2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning. We're going to get started. If  
4 the members will take their seats and if  
5 any visitors will retire behind the rail,  
6 we can get started.

7                   Prior to us starting, I'd ask  
8 that if there's anyone that has a cell  
9 phone or any other electronic device that  
10 makes noise, I'd ask that you please turn  
11 it on silent or turn it off. Appreciate  
12 your cooperation.

13                   To give our invocation this  
14 morning, the Chair recognizes Bishop  
15 Garvin Floyd of Fellowship of Love Church  
16 of God. He is here today as the guest of  
17 Councilwoman Bass.

18                   I would ask all members,  
19 guests, and visitors to please rise.

20                   (Councilmembers, guests, and  
21 visitors rise.)

22                   BISHOP FLOYD: Let every heart  
23 pray.

24                   Father God, we come to you,  
25 creator and sustainer of life, ask you to

3                    God, you know what we stand in  
4           need of before we began to enter into  
5           this place, God.  God, we ask you to be

10                   Father, you said in your word  
11           in Proverbs 3:5 and 6 for us to lean not

15           everything - Lord, over our kids; Lord,  
16           over our streets; Lord, over this  
17           meeting, God.

18                   God, have your way in this  
19           place, oh God.  Keep us, guide us, and  
20           lead us that we will do things according  
21           to your will and not our will, oh God.

22                   Father, we realize, oh God, if  
23           it wasn't for you, where would we be, oh  
24           God.

25                   I ask you right know in the

19                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20           Thank you again.

21                     Folks, can I ask you to hold  
22           your voices down, please. Thank you.

23                     Our next order of business is  
24           the approval of the Journal of the  
25           meeting of Thursday, June 13, 2019, and

4                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
5           you, Mr. President. I move that the  
6           Journal of the meeting of Thursday, June  
7           13th, 2019 be approved.

8                   (Duly seconded.)

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10          Thank you. It has been moved and  
11          properly seconded that the Journal of the  
12          meeting of Thursday, June 13, 2019 stand  
13          approved.

14                   All those in favor say aye.

15                   (Aye.)

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17          Those opposed?

18                   (No response.)

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20          ayes have it, and that Journal is  
21          approved.

22                   Our next order of business is  
23          requests for leaves of absence, and the  
24          Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

25                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

2           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
3           majority, there are no requests of leave  
4           of absence today.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair thanks the gentleman.

7                   The Chair now recognizes  
8           Councilman O'Neill.

9                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
10          Mr. President. On behalf of the  
11          republicans, there are no requests for  
12          leave of absence.

13                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
14          Chair thanks the gentleman.

15                  At this time, I would like to  
16          take a moment to thank everyone that has  
17          taken time out of their busy day to  
18          witness their government in action. We  
19          genuinely appreciate you being here. We  
20          hope that your stay here today is a  
21          knowledgeable one but, more importantly,  
22          a pleasurable one, so much so that you  
23          come back again. So, again, thank you  
24          for being here.

25                  At this time, the Chair

7                         (Councilmembers and guests  
8           approached podium.)

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
10          joining Councilman Domb, we have  
11          Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman  
12          Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman Parker,  
13          Councilman Green, Councilman Oh,  
14          Councilman Henon, and Councilman Jones.

15                        COUNCILMAN DOMB: All members  
16          of Council have supported this resolution  
17          and you're all invited to come up, if  
18          you'd like.

19                        So today, Dave, on behalf of  
20          all members of City Council, we welcome  
21          you today. We also welcome your wife,  
22          Myrna, and your sister, Donna.

23                        And today I asked some of your  
24          colleagues in the media their opinion of  
25          you, and from Pat Loeb, she said fair,

2           caring, and a mensch, and that's after 35  
3           years, I understand, of a longstanding  
4           great relationship. Pretty amazing.

5                     And from Jake -- I'm calling  
6           you out, Jake. He said he's accurate.  
7           Really good. And from Hal, who is -- is  
8           Hal over here? Hal said to me -- I  
9           didn't know this -- you're a scratch  
10          golfer and a shortstop. Pretty amazing.  
11          And from all my members of Council who I  
12          spoke to about Dave Davies, the common  
13          comment from everyone was fair, honest,  
14          and accurate. I don't think you can get  
15          better than that.

16                    So today we're honoring and  
17          congratulating Dave Davies on his  
18          retirement from WHYI's news desk and  
19          recognizing his excellence in journalism.

20                    COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And  
21          whereas, after 37 years reporting on  
22          Philadelphia politics using facts versus  
23          sensationalism, currently with WHYI, Dave  
24          Davies is stepping away from his work at  
25          the news desk as a senior reporter;

2                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:  Whereas,  
3       Mr. Davies, throughout his tenure in  
4       Philadelphia political reporting, is  
5       known for his tenacious investigations  
6       and fair reporting;

7                   COUNCILMAN JONES:  Whereas,  
8       prior to his career at WHYY, Mr. Davies  
9       worked as a City Hall reporter for the  
10      Daily News for 19 years;

11                  COUNCILMAN OH:  Whereas,  
12      Mr. Davies also reported on City Hall  
13      with KYW News Radio;

14                  COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:  And  
15      whereas, Dave Davies epitomized what I  
16      call a possibility thinker.  Before he  
17      was a journalist, Mr. Davies was also a  
18      welder, a cab driver, a teacher as a  
19      young man finding his path in the City;

20                  COUNCILMAN HENON:  Whereas,  
21      Mr. Davies has covered many historic  
22      moments of Philadelphia politics; and

23                  COUNCILMAN GREEN:  Whereas,  
24      Mr. Davies has an unassailable reputation  
25      for fairness and excellence in journalism

2           with politicians on both side of the  
3           aisle;

4                        COUNCILMAN SQUILLA:   Whereas,  
5           Mr. Davies upholds and teaches the  
6           fundamentals of journalism in modern  
7           times by encouraging the most important  
8           fact of all, all reporters to check their  
9           facts and give voice to every side of an  
10          issue;

11                      COUNCILWOMAN GYM:   Whereas,  
12          Mr. Davies will continue his presence on  
13          WHYY's award-winning program, Fresh Air  
14          with Terry Gross;

15                      COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:   Now,  
16          therefore, be it resolved, by the City  
17          Council of Philadelphia that Dave Davies  
18          is honored and congratulated on his  
19          retirement from the news desk and for his  
20          excellent reporting on Philadelphia  
21          politics over the last nearly four  
22          decades.

23                      Congratulations.

24                      (Applause.)

25                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And

2           the Chair recognizes Mr. Davies for  
3           remarks.

4                       MR. DAVIES: Thank you, Council  
5           President. This is a little  
6           overwhelming. I want to thank Councilman  
7           Domb for the honor of this resolution and  
8           thank all of you who did not object when  
9           the voice vote was held. Appreciate  
10          that.

11                      I know from many years sitting  
12          at that press table that nobody wants a  
13          long speech on the last day before  
14          recess, so I will be brief.

15                      I want to say a couple of  
16          things, though, about this body and you  
17          members. One is that I really appreciate  
18          what you do; that is to say, the  
19          challenges that you face. The City has a  
20          lot of needs, and resources are always  
21          thin and the politics are tough and the  
22          policy questions are tough, and I  
23          appreciate the way that you grapple with  
24          them day in and day out, and I encourage  
25          you as you do that to think broadly,

2           think not just about what this piece of  
3           legislation does today, but how it fits  
4           in with the City's tax structure and the  
5           regulatory structure and the real  
6           abilities of government, and use all of  
7           that when you're thinking about where  
8           we're going.

9                        I also want to say that  
10           although people love to make fun of  
11           Philadelphia politicians, and we've had  
12           our moments for sure, people don't  
13           appreciate the procedures by which this  
14           body considers legislation are far more  
15           deliberative and transparent than you  
16           will find in legislative bodies  
17           elsewhere.

18                       In Washington, senators can  
19           anonymously put a hold on legislation.  
20           Anonymously. In Harrisburg, they can run  
21           through a piece of far-reaching  
22           consequential legislation in hours in the  
23           middle of the night. You remember what  
24           happened when the leadership of the  
25           Parking Authority changed hands back in,

2           what was that, 2003? It happens.

3                     That doesn't happen here,  
4           right? You introduce a bill. There is a  
5           hearing. It is advertised. When it is  
6           enacted, it must be read in final form at  
7           least twice a week in succession,  
8           typically three times. And I think it's  
9           a little messy and it takes a little  
10          longer, but I have seen over years and  
11          years of covering this body that it  
12          results in better legislation, and I  
13          think people should know that.

14                    I also just want to say that I  
15          think it's a good thing that unlike some  
16          national figures, you don't mock those  
17          who cover you as purveyors of fake news  
18          or enemies of the people. You know that  
19          by and large the people who cover you  
20          believe in the City, work hard, and want  
21          to get it right. And so I think it will  
22          take your best efforts and their best  
23          efforts to ensure that democracy  
24          continues in the City and that local  
25          government is responsive.

2                   So I want to wish you good  
3 judgment, good staff, good partners in  
4 Harrisburg -- fingers crossed on that,  
5 right -- and a good national economy,  
6 because it makes things so much better  
7 here.

8                   I've lived here for 44 years.  
9 I mean, since Frank Rizzo was Mayor and  
10 Joan Krajewski occupied Councilman  
11 Henon's seat. So I've been around a  
12 while, and I'm still here, and what you  
13 do will be of interest and consequence to  
14 me, and so I will continue to follow it  
15 and I wish you all good luck, and thank  
16 you again for this honor.

17                   (Applause.)

18                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you.

20                   Council will be at ease.

21                   (Council at ease.)

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you and, again, congratulations.

24                   At this time, the Chair  
25 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger, who

7                         (Councilmembers and guests  
8           approached podium.)

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
10          joining Councilman Taubenberger, we have  
11          Councilwoman Cherelle Parker, Councilman  
12          Domb, Councilman O'Neill.

13                        COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:  
14          Council President, thank you for  
15          recognizing me.

16                        This also is a special honor,  
17          because it's part of the Philadelphia  
18          story. As a child of immigrants coming  
19          from a place where there was really at  
20          that time no freedom, no one could speak  
21          up, no one would dare demonstrate, it  
22          means a lot to me to honor any  
23          serviceman, because this freedom isn't  
24          free. The Taubenberger family knows that  
25          firsthand. Coming from Germany in the

2           1930s, there was nothing said about  
3           freedom. No one spoke up. No one could  
4           speak up in fear of your lives.

5                     Honoring and recognizing Jim  
6           Donnelly for his service in the United  
7           States Navy.

8                     COUNCILMAN DOMB: The Council  
9           of the City of Philadelphia is pleased  
10          and proud to honor and recognize Jim  
11          Donnelly for his loyal and dedicated  
12          service to our country.

13                    COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And  
14          whereas, Jim Donnelly has served our  
15          country by enabling the United States  
16          military to perform its functions  
17          overseas and at home by providing a wide  
18          range of services for the communities  
19          where he has been stationed; and

20                    COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,  
21          each serviceperson knows that they risk  
22          their lives in battle, and in every war  
23          there are acts of extraordinary courage  
24          where an individual goes beyond what is  
25          expected to avert conflict, save lives,

2           or otherwise achieve a mission. The acts  
3           of those individuals through feats of  
4           courage, nobility of purpose, or  
5           life-risking situations make them true  
6           heroes, and we proudly call Jim Donnelly  
7           a hero;

8                        COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: On a  
9           point of personal privilege, Mr. Donnelly  
10          was in Vietnam not once but twice.  
11          That's something that's very important to  
12          know.

13                       Therefore, by virtue of this  
14          citation, the Council of the City of  
15          Philadelphia does hereby honor and  
16          recognize Jim Donnelly for his loyal and  
17          dedicated service to our country. With  
18          appreciation, we extend the sincere  
19          respect and admiration of this  
20          legislative body.

21                       Mr. Donnelly, congratulations.  
22                       (Applause.)

23                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
24          the Chair recognizes Mr. Donnelly for  
25          remarks.

2                   MR. DONNELLY: Thank you so  
3 much, everybody. I first would like to  
4 thank President Clarke and  
5 Mr. Taubenberger for nominating me and  
6 the rest of the City Councilpeople for

8                   I did my service. I loved  
9 every minute of it, believe it or not. I  
10 went back for more. Seventy years old,  
11 still standing here, and I think I'm  
12 going to stay a little longer. So thank  
13 you so much for allowing me to be here.  
14 Appreciate it.

15                   (Applause.)

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17 Council will be at ease.

18                   COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: And  
19 also Mrs. Donnelly. There's always  
20 somebody behind the commander-in-chief,  
21 and in this case Mr. Donnelly is a very  
22 lucky man, Mrs. Donnelly.

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25 Thank you. Council will be at ease.

9           and Planning," to revise certain  
10          provisions of Chapter 14-600, entitled  
11          "Use Regulations," by amending standards  
12          for accessory dwelling units and making  
13          related changes; and

14                    An ordinance amending Title 14  
15          of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
16          "Zoning and Planning," to revise certain  
17          provisions of Chapter 14-800, entitled  
18          "Parking and Loading," by amending  
19          parking standards for historically  
20          designated properties; and

21                    An ordinance amending Title 14  
22          of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
23          "Zoning and Planning," to revise certain  
24          provisions of Chapter 14-600, entitled  
25          "Use Regulations," by amending use

11                      COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

13          Regulations," by creating the use  
14          category "Smoking Lounge" and related  
15          changes.

16                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17          Referred to committee.

18                       CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance  
19          amending Title 16 of The Philadelphia  
20          Code, entitled "Public Property," to  
21          provide for the availability of a person  
22          trained in the use of defibrillators at  
23          all times during the use by permit or  
24          license of a City facility.

5                     COUNCILMAN JONES:

6           Mr. President, today I offer three bills  
7           on your behalf and one privileged  
8           resolution.

9                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Thank you, Councilman.

11                    CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
12          amending Chapter 10-800 of The  
13          Philadelphia Code, entitled "Safety," by  
14          adding a new section to make police  
15          interactions with gun owners safer by  
16          including duties and penalties for  
17          individuals stopped by law enforcement  
18          officers who are licensed or exempted to  
19          carry a concealed firearm and are in  
20          possession of a firearm.

21                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22          Referred to committee.

23                    CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance  
24          amending various sections of Title 9,  
25          entitled "Regulation of Businesses,

2           Trades and Professions," and Title 10,  
3           entitled "Regulation of Individual  
4           Conduct and Activity," of The  
5           Philadelphia Code relating to duties of  
6           individuals and their weapons, firearms,

12          us today named Miriam Stewart. Miriam is  
13          heading to 9th grade at Penn Charter, and  
14          Justice is a rising senior at Central  
15          High School, and Arian is a rising junior  
16          at Bodine.

17                      They both come to our office  
18          through the Philadelphia Youth Network,  
19          an organization that helps our young  
20          people prepare for the workforce. PYN  
21          prepares year-round -- provides  
22          year-round work-ready employment  
23          programming and educational initiatives  
24          for in-school and out-of-school children  
25          and young adults age 12 to 24. PYN is an

2 exemplary community partner, and I'm  
3 proud to have two of their smart,  
4 hard-working students in my office this  
5 summer.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilwoman.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Congratulations. Thank you for being  
12 here. We appreciate it.

13 The Chair now recognizes  
14 Councilman Henon for a motion concerning  
15 the bills on the Second Reading and Final  
16 Passage Calendar today.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
18 Mr. President. I move that the rules of  
19 Council be suspended as to permit the use  
20 of a Consent Agenda to consider the

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman Henon. Before  
13 considering these bills and resolutions  
14 that are on the Final Passage Calendar  
15 today -- a little housekeeping.

16 It's been moved and seconded  
17 that the rules of Council be suspended to  
18 permit the use of a Consent Agenda to  
19 consider the bills just read by  
20 Councilman Henon.

21 All those in favor indicate by  
22 saying aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 ayes have it, the motion carries, and we  
5 will consider the Consent Agenda shortly.

6 The Chair again recognizes  
7 Councilman Henon for the purpose of  
8 calling up bills and resolutions on the  
9 regular Second Reading and Final Passage  
10 Calendar.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
12 Mr. President. In addition to the bills  
13 being considered on the Consent Agenda,  
14 the following resolutions and bills are  
15 being called up from the Second Reading  
16 and Final Passage Calendars today. They  
17 are Bill Nos. 190566, 190567, 190568,  
18 190569, 190571, 190572, 190573, 190574,  
19 190575, 190576, 190577, 190579, 190580,  
20 190584, 190467-A, 190253. All other  
21 bills and resolutions are being held.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 Okay. Thank you. Before  
25 considering these resolutions and bills,

2           we will consider public comment as  
3           follows:

4                     Today we're going to try to  
5           accommodate everybody possible. We have  
6           a significant number of individuals who  
7           want to testify today. I just want for  
8           the record, I know there's a number of  
9           people that I believe would like to speak  
10          about the issue relating to police  
11          postings and you've indicated on the  
12          list, using the newest tradition, where  
13          you put down something else such as  
14          school suspension to get to what you  
15          really want to speak on. So because  
16          there has been a resolution that is  
17          introduced that is on the Final Passage  
18          Calendar today, you can speak about the  
19          issue as it relates to police posting.  
20          So we don't have to segue into what you  
21          really want to talk about. All right?

22                     Now, I know you all like that  
23          part. Now, look, I understand. I know  
24          what goes on. It's all good, though.

25                     The other issue is, though, we

2           have a lot of people that want to speak,  
3           and under the rules, it allows us to cut  
4           off some subject matter. I don't want to  
5           do that. I want to make sure that  
6           everybody that's come down has an  
7           opportunity to speak. So I'm going to  
8           have to limit your time to two minutes.  
9           And best possible, if you can just alter  
10          your conversation as best as possible to  
11          reflect a two-minute time limit. Because  
12          I know a lot of people came down and  
13          there's some very important things on the  
14          agenda today. So I want to make sure  
15          everything has a chance. Okay?

16                        So when your name is called,  
17          you will go to the middle of the  
18          Chambers. For those of you that have not  
19          been here before, that podium in the  
20          middle has a device on it. When the  
21          light turns green on that device, it will  
22          be your time to speak. When the light  
23          turns yellow, you will have 30 seconds to  
24          conclude your remarks, so we please ask  
25          you to kind of start wrapping it up.

2           When the light turns red, we would ask  
3           that you please adhere to the guidelines  
4           and conclude your remarks.

5                        Again, we want to make sure  
6           that everybody has an opportunity to  
7           speak, so we please ask you to adhere to

9                        Thank you very much for your  
10          consideration.

11                      And, Mr. Decker, if you could  
12          call the first name on the list.

13                      MR. O'DONNELL: Ed O'Donnell.

14                      (No response.)

15                      MR. O'DONNELL: Ed O'Donnell.

16                      (No response.)

17                      CHIEF CLERK: Imam Isa Mateen.

18                      (Witness approached podium.)

19                      IMAM MATEEN: My name is Imam  
20          Isa Mateen.

21                      Regarding the bill about  
22          suspending students, suspending the  
23          school students, we don't need our  
24          children suspended walking the streets  
25          where they will be committing crimes or

2           just getting into problems, being picked  
3           up by police, and we know there's a  
4           problem with the police. We don't need  
5           that.

6                     The police are not concerned  
7           with our youth. They have no confidence  
8           in the police. The police -- with this  
9           300 police making these statements, no  
10          one believe there's only 300 police. In  
11          fact, the entire Fraternal Order of  
12          Police, in the view of us, is a criminal  
13          organization that should be prosecuted  
14          under the RICO Act.

15                    (Applause.)

16                    IMAM MATEEN: They are in line  
17          with a global white supremacist terrorist  
18          network that is responsible -- that is in  
19          line with the people responsible for  
20          bombing churches, shooting up mosques in  
21          New Zealand. This network exists in our  
22          Police Department, and we don't want to  
23          turn our youth over to this terrorist  
24          network.

25                    We want the police to be -- it

2           really should be disbanded and replaced,  
3           because all the FOP does is protect  
4           criminal cops, racist cops, white  
5           supremacist cops.

6                           (Applause.)

7                           IMAM MATEEN: So we are not in  
8           favor of turning our youth over to be  
9           arrested, beaten, and assaulted by the  
10          police.

11                           (Applause.)

12                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you so much for your testimony.

14                           CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green.

15                           (Witness approached podium.)

16                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
17          afternoon.

18                           MS. GREEN: Good afternoon. I  
19          just want to start off, we're opposed to  
20          Bill 190356. The reason why we're  
21          opposed to this, because the fact that  
22          this is a market-rate development that  
23          will be moved in. And the Planning  
24          Commission, the Planning Commission staff  
25          said they do not support this project.

2           When have you ever known the Planning  
3           Commission staff not to support a new  
4           development? They said it would lead to  
5           displacement and housing price increases.

6                        I'm calling on some of our  
7           Councilpeople to give us a postponement.  
8           The black community was shut out of all  
9           meetings. If this was such a wonderful  
10          project, why didn't our Councilman tell  
11          us this during reelection? Why didn't he  
12          say, hey, we gonna have a development  
13          with \$750 apartments? No, because \$750  
14          is a studio apartment. They forgot to  
15          tell you that. \$1,200 is one-bedroom all  
16          the way up to 1,800.

17                       Do you care the fact that these  
18          complexes will speed up gentrification in  
19          poor areas? Do you care if the fact that  
20          the rents will increase in the black  
21          areas going all the way back? Do you  
22          care that the fact that the developers  
23          will try to target Wilson Park, PHA, and  
24          all of the black areas? Do you care that  
25          newcomers will come and dictate and

2           control the area with RCOs, excluding  
3           black and low-income people from  
4           policing -- with over-policing and racial  
5           profiling? They will make the poor  
6           people feel like they're unwanted down  
7           there.

8                        I appreciate everybody here for  
9           police brutality, but this is housing  
10          brutality when a child is uprooted from  
11          their neighborhood, from their school,  
12          from their friends, and they're placed in  
13          a shelter. Do you know what the mental  
14          anguish is on that, to understand that  
15          you are no longer -- that you're in a  
16          shelter? That is mental anguish, and  
17          that is housing brutality.

18                       We must address this. We are  
19          asking you to give us a postponement.  
20          Let us speak with this developer.

21                       (Applause.)

22                       MS. GREEN: When you give him  
23          an overlay, when you give him an overlay,  
24          he never comes back. He doesn't have to  
25          accept the community engagement. He

2           doesn't have to go through the community  
3           process, and it gets rid of the ZBA  
4           process.

5                       Give us a postponement and let  
6           us speak with the developer so we can  
7           minimize gentrification --

8                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you, Ms. Green.

10                      MS. GREEN: -- in our  
11           neighborhood.

12                      Thank you.

13                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14           Thank you.

15                      (Applause.)

16                      CHIEF CLERK: Charles Reeves,  
17           Jr.

18                      (No response.)

19                      CHIEF CLERK: Charles Reeves,  
20           Jr.

21                      (No response.)

22                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next  
23           name.

24                      CHIEF CLERK: Laverne Johnson,  
25           commenting on 190356.

2                   (Witness approached podium.)

3           MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon,  
4 everybody.

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
6 afternoon.

7           MS. JOHNSON: I would like to  
8 speak on the Bill 190357. Laverne  
9 Johnson. That's who I am. And to our  
10 Councilman, we feel very appalled that we  
11 were not invited to any of the meetings  
12 about that project in South Philadelphia.  
13 We are extremely appalled, because the  
14 Italian neighborhood was invited to a  
15 meeting. We didn't find out about the  
16 meeting until it's now two weeks ago  
17 Thursday, and we really are very upset  
18 about that.

19                   We need to meet with the  
20 developer. We need to meet with the  
21 developer. I think again and again and  
22 again, this is just outrageous to our  
23 community, and we just don't -- we're not  
24 going to stand for it. We are not going  
25 to stand for it. We are totally upset

2           about that. And I believe it's  
3           plantation politics. That's what it is,  
4           plantation politics.

5                           (Applause.)

6           MS. JOHNSON: Business as  
7           usual.

8                           And another thing I would like  
9           to say, I appreciate everybody being  
10          honored. Everybody needs to be honored,  
11          but I believe that City Council need to  
12          take all that somewhere else. This is  
13          City time and it's City business, and  
14          business as usual gotta go. It gotta go.  
15          Even the man of God said it this morning,  
16          business as usual must go. It has to go.  
17          And God knows everybody needs to be  
18          honored, but I believe you need to take  
19          it at another place at another time and  
20          let us deal with business, City business.

21                          I am appalled at City Council  
22          at the very moment. I really am. My  
23          soul is upset with City Council right  
24          now. Business as usual gotta go. It's  
25          too serious out here. The police are

2           hurting -- my 13- and 14-year-old boys,  
3           they don't know nothing about crime.

4           They really don't. Innocent children.

5           And they got stopped on Memorial Day for,  
6           what is it, what do you call it, what do  
7           you call it when they touch the children?

8           They said they -- stop and frisk, that's  
9           what it was. They always --

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Ma'am.

12                   MS. JOHNSON: -- see the  
13           children.

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15           Ma'am, thank you.

16                   MS. JOHNSON: And that's what  
17           they call it. They said that somebody  
18           else just got robbed somewhere. Stop and  
19           frisk.

20                   (Applause.)

21                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22           Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

23                   CHIEF CLERK: Ethel Wise,  
24           commenting on 190356.

25                   (Witnesses approached podium.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3           afternoon.

4                   MS. WISE: Ethel Wise.

5                   UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good  
6           afternoon, President of Council, and good  
7           afternoon, Council. We, the residents of  
8           Wilson Park Resident Council, support the  
9           2301 Oregon Avenue Shopping Center. The  
10          Resident Council of Wilson Park currently  
11          helps over 680 residents in the housing  
12          development located in the heart of South  
13          Philadelphia. The 2301 Oregon Avenue  
14          Shopping Center will benefit the  
15          residents and community tremendously.  
16          The new development of the shopping  
17          center will provide several jobs for the  
18          residents and the community.

19                   The residents of Wilson Park  
20          and the community will be close to home  
21          while making a better life for their  
22          families by becoming employed.

23                   We would sincerely appreciate  
24          City Council's support of our decision in  
25          supporting 2301 Oregon Avenue Shopping

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           Center.

3                     Thank you for your  
4           consideration. Sincerely, the Wilson  
5           Park Resident Council.

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

8                     (Applause.)

9                     CHIEF CLERK: Claudia Sherrod,  
10          commenting on 190356.

11                    (Witness approached podium.)

12                    MS. SMITH-SHERROD: Hello. My  
13          name is Claudia Smith-Sherrod and I come  
14          here representing Bill No. 190356. I am  
15          in full support of the 23rd and Oregon  
16          Shopping Center. I have lived in this  
17          community for well over 60 years, and  
18          I've seen the deterioration of this  
19          facility, and I think it's a great, great  
20          project and I am 1,000 percent in support  
21          of it.

22                    The key businesses that are  
23          staying are Shop Rite, Ross, Modell's, LA  
24          Fitness, Rainbow, and Dunkin Donuts.  
25          There'll be others, and I'm excited about

2           it, because I still like shopping.

3                       New stores are being brought in  
4           to fill in vacant spaces and creating 210  
5           new jobs. The parking lot and property  
6           boundaries will be landscaped, greening  
7           the properties with trees and other  
8           plants.

9                       The Economic Opportunity Plan  
10          has diversity goals exceeding City  
11          targets, 40 percent minority and women  
12          participation in the construction. You  
13          can't ask for much more. I mean, I'm  
14          just excited.

15                      Thank you.

16                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17          Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

18                      MS. SMITH-SHERROD: One other  
19          comment, if I didn't overstate my time.  
20          I think that in terms of the Police  
21          Department, Article 6, Section 1-10  
22          should be read and the police should be  
23          fired.

24                      (Applause.)

25                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2           Thank you for your testimony.

3                   CHIEF CLERK: Solomon Jones.

4                   (Witness approached podium.)

5                   (Applause.)

6                   (Audience members chanting "No  
7 justice, no peace.")

8                   MR. JONES: If you are here --  
9 thank you, thank you, thank you. We are  
10 here at Philadelphia --

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
12 on, folks.

13                   MR. SOLOMON: We are here as  
14 Philadelphians because we pay taxes. We  
15 are here as Philadelphians because this  
16 ornate Chamber with the gold inlay and  
17 with the marble and with the carpet, this  
18 is ours, and everybody in here works for  
19 us. And so we support Derek Green's  
20 resolution calling for hearings on the  
21 racist police who posted on Facebook and  
22 who said openly that they hate the people  
23 whose communities they patrol.

24                   We are here on behalf of our  
25 wives and our children. We are here on

2           behalf of our husbands, our sons. We are  
3           here on behalf of the people, because we  
4           will not have racist police patrolling  
5           our streets.

6                         Now --

7                         (Applause.)

8                         MR. JONES: City Council, many  
9           of you are friends. Many of you I have  
10          worked with. Last time I was here, you  
11          were recognizing me. I am now here to  
12          recognize the fact that you work for us.

13                        (Applause.)

14                        MR. JONES: I am here now to  
15          recognize the fact that Derek Green only  
16          has ten co-sponsors on that resolution.  
17          Where are the rest?

18                        All of you work for us. We  
19          need you standing up for us. So we will  
20          not stand for you sitting down on this  
21          issue. We will see you at election time  
22          if you are not supporting this  
23          resolution.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        MR. JONES: We need all of you

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           standing up together on this issue and  
3           making sure that our communities are  
4           safe. That's what we sent you here for.  
5           Not to recognize me or anybody else. We  
6           sent you here to represent the people.  
7           We need you representing the people. We  
8           need you standing up on this issue. We  
9           need you telling the police that you  
10          stand with us and not with anybody else.

11                   (Applause.)

12           MR. JONES: We need to be  
13           protected in this issue by our people.

14           And so we are not asking. We  
15           are not imploring. We are demanding,  
16           City Council, that you stand up on this  
17           issue.

18                   (Applause.)

19           MR. JONES: And the last thing  
20           I want to say, on behalf of my wife and  
21           my children, on behalf of my neighbors  
22           and all of the people who I love, on  
23           behalf of everyone here in the City of  
24           Philadelphia, no justice.

25           AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No peace.

2           MR. JONES: No justice.

3           AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No peace.

4           MR. JONES: No justice.

5           AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No peace.

6           MR. JONES: No racist.

7           AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Police.

8           MR. JONES: Peace.

9           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Thank you.

11                   (Applause.)

12          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Okay. Let's go through the list. Thank  
14          you so much for your testimony.

15          CHIEF CLERK: Alyn Waller.

16                   (Applause.)

17                   (Witness approached podium.)

18          REVEREND WALLER: I stand in  
19          support of the bill being offered by  
20          Derek Green and I stand in support of the  
21          words already offered by Solomon Jones.  
22          All of us are here because we know what  
23          is right. You know what is right. We  
24          expect you to do what is right.

25                   The reality is, we cannot

2           afford this type of police behavior in  
3           our community. Everyone has stood up.  
4           We have not heard from you yet. We  
5           expect to hear from you, but not only in  
6           voice but also in deed.

7                        Thank you.

8                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you, Pastor.

10                       (Applause.)

11                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Thank you for your testimony, Reverend.

13                       CHIEF CLERK: Mark Tyler.

14                       (Applause.)

15                       (Witness approached podium.)

16                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
17           afternoon.

18                       REVEREND TYLER: Thank you very  
19           much. We come standing as a coalition,  
20           Rally for Justice. We want to thank  
21           Solomon Jones for calling all of us  
22           together. Today we stand -- I stand on  
23           behalf of the Live Free Campaign of  
24           POWER. We're joined with Black Clergy of  
25           Philadelphia, National Action Network,

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           NAACP, Guardian Civic League,  
3           Philadelphia Student Union. We stand  
4           with those who we've named and those who  
5           are also nameless, who also come out  
6           today to bring attention to the Plain  
7           View Project.

8                     If you've not seen it, I urge  
9           you to go to [plainviewproject.org](http://plainviewproject.org). There  
10          you will find some of the most hateful,  
11          vile speeches you ever seen, not just by  
12          anyone but by 328 Philadelphia police  
13          officers.

14                    We've heard from the Mayor. We  
15          met with him, and he expressed to us his  
16          outrage and displeasure. We heard from  
17          the Commissioner, who similarly was upset  
18          and outraged and has backed it up by  
19          taking 72 persons off the streets, and we  
20          hope that they'll soon not only be off  
21          the streets, but also be fired.

22                    (Applause.)

23                    REVEREND TYLER: And yet  
24          strangely we've not heard from this  
25          Council in a unanimous body.

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   We appreciate the efforts of  
3           those individuals who have presented  
4           resolutions and bills. We stand in  
5           support of the bill by Councilmember  
6           Green and by the efforts of  
7           Councilmembers Jones and -- Curtis and  
8           also Gym, but we need to hear and see the  
9           same energy by this body that it put into  
10          muting R. Kelly, who does not live in  
11          Philadelphia, who does not patrol the  
12          streets of Philadelphia, who has never  
13          stopped and frisked anyone in  
14          Philadelphia. If this body can  
15          unanimously vote to mute R. Kelly,  
16          certainly it can do the same for the 328.

17                   (Applause.)

18                   REVEREND TYLER: Let me just  
19          say this before I take my seat: Maybe  
20          some of you are quiet because you haven't  
21          seen the posts. Here's one of the  
22          greatest hits: Death to Islam. Here's  
23          another that says that black folk --  
24          blacks just seem to don't want to listen  
25          to police, have violent tendencies like

2           jungle animals. And if you didn't need  
3           incentive enough, this is what they said  
4           about your Council colleague, Cindy Bass,  
5           that someone should shut and smack this  
6           stupid in the mouth.

7                     If you won't stand up for the  
8           City, stand up for your colleague.

9                     Thank you.

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you.

12                     (Applause.)

13                     (Audience members chanting "No  
14           justice, no peace.")

15                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16           Okay. Thank you.

17                     Next name.

18                    CHIEF CLERK: Paula Peebles.

19                     (Witness approached podium.)

20                    MS. PEEBLES: No justice.

21                    AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No peace.

22                    MS. PEEBLES: No racist police.

23                     I want to thank City Council  
24           for giving us this opportunity. Thank  
25           you, Mr. President. But I'm standing

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           here in solidarity with my colleagues  
3           that have already spoken, and I join them  
4           in thanking WURD and citizen Solomon  
5           Jones for bringing us together.

6                     It's a total disgrace what has  
7           been revealed to us, but we know the Lord  
8           works in strange ways, and that's why it  
9           has been revealed to us. And we won't be  
10          quiet. We won't let it just be swept  
11          under the rug like it has been done so  
12          many times by the FOP and the police.  
13          But you all that know me know I always  
14          talk about economics, so I'm going to  
15          interject that.

16                    The police get paid by our real  
17          estate and tax dollars.

18                    (Applause.)

19                    MS. PEEBLES: So we asking  
20          those other Councilpeople that have not  
21          joined this effort to be smart and join  
22          the effort that call for these police to  
23          be removed.

24                    It's a disgrace what they  
25          have -- the blood that they have revealed

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           and this action being smeared on the City  
3           of Philadelphia.

4                        But also as a Philadelphian,  
5           I'm proud that Philadelphia is leading  
6           the way, because there are eight other  
7           cities, there were eight other cities  
8           identified, but we are leading the way in  
9           relationship to what you should do when  
10          your police reveal to you that in fact  
11          they don't like those who they police.  
12          And what we saying is, no problem, we'll  
13          give you your exit, but you going to exit  
14          without our tax dollars.

15                        (Applause.)

16                        MS. PEEBLES: We refuse, we  
17          refuse to continue to pay their salary.

18                        This is a diverse city, and if  
19          you don't want to serve a diverse  
20          population, then you need to go where  
21          they're all white people of your kind.

22                        We will not back down. We are  
23          going to give the Mayor -- and I'm going  
24          to sit down -- the Mayor and the Police  
25          Commissioner the time that we indicated

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           to them yesterday, but that's it and then  
3           we're going to move on with the next  
4           step.

5                     Thank you so much.

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you.

8                     MS. PEEBLES: No justice.

9                     AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No peace.

10                    (Audience members chanting "No  
11           justice, no peace.")

12                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13           Thank you.

14                    Next name.

15                    CHIEF CLERK: Rochelle Bilal.

16                    (Applause.)

17                    (Witness approached podium.)

18                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
19           afternoon.

20                    MS. BILAL: Good afternoon,  
21           Councilman, Councilpeople, whatever your  
22           new name is. First of all, let me thank  
23           y'all for at least allowing us. I am in  
24           support of Councilperson Derek Green's  
25           proposal.

2                   Let me say this: I am a  
3           27-year veteran of the Philadelphia  
4           Police Department. I am a black woman in  
5           this city, and I am appalled that any of  
6           my colleagues can make a statement about  
7           people that live here in this city. If  
8           we have 11 Councilpeople sign on and the  
9           rest of y'all aren't, then there's a  
10          problem with you.

11                   (Applause.)

12                   MS. BILAL: There's no way, no  
13          way that anybody should be comfortable  
14          with that. There's no way, no way that  
15          you should be sitting here silent. If  
16          you are afraid, go home.

17                   I'm saying right now, that's a  
18          shame. I'm appalled. I'm ashamed. And  
19          for the good cops, it damages us. It  
20          damages us. There are a lot of good  
21          police that do a lot of good work in the  
22          City, on and off duty. Right now we are  
23          embarrassed and we are ashamed, and this  
24          is damaging the good work that all of us  
25          in this city do. It damages the trust.

2                   Do you know how long it's been  
3           that people like us, black cops, Hispanic  
4           cops, good white cops, all cops been  
5           working to build that trust? And for a  
6           few of us to think that they can just say  
7           anything they want about us?

8                   I am a Muslim, and I'll be  
9           damned if I let you tell me what you  
10          going to do to me being in this city.  
11          I'm a taxpayer. I'm a mother. Are you  
12          kidding me? If the rest of you don't  
13          sign on it, you need to go home.

14                   (Applause.)

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16          Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

17                   CHIEF CLERK: Gregory Holston.

18                   (Applause.)

19                   (Witness approached podium.)

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
21          afternoon.

22                   REVEREND HOLSTON: My name is  
23          Reverend Gregory Holston. I'm the  
24          Executive Director of POWER. I stand  
25          with Reverend Mark Tyler, the Live Free

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           team of POWER and also stand with Solomon  
3           Jones and the Rally for Justice  
4           requesting that this -- demanding that  
5           this bill be passed, this resolution be  
6           passed.

7                        I can't say enough. It is  
8           deeply rooted in what it means to be a  
9           Philadelphian, what it means to be an  
10          African American Philadelphian, the  
11          relationship with the Police Department.  
12          From the very first I can remember the  
13          image of seeing the Black Panthers  
14          stripped when I was just six years old,  
15          it gave me a message of how black people  
16          were treated in this city, and every  
17          event that happened since then, every  
18          event from a bomb being dropped on a  
19          community to police brutality, to the  
20          39th police precinct, to stop and frisk,  
21          all gave the same image, the same  
22          message, you are less than human, you are  
23          less than a person, you are an animal,  
24          you are worthless. That message has been  
25          sent over and over, and finally we see it

2           actually written before us in a Facebook  
3           post that, yes, really you are just an  
4           animal to us. And our response is not to  
5           do anything? Our response is not to  
6           stand up? Our response is not to use  
7           every level of power that exists in your  
8           hands to move and fire those police  
9           officers right away? How dare you not  
10          use every bit of power you have to make a  
11          change in this city?

12                           (Applause.)

13                        REVEREND HOLSTON: We shouldn't  
14           have to come and request just a  
15           resolution or just a hearing, but there  
16           should already be a bill. There already  
17           should be some law. You should be going  
18           to Harrisburg to change the arbitration  
19           system to allow you to fire these cops on  
20           the spot. That should happen right now.

21                        You should be fighting for us.  
22           This is our children. This is our  
23           babies. This is our -- won't you stand  
24           up today for us.

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Thank you.

3                   (Applause.)

4                   (Audience members chanting "No  
5 justice, no peace.")

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
7 on, folks.

8                   Next name.

9                   CHIEF CLERK: George Gould,  
10 commenting on 180936.

11                   (Witness approached podium.)

12                   MR. GOULD: Thank you. My name  
13 is George Gould.

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
15 on.

16                   Quiet, please. Please respect  
17 the speakers, please. Respect the  
18 speakers, please.

19                   MR. GOULD: My name is George  
20 Gould. I'm a Senior Attorney at  
21 Community Legal Services. I'm here to  
22 speak about Bill 180936. This is a very  
23 important lead bill. It amends the  
24 current lead-safe certification law,  
25 which was supposed to protect children

2           from lead poisoning, but we have found  
3           and the Health Department, the Law  
4           Department has found that it's  
5           unenforceable because they don't know  
6           when children six or under are moving  
7           into a property.

8                     The bill that is currently  
9           before Council is a terrific bill. It is  
10          a very effective bill, and it was  
11          scheduled to be voted on June 13th.  
12          Unfortunately this bill has been delayed  
13          until September.

14                    Twenty-two hundred children get  
15          lead poisoned in Philadelphia every year.  
16          We are extremely concerned about this  
17          delay. We have heard numerous reasons  
18          why the bill has to be delayed. We have  
19          been working on it for 18 months. One of  
20          the first reasons was, we have to find  
21          common ground with landlords and real  
22          estate people. There is no common ground  
23          when you talk about children being lead  
24          poisoned.

25                    We also heard that there's some

2           wrinkles in the bill, that there's some  
3           maybe enforcement issues. When there was  
4           testimony in committee about this bill,  
5           the Health Department and L&I made it  
6           abundantly clear that they will set up a  
7           system where L&I will have access to the  
8           Health Department database and they will  
9           know whether or not there's been a lead  
10          certification issued. If not, they will  
11          not give a rental license.

12                    The other question was, well,  
13           how do you notify landlords about the two  
14           bills. Also testimony from the Health  
15           Department, easy, you just send them  
16           letters.

17                    Thank you. This bill needs to  
18           get passed.

19                    (Applause.)

20                    CHIEF CLERK: Jana Curtis,  
21           commenting on 180936.

22                    (Witness approached podium.)

23                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
24           afternoon.

25                    MS. CURTIS: Good afternoon.

2           My name is Jana Curtis. I'm here in  
3           support of Bill 180936. Many of you know  
4           the story of my daughter's lead poisoning  
5           from the Inquirer's Toxic City series.  
6           I'm here on behalf of my daughter and the  
7           1,200 members of Get the Lead Out and  
8           every mother I've met with in the last  
9           two years, coaching them through the  
10          scary days after finding out your kid has  
11          been poisoned. Because let's face it,  
12          it's moms who bear this burden.

13                    There is a sexism in lead  
14          poisoning prevention work that sickens me  
15          and should sicken every one of you  
16          members of City Council. If you saw  
17          Kamau Bell's piece on CNN on Sunday, he  
18          talks about how lead poisoning is a  
19          man-made problem, and that came from a  
20          conversation with me. It's  
21          male-dominated industries that brought  
22          lead into our everyday lives, and it's  
23          male-dominated industries that are  
24          keeping it there. It's the  
25          male-dominated landscape of landlords and

2           developers who continue to poison our  
3           babies.

4                        But instead of endangering a  
5           man's profit, what we do as a city is, we  
6           hand a mop to a worried momma and we tell  
7           her if she can clean good enough, then  
8           she can protect her baby.

9                        It's unacceptable that this  
10          practice continue. In no other industry  
11          would you be allowed to bring a product  
12          to market that poisons 2,200 kids year  
13          after year. But here in Philly, this  
14          Council just shrugs at it.

15                      When I sat down for my  
16          interview with Kamau from CNN, he asked  
17          me about the Philly shrug, and I did what  
18          any good Philadelphian would do. I  
19          fought back. But this Council's inaction  
20          on Bill 180936 is proving that Kamau may  
21          know Philly better than we know  
22          ourselves.

23                      It has been 1,639 days since my  
24          daughter's first elevated blood test, and  
25          not one day has passed where I haven't

2           worried about her future. You are  
3           leaving behind babies by delaying this  
4           vote. Many of you have children.  
5           Remember the first time you held that  
6           baby in your arms.

7                     I'm asking you to stop  
8           shrugging at 180936. Vote now and vote  
9           yes as written.

10                    Thank you.

11                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Thank you.

13                    (Applause.)

14                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15           Thank you for your testimony.

16                    CHIEF CLERK: Nancy Lanham,  
17           commenting on 190467-A.

18                    (Witness approached podium.)

19                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
20           afternoon.

21                    MS. LANHAM: Good afternoon.

22           My name is Nancy Lanham and I am a  
23           steering committee member of the Pay Up  
24           PPA Coalition. Pay Up PPA is dedicated  
25           to fighting for an annual, recurring

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           revenue stream of at least \$25 million to  
3           the Philadelphia School District from the  
4           Philadelphia Parking Authority.

5                     The formation of Pay Up PPA was  
6           in reaction to the many scandals at the  
7           PPA, which came to light through reports  
8           in the Philadelphia Inquirer and in the  
9           Pennsylvania Auditor General audit of the  
10          Authority.

11                    Since January 2018, we have  
12          attended every PPA Board meeting and  
13          provided public comment in support of our  
14          demands for annual School District  
15          funding and increased transparency and  
16          accountability for PPA. We have also  
17          reached out to local and state officials  
18          receiving public support from the Auditor  
19          General for our efforts to hold PPA  
20          accountable.

21                    In addition to the many  
22          examples of the PPA's failures of  
23          transparency and good government found in  
24          the report of the Auditor General, one of  
25          its top lines was around rate increases.

2           Quoting from the audit directly, The PPA  
3           lacks formal methodology and procedures  
4           for determining the necessity of rate and  
5           fee increases which affect its  
6           contributions to the School District.

7                         This was in regard to a 2014  
8           request to increase parking penalties in  
9           front of City Council. When the  
10          increases went into effect, they failed  
11          to net the revenue promised to the  
12          Philadelphia School District, which was  
13          \$7.5 million annually.

14                        As City Council debates Bill  
15          190467, we are here to remind City  
16          Council that allowing PPA to increase  
17          penalties without analysis is business as  
18          usual.

19                        Pay Up PPA supports the sunset  
20          provision within this legislation. This  
21          gives City Council some ability to  
22          oversee PPA revenue generated by any  
23          potential rent increases.

24                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
25          you, ma'am. Thank you.

3           CHIEF CLERK: Jessel Alexander.

4           (No response.)

11          CHIEF CLERK: Stephanie

12          Watkins, commenting on 190441.

13          (Witness approached podium.)

14          MS. WATKINS: Good evening. My

15          name is Stephanie Watkins. This is my

16          first time here. I'm here standing for

17          the homeless in the City of Philadelphia.

18          I just became homeless myself, a woman

19          that has worked most of my life, and we

20          have absolutely no help in finding

21          housing coming across hard times, not

22          much income.

23                 There's women in the shelters

24          that suffer from sicknesses such as AIDS,

25          cancer, and someone there is absolutely

2           no help to help us find sustainable  
3           housing or low-income housing.

4                       We have -- we face many issues  
5           in those shelters and we feel like our  
6           backs is against the wall, because those  
7           that we speak to only defend their jobs  
8           within the shelters.

9                       So I stand here now to ask that  
10          that issue of not having much income --  
11          low-income housing be addressed for the  
12          shelters in the City of Philadelphia.

13                      (Applause.)

14                      COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
15          you.

16                      CHIEF CLERK: Emily Schapira.

17                      (No response.)

18                      CHIEF CLERK: Emily Schapira.

19                      (No response.)

20                      CHIEF CLERK: William Mgiles.

21                      (No response.)

22                      CHIEF CLERK: William Mgiles.

23          Mgiles.

24                      (Witness approached podium.)

25                      MR. MGILES: William H. Mgiles

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           is my full name. I actually came to  
3           speak on Bill No. 190575.

4                     I feel as though that I'm for  
5           this bill. Why? Because at the end of  
6           the day, we do need poverty reduction.  
7           The situation that I'm in now is because  
8           of my impoverished state.

9                     Now, I've been to this program  
10          called RISE, which is the Mayor's  
11          program, and we were promised to be  
12          placed in jobs. I completed at least  
13          four certificates out of this program,  
14          and like I have no jobs. I'm sitting  
15          here with no job. And I'm in a situation  
16          now to whereas I'm in a halfway house  
17          where they literally try and nail me to  
18          the cross because I have no job and I'm  
19          not able to provide them with proof of  
20          income.

21                    I literally walk the streets  
22          and I sell oils. I sell body oils in  
23          order to provide for myself. They claim  
24          that I'm doing something along the lines  
25          of criminality. You dig what I'm saying?

2           In order for me to provide for myself,  
3           wash my clothes at this halfway house,  
4           buy a soda and provide for my son, I walk  
5           around and I sell these oils, but yet I  
6           have staff in the halfway house literally  
7           trying to stop me from going out of this  
8           halfway house in order so that they can  
9           see me in a bad situation. They  
10          literally dropped what is called the  
11          state indictment on me because they think  
12          that I'm out there selling drugs and  
13          doing wrong things, and they took my  
14          Social Security card, my state ID. I had  
15          to get all this stuff over. Why?  
16          Because they want to see me in a bad  
17          position.

18                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: All  
19                    right. Thank you, sir. Thank you.

20                    (Applause.)

21                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Call the  
22                    next name, please, Mr. Decker.

23                    CHIEF CLERK: Annette Woodall.

24                    (No response.)

25                    CHIEF CLERK: Annette Woodall.

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   (No response.)

3           CHIEF CLERK: Maria del Carmen.

4                   (Witnesses approached podium.)

5           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Good

6           afternoon.

7                   MS. DEL CARMEN DIAZ (through

8           interpreter: So good afternoon. I'm

9           Maria del Carmen Diaz. I'm from Mexico

10          and I have worked as a house cleaner,

11          nanny, and taking care of older people

12          for 24 years. I'm a leader with the

13          Pennsylvania Domestic Workers Alliance.

14                   I'm here in support of the

15          resolution put forward by the

16          Councilwoman Maria Quinones to celebrate

17          the International Domestic Workers Day.

18          There's 16,000 of us here in Philadelphia

19          and 67 million throughout the world.

20                   As a worker, we live a lot of

21          difficult things. Sometimes we're not

22          paid for the work that we do. We don't

23          have any benefits, like sick time,

24          vacation time, or health insurance.

25          There's a lot of racism, and we're not

2           treated as equals.

3                       This is why we need a lot of  
4           changes and with this resolution for  
5           International Domestic Workers Day and  
6           the Domestic Worker Bill of Rights that  
7           is being considered as well.

8                       We want to thank the  
9           Councilmembers who have been supporting  
10          us, as well as the Kenney Administration  
11          for your support, and we look forward to  
12          that support and your vote so we can win  
13          this year.

14                      COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
15          you. Thank you.

16                      (Applause.)

17                      CHIEF CLERK: Shelly Yanoff.

18                      SERGEANT-OF-ARMS: You called  
19          Barnett?

20                      CHIEF CLERK: Eric Barnett.

21                      (Witness approached podium.)

22                      MR. WOODALL: Arnett Woodall,  
23          independent for Mayor.

24                      I want to speak on that poverty  
25          bill, and that poverty bill directly

2           relates to the police thing that we have  
3           going on, because accountability not  
4           being applied. We want to know how many  
5           taxpayer dollars are now going to be  
6           wasted because none of these police  
7           officers will be able to testify before  
8           none of the crimes that they've arrested  
9           people for. We want to know how this  
10          process is going to move forward, because  
11          now all of their testimony is tainted.  
12          They're not going to be able to testify  
13          against anyone. So that's hundreds of  
14          hours of Philadelphia taxpayer dollars  
15          wasted. There's no accountability. So  
16          we want to bring accountability.

17                    This poverty issue that we  
18                    talking about, I saw an article that I  
19                    just read last week, Council President  
20                    Green -- I mean Clarke. It talked about  
21                    the community agreements that's done in  
22                    the development process through the City  
23                    of Philadelphia.

24                    We got another group that's  
25                    talking that come home from prison. They

2           went through all the City of Philadelphia  
3           programs on crime reduction, two-week  
4           programs, six-week programs. None of  
5           these programs give these people that  
6           come home from prison second  
7           opportunities or second chances. All of  
8           these police officers, though, they'll  
9           get second chances, when the people of  
10          the City of Philadelphia do not get  
11          second chances. Your returned citizens  
12          are not getting second chances.

13                    We just seen another article  
14           where we're boasting about 8,000 jobs,  
15           but at the end of the day when we talk  
16           about poverty and these jobs only lasting  
17           six weeks, the jobs only last six weeks,  
18           and if they only last six weeks, this is  
19           stemming the policy on poverty.

20                    We also want to talk about that  
21           RCO process. The RCO process across the  
22           City of Philadelphia is creating poverty,  
23           and when we come back in September, that  
24           RCO process needs to be looked into deep.

25                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

2           you, sir. Thank you.

3           Mr. Decker.

4           CHIEF CLERK: Shelly Yanoff.

5           (Witness approached podium.)

6           MS. YANOFF: Thank you very  
7           much. I'm Shelly Yanoff. I am a private  
8           citizen, but for almost 30 years I was  
9           the Director of Public Citizens for  
10          Children and Youth.

11          In 1987, I was just beginning  
12          my work at PCCY and I was sitting in City  
13          Council listening and hopefully learning.  
14          Two nurses from Jefferson Hospital  
15          testified about the children they were  
16          seeing at the hospital that day who are  
17          forever harmed because of lead poisoning.  
18          I knew nothing about it. I was alarmed,  
19          children who are being forever injured  
20          because of lead.

21          Although England long ago  
22          forbade the use of lead paint in homes,  
23          we didn't get around to doing that until  
24          80 years after they did. And the cost of  
25          that delay, the cost of that delay was

2           severe in the lives of thousands of  
3           children in the states, in this city.

4                     It's always easier to put it  
5           off, to delay. The cost of delay is the  
6           cost that our children pay.

7                     We're finally close to  
8           providing a law with the support of most  
9           of you which will provide some  
10          protection. Congratulations to all of  
11          you for supporting it. But there seems  
12          once again to be a reason to delay.

13                    Make no mistake, every day you  
14          delay, some babies, some children are  
15          being forever injured, and they're  
16          innocent children. The most vulnerable  
17          of us pay the price for this delay.

18                    Pass the bill. Pass it now.  
19          Develop implementation plans this summer.  
20          Take a step that will save the future of  
21          thousands of children and this city.

22                    Thank you.

23                    (Applause.)

24                    CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

25                    (Witness approached podium.)

1           6/20/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3           afternoon.

4                   MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

5           This is an official decree of the people  
6           in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as  
7           such, requires immediate action and  
8           remedy.

9                   Every week, Council, Mayor,  
10          Governor, and others transfer private  
11          property to the government, probably  
12          illegally.

13                  Consent of the Governor is  
14          required to be proved before you act.  
15          Did the Governor ask you to deny or  
16          restrict public comment at City Council  
17          meetings, which has been done several  
18          times this year?

19                  Did the Governor approve the  
20          theft of my home and theft of my just  
21          compensation? Did the Governor prove  
22          your unanimous votes last June to spend  
23          upwards of 120 million federal HUD money  
24          to build a mall on top of my stolen home?

25                  If you do not want to perform

2           your known duty or task, why do you run  
3           for reelection? Failure to perform your  
4           known duty or task is known by military  
5           people as treason.

6                         Why hasn't the Attorney General  
7           investigated and prosecuted my numerous  
8           complaints?

9                         I call on the federal and  
10          Commonwealth governments to perform its  
11          constitutional obligation to investigate  
12          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
13          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
14          1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

15                        The denial of God-given 42 USC  
16          1982 property rights for 25 years is  
17          egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,  
18          and requires immediate remedy.

19                        A just government must obey the  
20          rule of law. This color of law  
21          government must have its Charter to  
22          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
23          compliant government is installed.

24                        Public servants cannot refuse  
25          their sworn duty to act any more than a

2           fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
3           sovereign people require oath,  
4           Constitution, and law be enforced, and  
5           jail is required for all of you who  
6           violate your oath, Constitution, or law.

7                   I remind Council, it takes a  
8           lot of cooperation to create and allow  
9           all of this monumental corruption.

11                   CHIEF CLERK: There are no

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15           Thank you very much.

16                   Speeches on behalf of the

18                   The Chair recognizes Councilman

19           Oh.

20                   COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

21           much, Council President. I just wanted

22           to announce that Matt Pershe, who has

23           been my legislative aide all these years,

24           he will be leaving my office. He was

25           accepted at Harvard University but has

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7                   Congratulations.

8                   COUNCILMAN OH: I offered him a  
9                   little bit more money, but he turned it  
10                  down.

11                  No. In all seriousness, I want  
12                  to congratulate him, thank him for his  
13                  work, and we wish him well.

14                  Thank you.

15                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16                  Thank you, Councilman. And, Councilman,  
17                  when he finishes, when he comes back,  
18                  you're going to have to offer him a whole  
19                  lot of money to get him.

20                  COUNCILMAN OH: I might need a  
21                  job.

22                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
23                  right. Thank you.

24                  Speeches on behalf of the  
25                  majority?

2                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
3 Jones.

4                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
5 Mr. President. On the last day of  
6 Council, I will not belabor these  
7 comments any longer than I have to, but I  
8 feel compelled to speak about what we  
9 witnessed today and put a couple of  
10 things in perspective.

11                  Number one, that I want to  
12 applaud my fellow members, in particular  
13 Councilwoman Gym, who is all on top of  
14 this early, who served as sometimes  
15 Council's Jiminy Cricket and voice of  
16 consciousness, and that was important as  
17 we started to put together our strategy.

18                  I want to recognize also my  
19 colleague Councilman Green for putting up  
20 the resolution and definitively stating  
21 our position.

22                  I want to thank the members for  
23 all unanimously supporting it, and even  
24 if you didn't, you kept it quiet and you  
25 didn't put it in a vote. So I'm going to

2                   take your silence as tacit approval for  
3                   speaking out on the issue.

4                   I want to also recognize the  
5                   Mayor, who did not let grass grow under  
6                   this issue, along with the Commissioner,  
7                   who took definitive action, and we're  
8                   going to see and give him time to see  
9                   where the due process goes with this.  
10                  But I want to also juxtapose this with  
11                  what is going on and what happened last  
12                  weekend.

13                  Last weekend there were 18  
14                  shootings resulting in close to 30  
15                  victims and five fatalities. I watched  
16                  Unforgiven, which is a movie by Clint  
17                  Eastwood. There were more fatalities in  
18                  a bad weekend in Philly than in the movie  
19                  Unforgiven.

20                  We have to have a balance with  
21                  our police officers that revolves around  
22                  trust, that whether you are a victim  
23                  and/or someone who needs their  
24                  assistance, you have to have a degree of  
25                  confidence that when you come to them,

2                   you are coming to the good guys that are  
3                   going to give you help.

4                   What those 300-plus officers  
5                   did was raise a shadow of doubt about  
6                   where they stood in protect and serve as  
7                   they swore themselves in towards us, and  
8                   a lot of times this street side justice,  
9                   this back and forth shooting of each  
10                  other is because they do not -- these  
11                  young thundercats don't often trust the  
12                  system to take care of it in a fair and  
13                  equitable manner.

14                  I speak to you also as a Human  
15                  Relation Commissioner for the  
16                  Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and there  
17                  is a thing called implicit bias. That's  
18                  when you don't even know what you're  
19                  doing is prejudice and racist.

20                  If you have these feelings, you  
21                  are entitled under the Constitution to  
22                  feel them and even say them in a private  
23                  way, but when you put on that badge, when  
24                  you go through our streets, we have to  
25                  have a higher degree of confidence that

2                   you are for us. And so when these  
3                   people --

4                                 (Applause.)

5                   COUNCILMAN JONES: So when the  
6                   public came down here today to voice  
7                   their frustration, and often times it's  
8                   misplaced at us often times, but they're  
9                   expecting us to put the feet to the fire  
10                  to our colleagues on the second floor,  
11                  and we have a responsibility to do that,  
12                  because we do in part control the purse  
13                  strings.

14                  So I look forward to what comes  
15                  next. I'm proud of the fact that my  
16                  colleague Kenyatta Johnson is going to  
17                  have those anti-violence hearings next  
18                  week. He has been consistent on this  
19                  issue, consistent on this issue.

20                  And so as we raise our voices  
21                  to talk about our displeasure about the  
22                  police that violated this and keeping in  
23                  mind what Councilman Green said, that  
24                  we've interacted with a lot of good  
25                  police that do a lot of great things in

2                   the community, we have to equally be  
3                   upset about the state of emergency that  
4                   is happening on our streets every day.  
5                   Because as we spoke today, there was  
6                   another murder in my district, a teenager  
7                   in Carroll Park. I don't know the  
8                   circumstances, but I was here. But that  
9                   makes him 154 for the year. That's 9  
10                  percent above last year. These are  
11                  problems that have percolated to a crisis  
12                  in the City of Philadelphia that needs to  
13                  be addressed, and we need to balance the  
14                  scales of justice by having confidence in  
15                  the people in blue that are sworn to  
16                  protect us.

17                                Thank you, Mr. President.

18                                COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19                   Thank you, Councilman.

20                                (Applause.)

21                                COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
22                   Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

23                                COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
24                   very much, Council President. I want to  
25                   thank my colleague Councilman Jones for

2                   such an eloquent speech about what  
3                   happened today. I also want to just  
4                   share that a lot of the work that we have  
5                   to conduct here in this body is to not  
6                   accept violence or take the traditional  
7                   approaches. We're not going to solve it  
8                   by policing up. There's not going to be  
9                   enough police that you can put on the  
10                  streets to tackle what is clearly a  
11                  public health emergency, especially among  
12                  our young people.

13                  It is wrong for us to turn  
14                  young people away from rec centers and  
15                  playgrounds and to not have those  
16                  actually open up late, especially in the  
17                  summertime.

18                  So we have a lot of work to do  
19                  on this. It's a long conversation, and  
20                  we're going to have a lot of  
21                  opportunities to do that, but I want to  
22                  thank Councilman Jones and all of the  
23                  Councilmembers here who are helping me  
24                  learn and who are all of us teaching one  
25                  another about how we're going to figure

2                   this out.

3                   So I also wanted to just say  
4                   that most of us know as Councilmembers  
5                   that we are only as often as good as our  
6                   staff, and two years ago my legislative  
7                   aide, Jordan Konell, walked into my  
8                   office and asked to work for the office,  
9                   and sat down with him for just, I don't  
10                  know, an hour or so and hired him on the  
11                  spot, which almost never happens for me.  
12                  And since then, he's been described as a  
13                  magician who makes things happen by  
14                  people who testify here in public office,  
15                  but he's also been integral to much of  
16                  the great work of my office, including  
17                  handling the fair workweek bill,  
18                  navigating that with businesses,  
19                  authoring the 1967 black student walkouts  
20                  resolution and presentation, residential  
21                  treatment school funding. He's been  
22                  involved in a lot of it.

23                  He loves this body. I think  
24                  that's the thing that I appreciate so  
25                  much. Not only is he a brilliant and

2           passionate and hard-working person, but  
3           he loves this institution, and I think  
4           that that's hard to find. He loves the  
5           process of what happens to make a bill.  
6           He loves the relationships that he can  
7           build both inside on this floor and  
8           outside on this body.

9                   He's going off to study at Penn  
10           Law, and along with his Central High  
11           School credentials and Yale and Rhodes  
12           Scholarship, I'm sure Penn Law is just  
13           going to cap it all off, but I know that  
14           he's always got a home here, and I wish  
15           him the best, and come back to us.

16                   (Applause.)

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
18           Congratulations.

19                   The Chair recognizes  
20           Councilwoman Parker.

21                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
22           you, Mr. President. I too want to lend  
23           my voice in saying thanks to Councilman  
24           Green for his leadership and look forward  
25           to the fact-gathering and evidence, not

2           only that we gather from the hearing but  
3           also from the third-party independent  
4           research being conducted on behalf of our  
5           city so that when we move forward, anyone  
6           who should go won't be able to go through  
7           the arbitration process and claim  
8           wrongful termination. We will have done  
9           our due diligence. So I appreciate that.

10                   I also have to say this and to  
11           my colleague Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,  
12           yesterday I was thinking about you,  
13           Councilman, and not from the perspective  
14           of being a legislator and/or  
15           Councilperson, but that I remember that I  
16           had a great deal of respect for you when  
17           I first met you because your first entree  
18           into community activism didn't come when  
19           you were asking somebody to push your  
20           button for you. It came because of  
21           something deeply personal that impacted  
22           your life, and without the power of being  
23           elected, you worked to try to come up  
24           with a solution within your own community  
25           to address it.

2                   And with that being said, I  
3                   want to ask all residents of the Ninth  
4                   Councilmanic District -- and, Councilman,  
5                   for the record, I'm going to be late, so  
6                   don't think I'm not showing up for you.  
7                   The hearing that will take place on next  
8                   Wednesday, June 26th, I believe it is, at  
9                   11:00. I want to thank you for your  
10                  leadership there. I know you, along with  
11                  Councilman Jones and of course with the  
12                  leadership of our Council President, have  
13                  had a laser focus on that area, and I  
14                  want to say thank you for that.

15                  In addition to that, a little  
16                  personal privilege here, and I'm going to  
17                  ask him to stand, Mr. Jalyn Scott Davis.  
18                  I did not know this gentleman before  
19                  today, but when I walked out into the  
20                  hallway, he proceeded to let me know what  
21                  he was here advocating for, that he was  
22                  the class of 2021. For any Cheyney  
23                  graduates in the house, he is going to be  
24                  alum of the first historically black  
25                  degree-granting institution of higher

2                   learning in the Commonwealth, and that's  
3                   Lincoln University.

4                   (Applause.)

5                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And right  
6                   now he's interning at PIDC, and he's a  
7                   resident of the Ninth Councilmanic  
8                   District in Logan.

9                   So, Jalyln, we honor you and we  
10                  shut the school down, and we were able to  
11                  get student representation on that Board  
12                  of Trustees, and don't you let anybody  
13                  take that vote away from y'all.

14                  Thank you.

15                  (Applause.)

16                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
17                  right. Thank you. Congratulations.

18                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
19                  Johnson.

20                  COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
21                  Council President. First I want to give  
22                  a shout-out to one of my staff members.  
23                  We have a luncheon for him later on  
24                  today. And most of you do know him by  
25                  the name of Dillon Mahoney. He's moving

2                   on to Temple University to be a lawyer.  
3                   This is the second one of my staff  
4                   members who also left the office to go to  
5                   Temple University to become a lawyer, but  
6                   the interesting part about Dillon and  
7                   also my former staff member named Peter,  
8                   who is now a lawyer, is they started off  
9                   doing policy work, with no law degree,  
10                  learning how to write legislation and  
11                  dealing within his own right was baptized  
12                  by the fire dealing with zoning. And so  
13                  most of those comments that are directed  
14                  to me regarding development in the Second  
15                  Councilmanic District, he will have to go  
16                  and deal with the community residents in  
17                  the neighborhood on the ground. And so I  
18                  remember him being green into a mature  
19                  policy work around the issue of zoning  
20                  and having no problem navigating that  
21                  process.

22                  So I just definitely wanted to  
23                  acknowledge him for his hard work, his  
24                  dedication, and also to take a moment --  
25                  I thank my colleague Derek Green and

2           Helen Gym and Curtis Jones, and we were  
3           all talking on the telephone late last  
4           evening, but this started even a week or  
5           two ago when the report first came out  
6           and really making sure that we had a  
7           responsible response, but at the end of  
8           the day, we all were under the same  
9           agreement that no matter how many  
10          investigations that you do, the actions  
11          of those officers were totally  
12          unacceptable like at the end of the day.

13                   And so I thank my colleague  
14          Derek Green for stepping up to the plate  
15          and speaking truth to power through  
16          legislation so we can get to the bottom  
17          of this issue.

18                   And what keeps me up late at  
19          night on a regular basis is similar to  
20          what Councilwoman Parker talked about.  
21          We had a Father's Day weekend. I'm a new  
22          dad, so I'm enjoying myself with my  
23          family. Nevertheless we see carnage all  
24          throughout the City of Philadelphia.  
25          Particularly in my district, a graduation

2           party, there was a mass shooting. And so  
3           we know when there are mass shootings,  
4           there's usually a certain level of  
5           attention that is given to those types of  
6           issues. And so I've been working with  
7           the members of the African and Caribbean  
8           community in the southwest part of my  
9           district, but also I want to use this as  
10          an opportunity next Wednesday to host the  
11          Special Committee on Gun Violence  
12          hearing. I'm inviting all of our  
13          colleagues to come to the table to kind  
14          of figure out on how we wrap our arms  
15          around this issue as the City. And if  
16          we're dealing with trust on one end with  
17          the Philadelphia police officers, who we  
18          actually need to solve these homicides,  
19          right, and so we need to have that type  
20          of relationship and that trust there in  
21          order for people to come forward with  
22          information to resolve the homicides that  
23          we're seeing, but also we recognize that  
24          we're not going to police our way out of  
25          this situation.

2                   And so I remember under a  
3                   couple other administrations prior to me  
4                   becoming a Councilperson where we had  
5                   beacon schools, where the schools were  
6                   open after hours to like 9 o'clock for  
7                   our young people to get involved in  
8                   things that are positive. We had curfew  
9                   centers throughout the City of  
10                  Philadelphia. I remember Judge  
11                  Dougherty, Supreme Court Judge Dougherty,  
12                  volunteer to open up a community court in  
13                  the 12th Police District to crack down on  
14                  young people when it came to them getting  
15                  involved in things that wasn't becoming  
16                  of them being productive members of their  
17                  society. I remember we had Hands Across  
18                  Philadelphia where we all came together  
19                  as a community and found different ways  
20                  of trying to support one another from a  
21                  partnership and coalition-building  
22                  perspective.

23                  And so that's going to be my  
24                  approach moving forward. Again, this is  
25                  something that keeps me up every night,

2           because at the end of the day, we do not  
3           want to see the lives of our young people  
4           taken away from senseless gun violence,  
5           but also as parents who have children and  
6           seniors who live inside our communities,  
7           they shouldn't have to fear going to and  
8           from their homes of being shot or  
9           murdered.

10                   And so I look forward to a  
11           robust dialogue but, most importantly,  
12           some action steps so we can move forward  
13           and making sure that our city is safe.

14                   Also, next Thursday in the  
15           southwest part of my district where the  
16           graduation party was shot up, we will be  
17           having a community meeting at Patterson  
18           Elementary School at 70th and Buist  
19           Avenue to begin looking at how do we heal  
20           the community and address those issues in  
21           Southwest Philadelphia. That was only  
22           one major mass shooting, but also we had  
23           several other shootings in the African  
24           and Caribbean community in the southwest  
25           part of my district. So we want to get

2                   down to the bottom of why we're seeing  
3                   this rise in the level of shootings and,  
4                   most importantly, making sure that our  
5                   neighborhoods are safe and our recreation  
6                   centers and our playgrounds are safe for  
7                   all of our young people.

8                   Thank you, Council President.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10                  Thank you.

11                  COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Everyone  
12                  have a blessed summer.

13                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14                  Thank you, Councilman. Keep up the good  
15                  work.

16                  The Chair recognizes  
17                  Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

18                  COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
19                  Mr. President. I rise to speak to three  
20                  points. First, like Councilwoman Bass  
21                  and many of my colleagues, we too take  
22                  great pride in mentoring young people in  
23                  the office, and this summer we have four  
24                  high school interns and four college  
25                  interns. And we know that when we do a

2           great job mentoring young people, interns  
3           like Katherine Gilmore Richardson grow up  
4           to become a perspective elected official.  
5           So I want to salute future leaders Anya  
6           Castro, Tyler McCauley, Jada Hall, Hailey  
7           Proctor, Sekou Doumbouya, and Stephanie  
8           Brown, who will be with us over the next  
9           8 to 12 weeks of this summer looking at  
10          government up close and personal.

11                    Secondly, I too want to  
12          punctuate the salute to Councilman Green,  
13          Councilmember Jones, and Councilwoman  
14          Helen Gym for being what I call  
15          thoughtful and judicious in how we  
16          approach this ugly matter facing our city  
17          with regards to the police.

18                    And to Councilman Johnson, you  
19          should know that it was Mayor Green --  
20          forgive me; Mayor Street and I who  
21          actually set up curfew centers during his  
22          administration, and they indeed made a  
23          difference in helping to keep young  
24          people on track.

25                    Lastly, Councilman Goode and I

2                   were noisemakers during our tenure  
3                   together here in Philadelphia City  
4                   Council, and I would be remiss, extremely  
5                   remiss, not to remind us that the latest  
6                   and aptly named disparity study was  
7                   recently issued by the City's Office of  
8                   Economic Opportunity, and the bottom line  
9                   is that there is not good news.

10                  Fortunately Councilman Goode and I have  
11                  been joined by others of us in City  
12                  Council who still deeply care about the  
13                  critical issue of diversity and  
14                  inclusion. And anything involving public  
15                  safety, you cannot talk about that  
16                  without talking about poverty, period.

17                  To the extent that we can do  
18                  better in giving and offering and  
19                  ensuring minority and women-owned  
20                  businesses have access to City contracts,  
21                  we all win. I will not stipulate the  
22                  numbers because they are in the report.  
23                  I will say they are troubling and that we  
24                  as a city must do better if we are  
25                  authentic and serious about fighting

2                   poverty and breaking the brutal cycle of  
3                   what it looks like.

4                   So in closing, when we take a  
5                   close look at the definition of diversity  
6                   and inclusion, we cannot talk about one  
7                   without looking at the other. Government  
8                   has to lead by example, because we know  
9                   when we have diversity, research tells us  
10                  that we have better and different  
11                  outcomes.

12                  Mr. President, I would submit  
13                  that our city must do better. Thank you,  
14                  Mr. President.

15                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16                  Thank you, Councilwoman.

17                  The Chair recognizes  
18                  Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

19                  COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
20                  you. I also want to thank everyone.  
21                  Today was an important day in that we had  
22                  many different groups come forward and  
23                  utilize this forum and this body to lift  
24                  up the voices of the folks who are  
25                  frustrated and concerned in the City.

2                   This is about restorative  
3                   investments. Restorative investments go  
4                   to our core and key to us lifting folks  
5                   out of poverty. While we will recess  
6                   this Council, the work is not done. Not  
7                   only will Councilman Johnson have  
8                   hearings next week, in the Seventh  
9                   Councilmanic District joined by  
10                  Councilman Squilla, Councilwoman Cindy  
11                  Bass, who is Chair of Public Health,  
12                  we'll be posting -- we will be hosting a  
13                  community hearing on updating the City's  
14                  efforts on the opioid challenges that we  
15                  face in Kensington. That will be on  
16                  Wednesday at 6 o'clock at Harrowgate PAL.

17                  So the work not only continues,  
18                  but I think it is during our opportunity

20                  and every single discussion that informs

22                  for that reason, I want to thank you,  
23                  Council President Clarke, for putting  
24                  together this Committee on Poverty. We  
25                  know what the problems are. We know the

3           we have to take bold action. I look  
4           forward to working not only with the  
5           co-chairs but the different community

11                   The issue of not only getting  
12          people out of poverty but really
