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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

6 morning.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 There we go. We're going to get started.

10 To give our invocation this

11 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor

12 Tricia Neale from Feast of Justice. She

13 is here today as the guest of Councilman

14 Henon.

15 I would ask all members,

16 guests, and visitors to please rise.

17 (Councilmembers, guests, and

18 visitors rise.)

19 PASTOR NEALE: Good morning.

20 (Good morning.)

21 PASTOR NEALE: Please pray with

22 me.

23 Good and gracious God, we give

24 you thanks. Thanks for waking us up this

25 morning. Thanks for giving us life and

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2 breath and strength. Thank you for every
3 person in this room, for all of the gifts
4 that they bring. Thank you for the
5 beautiful weather that you have made, a
6 reminder of the love that you have for
7 all of creation.

8 This morning, Lord, we are
9 asking your blessing upon the people who
10 are called to lead the communities in
11 which we live and work and play. We are
12 also asking your blessing upon all who
13 are here, those working in these offices,
14 those standing in the hallways, and those
15 attending this meeting who serve to
16 support, encourage, and challenge our
17 leaders.

18 Help all of us to remember that
19 no matter what district we live in, no
20 matter the language we speak, no matter
21 the person we love, no matter the land we
22 have come from, or no matter the faith we
23 practice, that we all are neighbors.

24 And while we are all called to
25 work for the common good, help these

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2 elected leaders with the special
3 responsibilities you have given them in
4 their position. Help them as leaders to
5 not ask how do we fix all these problems,
6 but how can we better open our eyes and
7 ears and hearts to serve you and this
8 city.

9 Grant them wisdom to govern
10 among the conflicting issues of these
11 days. Grant them a sense of the welfare
12 and the needs of our neighbors. Grant
13 them a thirst for justice and for
14 righteousness. Grant them humility,
15 honesty, and trustworthiness. Grant them
16 the ability to work together in harmony,
17 and please grant them joy in their tasks.

18 Bless this Chamber and all who
19 are in it, that your love, your grace,
20 and your promises might shine forth on
21 this day.

22 We ask this in your precious
23 name.

24 Amen.

25 (Amen.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you so much for those inspiring
4 words. We really appreciate it.

5 Council will be at ease.

6 (Council at ease.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you and, again, thank you so much.

9 Before we proceed on our
10 Calendar, I would like to recognize a
11 couple of guests. I'd like to recognize
12 our good friend, State Representative
13 Dawkins and State Representative
14 Johnson-Harrell.

15 Thank you for being here today.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
18 really appreciate you being here.

19 Our next order of business is
20 the approval of the Journal of the
21 meeting of Thursday, May 23rd, 2019, and
22 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, Mr. President. I move that the
25 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May

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2 23rd, 2019 be approved.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. It has been moved and
6 properly seconded that the Journal of the
7 meeting of Thursday, May 23rd, 2019 stand
8 approved.

9 All in favor indicate by saying
10 aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it, and our Journal is
17 approved.

18 Our next order of business is
19 the request for leaves of absence, and
20 the Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. On behalf of the
23 majority, there are no requests of leave
24 of absence today.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 Chair thanks the gentleman.

3 The Chair now recognizes
4 Councilman O'Neill.

5 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. On behalf of the
7 republicans, there are no requests for
8 leave of absence.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair thanks the gentleman.

11 At this time, I would like to
12 dispense with the regular order of
13 business and I would like to thank
14 everyone who has taken time out of their
15 busy day to come down to witness their
16 government in action. We genuinely
17 appreciate you being here. We hope your
18 day is not only a knowledgeable one but a
19 pleasurable one, so much so that you come
20 back again. Again, thank you so much for
21 being here.

22 At this time, the Chair
23 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
24 will present a resolution recognizing
25 Archbishop Mary Floyd Palmer.

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2 Would Archbishop Palmer and
3 those accompanying her please join the
4 Councilwoman at the podium.

5 (Councilmembers and guests
6 approached podium.)

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We are
9 honored to be here this morning to
10 recognize not only a leader in our city
11 but a person whose father we have loved
12 and who knew Lucien Blackwell very well.
13 The Archbishop is with Archbishop Anthony
14 Floyd, her uncle. She is also with
15 Reverend Michael Faulkner and Dr. John
16 Thompson.

17 And we all know her. We know
18 her father. If you ever want to train a
19 choir or hear good singing, call on her.
20 And I just learned from one of our
21 photographers that her sister sings well
22 too.

23 But this is a family who knows
24 the Lord and who love people and who have
25 done more than their share of helping our

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2 city be a better place and doing all that
3 they can to help other people.

4 Thank you.

5 Resolution honoring and
6 recognizing Archbishop Mary Floyd Palmer
7 on her appointment as the first female
8 President of the Philadelphia Council of
9 Clergy.

10 How you like that?

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Another
13 glass ceiling has been broken.

14 Whereas, on March 16th, 2019
15 Bishop Mary Floyd Palmer made history --
16 young people, listen up -- made history
17 when she was installed as the first
18 female President Prelate of the
19 Philadelphia Council of Clergy; and

20 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
21 Whereas, the Philadelphia Council of
22 Clergy ("the Council") is a non-profit
23 organization that is a multicultural
24 group of faith-based leaders;

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: The

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2 Council unites under the desire to
3 alleviate suffering, overcome oppression,
4 and foster justice and peace in the
5 communities; and

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, Bishop
7 Mary is the eldest daughter of the
8 Philadelphia legend, Reverend Dr. Melvin
9 Floyd, the urban missionary, known as the
10 "Dean of Evangelism";

11 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: For 25
12 years, Bishop Mary served with her father
13 as Minister of Music at Agape Christian
14 Chapel; and

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: And
16 whereas, Bishop Mary is the founding
17 pastor of The Samaritan Temple. She
18 began her ministry early in life, and has
19 never hesitated in giving of her talents
20 and time to serve her church and God; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
22 Bishop Mary is passionate about prison
23 ministries, and has served as a Volunteer
24 Instructor for male inmates at SCI
25 Chester since 1988. Often, she can be

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2 found ministering at federal, state, and
3 county prisons;

4 COUNCILMAN DOMB: She also
5 serves on the Pennsylvania Reentry
6 Council, where she focuses her attention
7 finding tangible ways to reduce
8 recidivism; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
10 in May 2011, Bishop Mary was chosen by
11 the National Congress of Black Women to
12 receive their Women of the Year in
13 Ministry Award. Additionally, in 2017,
14 she was given the Lucien E. Blackwell
15 Guiding Light Community Award in 2017;
16 and

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
18 Bishop Mary intends to use her new
19 position at The Council for good. She
20 will continue her legacy and be a voice
21 for those who are the most vulnerable
22 among us;

23 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Now,
24 therefore, be it resolved, that the
25 Council of the City of Philadelphia

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2 hereby recognizes and honors Mary Floyd
3 Palmer on her installment as the first
4 female President of the Philadelphia
5 Council of Clergy.

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Further
7 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
8 resolution be presented to Bishop Mary
9 Floyd Palmer as a sincere expression of
10 the Council of the City of Philadelphia's
11 gratitude, admiration, and recognition.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 the Chair recognizes the Bishop.

15 BISHOP PALMER: Good morning.

16 (Good morning.)

17 BISHOP PALMER: Certainly to
18 President Clarke, the honorable
19 Councilmembers, elected and appointed
20 officials, esteemed clergy, colleagues,
21 gallery attendees, and fellow citizens, I
22 first want to give honor to God, who is
23 my life and to whom I am to obey and
24 serve.

25 Next would be my parents, the

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2 late Elizabeth Floyd, who would be
3 hippopotamus happy to be here today, and
4 to my dad in retirement, the Reverend
5 Dr. Melvin Floyd, along with my uncle,
6 his older brother, Archbishop Anthony
7 Floyd.

8 (Applause.)

9 BISHOP PALMER: Let me begin by
10 saying that I am truly humbled by this
11 recognition, and I realize that it was
12 not about me. On March the 16th when I
13 was installed as the first Presiding
14 Prelate of the Philadelphia Council of
15 Clergy, it was historic that it was a
16 woman succeeding a man. But more
17 importantly, I came later to find out
18 that I'm the first female archbishop in
19 the City and the first female archbishop
20 in the state and presently the first
21 female archbishop in the country.

22 (Applause.)

23 BISHOP PALMER: And as an
24 African American sister, I can't begin to
25 tell you how that ceiling has now been

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2 cracked.

3 I wanted to tell you something
4 simple as this: The level of hurt and
5 division we are experiencing worldwide
6 demands both our passion, compassion, and
7 one-on-one attention. I believe that
8 when this great City of Brotherly Love
9 reaffirms that we are all our brother and
10 sister's keeper, the world will then take
11 notice.

12 The simple answer to our
13 world's profound disconnect is resident
14 engagement. If I may, Apostle Nick
15 Ashford and Prophet Valerie Simpson wrote
16 a song sung by evangelist Diana Ross that
17 says "reach out and touch somebody's
18 hand, make this world a better place if
19 you can."

20 The simple solution to our
21 nation's profound division is helping our
22 brother up and our sister when he or she
23 falls. The simple key to our city's
24 profound unity is doing unto others as
25 you would want them to do unto you.

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2 I'm reminded about a familiar
3 story that some of you may have heard. A
4 mother bought her daughter a giant puzzle
5 and told her to put it together. She
6 thought that it would take weeks and
7 months to create it. However, after a
8 few hours, the little girl came back to
9 her mother and said, Mommy, I'm all done.

10 Her mother said, How did you do
11 that?

12 She said, On the other side of
13 the puzzle was a picture of a man. When
14 I put the man together, the world took
15 care of itself.

16 In order for us to put this
17 city, this state, and this nation back
18 together, we have to begin to do it
19 person by person, neighbor by neighbor,
20 man, woman, boy, and girl, community by
21 community, city by city, and nation by
22 nation.

23 In closing, I am happy that I
24 will not only be carrying the mantel of
25 my uncle for the public service he has

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2 done, but my father as well, who has
3 touched many lives and impacted many
4 young people during his tenure in the
5 street. His unique van, the one with the
6 coffin on top, was the family car, and
7 may I say in my formative years, I did
8 not want to embrace it, but I am grateful
9 for the result of it now. And I'm
10 thankful that as many lives as he has
11 touched, I'm only hoping to be able to
12 touch just as many.

13 On June the 27th, I will be
14 launching an initiative entitled "The
15 Community Healing Project" in honor of my
16 father for the work he has done in the
17 community. It will be held at the IBC
18 Atrium from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

19 Please accept my personal invitation to
20 all of you today to attend. The tickets
21 are free. You can register on
22 Eventbrite. But, more importantly, when
23 you come, we hope that you will bring
24 some form of donation that will be used
25 specifically for this effort.

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2 I was raised with integrity and
3 I was also raised with word is mine. And
4 I promise and pledge to you, to those
5 esteemed members of the Council, to
6 anyone here today, that if needed, just
7 give a sister a holler, I'll be right
8 there.

9 May God ever bless you.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Let me
13 note that in addition to Representative
14 Dawkins here on the podium with us is
15 State Representative Movita
16 Johnson-Harrell, and sitting out there is
17 Mr. Omar Sabir.

18 Thank you all for being here.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 Council will be at ease.

23 (Council at ease.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you and, again, congratulations.

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2 At this time, the Chair
3 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
4 present a resolution recognizing the
5 Philadelphia Muslim Community. Would
6 Qasim Rashad and those accompanying him
7 please join the Councilman at the podium.

8 (Councilmembers and guests
9 approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 joining the Councilman, we have
12 Councilman Green, Councilwoman Bass,
13 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman
14 Blackwell, Parker, and Councilman Domb.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Ladies and
16 gentlemen, you may have noticed over the
17 last month and in particular the last
18 several days, that tens of thousands of
19 practicing Muslims celebrated the month
20 and the conclusion of the holy month of
21 Ramadan and, in doing so, brought
22 introspection to themselves but also
23 awareness to others about Muslims in the
24 City of Philadelphia and around the
25 world.

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2 Joining me today is Brother
3 Qasim Rashad; Zakarriyah Rahman, who is
4 the founder of the Muslim Business
5 Association; State Representative Movita
6 Johnson-Harrell; State Representative
7 Jason Dawkins, who is no stranger to
8 these Chambers. Also joining us from the
9 Father's Day Rally Committee, Bilal
10 Qayyum and newly minted democratic
11 nominee for the Office of City
12 Commissioner, Omar Sabir.

13 Give them all a round of
14 applause, please.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: So Ramadan
17 is the most sacred month of the year in
18 Islamic culture. Muslims observe the
19 month of Ramadan to mark the revelation
20 from Allah, God, that first gave the
21 Qur'an to Prophet Muhammad. Peace be
22 upon him.

23 During Ramadan, Muslims fast,
24 abstain from pleasures, and pray to
25 become closer to their Lord. In so

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2 doing -- and I'll skip some of this and
3 just say that in some of this, what you
4 can find is a sense of peace that comes
5 over the entire city and state and
6 hopefully the world and, in so doing,
7 creating for the next nine months an
8 opportunity, an opportunity for that
9 blessing to be bestowed upon everyone.

10 And with that, we recognize the
11 Philadelphia Muslim Community and
12 acknowledge May 5th, 2019 through June
13 4th, 2019 as the holy month of Ramadan.

14 Whereas, Ramadan is considered
15 the holiest month of the year for
16 Muslims, as it is an opportunity for
17 self-reflection and spiritual
18 improvement;

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
20 whereas, Ramadan is the 9th month of the
21 Islamic calendar, which is based on a
22 12-month lunar year of 354 days. Since
23 the lunar year is 11 days shorter than a
24 solar year, Ramadan can occur during
25 different dates each year; and

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
3 the observation of Ramadan usually lasts
4 29 to 30 days. In 2019, Ramadan is to be
5 observed from the evening of May 5th
6 through the evening of June 4th; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
8 those observing Ramadan must abstain from
9 eating or drinking from pre-dawn to
10 sunset. Fasting is a way for Muslims to
11 gain "taqwa," which means being in a
12 state of constant awareness of God.
13 Fasting during Ramadan is used to teach
14 self-control, gratitude and compassion
15 for those less fortunate; and

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
17 during Ramadan it is common for members
18 of the Muslim Community to gather
19 together at the end of the day for an
20 "iftar," which means "breaking the fast."
21 Those observing Ramadan will break their
22 fast after performing a sunset prayer;
23 and

24 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
25 prayer and meditation are also two major

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2 components of Ramadan. During Ramadan,
3 extra time is to be spent reading the
4 Qur'an and performing special prayers
5 throughout the day; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, at
7 the end of the Ramadan is Eid al-Fitr,
8 which means the "festival of breaking the
9 fast." On this holiday, a special prayer
10 is held in the morning, followed by a
11 community celebration with food, games,
12 and presents for children; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, for
14 over 200,000 Muslims calling Philadelphia
15 their home, it is important that the
16 religious significance of Ramadan to
17 members of our community is recognized;
18 now, therefore, be it

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,
20 by the Council of the City of
21 Philadelphia, that it hereby recognizes
22 the Philadelphia Muslim Community and
23 acknowledges May the 5th of 2019 through
24 June the 4th of 2019 as the holy month of
25 Ramadan.

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2 Further resolved, that an
3 engrossed copy of this resolution be
4 presented to the esteemed leaders of
5 Philadelphia's Muslim Community as
6 evidence of the sincere respect and
7 admiration of this legislative body.

8 And we want to say
9 congratulations.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
12 the Chair recognizes Qasim Rashad.

13 MR. RASHAD: As-salamu alaykum,
14 Ramadan Mubarak, humde la (ph). And as
15 we say now, which marks the conclusion of
16 Ramadan, we say Eid Mubarak. And both
17 mean that Ramadan or Eid is a blessing.
18 And Ramadan or the Qur'an -- Ramadan
19 marks the month in which the Qur'an was
20 revealed to our beloved Prophet Muhammad.
21 It came down to him as a revelation. And
22 there were many things that revealed to
23 him, but one of the things that he came
24 to understand as a good community leader
25 is that the best of you are those who are

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2 among you who serve the people, and that
3 is what our illustrious City Council
4 provides for us. They are our chosen and
5 elected City officials by people of many
6 faiths and understanding.

7 And so we accept this honor on
8 behalf of all of those peoples the faith
9 and understanding, on behalf of all of
10 the Muslims in Philadelphia, which is
11 somewhere around 250,000 Muslims or what
12 the Pew Foundation has recognized as
13 about 15 percent of the City population,
14 with over 60 masjids in this great city.
15 I wouldn't want to put this to the test,
16 but you can't throw a rock in
17 Philadelphia without hitting a Muslim.
18 That's how they recognize the plurality
19 and the fabric that is so vast and
20 special to all of us.

21 So on behalf of the City,
22 behalf of those people who say they
23 believe, and on behalf of all of the
24 Muslims in Philadelphia and on behalf of
25 our elected Muslim officials, Councilman

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2 Curtis Jones, State Rep Movita
3 Johnson-Harrell, Commissioner-elect Omar
4 Sabir, State Representative Jason
5 Dawkins, and all of the Muslims, we
6 really thank you for this proclamation.
7 We really thank you for recognizing and
8 seeing us as we see you, as human beings
9 and as part of the fabric of this great
10 city.

11 As-salamu alaykum.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 Council shall be at ease.

15 (Council at ease.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilwoman Bass, who will
20 present a resolution recognizing Chestnut
21 Hill College. Would Carol Jean Vale and
22 those accompanying her please join the
23 Councilwoman at the podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining the Councilwoman, we also have
4 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman
5 Johnson, Councilman Taubenberger,
6 Councilman Oh, and Councilman Squilla.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
8 morning. Good morning.
9 (Good morning.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Well, first
11 of all, let me just start out by saying,
12 I don't pick favorites in my district,
13 but I have to say that Chestnut Hill
14 College is my favorite college in
15 Chestnut Hill. I'm just going to put it
16 out there. They are my absolute
17 favorite, and we're going to recognize
18 them today on their 95th anniversary.
19 And I'm just so pleased and proud that
20 they were able to join us today, because
21 we want to recognize them for all the
22 outstanding work that they do, not just
23 in Chestnut Hill but throughout the
24 entire Eighth District and really in the
25 entire City of Philadelphia throughout

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2 this region.

3 So we just wanted to celebrate
4 them and thank them for all of the
5 wonderful things that they have done for
6 our communities.

7 And our resolution reads:

8 Recognizing and honoring Chestnut Hill
9 College on its 95th Anniversary and
10 continued commitment to providing
11 students with a holistic education in an
12 inclusive community marked by academic
13 excellence, personal and professional
14 growth, service to one another and to the
15 global community.

16 Whereas, Chestnut Hill College
17 was founded in 1924 as Mount Saint
18 Joseph's College, a Catholic, four-year,
19 liberal arts college for women by the
20 sisters of Saint Joseph's, and was later
21 renamed in 1938 as Chestnut Hill College;
22 and

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the
24 College recognizes and honors current
25 President Carol Jean Vale of the sisters

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2 of Saint Joseph for her 30 years of
3 consistent service, which includes 27
4 years leading the College as President;
5 and

6 Whereas, in 2003, the College
7 fully transitioned to a co-educational
8 institution, expanding their mission of
9 academic excellence to a wider audience,
10 and today approximately 30 percent of the
11 College's full-time undergraduate
12 students are first generation college
13 students; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
15 Whereas, in the 2017-2018 academic year,
16 minorities accounted for nearly 41
17 percent of all degree-seeking,
18 first-time, first-year students, and in
19 2018 the College was recognized by
20 College Magazine as one of the top
21 colleges in Philadelphia. Additionally,
22 the College was inducted into Chestnut
23 Hill Conservancy's Architectural Hall of
24 Fame in 2018; and

25 Whereas, the College is one of

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2 seven Greater Philadelphia higher
3 educational institutions recognized as a,
4 quote, "College of Distinction," end of
5 quote, for its, quote, "engaged students,
6 great teaching, vibrant communities, and
7 successful outcomes," end of quote; and

8 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

9 Whereas, the College provides a rigorous
10 Liberal Arts Program that continues to be
11 updated and modified to meet the
12 ever-changing needs and demands of
13 society and higher education, even as
14 recently as this year where the College
15 added three new undergraduate majors:
16 Law and Legal Studies, Health Sciences,
17 Cyber Security, which is one of the first
18 programs of its kind in Philadelphia; and

3 190438.

4 All those in favor say aye.
5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 ayes have it, and this bill will be
11 placed on our First Reading Calendar
12 today.

13 That concludes our reports from
14 committee, and our next order of business
15 is consideration of the Calendar.

16 I note that the bills just
17 reported from committee with a suspension
18 of the rules have been deemed to have had
19 a first reading. These bills will be
20 placed on our Second Reading and Final
21 Passage Calendar at our next session of
22 Council.

23 As there are no additional
24 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
25 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the

2 purpose of calling up bills and
3 resolutions that are on our Final Passage
4 Calendar today.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. The following resolutions
7 and bills are being called up from the
8 Second Reading and Final Passage
9 Calendars today. They are Bill Nos.
10 190478, 190482, 190483, 190255-A, 181063,
11 190099, and 190314. All other bills and
12 resolutions are being held.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 So before considering the
16 resolutions and bills, we will have our
17 public comment session. It will go as
18 follows:

19 When your name is called, you
20 will go to the podium in the middle of
21 the Council Chambers. There's a device
22 on that podium. When the light turns
23 green, it will be your time to speak.
24 When the light turns yellow, you will
25 have 30 seconds to conclude your remarks.

2 When the light turns red, we'd ask you to
3 please adhere to our guidelines and
4 conclude your remarks. You will be given
5 three minutes to speak on a bill or
6 resolution that is on the Final Passage
7 today. Thank you very much for your
8 anticipated cooperation.

9 Mr. Decker, please call the
10 first name on the list.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Meris Bergquist,
12 commenting on 180936.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MS. BERGQUIST: Good afternoon,
17 President Clarke and City Councilmembers.
18 Thank you very much for this opportunity
19 for me to offer my strong support for the
20 bill just mentioned, No. 180936.

21 My name is Meris Bergquist. I
22 am the Executive Director of the
23 Massachusetts Fair Housing Center in
24 Holyoke, Massachusetts and I have
25 approximately 20 years representing

2 victims of housing discrimination. And
3 since my time is limited, I'm just going
4 to go into what I consider to be the two
5 major problems that we have with our
6 Massachusetts Childhood Lead Poisoning
7 Prevention Law, which are similar to the
8 existing Philadelphia Lead Disclosure
9 Act.

10 So both laws use the presence
11 of a child under the age of six as a
12 trigger for mandatory lead abatement by
13 landlords, and what this has done in
14 Massachusetts since our law was enacted
15 in 1971 is create systemic housing
16 discrimination. The law incentivizes
17 housing discrimination. Landlords find
18 it almost irresistible to avoid renting
19 to families with children rather than
20 engage in de-leading activity.

21 And I offer you my experience
22 on this point representing multiple
23 victims of housing discrimination based
24 on lead paint. But you don't have to
25 take my word for it, because it has been

2 well documented in our state by our state
3 Attorney General, our Department of
4 Housing and Community Development. The
5 Boston Globe has covered it, legal
6 scholars have covered it, and landlords
7 have even freely admitted it.

8 So this illegal housing
9 discrimination causes another unintended
10 consequence that is also harmful.

11 Our childhood lead prevention
12 law was intended to prevent childhood
13 lead poisoning universally. Childhood
14 lead poisoning, as I'm sure you know, is
15 a completely preventable condition, with
16 devastating irreparable consequences for
17 young children. And the statistics in
18 Massachusetts tell the story about how
19 our law has not been effective in
20 reducing childhood exposure to lead
21 paint.

22 Massachusetts has the fourth
23 oldest housing stock in the nation, and
24 only 10 percent of this housing stock has
25 undergone any abatement activity, 10

2 percent in the last 45 years. So at this
3 rate, we may achieve universal lead
4 abatement and a reduction of childhood
5 exposure to lead paint in residential
6 housing in centuries to come.

7 So I want to conclude by saying
8 that this amendment will fix the problems
9 that I've identified, and thank you very
10 much for my time.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: George Gould,
15 commenting on 180936.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MR. GOULD: Thank you, Council
20 President. My name is George Gould. I'm
21 an attorney with Community Legal
22 Services, and let me follow up with Meris
23 on Bill 180936.

24 One of the things that this
25 bill will do is deal with the problem of

2 discrimination against families with
3 children. This is a bill that amends the
4 current Philadelphia lead paint
5 ordinance, which requires a lead-safe
6 certification be given to tenants with
7 families six or under. And we believe
8 there's three major problems. One of
9 them is the clear discrimination that
10 goes on against these families in
11 renting, but second is the lack of
12 enforcement, because the Health
13 Department has no idea where families
14 with six or under are living. And of the
15 estimated 27,000 families who live in
16 Philadelphia with children six or under,
17 only about 7,000, or less than a third,
18 have had lead-safe certifications.

19 The second problem is that
20 tenants move around with their families.
21 They may go to relatives where there are
22 not children six or under living, and
23 that can clearly be problematic, as they
24 have all sorts of problems may exist in
25 those properties.

2 The third point I want to
3 make -- and this is very important --
4 when this bill went to committee, there
5 was testimony from Baltimore, which has a
6 somewhat similar bill, and in Baltimore
7 the effect has been not as landlords have
8 said, that it would be astronomical rent
9 increases. In fact, for landlords who
10 keep their properties in minimal
11 conditions, it has only maybe been a
12 couple hundred dollars expense. For
13 landlords who don't, they should fix
14 their properties up, and this bill would
15 require them to do it.

16 I want to thank Councilwoman
17 Reynolds Brown and her staffer, Julian
18 Thompson, for the many, many months of
19 working on this bill, and I think we have
20 come up with a terrific product, and I
21 urge City Council to move ahead and adopt
22 the bill.

23 Thank you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony.

2 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Angela Melder.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MS. McIVER: Thank you all. My

6 name is actually Angela McIver. Good

7 afternoon, Council President,

8 Councilmembers, and especially to

9 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown.

10 I'm Angela McIver, Chief Executive

11 Officer at the Fair Housing Rights Center

12 in Southeastern Pennsylvania. Our

13 mission is to ensure equal access to

14 housing opportunities for all people.

15 For 31 years, the Fair Housing

16 amendments has covered families with

17 children. Advocates and activists have

18 been working with policymakers in

19 fighting for or against social and public

20 policies that make housing unavailable to

21 families with children.

22 When housing is unavailable to

23 families with children, it's not just

24 about housing. Limiting housing options

25 relegate families with children to

2 segregated neighborhoods that were and
3 remain redlined by lenders, insurance
4 companies, economic investors.

5 We know that where you live
6 determines so much about you, including
7 access to opportunities that encompass
8 health, education, recreation, economics,
9 and merchandise.

10 Some victims of housing
11 discrimination experience trauma and
12 stress-related disorders that can present
13 in many ways. According to the
14 Diagnostic and Statistical Manual No. 5,
15 adults and children under six years can
16 experience an array of psychological
17 responses that negatively affect how an
18 individual's mind and body operate during
19 periods of exposure to stressful events.

20 It is one thing to deny
21 families with children access to
22 properties, but it's another thing when
23 families with children learn that they
24 were denied access to housing of their
25 choice.

2 Coping with housing

3 discrimination is not easy, nor should it
4 be acceptable as long as there are
5 federal, state, and local laws that are
6 against discrimination and prohibit
7 treating people different because of
8 their unique characteristics and
9 circumstances.

10 I encourage Council to vote in
11 favor of the bill and then educate voters
12 about expanding legislation that broadens
13 housing opportunities and improves living
14 conditions for the lives of families with
15 children.

16 Thank you for an opportunity to
17 address this body.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you so much for your testimony.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Emily Dowdall,
22 commenting on 180936.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 afternoon.

2 MS. DOWDALL: Good afternoon.

3 My name is Emily Dowdall and I'm Policy
4 Director for Reinvestment Fund's Data and
5 Policy Team. We're a Philadelphia-based
6 non-profit that has financed more than
7 15,000 rental units and has helped
8 Councilmembers and City departments use
9 data to inform policy and neighborhood
10 investment.

11 As you deliberate the City's
12 lead regulations, I offer a few points
13 related to projected housing market
14 impacts. The bottom line is that
15 compliance costs and their impact on
16 rents and total units available are
17 likely more limited than estimated by the
18 AEG study commissioned by a local
19 landlord group.

20 The AEG study is based on
21 snapshots of the City's housing stock
22 through 2015. Ordinarily a few years
23 data lag isn't critical because housing
24 stock changes slowly, but the last few
25 years in Philadelphia are a different

2 story. From 2015 to '18, there were more
3 than 10,000 new housing units permitted
4 in multi-family structures, and 2017 and
5 '18 had among the highest permitting
6 levels in the last 15 years.

7 At the same time, City data
8 shows that roughly 1,000 units have been
9 demolished each year, many of them older
10 properties with lead. These changes have
11 likely significantly reduced the
12 incidence of lead in the City.

13 Also in just the last few
14 years, the City's Landlord Tenant Court
15 has been more proactive in ensuring
16 landlords filing evictions have the
17 required certification, including the
18 lead-safe certificate. With
19 approximately 20,000 eviction filings a
20 year, it's reasonable to expect that a
21 number of units have been recently
22 abated.

23 The AEG study makes assumptions
24 about what landlords would do in response
25 to the ordinance, like raising rents or

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2 taking units off the markets based on
3 very limited data that doesn't meet the
4 standards of scientific evidence. It
5 also predicts that the cost of lead
6 abatement will force landlords to forego
7 maintenance and renovations, an odd claim
8 when eliminating lead is itself a
9 critical maintenance and renovation
10 activity.

11 Research from Trenton found
12 that the lead abatement work there had
13 additional benefits, including the
14 reduction of energy bills and asthma
15 triggers.

16 As to whether landlords can
17 afford the repairs, it's likely that some
18 can more than others, but important to
19 note that research also finds lead
20 abatement raises the value of property
21 more than three times over and above the
22 cost of the abatement, indicating a
23 potential to finance repairs based on
24 increased equity.

25 Finally, the AEG study is all

2 about cost, but there are many benefits.
3 For example, some landlords may now avoid
4 renting to households with children, and
5 changing the law would end that.

6 So in closing, the AEG study
7 likely overstates the costs and
8 consequences of expanding the lead
9 protections and is silent on its
10 benefits.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you for your testimony.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Cox,
16 commenting on 180936.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 afternoon.

20 MR. COX: Good afternoon. My
21 name is Joe Cox.

22 I support initiatives to
23 promote lead safety. We need to do more.
24 While we are at it, look at the
25 conditions of crumbling libraries and

2 schools, reduced hours and staff. This
3 shouldn't be. Schools that make kids
4 sick shouldn't be allowed. We need to
5 actually look out for the most
6 vulnerable.

7 A library is more than a
8 library. It is a community hub. We need
9 more, not less. Libraries are safe
10 spaces for many people. So many people
11 rely on libraries. Amend the budget. We
12 need to demand full and fair funding for
13 the libraries and schools now.

14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you for your testimony.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Russell Hicks,
19 commenting on 181063.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 afternoon.

23 MR. HICKS: Greetings and good
24 afternoon. I'm here to testify on Bill
25 181063 authorizing construction of a

1 6/6/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 liquefied natural gas facility. My name
3 is Russell Anthony Hicks, CEO of Ebony
4 Suns Enterprises, LLC. Some of you know
5 me from my own youth ministry and
6 economic development and impacts on youth
7 and families in regards to bringing young
8 men specifically from the block to the
9 boardroom, now through the green economy.

10 I stand here today as a climate
11 change fellow and staff community
12 organizer with POWER, Philadelphians
13 Organized to Witness, Empower and
14 Rebuild. We stand with our coalition for
15 a just and equitable transition to 100
16 percent renewable energy.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. HICKS: And stand with our
19 coalition for a just and equitable
20 Philadelphia.

21 POWER is made up of 50 active
22 interfaith congregations across
23 Philadelphia representing more than
24 30,000 families. We fight for racial,
25 economic, and environmental justice. We

2 have joined dozens of organizations
3 around the City to oppose the planned LNG
4 project and the press for the City to
5 plan a just transition to the use of 100
6 percent renewable energy to heat
7 buildings across Philadelphia.

8 Long story short, renewable
9 energy is clean and new. Alternative
10 energy is yucky, the yucky stuff, old,
11 and dirty and antiquated, and we need not
12 to invest in those old infrastructures.

13 We thank and are grateful to
14 the Councilperson Helen Gym for her
15 leadership, Councilperson Curtis Jones
16 for committing to voting no on the LNG
17 project. We want to work with all
18 leadership in City Council to give
19 data-driven strategies around how to
20 create green jobs through transitioning
21 energy systems.

22 I want to quickly share a
23 personal story that's near and dear to
24 our families. Last week in the midst of
25 the three-day torrential rainstorm,

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2 stormwaters flooding damaged schools,
3 specifically the old tank underneath the
4 playground at the C.W. Henry School.

5 This created a swell of oil that covered
6 the playground for three days. We were
7 lucky that this happened at night and not
8 during the school so children were not
9 exposed to toxic chemicals.

10 While the School District did a
11 phenomenal job in addressing this
12 situation, this experience is a perfect
13 example of what's to come with climate
14 crisis.

15 My son is in first grade. I do
16 not want to get that call in the middle
17 of the day to evacuate kids from any high
18 school because of climate disasters and
19 fuel.

20 In closing, we would like to
21 work with City Council at-large to expand
22 energy efficient programs to create a new
23 green economy. Philadelphia needs a
24 green new deal for Philadelphia and not
25 to get cut out like the last green new

2 deal, and we look forward to working with
3 you on these data-driven strategies for
4 100 renewable legislation.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: Mitchell Chanin,
10 commenting on 181063.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 afternoon.

14 MR. CHANIN: Good afternoon.

15 Thanks for the opportunity to testify.

16 Thank you, Mr. Russell, for your
17 testimony.

18 You heard a lot about this
19 liquefied natural gas bill over the past
20 several weeks. I wanted to share a
21 couple of additional thoughts that I
22 think may be helpful to you. I also want
23 to make clear that the amendment that was
24 introduced today does not in any way
25 alleviate the concerns or objections that

2 people have had about this bill.

3 In order to protect a livable
4 climate, we need to dramatically reduce
5 and eliminate the use of all fossil fuels
6 within 10, 20, 25 years maximum, and we
7 need to dramatically reduce the use of
8 natural gas as a fossil fuel over the
9 next several years.

10 I understand that there's a
11 serious crisis of energy affordability in
12 Philadelphia. Many thousands of
13 Philadelphians cannot afford to pay their
14 bills. I understand that the LNG project
15 has been put forward as a strategy to
16 bring some additional revenue to PGW
17 which will help to alleviate that
18 problem.

19 However, the project can only
20 be profitable if there is not serious
21 action over the next several years to
22 reduce the use of natural gas. And so
23 approving the LNG project essentially is
24 betting against the policies that are
25 necessary in order to protect a livable

2 climate, and it puts Philadelphia
3 absolutely on the wrong side of history.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. CHANIN: Policies are
6 already gathering momentum in cities and
7 states across the country and, God
8 willing, if we have a new administration
9 in Washington in 2021, we'll begin to
10 move towards a large-scale green new deal
11 at the federal level.

12 I want to read just three
13 sentences from a press release from the
14 Mayor of Los Angeles, who recently with
15 others in the city decided to cancel
16 plans to rebuild old natural gas power
17 plants in the city. Instead they're
18 going to take them offline and replace
19 them with renewable energy.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. CHANIN: Mayor Eric
22 Garcetti said in his press release,
23 quote, This is the beginning of the end
24 of natural gas in Los Angeles. The
25 climate crisis demands that we move more

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2 quickly to independence on fossil fuel,
3 and that's what today is all about. He
4 was joined by Michael Bloomberg, not
5 exactly a radical, billionaire Michael
6 Bloomberg, former Mayor of New York, who
7 said, and I'm almost done, Science
8 increasingly shows that the days of
9 seeing gas as a bridge fuel are coming to
10 an end. We need to accelerate the
11 transition to clean energy, and LA's
12 commitment to helping lead the way is an
13 important sign of progress.

14 So which side is Philadelphia
15 going to be on? Are we going to join
16 people like Michael Bloomberg and Eric
17 Garcetti or are we going to support the
18 profits of an industry that's outdated,
19 that's harming our health, that's
20 starting to wreck the climate and ruin
21 the future for our children?

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Karen Melton,
3 commenting on 181063.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 afternoon.

7 MS. MELTON: Good afternoon,
8 City Council. My name is Karen Melton.
9 I live in East Falls, and I'm speaking on
10 behalf of the Southeast Pennsylvania
11 Sierra Club.

12 I want to comment on one
13 paragraph, the whereas paragraph of the
14 amendment that was introduced today to
15 Bill 181063 creating an LNG gas plant.
16 It talked about combatting energy and
17 security. This financial argument for
18 building the plant was made at a hearing
19 of the Gas Commission in December. PGW
20 representatives testified that it would
21 be an important new source of revenue,
22 helping PGW limit future rate increases.
23 However, the energy consultant hired by
24 PGW's Public Advocate to review the
25 proposal disputed the revenue numbers,

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2 saying the projections are based on
3 unachievable sales on price estimates.
4 This is one of the reasons that City
5 Controller Rebecca Rynhart, who is a
6 member of the Gas Commission, voted
7 against the proposal.

8 The project assumes gas prices
9 will remain strong for the next 25 years,
10 as Mitch mentioned. PGW is betting and
11 wants you to bet that there will be no
12 policies enacted to address global
13 warming by transitioning against fossil
14 fuels.

15 If revenue from this project
16 was used to limit future rate increases,
17 we estimate the amount at somewhere
18 between 25 cents and 66 cents per month
19 for a customer.

20 The whereas clause also says
21 that this an environmentally sound
22 project that will reduce emissions. This
23 was said by the Philadelphia Energy
24 Authority. Despite repeated requests for
25 them to explain how they concluded that a

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2 new fossil fuel project planned to
3 operate for 25 years and generate a
4 billion gallons of LNG is going to reduce
5 emissions, there has been no response.

6 There's been talk about
7 oil-fired electric-generating plants in
8 Philadelphia, as if the LNG plant is
9 intended to displace them with gas
10 generators. And there are several plants
11 in Philadelphia that burn oil to produce
12 electricity, but they are very rarely
13 even turned on.

14 This LNG is not needed or
15 intended to be used in Philadelphia. PGW
16 already has a surplus of LNG that it
17 produces and sells. It wants to produce
18 and sell more. There is no credible
19 analysis we could uncover showing the
20 plant will reduce emissions.

21 So I ask you please to join
22 your two colleagues, Gym and Jones, who
23 have already decided to vote no on Bill
24 181063.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes,
5 commenting on 190074.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MS. LANDES: Hello. My name is
10 Lynn Landes. I'm an 18-year resident of
11 Philadelphia and the Founder of the Wild
12 Foodies of Philly in 2010, an educational
13 meetup that features more than 4,600
14 members. We are one of the largest
15 foraging meetups in the United States.

16 The Boy Scouts of America teach
17 young boys and girls about nature and how
18 to survive in the wild, and in that
19 regard, the Wild Foodies of Philly are
20 performing much the same service in our
21 urban environment. We are dedicated to
22 educating the public about our wild world
23 and its uses for food, fiber, and
24 medicine, and to that end, we have a
25 resource website at wildfoodies.org that

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2 provides a substantial amount of
3 information, including plant profiles of
4 over 200 local, wild, edible plants,
5 vines, bushes, and trees.

6 Why is it important to learn
7 about our wild world and its uses?

8 Because our wild world is the only truly
9 sustainable source of food, fiber, and
10 medicine that we have. Cultivated crops
11 are dependent on human assistance to
12 reproduce, whereas wild plants are not.

13 For a society to rely on
14 cultivated crops for its only source of
15 food is to create a serious risk where
16 one need not exist. Add to that the fact
17 that we import much of our food from far
18 away and we have now created a situation
19 ripe for any natural or manmade disaster.

20 Therefore, education and the
21 use of wild plants, including invasive
22 plants, is vital to our emergency
23 preparedness as well as a commonsense
24 approach to feeding and caring for our
25 population.

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2 To that end, farmers need not
3 abandon their crops in favor of wild
4 plants, but they can certainly learn to
5 co-harvest them, because many of our most
6 valuable and nutritious edible plants
7 such as Amaranth, Purslane, and Lamb's
8 Quarters like to grow near the fields and
9 between the rows of cultivated plants.

10 Increasingly, grocery stores,
11 farmers' markets, and others are
12 featuring wild edible plants, but much
13 more needs to be done. We need to
14 educate the general public, particularly
15 our schoolchildren. When young people
16 realize that our wild world has important
17 uses, that makes them care so much about
18 the world around them.

19 An important partner to have in
20 this educational process is Philadelphia
21 Parks and Rec, and I look forward to
22 working with them on this subject.
23 However, first it would be very helpful
24 if they stopped using toxic herbicides in
25 the park. Neither the public nor the

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2 Boys Scouts nor the Wild Foodies are
3 going to be able to safely nibble on
4 dandelions or eat the berries if they've
5 been sprayed with a toxic herbicide. And
6 that occurred in the last two weeks at
7 Lemon Hill and Kelly Drive.

8 I look forward to visiting you
9 with some wild foods in the near future
10 and hope you visit our website at
11 wildfoodies.org.

12 Thank you very much.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Mr. Decker, hold on one second.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Squilla.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I have to leave Council
20 for a little while. I'd like to be
21 recorded aye on all bills, resolutions,
22 and amendments in case I don't get back
23 in time.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 of mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
16 requires immediate action and remedy.

17 Every week, Council, Mayor,
18 Governor, and others transfer private
19 property to the government, probably
20 illegally.

21 Seventy-five years ago men of
22 honor performed their known duty or task,
23 many for the last time. Would they
24 believe that this ultimate sacrifice was
25 honored and respected by a government

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2 that has opposed and denied trial by jury
3 nine times, stolen my home, stolen my
4 just compensation? They fought to uphold
5 the Constitution and laws that this
6 government is violating.

7 The Attorney General talks
8 about accountability to others, yet
9 appears to hold himself above the law.
10 Why hasn't the State Police, the Sheriff,
11 or the Philadelphia Police arrested any
12 official?

13 Would people volunteer to serve
14 overseas knowing their government was
15 stealing their neighbor's home?

16 The constitutions require
17 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
18 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
19 duty. Your oath of office requires you
20 to act or face prison.

21 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
22 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
23 Constitution, Article I, 1 through 28; 26
24 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709, 711, 712, 713,
25 716, 902, and other laws listed in SCOTUS

2 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
3 violated.

4 I call on the federal and
5 Commonwealth governments to perform their
6 constitutional obligations to investigate
7 and prosecute all involved in the theft
8 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
9 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

10 The denial of God-given 42 USC
11 1982 property rights for 25 years is
12 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
13 and requires immediate remedy.

14 A just government must obey the
15 rule of law. This color of law
16 government must have its Charter to
17 govern revoked until a constitutionally
18 compliant government is installed.

19 Public servants cannot refuse
20 their sworn duty to act any more than a
21 fireman can refuse to fight a fire.

22 The sovereign people require
23 oath, Constitution, and law be enforced,
24 and jail is required for all who violate
25 oath, Constitution, or law.

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2 I remind Council, it takes a
3 lot of cooperation to create and allow
4 this ongoing, continuous, insidious,
5 monumental corruption.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

22 their memory, and I'm proud to have
23 helped in raising funds for the statue
24 for "Wild Bill" Guarnere.

4 continues to bolster public
5 accountability over a police force,
6 because it matters to the public trust
7 and because we know that people are
8 harmed when this does not happen.

9 The despicable and disturbing
10 public rhetoric by active-duty police
11 officers is terrifying for community
12 policing and is going to break the public
13 trust. And I do urge that everyone reads
14 that as well as the ACLU's op-ed that
15 talks about the Philadelphia Police
16 Department has a racism problem.

17 These are not things that we
18 can run away from. They're things we
19 have to confront. Our communities demand
20 it, they deserve it, and our public trust
21 will be built off of it.
