Julie's and Ron Wilch,
15 the fashion czar's, advice.

16 So I'm here recognizing and
17 honoring Ron Wilch and his family, who
18 have risen to become the biggest forces
19 in the Philadelphia fashion industry.

20 Whereas, Philadelphia has long
21 been a leader in the design and
22 manufacturing of textiles and wearing
23 apparel, with many notable Philadelphia
24 designers making significant
25 contributions to this industry. For the

2 past 20 years in Philadelphia, he has
3 been the host of many notable fashion
4 events, including Paris in Philadelphia,
5 Fashion Montage, Philly Fashion Expo, and
6 Fashion is an Art.

7 And I'll also mention a less
8 famous member of his family named Eve,
9 right?

10 Whereas

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
12 whereas, Ron Wilch of the Eighth Council
13 District has become one of the biggest
14 forces in the Philadelphia fashion
15 industry. He has been designing and
16 involved in the fashion industry for over
17 35 years; and

18 Whereas, in addition to
19 creating designs for his own clothing
20 line, Ron Wilch Collection, he operates
21 his business, The Wardrobe Clinic,
22 located at 1500 Walnut Street, in the
23 heart of Center City. A few notable
24 celebrities in his client list include
25 Eddie Murphy, Will Smith, and Katy Perry;

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
4 not only is Ron Wilch a fashion icon, his
5 wife Julie, his right arm, Julie Wilch is
6 a well-known fashion show producer and
7 has served as a Backstage Manager for
8 Philly Fashion Week for the past ten
9 years.

10 I might add, she's a fabulous
11 model on the runway too.

12 Her daughter, Grammy Award
13 winning music artist Eve is admired for
14 her profound sense of style and was the
15 creator and driving force behind the
16 Fetish brand. Mr. Wilch's son, Farrod
17 Wilch, is also making a mark on the
18 fashion industry through his private
19 label fashion brand, Motion, businessman,
20 making the Wilch family leaders in the
21 Philadelphia fashion industry; and

22 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, in
23 2017, Philadelphia Magazine acknowledged
24 Ron Wilch's outstanding work in fashion
25 at the Wardrobe Clinic, declaring him

2 "Best Tailor" in their annual Best of
3 Philly issue; and

4 Whereas, Mr. Wilch routinely
5 gives back to his fashion roots by
6 hosting a fashion networking event
7 Fashion Night Out, which gives an
8 opportunity for both established and
9 emerging designers to showcase and market
10 their brands on a larger platform. As a
11 result of this increased exposure,
12 employment in the manufacturing industry
13 in Philadelphia is on the rise; now,
14 therefore, be it

15 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Resolved, by
16 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
17 that it hereby recognizes and honors Ron
18 Wilch and his family as the "First
19 Fashion Family of Philadelphia," for all
20 they do to encourage the growth of
21 Philadelphia's fashion industry.

22 Further resolved, that an
23 engrossed copy of this resolution be
24 presented to Ron Wilch as evidence of the
25 sincere admiration and respect of this

2 legislative body.

3 Congratulations.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

6 Chair recognizes Mr. Wilch for remarks.

7 MR. WILCH: I want to thank the

8 Council. Thank you, Council President.

9 Thank you, Councilman Jones and Cindy

10 Bass and all. Listen, this is such an

11 honor. I'm very emotional right now.

12 I want to say this: I'm born

13 and raised in Philadelphia. I had an

14 opportunity to leave Philadelphia many

15 times - Chicago, St. Louis - but I

16 stayed. When Wilson Goode was the Mayor

17 and Philadelphia Dresses the World was

18 building, I was a part of that first time

19 in 1987. That year I met my wife. I won

20 the Award for Excellence. That year

21 later, in '92, we did Paris in

22 Philadelphia at the Academy of Music,

23 first show for myself and the first show

24 for her to produce, 300 people showed up,

25 sold-out crowd. I was honored. We had

2 other designers. We never charged
3 designers. We always promote designers.
4 We always promoted the industry, because
5 I know. I'm born and raised in
6 Philadelphia. I worked in Botany 500,
7 Fishman and Tobin's, Cycek and Sons,
8 these vacant factory buildings. I lost
9 jobs, from job to job. I know how it
10 feel to get laid off, doing piece work,
11 bundle boy. But my skill and
12 tailoring -- I want to thank my teacher
13 who passed away, Christopher Ramsey from
14 Thomas Edison High School. My pattern
15 and design teacher, Michael Pedolino, who
16 passed away, taught me pattern making.
17 For those two men gave me the skill to
18 dress some famous people.

19 I'm called constantly to LA and
20 other places to do things, but now I want
21 to take it further. I'm 58 years old,
22 and what I have learned, I must pass on.
23 So we did a deal a couple days ago.

24 Can I say this, Councilman?

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Go ahead,

2 let them know.

3 MR. WILCH: We just did a deal.
4 I have dedicated from this day forward to
5 invest my time and money and equipment
6 into public schools. We are going to
7 do --

8 (Applause.)

9 MR. WILCH: We just did a deal
10 with Overbrook. Overbrook, we are going
11 to start a summer camp in May, free of
12 charge to the kids, but the neighborhood
13 adults is allowed to come and learn the
14 basic sewing, how to put on buttons.
15 You'd be surprised that people can't sew
16 on a button today, and this is a shame.

17 So what I have learned in my 36
18 years in the industry is to give it back
19 to young people, because our young people
20 are the driving force in the fashion
21 industry. We must put the trades back in
22 high school.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. WILCH: I know quick
25 response is want to give money, but they

2 don't have the opportunity. They don't
3 know how. So I'm going after corporate
4 dollars. I'm going after bailed out
5 banks who got the bailout money in 2008.
6 I'm going after corporations who have big
7 box stores in our neighborhood and give
8 nothing back. I am determined to create
9 jobs. I am determined to leave something
10 behind. I am determined to leave a
11 legacy.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. WILCH: So I promised my
14 mother in 1979 when I told her, I said,
15 mom, I like this tailoring thing in high
16 school, because my brother here, Sherman
17 Wilch, Sherman, this was my example of
18 how to dress. My father was coming and
19 going, but he was my example how to
20 dress. My big brother, he has the
21 perfect closet. Sweaters was perfectly
22 neat, shoes were -- he had shoe trees in
23 his shoes, tailored suits, silk and wool
24 slacks. And I asked my mother, I said,
25 mom, I want to wear what Sherman has, and

2 he said, Ma, Ronald can't wear this
3 because this is tailor made. I'm like,
4 why it's -- tailor made, meaning that
5 it's made just for your specification and
6 your size, your measurements. At that
7 time, I was telling him that means I was
8 too tall for his pants.

9 But I promised my mother when I
10 was in high school, I said, mom, if you
11 buy me a sewing machine, you wouldn't
12 have to buy me no clothes. And a week
13 later in '79, she took me to 12th and
14 Cherry, Al's Sewing Machine, a black
15 Singer. I still have it. From that day
16 forward, I never looked back.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. WILCH: I like what I do.
19 I like to look sharp. I like to teach
20 fashion, but now I'm on another level.
21 I'm going to teach product designing,
22 product development, product packaging,
23 marketing. I'm known in 50 states and
24 four countries. I got friends around the
25 world.

2 So young people -- this is my
3 mission. They want to be trained. They
4 want a job. But I'm going to teach them
5 self-employment, because I know in
6 politics it's hard to create jobs out of
7 thin air, right? You got to have
8 budgets, you got to set law, but if I
9 could teach you how to pin up a suit, how
10 to take measurements, how you can show a
11 person fabric and show them how to style
12 and dress, you become a self-employed
13 worker instantly.

14 I know Macy's and department
15 stores are looking for fitters and
16 stylists, but most people in those
17 department stores, they don't know how to
18 fix you up, they don't know how to pin
19 you up, they don't know how to take your
20 measurements. But imagine young kids
21 coming out of high school can measure you
22 up, come in your office, pin up your
23 suit, mark you for your alterations, bag
24 it up, bring it to the factory, bring it
25 to Overbrook, do alterations, and deliver

2 it back to you in a quality package at a
3 reasonable price, and it's for a good
4 cause. They not stealing. They not
5 robbing. They looking sharp, with their
6 pants pulled up.

7 We got to set examples. My
8 wife and I, we produce shows. We're
9 going to do fundraisers for events for
10 good causes. We're going to raise money.
11 Imma reach out to Hollywood. Imma reach
12 out to Eddie Murphy. I'm reaching out to
13 Will Smith. Imma reach out to everybody
14 I know. Put money back. Put your name,
15 put your brand. Let us develop something
16 for you with our kids designing it.

17 I want young kids in high
18 school designing new uniforms for the
19 Police Department. We need new uniforms
20 for the correctional officers. We need
21 uniforms for charter schools and public
22 schools. They should not be wearing the
23 same old uniforms made in China. China
24 don't pay no taxes here.

25 (Applause.)

2 MR. WILCH: China don't pay no
3 taxes here.

4 Every uniform that the public
5 and taxpayer spend on police uniforms,
6 correctional uniforms, sheriff uniforms,
7 school uniforms should be made in
8 Philadelphia.

9 (Applause.)

10 MR. WILCH: If we have
11 contracts in Philadelphia, making
12 uniforms for police officers and prisons,
13 that's creating jobs overnight. All we
14 got to do is get a vacant building and
15 some machines.

16 Look, I used to train blind
17 people over in Jersey, best worker
18 industry for the blind. I trained blind
19 people for three years, totally blind. I
20 taught them how to use an industrial
21 machine, how to sew straight, how to make
22 a part. Now they in Cherry Hill, New
23 Jersey sewing for the government. They
24 make a uniform, military uniform, right
25 now. I had trained over 30 blind people.

2 I trained people in the prisons
3 for ten years for PhilaCor. I trained at
4 Philadelphia University. I taught at
5 Dobbins High School.

6 I asked the question to myself,
7 who am I? Who am I? What's my mission?
8 My mission is train and teach and put
9 people to work and make jobs for
10 ourselves. Jobs, no crime. Jobs, no
11 crime. Because if you're too tired to do
12 a crime, you got to go to work tomorrow.

13 So I want to thank you, my
14 wife, thank you. Listen, I am so honored
15 to have a wife like this woman, Julie
16 Wilch, who has been my right arm and my
17 left leg almost, and she helped me
18 produce the product. I have the idea;
19 she put it in a plan of action. She is
20 the push button to make things go. And I
21 thank God for my wife, my son, who just
22 came from Atlanta. He's now in Atlanta,
23 but he's a designer, very fashionable
24 young man. I never force him to wear a
25 suit, let him be himself. And of course

2 my daughter Eve, she'll be in tomorrow.
3 She's been honored, but she can't make
4 it. She thanks you for honoring us.
5 She'll be here tomorrow.

6 And, listen, all we are is
7 Philadelphians trying to leave something
8 behind for the next generation, for the
9 next generation.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. WILCH: And at my father's
12 funeral, a year dealing with my father's
13 funeral, I said, my father left a
14 footprint. My job is to make the
15 footprint even bigger.

16 Thank you for listening. Thank
17 you for your honor. Thank you,
18 Councilman. You look sharp. Thank you,
19 Councilman.

20 Thank you so much.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Council will be at ease.

24 (Council at ease.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
13 joining the Councilwoman, we have
14 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Oh,
15 Councilman Johnson, Councilman Jones.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Mr.
17 President, we're proud of being able to
18 join Penn in honoring the Penn Relays,
19 and the gentleman who will stand next to
20 me, Glenn Bryan, who is Vice President of
21 Government and Community Relations, I've
22 known so long that we're like brothers
23 and sisters. So in spite of my opponent
24 who thinks knowing a developer is just
25 about the wrong thing, I'm proud of my

13 Penn Relay Carnival is the oldest and
14 largest track and field event hosted
15 every year by the University of
16 Pennsylvania at Franklin Field since the
17 event started on April 21st, 1895; and

18 Whereas, the University of
19 Pennsylvania, located in University City,
20 West Philadelphia, is the nation's first
21 university, which was officially founded
22 in 1740, and currently boasts over 20,000
23 undergraduate and graduate students; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
25 the Penn Relay Carnival attracts more

2 than 15,000 high school and college
3 athlete participants locally, nationally,
4 and globally that compete in over 300
5 events over the course of five days; and

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the

9 Fraser, and Alfred Yego; and

10 Whereas, the Penn Relay
11 Carnival brings more than 100,000
12 spectators from around the United States
13 and the world each year to the City of
14 Philadelphia to partake of the festival
15 and the event; and

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
17 the Penn Relay Carnival has been credited
18 with popularizing the concept of relay
19 racing under the expert leadership of
20 Penn Relay Directors Frank Ellis, George
21 Washington Orton, H. Jamison Swarts, Ken
22 Doherty, Jim Tuppeny, Tim Baker, and Dave
23 Johnson; and

24 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
25 Whereas, the Penn Relay Carnival has been

2 held on the last week of April every year
3 since 1895. This year will mark the
4 125th Anniversary of the event, which has
5 been a staple in the City of
6 Philadelphia; and

9 recognition that the Penn Relay Carnival
10 brings to all of us in the City of
11 Philadelphia and has brought to
12 Philadelphia and recognizes and honors
13 the millions of officials, staff,
14 volunteers, and young athletes who have
15 participated from around the world since
16 its inception of the event in 1895; and

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Now,
18 therefore, be it resolved that the
19 Philadelphia City Council hereby
20 proclaims April 21st, 2019 "Penn Relay
21 Carnival Day" in honor of its 125th
22 Anniversary.

23 And further resolved, that an
24 engrossed copy of this resolution be
25 presented to the Penn Relays at the

2 University of Pennsylvania in honor of
3 the Penn Relay Carnival.

4 Congratulations everyone who
5 keeps this great tradition going. Thank
6 you.

7 (Applause.)

9 the Chair recognizes Scott Ward for
10 remarks.

11 MR. WARD: Thank you. On
12 behalf of the trustees of the University
13 of Pennsylvania, the members of the
14 Division of Recreation and
15 Intercollegiate Athletics, and all the
16 volunteers and competitors that make Penn
17 Relays so great and what it is today,
18 we'd like to thank the City of
19 Philadelphia. We'd like to thank City
20 Council President, City Council, and
21 particularly Councilwoman Blackwell for
22 this incredible honor as we celebrate our
23 historic 125th running of the Penn Relays
24 this month.

25 (Applause.)

18 remember that you are honoring also the
19 City of Philadelphia.

11 revised definition of "Waters of the

18 Mr. Decker, call the first
19 name.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Damaris Alvarado,
21 commenting on 170408.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 afternoon. Please just state your name
25 for the record.

2 MS. ALVARADO: Damaris

3 Alvarado.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Please proceed.

6 MS. ALVARADO: Good morning,
7 Councilmen and Councilwomen. I'm here to
8 testify on Bill 170408. My name is
9 Damaris Alvarado and I'm the Executive
10 Director of Children's Playhouse in South
11 Philadelphia. I'm here to testify on
12 behalf of the positive effects that the
13 sweetened beverage tax has had on our
14 students, families, teachers, businesses,
15 and how it prepares children for success
16 in primary school, possibly reducing the
17 rate of expulsions and suspension in
18 schools.

19 I have been a partner with the
20 Mayor's Office of Education in providing
21 high-quality education through these PHL
22 spots since they first launched in
23 January of 2017. We opened our first new
24 PHLpreK classroom with 20 three- to
25 four-year-old students in January. These

2 students have never been exposed to
3 childcare before in their lives. In six
4 months, we were able to successfully
5 guide and transition ten of those
6 students into kindergarten, with the
7 foundations they needed to succeed.

8 In 2018 school year, we
9 expanded our PHLpreK seats from 20 to 60
10 children. We have been able to fill each
11 of those PHLpreK spots before our school
12 year started and maintain a waiting list
13 for families that were interested in
14 joining our Children's Playhouse school
15 family. Throughout the school year, it
16 has been an honor to watch these students
17 grow with knowledge and confidence.

18 The Philadelphia pre-K program
19 has helped offer these services to
20 families who otherwise wouldn't have been
21 able to obtain them. Most of these
22 children were not previously enrolled in
23 any childcare or school setting prior,
24 and we asked the families why. Most of
25 their responses were that childcare costs

2 too much and they couldn't afford it.
3 Families are working paycheck to paycheck
4 to survive and at this time having to
5 choose between school and bills. We all
6 know that bills will win, but that choice
7 should never have to happen.

8 The Philadelphia pre-K slots
9 also allows us to offer families
10 consistency, stipulating affordability of
11 high-quality, developmentally appropriate
12 classrooms. This includes children with
13 IEPs. In most areas, especially in South
14 Philadelphia where we are located,
15 there's an early learning center drought
16 in general. Now let's think about
17 children who need support - speech
18 therapy, physical, occupational therapy,
19 sensory accommodation or just a quiet
20 place to decompress. Those centers are
21 few and far in between. Not because they
22 want to be but because they're not able
23 to be. The PHLpreK slots has helped us
24 offer these services to these families as
25 well.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Melissa Blatz,
10 commenting on 170408.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 afternoon.

14 MS. BLATZ: Good afternoon.

15 Good afternoon, members of City Council
16 and attendees. My name is Melissa Blatz
17 and I am the Executive Director of
18 Beautiful Beginnings in District 10 and
19 District 6. I am here to testify on Bill
20 No. 170408, a bill that speaks to do away
21 with suspending children in grades up to
22 8.

23 Beautiful Beginnings Child Care
24 Center is dedicated to providing a safe,
25 healthy, educational, and fun

2 environment. We strive for exceptional
3 childcare, setting a beautiful beginning
4 to every child's future. Our program
5 serves children ages six weeks to five
6 years from the Northeast Philadelphia
7 area. The enrollment is comprised of
8 children from mixed economic households
9 and multicultural backgrounds.

10 After almost 15 years of
11 service, we have strengthened our
12 knowledge of our community and their
13 needs. We understand, as most childcare
14 development experts, that when the
15 children thrive, families thrive.

16 Since partnering with PHLpreK
17 in January 2017, we have grown in our
18 ability to provide high-quality
19 pre-kindergarten education in very
20 specific ways. We have furthered
21 teachers' professional development
22 through various coursework offered by
23 PHLpreK. We have strengthened our
24 curriculum training for all teaching
25 staff and further developing their

2 implementation of creative curriculum by
3 expanding and offering further
4 professional development. We have also
5 provided a plethora of resources to the
6 children and families we serve, including
7 preparing for kindergarten transition.

8 In addition to these strengths
9 and program improvements, we have been
10 able to increase staff wages, which
11 directly has a positive impact on staff
12 retention and morale, ensuring that we
13 provide the consistent care our children
14 need. Through the expansion of PHLpreK
15 program in the fall, we were awarded 20
16 additional slots at our Holmesburg
17 location, which has allowed us to more
18 than double our enrollment, thus the need
19 to hire new teachers at our Frankford
20 Avenue location.

21 This year has been a year of
22 growth. We currently serve 35 children
23 and their families just through PHLpreK,
24 in addition to 60 children in
25 infant/toddler programming. When we were

2 awarded the additional slots through the
3 expansion of PHLpreK, we gave opportunity
4 to 20 children that did not have any
5 formal education program. These children
6 started in October, and through the
7 support of PHLpreK, we have completed
8 three successful referrals for children
9 who demonstrated the need for early
10 intervention and have partnered with
11 outside support to implement the goals
12 and strategies and developed a formal
13 individual education plan which will
14 follow them as they enter kindergarten.

15 Particularlly I want to talk
16 about a child we served who was diagnosed
17 with autism spectrum disorder. Once he
18 enrolled in our program, he was expelled
19 from three programs prior to coming to
20 us. In the short time that we were able
21 to provide support for his family, he
22 gained the skills necessary to function
23 in a typical classroom where he actually
24 skipped kindergarten because he met all
25 of the kindergarten milestones necessary.

2 relate. Government are not halls,
3 they're not judges, they're not
4 synagogues, they're not mosques, and they
5 should not be turned into one.

6 While I do believe
7 Representative Borowicz's fell short of
8 those attributes, there is no way it
9 could be construed as Islamophobic. I
10 listened to it many times. I didn't hear
11 any negative references to Islam or
12 Muslims. In fact, there are no
13 references at all to Islam or Muslims.

14 While it's surely noteworthy
15 that the Pennsylvania House of
16 Representatives was swearing in its first
17 Muslim woman, not knowing this occasion,
18 the invocation does not make that
19 invocation Islamophobic. Representative
20 Borowicz said she prayed that day like
21 she does in church. And while I don't
22 believe that's the appropriate way to
23 pray at the Pennsylvania General
24 Assembly, it does tell me and should tell
25 everybody here that it was not her

2 intention to antagonize or offend
3 freshman representative Movita Johnson
4 Harrell. I think she would have
5 delivered that invocation even if Ms.
6 Johnson Harrell was not being sworn in
7 that day.

8 But this resolution does intend
9 to be offensive, negative, and tends to
10 be harmful. I read somewhere that Movita
11 and Stephanie met by chance in the
12 hallway and they hugged.

13 This resolution strangles. It
14 serves no positive purpose. It doesn't
15 bring us together. It pushes us further
16 apart. It doesn't serve to heal. It
17 only serves to enlarging the wound,
18 causing it to fester and linger. This
19 resolution is nothing more than a
20 mean-spirited public verbal lynching of
21 one of your fellow Representatives who
22 made a mistake.

23 We all make mistakes. We're
24 all guilty of lack of good judgment, but
25 to respond in a public condemnation that

2 will go into the record will tarnish this
3 assembly by showing it has no mercy and
4 unable to forgive.

5 I, therefore, call upon
6 Councilman Curtis Jones to drop this
7 resolution and spare your colleagues the
8 embarrassment of having to vote on it.

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Cox,
14 commenting on 190238.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon.

18 MR. COX: Good afternoon. My
19 name is Joe Cox.

20 190238, I strongly support
21 condemning the State Rep. What she did
22 was disgusting. It should be condemned
23 by every single person. No one should be
24 in office that acts like that.

25 190242, I support condemning

2 the President administration for
3 eliminating special funding for Special
4 Olympics. Just about everything he does
5 should be condemned.

6 Now, 181063 is something else
7 that should be condemned. It is 2019.
8 Climate change is a fight for our lives.
9 We should be using renewables, not oil.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you for your testimony.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,
15 commenting on 190239.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MR. KING: Good afternoon. My
20 name is Clarc King and I hope to be on
21 November's ballot for the position of
22 City Council at-large.

23 I want to make a quick comment
24 about Resolution 181063, a bill. PGW is
25 like NASA to the United States. PGW is

2 the source of Philadelphia's strength,
3 and I hope that there are provisions made
4 for an exit from this contract should the
5 contract become an encumbrance instead of
6 a real benefit to Philadelphia.

7 I came up to talk about
8 Resolution 190239, an excellent
9 resolution, and would like to see a
10 committee appointed to liaison with the
11 Federal Reserve Bank. I say this because
12 taxes have a power to kill not just
13 businesses. I inform the Councilmembers
14 that the IRS is employing the U.S. Mail
15 Service, bringing notices, demanding
16 taxes from senior citizens living on
17 pensions and Social Security. A retired
18 person working as a waitress to
19 supplement her income has her tips
20 subject to tax laws or whatever.
21 Construction workers and other laborers,
22 skilled and unskilled, are subject to
23 taxes that contribute to poverty in this
24 city. Trillions of dollars were given to
25 Wall Street to save the looting system, a

2 crazy allocation of U.S. money and
3 credit. Congress did nothing for the 36
4 million Americans who were forced out of
5 their homes through the foreclosure
6 process.

7 There are only two classes of
8 taxes - direct and indirect. Taxing
9 someone's survival is not constitutional.
10 Putting a worker in the state of
11 criminality is a crime, and it occurs
12 when authorities act under the color of
13 law. The economy is suffering,
14 suffocated from a lack of cash in
15 circulation. Housing prices are too high
16 in the City, putting terrific pressure on
17 wages and putting terrific pressure on
18 the family who is trying to purchase a
19 decent standard of living.

20 Taxes and poverty are political
21 decisions. Taxes applied wrongly,
22 excessively are destructive to the City's
23 economy.

24 Thank you very much.
25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green,
5 commenting on 190239.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MS. GREEN: Good morning.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
9 afternoon.

10 MS. GREEN: Good afternoon is
11 it? Okay. I came down because I do
12 support Bill 190239, if it's going to be
13 productive. Okay? Special Committee on
14 Poverty Reduction and Prevention. And
15 they're saying that it needs to be also
16 grassroots activists on this committee,
17 not people necessary who are running
18 agencies or people who are not
19 necessarily living in the community,
20 because people -- poor communities know
21 what they want, such as Point Breeze. In
22 2012, we came together and we stated that
23 we wanted to preserve our two-story
24 community. We came up with an actionable
25 policy that we have put forth since 2012,

2 and because it was not in the same
3 direction that the City officials wanted
4 to go, at this point a poor community has
5 had to suffer for the last six or seven
6 years, watching their neighborhood being
7 destroyed by three-story urban mansions.
8 These mansions are being built in our
9 community, busting our blocks, blocking
10 our skyline and our view. And so
11 recently a policy was put forth, but the
12 language was not correct. The language
13 was not to the point it would be
14 protecting. So, therefore, at this
15 point, the bill was put on hold. But if
16 we're going to have actionable policies,
17 then it can't be about what the City
18 wants. It has to be about what the poor
19 people want.

20 And so at this point, we are
21 officially requesting to Council
22 President Clarke that the Bill 180973
23 that was requested by the poor people in
24 Point Breeze, our homeowners and our
25 residents, be revised, and we're asking

2 that Council come back to the table and
3 help reintroduce this policy to preserve
4 our community.

5 You cannot have a special
6 committee for poor -- to reduce poverty
7 unless you're going to respect the poor
8 people in the community and what we want.
9 And so at this particular point, we are
10 officially asking for this policy to
11 preserve our community. We can no longer
12 sit back and suffer. It is not right to
13 put us on the back of the bus. We have
14 no say when it comes to the height of
15 these houses, and yet we sit there and
16 developers come to zoning and say, well,
17 it's a matter of right. Well, how does
18 it make us feel? We're sitting on the
19 back of the bus, not having a say. We
20 can't say anything.

21 I officially invite Council
22 President Clarke and Councilman Johnson
23 to come to our next zoning meeting so
24 they can sit in there with us and watch
25 developers say in our face that it is a

2 matter of right to build these urban
3 mansions in our community, and hopefully
4 this new committee to help reduce the
5 poverty will also be about respecting
6 poor people in their community.

7 Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Grace Lewis,
12 commenting on 170675.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MS. LEWIS: Good afternoon.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. LEWIS: My name is Grace
18 Lewis, G-R-A-C-E, L-E-W-I-S.

19 They can hear me. I don't want
20 to put my mouth where everybody else put
21 their mouth.

22 I pay taxes. My 2019 taxes are
23 current and paid. And I vote.

24 I want to piggyback on some of
25 what Tiffany said. You are allowing

2 these contractors and architects to come
3 into our area without purveying, without
4 surveying the residents. I live across
5 from a new structure that has been
6 stopped now because they have some
7 violations. Before they were stopped, I
8 called L&I several times. I was told
9 that they took at least ten days from the
10 time that I called them and they came
11 out. They constructed whatever
12 violations they had time to construct in
13 those ten days. Now that monstrous,
14 ugly, cheap building looks into my
15 bedroom. That violates my pursuit of
16 happiness and the privacy of my bedroom.
17 I've been in here before and
18 I'm going to say it again. I do not want
19 curtains. When I walk into my bedroom, I
20 want to see the sky, whether it's raining
21 or sunny. I want to see the airplanes
22 ascending and descending to and from the
23 airport. When I lay my head down at
24 night, I want to look at that star in the
25 Big Dipper winking and blinking at me.

2 Because you take so long to
3 respond to the citizens, they had time to
4 build that. Not only did they have a
5 stop order which was placed last Monday,
6 last Tuesday they were inside the
7 building. Last Wednesday they were
8 inside the building. So Wednesday I
9 decided to call my Councilman's office,
10 and then the police showed up.

11 We are not trying to stop
12 progress in the City, but you cannot
13 progress without the input of the
14 citizens. We're not Indians. You're not
15 on some unoccupied land.

16 Again, I pay taxes and I vote.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval,
22 commenting on 181063.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 afternoon.

1 4/4/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. RAVAL: Yes. Hi. Again,
3 my name is Meenal Raval. I'm here today
4 in opposition to Bill No. 181063. That's
5 PGW's proposed LNG facility.

6 You may have noticed that I've
7 been here each week speaking or
8 supporting someone speaking against this
9 bill. Last week you heard from Abby
10 Leedy with the Global School Strike for
11 Climate. Some of the students from
12 Friends Select that were here were at the
13 Global School Strike as well.

14 I ask you, when are you going
15 to acknowledge the elephant in the room?
16 I'm talking about the climate crisis, the
17 crisis that's affecting our air and water
18 quality, the crisis that's affecting the
19 most poor, the black and the brown in
20 each community, the crisis that demands
21 that we stop planning new fossil fuel
22 projects.

23 I also know that most of you
24 are up for reelection. We could support
25 you so much wholeheartedly if you showed

2 an initiative, even some interest in
3 solving the climate crisis. Some new
4 at-large candidates such as Adrian
5 Rivera-Reyes give us hope. Did you read
6 his op-ed in the Philly Voice?

7 How, you ask? How can you
8 support us? How can you lead on climate?
9 We've developed a climate action platform
10 that my colleague Tanya Seaman has shared
11 with each of you. You could use that
12 document for starters. Missed that
13 e-mail? Please see me afterwards.

14 You could also review the
15 testimony offered by the public at the
16 November 29th hearing overnight of the
17 Committee of the Environment last year.
18 There were quite a few good ideas there.

19 Also for starters, you could
20 publicly state that you're against this
21 project and that you plan to vote no on
22 Bill 181063.

23 Since we're given only three
24 minutes to speak here, we've taken to the
25 airwaves by producing our own radio show,

2 Philly Talks Climate. Last week on the
3 show we talked about other U.S. cities
4 making commitments to renewable energy.
5 This week we'll talk about using less
6 energy overall and the jobs potential
7 from this.

8 Again, the show is Philly Talks
9 Climate. You can hear us on Fridays at
10 noon on PhillyCAM's WPPN 106.5 FM. Also
11 if you've missed the shows, you can find
12 details and you can hear it again at
13 Phillytalksclimate.wordpress.com.

14 We need your leadership. Who
15 wants to work with us? Come be our hero,
16 please.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 afternoon.

24 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

25 This is an official decree of the people

1 4/4/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
3 such, requires immediate action and
4 remedy.

5 Every week, Council, Mayor,
6 Governor, and others transfer private
7 property to the government, probably
8 illegally.

9 Over 200 years ago in this very
10 city, the people created government to
11 protect and defend their God-given
12 rights. Secure houses, persons, and
13 effects were contractually and
14 constitutionally required by the people
15 of their government. When oath of office
16 required the people -- required before
17 you could serve the people, there were
18 clear penalties for refusing your sworn
19 duty to act. Enforcement of these laws
20 is required by those sworn to uphold,
21 protect, and obey Constitution and laws.

22 Why has no official been
23 arrested for theft of my home? Why has
24 no official been arrested for effect of
25 my just compensation?

2 Attorney General McSwain
3 correctly identified that failure to
4 perform a known duty or task is illegal
5 and causes great harm.

6 No attorney people know this
7 action as treason. When can the people
8 trust their officials to respect and
9 comply with the Constitution and laws?

10 The constitutions require
11 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
12 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
13 duty. Your oath of office requires you
14 to act or face prison.

15 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
16 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
17 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
18 through 28, and 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708,
19 709, 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other
20 laws listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
21 14-4056 appear violated.

22 I call on the federal and
23 Commonwealth governments to perform their
24 constitutional obligations to investigate
25 and prosecute all involved in the theft

2 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
3 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

4 The denial of God-given 42 USC
5 1982 property rights for 25 years is
6 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
7 and requires immediate remedy.

8 A just government must obey the
9 rule of law. This color of law
10 government must have its Charter to
11 govern revoked until a constitutionally
12 compliant government is installed.
13 Public servants cannot refuse their sworn
14 duty to act any more than a fireman can
15 refuse to fight a fire. The sovereign
16 people require oath, Constitution, and
17 law be enforced, and jail is required for
18 all who violate oath, Constitution or
19 law.

20 I remind Council every week for
21 years, it takes a lot of cooperation to
22 create and allow this monumental
23 corruption.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you for your testimony.

1 4/4/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
3 other speakers on the public comment
4 list, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you very much. That concludes our
7 public comment session.

8 Mr. Decker, 190239.

9 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
10 authorizing the creation of a "Special
11 Committee on Poverty Reduction and
12 Prevention" to hold hearings to propose
13 and implement actionable policies and
14 programs that substantively prevent and
15 alleviate poverty in every Philadelphia
16 neighborhood.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
19 Quinones-Sanchez for a motion.

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: On your
21 behalf, Council President, I move for its
22 adoption.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
25 been moved and properly seconded.

1 4/4/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 All those in favor say aye.

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

8 ayes have it. Resolution 190239 is

9 adopted.

10 Mr. Decker, 190240.

11 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

12 authorizing the Philadelphia Land Bank to

13 dispose of 2511 North Orkney Street

14 located in the Seventh Councilmanic

15 District.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

17 Chair again recognizes Councilwoman

18 Quinones-Sanchez.

19 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

20 you, Mr. President. A copy of the

21 amendment has been properly circulated to

22 all members of Council. I move the

23 amendment to Resolution 190240 be

24 adopted.

25 (Duly seconded.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. The amendment has been moved
4 and seconded.

5 All those in favor say aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

11 ayes have it. 190240 has been amended.

12 It will be on our Second Reading and

13 Final Passage Calendar at our next

14 session of Council.

15 Mr. Decker, 190245.

16 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

17 initiating action to continue the East

18 Passyunk Avenue Business Improvement

19 District beyond its termination date in

20 an area that generally includes both

21 sides of East Passyunk Avenue from the

22 south side of Federal Street to the east

23 side of South Broad Street, certain

24 blocks of streets that intersect that

25 portion of East Passyunk Avenue, both

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 ayes have it. 190245 is adopted.

3 Mr. Decker, do you have any
4 additional resolutions?

5 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

7 tireless activism on behalf of

9 celebrating her life, introduced by
10 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
13 Brown.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes.
15 Mr. President, Marciene Mattleman was a
16 giant and a champion for literacy in our
17 city, and I would ask that we stand in a
18 moment of silence, please.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you.

21 Please stand for a standing
22 vote.

23 (All Councilmembers standing.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
25 resolution is adopted.

2 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
3 authorizing Council's Committee on Public

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair again recognizes Councilman
14 Greenlee.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
16 you, Mr. President. I move the adoption
17 of the resolution.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

10 abuse in Philadelphia and declaring April

13 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilwoman
14 Quinones-Sanchez.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
17 Quinones-Sanchez.

18 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
19 you, Council President. I thank all my
20 Council colleagues for supporting this
21 initiative annually. Thank you. I move
22 for its adoption.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
25 been moved and properly seconded.

1 4/4/19 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 All those in favor say aye.

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

9 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
10 recognizing April 2019 as Autism
11 Awareness Month in the City of
12 Philadelphia, and honoring Kambel Smith,
13 accomplished artist and co-founder of the
