2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 We're going to get started, if members
4 will take their seats.

5 To give our invocation this
6 morning, the Chair recognizes the
7 Reverend Dr. Kimberlee Johnson of Tasker
8 Street Baptist Church. She is here today
9 as the guest of Councilman Johnson.

10 I would ask all guests,
11 visitors, and members to please rise.

12 (Councilmembers, guests, and
13 visitors rise.)

14 REVEREND DR. JOHNSON: Good
15 morning, Councilman Clarke.

16 Thank you, Councilman Johnson,
17 for the invitation to come.

18 I bring you greetings on behalf
19 of Tasker Street Missionary Baptist
20 Church.

21 Will you pray with me.

22 Gracious God, we thank you for
23 the gift of life, for this brand new
24 beautiful day, and for all of our
25 blessings.

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2 We ask, God, that you would
3 come into this space and superintend the
4 time. God, we pray that all that would
5 be done here will be done in a way that
6 honors you and gives honor to the people
7 you have created.

8 We thank you for everyone that
9 has the best interest of the residents of
10 the City of Philadelphia in mind.

11 May everything here be done
12 with integrity and honesty and with the
13 greatest and the least among us in mind.
14 We know in that, you will be glorified.

15 We thank you for these and all
16 other blessings.

17 In your name, we pray.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Reverend, so much.

22 Council will be at ease.

23 (Council at ease.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you again, Reverend, for those

3 Our next order of business is

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. I move that the
10 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April
11 25th, 2019 be approved.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you. It has been moved and
15 properly seconded that the Journal of the
16 meeting of Thursday, April 25th, 2019
17 stand approved.

18 All those in favor say aye.

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 ayes have it, and the Journal is
25 approved.

2 And our next order of business
3 is requests for leaves of absence, and
4 the Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. On behalf of the
7 majority, there are no requests of leave
8 of absence today.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair thanks the gentleman.

11 The Chair now recognizes
12 Councilman Oh.

13 COUNCILMAN OH: Good morning.
14 On behalf of the minority, there are no
15 requests for leave of absence.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair thanks the gentleman.

18 At this time, I would like to
19 take a moment to thank everyone who has
20 taken time out of their busy day to come
21 down to witness their government in
22 action. We genuinely appreciate you
23 being here. We hope that your stay here
24 today is a knowledgeable one but, more
25 importantly, a pleasurable one, so much

2 so that you come back again. So, again,
3 thank you so much for being here. We
4 really appreciate you.

5 At this time, the Chair will
6 recognize Councilman Jones, who will
7 present a resolution recognizing Jim
8 Marino. Would Mr. Marino and those
9 accompanying him please join the
10 Councilman at the podium.

11 (Councilmembers and guests
12 approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 joining Councilman Jones, we have
15 Councilman Johnson, Councilwoman Parker,
16 and Councilwoman Blackwell and also
17 Councilwoman Bass.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: For many
19 decades, Philadelphia suffered with an
20 inferiority complex to New York and
21 Washington, DC. I had to grow up
22 listening to people bash our city, from
23 its water to its nightlife. But then we
24 started slowly being identified for
25 world-class events. We started being

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2 recognized in those events for things
3 that were uniquely Philadelphia, whether
4 it was water plugs, whether it was water
5 ice, whether it was cheese steaks, but
6 also as important was the Broad Street
7 Run. And we want to thank no incidences,
8 always professionally done, every now and
9 then we got a Mayor out there to high
10 five people going in. I don't think any
11 of them ever ran, but maybe in the future
12 we can get somebody to run.

13 So we are here today to
14 recognize Jim Marino for decades of
15 service to the City of Philadelphia and
16 the Recreation Department. Please join
17 me in giving him a round of applause.

18 (Appause.)

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: So the
20 citation goes:

21 Recognizing and honoring Jim
22 Marino on the occasion of his retirement
23 after decades of dedicated service to the
24 Department of Parks and Rec, and as the
25 Director of the Broad Street Run.

2 Whereas, Mr. Marino,
3 affectionately known as Jim, is a
4 longtime resident of the Roxborough
5 Neighborhood of Philadelphia, in the
6 Fourth Councilmanic District, where he
7 resides with his wife, Gerri, and his two
8 children, Allison and Christopher; and

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
10 Marino started his service to the City of
11 Philadelphia in the Summer of 1974, when
12 he served as a Pool Attendant at Veterans
13 Stadium and JFK Stadium, located in the
14 Second Councilmanic District;

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
16 since then, he has served in various
17 roles on countless projects for the
18 Department of Parks and Recreation in
19 recreation centers across the City,
20 including serving as Assistant Recreation
21 Leader at Scanlon Recreation Center,
22 Recreation Aide at Venice Island
23 Playground, and Recreation Leader at
24 Olney Recreation Center and -- help me
25 out -- Captiolo Recreation Center;

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2 Whereas, in 1997, Marino became
3 the Director of Philadelphia's Broad
4 Street Run. Under this man's
5 stewardship, the race has grown from
6 5,600 runners in 1998 -- listen to these
7 figures -- 5,600 runners in 1998 to
8 40,000 runners in 2018 -- I wish I was
9 one of them. I can't run -- becoming the
10 nation's largest 10-mile race; and

11 Whereas, Marino's elevation of
12 the Broad Street Run did not go
13 unnoticed. In 2005, he was named
14 Assistant Parade Director for
15 Philadelphia's legendary Mummers Parade;

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
17 whereas, in 2006, Mr. Marino was selected
18 as the, quote, "National Race Director of
19 the Year," end of quote, by his peers.
20 Additionally, in 2016, he was named as
21 the Director of the Philadelphia
22 Marathon; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
24 Marino has served on numerous committees
25 and boards on a national and local level,

2 such as Mid-Atlantic USA Track and Field,
3 an organization which presented him with
4 its Jesse Owens Award for Meritorious
5 Service in 2015, and Back on My Feet -
6 Philadelphia, an organization that seeks
7 to combat homelessness through the power
8 of running and community support; and

9 Whereas, Marino serves as an
10 inspiration to all, having battled cancer
11 while still having the strength and
12 courage to be a dedicated leader in our
13 community, touching the lives of
14 Philadelphians with each project he has
15 worked on; now, therefore, be it

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Resolved,
17 by the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia, that it hereby recognizes
19 and honors Jim Marino on the occasion of
20 his retirement after decades of dedicated
21 service to the Department of Parks and
22 Recreation, and as Director of the Broad
23 Street Run.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Further
25 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this

2 resolution be presented to Jim Marino as
3 further evidence of the sincere respect
4 and admiration of this legislative body.

5 Jim, congratulations.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
8 the Chair recognizes Mr. Marino for
9 remarks.

10 MR. MARINO: First of all, I
11 want to thank my wife, Gerri, and my son,
12 Christopher, for coming today. Chris is
13 a senior at Roman Catholic High School up
14 the street, so he got out for a couple
15 classes, but since he's so close, he's
16 got to go back.

17 My daughter, Allison, was
18 unable to be with us today. She's
19 studying abroad in Rome. She's a junior
20 at Penn State, living the life. So I
21 want to make sure I recognize her.

22 The three of them have
23 sacrificed so much over the years with me
24 doing all these various things that
25 you've just heard about, and without

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2 their support over the years, none of
3 that would have been possible. So I just
4 want to make sure I publicly acknowledge
5 them for being so supportive.

6 I also want to thank Councilman
7 Jones and Josh Cohen and the rest of
8 their staff, Charlita Davis, who is a
9 wonderful friend of mine who worked on
10 the Marathon for years with me, along
11 with all of City Council for honoring me
12 today with this award.

13 It's so nice to get recognition
14 for being a public servant. Many times
15 they're overlooked. We have public
16 servants throughout the City that I've
17 worked with over the 40-year plus that do
18 a great job day in and day out that go
19 unnoticed, but without them, none of this
20 happens.

21 I am so pleased of the
22 accomplishments that we've achieved as a
23 group in the Parks and Rec Department
24 over the years, not only in our
25 neighborhood communities but also what

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2 we've done on a large scale. It's
3 unheard of for a large-scale event such
4 as the Broad Street Run to happen in most
5 cities sponsored by a city, and we do
6 this -- it's sponsored by the City
7 because we own it. The Broad Street Run
8 is owned by the Parks and Rec Department,
9 but it's not technically sponsored by the
10 City. Independence Blue Cross is a
11 sponsor and there's other sponsors, but
12 the money that's generated through the
13 volunteer efforts and the groups that are
14 participating and the American Cancer
15 Society, who's the beneficiary of the
16 Broad Street Run, we were lucky enough
17 over my years of being in charge, we've
18 raised over \$6 million for the American
19 Cancer Society.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. MARINO: And having that go
22 full circle, as you heard, I am a cancer
23 survivor. So the research dollars
24 somewhere along the line helped saved my
25 life. I am a pancreatic cancer survivor.

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2 Yeah. Think about that.

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. MARINO: And Councilman Oh
5 and I got to speak at their Purple
6 Strides race a couple years ago on behalf
7 of the Pancreatic Cancer Program.

8 But as you hear lately in the
9 news with Alex Trebek having Stage 4, I
10 was lucky. I was diagnosed early. I was
11 Stage 1. You never hear that about
12 pancreatic cancer. So my promise to the
13 doctors was that I would tell my story,
14 and I do tell my story. If you're
15 getting a CAT scan, get checked. Tell
16 them to take a look at your pancreas,
17 because it's not something that they
18 pre-screen for. That's why it develops
19 into Stage 4. There's no symptoms. I
20 had my cyst for three years and it was
21 never a symptom until it finally went
22 malignant, and then they went and got it,
23 Stage 1. Very lucky, very lucky, very
24 lucky.

25 (Applause.)

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2 MR. MARINO: So spread the
3 word. Tell your people to get checked.
4 It's important.

5 It's important what the City
6 employees do day in and day out. Thank
7 them at your local rec centers. All the
8 people that work at these rec centers
9 work extremely hard to provide activities
10 for all members of the community, young
11 and old, and it's been a proud part of my
12 life to be able to be a public servant,
13 and I take it as a privilege that I know
14 each and every one of the Councilpeople
15 do also, and for that, I am extremely
16 grateful.

17 I've been lucky enough, as you
18 mentioned, about the different mayors
19 being at the race. I've been lucky
20 enough that I've worked under eight
21 mayors. Think about that. How is that
22 for survival? So I've seen the full run
23 of how things operate in this government.
24 And with Councilman Jones's support and
25 the community, him and I are working

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2 closely right now to help improve the
3 Belmont Plateau cross country courses.
4 I'm going to continue to stay involved in
5 that even though I'm retired, but that is
6 one of our diamonds in the rough. Just
7 like yesterday you heard about the
8 Schuylkill River, Belmont Plateau is the
9 same type of situation and we want all
10 your support for that.

11 So thank you once again. I
12 appreciate everybody honoring me today
13 and the Councilpeople for being involved.

14 Josh, it's always a pleasure
15 working with you in Roxborough, and thank
16 you very much, everyone.

23 Thank you, and congratulations.

24 At this time, the Chair

3 Sigma Theta Sorority. Would Patricia
4 Alford and those accompanying her please
5 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

6 (Councilmembers and guests
7 approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 joining Councilwoman Parker, we have
10 Councilman Johnson, Councilman Green,
11 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilman
12 Greenlee, Councilwoman Blackwell, and
13 Councilman Jones and Councilwoman
14 Blondell Reynolds Brown and Councilman
15 Domb.

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: As we
17 continue to get assembled here, I want
18 you to know that it is indeed an honor
19 and a privilege that I join with my
20 soror, Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
21 Brown.

22 Soror Councilwoman, how many
23 years for you on Delta?

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: 1996.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: 1996. 25

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2 years, this is my 25th anniversary this
3 year. So it is indeed an honor and a
4 privilege that we continue with what is
5 the 16th anniversary of a tradition
6 established by our former colleague and
7 my mentor and teacher, Sorer Councilwoman
8 Marian Tasco, in honoring Delta Sigma
9 Theta Sorority, Incorporated and its
10 Youth Day here in City Council.

11 Let me just say on a personal
12 note that all of our sorors who are here
13 today are women who wholeheartedly
14 believe that intelligence is the torch of
15 wisdom. We are proud to follow in the
16 footsteps of our founders. And for the
17 record, for those of you who may not be
18 familiar, now if you are an American or
19 live anywhere in this world and you don't
20 know Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
21 Incorporated, there are some challenges,
22 but nevertheless just in case, you need
23 to know of some notable Deltas who have
24 made a traditional impact on our globe:
25 Shirley Chisholm, Ruby Dee, Patricia

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2 Roberts Harris, Dr. Dorothy Height,
3 Shirley Jackson, Elaine Jones, Barbara
4 Jordan, Carrie Meek, Stephanie Tubbs
5 Jones. And my favorite story of all
6 sorors is when Soror Alexis Herman was
7 making history and becoming the Secretary
8 of Labor in our United States of America
9 during the Clinton Administration, and as
10 she was being sworn in, they came outside
11 to take a photo and President Clinton
12 says to our soror, Who are those women in
13 red? And it was a slew, a sea of red on
14 the steps. And our soror said, Oh,
15 Mr. President, those are my sisters.

16 So it is indeed an honor to be
17 here today. We want to say a special
18 thank you to Soror Pat Alford from our
19 Quaker City Chapter, who started the
20 organizing of this event and working with
21 Councilwoman Marian Tasco some years ago.

22 The resolution reads as
23 follows:

24 A resolution recognizing and
25 honoring the members of Delta Sigma Theta

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2 Sorority, Incorporated's Philadelphia
3 Alumnae, Quaker City Alumnae, and Valley
4 Forge Alumnae Chapters on the occasion of
5 Delta Youth Day at Philadelphia City
6 Council.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: We would
8 be remiss not to salute the sister of
9 Jannie from Cheyney, Patricia Banton, who
10 is also a member of our distinguished
11 sorority.

12 Whereas, the Delta Sigma Theta
13 Sorority, Incorporated was founded on the
14 campus of Howard University in 1913 by
15 twenty-two phenomenal and trendsetting
16 collegiate women who saw no limit to
17 their vision for sisterhood, scholarship,
18 and service. Delta's founders stepped
19 out on faith to march with the suffrages
20 and took a stand for social justice as
21 their first public act so black women
22 were a part of that movement. More than
23 105 years later, they continued their
24 legacy of leadership by following in the
25 footsteps of their founders and remain in

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2 the forefront of action as a voice for
3 those in need;

4 Whereas, since its founding,
5 more than 200,000 women have joined this
6 sorority. The organization is a
7 sisterhood of predominantly black
8 college-educated women. The sorority
9 currently has 1,000 collegiate and
10 alumnae chapters located in the United
11 States, England, Japan, Germany, the
12 Virgin Islands, Bermuda, the Bahamas,
13 Jamaica, and the Republic of Korea, who
14 proudly embraced their 2017-2019 biennial
15 theme of Joy in Our Sisterhood, Power in
16 Our Voice, and Service in Our Heart.

17 And on a final note of personal
18 privilege, my daughter is a legacy, a
19 member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
20 whereby she was President of her chapter
21 at Syracuse University.

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: And since
23 we're talking about family, both my
24 mother, wife, and sister are members of
25 Delta Sigma Theta, Incorporated.

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2 Whereas, the Philadelphia
3 Quaker City and Valley Forge Alumnae
4 Chapters share much more than a local
5 bond. In fact, they are each members of
6 a robust Pennsylvania statewide network
7 that includes twenty-six collegiate and
8 alumnae chapters in the Mighty Eastern
9 Region. From Philadelphia to York,
10 Allegheny to Erie and many counties in
11 between, these dynamic women of diverse
12 educational and professional backgrounds
13 join together to proudly institute the
14 sorority's Five-Point Programmatic
15 Thrust, which includes a laser focus on
16 Economic Development, Educational
17 Development, International Awareness and
18 Involvement, Physical and Mental Health,
19 and Political Awareness and Involvement
20 through service to their local and
21 national communities; and

22 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

23 Whereas, in 1927, eleven members of the
24 Gamma Chapter, led by Sadie T.M.
25 Alexander, the first national President

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2 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, formed the
3 nucleus of Xi Sigma. They together
4 stressed the importance of the academic
5 excellence, advocating for progressive
6 and equitable social, political, and
7 educational policies in the 20th Century.
8 The charter members became leaders in the
9 communities in which they lived, and in
10 1956, the nomenclature of all graduate
11 chapters were changed and Xi Sigma was
12 proudly renamed the Philadelphia Alumnae
13 Chapter; and

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: The
15 determined members of the Philadelphia
16 Alumnae Chapter humbly celebrate their
17 2018-2019 accomplishments which include:
18 serving as the host chapter for the
19 Eastern Regional stop of the Sorority's
20 PRIDE IN OUR HERITAGE TOUR, which
21 featured an enlightening dialogue between
22 Sorors Dr. Johnetta B. Cole and Nikki
23 Giovanni; hosting the outstanding Delta
24 GEMS Institute and the Dr. Betty Shabazz
25 Delta Academy programs; leading the

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2 Juanita Kidd Stout Economic Empowerment
3 Community Conference; prioritizing mental
4 health awareness for African Americans;
5 and addressing the need for worldwide
6 clean water by making contributions to
7 Water for Children throughout the
8 continent of Africa. The Philadelphia
9 Alumnae Chapter are Deltas leading by
10 example; and

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
12 the Quaker City Alumnae Chapter of Delta
13 Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated was
14 chartered on October 17th, 1976 on the
15 campus of La Salle University. There,
16 twenty-eight enthusiastic young women
17 were dedicated to combining their
18 visions, skills, and energies to
19 establish a new alumnae chapter in the
20 Philadelphia metropolitan area. The goal
21 of the chapter was to enhance the
22 Philadelphia community through its public
23 service endeavors, bringing life to the
24 mantra that Deltas were a Sisterhood
25 called to Serve; and

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2 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
3 diligent women of the Quaker City Alumnae
4 Chapter humbly celebrate their 2018 to
5 2019 accomplishments which include:
6 securing a pathway to education by
7 awarding six thousand dollars in
8 scholarships to local students; working
9 with Habitat for Humanity to build
10 quality homes for families in need;
11 lobbying members of the Pennsylvania
12 General Assembly and United States
13 Congress for an equitable investment in
14 education funding, fair housing laws,
15 affordable healthcare, gun control laws,
16 and sentencing reform; as well as
17 fundraising to support breast cancer
18 research and non-profit organizations
19 working to end human trafficking. The
20 Quaker City Alumnae Chapter are Deltas
21 demonstrating leadership and service
22 through their work; and

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Not to be
24 outdone, my daughter and my sister-in-law
25 are members of this fine sorority.

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2 Whereas, on February 10th,
3 1991, the Valley Forge Alumnae Chapter
4 was chartered with an initiation
5 membership of twenty-seven committed
6 women. The Chapter has since grown to a
7 membership of 170 dynamic, energetic, and
8 hard-working women who continue to live
9 in their mission to provide leadership
10 and scholarship to youth in our
11 community, support projects that
12 transform the lives of families
13 participating in charitable events, and
14 serve as social activists; and

15 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
16 dutiful women of the Valley Forge Alumnae
17 Chapter humbly celebrate their 2018 to
18 2019 accomplishments which include:
19 serving as a lead supporter for the
20 Valley Forge National Historical Park
21 initiative to educate visitors on the
22 contributions of African descendents
23 during periods of war; helping to foster
24 a love of reading among elementary
25 students through participation in the

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2 Gotwals Elementary School "Read It"
3 program, reaching well over 200 children
4 per month; building classroom libraries
5 through book and financial donations; and
6 supporting the efforts of the American
7 Red Cross via the Sound the Alarm
8 program, the Pillowcase Project, the
9 Hurricane Harvey Disaster Relief
10 telethon, blood drives, and volunteer
11 engagement. The Valley Forge Alumnae
12 Chapter are Deltas building a better
13 tomorrow; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

15 Whereas, the members of each of these
16 respective chapters' Social Action
17 Committees have furthered their
18 commitment to social and political
19 engagement by empowering and encouraging
20 student activism through the, quote,
21 "Election Ambassador Corps," the, quote,
22 "Behind the Ballot," end of quote, Girls
23 Badge, and continued participation in
24 Youth Leadership Day, where students
25 observe Councilmembers in action and are

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2 provided a platform to engage with
3 Councilmembers who represent the
4 districts where the students reside; and

5 Whereas, the women of Delta
6 Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated
7 continue to be magnificent examples of
8 servant leaders with an uncompromising
9 commitment to their community, which is
10 exemplified in today's annual event of
11 the Delta Youth Day at Philadelphia City
12 Council that was created at the behest of
13 the Quaker City Alumnae Chapter; now,
14 therefore, be it

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Resolved,

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 the Chair recognizes Ms. Alford for
15 remarks.

16 MS. ALFORD: Good morning. On
17 behalf of my President, Shawn Anthony,
18 and on behalf of our national
19 organization, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
20 Incorporated, I want to thank you for
21 allowing us to bring the youth here to
22 see how you work. And we always tell the
23 young people that they're not just people
24 sitting there. They're really working in
25 your interest.

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2 I have to say being born and
3 raised in Philadelphia in the University
4 City area, I got a fine education. I
5 lived in a very nice house. We
6 struggled. I hate hamburger and chicken
7 every night for about four or five years
8 after my parents purchased a home, but
9 Delta Sigma Theta, not only are we
10 educated, our job is to educate the
11 people in the community. Our job is to
12 go back and give the community the
13 resources and the things that they need
14 so they can be successful like I was
15 successful or they were successful.

16 We know the City has worked
17 really hard, and we heard that this
18 morning, in developing programs and
19 putting Philadelphia on the map, but I
20 have to remind everybody that nice
21 housing is nice, but when you make \$15 an
22 hour, you don't get \$32,600 a year. You
23 can't afford the new apartments that are
24 going up, and you have two kids and the
25 apartments are saying that it's \$2,800 a

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2 month.

3 You can't say to somebody that
4 is able to go to University of Penn
5 Hospital, Temple University, whatnot, to
6 get the resources they have for the
7 illness that they have if you have no
8 healthcare.

9 You cannot figure out whether
10 or not you're going to be represented in
11 the upcoming count for the census. We're
12 going to do everything we possibly can to
13 make sure every citizen in Philadelphia
14 is counted so the money could come to our
15 city so it can help every citizen in the
16 City of Philadelphia.

17 I just want to say, Sorcer
18 Reynolds Brown, you have been an
19 inspiration to us. Lord, we will miss
20 you. I just want to let you know that
21 they do have positions on the state and
22 the national level, and if you go there,
23 you will see this red every week, no
24 problem whatsoever.

25 I just want to thank you again

20 name is Tracey Howard. I'm the President

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MR. UZENA: Good morning,
19 Council President Clarke, members of City
20 Council. I'm here to support Resolution
21 170408 banning the suspension of
22 elementary-aged students from the first
23 through the fifth grades. This is
24 important because every child deserves to
25 have a chance to education and not feel

2 abandoned.

3 I support more investments in
4 our schools, but not -- beverage taxes is
5 not a way to do this. I am a business
6 owner in this community since 2007. We
7 run a store of only three employees, down
8 from four just a few years ago. Every
9 day customers blame me for the increased
10 costs because they can't -- they can just
11 go across the street and not pay tax.

12 Me and my wife have two other
13 stores here in Philadelphia and they are
14 struggling too. It's not just me. I
15 mean, (unintelligible) fees by 33, 35
16 percent since the introduction of tax.

17 If this tax remains, we will
18 lose our business. Please repeal this
19 tax.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Tony Vrana.

25 (No response.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Tony Vrana.

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next

5 name.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Rick Young,

7 commenting on 170408.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

10 morning.

11 MR. YOUNG: I'm speaking on

12 behalf of Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds

13 and Councilwoman Gym to support the

14 resolution for the School District of

15 Philadelphia for prohibiting suspension

16 of elementary school-aged students, but

17 I'm also here to talk about some of the

18 other things that I think is as equally

19 as important.

20 Neighborhood development.

21 Neighborhood development should include

22 everybody. Philadelphia is finally

23 referred to as the City of Neighborhoods.

24 A surge of new investment transforming

25 communities into highly sought after

2 places to live, work, and play is not all
3 a bad thing, but for the last 15 years,
4 multi-million-dollar development projects
5 has not been fair. Longtime residents
6 and business people who have been
7 committed to these neighborhoods have
8 largely not been able to participate in
9 the economic growth of our own community.
10 The development has been -- development
11 has not been diverse or inclusive. It
12 has been done by developers who do not
13 live in the neighborhood where they work
14 or look like the residents.

15 I'm an African American real
16 estate developer, a long-life resident of
17 Philadelphia. I started a business in my
18 own community, created entrepreneurial
19 programs in local elementary school. I
20 still reside in the community where I
21 grew up at.

22 As a long-time minority
23 business leader in West Philadelphia, I
24 cannot outbid out-of-town millionaires
25 for development opportunities in the

2 City. My story is not unique. It is the
3 reality of many minority developers in
4 Philadelphia.

5 Currently Philadelphia Land
6 Bank and the Redevelopment Authority
7 bundle properties and they control and
8 offer them at a higher bid. This may
9 seem logical, but it is in fact painfully
10 shortsighted and unfair when recognizing
11 smaller developers participating for
12 particularly minority developments and
13 the lack of the same capital that other
14 multi-millionaire developers have.

15 Operating the City this way
16 reduces the ability for smaller
17 developers to build reasonable priced
18 affordable projects in our neighborhoods.
19 Look around to see the result. Luxury
20 developments are going up in every
21 community that the average Philadelphian
22 cannot afford. Small local developers
23 minority business people do not get to
24 participate in the economic in their
25 neighborhoods. This is very important.

1 5/2/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Some City Councilmembers have
3 been criticized for trying to include
4 local business people, including myself,
5 in the real estate development taking
6 place in our community. I applaud this
7 effort. It is unacceptable to me and
8 should be unacceptable to everyone that
9 minority developers are scolded for
10 seeking the same seat at the table as
11 larger developers.

12 I challenge the City to use its
13 resources to create more fair opportunity
14 for smaller local developers
15 participating in the economic development
16 in our neighborhoods. I would like to
17 see more development done by local
18 diverse developers with a local diverse
19 workforce.

20 Not all neighborhood growth in
21 Philadelphia should go to outside
22 developers just because they have big
23 bank accounts. Allowing more local
24 developers who participate in
25 transforming our communities has the

2 potential of producing thoughtful
3 development, lasting benefits for
4 community, more business role models,
5 more community participation, more
6 development dollars stay in the community
7 and the neighborhood to help local folks,
8 neighborhood development in Philadelphia
9 that includes all of our neighborhoods.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Cox,
14 commenting on 181063.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MR. COX: Good morning. My
17 name is Joe Cox.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MR. COX: 181063, if we're
21 going to talk about going green like we
22 need to, why in the world would we be
23 opening new contracts for gas? This is a
24 humanitarian crisis, an economic, social,
25 and justice crisis.

2 When will we think about the
3 kids? We already have blood on our
4 hands. Until we act drastically, the
5 toll will continue to increase.

6 Philadelphia is the top five
7 worst places to live for risk of asthma.
8 Asthma is the leading cause for absentee
9 days for kids. Over 12 percent of kids
10 in school have asthma. Over 900,000
11 Philadelphians have asthma. Philadelphia
12 has the highest rate of hospitalization
13 due to asthma. Portland recently put out
14 buses that are run 100 percent on
15 renewables. Why can't Philly step up?
16 Fossil fuels should be extinct.

17 Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval,
22 commenting on 181063.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

1 5/2/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. RAVAL: Good morning. I'm
3 Meenal Raval here to speak on actually
4 three items, 170706, 181063, and 181081.
5 They're all about the climate crisis and
6 our dependence on fracked gas.

7 I am aware that only the second
8 one, Bill 181063, is on the agenda today.
9 The first item, Resolution 170706, is
10 from September of 2017. I bring it up to
11 remind ourselves that it commits the City
12 of Philadelphia to meet or exceed our
13 share of the target set by the Paris
14 Climate Accord to mitigate greenhouse gas
15 emissions. Sponsors of that bill were
16 many of you here today - Councilmember
17 Cindy Bass, Derek Green, Kenyatta
18 Johnson, Helen Gym, Curtis Jones,
19 Blondell Reynolds Brown, Bobby Henon,
20 Jannie Blackwell, and David Oh.

21 The emissions from PGW are
22 about 22 percent of Philadelphia's
23 emissions. What's been done to reduce
24 these emissions in light of our
25 commitment to the Paris Accord a year and

2 a half ago?

3 Related is Bill 181063 that
4 you've -- well, I just talked about that.
5 It's about the energy facility.

6 And Resolution 181081 about the
7 future of PGW beyond selling more fracked
8 gas. All three of these connected in my
9 head when I read yesterday's New York
10 Times article titled "Your Gas Bill is
11 Bad for You and the Planet." It says to
12 help solve the climate crisis, we need to
13 electrify everything. I highly recommend
14 this article. Some quotes from it. In
15 Berkeley, Councilwoman Kate Harrison is
16 proposing a ban on gas hookups in new
17 buildings in an effort to make sure the
18 city follows through on its 2018
19 declaration of a climate emergency, a
20 policy idea for us.

21 Stoves actually use very little
22 energy, but until people are convinced
23 that there are superior alternatives to
24 gas stoves, we will not be able to get
25 rid of gas lines to buildings and start

2 saving large amounts of money by shutting
3 down the gas distribution system. The
4 article also says gas stoves are
5 polluting our homes, that there's a
6 growing body of scientific evidence
7 showing that gas stoves throw off
8 pollutants like nitrogen dioxide and
9 carbon monoxide that when you are
10 cooking, these invisible pollutants can
11 easily reach levels that will be illegal
12 outdoors, but the Clean Air Act does not
13 reach inside the home.

14 So scientists link gas stoves
15 to asthma attacks and hospitalizations,
16 and doctors at John Hopkins urge parents
17 with asthmatic children to get rid of
18 their gas stoves, et cetera.

19 So I'm here today asking all of
20 you to step up to remember the Paris
21 Climate Accord and each of your pledges
22 to work towards it. I'm asking each of
23 you to be our climate champion this
24 coming election and leave us a memorable
25 legacy. There are many of us ready to

2 work with you on the transition. Who
3 will it be? Ms. Bass, Mr. Green,
4 Mr. Johnson or Ms. Gym? I can read the
5 whole list off. Mr. Jones, Ms. Reynolds
6 Brown, Henon, Ms. Blackwell or you,
7 Mr. Oh?

8 We need climate champions,
9 people.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Jacqueline
14 Wiggins, commenting on 190231.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon.

18 MS. WIGGINS: Good morning,
19 everyone. Good afternoon. The 190231
20 reads, "An ordinance approving a
21 Substantial Amendment to the Annual
22 Action Plan 2018-2019 for \$19,131,000
23 from the Housing Trust Fund Non-Recording
24 Fee Sub-Fund, all under certain terms and
25 conditions."

1 5/2/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I'm here today to talk in terms
3 of if this is to be supported, what does
4 it mean and what does it mean "under
5 certain terms and conditions"? I should
6 hope that some of those certain terms and
7 conditions would mean that we do
8 something about our trash problem.

9 Our trash problem is
10 outrageous, as we know, but there are
11 some issues. And, Councilman Clarke, I'm
12 directing this really to you. In an
13 April 18th article in the Philadelphia
14 Tribune, the article had to do with our
15 streets, and Commissioner Carlton
16 Williams did give comment and so forth.
17 But I'm concerned about the last
18 paragraph of that article that says, City
19 Council President Darrell Clarke said
20 that City residents are responsible for
21 the condition of the streets as well.

22 I can agree to that.

23 Here's the quote: "You talked
24 about this issue" -- this is you
25 speaking, Councilman Clarke. "You talked

2 about this issue of environmentally sound
3 ways of moving trash off the street, said
4 Clarke. I think the most environmentally
5 sound way of doing that is for people to
6 stop throwing trash on the street. At
7 the end of the day, people in this city
8 need to stop being pigs."

9 Now, I just want you to know
10 that Philadelphia taxpayers who pay
11 salaries here, yours, we are not pigs.
12 All right? We are hard-working people.
13 We are people who are deserving of more
14 than that type of descriptor.

15 And so with respect to this
16 part where it says this \$19 million, all
17 under certain terms and conditions, my
18 hope would be that we would have more
19 trash receptacles in our city, that there
20 would be other ways in which the trash
21 can be disposed of, and that we not be
22 treated as animals. We are human beings.

23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 5/2/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
4 commenting on 190195, 190325, 190324,
5 190329, 190332, 190333, and 190334.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MR. DANIHEL: This is an
10 official decree of the people in writ of
11 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
12 requires immediate action and remedy.

13 Did Council accuse a
14 presidential candidate of buying votes
15 for buy the weed and a 40? Did Council
16 deny and derive any election oversight by
17 the Commonwealth?

18 Last week, Council awarded the
19 City for conducting the most fair
20 elections. Were most educated by a law
21 school, whose professor stated he didn't
22 see a problem with anyone trying to vote
23 twice. Then Councilperson Blackwell
24 expressed Council's concern for the
25 homeless and downtrodden. Did Council

2 forget the June 2018 illegal but
3 unanimous approval to build a mall on top
4 of my stolen home with federal HUD money?

5 Are the willful and illegal
6 oath-violating behaviors so numerous, one
7 needs a scorecard to keep up?

8 If U.S. Attorney General
9 McSwain stated failure to perform a known
10 duty or task is illegal, then why have no
11 attorney generals refused to investigate
12 and prosecute the numerous oath,
13 Constitution, and law violations?

14 The constitutions require
15 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
16 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
17 duty. Your oath of office requires you
18 to act or face prison.

19 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
20 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
21 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
22 through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
23 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
24 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
25 14-4056 appear violated.

1 5/2/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I call on the federal and
3 Commonwealth governments to perform their
4 constitutional obligations to investigate
5 and prosecute all involved in the illegal
6 theft and deed transfer of my home, 1038
7 West Wyoming Avenue.

8 The denial of God-given 42 USC
9 1982 property rights for 25 years is
10 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
11 and requires immediate remedy.

12 A just government must obey the
13 rule of law. This color of law
14 government must have its Charter to
15 govern revoked until a constitutionally
16 compliant government is installed.

17 Public servants cannot refuse
18 their sworn duty to act any more than a
19 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
20 sovereign people require oath,
21 Constitution, and law be enforced, and
22 jail is required for all who violate
23 oath, Constitution or law.

24 I remind Council, it takes a
25 lot of cooperation to create and allow

2 this monumental corruption.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you very much for your testimony.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna Hagins,
7 commenting on 180723.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 MR. HAGINS: Good morning,
10 everyone.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. HAGINS: My name is Ogbonna
14 Hagins for the record. And actually I
15 want to change this. I was going to talk
16 about the dumping, but a few people
17 before me talked about our environment,
18 and the State Constitution is basically a
19 green document and we're not here --

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
21 what are you speaking about?

22 MR. HAGINS: What am I speaking
23 on?

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

25 MR. HAGINS: I'm speaking on --

2 I was going to speak on 170408, but I
3 want -- well, I'll speak on that.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
5 want to speak on --

6 MR. HAGINS: I really want to

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Okay. But you have to speak about
10 something that's on the Calendar.

11 MR. HAGINS: Okay. Let me talk
12 about not suspending children, right,
13 under the fifth grade.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Okay.

16 MR. HAGINS: So we definitely
17 shouldn't do that. I spoke about that
18 about six months. I thought that would
19 have obviously been gone, but I saw -- I
20 got a report on Facebook about our
21 schools, and in particular our schools in
22 African American neighborhoods, and that
23 there's a grading system that was
24 distributed and that the schools in the
25 hood are failing. That's primarily

2 African American children. And I
3 remember when I was teaching and actually
4 when I graduated, you know, our students
5 can't read. Our students can't write.
6 Six out of ten children who graduate
7 can't read, write or do math on a high
8 school level, and we're sitting around
9 talking about not suspending children.
10 We have to not let them graduate with a
11 false document, with a false sense that
12 they can go out here and succeed. And
13 this is primarily happening to African
14 American children with primarily African
15 American leadership in City Council, and
16 I don't understand how you can be sitting
17 here and comfortable with that and not
18 doing something drastic and radical to
19 change this education system.

20 We need a 21st century
21 education system that keeps up with
22 what's going on right now. Where is
23 coding? Where is science, technology,
24 engineering, and math? Where are our
25 trades? Where are they? We need some

2 answers.

3 And I want to piggyback on this
4 environment piece too. We have a green
5 document in the state that basically says
6 that we have a right to clean air and
7 clean water. This dumping is violating
8 our rights. Not keeping the streams
9 clean is violating the State
10 Constitution.

11 Ogbonna Hagins, 58.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

14 (Applause.)
