2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started. If
4 members will take their seats and the
5 visitors retire behind the rail.

6 Today to give our invocation,
7 we will have a special guest,
8 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell. Please
9 ask all guests and visitors to please
10 rise.

11 (Councilmembers, guests, and
12 visitors rise.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Councilwoman.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
16 you for getting me so that Kenyatta
17 couldn't get it. He can't have a
18 commercial and give the prayer too in the
19 same day.

20 All right. Good morning,
21 everyone.

22 (Good morning.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: As
24 always, let me first thank our Heavenly
25 Father for the privilege of seeing

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2 another day. Let me thank him for the
3 privilege and pleasure of being a part of
4 this body and being here with all of you.

5 During this special day in this
6 special time in our lives, I request that
7 we rededicate ourselves to our purposes,
8 to the purpose of public service. I also
9 ask that we pray for those who are
10 hungry. Pray for those who have lost
11 people. So many of us go to so many
12 funerals this week.

13 I ask that God bless those who
14 don't have enough food and who aren't
15 sure where they'll sleep tonight and who
16 need help with their housing. We ask God
17 to bless all families in need and, again,
18 we thank him for the privilege of having
19 us here so that people know where they
20 can go and to whom they can turn.

21 And, finally, let me say unto
22 him that is able to keep you from falling
23 and to present you faultless before the
24 presence of his glory with the seeding
25 joy, to the only wise God, our savior, be

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2 glory and majesty, dominion and power,
3 both now and forevermore.

4 Amen.

5 (Amen.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
7 you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you so much, Councilwoman.

10 Thank you. Our next order of
11 business is the approval of the Journal,
12 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Greenlee.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. I move that the
16 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April
17 11th, 2019 be approved.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you. It has been moved and
21 properly seconded that the Journal of the
22 meeting of Thursday, April 11, 2019 stand
23 approved.

24 All those in favor say aye.

25 (Aye.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 ayes have it, and our Journal is
7 approved.

8 Our next order of business is
9 request for leaves of absence, and the
10 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. On behalf of the
13 majority, a leave of absence is requested
14 for Councilmember Reynolds Brown.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair thanks the gentleman. That shall
17 be reflected in our Journal.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 O'Neill.

20 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. On behalf of the
22 republicans, there are no requests for
23 leave of absence.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair thanks the gentleman.

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2 At this time, I would like to
3 thank everyone who has taken time out of
4 their busy day to come down to witness
5 their government in action. We genuinely
6 appreciate you being here. We hope your
7 stay here today is a knowledgeable one
8 but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,
9 so much so that you come again. Again,
10 thank you.

11 At this time, I'd just like to
12 take a moment to recognize a good friend.
13 He wasn't necessarily a colleague,
14 because I was just a staffer at that
15 point. Our good friend, former Mayor
16 Bill Green.

17 Mayor.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
20 think the Mayor was the only one that
21 walked out of here unscathed. Got out in
22 time. Thank you, Mayor. Thank you for
23 being here. We really appreciate you.

24 At this time, the Chair would
25 like to recognize Councilman Domb, who

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2 will present a resolution recognizing the
3 National Annual Remembrance of the Six
4 Million Jewish Martyrs, who perished
5 during the Holocaust.

6 Would Sarita Gocial and those
7 accompanying her please join the
8 Councilman at the podium.

9 (Councilmembers and guests
10 approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
12 joining Councilman Domb, we have
13 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Henon,
14 Councilwoman Parker, Councilman Jones,
15 Councilman Green, and Councilman Oh and
16 Councilman Taubenberger. And we also
17 have Councilman O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN DOMB: In solemn
19 recognition of the week of April 21st
20 through April 28th, 2019 as the National
21 Annual Remembrance of the Six Million
22 Jewish Martyrs, who perished during the
23 Holocaust.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Whereas, over seventy years ago, six

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2 million Jews were murdered in the Nazi
3 Holocaust as part of a systemic program
4 of genocide; and

5 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

6 Whereas, millions of other people
7 suffered as victims of Nazism; and

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
9 people of the City of Philadelphia should
10 continually rededicate themselves to the
11 principle of equal justice for all
12 people; and

13 Whereas, the people of the City
14 of Philadelphia should remain eternally
15 vigilant against all tyranny, and
16 recognize that bigotry provides a
17 breeding ground for tyranny to flourish;
18 and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

20 Whereas, during the Nazi period, everyone
21 had to make moral choices. Some people
22 became perpetrators, others were
23 bystanders;

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: A small
25 and brave minority chose to help the

2 persecuted. These are the rescuers and
3 helpers;

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: This was an
5 extraordinarily selfless choice. It
6 meant risk of not only their own lives
7 but the lives of their families as well.
8 Many paid with their own lives;

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Although none
10 succeeded in halting the Holocaust, many
11 people survived as a result of their
12 efforts;

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Each chose
14 to defy the power of the Nazis and their
15 collaborators;

16 COUNCILMAN GREEN: They showed
17 the power of the individual and provided
18 hope in otherwise hopeless circumstances
19 by demonstrating the importance of moral
20 courage in action; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
22 given the alarming growth in the number
23 of anti-Semitic threats since the
24 beginning of 2017 and most recently
25 horrifically the murder of 11 worshipers

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2 of the Tree of Life Synagogue in
3 Pittsburgh;

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: It is clear
5 that we cannot be complacent in the fire
6 of anti-Semitism or any other forms of
7 bigotry and hatred; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
9 both the Talmud and the Koran remind us:
10 Whomever saves a life, it is as if he
11 saved the entire world;

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
13 the Jewish Federation of Greater
14 Philadelphia and the Memorial Committee
15 for the Six Million Jewish Martyrs will
16 honor the memory of the six million
17 martyrs and honor the survivors on April
18 28th, 2019;

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,
20 we further recognize the horror of the
21 Holocaust, and extend to the Memorial
22 Committee the respect and admiration of
23 this legislative body.

24 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Resolved,
25 that the Council of the City of

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2 Philadelphia, hereby recognizes the week
3 of April 21st through April 28th, 2019 as
4 the National Annual Remembrance of the
5 Six Million Jewish Martyrs, who perished
6 during the Holocaust and commend the
7 Jewish Federation of Philadelphia for
8 their ongoing commitment to the memories
9 of those who perished and to a peaceful
10 world in which such a tragedy should
11 never occur again.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 at this time, the Chair recognizes Ms.
15 Gocial for remarks.

16 MS. GOCIAL: Good morning.
17 Thank you for allowing us the opportunity
18 to speak with you regarding our annual
19 ceremony. We have with us today -- first
20 I want to thank Allan Domb for sponsoring
21 this event, the resolution, and also
22 Council President Darrell Clarke. And
23 with us today is Naomi Adler, the CEO of
24 the Jewish Federation of Greater
25 Philadelphia; Rabbi Batya Glazer,

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2 Director of the Jewish Community
3 Relations Council; Arlene Fickler, Chair
4 of the Jewish Community Relations
5 Council; and two very important people,
6 Marius and Martha Sturbigie (ph), who are
7 both Holocaust survivors.

8 This event, as you have heard,
9 will take place this Sunday, April 28th.
10 We had originally planned to have it
11 outside, but because the weather looks
12 like it's going to be rainy, we will
13 definitely have it at Rodeph Shalom
14 Synagogue at Broad and Green Streets at
15 1:00 p.m., and we invite all of you to
16 attend.

17 This year's program is focused
18 on the Theresienstadt concentration camp,
19 which was located 30 miles north of
20 Prague in the Czech Republic during World
21 War II. It was originally a famed
22 fortress that served as a holiday resort
23 for Czech nobility. By 1940, Nazi
24 Germany had assigned the gestapo to turn
25 Theresienstadt into a Jewish ghetto and

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2 concentration camp. It helped primarily
3 Jews from Czechoslovakia as well as tens
4 of thousands of Jews deported chiefly
5 from Germany and Austria as well as
6 hundreds from the Netherlands and
7 Denmark. More than 150,000 Jews were
8 sent there, including 15,000 children,
9 and held there for months or years before
10 being sent by rail transports to their
11 deaths at Treblinka and Auschwitz
12 extermination camps in occupied Poland.
13 Less than 150 children survived.

14 Although Theresienstadt was not
15 an extermination camp, about 33,000 died
16 in the ghetto. This was mostly due to
17 the appalling conditions arising out of
18 extreme population, the density,
19 malnutrition, and disease. About 88,000
20 inhabitants were deported to Auschwitz
21 and other extermination camps. At the
22 end of World War II, there were 17,247
23 survivors of Theresienstadt.

24 This camp was different. It
25 housed many educated Jews unlike other

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2 camps. Theresienstadt detainees included
3 scholars, philosophers, scientists,
4 visual artists, and musicians of all
5 types, some of whom had achieved
6 international renown and many contributed
7 to the camp's cultural life.

8 The Nazis used this camp in a
9 propaganda effort designed to fool the
10 western allies. The Nazis publicized the
11 camp for its rich cultural life.

12 Children in Theresienstadt were
13 housed separately from adults and boys
14 separately from girls. Each home had an
15 adult supervisor who held illegal classes
16 so that children would not fall behind in
17 their education once they were free from
18 imprisonment. One home, which housed
19 boys aged 13 to 15, set up their own
20 government and secretly created a
21 magazine, Vedem, which was the longest
22 running clandestine publication of the
23 Holocaust. Vedem included poems,
24 articles, dialogues, artwork, and
25 whatever the boys and their teacher

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2 wanted to record. They gathered
3 clandestinely every Friday night from
4 1942 to 1944 to read aloud the week's
5 issue.

6 Most of the boys perished in
7 the death camps. Of the few who
8 survived, one managed to save the
9 magazines. The book, We Are Children
10 Just the Same, is a compilation of
11 selections from the magazine, with
12 additional excerpts on the diaries of the
13 children, letters to their families, and
14 artwork not only from the magazine but
15 from other children in Terezin as well.

16 In 1942, on the eve of Tu
17 B'Shevat, a minor holiday that celebrates
18 trees, a teacher in Theresienstadt, Irma
19 Lauscher, decided to teach the children
20 interned in the camp the lessons of
21 Tzedakah, righteousness and charity, and
22 explained that on this festival of trees,
23 they would understand what Tzedakah
24 meant. Mrs. Lauscher enlisted the help
25 of a friendly Nazi guard to bring her a

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2 tree seedling from the forest. The next
3 day the guard presented her with a
4 seedling about four inches high. The
5 children and Mrs. Lauscher planted the
6 tree in the children's quarters. She
7 told them that this seedling needed water
8 and sun to grow. She asked each of the
9 children to give up a portion of their
10 water each day so the seedling could be
11 nourished and thrive.

12 Can you imagine asking these
13 children to give up a portion of their
14 daily water, which was rationed and it
15 was so small? But they did.

16 When Irma Lauscher died, she
17 was buried beneath her tree, which then
18 stood 30 feet tall. A plaque dedicated
19 to her was placed on her grave and served
20 as a reminder of her courage.

21 In 2007, Irma's tree in
22 Theresienstadt was dying. Because this
23 was no ordinary tree, several cuttings
24 were taken and brought to the United
25 States. Philadelphia was honored to be

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2 presented with one of the cuttings. Just
3 as in Theresienstadt, the twig was
4 nourished with water and sun and now
5 stands 12 feet tall. It was planted this
6 year in the Holocaust Memorial Plaza
7 where it thrives as a lasting memorial.

8 Of the 15,000 children
9 imprisoned in the Theresienstadt ghetto,
10 only about 1,100 survived. The exact
11 number of children who died during the
12 Holocaust will never be known, but
13 estimates say that one and a half million
14 children were murdered.

15 This Sunday, young people age
16 from 11 into their mid 30's will
17 participate in readings and musical
18 presentations to remember and honor the
19 courage those children exhibited. The
20 Keystone Boychoir will be performing a
21 piece dedicated to Irma Lauscher's
22 legacy.

23 Our youth must be educated in
24 order to grow from a twig into a
25 blossoming tree.

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2 Today the world is facing a
3 resurgence of anti-Semitism. The
4 Holocaust has taught us what can happen
5 when people turn away. We can never
6 ignore intimidation and hatred.

7 The Jewish survivors of the
8 Holocaust have demanded that the world
9 not forget the six million Jewish
10 martyrs. If we have learned anything
11 from the Holocaust, it is that we are all
12 responsible for each other. Inaction is
13 equal to acceptance.

14 Once again, I invite you to
15 join us this year at our very, very
16 special program, and I leave you today
17 with the words the survivors of the
18 Second World War have asked us all to
19 pledge: Never again. Never forget.

20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Council will be at ease.

24 (Council at ease.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you.

3 At this time, the Chair
4 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
5 present a resolution recognizing
6 Frederick L. Voigt.

7 Would Mr. Voigt and those
8 accompanying him please join the
9 Councilman at the podium.

10 (Councilmembers and guests
11 approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
13 joining Councilman Jones, we have
14 Councilman Domb, Councilman Taubenberger,
15 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman
16 Parker, Councilman Green, Councilman
17 Greenlee, and Councilwoman Bass.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Ladies and
19 gentlemen, let me take you back in time
20 to a period in Philadelphia's political
21 history where millennials will have to
22 Google, take you to a time of constant
23 turmoil between Rizzo and Bowser and
24 Green, factions of the democratic party.
25 Let me take you back before there was

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2 Facebook, Instagram, Tweeting and
3 Twittering and things like that, when we
4 got our news the old-fashioned way, off
5 of a newspaper. And in those times,
6 there was turmoil, enemies, frenemies,
7 colliding over political ideology, and
8 that turmoil often turned to distrust,
9 that the elections were rigged and things
10 were going on. But there was one man who
11 stood above the fray, who had the
12 integrity of all parties and factions,
13 someone who could with his integrity,
14 whether it was with the Committee of
15 Seventy or the City Commissioners'
16 Office, stand up and say, this process is
17 fair.

18 No matter what the results
19 were, no matter who wound up on top, I
20 remember Georgie Woods saying, I went to
21 sleep as a Councilperson, I woke up, I
22 was unelected. Let me take you back in
23 time.

24 Let me tell you about a
25 courageous Mayor named Bill Green, who

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2 said, let the chips fall where they may.

3 Let's do a study to look at the integrity
4 of the voting process, and then charged
5 Mr. Fred Voigt to be the honest broker.

6 This man in the dictionary for
7 fair electoral process, his picture
8 should be next to it.

9 So I am joined by my colleagues
10 today to recognize Mr. Fred Voigt,
11 congratulating and honoring Fred L. Voigt
12 for 50 years of dedicated service, both
13 as a resident of the City of
14 Philadelphia, on the occasion of his
15 retirement from the Office of the
16 Philadelphia City Commissioners.

17 And, by the way, that's the
18 office I ran for, just so that you know.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: You
20 didn't win, though.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: I did not
22 win. Whereas -- thank you for that.

23 Whereas, Fred L. Voigt has
24 faithfully served the residents of the
25 City of Philadelphia with proud

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2 distinction since 1969, first as
3 Assistant City Solicitor and later as
4 Assistant District Attorney under Arlen
5 Specter. He then worked as a staff
6 attorney for the Environmental Protection
7 Agency, litigating some of the first
8 asbestos cases in the United States; and
9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, in
10 1977, Fred became Executive Director of
11 the Committee of Seventy, Philadelphia's
12 independent civic watchdog organization
13 established in 1904. Fred was considered
14 one of the foremost experts on elections
15 in Pennsylvania and consulted on election
16 law throughout the United States. He
17 served as both an advisor to, and a
18 critic of, five mayoral administrations
19 of Philadelphia government over his three
20 decades there. Under his leadership,
21 Seventy launched studies into the
22 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter, ports,
23 housing, economic development, municipal
24 utilities, personnel practices,
25 transportation and police; and a judicial

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2 selection study that culminated in the
3 creation of Pennsylvanians for Modern
4 Courts. He also mentored and inspired
5 hundreds of young people who went on to
6 careers and significant volunteer work in
7 public service; and

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
9 in 2008, Fred joined the Office of the
10 Philadelphia City Commissioners, lending
11 his legal prowess and knowledge of
12 election law to assist in transforming
13 the electoral process in Philadelphia,
14 including the selection of new voting
15 systems and the assurance of checks and
16 balances to protect the rights of voters
17 and candidates to fair and free
18 elections; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
20 Fred was raised in Longport, New Jersey
21 as the second of four sons to Jacob and
22 Mary Voigt. His father was an executive
23 with the Pennsylvania Railroad who
24 commuted daily to Philadelphia. Fred
25 graduated from Valley Forge Military

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2 Academy and the University of Denver. He
3 attended Dickinson Law School, where he
4 met his wife, Patricia Van Allen Voigt.
5 They were married the year he began his
6 service to Philadelphia, and will
7 celebrate their 50th Anniversary this
8 year; and

9 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

10 Whereas, as a resident of Chestnut Hill,
11 Fred has served as a devoted member of
12 Saint Paul's Episcopal Church for nearly
13 50 years, and raised two daughters, Carey
14 Learnard and Sarah Savage, and his three
15 grandchildren, Mac, Anna Lee, and Wyatt,
16 have become his greatest joy, apart from
17 his orchids. Fred has been awarded the
18 highest honors at the Philadelphia Flower
19 Show for his orchids, including a special
20 distinction for winning 26 ribbons in the
21 2019 Flower Show and the Pennsylvania
22 Horticultural Society Orchid Award.

23 And as an agricultural degree
24 holder, that's damn impressive.

25 Whereas

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And

3 whereas, those who know him recognize

4 that, aside from the Flower Show, Fred

5 doesn't care for accolades. His

6 preference is to be known for his

7 relationships with us, those to whom he

8 has given friendship, advice, knowledge,

9 guidance, generosity, and love. Fred

10 considers the people who have worked

11 alongside him for the betterment of

12 Philadelphia as his extended family.

13 There is no greater love than his for the

14 City of Philadelphia; now, therefore, be

15 it resolved

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: By the

17 Council of the City of Philadelphia, that

18 it hereby congratulates and honors

19 Frederick L. Voigt on the occasion of his

20 retirement from the Office of the

21 Philadelphia City Commissioners and

22 wishes him well in his future endeavors.

23 Further resolved, that an

24 engrossed copy of this resolution be

25 presented to Fred Voigt as further

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2 evidence of the sincere respect and
3 admiration of this legislative body.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
6 the Chair recognizes Mr. Voigt for
7 remarks.

8 MR. VOIGT: Thank you very
9 much. I would like to thank a couple
10 people. I always like to thank Margaret
11 Tartaglione, who I worked with for many,
12 many years and who served this community
13 in much the same way that I did. I'd
14 like to thank Commissioner Deeley and
15 Commissioner Schmidt for their continued
16 service and for the support that they
17 gave to me.

18 I'd like to thank Carla Moss,
19 who is not here, who worked with me for
20 many years and who deserves great
21 accolades. And I would like to thank a
22 couple people in the audience, a couple
23 lawyers, two republicans over there, who
24 were quite remarkable in their service.
25 I'd like to thank Ben Field. I'd like to

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2 thank Tim Dowling. I'd like to thank --
3 where is he -- Hal Fichandler, who served
4 with me at the Committee of Seventy for
5 many years. And I'd like to thank Bill
6 Green for some of the battles that we've
7 had and Curtis Jones, who actually I
8 hired when he was 19 years of age, having
9 been a candidate for City Commissioner,
10 along with Chaka Fattah, and they both
11 worked for me that summer after their
12 loss, and one of the things that they
13 discovered was they were both ineligible
14 to be commissioner because they have to
15 be 21, and they happened to turn that
16 out, and both of them were very young
17 aspiring sprouts.

18 And all of that taken together
19 has given me great pleasure and the
20 ability to ensure -- you know, people
21 don't win elections in Philadelphia.
22 They're all stolen. Just ask the losers.
23 I mean, in Philadelphia, we don't just
24 have elections. We litigate them. We're
25 always in court challenging whatever we

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2 lost, but overall, for the most part, in
3 fact, it's the exception and not the rule
4 for an election not to be watched over by
5 everybody, with everybody having a view.

6 And thank you very much for the
7 honor, Council.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, and congratulations.

14 Our next order of business is
15 communications, and the Chair requests
16 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the

2 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
3 and members of the Council of the City of
4 Philadelphia, I am submitting herewith
5 for the consideration of your honorable
6 body a resolution authorizing the
7 Philadelphia Land Bank to dispose of 1907

5 Thank you. It has been moved and
6 properly seconded that the rules of
7 Council be suspended so as to permit

9 180998 and 190151.

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it. These bills will be placed
17 on our First Reading Calendar today.

18 The Chair now recognizes
19 Councilwoman Blackwell for a report from
20 the Committee on Finance.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
22 you very much, Mr. President. The
23 Committee on Finance reports three bills
24 out with a favorable recommendation.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Mr. Decker, please read the report.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on
8 Finance, to which was referred Bill No.
9 190129, entitled "An ordinance
10 constituting the Twenty-Second
11 Supplemental Ordinance to the Restated
12 General Water and Wastewater Revenue Bond
13 Ordinance of 1989, as supplemented;
14 authorizing the Bond Committee to issue
15 and sell one or more series or subseries
16 of tax-exempt or taxable water and
17 wastewater revenue bonds and revenue
18 refunding bonds"; and

19 Bill No. 190135, entitled "An
20 ordinance amending Chapter 19-1400 of The
21 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Realty
22 Transfer Tax,' to clarify the definition
23 of 'Value'"; and

24 Bill No. 190231, entitled "An
25 ordinance approving a Substantial

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 The Chair again recognizes
12 Councilwoman Blackwell.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
14 you, Mr. President. I move that the
15 rules of Council be suspended so as to
16 permit first reading this day of Bill
17 Nos. 190129, 190135, and 190231.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. It has been moved and
21 properly seconded that the rules of
22 Council be suspended so as to permit
23 first reading this day of Bills No.
24 190129, 190135, and 190231.

25 All those in favor say aye.

2 (Aye.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, and these bills will be
8 placed on our First Reading Calendar
9 today.

10 That concludes our reports from
11 committee, and our next order of business
12 is consideration of the Calendar.

13 I note that the bills just
14 reported from committee with a suspension
15 of the rules have been deemed to have had
16 a first reading. These bills will be
17 placed on our Second Reading and Final
18 Passage Calendar at our next session of
19 Council.

20 As there are no additional
21 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
23 purpose of calling up resolutions and
24 bills on the Second Reading and Final
25 Passage Calendar.

1 4/25/19 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING
2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. The following resolutions
4 and bills are being called up from the
5 Second Reading and Final Passage
6 Calendars today. They are Bill Nos.
7 190293, 190298, 190083-A, 181064, and
8 190132. All other bills and resolutions
9 are being held.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you.

12 Before considering the bills
13 and resolutions on our Final Passage
14 Calendar, we will have our public comment
15 session. It will go as follows:

16 When your name is called, you
17 will go to the podium in the middle of
18 the Council Chambers. When the light
19 turns green on that device on that
20 podium, it will be your time to speak.
21 When the light turns yellow, you will
22 have 30 seconds to conclude your remarks.
23 When the light turns red, we'd ask that
24 you please adhere to our guidelines and
25 conclude your remarks. You must speak on

2 a bill or resolution that is on the Final
3 Passage Calendar today. I want to thank
4 you very much for your anticipated
5 cooperation.

6 Mr. Decker, please call the
7 first name on the list.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Kelley Burnett,
9 commenting on 170408.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning. Please state your name for the
13 record. Just state your name for the
14 record.

15 MS. BURNETT: Good morning. I
16 would like to thank you all today for
17 listening to me, and those of you who
18 support the beverage tax, we appreciate
19 you.

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you.

21 MS. BURNETT: I am the owner
22 and operator of a family facility. I'm a
23 STAR 4 and I've been in business for 11
24 years.

25 I have a gift for

2 Mrs. Quinones-Sanchez, and this was made
3 by the children, and they call this the
4 Plant Buddy. They made these during a
5 STEM class activity with one of our
6 learning partners. In the class the
7 children learn what elements plants need
8 to grow - enrich its soil, a water
9 source, and sunlight.

10 Through the Philly pre-K
11 program and 1199C --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Ma'am, are you talking about school
14 suspension?

15 MS. BURNETT: Yes.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Okay. It would be good if you can
18 mention it.

19 MS. BURNETT: Okay.

20 Providers have been supplied
21 with additional tools and resources that
22 have comprised of essential elements that
23 help children grow, become prepared for
24 kindergarten, and avoid suspension and
25 expulsion.

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you.

4 MS. BURNETT: We have been able
5 to utilize innovative observation tools
6 such as TSG that help us monitor and
7 share a child's progress with the
8 families. We also through our Philly
9 pre-K hub, which is through 1199C, it's
10 comprised of a collective of educated,
11 driven women who support the growth and
12 the passion of the continuous social,
13 emotional, and cognitive learning of
14 children, also reducing expulsion and
15 suspension with children once they get to
16 school.

17 I hope that this Plant Buddy
18 serves as a reminder of how important the
19 Philly pre-K program is to many families
20 in the City that did not have access to
21 quality, enriching care for their
22 children and, thus, were not prepared for
23 kindergarten and their children avoiding
24 being expelled and suspended.

25 I'd like to thank you for

2 listening to me. You have a good day.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, ma'am, for your testimony.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Lisa Smith,
7 commenting on 170408.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MS. SMITH: Good morning. My
12 name is Lisa Smith. I support
13 permanently prohibiting Philadelphia
14 elementary students from being suspended
15 from school. We must also take steps to
16 eradicate the behaviors that lead to
17 suspensions to begin with.

18 Disruptive children are often
19 those who lack primary skills and get
20 into trouble. I am the co-owner of
21 Amazing Kids Academy LLC, a high-quality
22 early learning center with three
23 locations, one at G and Erie, one at
24 Cheltenham and Loretto, and another at
25 71st and Broad Street.

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Each of us who work, play, or
3 do business in Philadelphia has a
4 responsibility to the young children
5 here. Our slogan is "Early learning is
6 the key to academic success."

7 Amazing Kids Academy provides
8 high-quality early learning to pre-K
9 children funded by the soda tax. The
10 soda tax is vital to help provide pre-K
11 and give Philly children the head start
12 they so desperately need before entering
13 elementary school.

14 The soda tax allows for our
15 high-quality pre-K program to offer 21st
16 century wages, health benefit packages,
17 paid sick, vacation, holiday, paid days
18 for staff. The soda tax funding allows
19 us to offer high-quality instruction that
20 creates a lifetime lover of learning.

21 The only proven way to stop the
22 cycle of generational poverty, stop the
23 actions that cause children to rise to
24 the nature and occasion of having to be
25 suspended is through early education.

2 The future of Philadelphia's workforce is
3 at stake.

4 Councilwoman Maria

5 Quinones-Sanchez, we know that you're a
6 leading opponent of the soda tax. As a
7 Seventh District business owner, we ask
8 that you support the children and the
9 families in the Seventh District, your
10 community, and make sure the free
11 high-quality pre-K seats paid for by the
12 soda tax does not disappear.

13 Councilwoman Cherelle Parker,
14 we know that you support the soda tax.
15 We in the Ninth District love you and
16 thank you for your support for the future
17 of our young children, even when it's not
18 popular. We will not forget where you
19 stand with our young children and early
20 education at the voting booths.

21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Clarence Morris,

2 commenting on 170408.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 afternoon.

6 MR. MORRIS: Good afternoon.

7 My name is Clarence Morris. I am the
8 co-owner of Amazing Kids Academy LLC at G
9 and Erie. We are proud to offer
10 high-quality pre-K to the children in the
11 Seventh District. I am asking that you
12 vote to permanently stop suspending
13 elementary school kids.

14 We know that early education
15 helps better prepare children for
16 elementary school. Our center currently
17 provides PHLpreK to 37 funded by the soda
18 tax.

19 Council, please support the
20 PHLpreK soda tax so that you can help us
21 raise the levels of education for our
22 inner city youth and reduce the behaviors
23 in elementary school that could lead to
24 suspension.

25 Councilwoman Maria

2 Quinones-Sanchez, we know that you are
3 against the soda tax and we ask that you
4 support our community, your community,
5 and make sure that the free high-quality
6 pre-K seats paid for by the soda tax does
7 not disappear.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Amanda Rodriguez.

13 (No response.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Amanda Rodriguez.

15 (No response.)

16 CHIEF CLERK: Jennifer Jones,
17 commenting on 170408.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 afternoon.

21 MS. JONES: Hello. Can
22 everyone hear me?

23 Hi. My name is Jennifer Jones
24 and I'm a parent of a four-year-old child
25 at Amazing Kids Academy on Erie Avenue.

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I'm here to add another dynamic to the
3 meeting.

4 I am a parent of another child
5 who was constantly suspended from school,
6 and that was before we knew that he had
7 autism, so he was constantly suspended
8 from school. And all three of my
9 children have CCIS, and every time I had
10 issues at work, I would have to quit and
11 I would lose my funding. I would lose my
12 CCIS. With PHLpreK, I don't have to
13 worry about income guidelines, being
14 eligible for that. My son always has a
15 spot where he's at. And if I decide that
16 I'm able to go back to work, he still has
17 a spot and I can subsidize payments in
18 that area.

19 But other than that, I really
20 appreciate the program. It's been very
21 helpful for me. I'm not only a parent,
22 but I'm a student myself. So it gives me
23 time to go out and do what I need to do
24 to learn, and I'm confident that my son
25 is getting quality pre-K care. And then,

2 like I said, if I would like to go back
3 to work, he could be subsidized with full
4 day childcare. But it's very important
5 that our children have the support they
6 need now before they enter elementary
7 school so they don't have these problems
8 and parents don't have to worry about the
9 suspensions and expulsions from school.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: April Bryant,
15 commenting on 170408.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MS. BRYANT: Good afternoon.
20 My name is April Bryant. I'm here today
21 to just remind Council that we really
22 need your support in reducing suspension
23 and expulsion in schools, and it doesn't
24 start at the elementary school level.
25 We're encouraging you to take action now

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 while children are young.

3 At our earliest ages of three,
4 four, and five, children are sometimes
5 expelled and suspended, and we're
6 encouraging you to support us in our
7 efforts to gain professional development
8 through the PHLpreK beverage tax.

9 Our teachers are growing.
10 They're learning how to address
11 challenging behaviors and how to help
12 parents and families support their
13 children early on. We gain access to
14 many resources that we don't have usually
15 without the PHL beverage tax, which
16 affects our children when they get to
17 elementary school. The problems that
18 arise there can be eradicated at this
19 early age.

20 So we're asking you,
21 Councilmember Cindy Bass, to take your
22 name off of the sugary beverage tax.
23 We're in your district, and we really
24 need your support. Over 300 kids are
25 counting on you to make a difference in

2 their lives.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Emmanuel Bussie,
7 commenting on 170408.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 afternoon.

11 MR. BUSSIE: Thank you very
12 much. My name is Emmanuel Bussie. I
13 rise in support of --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 School suspension.

16 MR. BUSSIE: All right. So
17 190027. I'm in support of that bill and
18 that ordinance because I'm a big fan of
19 oversight. I came up to make my comments
20 about the oversight, but I want to also
21 talk about the young people that I've
22 seen today that come in here, the young
23 people. I have four daughters myself,
24 and when the four young people -- the
25 slew of young people came in today, my

2 heart was warm to see them be a part of
3 this process and then observe the
4 process. But what I say to the people
5 that brought the young people here is, if
6 you care about young people, you should
7 also care of the fact that only one
8 percent of women are allowed to work in
9 those building trades. So when you fight
10 for this pre-K, the opportunities in
11 pre-K, that the goal is for them to
12 either get a meaningful employment,
13 getting meaningful job or either own a
14 business themselves.

15 When black and brown people
16 only represent 2.5 percent of the
17 businesses in the City, something is
18 wrong. When women only represent one
19 percent of the people in the building
20 trades, something is wrong. So even
21 after pre-K, the goal and the hope is
22 that they get a meaningful employment or
23 a business opportunity, which does not
24 exist under the current administration.

25 So when we fighting for our

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 pre-K kids, we should fight what happens
3 after they get out of pre-K. That's why
4 I applaud Maria Quinones-Sanchez. That's
5 why I applaud Cindy Bass, because they
6 not just fighting for pre-K, because it's
7 a 52 fake-out. We get each other to
8 fight each other over crumbs. We got
9 more than enough funding to fund pre-K.
10 Let's be real.

11 You come down here and you talk
12 about funding pre-K. You have over \$357
13 million surplus, and even more than that
14 if you count all the money that we misuse
15 and misappropriate. We got tons of money
16 to fund pre-K. But what they get you to
17 do is to fight me, who got four
18 daughters, who I pay for pre-K out of my
19 own pocket, which I wish I had this
20 program when I was funding \$256 a week.
21 They get me to fight you over pre-K money
22 that we don't even need.

23 I was a supporter of the soda
24 tax because they said it would fund
25 pre-K. Seventy-four percent of the money

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 from the soda tax is sitting in the
3 General Fund. I was a supporter of the
4 soda tax because they told me it would
5 expand capacity.

6 We only have 2.5 percent of the
7 businesses, and they just took the
8 largest contract from a black business
9 and gave it to a Chicago-based company
10 because they omitted two pages in a
11 proposal. And Imma tell you something,
12 the City has the right on their own laws
13 and under their own RFP to omit any
14 information or exclude any information in
15 proposals, including, without limitation,
16 those identified in Sections 1 and
17 Section 2, receiving it through the
18 City's service or other means. The City
19 could have omitted the fact and allow
20 this company to bid on a contract that
21 they had for 17 years.

22 I'm going to try to repeat this
23 again. This is a contract that a company
24 had for 17 years, and the City did not
25 allow them to bid on a \$17 million

2 contract again. Let me just -- they just
3 said, you can't even bid on the \$17
4 million contract that you had for over 17
5 years because you left out two pages.

6 See, you can't talk about
7 expanding capacity, but take the largest
8 contract from a black and brown firm at
9 the same time. So when we care about our
10 young people and we care about the soda
11 tax and we care about funding pre-K, we
12 should also care about, like Maria, like
13 Cindy, like Curt, care about what happens
14 after pre-K.

15 Thank you very much.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Franchesca
20 Rivera, commenting on 170408.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 afternoon.

24 MS. RIVERA: Good afternoon.

25 My name is Franchesca. I'm here as a

2 mother. My son just turned five years
3 old. He's part of the Philadelphia pre-K
4 program. It has been a great experience
5 for my son, because he's learning the
6 basic skills that he needs to start as a
7 student, like letters, numbers, colors,
8 and the perfect way to play with other
9 students and the routine and norms that
10 he needs to be successful in
11 kindergarten.

12 Thanks to Mi Familia Child
13 Care, PHL program, my son learn English.
14 Since September, my son is part of the
15 greatest experience in his life, because
16 as a family, we want more opportunities
17 to other kids, not less. We really need
18 your help.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Esther Joseph,
24 commenting on 170408.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 afternoon.

4 MS. JOSEPH: Good afternoon.

5 My name is Esther Joseph and I am here as
6 an early childhood educator representing
7 Rising Sun Children's Center, which is a
8 STAR 4 facility and also a proud
9 participant in the City of Philadelphia's
10 PHLpreK program.

11 Our focus today is the
12 reduction and elimination of the
13 suspension of elementary school children,
14 but what we should consider is how to
15 prevent this, and it all starts with
16 access to early learning.

17 Aside from the often repeated
18 focus on math, language, literacy, art,
19 and technology, quality preschool
20 programs also help build a strong
21 foundation for children's physical,
22 mental, and especially the social
23 emotional development, and this prepares
24 them for a lifetime.

25 In these programs, our children

2 are learning about conflict resolution,
3 navigating their own emotions, and
4 positive peer actions. I have had my own
5 countless conversations with elementary
6 school professionals who have stressed
7 the importance of the following for
8 children's early learning success:
9 coping with emotions, taking the
10 perspective of someone else, establishing
11 healthy relationships with peers and
12 adults, expressing sympathy, negotiating
13 skills, resolving conflict without
14 resorting to aggression, which is
15 especially important when we're talking
16 about eliminating and reducing suspension
17 and expulsion of elementary school.

18 Our Philadelphia preschool
19 children are worth the beverage tax, and
20 I thank those Councilmembers who are in
21 favor of it, and I urge those who are not
22 to reconsider.

23 Thank you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: I do have a
5 question for the last speaker. Would you
6 come back to the microphone.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Ma'am.

9 MS. JOSEPH: Yes.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Do you believe
11 that if there were no soda tax, that the
12 City should use some of the \$360 million
13 surplus to fund pre-K?

14 MS. JOSEPH: I'm sorry?

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Or do you think
16 we should not fund it?

17 MS. JOSEPH: Can you repeat the
18 question, please?

19 COUNCILMAN OH: If the soda tax
20 did not exist, would you be in favor of
21 the City using money from the \$360
22 million surplus to fund pre-K?

23 MS. JOSEPH: If that's what it
24 takes, then I'm all in favor for it. I'm
25 not in support of removing the soda tax

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 without providing an alternative solution
3 to provide quality education for our
4 preschool children.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN OH: I agree with
7 you.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you, ma'am.

11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 Councilman Jones, did you also
13 have --

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: So --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Did
16 you have a question of the lady?

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
19 Joseph is getting out of here.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Since we
21 were in public comment, I was letting the
22 public comment and remain councilmanic
23 neutral on the issue, but since my
24 colleague felt he has to interrogate --
25 so let me ask you a question.

2 How long is the waiting list
3 for pre-K in your organization?

4 MS. JOSEPH: In my
5 organization, I have parents who have
6 been coming in since last September, and
7 they have been waiting all year, hoping
8 for a spot for their child for this
9 September.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: And --

11 MS. JOSEPH: It's absolutely in
12 need, especially in my neighborhood.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: So you
14 understand the correlation between
15 preparing young people to be able to read
16 successfully by the fourth grade, and if
17 not, how many jail cells we have to build
18 by the time they're 18 if they can't
19 achieve that reading goal.

20 MS. JOSEPH: Absolutely.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: And you
22 place the priority in making sure that if
23 we know that problem, to fix it early.

24 MS. JOSEPH: Absolutely.
25 People are knowledgeable -- we talk about

1 4/25/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 it all the time -- how the first five
3 years of life are essential, but for some
4 reason we can't make the connection on
5 investing our money and our time and
6 legislation into making sure that the
7 children have those resources that they
8 need.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: And would
10 you agree that this is not a social
11 service issue in and of itself but an
12 economic development issue, because it
13 allows moderate-income parents to be able
14 to pursue jobs because they have a safe
15 educational place to place their children
16 during the day while they work.

17 MS. JOSEPH: Absolutely.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
19 very much.

20 MS. JOSEPH: Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. Thank you, ma'am.

23 Thank you, ma'am. You better
24 hurry up and get out of here.

25 I'm sorry. I digress.

3 going to let her get out before I
4 recognize you, sir.

5 COUNCILMAN OH: All right. I'm
6 letting her go.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: If she were
10 here, I would ask her if she would like
11 me to introduce a transfer ordinance to
12 fund pre-K out of the surplus of \$50

15 and so it doesn't depend on the soda tax
16 at all.

20 funding for the children, but do not
21 think the Philadelphia beverage tax is
22 the right way.

23 My family owns the Nile
24 Restaurant located in the Second District
25 of Councilman Kenyatta Johnson. My

2 husband could not be here today. Right
3 now the business can only afford two
4 permanent employees, he being one of
5 them.

6 Today it's very hard on the
7 business owner of Philadelphia. Taxes
8 like the beverage tax is placing an
9 unfair burden on the businesses close to
10 the City line that businesses across the
11 City line don't have to deal with.

12 We both are immigrants. I've
13 lived here in Philadelphia for 34 years.
14 We have four children. They have been in
15 the business for six years and there has
16 been a stark difference between the
17 success of the business before and after
18 the tax.

19 We have -- we hope -- we had
20 hoped that operating a small business
21 would be easier over the time, but since
22 the introduction of the beverage tax, our
23 sales have dropped a great deal, so much
24 that we recently had to return the cooler
25 leased to us by the supplier because the

2 business weren't ordering enough to
3 fulfill on the contract.

4 Mr. Kenyatta Johnson, please
5 support the legislation to repeal the
6 beverage tax and give the businesses like
7 ours a chance, if you have that

9 more business with the benefit to the
10 community.

11 Thank you.

20 the people are your boss. Maybe the
21 people should exercise the right of the
22 people to abolish this incompetent,
23 oath-violating government.

24 The Declaration of Independence
25 clearly describes government abuses that
