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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started.
4 Thank you. If the members will take
5 their seats, we'll get started.

6 To give our invocation this
7 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor Keon
8 Gerow of Catalyst for Change Church. He
9 is here today as the guest of
10 Councilwoman Blackwell.

11 I would ask all guests,
12 visitors, and members to please rise.

13 (Councilmembers, guests, and
14 visitors rise.)

15 PASTOR GEROW: Let us pray.

16 God of our weary years, God of
17 our silent tears, thou who has brought us
18 thus far on the way, thou who has by thy
19 might led us into the light, keep us
20 forever in thy path, we pray.

21 May your guiding hand bridge
22 the gap that divides party lines, ideals,
23 and factions to move our city forward
24 with love, justice, and equity. Give us
25 the power and potency to allow us to live

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2 up to the standard of truly being the
3 City of Brotherly Love and Sisterly
4 Affection.

5 Protect our elected officials,
6 our Mayor, our City Council President,
7 City Councilmembers, law enforcement,
8 firefighters, first responders, prison
9 guards, domestic workers, and all
10 citizens of our city.

11 May love conquer hate, hope
12 conquer fear, good conquer evil, civility
13 conquer debauchery, unity conquer
14 division, and give us peace in the midst
15 of the storm.

16 Make us one Philadelphia, a
17 city where black and white, rich and
18 poor, liberal and conservative, white
19 collar and blue collar, young and old can
20 stand together in the unity of our God,
21 who has not given us the spirit of fear
22 but love, power, and a sound mind.

23 May we be better, bolder, and
24 more bountiful standing on the truth of
25 your ever-lasting word that no weapon

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2 formed against us shall ever prosper.

3 We ask these in the name of the
4 one who is and was and is to come, he who
5 was in the beginning before the beginning
6 began and is in the ending after the
7 ending will end, that at that name every
8 knee must bow and every tongue must
9 confess that God is in fact God of all,
10 the matchless, marvelous, mighty name of
11 the master himself, we pray.

12 Amen.

13 (Amen.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Pastor, thank you so much for those
16 inspiring words.

17 Council will be at ease.

18 (Council at ease.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Again, thank you so much, Pastor, for
21 those inspiring words.

22 Our next order of business is
23 the approval of the Journal of the
24 meeting of Thursday, May 2nd, 2019, and
25 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
3 you, Mr. President. I move that the
4 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May
5 2nd, 2019 be approved.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
8 has been moved and properly seconded.

9 All those in favor?

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 ayes have it, and the Journal of the
16 meeting of Thursday, May 2nd 2019 stand
17 approved.

18 Our next order of business is
19 requests for leave of absence, and the
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. On behalf of the
23 majority, there are no requests of leave
24 absence today.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 Chair thanks the gentleman.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Oh.

5 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
6 Council President. On behalf of the
7 minority, there are no requests for
8 leaves of absence.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair thanks the gentleman.

11 At this time, I will dispense
12 with the regular order of business and I
13 would like to welcome and thank everyone
14 who has taken time out of their busy day
15 to come down to witness their government
16 in action. We genuinely appreciate you
17 being here. We hope that your stay here
18 today is a knowledgeable one but more so
19 than that, a pleasurable one, so much so
20 that you come back again.

21 At this time, the Chair
22 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger.

23 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
24 you, Council President. I appreciate it
25 greatly. We also have some special

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2 guests here and I would like to recognize
3 them now. They are professional fellows
4 from the country of Nepal, Pakistan, and
5 India. They are guests of the United
6 States Department of State, part of a
7 program that promotes mutual
8 understanding between our countries, and
9 I would like to have them stand up and
10 actually I'm going to mention their
11 names. There's four of them. Ms. Amati
12 Chatta (ph) from the nation of India,
13 Mr. Muhammad Usman (ph) from the country
14 of Pakistan, and Ms. Suman Nepal from
15 Nepal and also Ms. Luxmar Marijan (ph)
16 from Nepal as well.

17 And a nice round of applause
18 for our guests.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you so much for joining us today.

22 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
23 you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
3 you, Mr. President. It gives me great
4 pleasure to introduce to some and present
5 to others some folks who are very, very
6 special to me. We have 49 students from
7 Ad Prima Schools, Overbrook campus and
8 Mount Airy campus. They're accompanied
9 by three adults, two principals and the
10 CEO Niya Blackwell. And I mention Niya
11 specifically because many remember when
12 she was lawyer in this city. She was
13 lawyer to John Street when he was Mayor.
14 She was lawyer to the Prison
15 Commissioner, and when she represented
16 many prisoners, she did so well, people
17 wanted her to run for judge, but instead
18 of running for judge, especially after
19 the days of Lucien Blackwell, she decided
20 to leave government altogether and become
21 a CEO of a charter school that does
22 better each and every year.

23 So we're proud that they are
24 here. They'll be in the Caucus Room
25 after our session getting lunch, and I

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2 hope that those of you who remember Niya
3 Blackwell, the apple of Lu's eye, will
4 stop in and say hello, if you will. They
5 are to my left in the balcony so that
6 they could all stay together, and I'm
7 just overjoyed to have them with us.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
12 you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 welcome. We appreciate you being here
15 today.

16 At this time, the Chair
17 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
18 present a resolution recognizing the
19 employees of the Philadelphia Department
20 of Prisons. Would Commissioner Blanche
21 Carney and those accompanying her please
22 join the Councilman at the podium.

23 (Councilmembers and guests
24 approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

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2 joining Councilman Jones, we have
3 Councilwoman Parker, Councilman Henon,
4 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman
5 Blackwell, Councilman Taubenberger, and
6 Councilman Johnson.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: So I think
8 it might have been four years ago there
9 was an article done by the Inquirer about
10 a budget hearing we had where I mentioned
11 a guy from my neighborhood named Ray-Ray.
12 Ray-Ray was a young man who I would say
13 his parents, in effect, failed him, not
14 providing the kind of guidance he needed
15 to grow up straight like an arrow.

16 I would then say the education,
17 public education, failed him, because he
18 could not read up to par by the time he
19 was in the 4th grade, so he used to
20 manufacture ways to get kicked out of
21 class so he could play hooky, so he could
22 do mischief.

23 I think spirituality failed
24 him, because he wasn't guided by a
25 different light that would prevent him

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2 morally from doing some of the heinous
3 things he used to do. And all of us kind
4 of feared and loved Ray-Ray, but when
5 Ray-Ray went away to jail, it was a
6 holiday in my neighborhood. Everybody
7 was happy, talking about finally we can
8 get some peace.

9 What often happens is, when all
10 of these institutions fail a young
11 person, it is the correction officer's
12 job to be that line, the line that should
13 have been there at the dinner table and
14 the family, the line that should have
15 been there in the school where he learned
16 how to play well with others. But these
17 individuals, these professionals have to
18 dance a delicate balance of providing
19 justice, keeping the public safe, and
20 keeping themselves safe, because after an
21 8- to 16-hour shift, they have to go back
22 to their families, right?

23 You can nod in your appropriate
24 place yes.

25 And they cannot take their job

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2 home with them. That is a delicate
3 balancing act.

4 I want to thank the President
5 and Donna Reed Miller too for appointing
6 me to the Public Safety Committee. I
7 think that's a cruel joke you play on
8 freshmen.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
10 figured it out.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: It's a lot
12 of work if you take it up, but I had an
13 opportunity to then learn about the
14 correctional system, and at the time --
15 what is it, seven prisons that were up
16 there? Six. Six prisons that were up on
17 State Road, and I had an opportunity to
18 go in all of them, including the House of
19 Corrections, which we have now shut down,
20 and I learned an appreciation for these
21 professionals. They do far more than
22 walk the tiers. They're social workers.
23 They're dieticians. They are counselors.
24 They are people who deal with medicines.
25 They are people who deal with the safety

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2 of the individual while in custody. And
3 I'm looking at you because I truly do
4 appreciate what you do.

5 And without further adieu,
6 recognizing the employees of the
7 Philadelphia Department of Prisons for
8 their professional contributions and
9 services; and proclaiming the week of May
10 6th to May 10th, 2019 as Correctional
11 Employee Week in the City of
12 Philadelphia.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
14 more than 2,400 Philadelphians work under
15 an oath to uphold the City Charter, the
16 Pennsylvania Constitution, and the
17 Constitution of the United States through
18 their work at the Department of Prisons;
19 and

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
21 correctional officers, social workers,
22 medical, maintenance, and administrative
23 personnel work daily to provide dedicated
24 service to our residents, while ensuring
25 the security and welfare of over 4,000

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2 inmates in the City of Philadelphia; and

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
4 correctional employees carry out programs
5 that encourage the dignity of those who
6 are incarcerated and create an
7 environment in which those who wish to
8 make changes in their lives may become
9 prospering members of their communities;
10 and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
12 Whereas, the correctional workers
13 employed by Philadelphia's Department of
14 Prisons strive to help those who will be
15 released from city facilities, to achieve
16 successful reintegration into our
17 communities as returning citizens; and

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, in
19 1984, President Ronald Reagan signed a
20 proclamation officially recognizing the
21 first week in May as "National
22 Correctional Employees Week." It is
23 called upon officials of State and Local
24 governments and all people of the United
25 States to observe this week with their

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2 appropriate ceremonies; and

3 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
4 professionalism, dedication, and courage
5 exhibited by these officers in their
6 performance of these demanding and often
7 conflicting roles deserve our utmost
8 appreciation and admiration; now,
9 therefore, be it

10 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

11 Resolved, that the Council of the City of
12 Philadelphia, hereby recognizes the
13 employees of the Philadelphia Department
14 of Prisons for their professional
15 contributions and services; and proclaims
16 the week of May 6th through May 10th as
17 Correctional Employee Week in the City of
18 Philadelphia.

19 Further resolved, that an
20 engrossed copy of this resolution be
21 presented to the employees of the
22 Philadelphia Department of Prisons as
23 evidence of the sincere respect and
24 sentiments of this legislative body.

25 Congratulations.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Just one
4 point of information, this is the first
5 African American female Prison
6 Commissioner in the history of the City
7 of Philadelphia.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 the Chair recognizes Commissioner Carney.

11 COMMISSIONER CARNEY: Thank
12 you, Council President, Councilman Jones,
13 other esteemed Councilpersons here
14 joining me today and, most importantly,
15 some of the staff that represent the
16 Philadelphia Department of Prisons,
17 inclusive of uniform staff, correctional
18 industries, vocational educators. We
19 also have behavioral health, medical
20 professionals here, our management, IT
21 systems, Training Academy. These folks
22 represent the best of what occurs behind
23 five major operating facilities located
24 in the Northeast portion of Philadelphia.

25 We are residents of

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2 Philadelphia. We understand that this is
3 a delicate balance in providing safety,
4 security for folks that find themselves
5 detained in our facilities. But the best
6 of a man is measured by how he treats his
7 fellow man, and it's through the delivery
8 of services 365 days a year, seven days a
9 week, 24-hour operation that these
10 dedicated folks that are joining me now
11 and those that are in full operation in
12 those departments and facilities on State
13 Road, that we represent the City of
14 Philadelphia and the best that it has to
15 offer those that find themselves
16 incarcerated.

17 And it's with humble submission
18 that I thank the Council for honoring and
19 recognizing the work that we do as part
20 of the public safety cluster. And staff
21 behind me and those maybe watching from
22 the facilities, I applaud you, because I
23 could do this not independent of you, and
24 I recognize and I acknowledge this day
25 and every day your commitment to public

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2 safety.

3 Thank you, and God bless.

4 (Appause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, and congratulations.

10 At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will
12 present a resolution on my behalf
13 recognizing the Masterman School Team.
14 Would Brett Mandel and those accompanying
15 him please join the Councilman at the
16 podium.

17 (Councilmembers and guests
18 approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
20 joining Councilman Greenlee, we have
21 Councilman Taubenberger and Councilwoman
22 Blackwell.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, Mr. President.

25 On behalf of Council President

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2 Clarke, it's nice to be able to repeat
3 some things, and this is to recognize a
4 great school in the City of Philadelphia.

5 So this is a resolution
6 honoring, congratulating, and recognizing
7 Julia R. Masterman School Team for their
8 2019 Odyssey of the Mind State
9 Championship and wishing them success as
10 World Finalists at the Odyssey of the
11 Mind International Competition.

12 Whereas, Odyssey of the Mind is
13 an international creative problem-solving
14 competition that engages students in
15 challenges involving a combination of
16 engineering, art, and performance; and

17 Whereas, Odyssey of the Mind
18 has been encouraging students around the
19 world to "think outside the box,"
20 teaching students to work together as a
21 team to solve challenging problems in a
22 productive way since 1978; and

23 Whereas, the Odyssey of the
24 Mind teaches students how to think
25 divergently by providing open-ended

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2 problems that appeal to a wide range of
3 interests. Students learn how to
4 identify challenges and to think
5 creatively to solve those problems. They
6 are free to express their ideas and
7 suggestions without fear of criticism.

8 Somehow we don't get that,
9 right? I don't know.

10 Anyway, and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
12 the Julia R. Masterman School's Odyssey
13 of the Mind Team competed in the
14 program's Division III, 9th through 12th
15 grades, in a problem called, quote, "OMER
16 to the Rescue again," end quote; and

17 Whereas, the problem challenges
18 students to construct and drive an
19 original vehicle that must fit into one
20 or two small suitcases. The vehicle must
21 be assembled to accomplish various
22 creative rescues before being
23 disassembled and repacked and then
24 reassembled before participating in a
25 hero's parade;

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And

3 whereas, the Masterman School Team
4 comprises students from a number of
5 Philadelphia public schools including
6 Masterman High School 10th-grade student,
7 Drew Brown; Central High School
8 12th-grade student, Tillie Donover;
9 Masterman High School 12th-grade student,
10 Louise Iodice; Masterman High School
11 12th-grade student, Abigail Leighton;
12 Science Leadership Academy 12th-grade
13 student, Sofia Powers; Central High
14 School 10th-grade student, Ariel
15 Weinbaum; and Central High School
16 12th-grade student, Rose Weinbaum. The
17 team is coached by parent Brett Mandel
18 and by parent and Powel Elementary School
19 teacher Chris Powers; and

20 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

21 Whereas, after placing first in the
22 Southeastern Pennsylvania Regional
23 Competition held at Pennsbury High School
24 on March the 2nd, 2019, the team placed
25 in first place in the Pennsylvania State

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2 Finals held at Pocono Mountain East High
3 School on April the 6th, 2019;

4 Whereas, at the Pennsylvania
5 State Finals, the team placed first in
6 each of the competition's three scoring
7 categories to best their rivals. The
8 team has earned their trip to compete at
9 the Odyssey of the Mind World Finals to
10 be held at Michigan State University May
11 22nd through 25th, 2019; now, therefore,
12 be it

13 Resolved, that Council of the
14 City of Philadelphia, hereby honors and
15 congratulates and recognizes the Julia R.
16 Masterman School's Odyssey of the Mind
17 for the 2019 Odyssey of the Mind State
18 Championship and wishing them success as
19 the World Finalist at the Odyssey of the
20 Mind International Competition.

21 And as a parent of a graduate
22 of Masterman, I am also very, very, very
23 proud. And bring it home.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Be it
25 resolved further, that an engrossed copy

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2 of this resolution be presented to the
3 Julia R. Masterman School's Odyssey of
4 the Mind Team as evidence of the sincere
5 sentiments of this legislative body.

6 Congratulations so far and good
7 luck in the future.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 the Chair recognizes Mr. Mandel for
11 remarks.

12 MR. MANDEL: Thank you so, so
13 much for having us in today and for
14 having us in in past years. We are
15 thrilled to represent Philadelphia at the
16 World Finals. And let me tell you this
17 little dynasty in our nerd sport has
18 represented you very well. They have
19 brought home a second place trophy, a
20 third place trophy, a fourth place -- or
21 fifth place mention and a sixth place
22 mention, and hopefully this year they'll
23 continue to do that.

24 This Chamber has literally
25 watched some of these people grow up.

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2 This will be the last time you'll see
3 some of them, including my daughter, who
4 is off to Brown; Abby Leighton who is off
5 to Yale; Louise Iodice who is off to
6 Pratt; Sofia Powers who is off to Temple;
7 and Tillie Donover who is off to Penn.

8 This is what happens when we
9 support our public school students.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Again, congratulations and thank you.

17 At this time, the Chair
18 recognizes Councilman Domb, who will
19 present a resolution celebrating the 71st
20 Anniversary of the foundation of the
21 State of Israel. Would Naomi Adler and
22 those accompanying her please join the
23 Councilman at the podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining Councilman Domb, we have
4 Councilwoman Parker, Councilman Greenlee,
5 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman Oh,
6 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilman
7 Jones, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown. It
8 looks like we have everybody, all members
9 of Council.

10 Please proceed, Councilman.

11 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Celebrating
12 the 71st Anniversary of the foundation of
13 the State of Israel; and

14 Whereas, on the 14th of May,
15 1948, in Tel Aviv, David Ben-Gurion
16 declared "the establishment of the Jewish
17 state in Palestine, to be called Israel";

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Ben-Gurion
19 would serve as the nation's first and
20 longest-serving prime minister; and

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
22 the creation of a Jewish homeland
23 represented for many the end of countless
24 years of oppression, particularly in
25 Eastern Europe;

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
3 whereas, the Jewish community had made
4 calls for a territorial Jewish state
5 since at least the late 1800s in order to
6 escape persecution; and

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, in
8 October 1946, following the devastation
9 of the Second World War and particularly
10 the Holocaust, President Truman declared
11 the support of the United States for a
12 Jewish state in Palestine;

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: In
14 November of 1947, the United Nations
15 General Assembly passed a resolution
16 allowing for the establishment of a
17 Jewish state;

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
19 this paved the way for the Declaration of
20 the Establishment of the State of Israel
21 the following May; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
23 Philadelphia has been home to a thriving
24 Jewish Community since the late 17th
25 Century; and

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
3 our City has long had a close
4 relationship to Israel that extends
5 beyond the traditional bond between
6 democratic nations;

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: We are
8 connected by our shared values of
9 diversity and equality, our shared
10 commitment to education and innovation,
11 and our shared passion for social and
12 economic justice. We are both
13 communities that face our own unique
14 challenges, but are committed to the
15 basic principles of brotherly and
16 sisterly love; and

17 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
18 Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia
19 nurtures a dynamic and mutually
20 beneficial relationship with Israel to
21 the Philadelphia-Netivot and S'dot Negev
22 Partnership, established in 1997;

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Originally
24 founded as a city of North African
25 immigrants, Netivot has welcomed

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2 Russian-speaking and Ethiopian
3 immigrants, reflecting true diversity;

4 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Over
5 the past 20 years, the Jewish Federation
6 has invested over \$10 million in our
7 partnership region while building a
8 strong relationship that transcends
9 dollars and capital projects;

10 COUNCILMAN OH: The Jewish
11 Federation continues to build the
12 personal connections that have grown
13 between the people of Philadelphia and
14 Netivot and S'dot and S'dot Negev; and

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
16 on May 9th, the City of Philadelphia will
17 celebrate Israel's anniversary with a
18 ceremonial flag raising outside of the
19 Municipal Services Building to be
20 followed by a celebration on the apron of
21 the Municipal Services Building in which
22 all are invited; now, therefore, be it

23 Resolved, by the Council of the
24 City of Philadelphia, that this body
25 hereby acknowledges and celebrates the

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2 71st Anniversary of the foundation of the
3 State of Israel.

4 Congratulations, everybody.
5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
7 the Chair recognizes Ms. Adler for
8 remarks.

9 MS. ADLER: Thank you, Council
10 President Clarke and thank you to
11 Councilman Domb and all the members who
12 join the resolution today on what is
13 called Yom Ha'atzmaut, Israel's
14 Independence Day.

15 It is such an honor to mark
16 Israel's 71st birthday with you, and on
17 behalf of the entire Jewish community in
18 the Greater Philadelphia area, I thank
19 you for your constant support of our
20 Jewish homeland and our local Jewish
21 institutions, particularly at this time.

22 While Israel is still a young
23 nation, it represents a dream and a
24 longing that Jews have had for thousands
25 of years. The creation of the State of

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2 Israel in 1948 in the ancestral homeland
3 of the Jewish people is, in short, a
4 miracle.

5 In its 71 short years, Israel
6 has become a vibrant democracy with a
7 thriving economy, all while remaining an
8 open and welcoming place for all of you,
9 people of all faiths to gather and
10 worship in holy and sacred sites.

11 The City of Philadelphia has
12 had a long, strong connection to Israel,
13 and over the course of the last decade,
14 the bonds have grown even stronger. Our
15 flourishing business-to-business
16 partnerships have expanded mutual
17 interests. More than \$5 billion a year
18 of commerce is going between Philadelphia
19 and Israel every single year.

20 We have mutual interests in
21 developing renewable energy sources and
22 of course highly advanced healthcare, and
23 last year, our own Philadelphia Orchestra
24 traveled to Israel with the Jewish
25 Federation for its series of unbelievable

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2 sold-out performances, deepening our
3 relationship on an artistic level. And,
4 most importantly, we share a cherished
5 commitment to equality and social
6 justice, a desire to remain a city and a
7 nation that welcomes immigrants and
8 provides opportunities to all people who
9 wish to seek a better life.

10 Israel has overcome and
11 continues to overcome enormous obstacles.
12 Every day Israelis face threats to their
13 security and safety, seeking cover in
14 bomb shelters, and this is a way of life
15 for many of the residences that we
16 support.

17 Here in the U.S., Jews face not
18 only a disturbing rise in anti-Semitism
19 but also a rise in anti-Zionism, where
20 protesters deny Jewish connections to
21 their homeland and seek the elimination
22 of this Jewish state entirely.

23 Resolutions like the one we
24 have today are very important and they
25 send a clear message that hate and

2 anti-Semitism and anti-Zionism have no
3 home here in Philadelphia. And the bonds
4 we share with the Jewish homeland of
5 Israel will remain strong and will
6 continue to grow.

7 On behalf of the Jewish

9 reminder, today is the day of Israel's
10 independence, so we are celebrating it
11 right outside this building. We invite
12 you to come and join us between 12:00 and
13 2:00 at Thomas Paine Plaza to join in
14 festivities and of course with food,
15 giveaways, and music. Zahav, the best
16 restaurant in the United States, as we've
17 just heard yet again, has created some
18 special treats. So you've got to come
19 out and mark the occasion with us.
20 Supplies are limited of course because
21 everyone is going to go there. We hope
22 to see you soon.

24 recognizing us today.

4 referred Bill No. 190315, entitled "An
5 ordinance amending Title 9 of The
6 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Regulation
7 of Businesses, Trades and Professions,'
8 by adding a new Chapter 9-4700, to
9 provide protections for parking employees
10 against wrongful discharge"; and

11 Bill No. 190316, entitled "An
12 ordinance amending Section 9-601 of The
13 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Garages,
14 Parking Lots, Sales Lots and Sales
15 Showrooms,' to add requirements for
16 sufficient staff for parking garages,
17 parking lots, and valet services,"
18 respectfully reports it has considered
19 the same and returns the attached bills
20 to Council with a favorable
21 recommendation.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair again recognizes Councilwoman
24 Parker.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

you, Mr. President. I move that the
rules of Council be suspended so as to
permit first reading this day of Bill
Nos. 190315 and 190316.

(Duly seconded.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. It has been moved and
properly seconded that the rules of
Council be suspended so as to permit
first reading this day of Bills No.
190315 and 190316.

All those in favor say aye.

(Aye.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Those opposed?

(No response.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
ayes have it, and these bills will be
placed on our First Reading Calendar
today.

Our next order of business is
consideration of the Calendar. I note
that the bills just reported from
committee with a suspension of the rules

2 have been deemed to have had a first
3 reading. They will be placed on our
4 Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar
5 at our next session of Council.

6 As there are no additional
7 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
8 Chair recognizes Councilman -- there he
9 is -- Councilman Henon for the purpose of
10 calling up resolutions and bills on the
11 Second Reading and Final Passage
12 Calendar.

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. Yes, I am here, and the
15 following resolutions and bills are being
16 called for the Second Reading and Final
17 Passage Calendars today. They are Bill
18 Nos. 190367, 190370, 190371, 180937, and
19 180976. All other bills and resolutions
20 are being held.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

23 Before considering these
24 resolutions and bills on the Final
25 Passage Calendar today, we will have our

2 public comment session. It will go as
3 follows:

4 When your name is called, you
5 will go to the podium in the middle of
6 the Council Chambers. There's a device
7 on that podium. When the light turns
8 green on that device, it will be your

10 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
11 conclude your remarks. When the light
12 turns red, we'd ask that you please
13 adhere to our guidelines and conclude
14 yours remark. I want to thank you very
15 much for your anticipated cooperation.
16 You will be given three minutes to speak.
17 Thank you very much.

18 Mr. Decker, please call the
19 first name on the list.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Thomas J. Smith,
21 commenting on 190371.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MR. SMITH: Good morning.

1 5/9/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
3 sorry. The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Squilla.

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I just have to leave the
7 Chambers. I'd like to be recorded as
8 voting aye on all bills and resolutions
9 moving forward.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 I think there may be one amendment also.

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And the
13 amendment.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you.

16 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 MR. SMITH: Good morning. My
20 name is Thomas Smith. I am the Chief
21 Operating Officer for Moss Rehab, a
22 nationally recognized leader in physical
23 medicine and rehabilitation and a proud
24 member of the Einstein Healthcare
25 Network. I'm here today to comment on

2 Resolution 190371.

3 Moss Rehab and Einstein are
4 humbled by the response that we've
5 received from Councilwoman Parker and the
6 City of Philadelphia to our request to
7 make the new Accessible Icon the citywide
8 symbol for designating accessible parking
9 for persons with disabilities and commend
10 the City for taking this action.

11 Moss Rehab and the Einstein
12 Healthcare Network adopted the new
13 Accessible Icon network-wide in 2014, and
14 the people we are so privileged to serve,
15 those with disability, expressed their
16 overwhelming gratitude for representing
17 the mobility, independence, and strength
18 that they possess. We believe those
19 feelings will now be experienced by
20 countless others with disabilities who
21 live in or visit Philadelphia.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Nosung Park,

2 commenting on 170408.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. PARK: Good morning,

5 Councilperson Clarke and members of City
6 Council. Today I am here to support the
7 resolution banning of the suspension of
8 elementary-aged students from the first
9 through fifth grade. Of course education
10 is a very important community investment,
11 but it should not be done at the expense
12 of the businesses that our city depends
13 on.

14 My name is Nosung Park and my
15 business, Liberty Gas Station, is located
16 in District 9, Councilwoman Cherelle
17 Parker's district.

18 Councilmember Parker, I urge
19 you to support the legislation to repeal
20 the beverage tax. I have been running
21 the business for more than 30 years. We
22 have about 25 employees, and this tax,
23 sugar tax, is putting all that in
24 jeopardy. The customers all are crossing
25 over to Cheltenham Avenue just one street

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2 across and leaving the community to spend
3 their money for their product. And part
4 of the problem is, the tax is confusing
5 the people. I can have two juice product
6 that look like the same, but one is
7 taxed, the one is not, and a diet drink
8 doesn't have sugar are taxed, but
9 chocolate milk that contains sugar is
10 not. Whatever this kind of sugary tax
11 hurt kind of small business in the City,
12 most small business in the City.

13 So I plead and even begging,
14 please get rid of this kind of tax and
15 energize small business in the City, and
16 then enter that small business in the
17 City. Then after that, we pay more tax
18 for this city.

19 Thanks a lot.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna Hagins,
23 commenting on 190242.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. HAGINS: Good morning,

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2 everyone.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 afternoon.

5 MR. HAGINS: Good morning,
6 everyone. My name is Ogbonna Hagins.
7 I'm going to be speaking about Resolution
8 190242, resolution condemning the Trump
9 administration's proposal to eliminate
10 funding for the Special Olympics. The
11 Special Olympics for me has always been
12 great to be able to see people who we
13 look at as people who can walk standard,
14 we look at them and we see in
15 wheelchairs, maybe walking with a limp,
16 maybe missing a leg. It's very exciting
17 to watch what they can do, but I don't
18 know if many of you know that there's an
19 Americans with Disabilities Act, which is
20 supposed to provide reasonable
21 accommodations for those with
22 disabilities. And from what I
23 understand, that -- and let me just say
24 this too, that Donald Trump is a
25 distraction. When you mention Donald

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2 Trump after three years of him being in
3 office, we already know what Donald is up
4 to, right? But do you know that in
5 Philadelphia, Philadelphia has the
6 smallest disabilities office in the
7 nation, the absolute smallest, with the
8 largest population of disabled people.

9 So, yeah, I'm down with
10 condemning Donald Trump, but I'm also
11 down with lifting up the disabilities
12 office in Philadelphia so that we can
13 accommodate the disabled population in
14 Philadelphia.

15 Don't be distracted with
16 politicians telling us to look at Donald
17 Trump. Because at the same time that
18 they're telling you to look at Donald
19 Trump, they're pickpocketing. They're
20 pickpocketing you while they keep
21 focusing on Donald Trump, who has been in
22 office for three years.

23 So I absolutely applaud the
24 Councilman for wanting to address this
25 and to condemn Donald Trump for cutting

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2 the funding, but we have to focus on
3 Philadelphia. We are representing
4 Philadelphians, and Philadelphians who
5 are disabled deserve to be able to get on
6 the sub at every single stop.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. HAGINS: They deserve to be
9 able to get into buildings that we can
10 all just walk into.

11 My name, Ogbonna Hagins. 58 is
12 my number. Let's make Philly great.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Islam Sharief.
17 Islam --

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: He's
19 here. He's here.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 afternoon.

23 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good
24 morning, everyone.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

1 5/9/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 morning.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Islam
4 Sharief and Blind Faith 4 U 2, or we can
5 go by Sharief. We'd like to speak on the
6 Bill 190367.

7 MR. SHARIEF: This bill is in
8 reference to the Redevelopment Authority
9 giving some more authority to issue
10 properties, and I've been part of this
11 city for 50 years. I've been a
12 contractor for 30, and I haven't gotten
13 one property. I'm a non-profit
14 organization as well, and I have applied
15 for over 300 properties and haven't been
16 given any reconsideration.

17 So I worked for the
18 Redevelopment Authority. I worked for
19 the Philadelphia Housing Authority. I
20 worked for PHDC as an inspector. So I'm
21 saying what do I have to do to be noticed
22 and identified that my corporation, which
23 I have two non-profits corporations,
24 haven't been considered for anything?
25 But the point that we have to speak on,

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2 my daughter would like to read it out to
3 you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hi,
7 everyone, again. We currently have a
8 forum out. You might see our flyers
9 hanging out. It's for Blind Faith 4 U 2,
10 Incorporated. It just introduces them as
11 a non-profit corporation, seeking to
12 unite with other believers to present
13 another clear opportunity to serve God.
14 We want to print the ideas to have
15 churches in Philadelphia ring their
16 church bells at certain times of the day
17 to pray.

18 With all the violence that
19 takes place in the City of Philadelphia
20 and in America, that this could be a good
21 place to start. If we can choose four to
22 five times a day for church bells to ring
23 and for people that could enter these
24 church doors and just ask God for
25 forgiveness, maybe there could be some

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2 type of resolution.

3 MR. SHARIEF: We want to just
4 make this idea clear that we need the
5 help of City Council, TV, radio, have
6 public announcements that at certain
7 times of the day that the churches --
8 there's so much violence in churches and
9 on the streets -- will take a hold of
10 this idea and actually ring church bells
11 and people will come to the recognition
12 that maybe we should have an idea to stop
13 what we're doing and make concession to
14 God and do his work. With this idea, we
15 think that we can bring forth some
16 forgiveness.

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And
18 hopefully for our future youth -- we have
19 my son, he's nine, out here passing out
20 our flyers. We just want to make the
21 City a safer place for everyone,
22 honestly.

23 MR. SHARIEF: We thank you very
24 much.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you for your testimony. Appreciate
3 you being here.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Frank Criniti,
6 commenting on 180729.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
9 afternoon.

10 MR. CRINITI: Good afternoon,
11 President of Council and all the
12 Councilpeople in this room over here. I,
13 first of all, want to thank Councilman
14 Kenyatta Johnson's office for working
15 with me on Bill 180729 out there in the
16 field, but Council President and, I
17 believe it's, Greenlee -- I'm bad in
18 pronouncing names. I apologize. But
19 I've been retired for a year and a half
20 down there in South Philadelphia and
21 didn't have nothing to do, but to keep
22 occupied, I started a thing down in my
23 own neighborhood, illegal dumping of all
24 the trash, construction material that's
25 being dumped not just in South

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2 Philadelphia but throughout the City.

3 Now, mind you -- oh, by the
4 way, I apologize. I want to thank
5 Councilwoman Blackwell over there for
6 giving me the 20 minutes last week in
7 regards to the homeless people.

8 Now, going around in South
9 Philadelphia and Southwest Philadelphia,
10 I turn around and ran across to a
11 homeless kid that I was taking pictures
12 of illegal dumping of construction
13 companies that keep dumping in our
14 streets. They don't care where they dump
15 at. And I'm glad that this bill was
16 passed or introduced or how it's -- I
17 don't know the legal end of it, but I
18 work out there in the streets. I don't
19 work. I volunteer for this work. I just
20 want all neighborhoods, all neighborhoods
21 in Philadelphia to avoid this illegal
22 dumping, and I hope the bill passes where
23 the penalty becomes \$300 to \$1,000 for
24 residential one bag, two bags, whatever
25 it may be, and contractors -- and I'm the

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2 one who suggested it in Councilman
3 Kenyatta's office for that \$300 to \$1,000
4 fine for an individual that gets caught
5 in surveillance cameras or whatever.

6 I also wish that any contractor
7 which was in the news the other day of
8 two contractors who are dumping, illegal
9 dumping, in North Philly up there, I wish
10 they would turn around and pass a penalty
11 of \$5,000 to \$10,000. So this way, we
12 give those people kind of a sign that
13 you're not going to dump in anybody's
14 yard.

15 I have three methods that I use
16 and, that is, the first time I give them
17 a courtesy call or send them a letter.
18 The second will be a \$300 to \$1,000 fine.
19 And the third, I'd like to ask the City
20 to turn around all the dumpsters and just
21 fill it up from the incinerator and turn
22 around and bring it to their house in
23 front of their porch, see how they like
24 it.

25 You could not believe what some

2 of the things I found in the trash bags
3 or throughout the City of Philadelphia,
4 South Philly and Southwest Philly that I
5 cleared majority with the help of
6 departments over here.

7 So thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
12 commenting on 190367, 160720, and 190370.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MR. DANIHEL: Afternoon. This
17 is an official decree of the people in
18 writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
19 such, requires immediate action and
20 remedy.

21 Every week, Council, Mayor,
22 Governor, and others transfer private
23 property to the government, probably
24 illegally.

25 The Thirteenth Amendment states

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2 neither slavery nor involuntary servitude
3 shall exist within the United States.
4 Are Council, Mayor, Governor, and others
5 unanimously institutionalizing slavery
6 and involuntary servitude? Stripping my
7 42 USC 1982 property rights and theft of
8 my constitutionally guaranteed just
9 compensation leaves me without the fruits
10 of my 28 years of payments.

11 In Nazi Germany or Venezuela
12 people have no property rights.
13 Fortunately Franklin and others created a
14 republic, if we can keep it.

15 Restricted by the rule of law
16 and requiring prosecution when
17 officials -- look amongst yourselves --
18 and others are plundering the people.

19 Why hasn't the Attorney General
20 investigated and prosecuted my numerous
21 filings? Why hasn't the State Police,
22 Philadelphia Police, or the Sheriff
23 Department arrested anyone? Clearly,
24 this RICO-style conspiracy to deny rights
25 exists, and immediate action is required.

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The constitutions require immediate remedy of this breach of law, breach of close, breach of fiduciary duty. Your oath of office requires you to act or face prison.

42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986, 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA Constitution, Article I, Sections 1 through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709, 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear violated.

I call on the federal and Commonwealth governments to perform their constitutional obligations to investigate and prosecute all involved in the theft and illegal deed transfer of my home, 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

The denial of God-given 42 USC 1982 properties rights for 25 years is egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating, and requires immediate remedy.

A just government must obey the rule of law. This color of law

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2 government must have its Charter to
3 govern revoked until a constitutionally
4 compliant government is installed.

5 Public servants cannot refuse
6 their sworn duty to act any more than a
7 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
8 sovereign people require oath,
9 Constitution, and law be enforced, and
10 jail is required for all who violate
11 oath, Constitution, or law.

12 I remind Council, it takes a
13 lot of cooperation to create and allow
14 this monumental corruption.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval,
19 commenting on 180976.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 afternoon.

23 MS. RAVAL: My name is Meenal
24 Raval. I'm here today to speak on two
25 bills that are on the agenda. 181063 is

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2 about PGW's proposed LNG facility and
3 180976, which authorizes the Philadelphia
4 Energy Authority to purchase electricity,
5 gas, and motor fuel for the City's needs.

6 Neither bill considers the
7 climate crisis and the need to rapidly
8 transition to zero and low-carbon energy
9 sources. I refer you to Resolution
10 170706 when Council committed to meet or
11 exceed the emissions reduction goals set
12 by the Paris Climate Agreement. This is
13 why we support the Office of
14 Sustainability's municipal energy master
15 plan to reduce and transition all of the
16 City's energy needs to clean, renewable
17 energy.

18 To support the municipal energy
19 master plan, we have worked with
20 Councilmember Reynolds Brown to introduce
21 Bill 181067 asking for public hearings to
22 discuss this transition. This bill has
23 been in committee since last December.

24 Yes, 22 percent of the City's
25 electricity will be powered by solar from

1 5/9/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the Adams solar project so that we'll
3 need to purchase less dirty electricity,
4 but I learned this week that this
5 contract has yet to be finalized.

6 And, yes, our Office of
7 Transportation and Infrastructure Systems
8 is working to transition the City's fleet
9 to all electric vehicles so that we'll
10 need less motor fuel.

11 And, yes, our Office of
12 Sustainability is working on energy
13 efficiency for City buildings to reduce
14 our gas heating usage, but I sense
15 they're understaffed to take this on at
16 the scale required.

17 So I ask that Council schedule
18 hearings about the municipal energy
19 master plan, as suggested by Bill No.
20 181067.

21 I also ask that you hold Bill
22 No. 180976 about municipal energy
23 procurement until after this hearing
24 about the municipal energy master plan.
25 There can be no business as usual when

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2 we're in a crisis.

3 Alternatively we can revise
4 Bill 180976 to include language to
5 gradually reduce our purchase of
6 electricity, gas, and gasoline or diesel
7 in line with the climate goals we are
8 committed to.

9 I also ask that Council
10 consider increasing the budget for the
11 Office of Sustainability to take on the
12 energy transition work that's needed.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Rick Young,
18 commenting on 190367.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 afternoon.

22 MR. YOUNG: Good morning. Good
23 afternoon. I would like to speak on
24 Councilman Clarke and Councilman Greenlee
25 efforts to move more of the development

2 from the PRA to the neighborhood. It's
3 just something I would like to say on
4 your behalf, and I would just like to
5 read something to you.

6 Neighborhood development should
7 include everybody. Philadelphia is
8 finally referred to as the City of
9 Neighborhoods. A surge in new investment
10 transforming communities to highly
11 sought-after places to live, work, and
12 play is not all a bad thing, but for the
13 last 15 years, multi-million-dollar
14 development projects has not been fair.
15 Longtime residents, business people who
16 have been committed to these
17 neighborhood, have largely not been able
18 to participate in the economic growth of
19 their own community. Developments have
20 not been diverse and inclusive and have
21 been done by developers who do not live
22 in these neighborhoods or look like the
23 people in the neighborhood.

24 I'm an African American real
25 estate developer, a long-life citizen of

2 Philadelphia. I have started my business
3 in my community, created entrepreneurial
4 programs for local elementary schools. I
5 still reside in the community that I grew
6 up with.

7 When I've had the opportunity
8 to develop City land, I have made sure
9 that it's affordable for working
10 families. As a longtime minority
11 business leader in West Philadelphia, I
12 cannot outbid out-of-town
13 multimillionaires for development
14 opportunities in my city. My story is
15 not unique. It is the reality of many
16 minority developers in Philadelphia.

17 Currently Philadelphia Land
18 Bank and the Redevelopment Authority
19 bundled properties together that they
20 control and offered to the highest
21 bidder. This may seem logical, but in
22 fact it is painfully shortsighted and
23 unfair when recognizing a small
24 developer, particularly minority
25 developers who lack the access to

2 capital.

3 Operating in the City this way
4 reduces the ability for small developers
5 to build reasonable priced and affordable
6 projects in our neighborhoods. Look
7 around and you'll see the result. Luxury
8 apartments are going up in every
9 community. The average Philadelphian
10 cannot afford -- the average
11 Philadelphian cannot afford the smaller
12 local developers and minority business
13 people do not get a chance to participate
14 in the economic development of these
15 neighborhoods.

16 Some City Councilmembers,
17 Councilman Kenyatta Johnson, Councilwoman
18 Blackwell, Councilman Curtis Jones,
19 Council President Darrell Clarke have
20 been largely criticized -- Councilmembers
21 have largely been criticized for trying
22 to include local business people,
23 including myself, in the real estate
24 development taking place in our
25 communities. I applaud these efforts,

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and it is unacceptable to me and should be unacceptable to everyone that minority developers are scolded for seeking a seat at the table with larger developers.

I challenge the City of Philadelphia to use its resources to create more of a fair opportunity for small local developers to participate in the economic development in our neighborhood. I would like to see more development done by local diverse developers with a local diverse workforce.

Not all the neighborhood growth in Philadelphia should go to outside developers just because they have the biggest bank accounts, and some development opportunities should be designated for local and minority developers, allowing more local development to -- allowing more local developers to participate in transforming their own community has the potential to produce more thoughtful development,

1 5/9/19 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 lasting benefits for community, more
3 business role models, more community
4 participation. More development dollars
5 stays in the community for local folks.
6 Neighborhood development in Philadelphia
7 should include everyone.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
9 you can wrap it up. Thank you. Thank
10 you, sir.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
13 other speakers on the public comment
14 list, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

17 We will now consider the bills
18 and resolutions on our Final Passage
19 Calendar today.

20 Mr. Decker, please read the
21 title of 190367.

22 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
23 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
24 Property to execute and deliver to the
25 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,

1 5/9/19 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 without consideration, deeds conveying
3 conditional fee simple title to certain
4 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with
5 the buildings and improvements thereon,
6 situate in Thirty-Second Ward of the City
