2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning. We're going to get started now,  
4 if members will take their seats. Any  
5 visitors or guests, if they can retire  
6 behind the rail, we will get started with  
7 our session today.

8                   To give our invocation this  
9 morning, the Chair recognizes Quasim  
10 Rashad, Amir of the United Muslim Masjid.  
11 He is here today as the guest of  
12 Councilman Jones.

13                   I would ask all members and  
14 guests and visitors to please rise.

15                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
16 visitors rise.)

17                   AMIR RASHAD: Good morning.

18                   (Good morning.)

19                   AMIR RASHAD: In the name of  
20 almighty God, most gracious, most  
21 merciful, praise be to God, the cherisher  
22 and the sustainer of the worlds, most  
23 gracious, most merciful. Master of the  
24 dead judgment, you alone do we worship  
25 and your aid do we seek.

2                   Show us the straight way, the  
3 way of those in whom you have bestowed  
4 your grace, those whose portion is not  
5 wrathed, and those who go not astray.

6                   Dear all hearing and merciful  
7 God, we beseech your blessings upon the  
8 Council, who have been gathered here  
9 today and called as leaders of this great  
10 city, which derives its name from the  
11 Greek phrase Philos Adelphos, ironically  
12 so named by an English Quaker seeking  
13 refuge from religious persecution from  
14 his homeland.

15                   Like its founder, we call upon  
16 these great members of City Council to  
17 lead this city of brotherly love, to defy  
18 with temerity those who would dare use  
19 hatred in the form of anti-Semitism,  
20 nationalism, Islamophobia, homophobia, or  
21 any other phobia or ism and weaponize it;  
22 that we reject that ideology in favor of  
23 love for peace, true justice, and  
24 mankind.

25                   This is the month of Ramadan in

2           which -- and was revealed to our dear  
3           prophet Muhammad, the prayers and the  
4           peace be upon him and a criterion for  
5           all -- a guide and a criterion for all of  
6           mankind. Ramadan is also the month when  
7           Muslims pray extra prayers, fast 29 of 30  
8           days, and wish goodwill to all men.

9                         So we pray, almighty God, to  
10           unite this Council, to uplift this city  
11           with its leadership, empower them to  
12           serve as people in a manner befitting his  
13           continent in an era of social justice  
14           turmoil and uncertainty. Guide them with  
15           the insight to legislate justly, not just  
16           for law and order but to maintain this  
17           city and elevate it to its greatest  
18           heights.

19                         This city and its leadership  
20           were formed to be a beacon and a model of  
21           brotherly love to the region and the  
22           nation.

23                         Almighty God, remind them that  
24           they are not only leaders, but also  
25           servants and that it is their

2           responsibility, as it is all of ours, to  
3           serve the City of Philadelphia and the  
4           common good.

5                       Remind them that no matter  
6           where we live, everyone - black, white,  
7           Hispanic, Asian, Muslim, Jew, Christian,  
8           Hindu, Sikh or Atheist - is our neighbor,  
9           brother in humanity, and that throughout  
10          the ages, that God through his prophets  
11          has called the leaders of the people to  
12          respect and protect the least of us who  
13          are able to protect ourselves.

14                      Grant them and us the wisdom  
15          and the courage to know what is right,  
16          good, and true. May they and we speak  
17          out when it is time to speak out and  
18          listen when it is time to listen. May  
19          they and we always be guided by the  
20          spirit of community, by the spirit of  
21          justice, and by the spirit of love.

22                      This we pray in the name of all  
23          that we hold sacred and holy, all that we  
24          hold good and true, and as the Christians  
25          and the Jews say amen, we, the Muslims,

2 say in solidarity with you ameen.

3 Thank you, and may God bless  
4 you all and bless the City Council and  
5 everyone in its range.

9 those inspiring words. Appreciate it.

12 Thank you again, Amir.

3                   All those in favor indicate by  
4           saying aye.

5                   (Aye.)

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Those opposed?

8                   (No response.)

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
10          ayes have it, and the Journal is  
11          approved.

12                   And our next order of business  
13          is requests for leave of absence, and the  
14          Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

15                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
16          Mr. President. On behalf of the  
17          majority, there are no requests of leave  
18          of absence today.

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20          Chair thanks the gentleman.

21                   And the Chair now recognizes  
22          Councilman O'Neill.

23                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
24          Mr. President. On behalf of the  
25          republicans, there are no requests for

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4           Chair thanks the gentleman.

5                   At this time, I would like to  
6           dispense with the regular order of  
7           business and I would like to say how much  
8           we genuinely appreciate you being here  
9           today. We really appreciate the fact  
10          that you're here to witness your  
11          government in action. So we hope your  
12          stay here today is a pleasurable one and  
13          a knowledge one. Thank you all so much  
14          for being here.

15                   At this time, the Chair  
16          recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will  
17          present a resolution honoring Coach Fran  
18          Dunphy. Would Coach Dunphy and those  
19          accompanying him please join the  
20          Councilman at the podium.

21                   (Councilmembers and guests  
22          approached podium.)

23                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
24          joining Councilman Greenlee, we have  
25          Councilman Green and Councilwoman Bass.

2           It's a Temple contingent.

3                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
4           you, Mr. President.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
6           on a second, Councilman.

7                   Folks, a little quiet, please.  
8           Thank you.

9                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
10          you, Mr. President.

11                   Before we present the  
12          resolution, I also want to acknowledge  
13          back there one of our friends, former  
14          State Representative George Kenney, who  
15          is now with Temple University.

16                   Sir, nice to see you.

17                   He made me say that.

18                   Those of us who are college  
19          basketball fans know a lot that the Big  
20          Five basketball is revered, and it's  
21          revered certainly for all its great  
22          players over the last number of decades,  
23          but also for its great coaches, and the  
24          gentleman we're honoring today is right  
25          at the top of that list.

2                   This is a resolution honoring  
3 Coach Fran Dunphy for his outstanding  
4 career as a coach, mentor, and educator.

5                   Whereas, after graduating from  
6 Malvern Prep, Dunphy was a star player  
7 with the La Salle Explorers including  
8 serving as a co-captain his senior year  
9 where he averaged 18.6 points per game  
10 and led the team in assists; and

11                   Whereas, Coach Dunphy began his  
12 coaching career in 1971 as an assistant  
13 at the United States Military Academy and  
14 his other assistant coaching stops  
15 included his Alma Mater plus the  
16 University of Maryland and the University  
17 of Pennsylvania; and

18                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, in  
19 1989, he was named the 16th Head Coach at  
20 Penn where he would go on to compile a  
21 310 to 168 overall record in his 17-year  
22 career. His Quakers Teams won an  
23 unprecedented 48 straight Ivy League  
24 games from 1992 to 1996. He won ten Ivy  
25 League Titles in his career at Penn and

2           was inducted into the University's Hall  
3           of Fame; and

4                       Whereas, on April 10th, 2006,  
5           Coach Dunphy became the first person to  
6           serve as the head men's basketball coach  
7           at two Philadelphia Big 5 institutions  
8           when he took over the reins of Temple's  
9           program from Hall of Fame Coach John  
10          Chaney; and

11                      Whereas, his extremely  
12          successful tenure coaching the Owls  
13          included ranking third on the school's  
14          win list, earning American Athletic  
15          Conference Coach of the Year three times,  
16          guiding the team to eight NCAA  
17          Tournaments, five conference titles and  
18          victories over seven top ten teams; and

19                      COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, one  
20          of the most respected coaches in the  
21          nation, Dunphy has coached eight  
22          Conference Players of the Year, three  
23          Conference Rookies of the Year, five  
24          perfect Conference seasons and 54 All  
25          Conference honorees; and

2                       Whereas, Coach Dunphy finished  
3 his career with an overall record of 580  
4 wins and 328 losses, including a 270 to  
5 165 record at Temple and an induction in  
6 the Big 5 Hall of Fame; and

7                       Whereas, Dunphy is also in his  
8 12th year of teaching at Temple's  
9 prestigious Fox School of Business and is  
10 very active in the Coaches versus Cancer  
11 Campaign and the Big Brothers Big Sisters  
12 Program; now, therefore, be it

13                      COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Resolved,  
14 that the City Council of Philadelphia  
15 hereby honors and congratulates Coach  
16 Fran Dunphy for his many dedicated and  
17 successful years of coaching and wish him  
18 all the best in the future.

19                      Further resolved, that an  
20 engrossed copy of this resolution be  
21 presented to Coach Dunphy as evidence of  
22 the sincere sentiment of this legislative  
23 body.

24                      Coach, thank you and  
25 congratulations for all those many years

2 in service to the City.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

5 the Chair recognizes Coach Dunphy for

6 remarks.

7 COACH DUNPHY: Thank you,

8 President Clarke. I appreciate it.

9 I'm happy to be here this  
10 morning. This is a bit humbling, to be  
11 honest with you.

12 I was interested in watching  
13 all of the festivities that went on in  
14 the other room, and I'm reminded that all  
15 of you as City Councilmembers are coaches  
16 of sorts. You have big staffs and you  
17 have people that you answer to, people  
18 that you're trying to make better, your  
19 lives better, the communities better.  
20 And everybody has got a song to sing, and  
21 we must listen to those songs. It's  
22 interesting to watch them.

23 I'm grateful for my time here.

24 I'm always grateful for my time coming to  
25 City Hall. It's a spectacular edifice

2           and one that I think people should see.  
3           I think we all drive past it often. I  
4           don't think we appreciate it quite for  
5           all that it does.

6                     And I'm grateful for what all  
7           of you do. You give your constituents  
8           your time. It's your greatest asset and  
9           it's your time, and I think all of us  
10          would be grateful for that. These are  
11          all jobs that are not easy. I appreciate  
12          that. I understand it.

13                    The last thing I wanted to just  
14          get across to all of you is, yesterday it  
15          was a culmination of a life well led.  
16          Last week we lost a great Philadelphian  
17          in David Montgomery of the Philadelphia  
18          Phillies. So yesterday was his funeral  
19          service. There was no greater man, in my  
20          mind, how he lived his life, and it was  
21          always for others. It was never about  
22          David. And to do the things that he did  
23          as the Chairperson of the Philadelphia  
24          Phillies and what he brought to his work  
25          every single day was just extraordinary.

2           And when he was asked by one of the  
3           journalists in Philadelphia, Jim  
4           Salisbury, how he would like to be  
5           remembered, it was interesting his  
6           comment. And he thought for a second and  
7           he said there's a statue right around  
8           City Hall of John Wanamaker, and at the  
9           bottom of that statue is one word, and  
10          that word is "citizen." And if we could  
11          all be the kind of citizen that Wanamaker  
12          was, most assuredly the kind of citizen  
13          that David Montgomery was, then we would  
14          have a better Philadelphia and a better  
15          society and a better community, and I  
16          think we all look to that.

17                    Again, grateful for all of the  
18                    work that you do. Grateful for what  
19                    Philadelphia brings to all of us.  
20                    Whether you live in the City or you live  
21                    around the City, we're all Philadelphians  
22                    just trying to do the very best that we  
23                    can. And if we have that one word in our  
24                    lexicon and we use it and we live by it,  
25                    we'd be all better off.

2                   But as a Philadelphian, and  
3           I've worked 35 of my last 40 years in the  
4           City, we're not perfect, but we sure try  
5           like crazy, and I'm grateful for that and  
6           I appreciate today and all of you, those  
7           people sitting in the background as well  
8           as all 17 of you who do such great work  
9           for the City.

10                   I thank you. Thank you for  
11           this resolution. I'm very appreciative.  
12           Appreciate it. Thanks.

13                   (Applause.)

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
15           Council will be at ease.

16                   (Council at ease.)

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
18           Thank you, and congratulations.

19                   At this time, the Chair  
20           recognizes Councilman Squilla, who will  
21           present a resolution honoring PATCO.  
22           Would John Rink and those accompanying  
23           him please join the Councilman at the  
24           podium.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
4           joining Councilman Squilla, we have  
5           Councilwoman Parker, Councilman Domb, and  
6           Councilwoman Bass and Councilman Green  
7           and Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman  
8           Blackwell and Councilman Greenlee and  
9           Councilman Henon.

10                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA:   Good  
11           morning, everyone, and thank you for  
12           being here.  As you see on your desks,  
13           there's a little red bag there that will  
14           give you just a little remembrance of the  
15           50th anniversary of PATCO, which we're  
16           celebrating today in this resolution, a  
17           great transit agency.

18                   We're honoring the Port  
19           Authority Transit Corporation (PATCO) on  
20           the occasion of their 50th Anniversary.

21                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:   Whereas,  
22           the Port Authority Transit Corporation  
23           (PATCO) High-Speed Line began operation  
24           in 1969, was the first of an entirely new  
25           generation of mass transportation.  The

2           rail line provided South Jersey commuters  
3           with a quick, inexpensive, and reliable  
4           trip to Philadelphia. The high-speed  
5           rail line provided an original running  
6           time of 22 minutes from Lindenwold to  
7           15th and 16th Street and Locust in  
8           Philadelphia. Similar trips by car and  
9           bus were 45 and 60 minutes, respectively;  
10          and

11                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, the  
12           vehicles were automated trains which  
13           operated on a dedicated right-of-way at  
14           speeds far exceeding those in  
15           neighborhood streets. PATCO was the  
16           first rail line in the country to offer a  
17           direct challenge to private automobile, a  
18           remarkable achievement and one of deep  
19           significance for the future of commuters  
20           in the United States; and

21                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the  
22           new vehicles were completely automated.  
23           The train operators only had to push a  
24           button to start the train and to open and  
25           close doors at each station. The

2           operators also had the ability to stop  
3           the train in an emergency and operate  
4           under manual control. Under normal  
5           operation, the train is controlled by  
6           signals transmitted through the rails  
7           which allowed the PATCO trains to operate  
8           at an original speed of 75 miles per  
9           hour; and

10                    COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,  
11           personal comfort was provided for the  
12           public, the cars were designed to be  
13           spacious, extra wide doors allowed  
14           passengers to enter and exit, temperature  
15           and humidity control, as well as enough  
16           seats for all passengers;

17                    COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Seats  
18           were designed to be roomiest seats ever.  
19           Seating was also designed to fit the  
20           passenger's body better; and

21                    COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
22           Whereas, train operation was created to  
23           operate at a frequency such that  
24           commuters had little time to sit around  
25           the station. What few minutes commuters

2           did have were spent in pleasant, modern  
3           stations. The air-conditioned station  
4           interiors were designed to feature a  
5           clean-lined combination of glass, tile,  
6           and concrete - materials believed to be  
7           attractively utilized and easy to  
8           maintain. Glass-bordered entrances and  
9           head houses projected an effect of  
10          spaciousness; and

11                    COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Just  
12          a point of personal privilege, a very  
13          dear friend of mine, Fred Williams, was a  
14          20-year-plus veteran of PATCO High Speed  
15          as an employee.

16                    Whereas, to attract commuters,  
17          ample parking was provided at each  
18          station. Parking lots were created with  
19          ample lighting, fully paved, and drop-off  
20          locations which were referred to as "kiss  
21          and ride" stops, which allowed commuters  
22          to be driven to the station, dropped off  
23          and picked up;

24                    Whereas, over the fifty years  
25          of service, PATCO has undergone changes

2           to -- Councilwoman Bass is next.

3                       COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

4           over the fifty years of service, PATCO

5           has undergone changes to adapt to the

6           success it has generated. Parking lots

7           have been expanded to accommodate the

8           increased number of commuters driving to

9           the stations, stations have been

10          modernized and improved with the

11          installation of elevators and signage,

12          Woodcrest Station was constructed in 1980

13          with a direct connection to Interstate

14          295, the fare collection system was

15          replaced with a modern system which is

16          integrated with SEPTA's fare collection

17          system, and all transit vehicles have

18          been overhauled and installed with modern

19          systems; and

20                       COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,

21          PATCO continues to provide the level of

22          service which it set out to create fifty

23          years ago. In order to maintain that

24          level of service, continued maintenance

25          and repair along with improvements to

2           infrastructure are required to be  
3           performed every day. The work which  
4           PATCO employees perform on the equipment  
5           and infrastructure will ensure that the  
6           line will continue to operate as intended  
7           for the next fifty years; now, therefore,  
8           be it

9                         Resolved, by the City Council  
10           of the City of Philadelphia, that we  
11           hereby honor the Port Authority Transit  
12           Corporation on the occasion of their 50th  
13           Anniversary.

14                         Congratulations.

15                         (Applause.)

16                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17           Thank you. I'm sorry. We're conducting  
18           business.

19                         The Chair recognizes Mr. Rink  
20           for remarks.

21                         MR. RINK: Thank you, Council  
22           President Clarke, Councilman Squilla,  
23           members of Council. It's an honor to be  
24           here to accept this resolution on behalf  
25           of our Board of Commissioners, our CEO

2           and President John Hanson, the over 350  
3           PATCO employees and, more importantly,  
4           our customers.

5                       For over 50 years, we've  
6           connected South Jersey to the City of  
7           Philadelphia, moving over 10.8 million  
8           people each year either to work, attend  
9           school at a higher learning institution  
10          in the region, use one of the various  
11          hospitals and, more importantly, all the  
12          cultural activities this region has to  
13          offer.

14                      So it's an honor and privilege  
15          that you recognize PATCO as an important  
16          part of the City of Philadelphia and its  
17          region, and, again, thank you for this  
18          honor.

19                      (Applause.)

20                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you.

22                      Council will be at ease.

23                      (Council at ease.)

24                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you, and congratulations.

2                   At this time, the Chair  
3 recognizes Councilman Squilla again, who  
4 will present a resolution recognizing  
5 Maurice German. Would Mr. German and  
6 those accompanying him please join the  
7 Councilman at the podium.

8                   (Councilmembers and guests  
9 approached podium.)

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Joining Councilman Squilla, we have  
12 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Henon,  
13 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, and  
14 Councilman Green and Councilwoman Parker.

15                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Good  
16 morning, and thank you again for being  
17 here. This resolution is sent to a  
18 person who really had his heart in the  
19 right place to do the right thing at the  
20 right time, and it's something that  
21 sometimes does get overlooked, but in  
22 this case, we wanted to make sure that  
23 people know that there are great citizens  
24 out there in our city and that they  
25 should be recognized. And that is why

2           today we are recognizing and honoring  
3           Maurice German for literally going above  
4           and beyond the call of duty to rescue an  
5           animal in distress.

6                    COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:   And  
7           whereas, Mr. German is a lifelong  
8           Philadelphian who grew up in North  
9           Philadelphia and now resides in West Oak  
10          Lane. Mr. German has an Associate's  
11          Degree from Community College of  
12          Philadelphia and two daughters ages 19  
13          and 18. His oldest is a college junior  
14          and his youngest a high school senior;  
15          and

16                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:   Whereas,  
17          Mr. German is a member of the  
18          Communication Workers of America (CWA)  
19          Local 13000 and started as a lineman with  
20          Verizon in 2007 where his duties included  
21          replacing copper and fiber cables,  
22          utility poles, guide wires (support wires  
23          from pole to pole) conduit and occasional  
24          pet rescue; and

25                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:   Whereas,

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2           Mr. German and his crew were working in  
3           the Port Richmond neighborhood on  
4           Saturday, March 16th when he was  
5           approached by a neighbor with a strange  
6           request for help. It seems that a cat,  
7           "Momma," somehow climbed to the top of a  
8           utility pole and was stuck since 9:30  
9           p.m. the night before; and

10                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
11           Momma's owner tried unsuccessfully to  
12           rescue her from the top of the utility  
13           pole for several hours Friday evening;  
14           and

3           going to be public comment. We're going  
4           to make a slight revision today because  
5           of the volume of individuals that we have  
6           testifying today. We will be cutting the  
7           timeframe from your testimony from three  
8           to two. That will enable us to get  
9           everyone on, because there are a lot of  
10          people that want to testify.

11                    Council has an engagement, and  
12          I call it that. We're actually supposed  
13          to be at the Veterans Affairs initiative  
14          across the street. There's a veterans  
15          fair that we're all supposed to be there  
16          to present members from our veteran  
17          community, and we might run into a timing  
18          issue where we might have to take a short  
19          recess, do our obligation to our heroes  
20          with the veterans and then come back to  
21          continue this. So we'll just have to see  
22          how this plays out during the course of  
23          the public comment.

24                    So the public comment will go  
25          as follows:

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
22 afternoon.

23 MS. STOMACKIN: Good afternoon.  
24 Hello. My name is Abby Stomackin and I'm  
25 a Philadelphia School District public

2           school teacher. I deal with foster care  
3           youth on a daily basis, and it affects  
4           not only my job but my family.

5                         Statistics show that  
6           Pennsylvania's State of Welfare 2017  
7           report that 8,020 children were entered  
8           into foster care in 2016. It shows that  
9           the number of children entered into  
10          foster care has risen by 32 percent since  
11          2012.

12                        The abuse report in 2016 also  
13          showed that 5,567 cases of child abuse  
14          were taken. Out of those 5,000 cases,  
15          847 were substantiated. That means that  
16          55 percent of the children in foster care  
17          families were in those reports.

18                        The statistics get worse when  
19          247 were repeated cases. It also shows  
20          that 503 of them were female and 344 were  
21          male. Alarmingly, 995 cases were  
22          screened out by insufficient information,  
23          which leaves no information about why  
24          they were taken out. In those 2,272  
25          people that applied to be foster care

2           parents, they were declined because they  
3           were perpetuated and substantiated  
4           perpetrators.

5                         What people need to realize is  
6           that numbers are not just numbers. They  
7           are children. These statistics are real,  
8           and they are reality that these children  
9           go through. They wake up to them, they  
10          go to school to them, and they come back  
11          to those same situations.

12                        An article in Education  
13          Stability for youth in foster care states  
14          that less than one-third of those  
15          students that change one time in high  
16          school do not graduate, and that is  
17          detrimental because our graduation rate  
18          in Philadelphia is 67 percent.

19                        What I have to say is that  
20          Philadelphia, there are 32,677  
21          Pennsylvania foster care youth in the  
22          population, and that actually means that  
23          next year 10,567 of them will be in here.

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you. Thank you so much for your

10                  MR. SOKULOU: Good afternoon.  
11           My name is Craig Sokulou.

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
13           afternoon.

14                  MR. SOKULOU: I'm an attorney  
15           who works in the court system. I'm on  
16           the wheel. I represent over 250  
17           families. Fifty-five children are on the  
18           Child Advocate.

19                  I believe that we should pass  
20           Resolution 190346 and have a committee  
21           chaired by Councilman Oh and Cindy Bass.

22                   (Applause.)

23                  MR. SOKULOU: Let me give you  
24           some examples of how we could save money  
25           in DHS and what one judge did.

2                   We had a case where a child was  
3 taken away from a parent. We were going  
4 to give the child back to the parent. It  
5 cost \$350 to give them a water heater.  
6 DHS said no. So the child had to remain  
7 in care until that water heater was  
8 purchased. Finally, the judge in that  
9 case said we're wasting money. \$38,000 a  
10 year to put that child in -- to be cared  
11 for. He ordered that the water heater  
12 that cost \$350 be installed. The child  
13 was returned to the parent.

14                   (Applause.)

15                   MR. SOKULOU: And DHS objected  
16 to that.

17                   Another case is where a child  
18 was not given to their kinship parent.  
19 DHS did no family finding. We have ten  
20 people who would have taken the people.  
21 That case is still pending, so I can't  
22 talk about that, but DHS must look at  
23 practical solutions which would save  
24 money.

25                   Therefore, I ask for 190346 to

20           process, as I am actually an adoptive

21           parent, not a biological parent. But DHS

22           came in and they stole my intended

23           adoptive son and allowed a private agency

24           to take him, with no custody order or

25           court order, and sent him to Netherlands.

3 out of this country, and I'm curious to  
4 know how many of these biological parents  
5 have been affected even by that. But the  
6 fact that it's even happening to us as  
7 adoptive parents and foster parents, DHS  
8 is intimidating us. They are threatening  
9 us by affecting other adoptions that  
10 we're in the process of. They're  
11 threatening us by making sure that we  
12 can't support these children who do need  
13 to come into care, and they are making  
14 sure that we are the ones who are shown  
15 as being vindictive and selfish.

16 So I strongly encourage the  
17 resolution to be passed. It has to be  
18 passed. We have to protect these kids.  
19 It is all about them and nobody else.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Caroline Hill.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. HILL: Hi. My name is

2           Caroline Hill. I'm with Every Mother is  
3           a Working Mother. I'm here to say to  
4           tell y'all that I had two nieces that DHS  
5           gave me in 2011. 2012 they came and took  
6           them from me for no reason. They went to  
7           court that week of Easter. They took the  
8           kids. I couldn't get in touch with  
9           nobody. Everybody on vacation. That  
10          following Monday, we go into court. They  
11          said in court -- they lied. They telling  
12          the judge I have mental issues, financial  
13          business, being evicted and everything,  
14          and I had been in my home for over 20  
15          years, and the judge tells me whatever I  
16          hear in court, don't say nothing. So I  
17          have to sit there and listen to these  
18          people lie about me about my niece.

19                   DHS came to my home, seized the  
20          kids, which was there for a year, and  
21          tell me that they are doing good, they  
22          are looking well, and then months later  
23          they come and take them out of my home  
24          for no reason at all.

25                   I had permission to see them,

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           to visit them, and been able to come to  
3           my home. Then one night they came to my  
4           home and my niece, she's one years old,  
5           she telling the DHS worker, bye-bye, see  
6           you, you know, like telling the man to go  
7           ahead on, we home. And then when they  
8           get back where they at, they saw  
9           tantrums, so they stopped the  
10          communication with me and my nieces.  
11          They stopped the visitation because the  
12          kids was acting out.

13                        These kids wasn't just acting  
14          out. They know where they wanted to be  
15          at. They wanted to be home with me where  
16          they had been for a whole year. And one  
17          of the nieces was so traumatized that she  
18          was seeing a therapist, and the therapist  
19          told them if they removed her again, that  
20          she would have a setback. And she did  
21          have a setback after they removed her,  
22          and her hair fell out, she lost weight  
23          and everything.

24                        And I just am here to support  
25          the bill to investigate why these kids

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           was taken out of my home. And that's  
3           all I have to say.

4                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
5           Thank you.

6                    (Applause.)

7                    (Witness approached podium.)

8                    MS. HASSAN: My name is  
9           Rasheedah Hassan. I'm also asking  
10          that --

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm  
12          sorry. Ma'am, I'm sorry. What's your  
13          name again?

14                   MS. HASSAN: Rasheedah Hassan.  
15          I'm a mother who also have nine  
16          children in care --

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
18          right. So was your name called?

19                   So we got to get some clarity.  
20          We've tried to --

21                   CHIEF CLERK: Yolanda Bryant.

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Your  
23          name has to be called for you to testify.  
24          So we can't have everybody testifying  
25          today. So only if your name is called.

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           CHIEF CLERK: Yolanda Bryant.

3           MS. BRYANT: Yes.

4           (Witness approached podium.)

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6           Thank you.

7           MS. BRYANT: Good morning. My  
8           name is Yolanda Bryant. I'm a  
9           grandmother of two kids in October the  
10          '18 I had took to Saint Christopher's  
11          Hospital. My two grand-kids was being  
12          physical assaulted and sexually molested,  
13          ten and five years old. The hospital had  
14          notified DHS because my grand-kids was at  
15          a location that was at a mental health  
16          facility when I had got the text  
17          messages, and when the DHS people had got  
18          there, they said a supervisor had told  
19          them that the children wasn't able to  
20          come home with me.

21          From there, when we went to the  
22          court, the supervisor had brought the  
23          molester to court, which is the  
24          perpetrator that did this to the two  
25          children, and the supervisor turned out

2           to be the aunt. He has a sister also  
3           that's in DHS too that's under the  
4           Commissioner, that works there.

5                       From there, I wasn't allowed to  
6           go in no courtrooms. They put the  
7           sheriffs there with all the evidence that  
8           was being seen. They never let nothing  
9           be seen.

10                      On December the 3rd, my  
11           two-year-old granddaughter that I had  
12           from birth that was never under DHS, she  
13           was given to me by social workers from  
14           the hospital for my daughter with mental  
15           health. They came to my house from --  
16           they was upset because I kept coming to  
17           every court date, and they removed her  
18           from the courtroom -- from my home.

19                      They falsified so many reports.  
20           They said the child was endangerment.  
21           They said the child -- they changed her  
22           last name. It was so many things that  
23           they had did. They never implicated him.

24                      And I just feel as though this  
25           resolution is -- reform is best to have.

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           They acting as -- the DHS is acting as  
3           they are the SVU unit as they police us,  
4           as they the judge. They making decisions  
5           that they don't have decisions to make.

6                        On March 3rd -- 24th I had got  
7           a phone call from the DHS, and the DHS  
8           had said that they never checked the guy  
9           out that did it and said that I was  
10          indicated. And I said, how was I  
11          indicated from just picking up the kids  
12          to take the children to the hospital?

13                       If we don't have a reform or  
14          something better --

15                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You  
16          got to wrap it up. The light is red.

17                       MS. BRYANT: Thank you. All  
18          right.

19                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Thank you.

21                       (Applause.)

22                       CHIEF CLERK: The next five  
23          speakers commenting on 190315 and 190316  
24          will please approach the podium. Lola  
25          Oladapo, Reverend Gregory Holston, Gabe

2           Morgan, and Gina Cain.

3                     (Witness approached podium.)

4                     MS. OLADAPO: Good afternoon,

5           City Council. My name is Lola Oladapo.

6           I'm a Philadelphia resident and serve as

7           a volunteer civic trustee with the

8           Campaign for Civic Cities, a national

9           initiative designed to bring civics back

10          into our schools and communities.

11                    As a civic trustee, I, along

12          with 23 other civic trustees, took an

13          oath to leave our city better than what

14          we found it. We do this by taking a

15          no-blame approach to solving the City's

16          most intractable issues.

17                    We meet monthly to engage in

18          solution-based conversations, then bring

19          these solutions to our representatives

20          for consideration.

21                    We are currently looking to

22          reduce the poverty rate here in

23          Philadelphia. We recently learned

24          through a 2018 study done by the Pew

25          Charitable Trust that we are the largest

2           poorest city in the nation, with some 25  
3           percent of the 400,000 residents living  
4           in poverty, half of which live in deep  
5           poverty.

6                         We recognize that there are  
7           multiple reasons for why our poverty  
8           rates are so high, from the lack of  
9           livable wage jobs to inadequate skills  
10          for the current industry that make up our  
11          economic landscape. That means that we  
12          believe that one of the biggest drivers  
13          of our city's poverty rate and the  
14          economic insecurity experienced by  
15          Philadelphians, which is often  
16          overlooked, is our at-will employment  
17          law.

18                        As an at-will employment law  
19          states, employers have the power to  
20          terminate a person for no reason, any  
21          reason, as well as for immoral reasons,  
22          and there's very little a terminated  
23          person can do unless they fall into a  
24          protected class.

25                        If Philadelphia residents are

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           ever going to pull themselves out of  
3           poverty, they need a fair workweek --  
4           thank you, Councilwoman Helen Gym -- a  
5           livable wage, and job stability.

6                        We're here to stand with the  
7           parking attendants and demand that you  
8           guys pass "just cause" legislation.

9                        Thank you.

10                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you. Thank you, ma'am.

12                      (Applause.)

13                      CHIEF CLERK: Reverend Gregory  
14           Holston also commenting on 190315 and  
15           190316.

16                      (Witness approached podium.)

17                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
18           afternoon.

19                      REVEREND HOLSTON: Hello. My  
20           name is Reverend Gregory Holston. I'm  
21           the Executive Director of POWER. POWER  
22           is Philadelphians Organized to Witness,  
23           Empower, and Rebuild, 65 congregations  
24           across the City of Philadelphia and the  
25           surrounding areas.

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   In 2016, POWER put on what was  
3           called a Poverty Summit, which we issued  
4           a report called Black Work Matters. In  
5           that report, we listed and talked about  
6           the poverty in the City of Philadelphia  
7           is at a 25 percent, now 26 percent rate,  
8           almost 400,000 people living in poverty,  
9           almost 200,000 living in deep poverty.  
10          And at that time, that was roughly \$5,500  
11          a year for an individual.

12                   We recognize that unless we  
13          empower service workers all across this  
14          city and made service work work that was  
15          good jobs at good wages that could  
16          sustain families, unless we did that and  
17          make service workers the manufacturing  
18          jobs of today, that we would always be  
19          the biggest poorest city in this country.

20                   (Applause.)

21                   REVEREND HOLSTON: So we  
22          believe the bill here today of "just  
23          cause" and making sure staffing is up to  
24          par in the parking industry is taking one  
25          more step in the right direction of

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           protecting service workers and lifting up  
3           service workers in this city.

4                       When we stand with workers and  
5           make sure that they have a living wage,  
6           when we make sure that they're not fired  
7           for just no reason or any reason at all,  
8           when we stand with workers and make sure  
9           that they are safe on the job so that  
10          they're so afraid that they're even  
11          afraid to go to work, when we stand with  
12          workers and stand with workers and  
13          believe with workers and hope with  
14          workers and build a better place with  
15          workers, we can make the change in our  
16          city.

17                      POWER stands with SEIU and all  
18          of the parking attendants today to make a  
19          better place in the City of Philadelphia.

20                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you.

22                      (Applause.)

23                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you for your testimony.

25                      CHIEF CLERK: Also commenting

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           on 190315 and 190316 are Gabe Morgan,  
3           followed Gina Cain.

4                         (Witness approached podium.)

5                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
6           afternoon.

7                         MR. MORGAN: Good afternoon.

8           My name is Gabe Morgan. I'm the Director  
9           of SEIU 32BJ, which represents almost  
10          20,000 property service workers here in  
11          Philadelphia, 175,000 property service  
12          workers in the eastern seaboard.

13                        I'm here today to support the  
14          parking regulations that have been put in  
15          front of this Council with the support  
16          and advocacy of Councilwoman Cherelle  
17          Parker, with the support of Councilman  
18          Green, Councilwoman Sanchez, and  
19          Councilwoman Gym, who have put forth this  
20          legislation which would really help a  
21          group of about 2,000 working poor people  
22          in the City. These are the folks who  
23          take care of people's cars who come into  
24          Center City and into West Philly, work  
25          under poverty wages and terrible

2           conditions in lots throughout the City.

3                       This legislation would do two  
4           things. One, it would make sure that an  
5           industry with a track record of  
6           mistreating workers finally has to abide  
7           by some basic standards to ensure some  
8           form of dignity on the job for people who  
9           desperately deserve it, folks who came to  
10          this country seeking the American dream,  
11          folks who are just simply trying to pull  
12          their families out of poverty, often  
13          working two or three jobs. That's what  
14          "just cause" provides the workers.

15                      The second is safety. This is  
16          an industry where workers are routinely  
17          left alone and customers are left alone  
18          in parking lots. And I just point out  
19          just two weeks ago in the newspaper there  
20          was an incident with someone wielding a  
21          machete who tried to take someone hostage  
22          in a parking lot in Philly.

23                      Routinely in the papers we see  
24          where lots of understaffed. They become  
25          places where violence happens, violence

2           to workers, also violence to customers.  
3           So there's also legislation in addition  
4           to treating workers well that will also  
5           allow there to be minimum staffing to  
6           make sure workers and customers are not  
7           in an unsafe situation and have a way to  
8           notify the City if they are.

9                        So I want to thank Council and  
10           everyone who has led this effort. We  
11           really look to Council in these times to  
12           try and lead on behalf of working poor  
13           people when our federal government will  
14           not. This Council has done that for  
15           airport workers. It has done that for  
16           security officers. It has done that for  
17           cleaners, and we hope you'll lead again  
18           to help parking workers as they try and  
19           fight their way out of poverty.

20                        Thank you very much.

21                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22           Thank you.

23                        (Applause.)

24                        CHIEF CLERK: Gina Cain.

25                        (Witness approached podium.)

2                   MS. CAIN: Good morning. Good  
3 morning. Thank you, City Council.

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
5 afternoon.

6                   MS. CAIN: Good afternoon.  
7 Sorry. Thank you for taking the time to  
8 hear my concerns. I am Gina Cain. I  
9 work at the -- I'm a parking attendant.  
10 I worked at DLC for five years. It will  
11 be six years next month.

12                   I'm a mother. I'm a  
13 grandmother. Some days I fear for my  
14 life working at this job. There are not  
15 enough workers. I work from 10:00 to  
16 6:00. I'm by myself on the job. I work  
17 in a booth. I have to lock the doors.  
18 I'm talking about the garage is open that  
19 for any access or anybody that can come  
20 in. I have had homeless people come into  
21 my window, banging on the window.

22                   I should not have to fear for  
23 my job. In the parking industry, we know  
24 that we can be fired or punished at any  
25 time for no reason. We work very hard

2           and deserve to be treated with fairness.

3                   I get paid minimum wage. I'm  
4           50 years old. I get paid 7.66. I  
5           started with 7.35. And it's not fair.

6                   Thank you.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

9                   (Applause.)

10                  CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on  
11           190184 in this order, Randy LoBasso, Jana  
12           Tidwell, and Nick Rogers. Please  
13           approach the podium.

14                   (Witness approached podium.)

15                  MR. LoBASSO: Hello. Thank you  
16           for taking our testimony.

17                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
18           afternoon.

19                  MR. LoBASSO: My name is Randy  
20           LoBasso. I work at the Bicycle Coalition  
21           of Greater Philadelphia.

22                   We support automated  
23           enforcement for Roosevelt Boulevard  
24           because we know it's been proven to make  
25           streets safer for everyone.

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   Roosevelt Boulevard is the most  
3 dangerous street in Philadelphia.  
4 Twenty-one people were killed in traffic  
5 last year on Roosevelt Boulevard. But  
6 I'm mostly here to represent a woman  
7 named LaTanya Byrd, who in 2013 lost her  
8 niece and three of her nephews while they  
9 were crossing the street legally on  
10 Roosevelt Boulevard.

11                   For the past three years,  
12 Latanya has been working to get this bill  
13 passed in Harrisburg and was successful.

14                   (Applause.)

15                   MR. LoBASSO: All right. So I  
16 have a message from Latanya. Before I  
17 move on, I just want to let everybody  
18 know Latanya's niece was named Samara  
19 Banks. Three of Banks' children, Saamir,  
20 Saasean, and Saadeem, they were all  
21 killed on Roosevelt Boulevard, and  
22 Latanya has made it her mission to get  
23 this passed.

24                   She sent me this text message  
25 earlier: The mission to support the

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           installation of speed cameras on  
3           Roosevelt Boulevard has always been  
4           dedicated to saving lives. It has been a  
5           long journey, and the number of deaths  
6           due to speed has accelerated. I know it  
7           takes time to get this lifesaving  
8           technology up and running. However, the  
9           next person's life at stake doesn't have  
10          time. Please think of our community of  
11          people. None of us want to be added to  
12          the number of deaths. We don't want any  
13          other family member's last memory of  
14          their loved one to be a traffic death  
15          that could have been prevented.

16                    Thank you.

17                    (Applause.)

18                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19           Thank you for your testimony, sir.

20                    (Witness approached podium.)

21                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
22           afternoon.

23                    MS. TIDWELL: Good afternoon.

24           My name is Jana Tidwell. I'm the Manager  
25           of Public and Government Affairs for AAA

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           Mid-Atlantic in Southeastern  
3           Pennsylvania.

4                     Roosevelt Boulevard is arguably  
5           the most dangerous stretch of highway and  
6           the most deadliest here in Philadelphia,  
7           if not in the nation.

8                     Between 2013 and 2017, 139  
9           people were killed or seriously injured,  
10          and over 2,700 crashes were reported.  
11          AAA supports Bill 190184 to pilot an  
12          automated speed camera program along  
13          Roosevelt Boulevard.

14                    A recent AAA poll of  
15          Philadelphia area residents indicates  
16          that more than half, 52 percent, support  
17          the use of automated speed enforcement to  
18          ticket drivers who exceed the posted  
19          speed limit. In addition, this same poll  
20          showed 21 percent of motorists believe  
21          that a divided highway is the most  
22          important location for speed cameras.

23                    AAA believes that when  
24          implemented with proper procedural  
25          safeguards and protections for motorists

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           as outlined in this bill, automated speed  
3           camera systems can contribute to the goal  
4           of reducing unnecessary fatalities and  
5           promoting traffic safety for all users.  
6           AAA endorses the following safeguards  
7           that are included in this legislation  
8           focused on safety, transparency, public  
9           access, flat contractor fees, police --  
10          not a contractor -- overseeing the  
11          program, posted warning signs, and an 11  
12          mile per hour speed limit -- 11 miles an  
13          hour over the speed limit before the  
14          citation is issued.

15                   We urge Philadelphia City  
16          Council to pass 190184.

17                   Thank you.

18                   (Applause.)

19                   (Witness approached podium.)

20                   MR. ZUWIALA-ROGERS: Hello. My  
21          name is Nick Zuwiala-Rogers. I'm the  
22          Transportation Program Director for Clean  
23          Air Council, and I'm here to represent  
24          both the Council and the pedestrian  
25          advocacy organization Feet First Philly

2           that we sponsor.

3                       We are here to strongly support  
4           the proposed automated enforcement on  
5           Roosevelt Boulevard. This is a key part  
6           of the City meeting any of its Vision  
7           Zero goals.

8                       The Roosevelt Boulevard is one  
9           of the deadliest roads in the country.  
10          It's received national coverage for how  
11          dangerous it is, and just on an average  
12          year, about one person dies there every  
13          month and almost half of them are  
14          pedestrians, greatly overrepresenting the  
15          pedestrian makeup of the crashes on the  
16          Boulevard.

17                      This automated enforcement is  
18          necessary because there's no good way for  
19          police to enforce speeding on the  
20          Boulevard. There's nowhere to safely  
21          pull people over. So this automated  
22          enforcement, not only does this remove  
23          bias from enforcement, but it's also the  
24          only way to do this here.

25                      It would be very disappointing

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           to stand by and do nothing any longer.  
3           We worked really hard to pass this at the  
4           state level, and we are really looking  
5           forward to the City implementing this  
6           important measure now.

7                         So, again, both the Council and  
8           Feet First Philly strong support this  
9           bill, and we appreciate your time today.

10                        Thank you.

11                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Thank you.

13                        (Applause.)

14                        CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on  
15           181063, in this order, Rachel Barata,  
16           Saleem Faison, and Owen Setiawan.

17                        (Witness approached podium.)

18                        MISS BARATA: Hello. My name  
19           is Rachel. I will be speaking on Bill  
20           No. 181063. I'm 14 and in 8th grade at  
21           FACTs Charter School about to enter high  
22           school. I currently live in South  
23           Philly.

24                        There are a lot of people like  
25           me, a young teenager living in South

2           Philly. This means that there are a lot  
3           of people whose lives and futures are at  
4           stake.

5                     The science is clear. The only  
6           way we can avoid the worst impacts of  
7           climate change is to get off of fossil  
8           fuel such as coal, oil, and gas as soon  
9           as possible. However, PGW's proposal  
10          about LNG is a sad stain to add another  
11          very strong fossil fuel, the liquefied  
12          natural gas plant. They want to do this  
13          where I and a bunch of other people live.

14                    If you accept this proposal, it  
15          will affect many people's lives,  
16          including the lives of children and  
17          teenagers who will have to suffer the  
18          most, children and teenagers that many  
19          adults say are the future. Approving  
20          this massive new fossil fuel project will  
21          make it even more difficult for  
22          Philadelphia to do our part to solve  
23          climate change. So why is this project  
24          going in the other direction?

25                    This plant would only be one

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           mile away from where I live. If this  
3           plant was agreed to, I would have to deal  
4           with breathing polluted air every day. I  
5           want the City Council to think about how  
6           many lives it would affect before you  
7           vote on the LNG plant proposal.

8                     Thank you.

9                     (Applause.)

10                    (Witness approached podium.)

11                    MR. FAISON: Hello. My name is  
12           Saleem Faison. I will be speaking on  
13           Bill 181063.

14                    I go to FACTs High School. I  
15           may not have asthma. That might not  
16           affect everybody in this room, but many  
17           people in Philadelphia do. Many of them  
18           come from low-income families.

19                    There's a question I need to  
20           ask you: How many lives must be  
21           sacrificed for you to realize that this  
22           LNG proposal is not a good idea? Would  
23           you rather pass -- have money than keep  
24           children alive? Be honest.

25                    Ban on natural gas. Even in a

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           liquid form, it will release toxic  
3           chemicals into the air. These chemicals  
4           have been shown to cause problems such as  
5           asthma, lung cancer, and heart disease  
6           for many people. A lot of people that  
7           come from these neighborhoods of the LNG  
8           plant can't afford the medical help that  
9           they need.

10                         Thank you.

11                         (Applause.)

12                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13           Thank you for your testimony.

14                         (Witness approached podium.)

15                         MR. SETIAWAN: Good afternoon.

16           My name is Owen Setiawan and I'm going to  
17           be speaking on Bill 181063. I'm  
18           currently an 8th grader living in South  
19           Philadelphia where the proposed location  
20           for the planned liquefied natural gas  
21           facility will be just about a mile away  
22           from where I live, and I personally would  
23           like to ask every single City  
24           Councilmember to deny this proposal  
25           because of all the effects that it would

2           cause to our environment, all the effects  
3           that it would cause to human beings and  
4           animals alike.

5                        Being a part of the new  
6           generation is making me deeply concerned  
7           as a comparison of our energy consumption  
8           and the amount of effort we are placing  
9           at controlling the global climate crisis.  
10          This has become a crisis because of the  
11          only small decade we have left to make a  
12          major change to prevent irreversible  
13          damage, one decade to make an actual  
14          commitment.

15                       Now, if this issue were never  
16          tended to, then it would just be passed  
17          on to the next generation, right? Yeah.  
18          Well, that's my generation. That's the  
19          young people on the streets of  
20          Philadelphia being taught how to prevent  
21          this issue when the adults are not  
22          working on it. And we're going to be  
23          facing droughts, floods, hurricanes,  
24          rising sea levels, and extinction. And  
25          global warming won't only be affecting

2 humans. It's going to be affecting  
3 animals, who will die, and animals such  
4 as the Bramble Cay melomys who will  
5 become the first mammal to be taken  
6 victim by climate change and have gone  
7 extinct. And you may be wondering now  
8 why does an issue all the way on the  
9 other side of the world affect us and our  
10 small community in Philadelphia? If we  
11 pass this facility, we're going to send a  
12 symbol to the people of Philadelphia that  
13 we approve of this action, we approve of  
14 this behavior. But, no. Together we can  
15 stop this and we can help to create a  
16 better future for children.

17 Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Okay. As I indicated earlier, we have to  
21 take a brief recess. We have an  
22 obligation across the street. We have to  
23 honor a number of veterans. So we're  
24 going to recess, and after the recess,  
25 we'll come back and conclude the public

3 So if I can ask the members if  
4 we can go across the street to the plaza  
5 and do our pittance to our veterans.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON:

7 Mr. President?

9 want to make a motion?

10 COUNCILMAN HENON:

11 Mr. President, I'd like to make a formal  
12 motion.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
14 right. Let's do a formal motion.

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: I'd like to  
16 make a motion to recess, adjourning back  
17 here in this Council at 1:30.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
20 been moved and properly seconded.

21 All those in favor?

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

8 Prior to us going back to  
9 public comment, I would like to recognize  
10 Councilman Squilla.

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
12 Mr. President. I move for special rules

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16 Thank you. It's been moved and properly

18 All those in favor?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
24 ayes have it. The motion carries. And  
25 Councilman Squilla has introduced one

3 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance to  
4 amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by  
5 changing the zoning designations of  
6 certain areas of land located within an

8 Street, Porter Street, and 9th Street.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Referred to committee.

11 And I'd like to recognize a  
12 good friend from Harrisburg. I believe  
13 he came here to get some sanity.

14 I'm sorry. I'm sorry. I  
15 digress. State Representative Kinsey.  
16 Thank you for being here today.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I  
19 know I'm going to hear about that.

20 Thank you.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
22 Green.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
24 Council President. I was going to  
25 acknowledge Representative Kinsey, who is

4                        So thank you for joining us  
5           this afternoon, Representative Kinsey.

6                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8                        We're going to continue our  
9           public comment.

10                      Mr. Decker, call the next name  
11           on the list.

12                      CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on  
13           190195 are Cecelia Reyes and Modesto  
14           Rodriguez. Please approach the podium.

15                      (Witness approached podium.)

16                      MS. REYES: Good afternoon,  
17           City Council and Council President  
18           Clarke. Thank you for the opportunity to  
19           speak today. I'm here today to support  
20           the confirming Council's agreement to  
21           propose the budget for the House Trust  
22           Fund related to affordable housing.

23                      Having a budget is an important  
24           part of City Council's responsibility,  
25           and as a small business owner, we have

2           that in common.

3                         However, unlike the City, I am  
4           forced to deal with the budget I have.  
5           Sometimes more than half of my operating  
6           costs for sweetened beverages is going to  
7           tax.

8                         I would like to take this  
9           opportunity to thank Councilwoman Sanchez  
10          as well as the others that are supporting  
11          the repealing of this tax, which is  
12          devastating my business and the  
13          community. Instantly I was expanding my  
14          business and hiring of new workers for my  
15          business. I'm fighting just to keep my  
16          doors open.

17                        For those who have not yet  
18          chosen to support the legislation, please  
19          reconsider, and thank you very much for  
20          your time.

21                        (Applause.)

22                        (Witness approached podium.)

23                        MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good afternoon.

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
25          afternoon.

2                   MR. RODRIGUEZ: My name is  
3 Modesto Rodriguez. I'm from NRC Media  
4 Market on the street of Ninth, Cherelle  
5 Parker. Good afternoon, City Council and  
6 City Council President Clarke. I'm here  
7 today in support of the resolution  
8 confirming Council agreement for proposal  
9 budget intended for the Housing Trust  
10 Fund related to affordable housing.

11                   I have owned the business NRC  
12 Media Market for four years. We have  
13 three employees. So we not hard store.  
14 Every day I work in my store. I have  
15 help to be close to the retirement, but  
16 because of the high taxes, specifically  
17 the beverage tax, my business is to take  
18 out more and more of my time. I want to  
19 be spending more of my time and to spend  
20 with my family, but I cannot do that.

21                   Affordable to the City are  
22 getting worse, and hard taxes like the  
23 sweetened beverage tax are making those  
24 into work or about my business and the  
25 other resident of the City.

2                   Thank you for your time, and,  
3           Councilwoman Parker, please consider  
4           supporting this regulation to repeal  
5           beverage tax.

6                   Thank you.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you for your testimony.

9                   (Applause.)

10                   CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on  
11           170408, Esther Joseph, Elaine Johnson, CC  
12           Philly, and Melissa Blatz.

13                   (Witness approached podium.)

14                   MS. JOSEPH: Good afternoon,  
15           everyone.

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
17           afternoon.

18                   MS. JOSEPH: My name is Esther  
19           Joseph and I am an early childhood  
20           educator here today representing Rising  
21           Sun Children's Center, a program under  
22           the Korean Community Center and a proud  
23           participant in the City of Philadelphia's  
24           PHLpreK preschool program.

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           You're talking about school suspension?  
3                    MS. JOSEPH: Yes. The bill  
4           that I am in support of today addresses  
5           the elimination of the suspension of  
6           elementary school-aged students from  
7           grades one to five, but I would like to  
8           take it a step further and include  
9           preschool-aged children under that  
10          umbrella.

11                    With the impending vote for  
12          Philadelphia leaders approaching, I'd  
13          like to address the Council and everyone  
14          participating in this session to remind  
15          you all how vital preschool programs are  
16          for student retention and children's  
17          future educational success.

18                    The soda tax grants children  
19          the access to Philly pre-K, and I thank  
20          the Councilmembers who recognize that.  
21          Access to quality preschool programs  
22          gives children an advantage when it comes  
23          to the formation of critical  
24          self-regulation skills and interpersonal  
25          skills, skills that are essential at the

2 elementary level in terms of being able  
3 to acclimate, accept change, build  
4 positive relationships, and resolve  
5 conflicts and, most importantly, remain  
6 in school.

7                   It's critical that the City of  
8 Philadelphia invest in our students in  
9 the early years now, and not a second  
10 later, to provide our children with the  
11 tools that they need. The soda tax is a  
12 wise investment that has had a more than  
13 worthy return. I know this because I see  
14 it every day when my preschoolers  
15 overcome challenges and gain new skills.  
16 I see it with the diverse families that I  
17 work with, the parents who do not qualify  
18 for state subsidized childcare who are  
19 now able to go to work knowing that their  
20 children are spending time in an  
21 enriching environment, and also the  
22 parents who come back and share their  
23 successes.

24                   The soda tax has allowed about  
25 4,000 preschool children to receive

2           high-quality education. Imagine how many  
3           more can be reached. I thank those  
4           Councilmembers who recognize the  
5           importance of the soda tax to continue to  
6           fund Philadelphia preschool programs, and  
7           I strongly urge those who do not to  
8           reconsider.

9                         Thank you for your time.

10                        (Applause.)

11                        CHIEF CLERK: Elaine Johnson.

12                        (No response.)

13                        CHIEF CLERK: Elaine Johnson.

14                        (No response.)

15                        CHIEF CLERK: CC Philly,

16           commenting on 170408.

17                        (Witness approached podium.)

18                        MS. PHILLY: Hello. I'm CC

19           Philly, 98.5 FM radio.

20                        I came today to talk about the  
21           illegal gentrification that's happening  
22           on Broad and Huntington Park, but since  
23           that's not on the list, I picked  
24           something to speak about, and it's about  
25           the children's suspension.

2                   So schools are meant to  
3 stimulate and encourage children  
4 physically, intelligently, and social  
5 growth. These suspensions will lead to  
6 children being suspended later on in  
7 life. That's what the study showed in, I  
8 think it was, in Louisiana. It teaches  
9 children that there's a way out instead  
10 of dealing with their problems properly  
11 and so forth.

12                   When they have a day off, most  
13 of the time children are left unattended  
14 at home and are forced to be with people  
15 that don't want them. These children are  
16 less likely -- right. Stand up for DHS,  
17 the parents of DHS too.

18                   These children are also less  
19 likely to be referred to services, less  
20 likely to be referred to services and  
21 support later on in life. You're also  
22 labeling children.

23                   Children need a chance. You  
24 have to teach children the right way in  
25 order for them to learn. By throwing

2           them off to parents that have to work, it  
3           causes other problems at home.

4                        So I basically feel as though  
5           that you should look deeply more into it,  
6           because it says that 25 percent of the  
7           children that are suspended are African  
8           American males, which we know that our  
9           race, our culture suffers from aggression  
10          from other people and different things  
11          like that. We need to have behavioral  
12          health specialists, mental health  
13          specialists in these schools instead of  
14          throwing these children to the wayside.

15                        That's all.

16                        (Applause.)

17                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18          Thank you.

19                        CHIEF CLERK: Melissa Blatz.

20                        (Witness approached podium.)

21                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
22          afternoon.

23                        MS. BLATZ: Good afternoon. My  
24          name is Melissa Blatz. I am the  
25          Executive Director of Beautiful

2           Beginnings Childcare Center. We have two  
3           locations in Northeast Philadelphia, one  
4           in Rhawnhurst and one in Holmesburg.

5                       Every child in Philadelphia  
6           deserves high-quality early childhood  
7           education regardless of parents' working  
8           status, income level, race, or ethnicity.  
9           PHLpreK ensures that every Philadelphia  
10          child has a strong foundation for  
11          academic success.

12                      Who is PHLpreK? I want to talk  
13          numbers for a second. 2,250 children  
14          enrolled this year alone. At my program  
15          we have 35 children. 70 parents are able  
16          to work - three are School District  
17          teachers, two are Philadelphia police  
18          officers, one is U.S. military, two mail  
19          carriers, three hospital employees, two  
20          self-employed small business owners, one  
21          student, and many more.

22                      Seven children currently have  
23          an individual education plan for special  
24          education. Three children are foster  
25          children whose foster families do not

2           qualify for state subsidy. 241 PHLpreK  
3           teachers will be unemployed without this  
4           program funded by the sweetened beverage  
5           tax.

6                     Please consider all these  
7           numbers when signing on to bills that  
8           will directly impact these City residents  
9           and employees.

10                    Thank you, Bobby Henon,  
11           Kenyatta Johnson, Cherelle Parker, and  
12           all other members of City Council for  
13           your support of the sweetened beverage  
14           tax and all the programs it has impacted.  
15           Thank you for not co-sponsoring the  
16           recently introduced Bill No. 190183.  
17           Your support is truly making a difference  
18           in our great city. Please consider who  
19           you are impacting when considering which  
20           bill to co-sponsor. The sweetened  
21           beverage tax is the only option that will  
22           continue to create a beautiful beginning  
23           to every child's future.

24                    Thank you.  
25                    (Applause.)

2                   CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna Hagins.

3                   (Witness approached podium.)

4                   MR. HAGINS: Good morning,  
5 everyone. Ogbonna Hagins, 58, make  
6 Philly great.

7                   I want to talk about -- I was  
8 going to talk about another resolution,  
9 but I'm going to talk about the  
10 resolution authorizing the establishment  
11 of a Special Committee on Child  
12 Separation in Philadelphia to investigate  
13 child separations --

14                   (Applause.)

15                   MR. HAGINS: -- in  
16 Philadelphia's child welfare system and  
17 develop recommendations to ensure  
18 compliance with State Child Protective  
19 Services Law to protect children and due  
20 process rights to families and prevent  
21 the unnecessary break-up of families.

22                   Councilman Oh, thank you.

23                   Councilman Oh, thank you.

24                   (Applause.)

25                   MR. HAGINS: Thank you,

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           Councilwoman Bass, who signed on to this,  
3           but, you know, you're looking out for  
4           black people. You're looking out for  
5           black people, and we thank you. The  
6           African American community thanks you for  
7           looking out for black people.

8                         (Applause.)

9                         MR. HAGINS: Nobody else in  
10           City Council that I see -- and, look,  
11           look at you guys. You're not even  
12           looking at me. You're not even looking  
13           at the people who are speaking to you.  
14           You have to show respect to the people  
15           that you're supposed to represent.

16                        (Applause.)

17                        MR. HAGINS: This is really  
18           indicative of this campaign season.  
19           Something that I've noticed is these  
20           commercials. What city are these  
21           commercials being produced in? I mean,  
22           you guys -- I mean, look, I'm telling  
23           you, you're very nice. You look nice and  
24           everything like that, but you're faking  
25           the people out.

2 (Applause.)

3 MR. HAGINS: You have these  
4 commercials with African Americans  
5 smiling? Really? What is there to smile  
6 about when every other block has  
7 potholes? What is there to smile about  
8 when six out of ten children in  
9 Philadelphia can't read, write, or do  
10 math on the high school level?

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12 Thank you.

13 MR. HAGINS: Yo, you guys need  
14 to be ashamed of buying the people.

15 I got three minutes, right?

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.  
17 You got two minutes, and your time is --

18 MR. HAGINS: Why do I have two  
19 minutes?

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Your  
21 time is up.

22 MR. HAGINS: But what I'm  
23 saying is this --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir?

25 MR. HAGINS: -- you're lying to

2 the people. The commercials --

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Your  
4 time is up.

5 (Microphone turned off.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Time  
7 is up. Thank you. You got two minutes.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Rebecca Womack.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

11 (Applause.)

12 (No response.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Rebecca Womack.

14 (No response.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Sara Stroman.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MS. WOMACK: Hi. My name is  
18 Rebecca Womack.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
20 on. Hold on.

21 Folks, can we have a little  
22 quiet, please. Thank you.

23 MS. WOMACK: And I am here  
24 today to express my support for the fair  
25 district resolution that was introduced

2           earlier by Councilman Jones and to thank  
3           him for his leadership in introducing it.

4                       Over the last several months,  
5           Fair District PA supporters have  
6           conducted constituent visits with  
7           Councilmembers to discuss this  
8           resolution. We also just conducted a  
9           legislative briefing on April 29th.

10                      Gerrymandering is when voting  
11           districts are drawn to give an unfair  
12           advantage to political parties and to  
13           particular legislators. Current law  
14           allows Pennsylvania legislators to draw  
15           the districts in which they and members  
16           of their party seek election. This  
17           direct conflict of interest has led to  
18           Pennsylvania becoming one of the most  
19           gerrymandered states in the entire  
20           country.

21                      The fundamental problem with  
22           gerrymandering is that it allows  
23           legislators to choose their voters  
24           instead of the other way around. This is  
25           undemocratic. Regardless of which party

2           is manipulating voting districts -- and  
3           they both do -- there are serious  
4           consequences for Philadelphians,  
5           including diminished electoral  
6           competition, governance divided by  
7           gridlock instead of problem-solving, and  
8           voter disenfranchisement.

9                     The long-term solution for  
10           ending gerrymandering is an independent  
11           citizens' commission for state  
12           legislative and congressional  
13           redistricting that must follow strict  
14           rules for fairness and transparency. The  
15           resolution introduced today affirms this.

16                     While only the Pennsylvania  
17           General Assembly can legislate  
18           state-level redistricting reform,  
19           municipalities nevertheless have a vital  
20           role to play in pressing for it. To  
21           date, 307 other municipalities have  
22           passed a fair district resolution like  
23           the one being introduced today -- or that  
24           was introduced. Their governing bodies,  
25           which comprise both republican and

2 democratic majorities, represent 56  
3 percent of the state's population.

4 It's time for Philadelphia City  
5 Council to pass a fair districts  
6 resolution too.

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Sara Stroman.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. STROMAN: Good afternoon.

14 My name is Sara Stroman, a volunteer and  
15 advocate for fair districts and other  
16 issues. I'm here today because I'm sick  
17 and tired of dysfunction in our PA  
18 Legislature and Congress. It's  
19 frustrating and wrong that practically  
20 all the decisions that are made in our  
21 State Legislature are made by a handful  
22 in leadership.

23 It's sickening that  
24 gerrymandering is a legal practice  
25 whereby it is legal to disenfranchise

2           voters. We know there are multiple ways  
3           of disenfranchising voters, and this is  
4           one of them.

5                     Our elected officials should  
6           not be drawing the lines for the  
7           districts in which they are running for  
8           election. The voters should decide who  
9           holds elected office, not the  
10          politicians.

11                    I am frustrated for my  
12          Representative who goes to work every day  
13          trying to do what we ask her to do and  
14          her voice is effectively and sometimes  
15          literally squashed. Thereby my voice is  
16          squashed and the issues I care about  
17          don't get addressed.

18                    No one deserves to be demonized  
19          and ignored due to their party  
20          affiliation alone. I want to be proud of  
21          my State Legislature, and right now  
22          largely due to gerrymandering and the  
23          extremes it promotes, we are the least  
24          productive full-time state legislature in  
25          the country, aside from Congress, which

2           suffers the same ills. This is nothing  
3           to be proud of.

4                    I am deeply grateful to  
5           Councilman Jones for introducing the  
6           redistricting resolution today so that  
7           the people of Philadelphia can send a  
8           strong message to Harrisburg that we have  
9           had enough.

10                   (Applause.)

11                   CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

12                   (Witness approached podium.)

13                   MR. DANIEL: Best for last  
14           again.

15                   This is an official decree of  
16           the people in writ of mandamus quo  
17           warranto and, as such, requires immediate  
18           action and remedy.

19                   Every week, Council, Mayor,  
20           Governor, and others transfer private  
21           property to the government, probably  
22           illegally.

23                   Duty doesn't give a damn if  
24           you're having a bad day. Duty doesn't  
25           give a damn if you don't feel like it.

2                   Gettysburg, Arlington, and  
3           countless other cemeteries are filled  
4           with people who performed their known  
5           duty or task.

6                   Would people volunteer to serve  
7           overseas if they knew their government  
8           was stealing their neighbor's home?

9                   Officials avoiding their known  
10          duty or task must be prosecuted to prove  
11          that the government honors veterans'  
12          sacrifices.

13                   Why hasn't the Attorney General  
14          investigated and prosecuted the numerous  
15          complaints filed by me? Why hasn't the  
16          Sheriff, the Police, or the State Police  
17          in this very room arrested any official  
18          for the theft of my home and theft of my  
19          just compensation?

20                   The constitutions require  
21          immediate remedy of this breach of law,  
22          breach of close, breach of fiduciary  
23          duty. Your oath of office requires you  
24          to act or face prison.

25                   42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,

1           5/16/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA  
3           Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
4           through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
5           711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws  
6           listed in SCOTUS 15-8965 appear violated.

7                   I call on the federal and  
8           Commonwealth governments to perform their  
9           constitutional obligations to investigate  
10          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
11          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
12          1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

13                   The denial of God-given 42 USC  
14          1982 property rights for 25 years is  
15          egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,  
16          and requires immediate remedy.

17                   A just government must obey the  
18          rule of law.

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Thank you.

21                   MR. DANIHEL: I remind Council,  
22          it takes a lot of cooperation to create  
23          and allow all of this monumental  
24          corruption.

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The

16           Chair recognizes Councilwoman

18                  COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:   Thank

25                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   It's

11                   Mr. Decker, please read the  
12          title of 190346-A.

13                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
14          authorizing the establishment of a  
15          "Special Committee on Child Separation in  
16          Philadelphia" to investigate child  
17          separation in Philadelphia's child  
18          welfare system and develop  
19          recommendations to ensure compliance with  
20          State Child Protective Services Law to  
21          protect children and due process rights  
22          of families and prevent the unnecessary  
23          break-up of families.

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
25          Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

2                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
3 you, Mr. President.

4                   Mr. President, the issue of  
5 child separation is obviously a serious  
6 issue. I think we all would agree on  
7 that. And it's certainly something that  
8 should be looked at in a very intense  
9 manner.

10                   I would argue, respectfully,  
11 this is not the right approach as  
12 proposed by this resolution to set up a  
13 special committee. We already have two  
14 standing committees that could address  
15 this issue, and I think, most  
16 importantly, we have a task force that  
17 was set up, I believe, last June that is  
18 dealing with the various issues of DHS,  
19 including this, and they include the  
20 all-important entities, including DHS,  
21 including the School District, and that  
22 would seem to be -- at least one of those  
23 places would seem to be the appropriate  
24 place to deal with this particular issue.

25                   I understand that task force,

2           again, has met at least a dozen times.

3                   I think we need to show a  
4           consistent approach to this issue. We  
5           already have -- it's already being looked  
6           into. To have another special committee  
7           set up and have them crisscrossing into  
8           each other I think is the wrong approach.  
9           I think it sends the wrong message to all  
10          of those concerned, including the state,  
11          who will be looking at what we're doing.

12                   So while I'm going -- while I  
13          would argue that we do not approve this  
14          resolution, I want to be clear, we are  
15          not rejecting the issue of child  
16          separation. We are rejecting this  
17          particular method of addressing it, and I  
18          think we all want to --

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Folks, you had an opportunity at public  
21          comment. Now we're going to have the  
22          vote and we're going to have information  
23          from the members.

24                   Councilman, I'm sorry.

25                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

2           you, Mr. President.

3                        Again, I want to repeat, we are  
4           not rejecting this issue of child  
5           separation. We all agree it's an  
6           important issue, but I think we should  
7           reject this particular approach and deal  
8           with the entities and the committees that  
9           are already set forth and all work  
10          together to try to address, again, this  
11          very important issue. So I would ask  
12          members to vote no on this resolution.

13                        Thank you very much,  
14          Mr. President.

15                        (Audience members yelling out.)

16                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17          Folks, folks, folks, we're not going to  
18          do that today. Okay? We're not doing  
19          that today. All right?

20                        (Audience members yelling out.)

21                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22          Folks, just calm down.

23                        (Audience members yelling out.)

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm  
25          telling you, folks, you have had your

9           We're going to have a vote today on the  
10          resolution. Okay? There will be a vote  
11          on the resolution.

12                   (Applause.)

13          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
14          Folks, we're not going to do this. I'm  
15          telling you, we're going to have a vote  
16          on the resolution.

17                   (Audience members yelling out.)

18          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19          Councilman Oh, did you want to be  
20          recognized? You had your -- you changed  
21          your mind?

22                   COUNCILMAN OH: I thought it  
23          was time to make a motion, but I think  
24          there's --

25          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.

2           It's time for speeches like we do every  
3           week. You had your light on. Do you not  
4           want to be recognized?

5                    COUNCILMAN OH: Yeah. I'll be  
6           recognized.

7                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,  
8           you're doing your light for the motion?

9                    COUNCILMAN OH: Sure.

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I  
11          got you. I'm sorry.

12                    The Chair recognizes  
13          Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

14                    COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
15          Mr. President. I do have a point of  
16          information. And it is clear by the  
17          anguish and the pain that we hear in the  
18          voices of these parents, it's absolutely  
19          heart-wrenching.

20                    The point of information is, in  
21          many ways I'm going to punctuate what  
22          Councilman Bill Greenlee has already  
23          articulated. To be sure, we have the  
24          Committee on Health and Human Services,  
25          which is one place where we can go for

2           parents and those who care about the life  
3           chances of our children to have a voice,  
4           to have a say and often times their way.  
5           We also have the Committee on Children  
6           and Youth where parents and those of us  
7           who care about our children get a chance  
8           to have their say and in many times get  
9           their way.

10                    I learned in doing some  
11           homework this morning that we also have a  
12           task force that has been convened under  
13           the leadership of Councilwoman Gym and  
14           Councilman Kenyatta Johnson. So for me,  
15           it would be very, very, very useful to  
16           get an update on where they are, and  
17           tackling every single issue that is  
18           articulated in this resolution needs to  
19           be examined, needs to be looked at with a  
20           laser beam. The point of information I'm  
21           asking is, of these issues introduced in  
22           this resolution, are they being captured  
23           in the task force that is currently  
24           already convened by Councilwoman Gym and  
25           Councilman Kenyatta Johnson? That's the

2           point of information I need.

3                       Secondly, are we slicing hairs  
4           here? Are we slicing hairs? Are we able  
5           to achieve everything this resolution  
6           requires? And, yes, we do need to look  
7           at the issue. Are we able to achieve  
8           everything in the resolution by way of a  
9           task force that has been in place for X  
10          number of months?

11                      So it would be very, very  
12          helpful for me to hear an update on the  
13          task force at this hour prior to calling  
14          on a vote.

15                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16          Thank you.

17                      (Audience members yelling out.)

18                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19          Folks, folks, come on.

20                      So the task force was convened.  
21          Who is going to be the person that's  
22          going to respond?

23                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: My limited  
24          understanding is --

25                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2           Chair recognizes -- hey, folks,  
3           seriously, we really need you all to be  
4           quiet, please, so we can conduct the  
5           business.

6                         The Chair recognizes  
7           Councilwoman Gym.

8                         COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
9           very much, Council President. First of  
10          all, I want to absolutely acknowledge the  
11          people who are in this room, many of whom  
12          have pushed us to go this far.

13                        In June, this Council convened  
14          and established a task force to take a  
15          look at the issue of youth in residential  
16          treatment facilities. Obviously many of  
17          them are separated from their families,  
18          but the issue has gone quite broad as  
19          well. We are looking at issues of  
20          separation but, more importantly, also  
21          issues of what we need to do to bring  
22          families back to health and healing.

23                        Since we established the task  
24          force, the task force started meeting.  
25          We have multiple members of the task

2           force. They include the School District  
3           of Philadelphia, the District Attorney's  
4           Office, CBH, DBH, City agencies,  
5           Councilmember offices, and our advocates,  
6           the Defenders Association, Education Law  
7           Center, and others who have -- Juvenile  
8           Law Center, who are taking a serious look  
9           and reducing on the front end and also  
10          ensuring the safety of young people in  
11          these treatment facilities.

12                        We started meeting in November.  
13          We've met over 14 times, including a town  
14          hall that brought out 150 families,  
15          showing us how we both need to do better  
16          and how we can do better. This is --

17                        (Audience members yelling out.)

18                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19          Folks, if you don't want to -- we  
20          really --

21                        COUNCILWOMAN GYM: There are  
22          parents who are represented on the task  
23          force as well as young people, and we  
24          will commit to doing -- we have committed  
25          already doing another town hall on this

2           very issue for which we will invite  
3           people, including members of the task  
4           force to be available.

5                         We are moving towards  
6           recommendations that will see a  
7           significant reduction around youth in  
8           these facilities. They include -- we  
9           expect to have those recommendations  
10          hopefully as early as September, but we  
11          would like to see that move towards  
12          fruition and invite members of those who  
13          are interested in the special committee  
14          to join us on the task force and be part  
15          of that solution that we are creating,  
16          the recommendations that we have.

17                        I understand the pain that a  
18          lot of people in this room are facing.  
19          We also have a big systemic problem, and  
20          we need all people at the table to try  
21          and get this under control. I'm  
22          committed to it. I'm in my first term,  
23          and we've already seen things move. And  
24          for those of us who are on Council, we  
25          are taking this issue very seriously and

2           certainly invite other Councilmembers to  
3           be part of that process.

4                       (Audience members yelling out.)

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

7                       Folks, listen, time out.

8           Folks, if all cannot participate in this  
9           way in a civil manner and let the  
10          Councilmembers speak, you're going to  
11          have to leave. You're going to have to  
12          leave. We can't have people hollering  
13          out from the audience. We gave you a  
14          chance to speak. You can't keep  
15          hollering out from the audience. All  
16          right? It's your choice. It's your  
17          choice.

18                       (Audience members yelling out.)

19          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20          Ma'am.

21                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
22          Oh.

23                       COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
24          much, Council President.

25          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Folks, can we have quiet, please.

3                   COUNCILMAN OH: The Committee  
4           on Health and Human Services chaired by  
5           Councilwoman Bass held a hearing based on  
6           a resolution that was passed in this  
7           body. It particularly had to do with DHS  
8           and whether the City agency, despite the  
9           good work that it does, its good mission,  
10          whether or not it was complying with  
11          state law.

12                   The issue is whether or not DHS  
13          as an organization routinely, routinely  
14          and intentionally violates state law, the  
15          Child Protective Services Law. And from  
16          what I've seen, it does, it has, and it  
17          justifies it.

18                   DHS is also the entity that  
19          educates mandated reporters in this city,  
20          and it routinely violates the law. So  
21          under those circumstances, I think it is  
22          important to focus specifically on DHS.

23                   The mothers that are here today  
24          and the many, many mothers who have  
25          contacted my office and brought proof to

2           my office have been going to their  
3           elected officials for years. This is not  
4           the first time that they've come to City  
5           Hall. I'm not the first elected official  
6           that they've been to. But they have come  
7           continuously, and they have no confidence  
8           in this current system, because despite  
9           all the evidence that they have presented  
10          that I've seen, medical records,  
11          photographs, videotape, testimony, all of  
12          those things, they have not been able to  
13          get a response, an appropriate response,  
14          to their complaints.

15                    There is something wrong with  
16          DHS.

17                    (Applause.)

18                    COUNCILMAN OH: The biggest  
19          problem that I have with DHS is that DHS  
20          tells us there's absolutely nothing wrong  
21          with them. And in the course of pursuing  
22          this, there have been threats made,  
23          threats intimated that there will be  
24          retaliation, that there will be political  
25          consequences, all types of threats, and I

2           wonder why, why is that, when all that  
3           we're doing is our duty to provide an  
4           oversight to an administrative agency  
5           that is responsible for protecting  
6           children. Why the threats? Why the  
7           problems?

8                         What I want to look at in this  
9           committee and not whitewash it, sugar  
10          coat it, hide it, or persecute it, I want  
11          to look and see whether or not the agency  
12          is in compliance with the law.

13                        I will say that I have in  
14          looking at the evidence -- and I have  
15          about 50 mothers, mothers who have  
16          voluntarily been videotaped. They said,  
17          videotape me. We videotape them. We  
18          have that. They're not being videotaped  
19          and presenting evidence because they're  
20          hiding something. They are mostly  
21          not-at-fault mothers, which means they  
22          were never accused of doing anything  
23          wrong. They were never accused of being  
24          abusive or negligent. In most cases that  
25          they have come forward, it was determined

2           by DHS that the allegations were  
3           unfounded, yet they have been denied  
4           their children for years.

5                     Their children are being placed  
6           in multiple foster care situations where  
7           they are abused, they have run away, they  
8           are depressed, they're medicated, they're  
9           sexually violated. And it continues.  
10          And then when not-at-fault mothers -- and  
11          no one has said they've done anything  
12          harmful to their children -- comply with  
13          DHS, get a GED, get a job, do everything  
14          they want, two years later DHS tells  
15          them, But we are putting your child up  
16          for permanent legal custody.

17                     It happens too much. There's  
18          something definitely wrong.

19                     And, finally, some of the facts  
20          that I've seen and confirmed are  
21          horrendous. What I mean is, I have  
22          accumulated evidence in a particular case  
23          that I've sent to the Attorney General's  
24          Office, the U.S. Attorney's Office. I  
25          have tried to give it to our District

2           Attorney. And it is because DHS has  
3           placed a five-year-old child who has been  
4           raped by a boyfriend, tried to place that  
5           child with the boyfriend, claiming to the  
6           judge that this was the paternal father  
7           when that was not the paternal father.  
8           DHS then places the child with the  
9           girlfriend of that person.

10                   That five-year-old child  
11           provided a medical report, corroborated  
12           by her ten-year-old brother, of two years  
13           of rape, and DHS determined that the case  
14           was unfounded. There's no police  
15           investigation.

16                   That person, the rapist, is on  
17           the street. But DHS came to the  
18           grandmother's home and took the third  
19           grandchild without a court order, and  
20           that's on videotape. No court order.  
21           They handed a piece of paper, and when it  
22           was opened after taking the child in  
23           front of a police lieutenant and six  
24           police officers, that piece of paper was  
25           not a court order.

2                   Now, the judge receiving a  
3 document from DHS signed an order that  
4 the grandmother is to have no interaction  
5 with her three grandchildren, and now  
6 they have brought allegations against the  
7 grandmother as being mentally ill.

8                   This is not something that I  
9 think is just a general handling of this  
10 matter. I think these type of cases --  
11 and I'm clearly not saying this is  
12 routine. Obviously not. What I am  
13 saying is, these type of situations  
14 appear to occur in a system that is not  
15 complying with the law. It does a lot of  
16 good things, but we cannot ignore the  
17 complaints of constituents all over our  
18 city, who have brought evidence and  
19 continue to bring evidence to their  
20 elected representatives seeking help.

21                   I would ask all of the  
22 Councilmembers to believe the women who  
23 are here today. The evidence will come  
24 out. Without an appropriate and proper

10 of Philadelphia. And I said to them I  
11 would hope that they would view these two  
12 legislative proposals as an effort to  
13 gain allies in their fight to help lessen

16 the workers who were here, along with the  
17 industry representatives who I know are  
18 paying attention to what we're doing,  
19 after you leave here today, hopefully the

16          They also broke up the concrete and even  
17          came back and repaired the concrete.

18                   So yesterday we -- and they  
19          were able to save about \$5,000 in repair  
20          bills through the American Water  
21          Resources and the Philadelphia Energy  
22          Authority, which is an institution that  
23          you created, Council President, the  
24          Water/Sewer Services Line Protection  
25          Program.

2                   So yesterday we had a press  
3 conference in front of this constituent's  
4 house in the Fourth Council District and  
5 it was announced that we've been able to

9 57,000 people have signed up for the  
10 program. For those who want to sign up  
11 still, it's less than \$8 a month, less  
12 than \$100 per year. We've also saved the  
13 Water Department over 100,000 kilowatts  
14 of energy through this new program that  
15 we just started about six months ago. In  
16 addition, all the repairs that have been  
17 done for homeowners in the City of  
18 Philadelphia that have been able to save  
19 a million dollars, 80 percent of that
