2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning. We're going to get started. If  
4 members will take their seats.

5                   To give our invocation this  
6 morning, the Chair recognizes the  
7 Reverend Bonnie Camarda from the  
8 Salvation Army. She is here today as the  
9 guest of Councilwoman Maria  
10 Quinones-Sanchez.

11                   I would ask all guests,  
12 members, and visitors to please rise.

13                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
14 visitors rise.)

15                   REVEREND CAMARDA: Good  
16 morning.

17                   (Good morning.)

18                   REVEREND CAMARDA: Our prayer  
19 today comes from Psalm 9. It says, I  
20 will give thanks to you, Lord, with all  
21 my heart. I will tell of all your  
22 wonderful deeds. I will be glad and  
23 rejoice in you. I will sing the praises  
24 of your name, O Most High.

25                   My enemies turn back. They

14 Thank you and, again, Reverend, thank you  
15 for those inspiring words.

16 Our next order of business is  
17 the approval of the Journal of the  
18 meeting of Thursday, June 6, 2019, and  
19 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
21 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
22 Journal of Thursday, June 6th, 2019 be

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Thank you. It has been moved and  
3           properly seconded that the Journal of the

8                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Those opposed?

10                   (No response.)

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
12           ayes have it, and our Journal is  
13           approved.

14                   And our next order of business  
15           is requests for leave of absence, and the  
16           Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

17                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
18           you, Mr. President. On behalf of the  
19           majority, leave is requested for  
20           Councilman Henon.

21                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22           Thank you, Councilman. The record shall  
23           reflect that. Leave shall be granted.

24                   The Chair now recognizes  
25           Councilman O'Neill.

2                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
3 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
4 republicans, there are no requests for  
5 leave of absence.

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7 Chair thanks the gentleman.

8                   At this time, I would like to  
9 dispense with the regular order of  
10 business and I would like to welcome and  
11 I want to thank everyone for coming down  
12 today to witness your government in  
13 action. We genuinely appreciate you  
14 being here. We hope your stay here today  
15 is a knowledgeable one but, more  
16 importantly, a pleasurable one, so much  
17 so that you come back again. So, again,  
18 thank you for being here.

19                   At this time, the Chair  
20 recognizes Councilwoman Bass, who will  
21 present a resolution honoring community  
22 leaders. Would Dr. Arlene Bennett and  
23 those accompanying her please join the  
24 Councilwoman at the podium.

25                   (Councilmembers and guests

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And

4           joining Councilwoman Bass, we have

5           Councilman Oh, Councilman Taubenberger,

6           Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman

7           Blackwell, and also have Councilman

8           Squilla, and also joining the

9           Councilwoman, our honorees.   In addition

10          to Dr. Arlene Bennett, we have the

11          Reverend Frank Crangle, Oliver Adams,

12          Nate "Mister" Miller, also known as

13          Champ, Bishop Leonard Goins, and Reverend

14          Joseph Williams.   True, true honorees.

15                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS:   Good

16          morning.

17                   (Good morning.)

18                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS:   Well, one

19          of the things that we love to do in the

20          Eighth District is recognize the folks

21          who have been out on the ground doing

22          hard work in our communities for a very

23          long time, and these are our unsung

24          heroins and heroes that have been

25          working, working, working diligently

2           throughout our communities, and we wanted  
3           to take a moment once again and say thank  
4           you to a group of individuals who have  
5           really left their mark on the Eighth  
6           District and continue to do so. I don't  
7           want to say past tense, because they  
8           continue to do so up until this very  
9           present moment.

10                         And so we wanted to recognize  
11           folks from the community, and we want to  
12           read this resolution, which reads:

13                         Honoring and recognizing  
14           Dr. Arlene Bennett, Reverend Frank  
15           Crangle, Oliver Adams, Nate "Mister"  
16           Miller, Bishop Leonard Goins, and  
17           Reverend Joseph Williams on their  
18           legacies of leadership and achievement in  
19           medicine, sports, the arts, and community  
20           service in the City of Philadelphia.

21                         Whereas, in 1964, Dr. Arlene  
22           Bennett became the first African American  
23           female to graduate from the University of  
24           Pennsylvania's Perelman School of  
25           Medicine. Dr. Bennett considers herself

2           fortunate to have grown up surrounded by  
3           accomplished and supportive women and  
4           never felt restricted by the gender and  
5           racial biases of the time. After  
6           graduating, she completed her internship  
7           at Pennsylvania Presbyterian Medical  
8           Center, followed by a residency in  
9           psychiatry at Eastern Pennsylvania  
10          Psychiatric Institute. She has been an  
11          active staff psychiatrist at Pennsylvania  
12          Hospital since 1980, a Clinical Associate  
13          at the Hospital of the University of  
14          Pennsylvania since 1977, and continues  
15          her work in private practice; and

16                           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

17          Whereas, Reverend Frank Crangle joined  
18          the Philadelphia Police Department in  
19          1982 and later the Philadelphia Police  
20          Chaplains after accepting Jesus Christ as  
21          his Lord and Savior. He rose through the  
22          ranks and now serves as President of the  
23          14th Police District Chaplains where they  
24          hold prayer walks, visit the sick and  
25          infirm, and encourage officers, local

2           ministries, and community groups with  
3           words from the Bible. Reverend Crangle  
4           praises God for continuing to bless his  
5           ministry and also for those he has put in  
6           his life, including his pastor, fellow  
7           police chaplains, Police Commissioner  
8           Richard Ross, and other City leaders. He  
9           stands willing to help without hesitation  
10          whenever called upon and trusts God to  
11          always lead and guide him in all things;  
12          and

13                    COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
14           several decades ago Oliver Adams, who  
15           owned a successful bakery in Northwest  
16           Philadelphia for over 30 years, came up  
17           with the idea of a national symbol which  
18           recognizes the diaspora of Black  
19           Americans. He believed that the term  
20           "Afro Americans" more accurately  
21           reflected the many nationalities that  
22           encompass African heritage, including, to  
23           name a few, Jamaicans, Haitians,  
24           Canadian, Ugandans, Somalians, and  
25           Liberians. In 1987, Mr. Adams

2           copyrighted his logo "Thank God I'm Afro  
3           American." A copy of the logo hangs in  
4           the Martin Luther King, Jr. Library in  
5           Atlanta. He continues to market his logo  
6           nationwide and hopes it will become a  
7           national symbol for Afro Americans in the  
8           United States and around the world; and

9                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
10          the boxing legacy of Nate "Mister" Miller  
11          began in Germantown where a troubled kid  
12          off the streets grew up to look at the  
13          world in a different way. Mr. Miller  
14          started turning his life around when he  
15          began training as a teenager at Happy  
16          Hollow Recreation Center where he  
17          eventually became a Golden Gloves  
18          Champion. His first title came from the  
19          North American Boxing Federation in 1989  
20          on a seventh-round knockout of Bert  
21          Cooper. In 1995, when he was 31 years  
22          old, Mr. Miller won his first world  
23          title, knocking out Orlin Norris in the  
24          eighth round to take the WBA  
25          cruiserweight crown, and defending his

2           title four times before retiring in 2001  
3           after accumulating a record of 31 and 9  
4           with 27 knockouts; and

5                        COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, in  
6           1982, Bishop Leonard Goins founded  
7           Chestnut Hill Church of God and Christ,  
8           which began as a storefront church at 22  
9           East Mount Airy Avenue and is now the  
10          headquarters for the Lion of Judah  
11          Pentecostal Churches International.  
12          Bishop Goins came to the Lord at a very  
13          early age, and his love, devotion, and  
14          desire to spread God's Holy Word  
15          culminated with his ordination in 1971.  
16          Bishop Goins served as the State  
17          Evangelist for the Commonwealth of  
18          Pennsylvania Churches of God and Christ,  
19          President of the Philadelphia Law  
20          Enforcement Clergy Support Unit, and  
21          Founder of the Pentecostal Clergy  
22          Political Advisory Council of  
23          Philadelphia where he continues to  
24          provide a voice for Pentecostal Churches  
25          among the City's political, social, and

2           economic institutions; and

3                       COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,

4           Reverend Joseph Williams serves as Pastor

5           of the Mount Airy United Fellowship

6           Church and has experienced a memorable

7           journey from music to ministries as the

8           youngest living member of the legendary

9           group the Dixie Hummingbirds, a

10          pioneering force behind the modern gospel

11          quartet whose imaginative arrangements,

12          progressive harmony and all-around

13          versatility made them one of the most

14          successful groups of their era. Reverend

15          Williams started singing when he was five

16          years old and would eventually travel the

17          world as a professional singer, joining a

18          number of popular groups of the time,

19          including the Gospel Stirrers and Sons of

20          the Birds. He later recorded with the

21          original Dixie Hummingbirds before being

22          called to the ministry; therefore, be it

23                       COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

24          Resolved, the Council of the City of

25          Philadelphia honors and recognizes

2           Dr. Arlene Bennett, Reverend Frank  
3           Crangle, Oliver Adams, Nate "Mister"  
4           Miller, Bishop Leonard Goins, Reverend  
5           Joseph Williams on their legacies of

7           sports, the arts, and community service  
8           in the City of Philadelphia.

9                    COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And further  
10           resolved, that an engrossed copy of this  
11           resolution be presented to each honoree  
12           as evidence of the sincere respect and  
13           admiration of this legislative body.

14                    Congratulations to all of our  
15           honorees.

16                    (Applause.)

17                    COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And I did  
18           want to add that Dr. Bennett has been  
19           really like a mother to me and a mother  
20           figure. So I'd like for her to come  
21           forward. And I know the Council  
22           President will recognize her, but I did  
23           want to acknowledge and I forgot to have  
24           her come forward when we were doing the  
25           resolution, as well as Ministry Crangle.

3           COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So I have  
4 like my mom and also Bishop Goins, who is  
5 like my dad. So they're both here today.  
6 Thank you so much.

9                   (Applause.)

10          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Please proceed.

12          DR. BENNETT: Thank you.

13 President Clarke, members of Council, and  
14 fellow citizens of Philadelphia, it's an  
15 honor and pleasure to be here today.

16 It's a pleasure and an honor to speak on  
17 behalf of my fellow colleagues on the  
18 stage. Our commitment to Philadelphia is  
19 unending. I think we all accept our work  
20 as a calling, and we will continue to do  
21 everything that we can to leave the world  
22 and Philadelphia a little better than  
23 what it was when we first came.

24                   Thank you.

25                   (Applause.)

3       Thank you very much.

4                   Council will be at ease.

5                   (Council at ease.)

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7       Thank you, and congratulations.

8                   At this time, the Chair

9       recognizes Councilman Jones, who will

10      present a resolution recognizing the

11      Father's Day Rally Committee. Would

12      Bilal Qayyum and those accompanying him

13      please join the Councilman at the podium.

14                   (Councilmembers and guests

15      approached podium.)

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

17      joining the Councilman, we have

18      Councilman Green, Councilman Oh,

19      Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman

20      Parker, Councilman Johnson, and

21      Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez and

22      Councilwoman Bass.

23                   COUNCILMAN JONES: So out of

24      all of the titles that I've had in my

25      life, none is greater than the title of

2           "father" to me.

3                   When you fly a plane, you need  
4           a license. When you drive a car, you  
5           need lessons. When you have a block  
6           party in the City of Philadelphia, you  
7           need a permit. But to be a father, there  
8           is no experience required.

9                   Some fathers that I've met that  
10          have been slightly derelict in their  
11          duties, leaving those responsibilities to  
12          the mother, and they gave me an excuse of  
13          saying that I can't afford to be a  
14          father, I would submit to them and those  
15          who are listening that you cannot afford  
16          not to be a father. The cost to those  
17          young people and society is too great in  
18          the absence of a father in a household to  
19          balance the dining room table in a  
20          household, often, too often, left up to  
21          the mother.

22                  For those out there that will  
23          be experiencing Father's Day with the  
24          title, quote, "stepdad," you get two  
25          thumbs up, because you signed up

2           voluntarily for that responsibility, and  
3           kudos to you.

4                        So recognizing the Father's Day  
5           Rally Committee for its 30th year of  
6           existence highlighting the importance of  
7           fathers in our city and in our community  
8           and nationally. Today we have Kasim Ali,  
9           Vernon Brown, Kevin Bell, and our own  
10          Bilal Qayyum.

11                      And I want to say, are we still  
12          having the Father's Day softball game?  
13          Do we intend to win this year? All  
14          right. Thank you.

15                      We won last year? So maybe  
16          it's because I didn't come to the game we  
17          won. Is that what you're saying? I'm  
18          coming this year.

19                      Recognizing and celebrating the  
20          30th Anniversary of the Father's Day  
21          Rally Committee and their efforts and  
22          initiatives that have positively impacted  
23          the quality of life of African American  
24          communities and men of color in the City  
25          of Philadelphia and the Delaware Valley

2           Region.

3                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
4           the Father's Day Rally Committee was  
5           created three decades ago by a group of  
6           African American men who saw the need to  
7           develop meaningful programs and  
8           activities for the African American male  
9           population of Philadelphia; and

10                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
11           the founding members of the Father's Day  
12           Rally Committee were Dr. Therman Evans,  
13           Reverend Clarence Hester, Steve Pina,  
14           Vernon Price, Bilal Qayyum of the Ninth  
15           Councilmanic District, and Reverend Henry  
16           Wells; and

17                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the  
18           mission of the Father's Day Rally  
19           Committee is to promote positive action  
20           and interaction among individuals to  
21           prompt a more aggressive hands-on  
22           approach toward resolving a range of  
23           problems confronting African American  
24           communities, such as violence and a lack  
25           of effective youth mentorship; and

2                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'm  
3 going to take a point of personal  
4 privilege and personally thank the  
5 Father's Day Rally. It's been almost a  
6 decade, right, Bilal, they started the  
7 Jackie Robinson/Roberto Clemente  
8 exchange, and I've been happy to  
9 participate in that. And I value and  
10 appreciate the fact that the strong  
11 African American male leadership thought  
12 it was important enough to reach out to  
13 Puerto Rican and Latino men, and I  
14 appreciate that personally and on behalf  
15 of the men, the fathers in the Latino  
16 community. So thank you very much,  
17 gentlemen.

18                   Whereas, since its creation,  
19 the Father's Day Rally Committee has  
20 initiated several valuable programs, such  
21 as the David P. Richardson, Jr. Rites of  
22 Passage Program, which caters to African  
23 American males ages 11 through 18. The  
24 program focuses on helping youth with the  
25 transition into responsible manhood; and

2                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

3       Whereas, the Father's Day Rally Committee  
4       also created, quote/unquote, "Operation  
5       Footprint," a mentoring program for high  
6       school students in Philadelphia's public  
7       school system, and, quote/unquote,  
8       "Project Safe Life," an initiative  
9       offering counseling to at-risk males,  
10      teaching non-violent alternatives to  
11      confrontational behavior and providing  
12      support to men and fathers who have lost  
13      a loved one due to violence; and

14                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM:   Whereas, the  
15      Father's Day Rally Committee has also  
16      coordinated several events, including the  
17      "Live and Let Live Campaign," which was a  
18      citywide anti-violence effort to stop  
19      senseless acts of violence in our city.  
20      Additionally, the organization has an  
21      annual Father's Day Picnic which has  
22      reached over 10,000 fathers in 30 years,  
23      to celebrate fatherhood and honor fathers  
24      who are making a significant contribution  
25      to their families and communities; and

2                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
3           the Father's Day Rally Committee  
4           continues to serve as a strong support  
5           system for African American men and  
6           fathers, helping them to flourish despite  
7           the daily pressures of our society. For  
8           the past 30 years, the Father's Day Rally  
9           Committee has remained committed to  
10          reducing violence in our communities by  
11          advocating positive interaction among  
12          men, and their dedication and  
13          achievements should be celebrated; now,  
14          therefore, be it

15                   COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, by  
16          the Council of the City of Philadelphia,  
17          that it hereby recognizes and celebrates  
18          the 30th Anniversary of the Father's Day  
19          Rally Committee and their efforts and  
20          initiatives that have positively impacted  
21          the quality of life of African American  
22          communities and men of color in the City  
23          of Philadelphia and the Delaware Valley  
24          Region.

25                   Further resolved, that an

7                           (Applause.)

8                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
9           the Chair recognizes Mr. Qayyum for  
10          remarks.

11                   MR. QAYYUM:   Good morning --  
12                           (Good morning.)

13                   MR. QAYYUM:   -- President  
14          Clarke and also members of City Council.  
15          I want to -- all fathers, would you  
16          please stand up.   If you're a father,  
17          stand up.

18                           (Applause.)

19                   MR. QAYYUM:   Thank you very  
20          much, because that's the whole mission of  
21          Father's Day Rally Committee, is raise  
22          the bar for fathers in the City of  
23          Philadelphia.   When Mother's Day comes  
24          around, mom gets everything.   We be lucky  
25          to get a card.   And I remember one

2           year -- I have five kids and 14  
3           grand-kids and two great grand-kids, and  
4           I remember one year they gave me a  
5           clip-on tie. That was my gift for  
6           Father's Day. All right? I ain't going  
7           to tell you what I got my wife and what  
8           she got.

9                        So we raised the bar in the  
10           City of Philadelphia, and we're very  
11           proud. This is our 30th anniversary. We  
12           also this year, like we did last year, we  
13           have, after the celebration of fathers,  
14           programs, a whole week. Starting last  
15           weekend, every day this week there's been  
16           an activity with fathers and groups, and  
17           some of the organizations with me this  
18           morning are participating in that. And  
19           as I speak today, Frontline Dads are  
20           bailing fathers out of jail today so they  
21           can be home for Father's Day. They  
22           bailed out five fathers.

23                        (Applause.)

24                        MR. QAYYUM: Because we got to  
25           build a movement, and we've been building

2           a movement in the City to get more men  
3           and fathers involved in their children's  
4           lives.

5                         If we have a father in the  
6           house, it's a big difference. All the  
7           national statistics show when there's a  
8           father around, the child is most likely  
9           to graduate high school. That child will  
10          most likely not get involved in negative  
11          behavior and go to jail. That child  
12          would live a better life, healthy life.

13                        So we have to get fathers  
14          involved more and more. And fathers are  
15          involved.

16                        So I would like just to thank  
17          Council for this resolution. I'm not  
18          sure if I'm going to be around for  
19          another 30 years, but I would like to  
20          just thank everybody for your support and  
21          your continued support of the Father's  
22          Day Rally Committee and our mission to  
23          promote fatherhood in the City of  
24          Philadelphia as well as you heard being  
25          very much involved in trying to reduce

2           shootings and homicides in the City of

4                     Thank you very much.

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6                   CHIEF CLERK: Dr. Marilyn  
7 Howarth, commenting on 180936.

8                   (Witness approached podium.)

9                   DR. HOWARTH: Good morning.

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
11 afternoon.

12                   DR. HOWARTH: Good afternoon.

13 Good morning. My name is Dr. Marilyn  
14 Howarth and I'm an occupational and  
15 environmental medicine physician working  
16 in Philadelphia for the last 25 years.  
17 I'd like to thank Philadelphia City  
18 Council for the opportunity to submit  
19 these comments in support of the lead  
20 remediation funding in the budget Bill  
21 190154.

22                   The College of Physicians of  
23 Philadelphia, one of the oldest and  
24 respected medical organizations in the  
25 country, has submitted in writing an

2           issue brief supporting the need to take  
3           action to protect children from lead. My  
4           testimony today is on behalf of the  
5           College of Physicians and the Center of  
6           Excellence in Environmental Toxicology at  
7           the University of Pennsylvania's Perelman  
8           School of Medicine.

9                        Thousands of research articles  
10           on lead exposure document its health  
11           effects on children in the first few  
12           years of life. Lead kills nerves in the  
13           brain and leaves others impaired,  
14           interfering with thinking and behavior.

15                        Researchers at our center have  
16           found that early life exposure to lead  
17           results in lasting sleep deprivation.  
18           Having a good night's sleep is very  
19           important and is actually essential to  
20           health, well-being, and learning. Our  
21           researchers have documented decreased IQ  
22           and behavior problems in lead-exposed  
23           children.

24                        Every year in Philadelphia,  
25           about 2,400 children have blood lead

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           levels over five micrograms per  
3           deciliter. These children have been  
4           robbed of their full academic potential  
5           with lifelong consequences.

6                        Every day children in  
7           Philadelphia are being poisoned. That is  
8           why your action to approve this bill  
9           can't wait. Physicians in Philadelphia  
10          want you to know that there is no  
11          effective treatment once a child has been  
12          exposed to lead. The damage is  
13          permanent. Primary prevention that this  
14          bill offers eliminates the primary source  
15          of lead, and this strategy has been found  
16          to be the best way to protect children.

17                       In Philadelphia, the majority  
18          of children with elevated blood lead  
19          levels were exposed in rental properties,  
20          mainly in poor African American  
21          neighborhoods. This is an environmental  
22          injustice. We urge City Council to enact  
23          this bill now to protect the most  
24          vulnerable. The data tells us that a  
25          delay in passing of the lead-safe

2           certification of all rental properties

3           even by two to three months --

4                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5           Ma'am?

6                        DR. HOWARTH: -- would result

7           in hundreds of children harmed in

8           Philadelphia.

9                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Thank you.

11                        (Applause.)

12                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you for your testimony.

14                        Again, I just wanted to remind

15          you all, we have to alter the timeframe,

16          so please alter your testimony to reflect

17          the two minutes today. We got a lot of

18          people that want to testify, and we want

19          to make sure everybody has an

20          opportunity. Thank you.

21                        Mr. Decker, please call the

22          next name.

23                        CHIEF CLERK: Donna Cooper,

24          commenting on 190154.

25                        (Witness approached podium.)

2                   MS. COOPER: Good afternoon. I  
3 want to thank Councilmembers for enacting  
4 a budget today that increases our funds  
5 for our libraries. Great move. You're  
6 also increasing the funds for summer  
7 youth employment programs. Great move.  
8 I really appreciate that.

9                   Twelve of you signed a letter  
10 earlier this week asking the School  
11 District to increase its investments to  
12 remove mold, asbestos, and lead from its  
13 school buildings. You're making an  
14 enormous transfer of City revenues to the  
15 School District, and that ask is the  
16 minimum of what they need to do. An  
17 additional \$30 million should be spent  
18 for that out of the School District's  
19 fund balance, which is very significant.  
20 So great move on the part of City  
21 Council.

22                   Bad move, today the lead bill  
23 was delayed. We began work on this bill  
24 with the great Councilwoman Blondell  
25 Reynolds Brown on October 25th, 2018, 240

2           days ago. In that period, working on the  
3           assumption that an average of six  
4           children are poisoned by lead every  
5           single day, 1,440 children poisoned by  
6           lead likely since the beginning when we  
7           started working on this bill.

8                        The time to act is now. We  
9           know that this Council has enough votes  
10          to act on behalf of children. You're  
11          showing you're doing that today with the  
12          budget. You showed you did that with  
13          your letter to the School District.  
14          We're asking you to show you can do that  
15          again and act on this lead bill before  
16          you recess for this summer. Our children  
17          are depending on you.

18                        (Applause.)

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Thank you for your testimony.

21                        CHIEF CLERK: Erin Blair,  
22          commenting on 190154.

23                        (Witness approached podium.)

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
25          afternoon.

2                   MS. BLAIR: Hi. My name is  
3 Erin Blair. I'm here today -- I know  
4 we're speaking to the budget, and I am  
5 also here as a public health nurse  
6 speaking about the consequences of  
7 delaying this bill for the passage of  
8 lead.

9                   I appreciate that funding for  
10 moving forward with legislation is a big  
11 part as well, and I hope to see in the  
12 budget that some of the allocations  
13 towards housing might go towards  
14 assisting landlords in remediating lead  
15 that are unable to afford to do so by  
16 themselves. But every day we delay this  
17 bill, six children may be poisoned.

18                   I'm waiting on every single  
19 phone call I'm going to receive between  
20 now and the passage of this bill for  
21 another mom that's been unfairly  
22 discriminated against for her housing,  
23 for another mom calling crying in tears  
24 because she found out her baby has a lead  
25 level of five, a lead level of seven, a

2           lead level of ten, a lead level of 15.

3           Permanent brain damage. That happens in  
4           homes in Philadelphia every single day.

5                     People are profiting off  
6           poisoning children. We need to fix that.

7                     Thank you.

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you for your testimony.

10                    (Applause.)

11                    CHIEF CLERK: Caitlyn Kubiak,  
12           commenting on 190154.

13                    (Witness approached podium.)

14                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15           afternoon.

16                    MS. KUBIAK: Good afternoon.

17           My name is Caitlyn and I am the parent of  
18           a beautiful baby boy. When I was almost  
19           eight months pregnant with my son, my  
20           landlord told me that he would not be  
21           renewing my lease when it was up, as he  
22           does not rent out to people under the age  
23           of five. This is because of the lead  
24           that was possibly in the building and he  
25           didn't want to be held liable.

2                   Upset about this, I reached out  
3           to the property manager, and he confirmed  
4           that they would not renew my lease in two  
5           months, the exact time my son was due.  
6           He told me they didn't know if my  
7           apartment had lead problems and that they  
8           were not obligated to test for it,  
9           because I was already living in the  
10          building. I lived in this apartment for  
11          a while. It was my home. The property  
12          manager even told me that I was one of  
13          his best tenants because I never caused  
14          any problems and I always paid my rent on  
15          time, but that they would still not be  
16          renewing my lease.

17                   This didn't seem right to me,  
18          so I called the nurse who was caring for  
19          me during my pregnancy, and she spoke  
20          with the lawyers at her office that  
21          helped with housing laws. It turned out  
22          my landlord shouldn't have been kicking  
23          me out because I was pregnant and would  
24          soon have a baby living with me, but the  
25          lawyer also said my landlord was not

2           obligated to test my unit.

3                     My landlord said I could pay  
4           for the lead test, but that if the test  
5           came back positive, he didn't have to fix  
6           it and wouldn't renew my lease. It was  
7           such an awful time. I had been a really  
8           great tenant there, and I had done  
9           nothing wrong.

10                    At this point, I decided it  
11           wasn't worth fighting to try to stay. It  
12           was really hard to move at eight months  
13           pregnant, and if I hadn't found a place,  
14           I had no idea where I could have gone,  
15           where would I have put all my stuff.

16                    Packing and moving was  
17           exhausting. I wasn't even able to lift  
18           any heavy stuff, so I had to get help.  
19           It was so stressful, which worried me,  
20           because I know stress isn't good for a  
21           baby during pregnancy. I also had to  
22           spend the money that I had saved up for  
23           my unpaid maternity leave. I had to  
24           spend that to find a new house.

25                    The lead law needs to be

2           changed in Philadelphia to protect moms  
3           and babies right now so they don't have  
4           to go through the same thing I did. I  
5           urge you all to act now before break to  
6           prevent the next baby like mine from  
7           being harmed.

8                         Thank you.

9                         (Applause.)

10                        CHIEF CLERK: Lisa Quattlebaum,  
11           commenting on 190154.

12                        (Witness approached podium.)

13                        MS. QUATTLEBAUM: Good  
14           afternoon. My name is Lisa Quattlebaum.  
15           I'm a former educator, community leader,  
16           environmental justice advocate, Food and  
17           Health Policy Advisory Board member, and  
18           parent at Powel Elementary School. I'm  
19           here to testify on Bill 190154.

20                        In this year's budget, this  
21           Council once again committed the revenue  
22           to our schools that our young people  
23           deserve. I'm here to thank Council for  
24           its demonstrated commitment to our  
25           schools and to challenge you to continue

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           to do so and to show your service to the  
3           community by pushing the School District  
4           to allocate a small portion of its fund  
5           balance to funding urgent facility  
6           repairs.

7                        My philosophy of education is  
8           rooted in the conviction that excellence  
9           in education means scholarship, character  
10          development, and citizenship expressed  
11          through to service to self, family, and  
12          community, the environment, the world.

13                       While the School District and  
14          newly formed Board of Education has  
15          placed much-needed emphasis on  
16          comprehensive teaching and learning  
17          standards, parent engagement, inclusive  
18          and equitable best practices, it has  
19          neglected the physical structures and  
20          spaces where inquiry, discovery, and  
21          mastery takes place.

22                       The learning environment, the  
23          classroom, the playground, the schools  
24          and facilities, as well as the  
25          communities' resources, including parks

2           in neighborhoods, must encourage students  
3           to consider and respect the variety of  
4           perspectives, including their own. Yet  
5           this is virtually impossible when  
6           students face worn and hazardous spaces  
7           that distract from learning and, quite  
8           frankly, place in critical harm.

9                        Having lived and worked abroad  
10           for more than a decade, I've seen  
11           incredible interpretations of school.  
12           This is not the school that my hometown  
13           should have.

14                        Thank you.

15                        (Applause.)

16                        CHIEF CLERK: Gretchen Walker,  
17           commenting on 190154.

18                        (Witness approached podium.)

19                        MS. WALKER: Good afternoon.  
20           My name is Gretchen Walker. I am also a  
21           parent at Powel School and I am the Home  
22           and School President there. I am here to  
23           testify on Bill 190154.

24                        I'd like to thank Council and  
25           especially Council President for your

2           commitment to invest in our City schools  
3           for our children and for our city's  
4           future.

5                         This year, the School District  
6           has a surplus. It's been mentioned now  
7           twice in testimony. I am asking for you  
8           to continue to push the School District  
9           to allocate a small portion of its fund  
10          balance to funding urgent facilities  
11          repairs, specifically \$30 million.

12                        A majority of Council has  
13          already signed on to a letter -- Donna  
14          Cooper mentioned it -- to the School  
15          District with this ask, and basically I'm  
16          preaching to the choir and just hoping  
17          the rest of you will start to sing  
18          harmony on this matter. And if in fact  
19          the burden of the school to fix all the  
20          repairs is what COO Danielle Floyd has  
21          stated last fall as 4 billion, why, you  
22          may ask, why \$30 million right now?  
23          Because each child's needs are priceless.

24                        Facilities' needs cascade and  
25          compound losses for every child affected.

2           So \$30 million repairs can make a big  
3           improvement for a lot of children's  
4           lives.

5                       Part of this 30 million will go  
6           to asthma control or remediation of mold  
7           that produces asthma reactions. Just  
8           this year, more needed to be remediated  
9           in a music facility at Powel, which means  
10          instruction was interrupted for six  
11          months. That's one child times 30 in a  
12          classroom, times two classrooms, times  
13          five grades did not get an opportunity.  
14          These opportunities lost do not get  
15          regained.

16                      Please do the \$30 million right  
17          now to support children.

18                      (Applause.)

19                      CHIEF CLERK: Audra Wolfe,  
20          commenting on 181063-A.

21                      (Witness approached podium.)

22                      MS. WOLFE: My name is Audra  
23          Wolfe and I'm a member of POWER,  
24          Philadelphians Organized to Witness,  
25          Empower, and Rebuild. I'm here to

2           testify on Bill 181063 authorizing  
3           construction of a liquefied natural gas  
4           facility.

5                       Most of you are familiar with  
6           POWER and are aware that we represent  
7           more than 30,000 people. We fight for  
8           racial, economic, and environmental  
9           justice. POWER is also a member of the  
10          No LNG Coalition, a group that includes  
11          30 organizations across the City. You've  
12          heard from us and our allies over the  
13          past few weeks on the need for the City  
14          to plan for a just transition to use  
15          renewable energy to heat buildings across  
16          Philadelphia. We're grateful to City  
17          Councilpersons Helen Gym and Curtis Jones  
18          for committing to vote no on the LNG  
19          project. We need that kind of leadership  
20          in a time of climate emergency. We hope  
21          that other members of Council will join  
22          them.

23                      The question of whether we as a  
24          city should be investing in new fossil  
25          fuel infrastructure should no longer be

3           should instead and must be about how we  
4           equitably, justly, and quickly transition  
5           away from fossil fuels to ensure that our  
6           city, our children, and our future have  
7           healthy air and water, a liveable  
8           climate, and sacred land to live upon.

9           The conversation must move away  
10          from pitting labor against the health and  
11          well-being of humanity and instead  
12          rethink how we respond to the climate  
13          crisis together.

14          The climate crisis is  
15          exacerbating racial inequality and  
16          already harming our communities. To  
17          quote Reverend Holston, we are bringing a  
18          watering can to a house fire. We need a  
19          comprehensive and urgent approach to this  
20          problem, and we need it now.

21          Transitions are always painful,  
22          but they can also create opportunities to  
23          re-envision our future. And we don't  
24          have to just dream. We can look at other  
25          cities that have done it.

2                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Ms. Wolfe?

3                   MS. WOLFE: Commit to this  
4 conversation. You'll be hearing from us  
5 more in the future, and please oppose  
6 this facility.

7                   Thank you.

8                   (Applause.)

9                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I think  
10 it's important that I amplify and  
11 underscore the request made very  
12 graciously of President Clarke.  
13 Everybody has a voice. Everyone will  
14 have their say. Let's be fair with the  
15 two minutes that he has requested of all  
16 of us.

17                   Chief Clerk.

18                   CHIEF CLERK: Mark Clincy.

19                   MR. CLINCY: Thank you. I  
20 thank City Council for allowing me to be  
21 here today. My name is Mark Clincy, a  
22 member of Philly Thrive and a resident of  
23 South Philadelphia. Some of you have  
24 already heard what I had to say, but you  
25 haven't listened, which is why I'm back

2           here today.

3                       This is a very important issue.

4           We don't want the LNG plant in South

5           Philadelphia. Many of you may know that

6           there is a polluting oil refinery in

7           South Philadelphia, the Philadelphia

8           Energy Solutions. This LNG plant may not

9           pollute as much as the refinery, but

10          adding additional pollution in the area

11          is way too much.

12                       Like the refinery, the LNG

13          plant will contribute to climate change.

14          We already see the greenhouse effect at

15          play with hotter summer days and worse

16          air quality, which makes it hard for many

17          in Philly and beyond.

18                       South Philly has been forced to

19          shoulder the burden of fossil fuel

20          infrastructure in this city, and we're

21          getting the short end of the stick. We

22          shouldn't have to take on the impacts of

23          another facility.

24                       This doesn't mean we can't have

25          jobs. We want well-paying green jobs for

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           all, not jobs that contribute to climate  
3           change.

4                     A lot of jobs have moved away  
5           from the City to the suburbs, and my  
6           community has been left behind. PGW  
7           needs to transition away from fossil  
8           fuels to renewable energy. This  
9           transition of PGW must include a plan to  
10          protect current jobs and create new jobs  
11          for people in my community who can't find  
12          work.

13                    An important piece of this  
14          conversation is cost of utilities. I  
15          know PGW wants to keep it affordable for  
16          ratepayers, but natural gas and fossil  
17          fuels is not the solution to this.

18                    COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:

19          Mr. Clincy?

20                    MR. CLINCY: Yes.

21                    COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: We want to  
22          thank you for your comprehensive  
23          assessment of the issue. Your two  
24          minutes are up. We need to move on.

25                    MR. CLINCY: Okay.

2                   (Applause.)

3           CHIEF CLERK: Also commenting  
4 on 181063-A, in this order, please  
5 approach the podium: Marta Guttenberg,  
6 Lisa Hastings, Nate Holt, Danny Bauder,  
7 Craig White, Ryan Boyer, and Greg  
8 Holston.

9                   Marta Guttenberg will be first.

10                   (Witness approached podium.)

11           MS. GUTTENBERG: Good  
12 afternoon. Like the people with me and  
13 standing behind me, I'm here to ask City  
14 Council to do its job and protect the  
15 people who live and breathe in  
16 Philadelphia.

17                   (Applause.)

18           MS. GUTTENBERG: Some of you  
19 may have heard the news today from  
20 Washington that the first responders to  
21 9/11, who had to live and breathe the  
22 destruction of the Twin Towers, are over  
23 these decades getting sick and not being  
24 cared for. I want to suggest to you that  
25 the experience that we have living and

2           breathing here in Philadelphia as more  
3           and more things are burned that shouldn't  
4           be burned is a kind of 9/11 first  
5           responder experience in slow motion.

6                         Washington stepped up and said,  
7           yup, we'll find some money to take care  
8           of you guys. I'm hoping that City  
9           Council will step up and say, right,  
10          first we're going to not harm you  
11          further, and we're going to oppose the  
12          LNG plant, and we're going to fund your  
13          care.

14                        Thank you.

15                        (Applause.)

16                        CHIEF CLERK: Lisa Hastings.

17                        (Witness approached podium.)

18                        MS. HASTINGS: Good afternoon.

19           I'm Lisa Hastings.

20                        I oppose the LNG deal because  
21           the very valid environmental concerns and  
22           for some other reasons. As was the case  
23           when I opposed selling PGW a few years  
24           ago, I want the City to retain full  
25           control over the direction of PGW and our

2           city's future. This includes retaining  
3           the ability to make improvements without  
4           being hampered by inflexible long-term  
5           agreements with private parties.

6                        My belief then and now is that  
7           public elected officials like you would  
8           be much more likely to make decisions for  
9           PGW and the rest of us based on the  
10          entire public interest rather than on  
11          short-term profits. You have the chance  
12          to make such a decision now by voting  
13          this project down.

14                       The LNG bill would commit the  
15          City to increase the commercial fossil  
16          fuel footprint in Philadelphia for 25  
17          years, even if much better, much cleaner,  
18          and more lucrative alternatives become  
19          possible. The City -- there's no escape  
20          clause in this deal, so the City is stuck  
21          with it for 25 years.

22                       With the ever-increasing rate  
23          of technological innovation and the  
24          urgency of climate change, 25 years is a  
25          very long time. If you approve this

2           project, you will also be inhibiting PGW  
3           and the City's ability to adopt new  
4           energy sources when they come available.

5                     Thank you.

6                     (Applause.)

7                     CHIEF CLERK: Nate Holt.

8                     (Witness approached podium.)

9                     MR. HOLT: I want to talk about  
10           this liquefied natural gas plant. If you  
11           approve this project and you vote for  
12           this bill, that is a direct attack on  
13           this city's desire for a green new deal.

14                     (Applause.)

15                     MR. HOLT: City Councilmembers  
16           talk a lot about addressing poverty and  
17           creating jobs, and nothing does that  
18           better than a green new deal.

19                     (Applause.)

20                     MR. HOLT: If you're not for a  
21           green new deal, stop talking about how  
22           you want to create jobs. Stop.

23                     No matter what the carbon  
24           footprint of the LNG plant is itself, the  
25           extraction of the gas that it processes

2           and the burning of it after it is sold  
3           off will produce millions of tons of  
4           greenhouse gases that will pollute our  
5           environment.

6                        It was rainy a bit this morning  
7           and it will be rainy later tonight, and  
8           there's four days of rain in next week's  
9           forecast. 2018 was the second rainiest  
10          year in Philadelphia's history. Three of  
11          the four rainiest years in Philadelphia  
12          history have been in the last eight  
13          years. If you don't believe climate  
14          change is real, then your eyes are not  
15          open.

16                        (Applause.)

17                        MR. HOLT: When in 25 years or  
18          30 years we look at our children, our  
19          grandchildren, we need to ask ourselves  
20          whether we did everything we could to  
21          help them, as food systems collapse all  
22          over the world and as a billion refugees  
23          need to be relocated due to the horrors  
24          of climate change that scientists tell us  
25          will happen. And you can say I hope it

2           won't happen or it's all a bunch of  
3           noise, it's all clickbait, but when this  
4           many scientists tell you all over the  
5           world, it's like worrying about whether  
6           the sun is going to set tonight or rise  
7           this morning. It's real. It's going to  
8           happen.

9                         History will reflect your  
10           record today. Please vote no.

11                         (Applause.)

12                         CHIEF CLERK: Danny Bauder.

13                         (Witness approached podium.)

14                         MR. BAUDER: Good afternoon.

15           I'm Danny Bauder and I am very proud to  
16           serve the 150,000 union members in  
17           Philadelphia as Campaign Manager of the  
18           Philadelphia Council AFL-CIO. Council  
19           President and members of Council, I'm  
20           here in support of Bill No. 181063-A  
21           introduced by Councilmember Green.

22                         Our city is very, very  
23           fortunate to own, to wholly own, an asset  
24           like the Philadelphia Gas Works. Not  
25           many cities can say that they have an

2           asset like PGW that the City and the  
3           citizens own themselves. It's one of the  
4           things that makes Philadelphia so unique  
5           and so great.

6                         Unfortunately, this is an asset  
7           that requires a great deal of investment  
8           for maintenance and repair. Thankfully,  
9           we have an opportunity today to make an  
10          investment in maintenance, to make an  
11          investment in infrastructure, to make an  
12          investment in those repairs by supporting  
13          181063-A.

14                        This project to export liquid  
15          natural gas is a win-win for our city.  
16          We're able to export a much-needed  
17          product and in return raise revenue for  
18          infrastructure repair and for the  
19          maintenance of PGW, our asset.

20                        The addition of a solar array  
21          at the Passyunk project site makes this  
22          the perfect public-private partnership  
23          that will be entirely carbon neutral.

24                        I want to thank all of the  
25          members of Council who have supported

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           this project from the jump. To those  
3           members of the Gas Commission who already  
4           voted in favor of it and to those voting  
5           today for the first time, I implore you  
6           to support this bill, support an  
7           investment in infrastructure, and support  
8           good union jobs.

9                     Thank you.

10                    (Applause.)

11                    CHIEF CLERK: Craig White.

12                    (Witness approached podium.)

13                    MR. WHITE: Good morning. My  
14           name is Craig White. I'm President and  
15           CEO of the Philadelphia Gas Works, and I  
16           want to thank Council President and  
17           members of Council for giving me this  
18           opportunity today to discuss our project.

19                    Certainly we heard you loud and  
20           clear five years ago when the company was  
21           not sold and the decision was made to  
22           retain Philadelphia Gas Works, and the  
23           message that we received was that we had  
24           to do more with that asset. We had to  
25           create revenue streams that could support

2           our growing low-income population.

3                       As you all know, we're the

4           largest city, we're the only city with a

5           population over a million that has as

6           many poor families as we do. And this

7           LNG project is a tremendous project in

8           that it is a public-private partnership.

9           It has, as the last gentleman said, it

10          has very few carbon emissions. To equate

11          that to something that's more

12          understandable, it's equivalent to about

13          seven homes in the City of Philadelphia.

14          So you build seven new homes, you have

15          the equivalent amount of emissions as

16          this LNG facility. And we are

17          budgeted -- we have budgeted and we filed

18          with the Philadelphia Gas Commission for

19          a solar array that would make carbon

20          emissions at that facility a net zero.

21                       In addition to that, we're not

22          talking about work that Philadelphia Gas

23          Works has not done. We've been doing

24          this for over 50 years. Matter of fact,

25          the gentlemen sitting over here to my

2           right, many of them have over 30 years,  
3           35 years at our LNG plants, working this  
4           facility, and providing this asset to not  
5           only citizens of Philadelphia but  
6           citizens around the region.

7                        So anyway, the red light has  
8           come on. I want to thank you very much  
9           for your positive vote.

10                      Thank you.

11                      (Applause.)

12                      CHIEF CLERK: Ryan Boyer.

13                      (No response.)

14                      CHIEF CLERK: Ryan Boyer.

15                      (No response.)

16                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not  
17           here.

18                      CHIEF CLERK: Greg Holston.

19                      (Witness approached podium.)

20                      REVEREND HOLSTON: My name is  
21           Reverend Gregory Holston. I'm the  
22           Executive Director of POWER. POWER is 83  
23           congregations across the City of  
24           Philadelphia and the surrounding areas.

25                      POWER has stand and has stood

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           with workers around this city over the  
3           last ten years. We have gotten arrested.  
4           We have marched in snow, sleet, and rain  
5           to make sure that workers had rights, to  
6           support the rights of workers and support  
7           them to have more and more jobs in the  
8           City.

9                         So when POWER stands up and  
10           says to all of you here, this is about  
11           the health of our city and not about  
12           jobs, we have a jobs record to stand on.

13                         (Applause.)

14                         REVEREND HOLSTON: As a pastor  
15           in the City, I've been in South  
16           Philadelphia. I started my career there.  
17           I grew up in South Philadelphia. For  
18           years they told us that plant in South  
19           Philadelphia, that refinery, was only  
20           emitting steam. For years they told us  
21           there was no carbon emissions. For years  
22           they told us our health was not in  
23           danger. Yet over and over, cancer after  
24           cancer after cancer can be found in that  
25           same community. How long are you going

2           to rely on the natural gas people to tell  
3           you that it is carbon neutral when  
4           they've had a history of not sharing that  
5           or not really doing that? It's been  
6           exactly the opposite in this city.

7                       How many children -- we've  
8           talked about it already. How many  
9           children, how many families, how many  
10          children are going to have asthma? How  
11          many children are going to have disease?  
12          How many children, how many people are  
13          going to suffer weird cancers and have to  
14          be buried again by the pastor in the  
15          community, wondering what's happening to  
16          their people?

17                      I'm here to tell you to vote  
18          no. Vote no because you don't know.

19                      (Applause.)

20                      REVEREND HOLSTON: Vote no  
21          because you don't really know what the  
22          truth is. Vote no for a safer  
23          Philadelphia. Vote no for the 21st  
24          century that we really want for this  
25          city.

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3           Thank you.

4                   (Applause.)

5                   CHIEF CLERK: Francho Robinson.

6                   (No response.)

7                   CHIEF CLERK: Francho Robinson.

8                   (No response.)

9                   CHIEF CLERK: Joe Cox,  
10           commenting on 180936.

11                   (Witness approached podium.)

12                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
13           afternoon.

14                   MR. COX: Good afternoon.

15                   LNG, new contracts with gas.

16           Have you heard the stories? I think it's  
17           clear you haven't. The stories of those  
18           living near LNG, the people being  
19           affected, the kids. If you did, the  
20           bill, would it ever have been dropped?

21                   Think about the kids when you  
22           vote. Not only in this decision that  
23           shouldn't have come to this point but to  
24           any legislation. Think about the most  
25           vulnerable.

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   Gas plants, lead buildings,  
3       burning trash, underfunded libraries and  
4       schools, where does your moral compass  
5       lie?

6                   I hope the deal hasn't already  
7       been made. No LNG, no lead buildings, no  
8       burning trash, fully fund the libraries,  
9       15 million.

10                  Thank you.

11                  (Applause.)

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13       George Gould.

14                  (Witness approached podium.)

15                  MR. GOULD: Thank you. My name  
16       is George Gould. I'm an attorney at  
17       Community Legal Services. I'm here to  
18       discuss Bill No. 180936. It's an  
19       extremely important bill, which would  
20       amend the lead-safe ordinance in  
21       Philadelphia.

22                  We had been told this bill got  
23       out of committee, and we have been told  
24       that this bill was going to come up for a  
25       vote today for final passage. We were

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           very excited about it, but instead we  
3           have been told by the Councilwoman  
4           Reynolds Brown's office there are a  
5           variety of reasons why this is  
6           indefinitely delayed.

7                     The first, we're told we want  
8           to reach a middle ground. Lead  
9           poisoning, you cannot reach a middle  
10          ground. Twenty-two hundred kids every  
11          year in this city get lead poisoned.

12                    The problem with the existing  
13          bill, it's not effective. The bill that  
14          is up for final vote in City Council is  
15          effective and it needs to get passed.

16                    We're also told there needs to  
17          be more discussions. There have been 18  
18          months of discussions. We have talked  
19          endlessly about this bill and the need  
20          for it.

21                    Today we get a memo saying that  
22          there needs to be some type of meeting in  
23          July about enforcement of the new  
24          provisions. Well, when this bill got  
25          passed, I personally talked to the

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           Commissioner Perri of L&I and  
3           Commissioner Farley of the Health  
4           Department, and they both agreed to a  
5           procedure that would clearly enforce this  
6           bill.

7                     Interesting, over a million  
8           dollars has been allocated to landlords  
9           that will abate lead-based paint, but  
10          nothing is happening to help the actual  
11          tenants.

12                    Finally, I'd like to thank  
13          Helen Gym for getting passed in the  
14          budget 1.5 million in the legal defense  
15          fund.

16                    Thank you.

17                    (Applause.)

18                    CHIEF CLERK: The remaining  
19          five speakers on the public comment list,  
20          in this order, please approach the  
21          podium: Ogbonna Hagins.

22                    (No response.)

23                    CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna Hagins.

24                    (No response.)

25                    CHIEF CLERK: Ruth Vincent.

2                   (No response.)

3                   CHIEF CLERK: Ruth Vincent,  
4           Meenal Raval, Tiffany Green, and Joe  
5           Danihel.

6                   Ogbonna Hagins will be first.

7                   (No response.)

8                   CHIEF CLERK: Ruth Vincent,  
9           please approach the podium.

10                   MS. VINCENT-WASHINGTON: Good  
11           afternoon, all. My name is Pastor Ruth  
12           Vincent-Washington. I stand before you  
13           representing the First Haitian Church of  
14           God and our Haitian community.

15                   This vote passing is important  
16           because we've been in existence now for  
17           40 years and have been a strong support  
18           to our fellow Haitian community as well  
19           as the community itself. We've been able  
20           to support our community emotionally,  
21           spiritually, financially, and socially.  
22           We've created a sense of self and  
23           self-validation in a world that is so  
24           judgmental for our people.

25                   If I can quote a verse, I would

2           like to say what Paul said in 2  
3           Corinthians 5: Therefore, if anyone is  
4           in Christ, he is a new creature. The old  
5           has gone. The new has come.

6                         Knowing our position in Christ  
7           solves all identity issues. This  
8           creature remains evident for us, because  
9           First Haitian assists our people in  
10          filling a sense of belong, a sense of  
11          self, giving them the self-confidence  
12          that they need to understand that they  
13          can do all things and anything is  
14          possible in a society where we are looked  
15          upon in such a negative lens. They're  
16          empowered by knowing that all things are  
17          possible as long as they believe.

18                        Within our congregation and our  
19          community, we have such greatness that  
20          comes from it. For example, we have  
21          pastors, doctors, lawyers, nurses,  
22          teachers, entrepreneurs from a Haitian  
23          community, if I can name a few. Our  
24          church has not only been able to service  
25          our Haitian people, but we are now and

2           have become a liaison for the community  
3           to help all different ethnicities.

4                     Please consider this and keep  
5           us in mind as you make your decision  
6           today knowing that we as Haitian people,  
7           we contribute to the brotherly love that  
8           this city exemplifies and talks about.

9                     Thank you.

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

12                     (Applause.)

13                    CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval.

14                     (Witness approached podium.)

15                    MS. RAVAL: Good afternoon. I  
16           am Meenal Raval and I'm giving up my  
17           right to speak for a moment to Sabirah  
18           Mahmud, a 16-year-old.

19                     (Witness approached podium.)

20                    MS. MAHMUD: Hello. My name is  
21           Sabirah Mahmud and I'm speaking on the  
22           Bill 181063-A. I'm a 16-year-old  
23           student, activist, and community member  
24           here in Philadelphia; more specifically,  
25           in University City. Today my friend,

2           Enya, and I represent the U.S. Youth  
3           Climate Strike and the youth of this  
4           country and this city.

5                   As we gather here today to vote  
6           on these bills and discover whether or  
7           not we should vote yes to the LNG plant,  
8           the communities I represent strongly  
9           oppose to this. This is because of the  
10          fact we are in a state of a climate  
11          emergency and this bill introduced by  
12          Councilmember Green takes us into the  
13          wrong direction. The reason I say this  
14          is because us, the youth of this country,  
15          are going to experience terrible  
16          consequences of this plant.

17                   I want to tell you all a story.  
18          I have a classmate of mine who runs. As  
19          my school is in South Philly, where this  
20          plant is to be put, he runs around the  
21          area along with his Students Run Philly  
22          Style group. However, as he suffers from  
23          asthma, he almost lost his life from  
24          running in this area where we lack the  
25          air quality we strongly deserve and need.

2           The fact this plant is even in discussion  
3           puts us, the youth, in risk of  
4           life-threatening situations, as my  
5           classmate was in.

6                     If you are in this room, think  
7           of your children, your nieces, nephews,  
8           and grandchildren. This LNG plant will  
9           affect them as well. I have a  
10          six-year-old sister and I would not want  
11          her to be affected in this way. If you  
12          are in favor for the future of the City  
13          and this country, please vote no. And to  
14          those who have committed to voting no, I  
15          thank you for voting in favor of our  
16          children. Our students and children do  
17          not deserve to have this plant. They do  
18          not deserve the air quality to be at  
19          risk. They deserve a clean future.

20                    Thank you.

21                    (Applause.)

22                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23           Thank you for your testimony.

24                    CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green.

25                    MS. RAVAL: I just want to

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           speak on two other bills.

3                     (Witness approached podium.)

4                     MS. GREEN: I'm going to make  
5           this quick. Tiffany Green.

6                     I'm speaking on Bill 190449, I  
7           believe it is, regarding the balconies.

8                     We asked for -- this bill was  
9           inside our housing conformity bill to  
10          stop the three-story houses in our  
11          community, and because a developer said  
12          that if they ban the three-story bill,  
13          three-story mansions that's being built  
14          in our community, then construction would  
15          shut down. How dare you pull our bill,  
16          Councilman Johnson, off the list because  
17          a certain developer made this warning?

18                    At this point that -- I want to  
19          talk about the treatment of black  
20          community. This is plantation politics.  
21          I don't have time for plantation politics  
22          no more. The thing about this at this  
23          point -- and then when it comes to new  
24          development, you're putting the black  
25          community on the back. It's okay for a

1           6/13/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2        developer -- I mean, for a shopping  
3        center to take millions of dollars from  
4        the black community and continue support,  
5        but when it comes down to meetings  
6        regarding discussing the details of the  
7        zoning, we're left out on the plantation.  
8        You don't feel that we're worthy enough,  
9        intelligent enough to deal with this.

10                 This is not right. You're not  
11        going to continue treating the black  
12        community like this. We want our bill.  
13        Now that you pull our bill off the list,  
14        we have to go through the rest of the  
15        year or the rest of the summer like lambs  
16        being slaughtered while they go to our  
17        blocks and build these five-story  
18        mansions. How could you sit there, City  
19        Council, and allow them to do this?

20                 Councilwoman Blondell,  
21        Councilwoman Bass, all of you talk about  
22        you are champions for children, but  
23        nobody asked what happened to the  
24        community. We talk about jobs and about  
25        new development. Do you ask how many

10          sat here and voted for a bill and passed

11          it through for a luxury complex. You

12          know that's a luxury complex being put in

13          our shopping center. And the reality is,

14          we deserve our five-story -- stop them

15          five-story mansions.

16                         Since June 2012, we have asked

17          for that bill, and we have not gotten it.

18          It is now June 2019 and we're still being

19          bombarded with these three-story

20          mansions.

21                         This is plantation politics.

22                         (Microphone turned off.)

15                   Every week, Council, Mayor,  
16   Governor, and others transfer private  
17   property to the government, probably  
18   illegally.

19                   Consent of the Governor is  
20   required to be proved before you act.  
21   Did the Governor ask you to deny or  
22   restrict public comment at City Council  
23   meetings? Did the Governor approve theft  
24   of my home, theft of my just  
25   compensation? Did the Governor approve

10                    Why hasn't the Attorney General  
11           investigated and prosecuted my numerous  
12           complaints?

13                    The constitutions require  
14           immediate remedy of this breach of law,

17           to act or face prison.

18                    42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
19           1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA  
20           Constitution, Sections 1 through 28; 26  
21           PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709, 711, 712, 713,  
22           716, 902, and other laws listed in SCOTUS

25                   MR. WALKER: I'm Matt Walker.

2           I'm the Advocacy Director with Clean Air  
3           Council. Clean Air Council has testified  
4           a number of times before various  
5           committees of Philadelphia City Council  
6           raising a number of issues with Liberty  
7           Energy Trust's proposed LNG plant. Those  
8           issues have still not been addressed and,  
9           therefore, the Council must again urge  
10          members of City Council to complete their  
11          due diligence before voting on the PGW  
12          LNG plant.

13                    City Council should determine  
14          how this LNG plant will advance the  
15          City's climate goals, of reducing  
16          greenhouse gases by 80 percent by 2050.  
17          In addition, before voting on this LNG  
18          plant, City Council must evaluate whether  
19          it will conform to the long-term  
20          sustainability plan for PGW.

21                    It is clear that neither  
22          Councilmembers nor the public have all  
23          the information necessary to make a  
24          well-informed decision. So this vote  
25          should not occur until after City Council

2           has complete answers to the following:

3                     One, an accounting of the  
4           diesel exhaust reductions claimed by the  
5           LNG plant, including the locations of  
6           sites that currently use diesel fuel that

9           change impacts from leaks of methane, a  
10          potent greenhouse gas, from additional  
11          equipment and additional throughput at  
12          the plant.

13                    Three, an analysis of  
14          non-fossil fuel alternatives to achieve  
15          similar economic and jobs goals.

16                    Four, benefits to low-income  
17          ratepayers.

18                    Five, benefits to the  
19          environmental justice community being  
20          asked to host this facility.

21                    Six, analysis of upstream and  
22          downstream greenhouse gas emissions.

23                    It is disingenuous for PGW to  
24          claim that this facility will have net  
25          zero emissions when it has not received

2           funding for the solar array to power the  
3           operations. It's also disingenuous that  
4           PGW would claim that the equipment would  
5           not emit methane emissions. No plant  
6           like this would plan to emit methane on

9           it would still leak or boil off --

11           you can wrap it up.

12                    MR. WALKER: -- vaporizer,  
13           trucking loading equipment, or other

17           it was faster than two minutes to me.

18                    And there hasn't been any  
19           attempt to estimate the methane leaks or  
20           address them.

18                    Every area of our land in  
19          Philadelphia is being monetized, our  
20          Fairmount Park. Whoever is the head of  
21          that committee, check. It's being

23                    I enjoy our city. I'm a native  
24          of this city. I enjoy all the good  
25          things, but I cannot discount all of the

17          colleagues to support this bill. I want  
18          to say a few words about where we are,  
19          where do we need to go, how we got there,  
20          and how this project fits.

21                   The early effects of climate  
22          change are already with us, and  
23          countries, especially the United States,  
24          have already polluted enough to lock in  
25          further negative change. We know that to

3           swiftly away from reliance on extracted  
4           fossil fuel. We also know that an  
5           equitable plan to do that must balance

10                         In the absence of leadership  
11           from the federal government, state  
12           General Assembly, that responsibility  
13           falls entirely, at least for now, to the  
14           City of Philadelphia. With its limitless  
15           human potential but obvious economic  
16           needs and definitely limited financial  
17           resources, we must take action.

18                         This body has already taken  
19           action. Last year, through the  
20           leadership of Councilmember Blondell  
21           Reynolds Brown, this body worked with the  
22           Philadelphia Energy Authority to do a  
23           solar initiative with Community Solar  
24           that will provide 20 percent of our  
25           municipal energy spend in Adams County

3           largest solar array in Pennsylvania.

4                     Just this Monday in the Finance  
5           Committee, we voted out the CPACE, or the

9           buildings to invest solar on their  
10          buildings.

11                    For the most part, and I think  
12          most people do know this, but for those  
13          who do not, the majority of our climate  
14          change comes from commercial,  
15          residential, industrial buildings. So  
16          the energy that we use to operate City  
17          Hall, to operate our homes come from  
18          carbon dioxide emissions, and the  
19          legislation that we voted out of the  
20          Finance Committee on Monday that had  
21          first reading today and hopefully final  
22          passage next week shows our work towards  
23          addressing that large aspect of climate  
24          change.

25                    But we know that Philadelphia

3           plan. In April, the Transportation and  
4           Public Utilities Committee heard initial

10          are not a blueprint.

11                         Fortunately, due to the  
12          leadership of the Office of  
13          Sustainability under the leadership of  
14          Christine Knapp and the work of PGW, the  
15          Bloomberg Foundation has awarded the City  
16          money and technical assistance to study  
17          diversifying the products that PGW  
18          offers.

19                         Even with the ongoing effort to  
20          review how their business model can  
21          evolve, there must be a broader  
22          conversation about how the City proceeds.  
23          I intend to continue to convene all  
24          stakeholders in a fair process to build a  
25          shared vision and craft an equitable plan

3           change.

4                     In the meantime, PGW took as  
5           instructions the opportunities laid out  
6           in the report that this Council used to  
7           determine not to sell PGW. And prior to

10          spent almost nine months looking at the  
11          sale of PGW. Based on a review and  
12          analysis, the net result to the City  
13          would have been about \$200 million. And  
14          so we've decided that we did not want to  
15          sell PGW, and so we put to PGW, as Craig  
16          White said earlier, let's look at other  
17          alternatives regarding liquefied natural  
18          gas.

19                    PGW has been looking at LNG for  
20          some time. Going back to March of 2012,  
21          they engaged Pace Global to do a market  
22          study and also a review of supply chain  
23          economics regarding LNG. In 2012, PGW  
24          also had a pilot program of sales of LNG.

25                    In June of 2015, they issued a

3           doing LNG along with Pace Global.

4                     In January 2016, they engaged  
5           Public Financial Management to do an  
6           independent review of the possibility of

10                    In September of 2017, PGW did a  
11           memorandum of understanding with  
12           proposers that were selected by PGW to  
13           develop LNG, and that was with the  
14           Liberty Energy Trust in September 2017.

15                    In June of 2018, the  
16           Philadelphia Facilities Management  
17           Corporation Board approved this proposal.

18                    In fall of 2018, the  
19           Philadelphia Gas Commission, which I  
20           chair, completed our review, and we voted  
21           upon this on December 4th of 2018.

22                    In the winter of 2018, we took  
23           additional conversations, and in December  
24           6th of last year, this bill was  
25           introduced into City Council.

2                   On February 27th of this year,  
3           the Transportation and Public Utilities  
4           Committee voted out this bill, and on  
5           March 28th of this year, we had briefings

9           Energy paying to create a new liquefier  
10          to be operated by PGW employees at the  
11          existing Passyunk plant. The liquefied  
12          natural gas from Liberty would be  
13          responsible and has the best business  
14          case in offsetting the local consumption  
15          of dirtier oil and coal. This carries  
16          effectively no risk to the City of  
17          Philadelphia. The deal would guarantee  
18          one million in non-ratepayer dollars to  
19          PGW, which is otherwise severely  
20          restricted by the state PUC in how it  
21          spends money.

22                  We all know that the City has  
23          the highest level of poverty for any big  
24          city in the nation at 26 percent, and  
25          this additional non-ratepayer dollars can

3           the PGW may need at PUC. In addition, it  
4           will give us the resources to start to  
5           diversify and do different things with  
6           PGW. In addition, invest in some solar  
7           projects like the project that this body  
8           approved with the Philadelphia Energy  
9           Authority last year with Adams Solar and  
10          look at other ideas regarding renewables.

11                     In addition, on the desk of  
12          each member of Council, we looked at what  
13          would this proposal do compared to other  
14          facilities in the City of Philadelphia.  
15          We looked at the Philadelphia Energy  
16          Solutions' plant, which is the former  
17          Sunoco plant. That emits over 3.2  
18          million tons of carbon dioxide per year.  
19          This project would do two tons of carbon  
20          dioxide emissions per year. That's two  
21          versus 3.2 million.

22                     Now, we also pushed upon  
23          Liberty Energy Trust to come up with some  
24          additional ways to reduce that type of  
25          carbon dioxide emissions. They have been

2           talking with the Mayor, and on the  
3           Mayor's list for RCAP dollars with  
4           Governor Wolf is the dollars to do a  
5           solar array. If that solar array is  
6           approved -- and we're pushing hard for  
7           that array to be approved -- that will  
8           cause a net zero emissions at this plant.

9                     As Craig White talked about,  
10           even without the solar array, this is  
11           equivalent to seven new row homes in the  
12           City of Philadelphia. And hopefully  
13           we'll be able to get the solar array, and  
14           we'll continue to push upon the Wolf  
15           Administration so that would be approved.

16                     It also is worth noting that  
17           some of the ideas that were talked about  
18           at the April 27th hearing regarding green  
19           molecules and other ideas could possibly  
20           be processed at this facility.

21                     Now, today there was an e-mail  
22           that was sent out regarding  
23           communication. There was a long list of  
24           information that was sent out to members  
25           of Council. Councilmembers also received

11          sure and I continue to say that those

13          still need your advocacy. Without the  
14          national mobilization and international  
15          strategy proportionate to the task at  
16          hand, those advancing the position that  
17          everything possible must be done to  
18          reduce the supply and demand of fossil  
19          fuels are the warning signs that we all  
20          need to focus on to make a course  
21          correction.

22                         The merits of this project are  
23          where we differ. This project is a  
24          nearly net zero emissions project at the  
25          existing plant operated by current gas
