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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 We're going to get started. We're going
7 to have a long day today.

8 To give our invocation this
9 morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend
10 Shawn Hyska, Pastor of the First
11 Presbyterian Church. He is here today as
12 my guest, and I would ask all members and
13 guests to please rise.

14 (Councilmembers, guests, and
15 visitors rise.)

16 REVEREND HYSKA: So thank you,
17 President Clarke, for the invitation to
18 come before this cherished body this
19 morning as a resident of your Fifth
20 District. Yet with the multiple hats I
21 wear, I actually touch almost every
22 district of this beloved city. I live in
23 your Fifth. My church, First
24 Presbyterian Church in Kensington, is in
25 Councilman Squilla's First District, and

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2 then with my full-time job, as if I'm not
3 busy enough, at Presby's Inspired Life,
4 we have an affordable housing community
5 for older adults I think in almost every
6 single district of this beloved city.

7 So with that and with all of
8 you who serve the residents of your
9 specific districts or at-large, let us
10 now go before our divine creator seeking
11 her guidance. Join with me, please, in
12 prayer.

13 Let us pray.

14 Loving, life-sustaining, and
15 boundary-breaking God, we call upon you
16 this day to shine your light in front of
17 these, your servants, in this, our home,
18 the City of Brotherly and Sisterly Love.

19 We ask that you empower these
20 Councilmembers to enact laws and
21 ordinances that are just and fair to all
22 residents, whether young or old, whether
23 they and their family have lived in
24 Philly for their entire lives or whether
25 they are just moving into the City today.

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2 Grant them the wisdom to do
3 what's right in your eyes, even if it's
4 unpopular, especially in protecting and
5 preserving our history, the stories of
6 the residents long gone, whose legacies
7 are too quickly demolished.

8 Guide their discernment and
9 actions to protect the rights of all
10 Philadelphians, no matter their race,
11 ethnicity, sexual orientation, or gender.

12 Support them in meeting the
13 needs of residents of the City, no matter
14 what neighborhood they call home, what
15 job they have, or whether they voted for
16 them or not.

17 Strengthen this Council and
18 every single one of their staff members
19 as they answer calls and e-mails from
20 concerned residents seeking relief and
21 liberation.

22 Let them never forget your call
23 to protect the vulnerable in our midst,
24 the widows, the orphans, and especially
25 our seniors.

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2 Provide all the members who
3 serve in this Council listening ears to
4 hear one another without judgment or
5 preconceived notions. Give them the
6 ability to truly listen to one another,
7 especially to those who disagree with
8 them, because there just might be
9 something to learn.

10 Help them check their own egos
11 in order for them to lead selflessly with
12 humility.

13 Oh, Lord, our creator, our
14 sustainer, our help in ages past and our
15 hope for years to come, fill us all with
16 your peace and love that only you can
17 give.

18 In this upcoming Memorial Day
19 weekend, as we bring out our grills and
20 enjoy fellowships over barbecues or we
21 rest our feet in the cool waters of the
22 ocean, let us never forget the stories of
23 the people who gave the ultimate
24 sacrifice of laying down their lives for
25 their friends and attempting to bring

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2 peace to this chaotic world.

3 May we all attempt to shine
4 your love and your peace in their lives,
5 in our neighborhoods, and in every
6 moment.

7 It is in your holy and powerful
8 name we ask all these things.

9 Amen.

10 (Amen.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those
13 inspiring words.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you and, again, Reverend, thank you
17 for those inspiring words.

18 Our next order of business is
19 the approval of the Journal of the
20 meeting of Thursday, May 16, 2019, and
21 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. I move that the
24 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May
25 16th, 2019 be approved.

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2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. It has been moved and
5 properly seconded that the Journal of the
6 meeting of Thursday, May 16, 2019 stand
7 approved.

8 All those in favor say aye.

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and the Journal is
15 approved.

16 And our next order of business
17 is requests for leave of absence, and the
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. On behalf of the
21 majority, a leave of absence is requested
22 for Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair thanks the gentleman. Leave shall
25 be granted. Let the record reflect that.

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2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: Good morning.
5 On behalf of the minority, there are no
6 requests for leaves of absence.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair thanks the gentleman.

9 At this time, I would like to
10 dispense with the regular order of
11 business and I would like to welcome and
12 I want to thank everyone for coming down
13 today to witness their government in
14 action. We genuinely hope that you have
15 a good stay here today, a knowledgeable
16 one but, more importantly, a pleasurable
17 one, so much so that you come back again.
18 So, again, thank you very much.

19 At this time, I would like to
20 recognize our good friend State
21 Representative Jason Dawkins over there.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: As
24 we affectionately call him, J. Dawk, kind
25 of reminds us of Brian Dawkins a little

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2 bit.

3 Representative, thank you for
4 coming down and doing that great work up
5 there in Harrisburg. We appreciate you.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Greenlee.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. On behalf of
10 Councilwoman Gym, who her voice is a
11 little weak today -- I couldn't imagine
12 why -- I want to acknowledge in the
13 audience right back here eighth graders
14 from Kirkbride Elementary School who are
15 here watching government in action.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Stand up guys so we can see.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you so much for coming down. We
22 appreciate you being here.

23 And the Chair recognizes
24 Councilman Taubenberger.

25 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

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2 Council President, thank you very, very
3 much. You have always been so welcoming
4 to young students to learn a little bit
5 more about the government and asking them
6 to come down. Well, I actually got a
7 school to come down. And I just want to
8 take a time and moment to recognize and
9 welcome the second grade class from the
10 Philadelphia Academy Charter School.
11 They have been studying government this
12 spring and are joining us today to
13 observe their city government in action,
14 because of the words that you speak every
15 week, and they are taught by
16 Mrs. Dougherty, Mrs. Wright, and
17 Mrs. Markoff.

18 Will these young students
19 please rise.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Stand up, guys.

23 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

24 There's 80 of them.

25 Council President, thank you so

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2 much, and thanks also for your leadership
3 in really allowing them to be here, but
4 also promoting them to come here, talking
5 about it every week. Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. I can see that
8 they're learning how to get engaged early
9 on. That's great. Good stuff. Thank
10 you.

11 Thank you guys for coming down
12 this morning.

13 Thank you. Thank you,
14 Councilman. And thank you, young folks.

15 At this time, the Chair
16 recognizes Councilman Domb, who will
17 present a resolution recognizing the Drug
18 Enforcement Administration. Would
19 Assistant Special Agent in charge Shawn
20 Ellerman and those accompanying him
21 please join the Councilman at the podium.

22 (Councilmembers and guests
23 approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 joining Councilman Domb, we have

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2 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman Parker,
3 Councilman Green, Councilman Oh,
4 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, Councilmen
5 Taubenberger, Squilla, Jones, and
6 Councilman Johnson.

7 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning.
8 We're acknowledging and recognizing the
9 Drug Enforcement Administration's 360
10 Degree Strategy, an innovative
11 three-pronged approach to combatting
12 heroin/opioid use through Law
13 Enforcement, Diversion, and Community
14 Outreach.

15 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'm
16 going to take a point of personal
17 privilege, because when I got elected to
18 Council, I never thought I was going to
19 have to play such a role in public safety
20 in the community, and the DEA in
21 particular with our office and the folks
22 not only that are here with us this
23 morning but some of their field agents
24 have really adopted the Seventh
25 Councilmanic District. They have helped

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2 us with bookbag drives and community
3 events and really have broken down the
4 barrier so that the community feels like
5 they care and that they can improve their
6 quality of life.

7 So I personally want to thank
8 everyone in the DEA's office for your
9 support and collaboration all throughout
10 the year, but in particular as we deal
11 with this very complex and complicated
12 situation around the opioid crisis. And
13 while it's a citywide approach, your
14 work, particularly with young people and
15 partnering with the School District and
16 others around prevention and education,
17 is very important and very much
18 appreciated.

19 So whereas, the Drug
20 Enforcement Administration (DEA) 360 is a
21 comprehensive approach tackling the cycle
22 of violence and addiction generated by
23 the link between drug cartels, violent
24 gangs, and the rising problem of
25 prescription opioid and heroin abuse in

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2 U.S. cities; and

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,

4 DEA 360 involves coordinated law
5 enforcement operations targeting all
6 levels of drug trafficking organizations
7 and violent gangs supplying drugs to our
8 neighborhoods; and

9 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

10 Whereas, the DEA 360 Strategy also
11 engages drug manufacturers, wholesalers,
12 practitioners, and pharmacists through
13 diversion control to increase awareness
14 of the opioid epidemic and encourage
15 responsible prescribing practices and the
16 use of opioid painkillers throughout the
17 medical community; and

18 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the
19 strategy incorporates community outreach
20 and partnership with local organizations
21 following enforcement operations,
22 equipping and empowering communities to
23 fight the opioid epidemic; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
25 DEA rolled out the 360 Strategy in

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2 November 2015 in Pittsburgh together with
3 the U.S. Attorney and state and local
4 partners;

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Since
6 that time, DEA has deployed the strategy
7 in other pilot cities and is using the
8 three-pronged approach in all DEA Field
9 Divisions; and

10 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
11 Whereas, since the implementation of the
12 program in Philadelphia in January 2017,
13 the DEA has partnered with and supported
14 the Gurney Street Project, the Mural Arts
15 Philadelphia's Kensington Storefront and
16 Porch Light Program; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: The DEA
18 has also sponsored youth City of
19 Philadelphia dance programs at elementary
20 schools around Kensington as well as
21 other events across Philadelphia; and

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
23 the DEA has joined forces with Discovery
24 Education to create Operation Prevention,
25 a comprehensive, no-cost, science-based

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2 program for young people ages 8 through
3 18 to combat opioid misuse;

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
5 Operation Prevention includes digital
6 classroom lessons, a parent toolkit,
7 Spanish resources, video challenge,
8 on-demand virtual field trips, and
9 student learning module; and

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
11 education prevention is one of the many
12 ways to combat the opioid crisis. We
13 encourage a collaborative partnership
14 between DEA 360 and other programs
15 currently providing prevention education;

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Now,
17 therefore, be it resolved, that the
18 Council of the City of Philadelphia
19 hereby acknowledges and recognizes the
20 Drug Enforcement Administration's 360
21 Degree Strategy, an innovative
22 three-pronged approach to combatting
23 heroin/opioid use through Law
24 Enforcement, Diversion, and Community
25 Outreach.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. And the Chair recognizes

5 Mr. Ellerman for remarks.

6 MR. ELLERMAN: First of all, I
7 want to say thank you to all our
8 partners. It's been successful the last
9 two years.

10 The numbers are out. They're
11 not great, but we have a lot to be
12 thankful for. That's because we judge
13 victory by one person at a time.
14 Statistics always run almost everything
15 in federal government and I'm sure in
16 state government too and local
17 government, but we can't look at this
18 problem with statistics. We have to look
19 at them as human beings.

20 DEA vows one thing - we fight
21 domestic cartels in the United States and
22 we fight foreign cartels overseas that
23 are plaguing our citizens throughout our
24 country. That will not stop. We will
25 continue to fight, but now we'll do it

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2 with a lot more friends.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, and congratulations.

10 At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilmembers Johnson and
12 Jones, who will do a presentation on my
13 behalf to celebrate the 138th Convention
14 of the United Supreme Council, Ancient
15 and Accepted Scottish Rite of Free
16 Masonry, Prince Hall, Northern
17 Jurisdiction. Would illustrious Melvin
18 J. Bazemore, 33rd Degree and the
19 Sovereign Grand Commander, the United
20 Supreme Council, New Jersey, and those
21 accompanying him please join the
22 Councilman at the podium.

23 (Councilmembers and guests
24 approached podium.)

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President, on your behalf.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 You're welcome.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Behold how
6 good and how pleasant it is for brethren
7 to dwell together in unity. It is my
8 distinct honor and privilege and pleasure
9 to be honoring and celebrating the 138th
10 Convention of the United Supreme Council,
11 Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of
12 Free Masonry, Prince Hall Affiliation,
13 Northern Jurisdiction, United States of
14 America, Incorporated.

15 The Council of the City of
16 Philadelphia is pleased and honored to
17 recognize the Pennsylvania Council of
18 Deliberation on the occasion of its
19 hosting of the 138th Convention of the
20 United States Supreme Council to be held
21 in Philadelphia May 23rd, 2019 through
22 May 27th, 2019.

23 Whereas, the Scottish Rite was
24 introduced to the United States in 1801
25 and subsequently to Prince Hall's

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2 Fraternity in 1820. In 1881, the United
3 States Supreme Council in the Northern
4 Jurisdiction was established and began to
5 convene every third year in various major
6 cities, with every third year convening
7 in Philadelphia; and

8 Whereas, today this proud
9 organization has grown in strength and in
10 size of its contribution to society. It
11 is over 130 years old -- y'all look real
12 good for 130 -- and draws its membership
13 from 20 northern states and well into the
14 Bahamas, Canada, Asia, and Europe; and

15 Whereas, since 1881, the core
16 objective and guiding principle of the
17 United States Supreme Council, Northern
18 Jurisdiction has remained steadfast and
19 unshaken, perpetually striving to make
20 good men better.

21 I like that, to make good men
22 better.

23 The immeasurable value of the
24 United Supreme Council can be seen most
25 readily in the emphasis that members

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2 pursue endeavors such as personal
3 motivation, human improvement, belief in
4 the supreme being, love of family,
5 devotion to country, and charity to all;
6 and

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: It is
8 truly an honor and a privilege to have
9 this opportunity to present this
10 acknowledgment with my colleague
11 Councilman Curtis Jones. I've been a
12 part of this fraternity for more than 20
13 years, and it's definitely helped me
14 become a better man, but also I'm proud
15 as a Councilperson to have the
16 opportunity to represent their
17 headquarters in the Second Councilmanic
18 District.

19 Whereas, the personal and
20 paternal development of the members of
21 the United Supreme Council can easily be
22 documented due to a distinguished history
23 of service to others. Among many
24 examples, they proudly award scholarships
25 to need-based college students in each of

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2 the 26 orients that comprise the Northern
3 Jurisdiction; and

4 Whereas, in the City of
5 Philadelphia alone, the United Supreme
6 Council operates two housing facilities
7 for low- and moderate-income senior
8 citizens collectively comprising of 234
9 units in the Second Councilmanic
10 District. Moreover, the United Supreme
11 Council annually contributes more than
12 \$125,000 to various community
13 organizations such as the NAACP and its
14 Legal Defense Fund, the Urban League, the
15 United Negro College Fund, and others.
16 Taking great pride in supporting women
17 and children, Prince Hall Scottish Rite
18 Masonry annually provides resources to
19 widows and orphans and celebrates the
20 complementary endeavors of the ladies of
21 the Golden Circle, an auxiliary
22 organization made up of wives, mothers,
23 sisters, and daughters of its membership;
24 and

25 Whereas, while the

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2 aforementioned is merely a snapshot of
3 its positive impacts on the lives of its
4 members, their families, and their
5 surrounding communities, it is without
6 question that Prince Hall Scottish Rite
7 Masonry's positive impact on the world
8 will continue to be immeasurable for
9 generations to come.

10 Therefore, by virtue of this
11 citation, the Council of the City of
12 Philadelphia is pleased and proud to
13 honor and celebrate the United Supreme
14 Council, Ancient and Accepted Scottish
15 Rite of Free Masonry, Prince Hall
16 Affiliation, Northern Jurisdiction of the
17 United States of America, Incorporated on
18 the occasion of its 138th Convention of
19 the United Supreme Council. We in this
20 Council extend the sincere respect and
21 admiration of this legislative body and
22 say congratulations.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 the Chair recognizes the illustrious

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2 Melvin J. Bazemore for remarks.

3 MR. BAZEMORE: Good morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 MR. BAZEMORE: To Council

6 President Darrell Clarke, to the

7 Councilman who represents our district,

8 Councilman Kenyatta Johnson, to all of

9 the other distinguished Councilmen under

10 the sound of my voice, it is indeed an

11 honor and a privilege to stand before you

12 on this morning to represent the United

13 Supreme Council of the Ancient and

14 Accepted Scottish Rite of Free Masonry,

15 Prince Hall Affiliated for the Northern

16 Jurisdiction.

17 As has been stated, we are in

18 your beautiful city to host our 138th

19 annual session. Coming into this city

20 this week will be members from our

21 organization from over 26 countries and

22 three different continents, the Bahamas,

23 Europe, Asia. We are here, and we want

24 you to know that we are here representing

25 you as a city where our headquarters is

10 Thank you.

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 (Appause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Again, thank you, gentlemen, and
16 congratulations one more time. I really
17 appreciate you being here today.

18 Our next order of business is
19 communications. The Chair requests that
20 the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the
21 messages from the Mayor to the Chief
22 Clerk.

23 And, Mr. Decker, if you will
24 please read those messages.

25 CHIEF CLERK: To the President

2 and members of the Council of the City of
3 Philadelphia, I am pleased to advise you
4 that on May 22, 2019, I signed the
5 following bill which was passed by
6 Council at its session on May 9, 2019:

8 And I am submitting herewith
9 for the consideration of your honorable
10 body a resolution approving the
11 redevelopment contract of the
12 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for
13 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a
14 portion of the South Central Urban
15 Renewal Area, identified by house numbers
16 and street addresses as 1035 South Sixth
17 Street, 1037 South Sixth Street and 1028
18 South Fairhill Street; and

19 A resolution approving the
20 redevelopment contract of the
21 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for
22 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a
23 portion of the Kensington North of Lehigh
24 Redevelopment Area, identified by house
25 number and street address as 2250 East

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2 Cambria Street; and

3 An ordinance authorizing the
4 City Treasurer to enter into a Provider
5 Agreement with U.S. Bank, National
6 Association for the provision of
7 custodial banking services to the City;
8 and

9 An ordinance authorizing the
10 Director of Planning and Development to
11 file applications with the United States
12 Department of Housing and Urban
13 Development for a Community Development
14 Block Grant; to file applications to
15 participate in the HOME Investment
16 Partnership program and the Emergency
17 Solutions Grant program; and to apply for
18 a Housing Opportunities for Persons with
19 AIDS grant; and

20 An ordinance authorizing the
21 Streets Commissioner and Procurement
22 Commissioner to enter into an agreement
23 with Waste Management of Pennsylvania,
24 Incorporated pursuant to which Waste
25 Management will receive municipal solid

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2 waste to be collected by or on behalf of
3 the City, and transfer and dispose that
4 municipal solid waste; and

5 An ordinance authorizing the
6 Streets Commissioner and Procurement
7 Commissioner to enter into an Agreement
8 with Covanta Sustainable Solutions
9 pursuant to which Covanta will receive
10 municipal solid waste to be collected by
11 or on behalf of the City, and transfer
12 and dispose of that municipal solid
13 waste; and

14 An ordinance amending Title 4
15 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "The
16 Philadelphia Building Construction and
17 Occupancy Code," by adopting the 2018
18 edition of the "International Plumbing
19 Code" as published by the International
20 Code Council as "The Philadelphia
21 Plumbing Code," with additions, deletions
22 and other amendments thereto; and

23 An ordinance authorizing the
24 Commissioner of Public Property to grant
25 to the Pennsylvania Department of

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2 Transportation, a temporary construction
3 easement on a portion of the parcel or
4 parcels of land in and about the area
5 bounded by Girard Avenue, North 34th
6 Street and Zoological Drive, commonly
7 known as 3400 West Girard Avenue; and

8 An ordinance constituting the
9 Eighteenth Supplemental Ordinance to the
10 Amended and Restated General Airport
11 Revenue Bond Ordinance; authorizing the
12 Mayor, the City Controller and the City
13 Solicitor, or a majority of them, to
14 issue and sell one or more series or
15 subseries of tax-exempt or taxable
16 airport revenue bonds or notes of the
17 City of Philadelphia; and

18 An ordinance constituting the
19 Seventeenth Supplemental Ordinance to the
20 Amended and Restated General Airport
21 Revenue Bond Ordinance; authorizing the
22 Mayor, the City Controller and the City
23 Solicitor, or a majority of them, to
24 issue and sell one or more series or

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,

1 5/23/19 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS

2 Mr. President. I have seven bills, two
3 on your behalf, two co-sponsored by
4 Councilmember Parker, and two
5 non-privileged resolutions.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
9 amending Title 12 of The Philadelphia
10 Code, entitled "Traffic Code," to revise
11 various provisions related to the
12 on-street parking system; and

13 An ordinance amending Section
14 11-203(3) of The Philadelphia Code,
15 entitled "Sewer and Water Pipe and Other
16 Underground Service," to authorize
17 revision of the length of time during
18 which a permit to maintain a plumber's
19 ditch remains valid; and

20 An ordinance amending Section
21 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
22 "Designation of Bicycle Lanes," to
23 authorize a bicycle lane on North 2nd

25 and

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
18 week's Calendar.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a
20 non-privileged resolution approving the

23 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a
24 portion of the Kensington North of Lehigh
25 Redevelopment Area, identified by house

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 that will be on next week's Calendar.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Oh.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
9 much, Council President. On behalf of
10 Councilwoman Cindy Bass, she offers one
11 resolution. Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged
15 resolution recognizing and honoring
16 Chestnut Hill College on its 95th
17 anniversary and continued commitment to
18 providing students with a holistic
19 education in an inclusive environment
20 marked by academic excellence, personal
21 and professional growth, service to one
22 another and to the global community.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 that will be on this week's Calendar.

25 That concludes our introduction

3 order of business is reports from
4 committee.

5 And the Chair recognizes
6 Councilman Green.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. The Committee on
9 Appropriations reports one bill with a
10 favorable recommendation.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you.

13 Mr. Decker, please read the
14 report.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on
16 Appropriations, to which was referred
17 Bill No. 190314, entitled "An ordinance
18 authorizing transfers in appropriations
19 for Fiscal Year 2019 from the General
20 Fund, certain or all City offices,
21 departments, boards and commissions, the
22 Grants Revenue Fund, certain or all City
23 offices, departments, boards and
24 commissions to the General Fund, certain
25 or all City offices, departments, boards

2 and commissions, and the Special Gasoline
3 Tax Fund, certain or all City offices,
4 departments, boards and commissions,"
5 respectfully reports it has considered
6 and amended the same and returns the
7 attached bill to Council with a favorable
8 recommendation.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Mr. Decker.

11 And the Chair again recognizes
12 Councilman Green.

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
14 Council President. I move that the rules
15 of Council be suspended so as to permit
16 first reading this day of Bill No.
17 190314.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. It has been moved and
21 properly seconded that the rules of
22 Council be suspended so as to permit
23 first reading this day of Bill No.
24 190314.

25 All those in favor say aye.

1 5/23/19 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING

2 (Aye.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, and this bill will be
8 placed on our First Reading Calendar
9 today.

10 That concludes our reports from
11 committee, and our next order of business
12 is consideration of the Calendar.

13 I note that the bill just
14 reported from committee with a suspension
15 of the rules has been deemed to have had
16 a first reading. It will be on our
17 Second Reading and Final Passage at our
18 next Council session.

19 As there are no additional
20 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
21 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
22 purpose of calling up bills and
23 resolutions on our Final Passage Calendar
24 today.

25 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. The following resolutions
3 and bills are being called up for the
4 Second Reading and Final Passage
5 Calendars today. They are Bill Nos.
6 190195, 190420, 180937-A, and 190255.
7 All other bills and resolutions are being
8 held.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Parker.

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
14 you, Mr. President. Due to a
15 longstanding commitment, I will have to
16 be excused from Council, but I wish to be
17 recorded as voting aye on all bills and
18 resolutions.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilwoman.

21 Let me make sure we got nine
22 people here.

23 Okay. Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 Let the record reflect that the
25 Councilwoman will be voting aye on all

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2 bills and resolutions and amendments.

3 Thank you.

4 Before we consider these bills
5 and resolutions on our Final Passage
6 Calendar, we will have our public comment
7 session. It will go as follows:

8 When your name is called, you
9 will go to the middle of the Council
10 Chambers. There's a podium. There's a
11 device on that podium. When the light on
12 the device turns green, it will be your
13 time to speak. When the light turns
14 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
15 conclude your remarks. When the light
16 turns red, we ask you please adhere to
17 our guidelines and conclude your remarks.
18 You will have three minutes to testify.

19 Mr. Decker, please call the
20 first name on the list.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Colleen McCauley,
22 commenting on 180936.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

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2 MS. McCAULEY: Good morning.

3 Council President Clarke and all City

4 Councilmembers, thank you for your

5 attention and action throughout the year

6 to improve the lives and life chances of

7 Philadelphia's children. I'm Colleen

8 McCauley, the Health Policy Director at

9 PCCY, a child advocacy and policy

10 organization working on behalf of kids in

11 the region. I'm also a nurse and the

12 proud parent of a Philadelphia School

13 District student.

14 I am here to urge you to

15 support Resolution 170408 to prohibit the

16 suspension of elementary-aged students in

17 the District. Providing more supports to

18 our youngest students as well as support

19 and training for teachers and school

20 administrators is what's truly needed. I

21 say this because suspension of kids who

22 are six, seven, eight, nine, ten years

23 old is most often just a symptom of

24 larger underlying issues.

25 Many of the reasons young

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2 children's behavior moves a school to
3 suspend them are related to deprivation
4 and trauma, such as unstable housing, not
5 enough food to eat, violence in their
6 homes or community.

7 Rampant lead poisoning of
8 babies throughout the City also causes
9 behavioral problems and attention deficit
10 problems that manifest when children
11 become school age and is the likely cause
12 for some young students to be suspended
13 from school.

14 Today you're considering
15 another measure, Bill 180937, requiring
16 all Philadelphia children to get screened
17 for lead at ages one and two. With 2,200
18 babies poisoned by lead in the City every
19 year, I urge you to support this bill as
20 well.

21 At the Health Committee hearing
22 on this bill in March, the bill sponsor,
23 Councilperson Blondell Reynolds Brown,
24 made a critical statement, very much
25 worth repeating. She said, Many would be

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2 surprised to know that today more
3 children are being poisoned by lead in
4 the City of Philadelphia than in Flint,
5 Michigan, which made national headlines
6 in 2015 for its lead poisoning issues.
7 There are 16 zip codes in Philadelphia
8 covering nine of ten councilmanic
9 districts where more than 10 percent of
10 our children screened have elevated blood
11 lead levels.

12 Screening babies for lead
13 poisoning is important so we can connect
14 them to the critical services like early
15 intervention and high-quality early
16 childcare services supported in part by
17 the soda tax so we can try and mitigate
18 the harm done by lead to children's
19 intellect, development, and behavior and
20 prevent some of these kids from
21 ultimately being suspended from
22 elementary school.

23 But I also want to urge you all
24 to think about preventing babies from
25 ever being poisoned by lead in the first

2 place by helping get the lead out of
3 their homes. Most babies in this city
4 are poisoned by deteriorated lead-based
5 paint in older rental properties, a bill
6 unanimously passed out of the Health
7 Committee in March to require properties
8 to be tested.

9 If we get lead out of babies'
10 homes, they don't get poisoned. Their
11 blood lead tests will be negative, and
12 most likely fewer young children will be
13 at risk for being suspended.

14 Thank you very much for this
15 opportunity to talk to you.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Maurice Sampson,
20 commenting on 180937-A.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. SAMPSON: Good morning,
23 Council President, members of City
24 Council. I am here today to also speak
25 in favor of the blood lead levels bill.

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2 Informing the parents making
3 certain that we are aware of the children
4 and the potential of blood lead levels at
5 both 12 and 24 months is essential if we
6 want to catch the presence of lead before
7 it does its serious damage, which is for
8 life. The passage of this particular
9 piece of legislation provides some real
10 basic information for folks.

11 Clean Water Action, the
12 organization that I represent, we have
13 for the last two years been out just
14 talking to people trying to inform people
15 of just where the lead is that's in their
16 lives. We have been working on the issue
17 of dealing with lead in the City for a
18 long time. In 1972, I was an urban study
19 student at Rutgers University and came
20 across the river in order to hear about
21 this wonderful program the Health
22 Department had about lead poisoning in
23 the homes. So more than 50 years ago.
24 Had we set a goal then of 1/50th
25 reduction of all the lead, it wouldn't

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2 even be a subject we'd be discussing
3 today. We probably need to do that. A
4 40-year plan to get rid of lead is
5 something that probably looks reasonable
6 over 40 years. We can work every year to
7 make it less, but in 40 years we'll know
8 that it's gone.

9 Lead is not like a snake. It's
10 not something that comes up and bites
11 you. Lead is more like a hot stove that
12 you don't know about. So we expose
13 ourselves to it, and that's where the
14 children get poisoned.

15 We need and we have considered
16 a whole suite as pieces of legislation
17 that dealt with lead, and that is
18 wonderful. What we also need to do now
19 is to focus on making certain that
20 everybody knows where that lead is so
21 that we don't have to read every 18
22 months about children being poisoned by
23 lead.

24 Thank you so much for your
25 efforts here. I appreciate it. And we

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2 have full support of this bill.

3 Thank you very much.

4 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
5 you, sir.

6 (Applause.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: George Gould.

8 (No response.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: George Gould,
10 commenting on 180937-A.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. GOULD: Good morning. My
13 name is George Gould. I'm an attorney
14 with Community Legal Services here in
15 Philadelphia. I'm here to talk about
16 Bill 180937, which would require blood
17 lead testing of children in Philadelphia.

18 I have been involved in the
19 problems of lead-based paint since 1970
20 and have talked to Council about many of
21 the issues. This bill -- it's a very
22 important bill -- would do two things.
23 It would require doctors treating
24 children between nine months and 21
25 months to test for blood lead levels. It

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2 would also require doctors treating
3 children between 21 and 72 months to also
4 test for blood lead levels. So the
5 requirement would be twice.

6 There is a Board of Health has
7 established the regulations -- it would
8 also require the Board of Health to
9 establish regulations implementing this
10 and to have special testing for at-risk
11 children. Doctors would have to report
12 to the Department of Public Health, and
13 the Department of Public Health would be
14 required to conduct a public information
15 campaign on this issue.

16 According to a recent study by
17 the Department of Public Health, only 28
18 percent of the children in Philadelphia
19 were tested in accordance with the
20 Department of Health recommendations,
21 which are at age one and age two. This
22 bill is extremely important to the health
23 of the children of Philadelphia.

24 While Medicaid and CHIP both
25 require blood lead level testing, the

1 5/23/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 percentage of children tested is not very
3 high. A child's blood lead poisoning is
4 a serious problem, as had already been
5 mentioned, and I think everyone is well
6 aware of this. Even at low lead levels,
7 lead poisoning can cause serious problems
8 such as intelligent quotient
9 deficiencies, reading and learning
10 disabilities, impaired hearing, reduction
11 of attention span, and hyperactivity and
12 behavior problems. They're at great
13 costs also to society - medical
14 treatment, long-term care, school
15 failure, and reduced earnings.

16 I would be remiss if I also
17 didn't talk about Bill 180936, which
18 would make a major change in the blood
19 lead law in Philadelphia and would
20 require preventive medicine; that is,
21 requirement of life-safe certifications
22 in all rental properties.

23 Thank you.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
25 you. Thank you very much.

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2 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Napoleon Kincaid.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. KINCAID: Yes. Good

6 afternoon --

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Good

8 afternoon.

9 MR. KINCAID: -- members of

10 Philadelphia City Council. My name is

11 Napoleon Kincaid. I'm a sports reporter

12 for the Neighborhood Leader paper, and

13 I'm here to speak in honor of Janiya

14 Victor.

15 As I stand here today, I'm

16 proud -- I brought a copy of my article

17 of Janiya Victor that appeared on the

18 front page a few weeks ago, matter of

19 fact. I had a great honor to crack the

20 story.

21 She and I engaged in a

22 conversation at a rec center, and I was

23 talking to her about participating in an

24 AAU girls basketball league, and she

25 mentioned the fact that she had to attend

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2 practice with her high school baseball
3 team. So first I said, wait a minute,
4 you mean softball, right? You didn't say
5 baseball. You meant softball.

6 And she said, no; baseball.

7 So it kind of registered that
8 she was talking about a boys baseball
9 team. So first I didn't want to believe
10 it, you know, because I'm a reporter/rec
11 ball coach. So what I did, I said, when
12 is your next game? So she invited me to
13 her next game. And ladies and gentlemen,
14 when I went out to South Philadelphia to
15 watch her play for John Bartram Boys
16 Baseball Team, I couldn't believe it. I
17 stood there in a trance, because I never
18 seen this in my 37 years being a sports
19 reporter. I have covered lots of
20 baseball games. I never seen a girl play
21 baseball for a boys baseball team. I
22 never seen it.

23 So I'm looking at her playing
24 shortstop. When I tell you, she plays
25 shortstop like Ozzie Smith, with the stab

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2 with the glove, with the form-through
3 throw. I'm telling you, this girl can
4 play baseball with the boys with no
5 problem. I never seen this before.

6 The City of Philadelphia has to
7 recognize this, because this is the
8 second time in five years that a female
9 baseball player is playing ball right
10 here in this city for a boys baseball
11 team. This is the second --

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. KINCAID: -- female in the
14 history of Philadelphia in the last five
15 years since Mo'Ne Davis.

16 Now, mind you, Mo'Ne Davis did
17 not play high school baseball. She
18 played for her Little League team, you
19 know. So for Janiya Victor to play for a
20 high school boys baseball team to
21 represent this city, it's an honor. And
22 as a reporter, I'm honored to know this
23 young lady, because to watch her
24 mannerism, her professionalism,
25 especially on that baseball field, it's

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2 remarkable. And she got two more years
3 to go at John Bartram High School playing
4 for the baseball team, two more years as
5 the team's starting shortstop.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
8 you, sir. Thank you, sir.

9 MR. KINCAID: Thank you. I
10 hope you take this resolution very
11 seriously, because this girl has made
12 history in the city we live in.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
14 you. Thank you very much for your
15 comments.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:
18 Mr. Decker.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Coming up as a
20 group, Nicole Zalking, Taniya, Kyla,
21 Nylaah, Jakara, Yanhui, Nyeska,
22 commenting on 170408.

23 (Witnesses approached podium.)

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Good
25 afternoon.

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2 MS. ZALKING: Good afternoon,
3 City Council. Thank you very much for
4 the forum, this very important forum. I
5 have the voices of public Philadelphia
6 education to be heard today. So we
7 appreciate your time.

8 My name is Nicole Zalking and I
9 teach seventh and eighth grade language
10 arts at Kirkbride Elementary School in
11 South Philadelphia, and our classes here
12 studied the impact that poverty has on
13 their opportunity for an equitable
14 education. Through the Need in Deed
15 network, we were able to partner with
16 Helen Gym's office and, through our
17 research, found the incredible work that
18 she's been doing with fairworkweek.org.
19 We also support the movement in
20 Philadelphia's fight for 15 to raise the
21 minimum wage to \$15 an hour, because our
22 students are living below the poverty
23 line, many of them.

24 I'm going to give my time now
25 so that you can hear the personal

2 testimony of some of our eighth grade
3 students from Kirkbride Elementary.

4 Thank you very much.

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
6 you.

7 MS. SUN: Good afternoon. My
8 name is Taniya Sun and it's a pleasure
9 for me to be standing here amongst you
10 Councilmembers. I'm an eighth grader at
11 Eliza B. Kirkbride Elementary School and
12 here's my testimony:

13 I am what's going to change the
14 future. My generation will suffer the
15 impact of the results of your
16 generation's inability to provide fair
17 care and working conditions for my
18 parents.

19 My research tells me that you
20 say we cannot raise the minimum wage
21 because we fear the loss of revenue.
22 This poor reasoning does not have data to
23 back it up and it is made by people who
24 never lived through the inner city
25 struggles that I do, rather enjoy private

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2 schools, gated communities, small
3 classes, resources, and equipment that
4 made their education not equal to mine.

5 I'm a young teenage girl living
6 in the trenches of Philadelphia's public
7 schools. I sit in a class of more than
8 30 students with broken, donated,
9 outdated technology. I'm typing this
10 testimony on a Chromebook that's missing
11 the letters T, L, S, A, and a backspace.
12 I'm handed a torn textbook that still has
13 the names of my older siblings on the
14 inside cover. She graduated in 2004.

15 The latest President in the
16 social studies textbook is President
17 Bush, Sr. The most recent world event is
18 9/11. Our black President isn't even
19 represented in the materials you provide
20 us. Why aren't I given the same
21 opportunity and access to education as
22 many other kids my age across the state?

23 We learned that decisions like
24 raising the minimum wage can only be made
25 in Harrisburg at the state level. Why

2 can't Harrisburg make the decision to get
3 every student in the state an equitable
4 education.

5 I challenge you to take a stand
6 and hope to make a change. I'm asking
7 you to fight for us. I promise that when
8 I grow up, I will be sitting in your
9 seats continuing to fight against poverty
10 in the city that I love, the City of
11 Brotherly and Sisterly Love.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
14 you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: If you
17 want to please state your name.

18 Let me just ask, my
19 understanding was that this was going to
20 be three minutes total with all. Is
21 everybody speaking three minutes? Is
22 that the --

23 MS. ZALKING: They have timed
24 two spaces. So that was three minutes
25 and this is three minutes.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: So all
3 the rest are three minutes. Okay. Thank
4 you. Thank you.

5 Please, go ahead. Please just
6 state your name too.

7 NYLAAH: Nylaah.

8 Here are some excerpts from
9 some of my classmates' testimonies that
10 tell their tales of living in poverty.

11 I was at my aunt house one
12 summer day, and my cousin and I heard
13 gunshots. We ran around the corner to my
14 uncle house, and on the step was -- ran
15 around the corner to see my uncle on the
16 steps bleeding.

17 Poverty affects my life because
18 people don't know when to put guns down.
19 It's hard for me to concentrate on school
20 because I have loss on my mind all day.

21 JAKARA: My name is Jakara and
22 this is my story: I was born after my
23 parents immigrated to U.S. Knowing no
24 English had an impact on their ability to
25 work. I always knew my family was living

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2 in poverty, but so thankful because I
3 knew there was others living in the worst
4 conditions.

5 It directly impacted me when my
6 brother got a virus and was in the ICU
7 and a medically induced coma. He had no
8 health insurance, and my family had to
9 work to seek government assistance.

10 KYLA: My name is Kyla and my
11 testimony is, it's a struggle, one that
12 we have to go through every single day,
13 but we do our best and work as hard as we
14 can so that we are able to make a living.
15 But sometimes hard work just isn't
16 enough, because hard work doesn't
17 determine your paycheck in the City.

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
19 you.

20 NAALYN: My name is Naalyn and
21 this is my testimony: When I was about
22 eight years old, I realized I was living
23 in poverty. Even though we always worked
24 at the -- even though we always had food
25 to eat every night and we never slept

2 with a hungry stomach, my dad was always
3 at the kitchen table at night calculating
4 how we wasted money. We are a family of
5 four people and the only person that
6 works is my dad. He makes \$7.50 an hour.
7 I believe that's not okay.

8 MS. CHAIN: My name is Alison
9 Chain, and as I continue to grow up, I
10 struggle with understanding the reason
11 behind poverty, but I do understand the
12 feeling. I don't believe we are in the
13 worst conditions, but I do ask myself
14 what is school like that is. I will want
15 to fight for them too. Isn't every
16 student supposed to get an equal
17 education?

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
19 you.

20 YANHUI: My name is Yanhui. I
21 learned that stress can impair brain
22 development and that if children want to
23 do well in school, that they should have
24 a low-stress home environment.

25 I come to school with no food

2 in my belly, and the school lunch isn't
3 great. At least it's something. Then I
4 go home with little to no food in my
5 belly. That is not a low-stress
6 environment. What can we do? This is
7 poverty.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you
10 all. Thank you all.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

13 Mr. Decker.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Emmanuel Bussie,
15 commenting on 190195.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. BUSSIE: I rise in favor of
18 Bill No. 190 -- good afternoon, everyone.
19 My name is Emmanuel Bussie, for the
20 record. I yield in favor of 190195.

21 I just want to remind everybody
22 that I'm sent here by 65 individuals, 33
23 community organizations, including Shante
24 Love, Mel Wells, Rochelle Bilal, Anton
25 Moore, Albert Littlepage. I'm also sent

2 here by community activists like Marie
3 Patterson, Wayne Williams, Asteria Vives.
4 So when you see me here speaking to you,
5 I've already met with 40 to 65 people on
6 Sunday getting my instructions on what to
7 communicate to you guys.

8 First, I want to congratulate
9 all of our elected officials that were
10 reelected, especially our DKOD elects,
11 the seven of -- the eight of you. I want
12 to congratulate you guys on a job well
13 done.

14 I will also say that again the
15 reason why we're so hard on City Council
16 and so critical of City Council is not to
17 be demeaning of City Council. It's
18 because we believe that this is the best
19 City Council that the City has ever had
20 by far. It is one of the best City
21 Councils in the nation.

22 There's a lot of skepticism, a
23 lot of cynicism around in the City
24 because of the Trump era and because of
25 some elected officials that got into some

2 trouble, but make no mistakes about it,
3 this is a very tough job and a very
4 serious job that you guys have to do, and
5 it's easy to sit back and criticize you
6 guys. It's easy to sit back and say what
7 you haven't done and what you should not
8 have done. But what we try to do is get
9 behind you guys, the good guys, those of
10 you that mean well and have well
11 intentions, because though not perfect,
12 your intentions are good, your intentions
13 are honorable for the most part. And I
14 think that if this city gets behind you
15 in a meaningful and significant way, you
16 guys can do some groundbreaking stuff in
17 the second largest city on the East
18 Coast. I want to say that again. This
19 is the second largest city on the East
20 Coast with a GDP of \$445 billion. That's
21 our gross domestic product. If we were a
22 country, we would be one of the strongest
23 countries in the nation with a GDP of
24 \$445 billion.

25 And I challenge Council to do

2 those meaningful things to move the City
3 forward in terms of violence, in terms of
4 funding anti-violence groups on the
5 ground that's doing this work,
6 non-traditional groups, not the Penn, not
7 the Temple, but putting money on the
8 ground.

9 I challenge you also to move
10 that legislation and to move to take back
11 our resources like the Parking Authority.
12 There's a \$60 million entity and profit
13 in the Parking Authority just from
14 on-street parking. I think it should
15 come back under -- and all I'm advocating
16 for is that you guys control the Parking
17 Authority. I'm not saying change it,
18 switch it around, flip it. I'm just
19 saying we are as Philadelphians more
20 comfortable with you guys controlling the
21 destiny and direction of the Parking
22 Authority than people in Harrisburg.

23 So two things that I'm sent
24 here to ask you guys to do is to fight
25 for anti-violence groups, non-traditional

2 groups on the ground to get funding, a
3 line item budget in the Mayor's budget.
4 It's enough for you guys to say, hey,
5 Mr. Mayor, we need this funding. And
6 it's also enough for you guys to take
7 back valuable City resources like
8 on-street parking. At least bring it to
9 the floor so you can have a full
10 discussion so Curt can talk about it, so
11 Domb can talk about. Bring that bill to
12 the floor so we can have full discussion,
13 full transparency in terms of our City
14 resources.

15 I thank you guys. And, again,
16 I appreciate the work you do.

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
18 you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:
21 Mr. Decker.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Tammy Murphy,
23 commenting on 181063.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Good

2 afternoon.

3 MS. MURPHY: Good afternoon.

4 My name is Tammy Murphy. I'm with
5 Physicians for Social Responsibility, and
6 I'm here to talk about No. 181063.

7 The conversion of fracked gas
8 to liquid reduces the volume to increase
9 capacity to export for corporate profit.
10 The name of the Passyunk Energy Center
11 implies that it will provide local
12 energy, but Philadelphians are not fools.
13 The extracted fossil fuels will be
14 brought into our city by an industry that
15 aggressively tears into our state lands,
16 demolishes property and communities
17 through falsified claims of eminent
18 domain, and wreaks havoc on the lives of
19 Pennsylvanians as it makes its way to
20 Philadelphia, only to be exported
21 globally for profit.

22 Corporate profits should not be
23 permitted to leave Philadelphians in the
24 wake of additional noise the facility
25 will bring.

2 Corporate profits should not be
3 permitted to leave Philadelphians living
4 the rest of their lives in the realistic
5 fear of a potential deadly explosion.

6 Corporate profits should not be
7 permitted to pose as job creators when a
8 pipeline explosion in 2014 caused an LNG
9 storage tank to leak, injuring multiple
10 workers, forcing a thousand residents in
11 the two-mile radius to evacuate and
12 causing \$72 million in property damage.

13 Corporate profits should not be
14 permitted to allow what happened just ten
15 years before the aforementioned accident
16 when an LNG explosion killed 30 people
17 and destroyed the poor infrastructure.

18 Corporate profits should not be
19 permitted to allow what happened just a
20 generation prior to ours when 128 people
21 died and at least 200 were injured.

22 The same corporate profits
23 should not be permitted to drive an
24 industry linked to health impacts ranging
25 from low birth weights to asthma, birth

2 defects to what seems to be clusters of
3 rare cancers in children living near
4 elements of the same industry.

5 Yes, this project named the
6 Passyunk Energy Center is part of the
7 same industry that is linked to
8 communities just a few hours west from
9 here suffering from Ewing's sarcoma and
10 other rare cancers, taking the lives of
11 children and youth a few hours west from
12 here.

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna Hagins,
18 commenting on 180729.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. HAGINS: Actually I have to
21 change that, if you don't mind. The
22 young people speaking about poverty
23 actually -- I want to change this. I
24 want to speak on -- my name is Ogbonna
25 Hagins, for the record. I'm speaking on

16 So I totally 100 percent oppose
17 this ordinance in the name of poor people
18 in Philadelphia for them to have an
19 opportunity to survive and to one day be
20 a Walmart of the world.

21 Again, my name is Ogbonna
22 Hagins. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
25 commenting on 190195.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 afternoon.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. DANIEL: Good afternoon.

6 I, unlike the earlier speaker, know your
7 criminal intent when you unanimously
8 voted to build on top of my stolen home
9 as a clear action that nobody can take
10 back.

11 This is an official decree of
12 the people in writ of mandamus quo
13 warranto and, as such, requires immediate
14 action and remedy.

15 Every week, Council, Mayor,
16 Governor, and others transfer private
17 property to the government, probably
18 illegally.

19 Gettysburg, Arlington, and
20 countless cemeteries are filled with
21 people who performed their known duty or
22 task. Duty does not give a damn if
23 you're having a bad day. Duty does not
24 give a damn if you don't feel like it.

25 Would people volunteer to serve

2 overseas knowing their government was
3 stealing their neighbor's home?

4 Officials avoiding their known
5 duty or task must be prosecuted to
6 avoid -- or to prove to the veterans that
7 their sacrifices are honored.

8 Why has the Attorney General
9 not investigated or prosecuted the
10 numerous complaints filed by me? Why has
11 the Sheriff, the Police, or the State
12 Police not arrested any official for
13 theft of my home or theft of my just
14 compensation?

15 The constitutions require
16 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
17 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
18 duty. Your oath of office requires you
19 to act or face prison.

20 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
21 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
22 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
23 through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
24 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other law
25 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,

2 14-4056 appear violated.

3 I call on the federal and
4 Commonwealth governments to perform their
5 constitutional obligations to investigate
6 and prosecute all involved in the theft
7 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
8 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

9 The denial of God-given 42 USC
10 1982 property rights for 25 years is
11 extraordinary, oath-violating, and
12 requires immediate remedy.

13 A just government must obey the
14 rule of law. This color of law
15 government must have its Charter to
16 govern revoked until a constitutionally
17 compliant government is installed.

18 Public servants cannot refuse
19 their sworn duty to act any more than a
20 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
21 sovereign people require oath,
22 Constitution, and law be enforced, and
23 jail is required for all who violate
24 oath, Constitution or law.

25 I remind Council, it takes a

3 all of this monumental corruption. And
4 according to my phone, I did three
5 minutes. According to his clock, I did
6 two minutes after. So somebody needs to
7 pay the guy to do this clock properly.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, sir.

10 MR. DANIEL: You're stifling
11 public comment. It is illegal in the
12 Commonwealth.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, sir.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Sara Stroman.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MS. STROMAN: Good afternoon.

18 My name is Sara Stroman and I'm a
19 volunteer with Fair Districts PA, a
20 non-partisan grassroots organization
21 working to end gerrymandering of
22 Pennsylvania congressional and state
23 legislative districts. We have over
24 8,000 supporters in Philly and thousands
25 more across the state.

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2 I'm here today to express
3 support for Resolution No. 190420. The
4 resolution affirms the need to end
5 gerrymandering in Pennsylvania by
6 creating an independent citizens'
7 commission for state legislative and
8 congressional redistricting. This
9 resolution does not take a position on
10 how municipal districts are drawn.

11 Over the last several months,
12 we have conducted constituent visits with
13 Councilmembers to share with them why we
14 are so passionate about this issue and to
15 answer their questions, including a
16 briefing on April 29th. Nearly all
17 members we have met with have expressed
18 their support for this effort.

19 Gerrymandering is a way of
20 disenfranchising voters by drawing voting
21 districts to give an unfair advantage to
22 political parties and to particular
23 legislators. Current law allows
24 Pennsylvania legislators to draw the
25 state legislative and congressional

2 districts in which they and members of
3 their parties seek election. This direct
4 conflict of interest has led to
5 Pennsylvania becoming one of the most
6 gerrymandered states in the entire
7 country, with the most dysfunctional
8 legislature, aside from Congress, which
9 suffers the same ills.

10 The fundamental problem with
11 gerrymandering is that it allows
12 legislators to choose their voters
13 instead of the other way around. This is
14 undemocratic. Regardless of which party
15 is manipulating voting districts, there
16 are serious consequences for
17 Philadelphians, including diminished
18 electoral competition, governance
19 dominated by polarization and gridlock
20 instead of problem-solving, and voter
21 disenfranchisement and apathy. We don't
22 vote because we think our votes don't
23 matter.

24 A lawsuit in 2018 provided a
25 temporary fix for Pennsylvania's

2 congressional districts, but did nothing
3 for our state legislative districts. The
4 long-term solution for ending
5 gerrymandering is an independent
6 citizens' commission for state
7 legislative and congressional
8 redistricting that must follow strict
9 rules for fairness and transparency.
10 States that have created such commissions
11 have seen notable improvement in
12 electoral competitiveness, legislative
13 compromise, and voter trust.

14 To date, 310 other
15 municipalities have passed the fair
16 districts resolution like the one being
17 voted on today, including four of PA's
18 five major cities, notably Pittsburgh.
19 The governing bodies which comprise both
20 republican and democratic majorities
21 represent 56 percent of the state's
22 population.

23 It's time for Philadelphia City
24 Council to pass the fair districts
25 resolution to make that 70 percent. The

24 this resolution for a statewide citizens'
25 commission for legislative and

3 This is a significant step
4 forward for voting rights for the people
5 of PA. I'm hopeful PA will join
6 California in its practical and

12 (Applause.)
